




New Equipment in Fabrication Department









During the past year, several major pieces of equipment have been added to the Metal Fabrication Department to improve their overall operation as well as to make better products for our customers.

Pictured on the left is Bob Nixon operating the new large vapor degreaser. This was a replacement of a smaller unit. The new degreaser is used to wash and clean all metal parts, cabinets, and racks. This is quite a comparison to the old acid washing done by hand.

Next is Karl Fleming working on the new Do All band saw. This machine, with the capacity to cut 8" cold rolled steel, will speed up many of our sawing operations. It can also be used as a filing and polishing machine along with making many of our punches and dies.

Don McCabe is operating the new surface grinder, which is used to

sharpen punches and dies. It will also be used to make precision gauges, jigs, and fixtures.

Next is the new heat treat oven used to harden and temper punches and dies. The new accurate themostatically controlled oven allows us to do many jobs which formerly had to be sent out.

During the year we also added our second South Bend turret lathe, which increased our capacity to economically produce small precision parts in large quantities. This machine is especially important now with the introduction of many new products.

Foreman, John Beckgerd, tells us there are more plans for the months to come, so you can see the Metal Fabrication Department is keeping up with modern improvements. This gives us the capacity to turn out more quality products as our company continues to expand.

New Telephone Dial Installation Completed

While the office and plant were closed Friday, July 3 to celebrate the Independence Day holiday, the Illinois Bell Telephone men completed the cut over to our new dial installation. For many years the company has considered making this move and last fall it was decided that it should be done.

The order was placed with the Western Electric Company for the equipment and for the past several weeks we have been visited daily by Western Electric and Illinois Bell installers and service men.

With the continued growth of the company, we simply outgrew the old manual type of installation. The new system will speed up the service both with customers and on calls within the company.




