

Congratulations to the Harris/Allied Broadcast team for meeting the major part of the goals for FY-89. In the case of radio orders and sales, both Richmond and Quincy exceeded their goals. Television orders were slightly under plan while

international orders were over plan for both locations. Overall we moved into FY-90 with a better backlog than experienced for the past few years and have substantially improved the market position of Harris/Allied. Harris/Allied is becoming recognized worldwide as one of the major leaders in the radio industry. Overall sales and profit exceeded plan.

Cost reductions in production and reduced price concessions in most areas accounted for the good gross margin achieved. The new products introduced during the year culminated with an excellent NAB show and a very positive Harris/Allied worldwide recognition. Needless to say, this was a busy and exciting year for all and also one of extreme satisfaction for the accomplishments in spite of the extraordinary effort by all



United States Telecommunications Training Institute

Harris Hosts 20 Third World Broadcasters at USTTI



A total of 20 broadcasters from 17 developing nations attended "Broadcast Transmitter Operation and Maintenance," a two-week, free training program offered by Harris Broadcast Division under the auspices of the U.S. Telecommunications Training Institute (USTTI).

Participants were from the Bahamas, Belize, Brunei Darussalem, Egypt, Ethiopia, Ghana, India, Kenya, Morocco, Oman, Pakistan, St. Lucia, Singapore, Sierra Leone, Tanzania, Thailand, and Uganda.

During the program, taught by Harris Broadcast Training Center Instructors Dave Kobe, Clarence (Doc) Daugherty and Dana Myers, participants studied the latest in broadcast transmitter technology.

Bridging the Gap

USTTI began offering tuition-free training to qualified telecommunications and broadcast professionals from the developing world in 1982, and Harris Broadcast Division became a participant the following year.

The need for hands-on and management training in telecommunications for the Third World was recognized during the U.S. government's preparation for the 1982 International

Telecommunication Union Plenipotentiary Conference in Nairobi, Kenya. The U.S. Ambassador to the ITU Conference, Michael R. Gardner, heard repeatedly from Third World telecommunication and broadcast leaders that the gap between developed and developing nations was increasing and, if developing nations were to enter the information age, training was urgently required.

From the beginning, USTTI has worked to meet three goals:

- Humanitarian: Recognizing that telecommunications is the actual pipeline for information which leads to economic, cultural and social improvements, USTTI programs provide individuals with skills needed to upgrade, maintain and expand communication systems.
- Political: Not only do USTTI programs offer training in the most modern methods and technology to help Third World governments operate more efficiently, but USTTI participants gain greater understanding of the United States and its positions on various international communication issues.
- Commercial: Through USTTI sponsorship, U.S. corporations make a long-term investment in developing future markets for equipment and ser-

vices in the Third World.

Focus on New Technology

Dave Kobe, manager of Harris' Broadcast Technology Training Center, notes that the company's patented digital modulation AM and solid-state VHF technologies attracted special interest.

Harris' digital modulator, introduced in 1987 in the DX Series of AM transmitters, improves reliability and ease of operation, but can cut a radio station's transmitter power bill by a third or more, and the new Platinum™ Series solid-state VHF TV transmitter line is designed to eliminate off-air conditions through built-in reliability.

Beyond the Classroom



Harris Sells DX-10 to Mainland China

During the week of July 24-July 28, two assistant engineers from the Shanghai Radio and Television Bureau were in Quincy for complete training on the bureau's new DX-10—the first ordered for mainland China.

The engineers, Sun Yao and Chen Xiaowei, are in charge of the installation, commissioning and maintenance of the transmitter.

Harris' sale to Shanghai Radio and Television Bureau resulted from a sales lead during the 1988 National Association of Broadcaster's Convention at Las Vegas. The order was placed in December.

Peter Koenig, Systems Engineer, attended the Amitra conference in Guanajuato, Mexico held August 11 and 12 with Bob Weirather, Director of Marketing for Harris Broadcast. Bob Weirather gave a technical presentation on digital AM transmitter technology. Unofficially, this was a presentation of DX transmitter technology, without specific reference to Harris as required by Amitra rules.

On a lighter side...



Dale Vandenboom a Finalist in Nationwide Value Analysis Contest



Dale Vandenboom, senior buyer for Harris Broadcast's Purchasing Department, received an honorable mention award in the 1989 Value Analysis contest sponsored by *Purchasing Magazine*.

Among nine finalists named in the June 1989 issue which recognizes top value analysis programs in the nation, Dale's entry was for a DX-10 transformer redesign effort which reduced transformer cost by 35 percent without impacting the quality or reliability.

Noting that Harris Broadcast's Purchasing Department works closely with Engineering on value analysis, Dale explains the program:

"While originally the DX-10 transformer hit cost targets, its price climbed to a point where it was exceeding original targets by 40 percent. Through value analysis, we were able to reduce transformer

costs without impacting specifications. All of the parameters established at the start of the DX-10 program remain in place."

Dale— a 30-year Harris employee who'd worked in assembly, industrial engineering and program management before joining the Purchasing staff three years ago—notes that value analysis is an ongoing function at the Broadcast Division. "We do a lot of this—but it's nice to get recognition," he says.

Here Are The Answers...You Guess The Question and who's asking them?

"The check is in the mail"

"Call me back after lunch"

"I'm deaf and I can't hear you"

"I can't pay because my bull turned queer"

"I never received your invoice"

You probably guessed right—the question is "Where is the money?" and the collectors are asking it every day of their working lives. Not an easy job. But, there are right and wrong ways to deal with it.

Some 85 percent of debtors' excuses are standard, time-honored dodges;' says Bernard M. Page, a credit collection specialist. Probably the most popular is "the check is in the mail," and sometimes it really is. According to Page, "Most people want to pay debts. True deadbeats are a small percentage." Truth is, though, deadbeats can kill a business. Many companies have more money tied up in delinquent accounts than they make in profits. Perhaps the problem is in too little effort put into training telephone collectors.

Collectors need to verify what a debtor tells them. If they say "the check is in the mail," they should be asked for the check number and if the debtor is a business, they should be asked who signed the check. The excuse of not having received invoices can be rectified by sending a copy via fax. Some companies will pay up right away to avoid getting collections by fax due to the various hands that paperwork may have to go through.

Yet another excuse, says Page, because of cash-flow problems, is "You'll get it when I get it." Page suggests not to ask "how much can you pay," instead ask, "how much are you short?" This works on their pride and you'll get the answer that will least embarrass them—in other words, they'll probably fork over twice as much as compared to "how much can you pay."

When worse comes to worse and the debtor says, "go ahead and sue me," try this tactic suggested by Page: "In court, your debt becomes public information, and your other suppliers could learn of this suit. That information could produce an avalanche of suits against your company. Only you know whether you can withstand an avalanche. Thank you—and good luck."

Bringing this closer to home and proving not all is grim for a collector...
J.R. recently received a letter from Intermart, Inc., complimenting Abby Vanderpool for her "patience in straightening out our account." The letter from Tricia Fierro went on to say; "She (Abby) is definitely


an asset to your department." Abby certainly hears her share of debtors' excuses, but, says, "There are those customers that are a delight to work with."

Let's Stay Healthy

How would you like to banish headaches from your

Try changing when, how and what you eat.

Now there is medical evidence suggesting that you can prevent many, perhaps most of your headaches by watching what, when and how you eat. This is good news for everyone. Ninety percent of all Americans get occasional headaches, according to Joan Miller, PhD. director of the Atlanta Headache Clinic and author of Headaches: The Answer Book.

Although the cause can be a serious ailment such as meningitis, a brain tumor or stroke, for the most part a headache is the result of a temporary change in our bodies. Miller explains; "Tension headaches, for example, happen when muscles of the head, neck and scalp tighten and blood vessels constrict. Other headaches involve vascular dilation-blood vessels swell and inflame, creating pressure on surrounding nerves."

That's where foods come in. When food chemicals get into the bloodstream, many of them constrict or dilate the vessels. The wrong chemical combinations, along with other factors such as stress, hormonal fluctuations and even the time of day, can intensify these reactions.

The worst headaches, suffered by 10 to 20 million Americans, are migraines. Usually you know when one is on the way; blood vessels in the head constrict, creating visual disturbances such as blind spots and shimmering lights. Then the vessels dilate, bringing on the pain, sometimes even nausea and vomiting. Many people take medication or simply accept these episodes as something they have to live with. However, researchers are finding that migraines often disappear when their victims identify and eliminate certain foods

At the Hospital for Sick Children in London, for example, doctors stopped migraine attacks in 82 out of 88 children by putting them on diets free of foods to which they proved sensitive. In another study conducted at Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center in El Paso, one-third of 43 adult migraine patients improved dramatically by avoiding suspected food allergens. Six patients were headache-free.

Allergy specialist James Breneman, MD, chairman of the Allergy Committee of the American College of Allergists, reports that 70 percent of all headaches can be traced to food sensitivities. The problem is finding what those foods are. Dr. Breneman is working on a patch test involving placing a food allergen on the skin. The patient goes on a week-long "elimination diet" during which he or she avoids the most common allergens, such as milk, wheat, eggs and chocolate. These foods are then reintroduced one at a time to watch for symptoms. This procedure reportedly works 60 to 70 percent of the time.

No one should go on an "elimination diet" without

a doctor's supervision, however, you can experiment by avoiding your *favorite* foods. According to Alan Levin, MD, of the University of California, San Francisco, School of Medicine, you can develop allergies to foods you crave. You can become sensitized to foods eaten every day.

Some common headache inducers include: nitrites, found in many processed foods especially hot dogs; tyramine, found in alcoholic beverages, especially aged wines and other fermented foods such as yogurt, pickles, cheeses, caviar, pickles herring and cured meats; salt, too much can make the blood vessels hypersensitive to other foods eaten (salt coming in contact with the stomach lining sets off a reflex action involving the vagus nerve which can stimulate head pain).

Now for some good news: some foods can help chase away headaches, such as: caffeine, it helps narrow dilated blood vessels that may be causing migraine pain (b + careful though because too much has a rebounr, effect-the vessels dilate); fish oil, the eiosr.pentanoic acid (EPA) found in fish such as salmon anr, mackerel, cut the incidence of severe migraines in nalf (Charles Glueck, MD, professor of medicine and rediatrics at the University of Cincinnati College of Medicine in Ohio, recommends not taking fish oil pills to prevent or treat headaches). For guidelines and diet plans you should see your doctor and refer to Levin's The Type 1/Type 2 Allergy Relief Program and Basics of Food Allergy by Breneman.


