1070 KFDI Wichita. Try at either sunset or at sunrise, despite all the others on 1070
1150 KSAL Salina. Park got them on a DX last season. 0630 s/on MM in Calif.
1250 WREN Topeka. Try MM when others are off. It's KFKU before sunset. "The pest
of the West." Very loud on WC.
1270 KSCB Liberal. S/off u/WHEF at 2330 in Colo.; s/on at 0700 heard in Calif.
1290 KWNS Pratt. Another one heard in Calif. at 0700 s/on.

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A MESSAGE FROM YOUR PRESIDENT
"Responsibility and the Free Press"

It has been said that the freedom to strike another person ends with the beginning of that person's nose. In other words, for every freedom granted to an individual that individual in return has a responsibility he must fulfill to all. Without responsibility there cannot truly be freedom. So it is with the free press.

Perhaps the choice of the word "free" when related to our club's editorial policies is not the best, for the word free implies the existence of no restrictions. The fact that we do have editorial policies should make it obvious that we are not completely free. Perhaps a better description would be a "responsible" press. It is a responsible press that we are striving to attain, yet what is a responsible press?

In our situation a responsible press could be best defined as one that serves to foster constructive ideas, opinions, and viewpoints as well as the presentation of factual news and information. Let us examine both aspects of the responsible press.

What is a fact? Although there may be various interpretation of this word, I shall consider a fact as being something that is true by the virtue of its impossibility to be disproven. The responsible press has a duty to report all facts pertaining to the subject at hand that are available to it. To shun from this duty, this responsibility, the responsible press loses its identity of responsibility and soon becomes the irresponsible press. Irresponsibility breeds contempt, which in turn breeds chaos.

Possibly even more essential to the heart of the responsible press is the promotion of constructive ideas, and here I emphasize the word constructive. Any press can foster ideas, but only the truly responsible press can promote constructive views. In a responsible press, constructive views, like facts, can be taken seriously or treated lightly, but they cannot be denied. Yet the press is still manmade and anything human has its weakness.

The press can be compared to one angle of a triangle, the other two being the individual and the audience served by that particular press, and of these three angles in this triangle, the press is the weakest. Why is this so? It is because to exist the press must rely on sources, and, just as the chain, the press can be only as responsible as its most irresponsible source. In our club's press--DX Monitor--it is only as responsible as its most irresponsible contributor.

Who is this "most irresponsible contributor" you ask? He is the one who acts before he takes time to debate whether his contributions are factual or constructive, or whether they are something submitted for the sake of merely contributing. It is because of him that we must still strive to become a responsible press.

Do you fit the description of our most irresponsible contributor? There should not be any doubt in your mind if you do not. If there is doubt, I ask you why? One reply might be that not all of us are adults. But because you may not be adults, must your contributions indicate it? I think not?

Time and time again I have been told that the main duty of an editor is to edit. This is a truism, but must it be? Again, I think not. If all of us were to keep in mind and continually apply in our reports to DX Monitor the definition of a responsible press, would there be a need for editors? There is a distinct difference between an editor and a compiler.

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It is time we all examine closely our habits of contributing to DX Monitor. This, in my opinion, is not too much to ask, for if irresponsibility continues to breed freely, continues to remain unchecked, we cannot have a responsible press, and without a responsible press we cannot have a free press.

Is not a free press, a responsible press, worth the effort to attain and maintain? The answer is in your hands.

In previous Messages I outlined two of my new programs that were at that time before the Board for their consideration. Having now passed, I wish to reintroduce these two projects for you.

The first one is the creation of officially-recognized local chapters of our club. The only prerequisites for official recognition are that each area applying must have at least five members located to make regular meetings practical and that those members draft and submit a set of operating laws not in violation of our Constitution and By-laws to the Board. That's all! At present there are several localities in the US and Canada that meet the numerical requirements, so if you live in one of these areas why not arrange a meeting of the local IRCAers and draft a set of rules to be submitted to the Board? Other than not violating the club's laws, there are no restrictions placed on those operating laws so you have plenty of room to maneuver.

Just what is the purpose of an IRCA chapter? If you're like most any other DXer, you're bound to want to meet with fellow DXers in your area, so in effect we are making your gatherings "official." However, there are several advantages to be gained and most important, through them valuable experience in club work can be acquired. Chapters can be an excellent foundation for future conventions; promoting club affairs in your local area by sponsoring DX programs, etc.; in fact, inter-chapter DX contests could even be arranged; and the experience gained in chapter work can pay off later because you will be given a good background in organizing and administering a club. The possibilities are endless, but it is all up to you.

What if you don't have five members in your area? No one's stopping you from recruiting new members to have enough to form a chapter! Were every member to get four new members we'd have over 1300 IRCAers! Impossible? Keep in mind that in less than two years we've grown as much as it took other clubs over a decade to.

So think about it. Creating chapters all over the US and Canada could just be the shot in the arm our club needs. But again, it's all up to you. Only you can unlock the unlimited potential we as a club have. If you already have five members in your area, submit a set of operating laws; if not, try enlisting new members. Why not give it a try? You've only got one thing to lose--a lack of spirit. For more information on forming a chapter in your area, contact me.

The second project approved by the BoD is the creation of the Ted Vasilopoulos Award. This award, in memory of our late charter member and one of our finest DX friends, was created to promote the improvement of BCB DXing through DXclubs--a goal that Ted held dear. The TVA will be presented annually at our conventions to the one IRCAer selected by you, the members, whom you feel has done the most in promoting our club, its programs, and goals. The TVA will consist of an inscribed plaque and a free year's membership. But to be representative of all of us, I am asking you to contribute now to the first annual TVA Fund. Just a dime or a quarter from every member would be enough to get the Award started.

If you believe our really hard working members should get more than a mere "thanks," why not send in a dime or a quarter or as much as you can afford to create a fitting award to some of the finest people in the world, the members of the IRCA.

- 990 XECL Mexicali, Mexico put in a super-fine signal on 12/26 at 0020 o/CEW (SGS)
- 995 HCEW2 Guayaquil, Ecuador very strong here on 2/23 from 2245-2300. Several R. Suceso ID's heard. (BN) "Ave Maria" hrd at 0601 2/14, then SS. I didn't hear any R. Suceso ID, but the phrase "Nuevo Mundo" heard. Very weak so probably HCEW2. (KGS)
- 1000 YNY Managua, Nicaragua sent what I consider to perhaps be the most cordial verie ever received from a station. The Gerente, S.R. Buenaventura Selva T., sends his most sincere greetings to the members of the IRCA. The address is Apartado Postal 1894. Note the new WRTH lists the call as YNDN, and FBIS as YNY. The verie doesn't specify. (LEG)
- 1020 --- ??? weak EE under KDKA and China on 2/3 at 0405. Probably ZCO Tenga from program and loop bearing. (KGS)
- 1025 HJER Cali, Colombia, "R. Pacifico" hrd well on this new freq. 2/15 @ 0100 s/off, taped and repr ted. (RJS). Hrd w/0100 s/off on 2/23 and 2/24 but not IDed, mention of Cali made and Colombian WA hrd but QRM(TVI) too great for slogan. (BN)
- 1035 4VEF Cap Haitien, Haiti hrd 12/26 at 2325, or their carrier, with all the WBZ sloop it was hard to tell about audie. (SGS)
- 1038 --- ?? UNID LA loud 2/14 @ 0415. W/?? (RJS)
- 1040 --- R. Peking, China excellent on 2/7. No trace at 0550, and excellent at 0610. Therefore, probable s/on is 0600. (LCM)
- 1070 --- ??? Weak UNID DU station with several interfering stations (NHK, CFAX, and SS). Children's music program from 0330-0400, then a 4 note chime. I suspect 12B, but am curious. (KGS)
- 1080 YVQJ Barcelona, Venezuela, excellent from 0530 on 0546 on 2/7 w/"R. Rumbos" Network news. (LCM)
- 1090 --- R. Peking, China good at 0613 on 2/7 due to late s/on of XERB. (LCM)
- 1095 JOHB Sendai, Japan. Japanese QSL #15. Just over a month to return, so NHK is much faster this year. (KGS)
- 1100 --- China. Chinese music with a Mandarin ID at 0515 EST on 2/5. Several US OC's bothered reception. (KGS)
- 1120 4BC Brisbane, Australia was sure to be the EE R&R station mentioning Australia in a casual way MM 2/14 0400-0444, before R. Peking took over. (LEG)
- 1135 HJAC Baranquilla, Colombia hrd with fantastic strong signal at 0609 s/en MM 2/14, 1Ding as "Emisora Riomar". taped report sten, with one I had of them on 1128 kc. in Febr., 1964. (LEG). Hrd on 2/13 at 2010 with a trumpet fanfare and at 2025 with "Emisora Riomar" ID. Three descending notes on an organ used as an IS. (RC)
- 1205 RTF Bordeaux, France, sent v/l in FF for 12/6/65 report. They were very specific as to freq, time, and date. Reports should go to the "Le Chef du Service des Relations Publiques" at RTF, 34 Rue Ulysse-Gayon, Bordeaux. (RB)
- 1223 --- Arganda, Spain was in very nicely again on 2/14 from 0102-0115. Part of the programming seemed to be a language lesson. (ELK)
- 1375 --- St. Pierre & Miquelon still eludes me for a report although I can hear them almost nightly with a weak to fair signal. One of these days! (ELK)
- 1470 XEBBC Tijuana, Mexico, please note calls are changed from XEAU(RJS). Hrd under these calls on 2/23 with good signal @ 2335. (BN)
- 1560 WRSJ Bayamon, Puerto, Rico hrd 0530 2/14 ann. gave call in EE, then had news and spot for Volkswagen in SS later. (BW)
