First to arrive was Percy Kestevan, who rolled into town on Monday, July 15. Early arrivals must run in the family, as second to arrive was George Kestevan, who showed up around noon Thursday. Many others arrived Thursday, but most appeared on Friday after the meeting room opened.

Friday afternoon saw about 15 persons touring KIRO

Radio-TV. Dave Hubert, CE for KIRO AM, gave a very thorough tour, followed by a lively discussion on DXing and veries, for which he received a well deserved round of applause. A tour of KJR & KISW FM followed. Thanks to the skillful navigating of the lead car, a scenic sidetrip was made through the enchanting Harbor Island industrial area.

Friday evening was open and everyone spent the time talking, making new friends, and consuming vast quantities of refreshments. Many were fascinated by a time line tracing the history of Seattle radio from 1919 to the present. The ERBA delegation - Kaskey, Northam, Prather, and Krejny - appeared for about an hour before heading for the local bars. An HQ-150 was on hand and some actually had the audacity to DX. Many locals were heard but TVI and power

Many members toured KBES on Saturday morning. That afternoon, a caravan of cars headed out to the naval VLF station at Jim Creek. The size of the installation amazed everyone, especially when the transmitter was toured. present were actually permitted to walk inside the different stages of the transmitter; as Richard Wolf put it at one point, "I've never been inside a power supply before." There were a lot of things there not normally found in your average DX shack, such as coils the size of cars and capacitors the

size of garbage cans.

The banquet unfolded in the penthouse at 7 p.m. An IRCA first occurred as the banquet was held where a radio station, KREN, once had its studios. After the banquet, John Mowbray, General Manager of KQIN, gave an excellent talk on his experiences in getting the station started. He included many fascinating comments and anecdotes about the F.C.C. and people he'd run across, and had many additional comments on broadcasting in general. Names were then drawn for door prizes. Joe Markewicz won a 2h hour timer, while John Clements and Brian Scully received a postal scale and an alarm clock, respectively. A pair of stereo headthones went to Bill Block while the biggest door prize of all - a door (complete with knob) - went to Richard Wolf. Rick Evans then conducted a highly successful business meeting, details of which appear elsewhere in DXM.

The auction followed. Bill Hardy acted as auctioneer with frequent assistance from Phil Bytheway. About \$152 was netted. As usual, those who bought junk paid high prices and those who bought anything useful got real bargains. For instance, Rob Harrington shelled out \$6 and \$7 for 1967 & 1968 WRTVH's while George Kestevan paid \$2.10 for a slide rule worth many times that amount. Father Jack bought a lot of stuff he says he'll use as filler material for the bulletin so if a lot of strange items appear in DXM in the coming months you'll know why. A mysterious package with Chinese lettering on it, which Percy and George Kestevan claimed contained Red Chinese contraband they smuggled across the border, finally went to Mike Worst for \$5.50. When opened, it was found to contain two tubes of toothpaste!

Most members checked out and headed for home Sunday morn-Those who remained headed for Talbot Hill Park for the softball game. Thanks to the brilliance of the Renton Park Department, IRCA was scheduled to use the baseball diamond the same time as a little league game. Since we were outnumbered, we headed for a clearing in the woods in the far corner of the park where a baseball polygon was constructed. It was a bit oddshaped, but it did have four sides. Home plate and third base were piles of sticks and leaves, while first and second bases were trampelled down gopher mounds. After a picnic lunch, the game got under way. There weren't enough people to form two teams and not everyone wanted to play, so it was everyone versus everyone. Scoring was difficult as people on base would sometimes change places with people on base but the apparent winner was Phil Bytheway with six runs, followed by Charlie Keleher with 4 and George Kestevan with s three. Bill Block and Bill Hardy were tied with two runs each, while Mike Worst and Brian Scully each scored one.

After the game, everyone returned to the hotel. Father Jack gave a presentation on how DXM is prepared and a discussion then ensued on using computers for DX related purposes. The rest of the day was spent entertaining several prospective members who dropped by, talking, playing with flipover mazes and listening to dirty tapes.

MINUTES OF THE IRCA BUSINESS MEETING RENTON --- 20 JULY 1974

President Richard C. Evans called the meeting to order in the Panthouse of the Sheraton Renton Inn at

9:40 p.m. Committee Reports were then presented.
Secretary-Treasurer Carl "Skip" Dabelstein reports
that the IRCA is sound financially at this time. Cash on
hand as of 30 June 1974 was \$2,597, the combined totals of a checking account and two savings accounts. Over the present fical year total membership has remained relatively unchanged. Publishing costs have increased significantly due to the use of a commercial printer for our offset bulletin. This has been partially offset by a reduc tion in postage costs due to the smaller mailing size and Father Jack's second class efforts. The IRCA faces rising costs, however, but intends to keep the present dues structure for some time in order to reduce some of our surplus cash. A detailed financial statement will be presented in DX Monitor subsequent to the end of the fiscal year on August 31, 1974.

Editor-In-Chief Father Jack Pejza, representing the Publishing Committee, reported that second class mail serwice, begun in March, has been a failure. There have been many difficulties in obtaining a permit. Our application, still pending, has necessitated that we pay the first class rate of 10ϕ per ounce while receiving second class service. second class rate is 2ϕ per ounce.) Second class mail service has been very; very poor and will be discontinued on the first September bulletin when we will return to first class. Within the next few months (the length of the delay is uncertain) we will be granted a second class permit. At that time we will be able to claim a refund on our excess postage. We will not, for reasons stated earlier, use our permit, however. As for printer costs, the regular rate in April 1974 was raised to \$11.00 per thousand sheets. We are still paying an earlier, lower rate, however. San Diego Printers was sold recently so the future of our costs is uncertain. On reprints (which are photocopied) we break even on printing and postage costs. There were 2200 reprints in the past year. Four people including Grant Manning, Father Jack Pejza, Dave Stroup, and Albert S. Lobel regularly meet to assemble and mail the bulletin on Saturday mornings. Grant provides the space for equipment and storage, while Father Jack looks after layout, pickup and delivery of the copy. John Kolb, Jim Campbell, and Ralph Sanserino also

lend a hand at various times. ANOTHER REGULAR IS RANDY SEAVER. (FJP)
Countries List Committee Chairman Mike Worst reported that a new list will be published this year. The Committee is short two members. Anyone wishing to join should contact Mike immediately (see his address in the Western DX Forum).

The Elections Committee Chairman reported that Seattle had won the bid for the '74 convention site and that all three by-laws proposals had passed in the election of February 2, 1974. The Ted Vasilopoulos Award election, held May 4, 1974, had been unfavorably affected by the poor second class mail service with many ballots not arriving until the June 7, 1974 deadline and a few coming in after this date. Chairman George Jensen stated that members could assist him by "More active participation by the membership in casting ballots in the elections. I read a lot of gripes, but when the time comes for an official form of redress,

these members disappear. Vote."

Percy R. Kesteven, Achievement Awards Committee
Chairman, reported that 37 awards had been given out over

the past year.

Contest Committee Chairman Dr. Michel Breger reported that the five contest divisions were very popular with 26 participants in the Domestics and 16 contestants in the Foreign Division. Experimental changes this year included bonus points for the domestic contest, printed certificates instead of money for prizes, and an amateur section for

novice DXers. The contest lost money because of the printing costs involved with the certificates, but the Committee expects to recoup these losses next year as surplus certificates were printed for upcoming contests.

The winner of this year's Ted Vasilopoulos Award was

Bruce Portzer.

President Evans noted that the furthest member who attended the convention was Ed Krejny. He also remarked that two people present, Don Erickson and Ed Krejny, had attended ten of the total eleven IRCA conventions held during the Club's history.

Two items were opened for dicussion under New Business. President Evans noted that a By-Laws proposal to permit the inclusion of longwave material in DX Monitor was ready to go before the membership. Only regular longwave broadcast stations would be listed, the utility ones coming in for a mention only as interference. Medium Wave is to be given top priority in case of space conflicts. The assembled members brought up a number of points, including the fact that only the Realistics and the Drake SPR-4 receivers cover the LW band and that these stations exist almost exclusively in Europe. Some members question where this expansion would end. Others felt that editors already could publish information of interest to general members without a By-Laws amendment. President Evans, in response to a question about whether the Constitution as well as the By-Laws would have to be changed, expressed a negative opinion as the Constitution mentions the Broadcast Band but does not specify frequencies.

Secretary-Treasurer Skip Dabelstein requested that the members discuss the problem of a convention committee which found that they had a deficit after some future get together. Club tradition has been for profits from the convention to be donated to the treasury, as with auction income. Skip felt that, while this deficit situation has never occurred, provision should be made for its eventuality. Larry Godwin expressed the view that individual cases could be brought before the Board of Directors and that no universal ruling should be made. Convention hosts are responsible for all costs, except special ones such as theft, and should be

made to pay all expenses.

Father Jack noted that it has been the practice of the Club to receive information from members located in foreign countries. Ron Shatz, Father Jack noted, has suggested that members receive only DXWW at special reduced rate with the proviso that these foreign members contribute information on local conditions. Such an arrangement would cost about 26¢ airmail per issue to the eight or ten overseas members. Mike Worst remarked that a member he knew in England wanted the whole bulletin, not just part, presumably for the domestic DX content.

Larry Godwin suggested contest results be announced at future conventions (not possible this year). President Evans said this suggestion had already been made to the Contest Committee Chairman Dr. Michel Breger.
The meeting was adjourned at 10:20 p.m.



FCC RULES & REGULATIONS: A new idea in Special Features

Offset printing, introduced to IRCA members through DX Monitor just a little over a year ago, has provided boundless new opportunities to provide our readers with helpful and interesting DX info. One new possibility I've just uncovered is the direct reprinting of FCC rules and regulations that pertain to DXing.

The possibilities of this new idea in features are wideranging. In addition to legal operating and technical requirements of standard broadcast stations (the FCC's definition of an AM BCo station), the rules contain detailed standards for frequency allocations and assignment availa bilities, including what channels are available for new stations and under what conditions, and what channels are not available in the U.S. for new assignments. There's also information on permissible day and nighttime signal radiations broadcast matter either lead or attempt to lead the who gets protected on a frequency, why, and how much. This helps explain some of the directional patterns you see in the NRC Pattern Book. And there are numerous interesting graphs and charts on AM propogation - surely more interesting to most members than page after page of sunrise/sunset times for all latitudes of the world!

We don't want to turn DXM into a completely-technical bulletin, so what I need to know is how much and which of this material you'd like to see reprinted in DXM. It will be used on a space-available basis. It's not limited to the above. If you have a question about U.S. station operation and what the law requires, feel free to write to me at the above address. If the rule is of general interest or helps clear up a general misconception (such as what constitutes a legal ID), we'll reprint it. If you'd like to see more FCC rules reprinted in DXM, we've got the capacity!

THE NEW (DEC. 1972) STATION ID RULE To kick off our FCC rule reprints, let's give you

the FCC version of perhaps the most important rule to any DXer: the rule requiring regular station ID's. As you know, they were required to be given on the hour and half-hour until Dec. 15, 1972. At that time a newer, simplified rule went into effect, requiring ID's only on the hour. The new rule is reprinted here. You may find it interesting that legal ID's are required at s/on and s/off as well as on the hour. In fact, a legal ID is the only information required at s/on-s/off time, and most Diers are glad to get other info that broadcasters put in by tradition - power, frequency, licensee, address, etc. You see, things could be worse!

The following is the CLD rule on station ID's which the above rule replaced on 12/15/72. It is reprinted here for comparison only, and you are cautioned that it is no longer in effect. Its key provisions, deleted completely in the new rule in favor of the phrase "as close to the hour as feasible," include the provision for late ID's during ball games and live music presentations, and for ID's up to 15 minutes late during proof-of-performance tests. This rule, in turn, had replaced a rule in Jan. 1970 which allowed 5 minutes leeway on ID's during sports broadcasts.

- (a) When regularly required. Broadcast stations shall announce station identification: (1) At the beginning and ending of each time of operation, and (2) regularly, during operation, within 2 minutes of each hour. Standard, FM, and noncommercial educational FM broadcast stations shall, additionally, announce station identification regularly within 2 minutes of each half hour. Television broadcast stations may make these announcements either visually or aurally.
- (b) Content. (1) Official station identification shall consist of the station's call letters immediately followed by the name of the community or communities specified in its license as the station's location.
- (2) When given specific written authorization to do so, a station may include in its official station identification the name of an additional community or communities, but the community to which the station is licensed must be named first.
- (3) A licensee shall not in any identification announcements, promotional announcements or any other station's audience to believe that the station has been authorized to identify officially with cities other than those permitted to be included in official station identifications under subparagraphs (1) and (2) of this paragraph.

Note: Commission interpretations of this paragraph may be found in a separate Public Notice issued Oct. 30, 1967, entitled "Examples of Application of Rule Regarding Broad-cast of Statements Regarding a Station's Licensed Location." (FCC 67-1132; 10 FCC 2d 407).

- (c) Channel-(1) General. Except as provided in subparagraph (2) of this paragraph, in making the identification announcement the call letters shall be given only on the channel of the station identified thereby.
- (2) Simultaneous AM-FM broadcasts. If the same licensee operates an FM broadcast station and a standard broadcast station and simultaneously broadcasts the same programs over the facilities of both such stations, station identification announcements may be made jointly for both stations for periods of such simultaneous operation. If the call letters of the station, the joint announcement shall so identify it.
- (d) Program interruption. Licensees shall, in ger eral, arrange their programming so as to permit the broadcast of station identification announcements ϵ the regular times prescribed in paragraph (a) of thi section without undue disruption of program cont nuity. Subject to this requirement, a station identifies tion announcement need not be presented at the tim it is regularly required, if to do so would objectionabl break program continuity essential to the value of the program to the audience. However, program continuity is deemed to be broken, and therefore an announce ment is required, if during the 4-minute period in which an announcement is regularly due there is pre sented any nonprogram matter, such as commercial public service or promotional announcements. While there may be exceptions, normally program continuity is also deemed to be broken, and an identification an nouncement is required, if during the 4-minute period there occurs the end of a regular period in a sports event being broadcast (e.g., round, quarter, or halfinning), the end of an act in a dramatic or variety program, the intermission of a live concert, opera, recital, or other musical performance presented live in its entirety (presented simultaneously or by rebroadcast), or the end of any other musical selection.
- (e) Deferred station identification, (1) If a station omits a regular station identification announcement as permitted under paragraph (d) of this section, it shall broadcast a deferred station identification announcement at the next opportunity when it can be presented without objectionably breaking program continuity essential to the value of the program to the audience. Such opportunity is deemed to occur, at the latest, when any of the material or events mentioned in paragraph (d) of this section is presented or occurs.
- (2) If no opportunity for an announcement (as defined in subparagraph (1) of this paragraph) occurs after a regular station identification is omitted, a deferred station identification shall be broadcast promptly at the end of the program unless the next regular station identification is broadcast within 5 minutes after the program ends.
- (f) Equipment performance measurements. Station identifications falling due during equipment perform-FM station do not clearly reveal that it is an FM ance measurements may be deferred up to a quarter of

No music. No news. No talk shows. "We will offer complete, regularly changing broadcasts about conditions at the border gates," said Albert Bergesen, re-gional commissioner of the service in Los Angeles.

"If the lines are long or short, we can let people heading back know about them," said Bergesen. "We will get more specific whenever we can."

For instance, the station hopes to be able to tell a tourist the exact waiting

time at the gates.

A sudden blockade of cars would result in an immediate change of the tapes, say the officials.

The broadcasts have a radius of three miles, depending on conditions, from the Customs headquarters.

"We hope this is enough distance, right now, to let motorists know about conditions before they get stuck in a line."

CARRY BULLETINS

The network will also carry bulletins about checkpoints at the border, special crossing information and. periodically, a set of instructions to aid in what the service calls "smooth cros-

sings."
The tapes will be bilingual. Each broadcast will last 35 seconds.

For good news and bad, weddings and deaths, storms and sunshine, meeting no-tices and ship sailings, people of the Bahamas have relied on ZNS Radio Bahamas since 1936. ZNS is more than a radio

station; it is an institution. It transmits tragedy and carries cheer. It is the tie that binds the Bahamas — a nation of more than 700 islands and

cays — together.

If ZNS is an institution, its three times daily "Communi-

ty Page" — from which the preceding items were randomly selected — is the cor-

nerstone.

AT 8:15 A.M. and 1:15 and 7:15 p.m. daily the "Community Page" is aired. The times are inviolate, not only for the radio station but for all the Bahamas, from Grand Baha-ma off the coast of Palm Beach to Great Inagua, near

"In the Out Islands, espein the out islands, especially, the entire social structure is adapted to it," says a former resident of those population pockets away from Nassau, the capital of the is-

land nation.
"Nothing happens until after 7:30 p.m. (when the last Community Page' is con-cluded). You walk down the street of any small out island settlement and you can hear ZNS without a radio. Every-

"ZNS without a radio. Every-house has it tuned in.
"ZNS is a religion. Meetings are not scheduled, church services don't begin, until after 7:30."

Invariably, the community announcements begin with ship arrivals and ship sailings. They conclude with the weather forecast.

IN BETWEEN comes a revealing slice of life from the Bahamas, the not-so-private back fence chit-chat of an entire nation.

ZNS began in 1936 as a short-wave station to give weather infirmation, particularly on hurricanes, emergency announcements and shipping news to those remote Out Island settlements.

In its 38 years, it has blos-somed into a complete broadsomed into a complete broad-casting service with some 70 employes, AM and FM broad-casting and three operations — serving (1) the nation, (2) the major northern Bahama Island of Grand Bahama, Abaco and Bimini, and (3) New Providence or Nassau.

the capital.

The national service is a 20,000 watt, round-the-clock operation that provides music, news, drama, sports and the community announcements. It is known as ZNS-1. ZNS-2 is the local, 1.000-watt service for New Providence and ZNS-3 is the 1,000 watt service for the northern Bahamas. ZNS-3 celebrates its first annivers-

ary this month.

Although ZNS is publicly owned, it is relatively autonomous and totally self-sup-porting. It is the only local radio or television service in the Bahamas although Florida radio and TV are received

WHEN THE STATION began in 1936, staffers were dispatched to the Out Islands to install wind-powered receivers in community centers of the major settlements so it could be heard.

Now, residents of remote Now, residents of remote fishing and farming villages of the new nation have come to rely on ZNS for news of ship sailings, weather reports, parliamentary reports and — most importantly —

personal messages.

Harcourt Bethel, general manager of ZNS from 1938 manager of ZNS from 1938 until his retirement in 1972, once referred to the station as "the Bible" of the Out Islands. "They depend on us for everything."

Still, it is the community announcements for which they depend upon ZNS the most

most.
"We get everything from lost parakeets to lost hus-bands," says news director Bethel, the man with immediate responsibility for the Community Page.

Bethel says that one of the more memorable notices for him, came as he was reading the announcements over the air cold. It began: "Lost, one black hog . . ."
"I read it and broke up

right there on the air," says Bethel. "Then I apologized and continued reading."

from a Nassau funeral director who was providing de-tails for a service in one of the out islands. Included were specific instructions for the size of the grave.

STILL IN FILE in his Nassau office is a wedding notice detailing the marriage of a Bahamian couple that carried this final paragraph:

"Within 29 hours after the ceremony the newlyweds had an addition to their family a baby girl which arrived at 1 a.m. Tuesday morning in Princess Margaret Hospital." The ending didn't make it

on the air. For an outsider, some of announcements need

translation. For example, one routinely calls for "the mothers of the following children" to "contact the children's ward of the hospital as soon as possi-ble . . ." It usually means that the parents have re-turned to the out islands and the child is ready for dis-charge or that the child has taken a turn for the worse and the parents should be at his side.

Or, when "Basil Spars is asked to report to the Supreme Court at 10 a.m. to-morrow morning," it is likely that Sears was not properly notified that he was to appear as a witness in a court

Normally, the Community Page runs for 15 minutes, but it is open-ended until the an-nouncements are completed.

THE SHIPPING arrivals and departures, public service announcements, deaths and weddings are carried free of charge. There is a \$5 charge, per broadcast, for a lost item and a \$3 fee for an essential announcement such as a notice about illness. The announcements in recent years have accounted for about \$20,000 to \$30,000 annually in station revenue.

The station attempts to screen out those announcements that appear to be inti-mate messages resulting, per-haps, from a lovers' quarrel.

Still, however, they occa-sionally make it on the air. For example, one recent mes-sage addressed to Leroy and signed by Sybil asked: "Please contact me for im-portant business."

So dependent are the Out Islands on Radio Bahamas that even on those islands where only a single settle-ment exists and word of mouth is the most conve-nient bulletin board, the Community Page is still im-

portant.
"For those people," says Ed Bethel, "It's not true un-less they hear it on Radio Ba-

Even then, he concedes, they had trouble convincing some people that men really had landed on the moon.

GREENWOOD, IND. (NRB)-Listeners to Haiti's Radio Lumiere who are not located on that French speaking island are primarily Spanish speaking. The Oriental Missionary Society, which operates the station, estimates that there are nearly 1385 potential Spanish speaking listeners within its reach for every 12 notential within its reach for every 12 potential English speaking listeners. As a result, 4VEH has expanded its Spanish broadcast with programs specifically aimed at listeners in the Dominican Republic and Cohe Letter received from Cuba as 3 listeners in the Dominican Regione and Cuba. Letters received from Cuba as a result of the new programming are primarily coming from young people. OMS estimates that 75% of its letters coming out of Cuba are from listeners under 20 years of age.

PORT AU PRINCE, HAITI (NRB)—By the end of summer, 1974, a new antennae system at Radio Station 4VEH in Haiti will allow the station to concentrate its signal in Cuba and the Dominican Republic for Spanish broadcasts, on the Caribbean Islands to the northwest for English proadcasts, and to Haiti for Erapeh and broadcasts, and to Haiti for French and Creole. A high conductivity in the antenna area, plus the surrounding salt water, will give 4VEH excellent opportunities to reach most of the Caribbean with Gospel

MADISON, N.J. (NRB)—The fuel shortage which many Americans experienced earlier this year has generally passed. No longer are there long lines at gas stations, with state-enforced rules about "odd" and "even" license plates, inspection stickers and other requirements.

But the fuel crisis is not over, and its impact worldwide is being felt by overseas broadcasters who use fuel to generate pow-er for large transmitters. Several missionary operations have reported having to serious ly re-evaluate every program being broad-cast in light of the increased cost of fuel oil for diesel generators. For the time being, indications are that most stations will not make drastic program cutbacks, although future increases in fuel oil costs arthough future increases in the on coarse or a scarcity of supply could greatly de-crease the global outreach of overseas Christian broadcasters.



Constitution of the INTERNATIONAL RADIO CLUB OF AMERICA, INC.
(in effect August 31, 1974)

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of the organization shall be the International Radio Club of America, Inc. ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

The purpose of the International Radio Club of America shall be to promote the hobby of radio listening on the AM Broadcast Band.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

Membership in the International Radio Club of America shall be open to anyone in any nation interested in the hobby of broadcast band Dxing.

ARTICLE IV - DUES Dues in the International Radio Club of America shall be enacted on an annual basis, the amount to be determined by the appropriate governing body, to be known as the Board of Directors. ARTICLE V - OFFICERS

The government of the International Radio Club of America shall be comprised of the following officers:

1. President

2. Secretary-Treasurer

3. Board of Directors (seven members)

ARTICLE VI - ELECTIONS

Elections for President, Secretary-Treasurer, and Directors will be held every two years.

ARTICLE VII - CONVENTIONS The one official international meeting of the International Radio Club of America shall be

the annual convention.

ARTICLE VIII - AMENDMENTS

Amendments may be made to this Constitution by submitting a proposal in written form to the President of the International Radio Club of America at least 60 days prior to the beginning of the annual convention. To become enacted (as) an amendment, the proposal must receive a full hearing before the members assembled at the business meeting at the annual convention, and announcement must be made at that time to express the intent to have the full club membership vote on the porposal. In addition, to become enacted, a proposal must receive a two-thirds majority of the total club membership.

ByLaws of the INTERNATIONAL RADIO CLUB OF AMERICA, INC. (Revised to August 31, 1974)

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this arganization shall be the International Radio Club of America, Inc., and the official abbreviation IRCA may be used in referring to this organization.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

The purpose of the IRCA shall be to promote the

The purpose of the IRCA shall be to promote the hobby of radio listening on the AM Broadcast Band, 510 to 1630 kilohertz.

ARTICLE III - ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section I - Frequency of Elections; Term of Office Regular elections shall be held in odd-numbered years to elect the officers listed in Article V of these Bylaws, including the Chairman of the Board. All terms of elective office shall begin at 0001 Mountain Local Time, on September 15 of odd-numbered years (or, in case of replacements, at 0001, Mountain Local Time, on the date of the <u>DX Monitor</u> in which the results of elections are announced), and shall expire at 2400, Mountain Local Time, on September 14 of odd-numbered years.

Section 2 - By Whom Elected
Part 1 - The President and Secretary-Treasurer shall be elected by the membership at large. Each member in good standing shall have one vote for each office.

- The seven members of the Board of Directors shall also be elected by the membership-at-large. Each member in good standing may vote for seven of the candidates seeking Directorships.
- Part 3 The Chairman of the Board of Directors shall be selected by the Directors in accordance with Article III, Section 6.

Section 3 - Eligibility to Hold Office

Any member in good standing, regardless of where he lives, shall be eligible for regular election to any office provided he has held one year's continuous membership in the IRCA as of April

15 of the election year. for purposes of special elections, the requirement shall be one year's continuous membership as of the effective date of vacancy of the office in question, such date to be determined by the President. It is not necessary for an eligible member's name to be printed on a ballot for him to be elected.

Section 4 - Authority for Elections
The Election Committee Chairman (EEC), appointed by the President and confirmed by the Board, shall handle all aspects of all elections of officers, whether regular or special, with

complete authority.

Section 5 - Regular Elections; Procedures and Date
Part 1 - The President shall be responsible for announcing in the <u>DX Monitor</u> full details concerning the upcoming elections approximately February 15 of election year.

- Part 2 Nominations shall be open for President Secretary-Treasurer, and the seven members of the Board of Directors from March 1 through April 15. Only one nomination each for President and Secretary-Treasurer, and only seven nominations for the Board, shall be allowed each IRCA member. All nominations must be submitted in written form to the ECC by April 15.
- Part 3 As soon as possible after April 15, the ECC shall send to the Secretary-Treasurer a list of all nominees. The Secretary-Treasurer will return the list to the ECC as soon as possible, indicating which nominees have been members in good characters. members in good standing for the required one-year period.
- Part 4 The EEC shall notify by letter all eligible candidates concerning their nomination by May 1, Each letter of nomination shall contain the names of all eligible members who have been nominated for the particular office in question. Such letters must stress that the nominee must reply in writing if he accepts the nomination, and each such letter must request from each nominee a campaign statement, not to exceed 15 stencil lines, to appear in a June issue of the <u>DX Monitor</u>. He ever, a nominee is not required to submit a campaign statement provided he has duly notified the ECC of his intention to run for office. An IRCA member may be nominated for more than one office, but he must decide for which he prefers to run, and so notify the ECC. A nominee who has indicated his intention to run for an office may not be considered as a write-in candidate for another office in the same election.
- Part 5 All letters of acceptance of the nomination, and all campaign states, must reach the EEC by May 20. The FEC shall prepare the ballot and the campaign statements and submit them to the Publisher by June 1. Ballots shall contain spaces for write-in candidates.
- Part 6 Elections: Ballots and the printed
 statements are to be mailed to all members via first class mail separate from the June issue of <u>DX Monitor</u>, and are to be postmarked during the second calendar week of June of the election year.

Part 7 -The ballots are to be returned to the Election Committee Chairman prior to August 1.

Section 6 - Election of the Chairman of the Board

The EEC shall ballot the Board of Directors soon after each regular election to determine the Chairman of the Board, who will be the spokesman for the Board and will be responsible for assuming the President's office in case it is vacated during the current term. In the event the Chairman of the Board becomes Club President, he shall be required to resign his Board position. The EEC shall then ballot the Board of Directors again to determine the new Chairman of the Board.

Section 7 - Special Elections of Officers

In the event the Secretary-Treasurer, the Chairman of the Board, or a regular Director on the Board resigns, or in any other circumstance requiring a special election of officers, a special election shall be conducted as soon as possible by the ECC, in accordance with the relevant procedures outlined above. If advisable, the various deadline dated fixed in Article III, Section 5 shall be altered by the ECC, but the relative timing of the various procedures will be retained.

Section 8 - Determing Winners
The seven eligible members who receive the most votes cast shall be deemed winners during a regular election of the Board of Directors. In all other elections, whether regular or special, the elgible member who receives the most votes cast shall be declared the winner.

Section 9 - Ties in the Ballotting:

The Insufficient Nominees

Part 1 - In the case of a tie in the balloting for President or Secretary-Treasurer, the Board of Directors (to be realist) the Board of Directors (to be polled by the EEC) shall break the deadlock. In the case of regular elections, such deadlock shall be broken by the newly-elected Board members.

In the case of a tie in the balloting for the Board of Directors, a run-off election among the persons who tied Part 2 will be executed immediately by the EEC. In the event there is a tie in the run-off election, the elected members of the Board shall determine the winner. A deadlock in the Board voting shall be broken by the President, or in the event his office is vacant, by the Secretary-Treasurer.

Part 3 - In the case of a tie in the balloting for the Chairman of the Board, the President (or in the event his office is vacant, the Secretary-Treasurer) shall cast the deciding vote.

Part 4 - In case no persons are nominated to fill the office of President or Secretary-Treasurer, or in case fewer than seven eligible members are nominated to the Board of Directors, and no eligible write-in candidate(s) is(are) declared the winner(s), the Board shall select the officer(s) in the best manner they see fit.

Section 10 - Announcement of Results of Elections The results of all regular and special elections shall in all cases be announced by the ECC in the DX Monitor within 30 days after the deadline for receipt of ballots. If it may be done in a timely manner, the election results shall first be announced by the ECC or his appointee at the

annual business meeting.

ARTICLE IV - DUES Dues will be collected on an annual basis and the amount will be subject to change by the action of the Board of Directors. The Secretary-Treasurer will be in charge of collecting dues.

ARTICLE V - OFFICERS AND DUTIES

Section 1 -Officers

The government of the IRCA shall be comprised of the following officers: President, Secretic the following officers: President, Secretic the following of a Board tary-Treasurer, and seven members of a Board of Directors.

Section 2 - Duties of Officers

Part 1 - President

a. Shall preside at all official club functions, including the annual business meeting, when in attendance. If he is not to be present at an official club function, he will. wheneven possible, appoint a member who does plan to be present to preside at the official club function; this appointment is not

ial club function; this appointment is not subject to Board approval.

b. Shall be responsible for protecting the reputation and dignity of the IRCA, and promote and administer the affairs of the club to the best of his ability.

c. Shall, with the approval of the Board, have the power to bring reprimand and revocation receedings against any member who he deems proceedings against any member who he deems is not adhering to the rules of the organization; he must submit in written form any findings to the Board for their action.

d. Shall have the power to appoint the chairman of any committee, with the advice and consent of the Board of Directors.

e. Shall have the power to remove a chairman of any committee for neglect of duty; this action must in turn be approved by the Board.

f. Shall have the authority to act on any suggestions or proposals, making any recommendations if he so desires, but also submitting the primary proposal to the Board of Directors; any action on a suggestion or proposal is subject to the final approval of the Board.

g. Shall have the power to vote on any proposal that does not receive a majority decision by the Board of Directors during the contemporary administration so as to break any dead-

lock that would occur.
h. Shall not have veto power over actions of the Board.

i. Shall be responsible for the inclusion of the complete IRCA Constitution and Bylaws, as amended during the previous year, in one of the summer issues of the <u>DX Monitor</u> each year.

i. Shall be responsible for reporting the results of voting by the Board of Directors in the $\underline{\text{nX}}$ Monitor as soon as possible after the votes have been counted.

k. Shall, in September of each year, request the Board to reconfirm the appointment of each editor and Committee Chairman currently serving the club. Such request will be accompanied by the President's recommendation concerning each individual, based on a review of the past year. The Contest Manager and the Courtesy Program Committee
Chairman, however, are to be reconfirmed
in May of each year.

a. Will be in charge of collecting all dues
for membership and membership renewals.

c. Shall keep an up-to-date list of all members.

The financial state-ment of the club must be approved by the Board of Directors before publication in

the <u>DX Monitor</u>.

f. May, with the consent of the Board, appoint members to assis him in some of the book-

keeping work.

g. Shall be responsible for recording and filling minutes of the annual business meeting. In his absence at the business meeting, he shall appoint another member to record said minutes.

Part 3 - Board of Directors a. Shall be responsible for protecting the reputation and dignity of the IRCA, and promote the affairs of the club to the

best of their ability.

b. Shall have the final power in ruling on . any club affairs, suggestions, proposals, recommendations, or findings submitted by the President; the Board shall have the power to present legislation and findings as well as make rulings.

c. Shall not have the power to appoint chairmen of the various committees, publishers, or editors, but shall have the power to

confirm their appointment.

d. Can conduct most of their business by mail, but if five are present during an annual convention, a quorum for business shall be said to exist.

e. Shall have the power, if they deem it necessary, to call for a special election to submit a major issue to the membership—at—large; the Election Committee then will

handle all aspects of the special election. f. Shall have the power to submit a question to the vote of those present at the annual business meeting with a simple majority of those voting prevailing.

Question: Anyone know what stn on 1430 would have tapedelayed and NBC hourly excast till 0345-0350 EDT 6/77 That was just before I heard WIRE, which catches me up with Nancy in states at #36. Al Ogrizovich's comments last time about calling stns during proof-of-performance (PoP) tests are well taken, if the stn bothers to ID during the test. It's difficult for them to give live ID's during a test cause the mike is disconnected where the tone generator goes in. Even so, they're legally required to ID at the start and end of the test, before disconnecting and after reconnecting (respectively) the mike, or by using a prerecorded legal ID (call & city, spoken or sung). Bigmarket stns tend to follow the rules, but small-stn CE's sometimes get in a hurry and shut the carrier off without ID'ing. I recall a recent weeknight when we heard two PoP's on 1380 simultaneously thru KRKO. We listened for more than an hour hoping for an ID, but after 45 min. all that was left was KRKO alone. A quick phone call to possible unID testers to ask "Could you please tell me if you are testing?" and if they say "yes" a quick "That's all I wanted to know, thanks very much" will keep you out of the CE's hair and pin down which of the dozen or so possibilities it is. I'm writing a complete feature on the often misunderstood PoP test; it'll appear soon. I've actually DX'ed this summer; see DXR as well as my next DXF. Out of

It seems that quite a few socalled "DXers" are faking their reception reports. He stated that it is so obvious to him many times when one "fakes" a report. He mentioned the fact of how some are using tapes from their friends in attempting to receive a written verification by that unethical method. I, myself feel that most members in IRCA are honest with some possible exceptions. However, we can't eliminate the possibility that there may be more members "faking" than we thought. It should be clear to anyone with a mature mind that a written or tape "verification" is as good as the person's word. Anyone holds the power of being honest or dishonest. becomes a habitual liar, it is almost impossible to help him for anything he says or does, as it may simply be another deception. Minnesota DX Club, with 26 members, has decided not to move toward a formal club format (bulletin, dues, etc.), but will continue with emphasis on face-to-face gatherings, with only the meetings of these gatherings printed.

The ANARC Convention, held in Bronxville, NY hosted about 32 DXers. Al Niblack was awarded the 1974 ANARC Man of the Year Award for his valuable work for NASWA in providing last minute tips. Presentations were made on HAP, on the equipment market, on Latin American radio, on utilities, on Radio Free America, on ANARC, and on trend in communications. The convention did suffer a loss of about \$270, since not as many attended as had been planned for. ANARC covered \$100 of the loss from its funds, with the remainder being absorbed by the convention committee.

The Convention committee recommended that a Convention Scheduling Committee be established to coerdinate conventions of the major DX clubs, to encourage maximum attendance at all. The committee also recommended that future convention committees consider well their ability to shoulder both time and financial drains if such should arise.
