Give daytimers a break, say **FCC** comments

Filed in response to NTIA petition, daytime broadcasters expectedly endorse easing of restrictions; clear channel operators and some others file less enthusiastic responses

The FCC should adopt a rulemaking aimed at easing the restrictions under which daytime-only AM stations operate, according to comments filed with the FCC. But how much seems open to question.

The comments came in response to a petition for rulemaking filed by the National Telecommunications and Information Administration in September

(BROADCASTING, Sept. 21).
In its petition, NTIA had recommended that the FCC increase the presunrise and post-sunset operating hours of selected daytime-only stations; give daytimers that provide the only local service in their communities of license a significant preference in comparative contests for new FM facilities if the daytimers file the original petition to amend the table of assignments, and speed up processing of petitions to amend the table and of applications for construction permits for new FM facilities when filed by daytimers that provide the only local service in their community.

The petition argued for permitting stations not authorized for presunrise broadcast to be given experimental authorization to begin operating 30 minutes earlier. Stations that are permitted to operate at 6 a.m. with 500 wif they don't interfere with other stations should also be given authorizations to expand morning service, NTIA said.

NTIA also said protection requirements should be based on actual diurnal variations of signal strength, phased in according to the continuing reduction in the radius of the projected skywave contourrather than on nighttime propagation

curves NTIA also said post-sunset operations should be permitted experimentally where protection requirements can be met. NTIA also suggested that certain daytime licensees be granted experimental authorizations to operate at night with less than 100

As might be expected, daytimers have endorsed the NTIA petition warmly; other broadcasting representatives, and repre-sentatives of clear channel stations, have given the petition a cooler reception.

Breaking Co. Inc., licensee of daytime-only wortawn Lake City, S.C., urged the FCC to adopt a rulemaking on the NTIa retition, arguing that the only local tuern strates in many communities is provided to daytimers. As a result. Coastline said, those communities were deprived of early-morning and evening weather, winter school closings and traffic information.

Accomack-Northampton Broadcasting Inc., licensee of daytime station WESR(AM) Onley-Onancock, Va. said the FCC "should do all things reasonably possible to alleviate this deficiency in fulfillment of the mandates of the Communications Act to provide an efficient distribution of radio facilities to each community.

Radio WEW Inc., licensee of daytimer WEWIAMI St. Louis, said the NTIA proposal to give daytimers preference for new FM stations in their communities was 'eminently fair . . . If the commission can give preference to minority applicants, it should be permitted to give preference to applicants whose existing AM facilities do not provide a full service because of technical limitations, especially when they have spent thousands of dollars to initiate and maintain the rulemaking proceeding which resulted in availability of a channel," Radio Wew said.

The Daytime Broadcasters Association said it "strongly" endorsed NTIA's proposals, but it thought the proposed rulemaking should be expanded.

According to DBA, the rulemaking should consider permitting all daytimers to operate from two hours before sunrise to two hours after sunset (unless a fulltime station could demonstrate that such operation "unduly" interfered with its signal); permitting daytime-only stations to provide low-power nighttime service; amending and reallocating FM station assignments to "permit rapid introduction of local nighttime service into under-served communities"; eliminating the difference in the degree of protection granted Class I clear channel stations, and implementing those proposed revisions on an experimental basis for two years, pending the establishment of formal rules.

The National Association of Broadcasters urged the FCC to adopt a rulemaking aimed at easing the restrictions under which daytime-only stations operate, but it said such a proceeding should "consider NTIA's proposals for all daytimers, not just those that provide the only local service.

NAB also said the FCC should consider modifying its application acceptance cri-teria (which NAB said have restricted some daytimers from applying for fulltime operation) and change its diversification policy (which NAB said had been a barrier to daytimers seeking full-time AM or FM operation in comparative proceed-

ings) Although NAB said it had "reservations" about permitting daytimers experimental authorizations, it said it supported "all efforts, technical and nontechnical, that will aid daytime radio stations without significantly diminishing the service pro-

NRBA also took NTIA to task for using "somewhat misleading statistics" on the number of communities where daytimeonly stations represent the emby local service to rationalize its argument for requesting the FCC to alter its technical allocations rules. NRBA said that most of those communities have access to a "multiplicity" of radio services

"As much as the daytimers need and deserve assistance, care should be taken assure that any assistance offered to them does not disserve everyone." NRBA said

NRBA also said that adoption of its own petition for rulemaking would have a "distinct salutary effect on daytimers without any undesirable side effects on the technical quality of other AM service . . . because the NRBA's proposal relates to nontechni-

cal 'artificial' allocations criteria.'

The Association for Broadcast Engineering Standards Inc. said it supported the NTIA petition to an extent, but cautioned the FCC against adopting a "narrow" approach that "might seek to improve the lot of daytime-only stations at the expense of massive interference to the reception of full-time AM services.

ABES said: "While the commission certainly should consider an 'engineering' solution to the question of nighttime service . . . it should also put an emphasis on those nontechnical policies which are responsible for placing daytime-only appli-... at such a disadvantage.

ABES recommended that the FCC not adopt a policy of preferring daytime stations over other classes of applicants, because such a policy would raise "many vexing" legal questions.

ABES also said current FCC rules limiting the operation of daytime-only stations 'are not frivolous or arbitrary . . . They are eminently reasonable standards applied to protect what is on balance the general public interest in receiving interferencefree AM radio services in the important

early morning and evening hours."

The Clear Channel Broadcasting Service said that it "continues to urge that the wide-area daytime and expanded widearea nighttime service afforded by clear channel stations to rural and small town residents and highway travelers be preserved and improved through an allocations policy which rests on sound engineering principles."

CCBS also said NTIA had based its argument for expanding daytimers' hours of operation on use of a diurnal curve, which CCBS said was "a faulty premise." CCBS said it had "long maintained that FM affords a superior means of providing a full-time service to small communities.

It's All in the Timing

I don't doubt that a listener in Japan recently heard KGO (ADWEEK, Nov. 2, 1981) but surely not 'between' 7:17 and 7:58 pm Pacific Time." That's the middle of the day in Japan (specifically 11:17-11:58 am), and broadcast-band signals require a complete path of darkness between transmitter and receiver to propagate over long distances.

Most likely the times quoted were actually JST, since 7:17 pm there is 2:17 am here, and the great-circle path between the two points is indeed in complete darkness. Incidentally, that kind of reception isn't especially remarkable or unusual, nor is its reciprocal. During the fall and apring months, anyone in the Bay aren with a radio capable of good sensitivity and selectivity can pick up some of the more powerful Japanese stations — most notably the ones on 747 and 774 kHz — during the early morning hours until surrise. It doesn't take a fancy antenna, either.

Cuba calling all comrades

LATE-NIGHT radio listeners in the Metropolitan Area can now tune in Radio Havana, loud and clear at 1160 on the AM dial.

For the first time, English-language programming from the Cuban station is on a frequency that is open and audible throughout the East.

Cuba has been broadcasting in English to America for the last two years, but using two frequencies crowded with U.S. stations, making reception difficult.

But the English programming has now been moved to 1160, making it easy to hear on car radios and good

The only other station on 1160 at night in the United States and Canada is KSL in Salt Lake City, which is weak or inaudible in the East.


The Cuban station offers English-language Radio Moscow programming in the hours just after midnight, followed by English-lan-

A Comparison of the "Shotgun" and "Select-a-Tenna" Loop Antennas

by Randy Tomer

Although the "Shotgun" passive tuneable loop antenna (available from Radio West; I believe it's \$30 in the new catalog) is reasonably well known among DXers who listen on portable radios, there is another passive loop known as the "Select-a-Tenna". This has been available from Edmund Scientific for \$34.95, but can now be mail ordered from U.S. General Supply Corp., 100 Commercial St., Plainview, NY 11803 for \$19.80, catalog number 873-541W1980. They are a discount tool and hardware supplier whose catalog

costs \$1.00.

What I like about the Select-a-Tenna is that it couples easily with just about <u>any</u> radio with an internal loop. It turns a cheapo 6-transistor pocket receiver into a real signal-inhaler with good selectivity. (This leads me to believe that in portable radios, the secret is to have a big, selective antenna, then everything else just falls into place.) The advantage of the Radio West Shotgun is that once it's stuck on top of a Realistic TRF or Panasonic, it not only couples well, but the radio and antenna rotate and null together perfectly. This is more difficult with the separately mounted Select-a-Tenna. The Shotgun has a much sharper peak than does the Select-a-tenna. This could be a disadvantage for, say, listening to clear channels for the programming rather than DX'ing. My Shotgun has to be tuned slightly off frequency to get good audio response for program listening, otherwise higher pitched sounds are cut off. What I don't like about the Shotgun is that it must be stuck on a radio more or less permanently (to avoid being dropped) so you can't move it from one radio to another, and it doesn't conveniently couple with all radios. For instance with my GE TRF model 2870-A (predecessor to the Superadio), the Shotgun just doesn't seem to couple. Also, the Shotgun isn't all that practical with any smaller portable radio, due to its large size.

My assessment is that if you're using a Realistic TRF, GE Superadio,

or Panasonic RF-series (or any other large portable with large built in loopstick) fairly continuously for DX listening, the Shotgun is the only way to go because of its higher "Q" and its ability to simultaneously peak and null with the receiver. However, for occasional use with just about any small radio made, I like the Select-a-Tenna. It's perfect for peaking that out-of-town talk show you like. So, the Shotgum for DX'ing,

the Select-a-Tenna for long-haul listening.

One more Select-a-Tenna feature--it has an input jack for an external longwire--I didn't try it--but by running a piece of coax from this jack to the antenna input of a communications receiver, the Select-a-Tenna becomes a fair quality unamplified loop. Glue it to a Rubbermaid turntable and you have a budget loop that works.

News from Europe ---- courtesy of Ben Peters

---A new portable will be available in Europe in early 1982, the Philips AL 990. It covers LW, MW, FM and SW from 1.6 to 26.2 MHz. Digital display, variable BFO, S-meter, bass and treble controls, clock etc. etc. Selectivity is given for "wide" at -3 dB/-35 dB---3.5 kHz/9 kHz, and "narrow" at -3 dB/-45 dB--1.8 kHz/9 kHz. These figures are as given by the manufacturer, but it seems likely that they mean ±3.5 kHz, ±9 kHz etc. IF frequency is 468 kHz making selectivity modification difficult. What is of most interest to the MW DXer is the fact that for LW and MW the set uses a "Ferroceptor" rotatable ferrite loop antenna on top, which is defeatable when an external antenna is connected. There is also a removable rotating loop antenna for SW marine band. Direction finding is possible with a "calibrated ring" as part of the loop. Price is 525 guilders (about US\$330; perhaps it will be available in the U.S. through Philips dealers)

---The Yaesu FRG-7700 is being sold by Surrey Electronics, The Forge, Lucks Green, Cranleigh, Surrey GU6 7BG, England, in a modified version which features IF and AF line outputs, But the most interesting point for the DXer is a redesigned front end resulting in "improved noise figure and better overload levels" (third-order intercept is claimed to be -2 dBm from the -21 dBm in the stock version). Two versions, one at approximately $\rlap/ 400$, and another around $\rlap/ 450$. This is about \$760 and \$1045 in U.S. funds, so quite a bit more pricey than the stock FRG-7700, but the brochure seems to imply that the cheaper version has the improved front end. ---from SKALA, magazine of Mittelwellen Spezial Club, W. Germany (their source is Radio-Ümschau, no. 8, 1928):

Defeating Atmospheric Interference by Underground Antennas

Two versions: linear and spiral, to cover wavelengths of 150 to 500 meters (i.e. MW) The linear version is about a 25 meter length of copper wire about 1.5 mm in diameter, with adequate insulation (the end needs special attention!) buried about 0.5 meter deep. The directivity, if any, can be defeated by connecting another wire at a right angle to the first.

The spiral version is buried in a one meter deep and 0.9 meter wide hole, as follows: Well insulated copper wire (insulate the bare end as well) 1.5 mm in diameter is laid in the bottom of the hole starting from the outside in a spiral with 7.5 to 10 cm between the turns. Do not cut the wire when you reach the innermost turn of the spiral, but put a 15 to 20 cm layer of earth on the winding. With the remaining wire (poking out of the earth) wind another spiral in reverse order (starting at the innermost turn). You wind four spirals this way, each wound in reverse order to the last, and separated by 15 to 20 cm of earth. Then the remainder of the hole is filled up with earth and the wire connected to the receiver. This version is not directive, but is less sensitive than the linear version.

It has been possible to receive distant stations without interference during heavy thunderstorms with lightning (with no danger of the antenna being struck by lightning!), but care should be taken that interference can not enter the receiver in other ways. (Ed. note: shielded lead-in should be used for example). This design was eventually used with a good amplif-

ier/preselector to make up for losses.

One of you eastern or midwestern DXers should try the above for summertime DX'ing. Let the rest of us know the results. Ben Peters has taken Mark Connelly's article on using the MW-1 as a random wire tuner and developed a random wire tuner cum phasing unit using his two Martens loop antennas. The coupling from the random wire is effected by placing the two

loops close together, coupling the random wire to one and taking the output to the receiver off the other. Coupling is between the tuned circuits of each loop. Both loops can be rotated (if space is at a premium, one could be mounted above the other), and depending on the tuning and rotating of each loop, much better nulls result than using the loop alone. Also, signal strength is better than the loop alone or the random wire alone. In fact, Ben rarely uses the loop's switchable amplifier when using this configuration, due to the high level of signal available. He has also tried another random wire coupled to a third loop placed next to the other two. Even better results, but operation become much more complex, needless to say.

Don Moman sends word of a mail order company he has formed called "Shortwave Horizons". At the moment, re-chargeable batteries, connectors, cables, variable capacitors and some used receivers are what he has in stock.
