A Minneapolis company called Metacom Inc has set up about 400 Rezound Cassette Copying Centers around the U.S., mostly in college bookstores or quick-copy centers. Bring in your original cassette, buy a C-60 or C-90 from them for \$4-5, plunk them into the machine, and two or three minutes later, your tape is copied. The equipment is intended for copying monaural recordings of talks and "non-critical music" (i.e. forget about copying stereo hi-fi recordings). Call (800)328-4818 to find the copier nearest you.

Again on the subject of that bizarre interface between outlaw research and underground history, I was recently provided with a copy of J. H. Nelson's "The Propagation Wizard's Handbook" (as far as I know, absolutely no connection with other prominent Nelsons). According to a R. So, Ric; you think stereo doesn't exist! You might be quite correct when it comes to stereo on records. When was the last time you listened to a good tape? The separation on a good reel-to-reel tape can be 100%. Even on a good cassette tape, the separation can be as much as 99%. As for 8-track tapes, I never really did think much of them. When you try to squeeze so much information on in such a small space you're bound to get cross talk between channels.

Re AM-stereo: There's been a lot of talk in both EDXF and WDXF about the subject lately. BIG DEAL!!! We've had it here in Southern California for the last approximately 7 years. XETRA was the first to go the way of RM-stereo with the Khan System and they still use it. While I don't listen to XETRA that much, I recently checked it out and they're still in AMstereo. The separation is just as good as a medium quality FM-stereo station. I have never noticed anymore slop from XETRA when they're in stereo as epposed to not in stereo (of course, XETRA is a sloppy broadcaster anyway). Now if someone could put two AM receivers into one and fix it so that the left channel would tune to the lower side band and the right channel to the upper side band and then feed this into one amplifier, it would be very simple to make an AM-stereo receiver right in your home. It's simple!

File a complaint with the FCC! Who are you kidding, Ric? I filed a complaint with the FCC back in 1974 regarding KCBQ when I lived in El Cajon. During the daytime hours I couldn't even turn on my tape recorder to record off the turntable without KCBQ coming in and ruining the tape. I lived 8 miles from the towers. Do you think they indeed did anything? If you do, think again. THE REMINGTON REPORT. PART V

I've now DXed for 8 years on each U.S. coast, and would like to mention some differences and similarities. It could be looked at as a difference between selectivity and sensitivity: In the east, all channels including clears and many splits have fulltime pests. If it isn't Boston or NYC QRMing you, then it's Cuba or Columbia. The graveyard channels were so packed in New Haven that I was unable to log several semi-local CT stations. On the regionals, the NSPers are 10 or 20 thick, so you have to rely on anomalous propogation or E.T.'s to bring new catches. On the TA splits, it's more a matter of fighting slop than digging weak signals out of the natural noise floor.

By contrast, on the west coast, clear channels are often virtually empty (although this is rapidly changing—thanks FCC). On 540, 660, 700, 1210, etc., there is simply nothing there but weak carriers or mud, a good portion of the time. Mexicans are loud in a few cases, but not nearly so ubiquitous as the Cubans are in New England. It is essential to get the last weak spurs out of your receiver, and to hunt down or null any QRN sources. A precious few regional channels open up nicely on MM (or did until 1980 or so, hi), notably 1270, 1390, and 1440. Our GY stations are 100+ miles apart, although they still sound like a jubled mess, hi. And, of course, it's much easier to hear the northeast from here, than vice versa. There was just never any armchair copy of stations west of KSL at my CT (TH; whereas here, WBZ, WCAU, etc. can do it fairly often. I think this is simply due to lower (QRM on the west coast, rather than a propogation effect. As for long—haul transoceanic DX, all TP signals I've heard (except Hawaii) run an average of, say 20 dB weaker than equivalent TA regulars did in CT. One compensation is the scrumptious island programming we get from Tonga, Kiribati, etc. Steve and I are both tempted to just sit on Tarawa-846 rather than bandscanning when we set up Beverages at Pt. Reyes. As for totals, I'd say it was easier to reach say, 40 states, 7 provinces, and 40 countries from New England. The Carribbean and South Americans are all easier in the east.

There are also similarities in DX from the two coasts. Listening to CBK, WHO, WWL, WOAI, etc., is the same experience at both; and the same for Central Americans south of Mexico City. Digging for Canadian LPRT's is about equally difficult. TA's and TP's both seem to undermodulate (compared to US hyper-compression) equally. TVI and powerline buzz and junk programming are equal deterrents to goos listening on both coasts. The patterns of long-haul signal variations are similar in both places. And, finally, the award for booming signal on both coasts goes to PJB 800. I won't mention the weather, especially after last winter's flood here, hi. A final propagation item: Do we still have a porpagation editor? I feel a definite lack of coordinated listening tests, which could be the scientific forte of IRCA.

Ernie Cooper, your VOA unID reminds me of when VOA programming could be heard on the BCB from Bermuda back in the '60s. I think on 940 kHz. Is there a Bermudan on your unID channel? Similarly, I have a tape of BBC news on

Tarawa 844 a few years back.

Ric, have you ever DX ed from the residential neighborhoods of western (coastal) San Francisco? Seems like a possibly good TP location. (Guess you weren't in IRCA when I lived in the Sunset -20th & Lawton - from September '76 to February '78. "Twas before the nine kHz separation, but Hawaiians were definitely enhanced and Tarawa 844 and other splits were at times like locals-RtH.)

There were a couple of positive notes in the list of new Canadian "cringe allocations": I see 10 kw on 740 at Whitehorse; 10/5 on 870 at Dawson; 10/1.5 at Inuvik; and 50 kw on 820 at Halifax, all of which would give us a shot at rare territory. Did anyone ever hear CFFB 1210?

Enough for now, so have a good (if only auroral) DX season. 73.

The most remarkable thing abour the Dallas broadcast band is that you have no locals on the air at night between 570 and 820 kHz; 250 kHz of DX'ing no locals on the air at night between 570 and 820 kHz; 250 kHz of DX ing space across this vital portion of the band. The contrast with the Denver situation is striking. Denver locals at night are found on 560, 630, 710 and 850 on these lower frequencies. The largest span of DX ing space in Denver is the 140 kHz between 710 and 850. And I believe there are applications on file for new Denver locals on 670 and 760. Denver is blessed with 37 AM and FM stations. Dallas with 23. Denver has 19 AM stations while Dallas has only nice. las has only nine.

In terms of population and economics, the contrast between the two cities makes no sense at all. Dallas is the seventh largest city in the US while Denver is 25th. And Dallas is a substantially better business town than Denver and you would think that would be reflected in the number of radio sta-

tions able to survive in the tow places.

I spent 12 days in the Dallas suburb of Richardson in late October and early November. On the few occasions when I had time to examine the broadcast band, I was much impressed by the contrast with Denver reception conditions. Using the GE 35280 AM-FM cassette receiver, I could hear the Tahiti het against 740 stations in the late hours. Another early morning I located New Zealand 882 het against the 880 Cuban at 0655 EST. KRVN was off the air that morning until 0700 EST. Both KCMO 810 and WCCO 830 separate cleanly from WBAP 820 on the GE. And Dallas local KLIF 1190, as heard in Richardson, is no stronger than WOAI 1200.

Of course I realize this Denver-Dallas contrast wouldn't be so striking if the Ft. Worth stations were included in the Dallas listings, but even then

you would still have that 250 kHz of DX'ing space on the AM band.
When it comes to a wide expanse of useful DX'ing space, it would be hard when it comes to a wide expanse of useful DA ing space, it would be hard to beat the allocation situation in Cleveland as it was 20 years ago. Cleveland had no locals at all below 850. 73. (Gene, you should visit this area. After 0000 PST, 540-1330 and 1350-1600 is clear, and 540-1600 MM, hi-RtH.)

Tales Of Terror From The Annals Of Broadcasting

As Halloween rolls around again this year, the time is right for annual tales of terror, for horror stories to make any general manager shudder. I instance, we all know the one about the afternoon drive jock who forgot to record the winner's reaction after awarding her \$10,000 - the biggest prize in the station's history - but did you hear about KNX-FM Los Angeles, which decided to launch a billboard campaign a few years ago? Looking for a suitable mellow male model to place in the ads, they happened upon one guy they all liked. The fellow's agency (glad for the commission) and the model (happy to be working) neglected to inform the station that he was doing afternoon drive across town on KUTE.

While that was an accident, the competition has been known to sabotage even the best of campaigns, such as the one in Cleveland about 18 months ago which centered on the phrase "Follow the Leader - WTAR." Boards, ads, on-air mentions all instructed listeners to follow the leader, which was just fine until rival station 3WE proudly proclaimed itself "The Leader".

But sometimes competing stations are a bit more subtle. The following act of sheer genius dates back to 1964 in Miami, when WQAM had worked out a deal for receiving "Beatles Exclusives" on tape, sometimes as much as a week before WFUN would receive the new release. This practice drove the competing program director to distraction until he sent a telegram to WQAM ordering it to "cease and desist playing unauthorized releases until further notice" and signed it Capitol Records. Two days later, WFUN received the release and was on the air with it for quite some time before his pals across the street

realized they'd been had.

By then, WQAM should have been used to it, especially after the Burdine's department store window incident. This one happened so long ago in the '50's, I really can't substantiate it, but as legend has it, promos all week announced that listeners could view their favorite WQAM jock broadcasting live from the downtown display window. Came the big day, and so did the competition, with Mary Carter Paint uniforms and 10 gallons of flat black one coat. One coat was all it took.

When man invented the car, he never realized he'd just invented the mobile radio promotion. Bumper strips, rear window stickers, not to mention "tenna toppers, have all been the focal point of countless promotions and problems. At WFUN, they were quite proud of "Pamela". Her sole duty was to drive around town looking good while awarding prizes on the air to listeners with the station's logo on their car. She was young and lovely and she couldn't drive a mile. So here she was on the air during afternoon rush hour saying, "Well, Richard, I'm following a blue Chevy locense number 1W, well I can't make out those numbers too well, I'll get a little closer. That was 1W..." About then the full effects of her front end collision became painfully apparent as she wailed, "Well, Dick, I guess we have a winner."

The there was the guy in Salem, Indiana who sent the FCC a postcard saying, We're putting on a radio station here next Sunday, thought you might like to

know."

At least it had a location. One station licensed to New Albany, Indiana didn't. It was an AM daytimer housed in a trailer, which was quite economical until vandals hooked it up and drove it off late one night. New Albany did without local service for several days until police located the station aban-

doned by the side of the road.

But even major stations face location problems, like WNOE New Orleans, which had studios in the Sheraton Charles as part of a great trade-out agreement. Jimmy Noe simple had to run the following ID twice an hour: "WNOE New Orleans, located in the Sheraton Charles Hotel." Unfortunately, this great agreement had two years to go when the station moved, so for the next two years listeners contemplated this announcement twice an hour: "WNOE New Orleans, located just three blocks from the Sheraton Charles Hotel."

Deregulation is great, but even with the new leniency, there are still some rules to be followed, as KUTE Los Angeles learned recently. It seems its AM sister station, KGFJ, moved to a new location last month, and the FM was slated to join them in early October. As the staff was packing up the equipment and leaving the building for the last time, the manager turned to the program director and said "So you've got the FCC authorization?" Replied the PD, "No, I thought you had it." Nobody had it, or had even applied for it, and that oversight caused them a minor delay and major embarrassment.

But at least the listeners were unaware of their little mixup. Not so

with KHJ, which promoted its contest a couple of years ago as "Cheap Trip to Cheap Trick." Winners phoned in a won two tickets to the group's San Diego concert including round-trip transportation. Several busloads were on hand at the station when it became frightfully obvious that the person who was supposed to charter the buses hadn't. Subduing the listeners with the longest radio station tour in the history of broadcasting provided enough time to call in replacement buses, but by this point the staffer assigned to escort the group was so confused he forgot to take a head count. To this day, rumours abound about the lone fan still waiting for the bus ride home.

And finally from television's annals of disaster, a little Halloween ditty. I'll let this poor guy rest in peace anonymously, and you'll soon see why. Working as a production director for a network affiliate in a major Eastern Seaboard city, his weekend duties included hosting the "creature feature" as your basic balding overweight Dracula in tennis shoes. And if that wasn't enough to drive him to drink, one hot October he wasordered to appear at several locations of a well-known fast food chain, arriving inside a coffin

in a hearse. Things went well at the first six locations; his pallbearers would open the coffin and out he'd pop with prizes for the kiddies. But eventually the heat - mixed with an occasional nip - got to the guy, so out come the pallbearers as they arrive at the last location, up goes the coffin and out rolls Drac looking realistically white as he regurgitates over all the unsuspecting kiddies and their horrified mommies. Trick or treat, anyone?







Which format route should

O WAY AROUND it, once-proud WCFL is buzzard meat. WCFL is buzzard meat.

The superpowerful Chicago
radio station used to lead the way
in programming. It was the hottest rock
station in town in the early 1970s and
rode at or near the top of the ratings in
this city for many years. Now, after a
decade of sometimes-comic mismanagement, "Super CFL" lingers, near death,
at the bottom of the heap, producing
ratings so bad they have set the national
standard for ineptitude among 50,000-wat
stations. The station has tried several
formats in recent years, but it's still a
sonic cesspool into which the Mutual
Broadcasting System, which paid \$12 million for the station four years ago, is
throwing an estimated \$250,000 a month.

A.drastic change is needed at AM 1000; everyone on the Chicago radio scene has been saying so for months. But what? We



already have about 90 stations in the greater Chicago area, and many observers believe that all the big, profitable formats worthy of WCFL's potential are, already staked out: We have three major-country stations, four urban contemporaries, three soft-rock and oldies, three album rockers, two big band stations, and all the current pop and beautiful music we can stand, thank you very much.

THE SITUATION is ominous for AM stations all across the country, and the plight of WCFL is representative of a deeper malaise. FM, with its sharper signal and stereo capabilities, has become the favorite of music listeners, and many AM music outlets—which now seem to exist mostly for certain car radio listeners and others without access to FM—have either had to switch to a newstalk format or cles leaven their music with a generous amount of personality, public service and current events in order to survive.

Stations cannot count on AM stereo, the Stations cannot count on AM stereo, the 1980s pie-in-the-sky for troubled broad-casters, to solve the problem. Even though some AM stations are now beaming a stereo signal, including WLS-AM and WGN in Chicago, it probably will be soveral years until an agreement will be hammered out deciding upon which of five compatible reserves.

be hammered out deciding upon which of five competing systems to use, and many years after that until a significant number of people own the new equipment needed to tune in AM stereo.

Big band is the only music that seems to fare particularly well on AM, since the fidelity on the old, original recordings isn't so great anyway, but WCFL stood lamely aside as first WJJD then WAIT introduced that format to Chienge this introduced that format to Chicago this year. So what's left?

year. So what's left?
WE PUT THE WCFL question to some prominent local and national radio minds, and though some were reluctant to be quoted, citing "competitive grounds," they offered these thoughts: News—WCFL recently hired William O'Donnell as general manager, a position he held for 13 years at all-news WBBM. Rumors are flying that O'Donnell is putling together a consortium to buy the ting together a consortium to buy the

sleeping Super 'CFL take?

station from Mutual, which further heightens speculation that WCFL will attempt to beat WBBM in the news derby. WBBM forestalled any plans by O'Donnell and company by lightening their format two months ago, ellminating "fluft," and cutting back on sports game coverage. Ob-servers say another hard news sta-tion in town is now unlikely.

Talk—Probably the most vulnerable station on the Chicago AM dial is news/talk station WIND. Though the news/talk station WIND. Though the station draws respectable ratings, it has relatively low power, and morate among the air staff under the tight rein of general manager David Graves is poor enough that several talented program hosts probably could be lured to a new station. Several years ago, however, WCFL tried an all-talk "lifestyle" format that bombed miserably and may shy away from another such operation away from another such operation because of the great expense needed to start it up.

to start it up.

All-sports—A local radio version of cable TV's ESPN would be extremely attractive to advertisers and listeners, but such a station would need to have game coverage of the big teams in town. The White Sox have signed with WMAQ for four more seasons, the Bears are under a two-year contract with WBBM, and WGN has one more year with Mutual Sports [Notre Dame and Big Ten football] and De Paul basketball, and they are currently negotiating another three year pact with the Cubs.

Full network—Syndicated network

Full network—Syndicated network programming and independent satel lite services now offer big names and slick programming at very low cost to the broadcaster. Electronic cost to the broadcaster. Electronic legerdemain allows national programs to sound local by cleverly slipping in area traffic, weather, news, and station ID's. WIND has just signed Michael Jackson on the ABC network to fill two afternoon hours, and the success or failure of that experiment will demonstrate Chicago's willingness to accept na tional programming during the day. The NBC network's talk service is still available in this market

still available in this market. Full service/personality—Ever since Chicago 101 became Q-101, this market has had no middle of the road music station with strong, on air personalities and a full-service news department. Some local broad-casters, including WCFL's current morning man, Fred Winston, think minor surgery would heal the patient: WCFL should be much more consistent in its middle of the road music programming. Beef un station music programming, beef up station services and promotions [they just services and promotions (they just fired their promotions manager), hire some new personalities, and, perhaps most important of all, change the call letters. "The letters WCFL have been associated with inconsistency for the last five years," Winston says.

years," Winston says.

Adult variety—This now-nonexistent format is the idea of Ray Nordstrand, president of WFMT, but it
comes from the old days of radio
before strict formatting. Nordstrand
points out that the most successful
station in the market, WGN, has a
varied format, and to his mind there
is a market for "a low-key, sponta-

neous station that just plays a lot of good, nonrock music; everything from Boston Pops to folk to big band to musical comedy . . . maybe even bluegrass. They should just mix it all up and have a ball." George Dubinetz, general manager of WJEZ and WJDD, adds that such a format might include a heavy dose of radio dramas and old-time soap operas.

dramas and old-time soap operas.

New music—Hard-core progressive rock stations that play British imports and awant garde records usually only heard on college stations have sprung up on both coasts and proven popular among rich young people. Hip listeners in this market have been clamoring for such a station, but those who program this music in other areas say that the relatively poor fidelity of the AM band would doom such a format on WCFL to failure. The same problem, plus pre-existing stations, would probably doom an AM classical music station as well.

Traditional country—Old-fash-

Traditional country—Old-fash-ioned, nonslick country is getting a foothold on AM in certain country jocks and programmers in Chicago don't think the hard-core country audience is large enough to sustain such a station here.

such a station here.

Rock oldies—Tribune TV-radio
critic Ron Alridge has suggested several times that WCFL revive itself
with a steady diet of rock hits from
the 1950s and 60s—sort of "music of
your life" for people in the 30-45 age
bracket. WFWR's oldies approach,
he says, includes far too many recent hits. Critics of this idea say
WFYR has the oldies market already wrapped up and that such a
station would burn out quickly.

All business—Business news is in-

station would burn out quickly.

All business—Business news is increasingly popular these days, as well as very upscale. Subscription FM carrier channels currently broadcast continuous business news to a specialized audience, but, Alridge says, "To my knowlege a commercial all-business station has never been done. I've always thought if it hasn't been done, then it's probably a good idea. They're such an unimaginative bunch of buffoons in radio anyway."

unimaginative bunch of buffoons in radio anyway."
Comedy—WJOK, an AM station in the Washington, D.C., area is going on the air with full-time yuks before the end of the year. President and general manager Bob Cobbins thinks innovative formats, such as WJOK's, are the answer to the AM blues, but points out that all-comedy requires a "tremendous inventory of records and tapes." He has spent 18 years collecting the library for his new station.

station.

Surrender—Perhaps the most pertinent answer of the week came from Steve Dahl, evening-drive jock of WLS-FM. If he were given the keys to the front door of WCFL, he'd. 'go in and turn it oft.' Said Dahl, 'AM stations are all dinosaurs, and the spectrum in Chicago is all covered anyway. That station can't be saved, That's my answer. I'd take the station [in Marina City] and turn it into a condo."

Fans fear the end of KFAT

The new owners of KFAT radio in Gilroy want to change the station's name to KWSS (variously pronounced "Kwiss" or "K-woos"), a name that real men and women from Monterey to San Francisco

may have a difficult time accepting.

"Real men don't eat KWSS," joked Gilroy attorney Steve Millich, a loyal "FAThead".

"KWSS does sound kind of soft, and I guess that's what they want to do," said former KFAT owner Jeremy Lansman, who once considered naming the popular progressive country station KPIG.

"Hopefully, we can get the word across to the new owners that we'd be a lot happier if they didn't change the call letters," said Gilroy Chamber of Commerce President Bob Dyer. "KFAT is on everyone's lips. You sure remember it more than KWSS. It's kind of an acronym for Gilroy."

Western Cities Broadcasting, a Las Vegas, Nev., broadcasting chain scheduled to take over the station in January, hasn't tried to allay those fears. Company officials didn't return telephone calls Tuesday. And Western Cities representatives have told KFAT employees only that their market surveys still are incomplete.

"We've heard nothing but rumors," said one KFAT employee. "They sound like a 60-second cartridge — 'We're not making any decisions until January.'"

For seven years, KFAT has aired a raucous, irreverent blend of country music, rock 'n' roll, morning talk and sometimes off-color ads and jokes. Once a

low-power station, KFAT now transmits its signal all over the Bay Area from the top of Loma Prieta in the Santa Cruz Mountains. KFAT's studios are in the Old Gilroy Hotel on Gilroy's main street.

But FATheads are worried that the contemporary and rock formats at Western Cities' five other stations in Las Vegas, Mesa, Ariz, and Sacramento may soon come to Gilroy. While that may not sound so awful, many in Gilroy point out that KFAT in its present incarnation has given their town a large measure of identity.

"When I go to meetings in the Bay Ar-

"When I go to meetings in the Bay Area, and people see my name tag, they don't say Garlic Capital, they say KFAT," said Gilroy City Council member Sharon Albert.

"It would behoove the company to look at the listening audience and see how popular the station is," Albert said. "I would hate to lose it."

Western Cities applied for the name change on Nov. 5 before the Federal Communications Commission. Although the FCC has not acted on the application, its criteria for a call-letter change are relatively easy to satisfy.

The new letters cannot match those of another station in the market. And they cannot resemble the call name of another station in the market, either rhythmically or phonetically.

or phonetically.

"Generally, a change in call letters is because of an identity change," FCC engi-

neer Philip Kane said. "Usually the licensee wants it so bad he can taste it."

All KFAT listeners and employees want is for things to remain the same at Gilroy's only radio station.

"It's really sad to listen to it now," said KTAT disc jockey Dallas Dobro. "Now KHAT'd signat conglomeration of music blended together without sounding like a juke box in a mental hospital. In the last few months, it's really come together."

The music has been a problem only for the station's accountants. Although many of KFAT's listeners were upper-income professionals, the station never reached a mass audience.

The situation became more complicated in May when former owner Harvey Levin died of cancer at age 38. Levin stipulated that the station's operating income or the profils from its sale go to medical or environmental charities.

"The station is owned by the estate, and it doesn't have any resources available for working capital," said San Francisco attorney William Horwich, the executor of Levin's estate.

"It just can't weather the downs or take advantage of the ups in a market that's somewhat volatile because of the economy. Generally, the station has been showing good growth. But the risk of keeping the station if things didn't get better was that you might have to dip into other assets of the estate and lose the benefit to charity."

Detroit ethnic radio finds permanent home on dial

Detroit's rich collection of ethnic radio programs has a home of its own. At last.

No more being shoved back and forth across the kilocycles at someone else's whim. No more being relegated to silence when some station or another changes from country to rock, from AM to FM.

Beginning Wednesday, 30 ethnic programs - off the air since

July last will broadcast again on a station they now themselves:

WPON, 1460

"Our history of being unceremoniously dumped bν

this station or Margaret Palos commented Margaret

Palos, who started her Hungarian Rhapsodies program in 1936 on radio station WJBK with her late husband, Ernest.

"WJBK WAS SOLD in September of 1947 and we were dumped. We went to WJLB the Detroit News, 11/18/82, via Phil Boersma

next month and stayed there until May 1948, where it happened again. But then WJLB took us back in June 1949, when its policy changed again."

This time, Hungarian Rhapsodies (and some other ethnic programs) stayed put for 11 years on WJLB, until 1969. But then the station informed them they were tailor-made for FM radio. They were moved without choice to WMZK, an FM station owned by WJLB, and their listeners had to run out and buy new radios with an FM band.

WMZK — eventually known as "The Station of the Nations" - was home to the growing number of eth-nic programs until last July, when new owners said they wanted new sounds.

So the ethnic programs were off the air again.

THEY MIGHT have sued. Instead, they formed Foreign Radio Programs Inc. (FPR) and looked for a station to buy. WPON, a 1,000kilowatt station, was available and they purchased it "for more than \$1.1 million" from the Michigan Cablevi-

minon from the mean sion & Radio Co.
The new WPON will be heard in Oakland, Macomb, Wayne, Livingston, Lapeer and Wicounties and in Windsor. Washtenew

heard on the nation's only all-ethnic station:

News from the homelands is emphasized on many of the programs, as is special news at times

Jerzy Rozalski, director of Polish Varieties, has been in telephone contact with the home of Lech Walesa, leader of Poland's outlawed Solidarity union. Excerpts of those calls have been published in The Detroit

ROZALSKI WILL play his Walesa tapes for his radio audience when his program opens the new era on WPON at 9 a.m. Wednesday.

Mrs. Palos is considered the dean of the stockholder-directors who own the station and present the programs. Another is Josephine Faddol, director of the 35-year-old Middle East Melodies, the oldest Arabic language program in the United States.

Both women remember when the ethnic programs raised enough money to buy a station sometime in the 1940s, only to learn from the Federal Communications Commission that "there was no air space available for us.

This time the ethnic directors raised money to buy WPON with talkathons, benefit parties and other projects.


