FLASH TIPS: The latest Review of International Broadcasting reports WAGE-1200 in Leesburg, VA will begin operating on their new frequency December 2, 1985. Since it's now mid-January there's a good chance they've moved by now. The station had planned to go 24 hours after they moved (they were on until midnight on 1290), and would carry Larry King. Also in that issue of RIB, Venezuela is cracking down on stations that don;t play enough Venezuelan music. Two stations (the article didn't say who) were suspended from operating for three days because they only played 47 percent Venezuelan artists. The minimum requirement is 50 percent. Meanwhile back on the western end of this continent, KARR-1460 in Kirkland, WA has left the air. They had been NSP for the last couple of years but consistently lost money. I always thought there were too many stations in this market.

On Saturday 12/7, Greg Monti hosted a WADXA get-to-Bill Townshend, gether at his Arlington, Va. pad, 2 km west of the Pentagon, with fourteen including Tom White and yours truly attending. Here is something for Bruce Portzer who ran a "Domestic Thingamajig Roundup" column in DXM several years ago. WILC-900 Laurel, Md. (ex-WLMD) is broadcasting in Spanish as of 12/17/85. The AdCon format went out, along with Pat O'Leary, the PD and midday man who played oldies on the last hour of his four-hour was bought from the Mid-America Corp. by Israel Lopez Corp. (whence the call letters) for 720 grand. Their s/off is bi-lingual, in English, then Spanish. I hear IRCAn Jim Wallace broadcast the 1800 news during the week on WWVA-1170 Wheeling, W.Va. Speaking of SS, the other such station in the Baltimore-Washington DC area is WMDO-1540 (ex-WDON) Wheaton, Md. and the SS TV station is a translator on channel 14 (W14AA), whose original broadcast comes from San Antonio, Texas and re-transmits from a tower on the American University campus (WAMU-FM-88.5 uses the same tower). I can see the tower, as well as the one used by WRC-TV and WKYS-FM, from my bedroom window, 3 km to the NE. KDKA-1020 Pittsburgh, Penn. is now a "senior citizen" as radio stations go, having turned 65 on 11/2 (it was on 11/2/ 20 that the station proadcasted the 1920 presidential election returns). WRC-980 (now WWRC) will attain senior citizen status in 1987. The old geezer on 1020 is a pest but has been "auroraed out" at times, especially in the fall of 1978, when I heard Cuba and Venezuela on that channel. Those two SS stations are the only two other stations heard on 1020. I never heard KBCQ in N.H. nor KTNQ in Calif. (like WILC, it is SS). With only three rigs, all by Radio Shack (DX-160, Patrolman SX-60, and Portavision-55), I now have access to the following frequency ranges: 150-400 kHz, 520 kHz-50 mHz, 58-216 mHz, and 450-890 mHz. Enough blab for now, so I'll syoff and see you in 14 or 21 or whenever. 73 and good DX in the new year.

I hope everyone had a safe and happy holiday season, and I thought I'd get the New Year off to the right start with a Forum. this column has been looking a little slim lately, maybe all of us East Coasters should do this! I strung up a new beverage antenna, to the south, a few weeks ago and have been having some fun logging some new Latins and Florida stations. The land directly behind our subdivision separates us from the main highway, and as this land fronts this highway (and this part of town is fast-developing) it won't be long before homes or apts. are built, and I'll lose my antenna farm.! So I am enjoying it while I can...the land is currently for sale. According to the local papers, WJYA-1080 in Marietta will go silent tonight (New Year's Eve) and come back in a few weeks as a new urban-contemporary outlet. The same goes for its sister FM, WJYA-104.1. The station has been sold to Zapis Communications out of Cleveland. I was pleasantly surprised last week to receive two veries from Latin stations...HJKH-770 Bogota, Colombia and YSS-655 El Salvador both replied with nice, SS letters (had to get Linda to translate for me!). In the past few years I have had terrible luck in mailing reports to Central-and-South America, so this was encouraging. am mailing one to R. Belen-1175 in Panama, a country that is notoriuous: for its non-verifying, but this particular station has recently replied to Richard wood in Hawaii, so maybe I'll get a reply too. I wonder if it would be wise to send reports to the two Nicaraguan stations I logged recently? I'm not sure they would even reply, or that the reports would make it there. As to the current controverzy, I am in favor of leaving things the way they are, time-zone-usage-wise. Being primarily a domestic DXer, I have little use for GNT (and even when I do do some foreign DX on BCB, GMT is of little use there, either). It just doesn't fit in with BCB DX at all...almost none of the BCB broadcasters, domestic or foreign, use it themselves, so why should we convert all of our submissions to DX Monitor to GMT? At the very least, maybe to foreign columns could use GMT but certainly not EDXC, CDXR, and WDXR! One other consideration is that just as the old abbreviation system that was heavily used in IRCA and NRC may have made new members somewhat reluctant at first to send in contributions, (due to unfamiliarity with the myriad of abbreviations that were used) the use of GMT may have the same effect. Unless a DXer has already gotten used to it through SW DX, it can be a little confusing. I am not in favor of complicating things unnecessarily. Now off my soapbox and time to put this into the mailbox. 73's.

It appears that WRSC has corrected their problem of dumping modulation on the frequencies of 1360 and 1420 kHz. Radio Paradise from St. Kitts is doing well on 825 kHz in the early night hours and this is a good time of the year to nail this one if you have not done so already. Happy DXing.

Jim Hall, 240 Byron Road, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania 15237 this reaches print before the next DXWW-E, please note that I am moving back to my old P ttsburgh address as listed above; and as of the end of 1985 you may resume sending DXWW-E reports to Pittsburgh. To the relief of DXWW-E enthusiasts, the change will allow columns to be on schedule with little or no dalays. Sad to say, however, that I may be resigning, not by choice, by summer '86 -- that's if I'm selected for training by the FAA in Oklahoma City. Perhaps, If I am, (maximum length of training at the Oklahoma City facility shouldn't exceed 4 months) an interim editor can take over until I return for placement in the FAA Eastern Region where air traffic controllers are required. This is a good idea and I suggest that DXers seeking veries ask this of stations they write to. I'm very sad to see Peter V. Taylor's resignation - I certainly hope Richard E. Wood appoints a new editor for DXWW-II very shortly as it is an extremely useful column offering lots of valuable information to the global DXer. Mr. Taylor is to be congratulated for doing a professional job with DXWW-II and I hope his resigning doesn't bring a demise to this useful column. It's too bad the East Coast has lost Niel Kazaross's excellent DXing capability; I certainly hope he re-establishes himself as an ace DXer on the West Coast alike. But we on the East Coast still have some top-notch members keeping worldwide DX alive here. Enough said, I don't want to compete with Jaison's Journals. See you in DXM.

Hi everyone. Hope you all had a good holiday season and that 1986 is treating you well so far. This is my last forum from Anaheim. I left for the Monterey/Salinas area on January 4th to stay at Laura's father's place, to look for work up here. Laura's store in Monterey opens in March and we should be settling into our place near Carmel Valley in February. I'm on a waiting list for the position with Monterey County 911 communications as an emergency dispatcher. So, I'm trying to line up interviews with broadcasting stations. I have a good shot at an interview at channel 46-KMST Monterey. So I'll keep you informed as I find out more. And when I have a new address I'll let everyone know. Mail to Anaheim will be forwarded in the meantime. I'm going to miss all my DX friends in southern California very, very much.

With all the preparations to move and the holidays, DX has been a bit on the slow side. November was fairly good with KABN 830 Alaska heard and WHBO 1040 Florida also heard. Those are my two best catches in a while. The rest were in WDXR. Total heard now stands at 563. Barely got the test from WSJC on 26 December - KGO is difficult to null, and I couldn't get rid of them completely.

On the time zone issue I say keep it the way it is, Eastern time for the domestic columns. I keep my logs in local time like Nancy Hardy, such as 5:30 FM. I can easily convert to the 24-hour clock in Eastern time in my head. The same goes for GMT. So, my feelings, leave it alone!

To Dr. Richard Wood: WFLA 970 might be a good idea for someone in the west for Florida, but not in southern California! There's too much QRM from KFWB 980, plus KVIM and KUZZ 970 to contend with in the Los Angeles area. Judging by the number of IRCA members that haven't heard WHBO lately, I'd say that would be the current best bet for Florida in the west. The only other one I've heard is WTAI 1560 and that depends on SR time, because KPMC signs on at 0700 Eastern time

On the problem of XETRA being off frequency 29 November, I heard from a local CE that it might have been a problem with their Kahn stereo generator causing them to drift off frequency. (Muhr? Wouldn't their crystal for 690 be suspect first?—RtH.) Still haven't been able to find out which system KWIZ 1480 uses, but their stereo signal sounds good. Locally, KWRM 1370 is carrying Cal State Fullerton BkB and U.C. Irvine BkB is heard on KPZE 1190. During the fall, Cal State Fullerton FB was on KWOW 1600. Now, KWOW is carrying Cal State Long Beach BkB.

Thanks to Gary Larson and Steve Mittman for their recent phone calls. It was nice to talk to Don Erickson and Matthew Shugart so much in recent months also. Thanks to all your help and encouragement over the years, guys. The friendliness and helpfulness of the DX'ers are what makes IRCA such a great club.

The recent AM stereo list in DXM was very interesting and very useful to this

DX'er. I have an AM stereo receiver and have heard quite a few stations in AM stereo. The list only included stations in the US, however, there was a smaller list in DX News showing some of the C-QUAM stations in Canada, Australia, South Africa and Venezuela. It would be unlikely that a DX'er in the US or Canada would be able to log South Africa. A useful AM stereo list would be for stations in Mexico, where I $\,$ know there are some $\,$ AN stereo stations. In $\,$ fact, XETRA 690 was one of the first stations in the world to broadcast in stereo and still does so with the Kahn system. AM stereo is one of the greatest things to happen to AM in a long, long time. It sounds as good as FM stereo with a good amplifier connected to the receiver. Even the Sony SRFA100 can sound good if connected to an amplifier and not just the small two-and-a-half-inch speakers in the system.

Jaisun, sounds like it's time, once again, to get friendly with the overnight bunch at KGO, and with Tallifierro that could be interesting (hi) and push the Wedge loop plans again. Either Luckoff has gotten letters from some really dumb people, or they're a lot closer to Grass Valley than Sacramento, but believe me, KNCO at night is NOTHING, compared to KGO. Even in Eureka, three times the distance from KGO as Sacramento, KGO did well 24 hours a day, and daytime that was one-and-a-half miles from 5 kw KEKA 790. Ah yes, in closing, Sac. is Kaskey's old stompin' grounds and he mentioned years ago that KWUN 1480 Concord, just 45 miles away was impossible (they send less than 25 watts this direction from their five towers). Hey Kaskey, you weren't south enough here. KWUN has a beautiful signal here midday, albeit fighting KYOS all the way.



Cuban Interference Increasing

Miami FL ... South Florida broadcasters report increased Cuban interference on the AM band, including some instances of jamming, since a 50 kW Spanish-language station signed on in Miami in late October.

Though the interference is also affecting some stations across the continent at night, there appears to be little chance of talks with Cuban authorities to reduce the problem.

The latest round of interference coincided, broadcasters said, with the arrival of WAQI, a 50 kW Spanish-language station on 710 kHz. On 23 October, WAQI replaced Miami's WGBS, an English-language news/talk station, which merged operations with another Miami station, WNWS, on 790 kHz.

Jefferson-Pilot Broadcasting Company sold WGBS to the Mambisa Broadcasting Corporation and, in turn, purchased WNWS. Jefferson-Pilot merged its WGBS staff with the existing WNWS

staff to continue the English news/talk format there.

"Radio Mambi"

WAQI, which calls itself "Radio Mambi," is apparently drawing electromagnetic scorn from Cuban authorities because it not only has the strongest signal in the state, but also reports on news events in Cuba, said WAQI VP Charles Fernandez.

In the first few days after its launch, before jamming began, WAQI's 710 kHz signal could reach well into Cuba, Fernandez said, even better than the Voice of America's (VOA) Radio Marti service.

WAQI programs a mix of news, talk and entertainment. While it is not "anti-Castro" per se, Fernandez said that the Castro regime would not be too pleased with the content of some of the programming.

According to former WGBS CE John Morris (now with WNWS), WGBS' English-language programming had not been subject to Cuban interference.

"Most Cuban people don't speak English, so Cuba wasn't worried about WGBS," Fernandez added.

By 27 October, however, Cuba began a powerful broadcast of its Radio Rebelde program—which is found elsewhere on the AM band—on WAQI's 710 kHz frequency. According to several broadcast engineers in South Florida, the island nation has also been broadcasting a noisy jamming signal at times on the frequency.

An area broadcaster who did not want to be identified said the FCC told him that it speculates that two transmitters in Cuba are pumping about 100 kW on 710 kHz toward the US to jam WAQI.

Both Fernandez and Morris complained that the Cuban station has been using WAQI's calls to further confuse the situation. "They are trying to get us in trouble with the FCC," Fernandez added.

Fernandez said that, during the day, WAQI can be heard in the Miami area, but listeners in the Florida Keys can only hear Cuba's Rebelde. At night the problem is more severe, compounded by the fact that WAQI has been operating at only 18 kW while it makes equipment repairs, he added.

The Cuban interference on 710 kHz has even affected New York City's 50 kW WOR, which operates on the same frequency. Listeners in the mid-Atlantic states who previously received WOR at night with no problem report a rather strong Spanish-language signal underneath it.

FCC Field Operations Bureau Deputy Chief Arlan Van Doom said the Commission will investigate an interference complaint it received in early December from WOR.

Not Radio Marti backlash

The issue of Cuban interference is nothing new to South Florida broadcasters. Many feared they would be subject to massive interference after the VOA started its "Radio Marti" service on 20 May 1985.

Aimed directly at the Cuban population, Radio Marti broadcasts with at least 50 kW on 1180 kHz from a transmitter in the Florida Keys. Previously the VOA used the frequency to relay its general Spanish programming to Central America and the Caribbean.

Radio Marti's programming apparently did not bother the Cuban authorities, and most South Florida broadcasters did not report any major increase in interference after Marti signed on, even though Havana has experimented with high-powered AM band interference on occasion.

Other frequencies affected

Besides increased interference on 710 kHz, stations on other frequencies are re-

porting higher levels of Cuban interference. Fernandez said it appears that Cuba is striking hardest at Spanish-language stations in South Florida.

Ralph Chambers, CE at WCMQ, a Spanish-language station on 1210 kHz, said he had noticed a significant increase in interference on 1210 kHz within one week after WAQI signed on. He said Cuba has been running Radio Rebelde on other frequencies besides 710 and 1210 kHz.

Chambers confirmed that Cuba had been broadcasting noise jamming, in addition to Radio Rebelde, on 710 kHz.

dition to Radio Receited, oil 10 KHz.
While he has always noted a Cuban
station on WCMQ's frequency before
WAQI signed on, he said the level of interference on 1210 kHz has doubled since
last year. "We have listeners in the fringe
area of CMQ that can't get us anymore,"
Chambers said.

WCMQ operates at night with 2850 W under special temporary authority, instead of its normal 2500 W. But the night power is no longer enough to counteract the Cuban interference, Chambers said.

CE John Morris said the level of Cuban interference to English-language WNWS on 790 kHz also seems to be getting stronger. "We are getting more complaints," he said.

Other stations are reporting interference. NAB Engineer Mike Rau said his organization received a recent Cuban interference complaint from KSL, Salt Lake City, Utah, a 50 kW station operating on 1160 kHz.

KSL Assistant CE Randy Finch confirmed that the station has received complaints, particularly from listeners in Southern Utah who hear Spanish language programming underneath KSL's Brigham Young University sports events. Finch said he even got a complaint from a listener in Hawaii who said a Cuban station was interfering with reception of KSL.

Finch said that two years ago Cuba violated an agreement it had to respect KSL's clear channel status, and many complaints were received.

He added that there would be a greater number of recent complaints if there were not a period of such low sunspot activity now, which tends to reduce the ionospheric skywave "skip" of distant stations.

Cuba has reportedly been operating a station for tourists on 1160 kHz that has been broadcasting, at times, in English. Though the station normally signs off at local sunset, it has occasionally been monitored operating at night, when it then interferes with KSL's signal.

Severity questioned

Despite complaints from some broadcasters, the FCC said it is not convinced that the level of Cuban interference is significantly higher than in the past.

While he said he was familiar with the WAQI situation, the FCC's Van Doorn said he had not received many complaints from broadcasters. In fact, the only recent Cuban interference complaint he has received was from WOR.

"We normally get calls, but it has been quiet," he added.

However, WAQI's Fernandez said he has already filed an interference complaint with the FCC and plans to file another.

The FCC, Van Doorn said, regularly monitors Cuban medium wave activity and releases reports. The last Cuban broadcast list was made available in mid-October, before WAQI signed on.

Talks stalemated

State Department and FCC officials said they have tried to resolve the ongoing problem of Cuban interference. Both organizations blame Cuba for unwillingness to negotiate.

At a fall meeting of the Radio Advisory Committee (RAC), which was attended by broadcasting representational officials from the NAB and FCC, there was talk that the US and Cuba might meet to discuss more critical communications involving aircraft, weather and telephone links.

However, US State Department International Radio Communications Office Deputy Director Bill Jahn doubted that the talks would take place in the near future.

A matter of primary importance, he added, was the replacement of an aging telephone cable between Miami and Havana. Therefore, he said, negotiations may emphasize common carriers as opposed to broadcasters.

"We met with Cuba in August 1983, in San Jose, Costa Rica, and again in October 1983 in Mexico City. But Cuba walked out of the talks at the last minute," Jahn said. "The US has a standing offer to (reopen) the talks."

FCC Attorney Louis Stephens, who also serves as chairman of the RAC, said "We are seeking opportunities to develop understandings with Cuba. However, previous efforts have failed," because Cuba has sought "trade-offs" in non-broadcasting areas.

Officials at the Cuban Interest Section office at the Czech Embassy in Washington, DC could not be reached for comment on the matter.

Financial compensation

The FCC is continuing to administer its program to provide monetary compensation to stations that have made costly improvements in their transmission systems to battle increased Cuban interference, according to FCC Audio Services Division Assistant Chief Dennis Williams.

However, he reported that financial compensation has not yet been sent to broadcasters.

Williams said the FCC previously approved \$12,265 in compensation to WSUN, St. Petersburg. Under the plan, the FCC's recommendation was sent to the US Information Agency (USIA), which is to distribute the money. However, Williams said that Congress has not yet appropriated the money to USIA.

However, some stations are not as interested in financial compensation.

"We are not angry at the FCC," said Ralph Chambers of WCMQ, which did not file for compensation.

"We just want a power level to overcome the interference," he added.

The MWT-1: A Medium-Wave Tuner / Pre-selector with Regeneration Capability

Mark Connelly -=- WAIION DX Labs -=- 18 DEC 1985

Introduction

Several problems are encountered today by medium-wave DXers in the quest to hear new stations.

The first is the mediocre ability of reasonably-priced receivers to deal with strong stations. Spurious mixing responses caused by overloading of a receiver's front end by several local stations are a problem most of us have experienced. Overloading is most severe at urban locations when an outdoor wire antenna of considerable length is connected directly to the receiver input. The most common remedies are (1) use a (tuned) loop antenna or (2) attenuate the signal from the longwire. Solution (1), using the loop approach, is of considerable merit if the building in which the loop resides is not made of an RF-absorptive material and if the RF noise level within that building is low. Shielded, balanced loops offer reduction of some types of electrical noise. Of course there are many cases that rule out successful loop operation - e. g. a steel-frame building with numerous SCR light-dimmers and TV sets. Common-remedy (2), using a potentiometer or resistivedivider to attenuate the signals from a longwire antenna, will often give the desired results of a low manmade-noise level and freedom from overloading-caused spurious responses, but the penalty may well be that a DX station's weak signal level may be lower than that which the receiver can detect.

A second problem is that the same receivers that are readily overloaded by strong stations in the city may not be sensitive enough to receive weak signals when operated in the country. A DXer may not always be able to solve the low-sensitivity problem by casually strolling outside with a 2000-foot roll of Beverage wire: the land required may simply not be available. Some car receivers yield impressive sensitivity with short whip aerials, so a DXer would expect that a \$ 300 to \$ 500 communications receiver should pull tremendous signals from a 50'/15 m. longwire. Such is often not the case, however.

The third problem to be considered is the insufficient selectivity of some receivers. This is especially notable with the many moderately-priced digital-readout portables now in common use – e. g. the Sony ICF-2001, Uniden CR-2021, Realistic DX-400. Mediocre selectivity is also a "feature" of the Kenwood R-600 and R-1000: the so-called "narrow" selectivity position provided by these receivers just can't "cut the mustard" on foreign splits like the more expensive rigs (R-71, etc.) or like the old-timers (R-390A, HQ-180A).

The MWT-1: a DX problem-solver

The MWT-1 Medium Wave Tuner can be placed between an antenna lead and the receiver's input. This tuner can perform four distinct functions which allow the DXer to get optimum results for the given receiver / antenna / location combination. These functions are summarised as follows:

- (1) Direct antenna to receiver connection: The antenna may be connected through the tuner directly to the receiver's input. An attenuator pot (R1) allows reduction in the signal levels provided by the antenna (thereby combatting front-end overload problems).
- (2) Passive tuning (no amplification): Overloading / spurs from unwanted -frequency stations may be reduced or eliminated with little or no loss of desired-frequency DX station signal strength. The L-C tank circuit in the tuner is adjusted to peak the desired frequency; stations on other frequencies are attenuated. Those using sizable longwires and mediocre receivers at strong-signal urban locations benefit the most from the passive tuning approach.

- (3) Simple Active tuning (amplified, no regeneration): The desirable features of passive tuning are coupled with the added benefit of amplification. Thunderous signal levels may be obtained from wires as short as 20'/ 6 m.; even a car whip provides worthwhile DX. High-impedance shortwires which perform poorly into 50-ohm receiver inputs "come to life" when active tuning is used. Even a Beverage's output can be improved, at least at sites without strong local stations.
- (4) Regenerative tuning: Reception improvements made by simple active tuning are taken even further by regenerative tuning. Much more gain is achievable. Furthermore, previously-listed Problem # 3 (insufficient receiver selectivity) can now be attacked. A regenerative tuner, when peaked and on the verge of oscillating, tightens the received passband to the point that audio can be successfully extracted from a station on 999 kHz that is 10 dB weaker than a station on 1000 kHz. This selectivity-enhancement works like a Q-Multiplier circuit and is somewhat independent of the receiver's own selectivity. This gives car radios and other broad-selectivity receivers split-catching capabilities normally associated with midpriced communications receivers. A Q-Multiplier differs from the MWT-1 in that the Q-Multiplier works on the IF (usually 455 kHz) and has to be wired to the receiver's innards while the MWT-1 works on the RF input and does not require any wiring to the receiver other than to its signal-input jack. Regenerative tuning is more complicated (adjustment-wise) than passive or simple active tuning are, but the results are frequently worth the effort. Using regenerative tuners of various types between my car whip and car radio has been most gratifying, especially when parked at Waterfront Park in Boston at sunset when the Trans-Atlantics are rolling in.

Before getting into the particulars of initiation and performance of each mode, the operator of the unit should become familiar with the unit's controls and its input / output connectors as identified in Table 1 and in the schematic drawing (Figure 1). Figure 1 appears in the "Building the MWT-1 Tuner" section of this article. It should be noted that S2 is a 3-position function switch which selects Mode 2 (passive tuning) at its fully counterclockwise position, Mode 1 ("off / bypass" - i. e. direct antenna to receiver feed) at its centre position, and "active" (to be explained more) at its fully clockwise position. The "active" function switch setting actually comprises both the Mode 3 (simple active tuning) and Mode 4 (regenerative tuning) functions: Mode 3 is obtained by setting R3 to fully clockwise (R3's wiper arm to ground); Mode 4 is obtained by adjusting R3's wiper arm to be not at zero ohms to ground.

The tuned modes of a standard MWT-1 provide coverage of 140 - 300 kHz (European / African / Asian longwave broadcasts) and 450 - 2000 kHz (ship traffic, standard AM broadcast band, and 160-metre ham band). A longwave-only unit (LWT-1) could be made to cover 90 - 700 kHz, thereby providing full beacon-band coverage, by using the following tank inductors on S1: (L in uH) L1=15000, L2=6800, L3=3300, L4=1500, L5=680, L6=330, L7=3300, L8=1500, L9=680, L10=330, L11=150, and L12=68.

Operating the MWT-1

Before operating any of the four modes, connections to/from the MWT-1 must be made. The antenna or other signal source may be connected to J1, J2, or J3. Earth ground should be connected to J4 if the cable to the receiver will be longer than 10'/3 m. or if the receiver is not grounded. Earth ground may be a ground rod, a cold water pipe, a 3-prong AC outlet's centre-pin, or even a "dummy ground" such as a Beverage antenna not being used at the time for reception. Grounding helps to reduce interference from locally-generated mammade RF noise. A 9-volt battery should be connected to J7. The RF-output coaxial cable (to the receiver input) may be connected to J5 or J6. A shielded receiver (e.g. communications receiver or a car radio) should be used; successful tuner operation with receivers having coupling coils on ferrite rod aerials is not always possible because of the inherent stray pickup of ferrite rods.

Mode (1) direct feed of antenna to receiver

Initialisation

The following controls are not used in Mode (1): C1, R3, S3, C2, S1, R2. Their positions are irrelevant.

Set R1 initially to fully CCW (the switch on R1 takes this attenuation pot out of the line).

Set S2 to centre (off / bypass function).

Operation

With receiver on desired frequency, check that the wanted signal is of sufficient strength and has no spurious mixing signals or images from strong local stations. If spurs / images are present, adjust R1 until they go away. If the wanted station is now too weak, a different operating mode (2, 3, or 4) is suggested.

Mode (2) passive tuning

Minimum suggested wire length for passive tuning is 50'/15 m. at frequencies below 500 kHz; 26'/8 m. at frequencies above 500 kHz.

Initialisation

C1 is to be adjusted later.

Set R1 to fully CCW (attenuator out of line).

Set R3 to fully CCW = maximum output level.

Set S3 to right = "Normal" length position.

Set S2 fully CCW = passive tuning position.

Set C2 at 12 o'clock pointer position = minimum capacitance.

Set R2 fully CCW = maximum Q.

Set S1 for operating frequency range desired, in accordance with Table 2.

Operation

Adjust C1 for maximum desired-frequency signal.

If overloading-caused spurious responses QRM the desired signal when C1 is properly peaked, set S3 to "Long" (middle) and re-peak C1. If, after having done that, spurs still exist: adjust R3 to make the spurs go away. Slight re-peaking of C1 may then be necessary.

Mode (3) simple active tuning ======= Initialisation

C1 is to be adjusted later.

Set R1 to fully CCW (attenuator out of line).

Set R3 to fully CW = wiper arm at GND.

Set S3 to right = "Normal" length position (wire length greater than 10'/3 m.) or to left = "Short" length position (antenna shorter than 10').

Set S2 fully CW = active tuning position.

Set C2 at 12 o'clock pointer position = minimum capacitance.

Set R2 fully CCW = maximum Q.

Set S1 for operating frequency range desired, in accordance with Table 2.

Operation

Adjust C1 for maximum desired-frequency signal.

If spurs occur & S3 is on "Short", set S3 to "Normal" & re-peak C1.

If spurs occur & S3 is on "Normal", set S3 to "Long" & re-peak C1. At that point, use R3 to eliminate any residual overloading-caused spurious responses that may be present. Slight re-peaking of C1 may be required.

Mode (4) regenerative tuning

Perform all Mode 3 steps above except, during initialisation, set C2 to half-meshed (= 3 o'clock) and R2 at half-resistance (= 12 o'clock).

Bring R3 gradually CCW in small steps; after each step, re-peak C1. An increase in signal level and tuning sharpness should be readily apparent. At the "regeneration threshold" the received audio gets muddy; beyond that threshold, oscillation occurs. Once R3 & C1 have been adjusted to the threshold as closely as possible, fine-tuning may be accomplished by successive adjustments of vernier controls R2 & C2.

Occasionally it may be necessary to set length switch S3 to the "next longest" position (e.g. to "Normal" if it had been on "Short") to get a high enough Q for regeneration. Doing this also reduces the likelihood of spurs.
