



He has DXed on the 160 meter band using a Beverage and he knows some hams who have also Dies on the 80 and 40 meters with Deverages. He said that there is a null in the direction of the end of the antenna, but two large lobes at small angles from the end of the antenna. So if what he was saying is true then stations directly off the end of the antenna would be nulled out. Can someone in the club confirm this? Also I would like to put my two bits in about the conversation going on about the lack of reception of stations from the Far Bast on the Rast Coast of North America. I think most of the reasons put forth already explain why Diers have not been receiving these stations. Mainly I would like to offer my observations about the existence of the "Donut Hole" and its effect on 5W reception. Host SEL's have experienced this phenominon. For example, at my Maryland QTR it was unusual to have good reception of stations like Radio Japan and Radio Korea. When they were coming in at a listenable level it was usually our_ng periods of lower geomagnetic activity. However I would hear Radio Australia almost daily. Looking at my globe, I noticed signals from Australia would not go near the "Donut Hole" in worthern Canada and was affected very little by geomagnetic, while signals from korea and Japan would have to pass directly through it. I could go on with other examples, but based on my experience 1 am convinced that such a phenomenon does exist. I don't know what effect this would have on EM reception, but I am sure that it could explain at least in part why reception of Japan has not occurred lately. Bye for now de wih.

A number of emergency proadcasts have leen heard over the past few weeks. On harch 24th a fire broke out in a metal plant in Nunticoke, PA causing a green chemical cloud to hover above the factory slowly drifting with the wind. WARD-1550 Pittston, PA went into emergency format allowing the relay of instructions to advise the nunic of the dangers of the irritant contained in the chemical cloud, warning the 15,000 people in the area to evacuate their homes. A hospital and nursing home were also in the danger zone. A call went out for hospital and emergency workers. Ambulances from over 100 communities responded to assist in the evacuation. Phose who stayed bening were told to stay indoors and keep their doors and windows closed. The National Guerd made a nelicopter available to the Department of Environmental Resources so the toxin in the green cloud be measured. Governor Casey arrived to cour the area. WARD stayed with the story and keep citizens advised as to everything that was happening suring the emergency. KDNA in spite of being the flag station for the Littsburgh Piratesmanaged to do a great job in keeping people in the Littsburgh area advised on the train derailment which caused an evacuation of 15,000-18,000 people from the area without interupting the feed to the stations also carrying

the Pirate games during the weekend of April 8th. I checked WMAJ-1450 State College during one of KDKA's emergency announcements and found the game still in progress with only a brief mention by the sports announcer bringing those in the Pittsburgh area up-to-date when the announcement was ended. KDKA used a tone alert prior to each emergency announcement. Residents in the half mile area of the chemical spill were instructed to go to the Civic Arena and the overflow went to the Convention Center where they were assisted by the Salvation Army and Red Cross. Police were pulled in from other districts to patrol the area to prevent looting. Weather was a big concern as the chemical reacts to water and rain was expected so workers worked throughout the night covering the tanker with plastic. WRSC-1390 State College, PA made brief announcements of a plane crash which occured in the back yard of a State College resident. The four people in the small plane were killed. The station was doing a road show at the time and that may account for the lack of reporting. They also avoided telling of the expected rain. (To be continued next time...)

Tom Farmerie in Grafton, Massachusettes, sums up one of my sneaking suspicions in his report in DX News, 13 April. He says there, "the prime reason for Asian DX not being heard in the East is simple. Nobody, including

myself is trying."

Perhaps that statement should be modified to say not trying hard enough. I'm sure Tom wouldn't quibble about my modification. Tom has been checking into the early issues of DXN, as I had suggested, to determine if Japanese loggings weren't frequently reported by Eastern DX'ers in the early 30s. He mentions a long-gone DX'er in Worchester, Massachusettes who claimed reception of seven JJ stations in 1934. There's no way that claim can be proved, but I find it easy to believe inasmuch as there was a collection of seven particular Jo's often reported at that time by DX'ers all over the country: These Big Seven were JOAK 870, JOFK 850, JOIK 830, JOCK 810, JOGK 790, JOHK 770 and JOBK 750. All of them were listed for 10 kw and if anyone heard Japan in those blessed days when domestics signed off at night, these were the most likely ones.

Farmerie mentions that JO reception was much more common in the late '30s. He says they were heard on many occasions as far northeast as New

England.

Now in those days, no DX'er had heard of the auroral zone, the midwinter anomaly, the doughnut hole, cared nothing about the probable height of the D-layer or the geomagnetic indexes. And Eastern DX'ers just sat down at their old-fashioned tube radios connected to 75-to-100-foot antennas and got Japan in season along with Australia, New Zealand and Hawaii.

So I would urge Eastern DX'ers to take Tom Farmerie's diagnosis serious-

ly - that they try for Australia, make a good effort even though that involves getting up a couple of hours before sunrise during the fall and winter mornings. They can anticipate when the time is ripe by watching the A-Index on a daily basis, waiting for the periods when it offers low quotations for days at a stretch. October is probably the best time to look for Japan while January is probably too late. October 31st was the date James Hall in Pittsburgh found JO frequencies 747 and 774 both delivering tantalizing signals at the same time last fall. 747 can hardly be anything else but JOIB. It's virtually a clear channel in TP hours, as early as 0800 GMT.

And let us hope that James Hall will find time this summer to build himself a directional loop so he'll be ready next time Japan and/or Australia tries to make an appearance at his diggings. 73.

The current discussion on propagation is interesting, and I think it's valuable to know as much as possible about it, in the same way that a fisherman is better off knowing about fish. I had heard some time back that there's a propagation enhancement along the periphery of an auroral zone, and sometime around 1958-60 I recall hearing KFQD 730 Anchorage, Alaska (now on 750) quite well and then found out the same time Roy Millar was hearing Sarawak and a DX'er in Brooklyn (was that you E.C.?) was hear-

ing CKLG.
Ric, you asked is there was any conflict with local KYOS and Turlock's KYES having similar calls. However, I can't locate onyone who listenes to either of them so the question is difficult to answer. (And to think KYOS

was the #1 station at one time, of course 20 years ago, hi-RtH.)
Somrone had mentioned a need for service information on an HQ-129X. You need a Sams Photofact #8-18. Check with an electronic parts house or bookseller that sells Howard W. Sams publications, or if you're on good terms with a TV repair shop they may photocopy the schematic and alignment



DX Techniques

And now, "How I DX", short essays by IRCA members stressing the techniques they use to hear DX. There are several member contributions, even one from me! Maybe you will read about a technique for DXing that you haven't tried. Try it out and let us all know how it works. Thanks to those who have made this column possible.

Shawn Axelrod - Winnipeg, Manitoba

Well. I'm a bit new to all of this, Although a DXer since 1971, I only got into BCB DXing in the last 3 years. You might say I'm a seasoned novice, hi! I liked the idea about keeping track of what you have heard. I keep a book with the stations I've heard listed by frequency. Under each frequency I list call letters and location. I don't keep track of the format for they seem to change very often and on graveyard frequencies you can forget it as there are too many stations doing the same thing. I also keep a sort of hit list of new stations or stations I want to hear handy so I can give it a try. If, for instance, I have good skip to Ontario in the 1300-1500's. I'll try for those Ontario stations I feel that fall into the range. It gives you a fighting chance.

One very important lesson I learned from over 15 years of Ham Band DXing is that you need 3 pieces of equipment, 1) a receiver, 2) an antenna and 3) a tape recorder. My tape recorder runs constantly. It goes on when the radio goes on and off when the radio goes off. Many a time my tape recorder has landed me a new one because the tape is quicker than the ear, not to mention it loves to repeat things for you-until you get it right. Hi!!

A new lesson I learned last week was concentrating on a small number of frequencies. I belong to CIDX (where I'm Ham Band editor) and we had a BCB contest. The rules were simple, one point per station for your state or province; 2 points per station for other states or provinces; 3 points per station for foreign stations outside of US and Canada. The contest went from local midnight February 21 to 2359 local February 28. The kicker was you could only contest in 2 - 100 khz sections of your choice from 530 to 1610. I chose 1310-1410 and 1420-1520, as we have no locals there. Well, to make a short story long, hi!, I logged off 123 stations of which 40 were new for me! I listened various times to catch late night as well as sunrise, sunset stuff. All in all, it was very profitable for me as my station heard count is now at 700.

John Demmitt - Bellefonte, Pennsylvania

My receiver stays on during my waking and sleeping hours. I will often conduct a quick scan to determine how well the propagation is doing and to locate any new stations or changes in programming. As soon as I notice something unusual, I get out the logbook and I am ready. I keep the log, pencil and paper near the receiver at all times because you never know when interesting DX is going to roll in. Normally, the best period to DX is around sunset so I often lay out my materials and position the Sony ICF-S5W in an area where I can make nulls. When going for the DX, I find it to my advantage not to use an outside antenna or AC power as they tend not to allow for nulling. When I detect stations from a certain area, I may try for the other frequencies assigned to that region. I'll rotate the radio in every angle possible searching for the nulls that wiil bring in that elusive DX. I'll search all 129,600 degrees if need be by circling the radio up, down, sideways, upside down, etc. I'll hold the receiver to the ceiling for some stations and hug the floor for other stations. I'll often use a metal door frame to null out the more powerful locals. Other interesting places to DX near are heat pipes, water pipes and along the walls. Must go after that signal sniffing it out no matter where it is. A handy reference should include a good listing of stations, your log, an atlas and a set of maps showing sunrise and sunsets. A lot of time is also very helpful. Keeping up on the latest news in the radio hobby will assist you at finding new stations so be sure to keep IRCA's DX Monitor as part of your hobby library.

Tom Laskowski - West Lafayette, Indiana

In my opinion, a successful approach to DXing is to be <u>very</u> organized. This means keeping a log. This may seem trivial, but there are in fact many who don't.

I prefer to use logsheets which are commercially available as their appearance is pleasing. I keep a chronological record of my loggings, recording a station one time for each frequency or call letters used. I also keep an index card file by frequency so I can quickly tell what I have heard on a particular frequency. This could easily be done also with a computer, but personally I see no need for such an expense if it is only used for DXing. As noted in the initial "DX Techniques" column, when first starting out, you will hear only DX. A good thing to do when starting out is to spend some time to memorize the reliable stations which are being heard. This includes clear channel stations and strong regionals. By memorizing what is on a particular frequency, you will quickly be able to note anything unusual being heard. This will permit more time for actual DXing rather than spending time looking through bulletins for clues to what you're hearing.

Another thing that I consider essential is to ALWAYS keep a tape recorder running while DXing. I use a tape recorder with a digital counter and when I hear a possible ID I note the counter number of the tape, the exact time heard and frequency. This way I can always go back and listen and get an ID. I've read accounts of DXers using a stereo tape recorder with one channel tuned into WWV and the other to the station they are listening to . This provides them with accurate time when taking details. However, I have never looked upon this idea with much favor. When trying to dig weak signals out of the mud, the last thing I want to hear is more QRM. I prefer to use headphones when going back over a tape and find it essential to use both ears. Adding a time signal to one channel makes it that much harder. I really think my way of utilizing a tape recorder is more efficient.

The final thing I require in my DXing is to have up to date material regarding the latest call letter, power, pattern, and format changes. Everything I need is in DX Monitor. I will comb through the bulletin and make a list of stations being heard in the column for my region (CDXR). I note the time and the location of the reporter for the logging. This provides me with a target list for stations I want to hear. I never actually use the content of the log to ID a station, but I will only enter a station in my log when I hear an ID. This may mean keeping after a station for a very long time to catch an ID.

There you have it. I don't see my DX activity as being a science, but I think if I'm going to be putting so much effort into it I am certainly going to approach it with a good attitude and well organized manner.

DXing to me is probably one of the most enjoyable activities I have ever known and belonging to IRCA with its excellent group of DXers with the many fine loggings provided, keeps me motivated to keep tuning to hear that ever clusive great catch.

John C. Johnson - Billings, Montana

One must first have a log of stations, and keep a record of what is heard. This does not have to be elaborate, but some kind of written information is necessary. Keep an ear on the radio at various intervals. After listening over a period of time, you will become familiar with your "regular" stations. The station format, the way the signal sounds (strong no fades; good but always fades, etc.) is a big help. The more you listen, the easier it is to tell if you are listening to something new.

If you use a loop antenna, the direction becomes important. Knowing you can "null" a regular station to hear others is helpful in logging many new stations. Listening times will give you different stations, that is, sunrise, daytime, sunset, evenings and late night you will find different stations of any given frequency.

As loggings increase, one may want to keep better records of what he has heard. I use my computer to keep track of all DX activities, and printing monthly activity reports. I use a commercial program, "IBM Filling Assistant" for filling and "IBM Reporting Assistant" for printing reports. Over the years I have found commercial station logs to be very dated, needing constant attention to keep up with call changes, new stations, etc. I have a rather large data base built using information on what I have heard and verified, my own listing of stations (currently just states/provinces that are commonly heard, plus all 50kw US and Canada stations) and using information in Broadcasting and IRCA DX Monitor I update the data base almost daily. (Each DX activity is given a code which appears in all data bases). About every 3 months, I do a printout of my own "AM Station Guide" which gives me a very very accurate and up to the minute guide which I use while DXing. At any time, I know what I have heard, when I heard it, verification information, and what I have not heard. Call changes are also included, I like to re-log call changes, many are from stations that I had logged when I lived in Sheridan, Wyoming from my early years of DX. As far as using a computer to print one's own log, well, that is not for everyone. I spent hundreds of hours entering data! The "AM Station Guide" data base is about 280,000 bytes. The guide takes over an hour to print!

When sending a reception report to a station, very complete information is given as to what I have heard. A report from me includes, if at all possible, no less that a half-hour of logging. I have received many replys from stations stating "Your's is the best reception report I have ever seen". Information as to signal, what else is being heard, fades, etc. is detailed. I also include information as to my receiver, antenna and location. I always mention a brief history of myself and my DX, including information on the IRCA. I learned "How to DX" from listening to others, my first reports look poor compared to those of later years.

Phil Bytheway - Seattle, Washington

This is a tough one for me, as I have tried almost every DX technique I can think of. When I started DXing back in 1968, I just tuned around in the evenings, and often spent hours listening to the programming on stations just because they were far away! I had heard about verifying stations from a friend, and when I wrote to KOB, Don Erickson, then IRCA publisher, got my name and sent me a sample of DX Monitor. Things have not been the same since. I learned about Monday Morning (when stations that are on 24 hours often time go off the air), loop antennas (which can often be used to null stations, even locals, and hear others), frequency checks (when daytimers come on the air to verify their frequency, usually with full power), sunrise (when daytimers can sign on before local sunrise), sunset (when daytimers sign off every fifteen minutes, or at least they used to), DX programs (where special tests are arranged by club members), and foreign DX (which blew my mind)! I have tried, and still try (although now with a tape recorder), all these techniques and, suprisingly enough, will feature in depth studies in future DX Techniques columns.

Since August 1984, I've been using a technique that has been called "DXing while you sleep". This requires an intimate knowledge of the band at all hours of darkness. Silent periods, nulling bearings and schedules are all important to take advantage of your "DX time". This technique requires a stable receiver, tape recorder (with lots of tapes) and an accurate timer. After I'm through tuning around in the evenings, I set the radio to a frequency that I have determined might net a new station. I then peak the antenna and pointing it in a position that has proven successful in the past. The audio is then switched into my recorder, which is turned on and off by the timer. The next morning, I take the tape to work and listen to it during my lunch hour. That's it in a nut shell. I will be featuring this technique in detail in a future column.

I can't overemphasize the need for good, accurate logs and a list of stations I've heard as essential for making my DX time count. And, of course, a good source of information on what is being heard, like **DX Monitor**, helps with the preparation of my hit list, no matter how it is organized (by frequency, location or sunrise/sunset time).

In the next DX Techniques column. I will cover the various DX accessories that are available to help in addition to a log and DX Monitor. These will include other reference books, tape recorders, filters, tuners, etc. Those of you wishing to contribute, please send it to me by May 1st. I'm also willing to field any questions that you may have about BCB DXing. If I don't know the answer. I'll find someone who does! Take care... phil

RADIO VERIFICATIONS

As long as I've been in the radio listening hobby I've heard DXers talk about what to do with their QSLs after they pass away. I can't say I'd heard many good ideas on the subject, however. Discussion of this topic has a natural tendency to drift off into uncertainty. DXing is, after all, a hobby for today, and no one seems too worried about the future.

A related issue that is mentioned from time to time is the future of QSLs belonging to hobbyists who may be active and then leave the hobby for one reason or another.

In both cases, the likelihood is that their QSLs will at best face an uncertain fate. Other family members seldom seem to share our interest in radio, least of all the QSL-collecting aspects, and so despite the time and effort we spend on our collections, most of our material is probably destined for a dusty attic or a wet basement if we're lucky, the trash heap if we aren't.

Since QSLs are usually considered <u>personal</u> momentoes of our listening experiences and contacts with particular stations, maybe we shouldn't be too concerned about the time when we are no longer able or interested in caring for them.

But there is another way of looking at our old veries. They represent not just souvenirs of our own listening, but also a part of the broader history of radio, reflecting changes in national politics, broadcasters, frequencies and relations between stations and their listeners. Older QSLs never fail to prompt interest among hobbylsts. At the very least they are intriguing glimpses at the details of early radio listening, the direct predecessors of our own listening activities of today.

In 1986 it was decided to take a major step toward making available a means by which QSLs could be preserved when persons passed away or became inactive, and stemming the loss of this important radio material. The Committee to Preserve Radio Verifications was established as a committee of the Association of North American Radio Clubs. It is hoped that in the future, through the efforts of this Committee, more QSLs will be saved from loss or destruction.

The Committee's work

The Committee is working toward its goal in several ways.

First, by our activity we hope to cause more hobbyists to think about the long term importance of their QSL collections. This alone is an important first step.

Second, the Committee will provide a central repository for QSLs. Through direct contact with inactive listeners and the families of deceased hobbyists, and by a public information campaign within the hobby and elsewhere, the Committee will seek out existing QSL collections that might otherwise be lost, and attempt to preserve them.

Third, the Committee will be available to serve as recipient for any QSL collections that hobbyists might wish to dispose of in their will.

Thinking in the very long term, perhaps the Committee will some day be able to publish a collection of QSLs in book or other form so that all radio enthusiasts will be able to learn more about the history of radio and the radio listening hobby, view and enjoy old QSLs and use them for research purposes. That is a long term goal, however. For now, the Committee's main objective is to archive as many QSLs as possible in order to prevent further losses.

The Committee is prepared to archive all QSL-cards and letters received. At the outset the Committee is concentrating on QSLs from shortwave broadcast stations, large and small. However, it is an all-wave project, and the Committee welcomes QSLs covering medium wave, utility and other stations as well.

Since today's QSLs are tomorrow's history, the Committee wants to archive QSLs of more recent origin as well as vintage material. So hobbylsts with "new" collections are as important to us as the "old timers."

The Committee is concentrating on QSL collections in the United States, but in the future the Committee may have affiliated groups in other countries working to provide appropriate QSL depositories for their DXers. For now, hobbyists outside the U.S. who are interested in preserving their QSLs are urged to contact the Committee so that their interest can be noted and their names referred to local affiliated groups that may be formed.

What happens to QSLs that are donated to the Committee?

DXers needn't worry that their QSLs will just be piled up in a basement someplace. All material is handled with care. Each QSL is placed in an individual envelope, carefully marked with the donor's name, and filed in neat, orderly fashion. Each QSL is always fully credited to its original owner. A computerized index is maintained so that all material can be accessed quickly and easily.

Eventually the CPRV collection might be housed at a museum or a library so as to facilitate viewing and use by interested persons. For now, however, the Committee's collection is located at the Boston headquarters of the Christian Science Monitor, the internationally recognized news organization, leader in the field of objective news reporting, and home of Herald Broadcasting, parent organization of CSM's new 500 kw shortwave station in Maine. The Committee is pleased to have the support of this important voice of international journalism.

Who are the members of the Committee?

Yours truly, Jerry Berg, attorney, active in the shortwave hobby as a listener and QSL collector since 1958, and Committee chairperson . . . Kent Corson, social service executive and active shortwave hobbyist since 1952 . . . Gerry L. Dexter, broadcaster, author of many radio publications, and well known for his interest in QSL collecting during his 35 years in radio . . . Tom Gavaras, radio marketing professional, a DXer since 1969 and active in hobby club circles . . . John C. Herklmer, printer, radio hobbyist since 1968.

Interested?

We hope so. Most QSL collectors have spent many, many hours seeking QSLs, and as long as they are active in the hobby they should hold on to their verifications so they can get back from them as much enjoyment as they have put in. But if you are leaving or have left the hobby, the Committee urges you to consider placing your QSLs with us in order to insure that your active involvement in the hobby will be memorialized for future generations of DXers.

Also, if you know of others who might be interested in the Committee's work, or if you are holding a QSL collection belonging to a DXer who is no longer active or has passed away, we hope you will contact us.

Contact any member of the Committee, by mail or telephone. Each inquiry is handled individually. The Committee will work with donors to address any questions or special needs they may have.
