



CA, Los Angeles 12/7 2100 now finally broadcasting true stereo 1070 KNX with Dolphins vs. Jets football game. Interestingly, left & right channels were opposite from that of KFMB-760 San Diego! (SMM-CA)

1240 KSAC CA, Sacramento 12/13 1400 noted w/"Sacramento's only 24 hour Classic station." Heard on car radio in Corte Madera, CA. Sounds automated. Announcer sounds like he should be on AC or CHR outlet. (PT-CA)

1290 KMEN CA, San Bernardino now simulcasts with its CHR FM, KGGI, during AM and 99-1 FM, followed at 100 with legal ID: "99-1 is KGGI Riverside-San Bernardino-Ontario, and KMEN San Bernardino-Riverside . . . with more continuous music . " (Note that "gg-I" looks like "99-1."). This per FM reception, as KMEN is almost impossible to hear at this location. (SMM-CA)

- 1290 KESP <u>CA</u>, Santa Barbara Tu 11/24 1850 ex-KXXN. Fair here midday with KFRN-1280 slop nulled, with Spanish programming and "<u>K</u>ah-Espanol" (K-Spanish) IDs. Legal ID in English: "This is KESP 1290 AM stereo in Santa Barbara." (SMM-CA)

Remember that Cuba tends to rearrange their frequency network every once in awhile; please report any such changes so we can maintain a complete listing. Also keep in mind that many outlets are allowed to drift off-frequency on occasion, very likely to QRM US stations.

- # Additionally, Radio Progreso programs can occasionally be heard on CMBM-860 (R. Metripolitana La Habana) during the early morning hours. I assume this is for filler. Similarly, it has been noted in the past that virtually any Cuban net program can often be substituted on any Cuban frequency, so don't be suprised to find a different net program on unlisted frequencies on occasion. (Note that some frequencies already have more than one net outlet in operation, i.e. 590 now has Reloj & Rebelde transmitters, 640 with Progreso & Rebelde, 680 with Rebelde & Progreso, 910 with Reloj & Cadena Agramonte, 920 with Progreso & Reloj, etc.).
- \$ The 1180 Reloj outlet is most often found on 1179.5a with hetting on 1180 (R. Marti).

Anyone know of any Cubans from these nets still using 730, or other frequencies? A couple years ago I recall Gerry Thomas-FL reporting a Progreso Cuban on 890 - is this still on? Every outlet listed above has actually been heard here in Pittsburgh and by numerous other US/Canadian DXers --- so look for them DXers!

Also, George has a logging of Honduras-1335, which confirms their presence on the frequency (& my tentative of last issue). A few notes regarding recent DXWW-E's: Re recent reports of Monaco-1467 after 0500 or so, I've done some checking through back issues and have determined that this must be the Radio Monte Carlo service (not the TWR relay @this time). Furthermore, I assume the 1466 daytime frequency is no longer in use (at least at this time). After 0530 I've heard them in FF, and haven't heard any "TWR" ID's. Anyone know more about this? Also, re my possible TA (likely African) on 1367 (11/28/87 DXM, Vol. 25 #10), I found some old loggings by Kaz of Angola there. Additionally, I also found a mention of Angola 1367 operating //944 (RNA). I presume I had the Angolan, although a few years back Kaz had also reported Senegal on 1367 (5 stronger than the Angolan, too). I also even found a mention of Morocco using 1367. 

One of the hoariest myths in this//M6G 3X8
radio hobby is that shortwave DX is somehow "superior" to medium wave. Anyone who has attended an
ANARC convention would notice that MW DX always
seems to get the short end of the stick. There

shoddy treatment at the 1987 ANARC treatment, hostel

To paraphrase Orwell's Animal Farm, ODXA (along with a couple of other so-called "all-wave" clubs) would have its members believe "short wave good, medium wave badi" Who says SW and MW DXers can't co-exist? What about those who DX both, myself included. I do some DX-ing on 60 meters as well as listening on other bands, though 90% of my DXing is done between 530 and 1610 kHz. I don't appreciate pompous, arrogant SW types looking down their noses at MWers, not considering it "real" gant SW types looking down their noses at Mwers, not considering it "real" DX. As far as I am concerned, my best MW catches -- CBU-690, WFOY-1240, KBRT-740, etc. -- are as good as, if not better than logging Falkland Islands, Tristan da Cunha, or NYAB Bhutan. ROSARITO, MEXICO HERE ARE THOSE WHO argue that the hippest radio cigarettes was artfully disguised and chatter over the American airwaves operated out of a tiny studio overlooking the Pacific Ocean in this sleepy Mexican resort town, 15 miles south of the United States border

The station was XERB, and it is perhaps the best-known representative of a peculiarly American genre of entertainment known as border radio. It served as the model for the radio station featured in the film "American Graffiti," inspired untold thousands of pop musicians, and has evolved over the years in a way that reflects many of the changes in life along the border.

For a generation of teen-agers now in their 30's and 40's, listening to "50,000 watts out of Mexico," as the Blasters affectionately recalled in their 1981 song "Border Radio," was a nightly ritual. After turning out the lights and slipping under the bedcovers, they would tune their radios to one of "the X's," Mexican-owned stations here and in other border towns such as Piedras Negras, Nuevo Laredo and Tijuana.

The impact of that experience - an all-American music that transcended format and ranged from the country and western of Hank Williams to the hard-core funk of James Brown can be heard today in the music of numerous rock 'n' roll groups. Among them are New Wave bands such as Wall of Voodoo, whose "Mexican Radio" is a rock-club staple, and blues re-creationists like the Fabulous Thunderbirds, whose album sleeves and live shows have been known to incorporate border-radio patter

"There was a touch of mystery to hearing the voice of Howlin' Wolf or John Lec Hooker coming out of the night from a foreign country," said the composer and guitarist Dave Alvin, who wrote the "Border Radio" paean. "And it always amazed me as a kid to find that no matter where I traveled with my parents in the Southwest, the same stations would come in loud and clear."

In the intervals between songs, disk jockeys sporting sobriquets such as Woilman Jack, Huggy Boy and Dr. B hawked virility potions, plastic dashboard statues of Jesus, record anthologies and roach clips - whose ultimate use as holders of marijuses

station ever to beam music and record anthologies. Rounding out the programming were the radio evangelists, offering salvation between their requests for money.

> "I had everybody that nobody else wanted, all the fortune tellers, all the preachers, all the scalawags," said Wolfman Jack, one of the principal pioneers of border radio, first as a disk jockey and station manager at XCRF in Ciudad Acuña and then at XERB. "The old Wolfman gave them all a place on the air, and I ended up making a ton of money.'

These days, border radio continues to flourish, albeit in a glossier, more mainstream fashion. Most of the stations that made their reputations in the 1960's are still on the air, but during the last decade, many have changed both the audience they seek and their management.

Mexican station owners, realizing that border radio can be a lucrative business, have opted not to renew lease agreements with Americans and have taken over control of some stations themselves. And the rapid growth of the Hispanic population in the American Southwest, now estimated at more than 10 million people. has made Spanish-speakers the preferred target for many of the "border blasters," as broadcasters frequently call the X stations.

XERB, for example, is now known as XPRS, and long ago abandoned rock 'n' roll in favor of mariachi and ranchera music aimed at Hispanic listeners in Los Angeles. Its programs are taped, in Spanish, in a studio in Los Angeles and then shipped down to transmitting facilities here for broadcast back to Southern California.

"The California market has been our salvation," said Martha Barba de Díaz, general director of the Califórmula radio group in Tijuana, which operates three FM stations - two in Spanish and one in English — beamed at listeners in the San Diego area.

In the San Diego-Tijuana area alone, there are nine AM and seven FM stations now broadcasting to audiences on both sides of the border in English, Spanish or a combination of the two. Advertising and proadcast consultants estimate there are at least twice as many such stations in Mexican border towns across the Rio Grande from Texas.

the American side is just growin; growing, growing, and advertises are very much aware of that," sai Robert France, vice president (sales for XEMO AM and FM in T juana, "Our advertisers now includ people like McDonald's, Sears, Kra-Foods, Toyota, 7-Up and all the majo supermarket chains."

In earlier years, however, Ame ican broadcasters were drawn to sta tions in Mexican border towns no only by visions of profit but by th lack of regimentation and a free wheeling "anything goes" frontie spirit that resulted in "radio tha sounded like it was coming from at other planet," in the words of Ke Barnes, editor of Radio & Records, leading trade publication.

"When I started at XCRF in 1966 Mexico was the most lenient countr in the world when it came to radio, said Wolfman Jack. "All you had t do was file one form sheet, run th National Hour every Sunday nigh and pay your taxes, and the Mexican would let you do whatever the he you wanted."

"By locating in Mexico, radio sta tions were subject to zero regulatio by the Federal Communication Commission," said James LaMarca program director for XTRA-AM which has its studio here and its busi ness offices in San Diego. "Tha meant no news commitment, no fair ness doctrine, no public-service an nouncements and none of the load of paperwork or filings required by the F.C.C."

Mexico also allows stations to broadcast more commercials than the 18 minutes per hour maximum permitted in the United States. But the biggest attraction for such stations was, and continues to be, the ability to transmit signals well above the 50,000-watt AM maximum in force in the United States, an advantage that has allowed border stations to reach a nationwide audience.

On the books, some of the X stations had licenses allowing them to broadcast at up to 250,000 watts of power. But most also found ingenious ways to boost their transmissions, enabling them, on cold nights when signals carried further, to be heard clearly as far north and east as Chicago or even Canada.

"We'd use reflector antennas, put "The Spanish-language market on water under the antenna to make it o another three or four states, and it generally do all kinds of things y wouldn't let you do in the ites," said Wolfman Jack. "You ald hear us all the way to Russia." Border radio first came into existce in the mid-1930's, when Mexican d American regulatory agencies reed to allow Mexican stations to padcast toward the north. But the ginning of its impact on a mass dience coincided with the advent in e 1950's of rock 'n' roll, which was itially resisted by mainstream nerican stations.

that's where I learned my licks. From coast to coast and line to line, in every county there,

I'm talkin' 'bout that outlaw X. it's cuttin' through the air.

The renegade outlook at the border stations has also become the stuff of broadcasting lore. Wolfman Jack, for instance, recalls the time XCRF was attacked by gunmen hired by a disgruntled former director of the sta-

"We had a good time for years," he said. "It was a very special time, a very special combination of circumstances, and I don't think it could ever

Radio pioneer remembers many years of change

When he graduated from the University of Maine in 1915, Harold H. Beverage (LF) faced a choice: whether to play trombone in a theater orchestra at night and attend graduate school by day, or take an engineering job paying about \$550 a year.

a year.
"I was afraid I'd fall asleep in class if I took the theater job," says Beverage, who recently turned 94. So he went to work for General Electric Co. at what seems now to be an inconceivably low salary. But, Beverage chuckles, "At the time, I didn't think I was worth that much."

President of the Institute of Radio Engineers in 1937; Beverage is considered a radio pioneer for his work with antennas. As a consultant to the Allies in World War II he made significant improvements in radio communications.

In-1957, he retired from Radio Corp. of America, spun off from GE in 1922, but he still, 30 years later, remains a consultant to the company. And he still pursues music, his old love, although the last time he played was about two gears ago in a 35-piece orchestra.

World War I research - 6 5 1 5 5 7 5 1

In Schenectady, Next, during World War I, Beverage worked in GE's test department with E.F.W. Alexanderson. They developed a radio-receiver to go with a transmitter incorporating Alexanderson's high-frequency alternator. The resulting barrage receiver required two antennas, each two miles long and laid on the ground from northeast to southwest.

The antenna solved many of the problems of radio interference by the Germans that plagued the French forces in World War I. Because the receiver was unidirectional, it could be aimed to receive only radio signals from U.S. forces, but by simultaneously sending out a barrage of interference, it prevented the Germans from copying the transmissions.

Five years later, Beverage developed his wave antenna, which was widely used at very low radio frequencies of 10 000 to 30 000 hertz. The unidirectional, aperiodic antenna eliminated static from lightning storms, one of the major problems apt to trouble such low-frequency equipment.

Short waves rediscovered

Guglielmo Marconi's 1926 discovery that short-wave radio signalscould travel long distances during daylight hours made the wave antenna largely obsolete. Short waves, had previously been considered almost useless because a layer of the atmosphere present during daylight prevents the signals from reaching a higher layer that reflects them back to the ground.

At night, the lower layer dissipates and the reflected short waves can be received. Marconi shortened the waves from 200 to 32 meters, which solved most of the reception

problem

Short waves were more economical because the long-wave antennas were extremely large and costly. But short waves were far from perfect: their most serious drawback was a tendency to fade in and out in northern regions such as Greenland, because sunspols cause atmospheric ionization that interferes with short-wave reception.

From 1927 experiments at RCA, Beverage and his assistant, Harold O, Peterson (LF), found that diversity reception, a combination of several antennas, minimized fading. The two engineers found that three antennas, spaced about a thousand feet apart in a triangle, provided the best reception.

To reduce fading further, they combined antennas with opposite polarities. The technique—known as polarization diversity reception—is still used in-satellite reception to compensate for the effect of the ionosphere on polarization.

"A modest man who retains the distinctive necess to that from state of Maine, Beverage remains proudest of his participation in World War III. As sar expert column meditions consultant order of the world was the U.S. Searchary of War, he worked on projects in Italy, North Africa, and Britain.

He was given his most important assignment when he arrived in London about two weeks before D day, June 6, 1944—to direct air support for the invasion of Normandy, where reliable air-to-ground communication was needed over both land and water.

Bevenge thought the frequencies to be used were fine, but this horizontal polarity, rather than file varietied polarity that the British used, would send the radio signals up to the atmospheric layers, where they child travel, quickly without interference. He worked feverishly until the day of the attack to change the polarity of the transmitters, but had no time to test his thesis.

"I had no idea whether the change in polarity worked during the attack because the radio frequencies were changed to confuse the Germans," said Beverage. But he later received a letter from the U.S. Air Force saying that thanks to his efforts there had been no failure in communications. In 1948, he was awarded a Presidential Certificate of Merit in recognition of his work.

Beverage remained with RCA until his retirement, at which time he held two positions: vice president for research for communications, and director of radio research.

At 94, having seen technological advancements that have radically changed the world, Beverage is content to sit back and relax. His biography, The Genius at Riverhead, written by Alberta Wallen, will soon be published by the Courier Gazette Press, Rockland, Maine. Now, he says, he is glad he doesn't have to understand the current developments. He just watches them continue to change the world.
