Casey Kasem, ABC Radio Network Contract Talks Are Stalemated

adio personality Casey Kasem may be on the way out after 18 years as host of "American Top 40," the weekly show on which he plays the week's top-selling pop records.

Contract negotiations, which began last summer, have ended in a stalemate over Kasem's salary-an amount both sides refused to disclose Wednesday.

"There's only a slight chance that things could be worked out if they [Kasem and his attorney] come back to the bargaining table," said Tom Cuddy, vice president of en-tertainment programming for the ABC Radio Network.

ABC already has started auditioning for a new host, Cuddy said. He said that he plans to name

Kasem's successor within 30 days. although the new host won't take over until next January, when Kasem's contract expires.

Kasem's attorney, Mark Arm-bruster, was more optimistic. "Casey's relationship with ABC is excellent," the Los Angeles lawyer said. "We're still open to discussions with ABC at any time, but I have no way of predicting whether there is a good, bad or medium chance of contract negotiations being concluded with ABC. It's out of our hands right now."

Kasem, who was not available for comment, has received offers from "various serious players" in-cluding ABC's main competitor, Westwood One, Armbruster said.

With or without Kasem, the show's current format and staff will remain intact, Cuddy said.

"Casey has done a tremendous job over the last 18 years but the show will survive as long as the foundation is strong," Cuddy said.
"American Top 40," which first

aired in 1970, is heard on nearly 500 radio stations worldwide. Locally, it is carried on KEZY-FM in Anaheim.

0530:30-0600 - A rlgs pgm in FF

0600-- The signal became noticibly weaker at precisely 0600 and then the regular Radio Monte Carlo pgmming started.

If that is true then this station could no longer count as Monaco. 702 is still Monaco though". (I had heard that they were supposedly getting new facilities, Bill. Oh, and I'm still trying to get back down to Elkridge Landing, Bill, but no luck as of yet! If I do, I'll ring. ed)

Thanks again for the nice support this week. Good to hear from Gerry again, and of course it's always nice to hear from Bill in Bavaria with European info, and J.D. with his LA DX. J.D. is still trying to QSL the Bahamas - he recalls seeing a separate address for the ZNS stn in Freeport when he was there in '85 - anyone know?????? I'll check around, J.D., but perhaps your local library has a phone book section with a Bahamas directory? Into the ears of babes: targeting children on AM

North Little Rock station hopes to become profitable soon with full-time format aimed at children; syndication is also a possibility

It is the year of the dragon in China and—if KPALIAM) has anything to say about it—in North Little Rock, Afk., as well. The commercial station, whose mascot is a dragon named Piccolo (children can spell it any way they like, according to station director, Tish Henslee) is into its third year of broadcasting with a 'Children's Radio' format. And if all goes as planned, it will be operating in the black by year's end (although long-term, it still has some developmental costs to cover). If the format—"a blend of music, poetry, stories and feature shows" targeted at children and their parents—proves profitable, the station's owners plan to syndicate it.

That puts national distribution at least two "if's" away, but for now the station is content with building an audience for a format that is still in its infancy.

KPAL claims to be the only station broadcasting a full-time children's format. The National Association of Broadcasters radio department has found no reason to dispute that claim, according to the department's special projects coordinator. Robert Marking. The NAB has found reason to applaud the station's efforts, however, bestowing upon it one of 10 Crystal Radio awards given out for "excellence in local achievement and community involvement." The format also found favor with the station's current owner, Melvyn Bell, a diversified businessman with interests as divergent as hazardous waste management and family theme parks.

Bell purchased the station and its coowned FM (KAUL-FM Sheridan, Ark.) 18 months ago, with the children's format already in place but undercapitalized. And it was the AM, not the FM, that was the Jrawing card. According to Rod Grandy, executive vice president of Bell's personal holding company, Bell Equities Inc., which owns the station, Bell saw long-range possibilities in the children's AM format, and took the FM "basically to pay the bills"

took the FM "basically to pay the bills." KPALS "Children's Radio" format was created a little over two years ago, when the station's managers and then part-owners. Tish Henslee, a professor of early childhood education at the University of Arkansas, Little Rock, and her husband. Bill, who is president of the station, bought an FM in the same market and moved a Big Band format from then KAULIAM) to the new FM. "That left the AM frequency open," says Tish left the AM frequency open," says Tish Henslee, who saw simulcasting the FM as a "waste." "We knew you had to have special programing to get people interested in AM radio," she said. Bill Henslee had read an article about a Marina Del Rey, Calif.-based children's radio network just starting up. The fit seemed perfect. They signed up for the service, which Tish Henslee described as no features and a limited selection of music. Within three months, said Henslee, the California venture had folded. KPAL had received one shipment of tapes, which proved of limited use, and was left to build a format from scratch.

The capital required proved more than they could handle, and, facing mounting



debts combined with the difficulty of selling to advertisers without numbers—Arbitron does not measure children under 12, the station's target audience—the Henslees decided to shop both stations to someone who would back the AM format, in which they both believed. "We wanted to stay in children's radio and we wanted it developed properly." Tish Henslee said. That someone turned out to be Bell (the Henslees had read an article about his ownership of family theme parks), who agreed to buy out the Henslees and their partners. The FM format was changed to solid gold.

The Henslees continued to manage the station, with enough capital to develop a 4,000-record library, build a program schedule, increase the staff and salaries, undertake numerous community-related events and begin to market the station to advertisers, with an emphasis on promotional licinis and an eye to eventual syndication, one of the "possibilities" Bell had envisioned from the outset.



president of Bell Equities Inc., Bell machis money "investing in technologies [fc: the disposal of hazardous waste] that took five or 10 years to come to fruition," so he is willing to give his investments time to grow. "We saw only a few formats in AM that work—religious, talk, country," said Bell. "If AM stations want to be alive in the future, this might be a format that is cost-effective." But Bell was a realist: "With AM the way it is, you're never going to make a ton of money out of it," said Grandy, "It's a business with a longer investment return horizon than most people might want. A lot of people want to buy radio properties, change the format and get a six-month turn-around. The real upside seems to be the possibility of syndicatoin. But we won't be able to syndicate it until we can prove that we can make it work in our own market."

Making it work means making it profitable, which is the obvious goal of Bill White, KPAL's general sales manager, Without Arbitron ratings to show to potential advertisers, White's marketing strategy has taken a different tack. One approach that has proved successful, he said, is to "go to a bank president or the head of a utility and ask them to appear on our program, Meet our Leaders, where children can ask them questions. They see what we're doing .. We say to them: 'You spend thousands of dollars every year on public image. Where better could it be spent than in support of chil-dren's radio? The agencies laugh at us because we have no numbers, but the leaders go back and tell the agency: 'Buy them.' " Business has been slow, White says, but has picked up in the past several months, and he has "no doubt" of the eventual success of the format.

Henslee concedes that the possibility of syndication remains somewhere down the road—Grandy estimates 1980 or 1990—but she has had inquiries from stations in Tensessee, Florida and Illinois. "There is a but of interest," she said, "because so many AM's are simulcast formats. They are just a wasted 'signal."

In my recent article on the effects of solar activity and the earth's magnetic field on medium wave propagation (28 November 87 issue), I forecasted that fall 1987 would be excellent for high latitude DX, based on the sunspot minimum in 1986 and past history. The article was written in July and updated in September. September wasn't a good month from a geomagnetic index standpoint, with an average Ap index of 19, 16 days with an active geomagnetic field of Ap 16 or higher, and only five quiet days (Ap 7 or below). October was a little better, with an average Ap of 16, 11 active days and 7 quiet days. November was a little better, with an Ap average of 13, 10 active days and 9 quiet days. None of those months were very special, but some high latitude DX was done, as reported in the DXWW column. Fall of 1986, especially October, was better than fall of 1987 in terms of average Ap index and number of quiet days. In the study I made of the Ap index over 30 years, the increase in average Ap in September and March was apparent for many years. Just another one of the many mysteries that control and/or affect MW DX.

I guess there's a lesson here also about forecasting - it's very difficult to be right! (Just ask any meteorologist, hi-RtH.) Bruce Portzer sug-

gested that I jinxed the hobby by writing the article. Maybe so, but it wasn't published until after the jinx worked.

Far East DX has been very poor, with only a few decent openings on the mornings I DX'ed. Down Under has been even worse, with only hets (or very weak signals) on a few frequencies on the few occasions I've heard anything. The proliferation of former clear channel assignments has definitely affected my DX results, and even my attitude toward DX ing.

I refuse to make another forecast about propagation conditions, but I'm hoping late February and early March will be better for the Far East and





ENCEBE A North Carolina Mini Beverage

In January '88, with the onslaught of cold weather in North Carolina—and a for-real, 2-inch snow: probably the worst time for the erection of any antenna, I finally overcame inertia and constructed a 700-foot mini beverage, after nearly two years of living here in North Carolina.

We are fortunate to have a 50-acre wooded plot of land immediately behind (northeast of) our home in Grifton. It shields my DX workings from much of the usual powerline noise, as my 75-foot longwire is sited parallel to the rear property line, on an axis of 135/315°.

Unfortunately, as an affirmation of Murphy's Law, it was discovered that the longwire has a deep null (about 20 dB) toward about 45°, and Europe. That such an electrically-short (at MW) wire could develope such a null was a reminder that a short beverage could be a very interesting project.

In summer of 1983, while still in Okinawa, I erected what I dubbed OKIBE (oh-KEE-bee), a 1,000-foot Okinawa beverage. Actually, I laid it on the ground, with an orientation of 15/195°, and terminated it toward Taiwan. I took no notes nor tapes of this event, but I remember the gain that it exhibited, especially of the Fu Hsing ("Reconstruction") B.C. stations in Taiwan on 1512 kHz. These were usually rather weak, but on this occasion were armchair copy with highschool baseball playoffs being broadcast at the time.

This next effort, ENCEBE, was to be at least reasonably well documented.

My advice to whomever has considered the construction of a beverage antenna: Don't consider it, DO it. I had long contemplated the underbrush in the forest next to our humble hovel, weighed the difficulties of erecting a beverage through it, and talked myself out of it. I had, however, gathered together the materials for a beverage, against the day that I might encounter optimal conditions.

Came a four-day weekend, and the snow (naturally), but—what the hey—I'll do it anyway.

Construction took three hours, and was a one-man evolution. I suspended a 1,000-foot spool of #24 AWG, plastic-insulated wire-on a 3-foot length of plastic clothesline between two convenient supports, such that the spool played out wire smoothly in the direction that the wire was being suspended. I fed the wire out through a steel pulley suspended from the eaves of our house. To the end of the wire, I attached a

3/8-inch steel hook as a messenger (to provide weight for tossing the wire over tree branches, and an aperature for snagging the wire with a gin pole). Tossing the hook-weighted wire over tree branches in a straight line from the rear of our house, and grabbing the hook manually, or with the gin pole (when the hook came to rest suspended from a tree branch too high to reach by hand), I pulled the wire out toward 45° until I reached the limit of extension of the antenna, in this case, the edge of the forest that faces a street on its northeast perimeter. At that point, I terminated the far end of the wire temporarily on a ground rod, then returned to the spool end of the wire, and cut it long enough to wrap back on itself on the pulley, and then passed it through a window to the DX den.

No especial care was taken to insulate the wire, as it was already plastic insulated. As the antenna is temporary, the probability of abrasion of the insulation by tree branches and by bushes wasn't considered. Since the wire wasn't too long, I was able to sight in on our garage during the entire evolution.

As constructed, the ground termination consists of three Radio Shack ground rods driven into the earth in a straight line at five-foot intervals.

The antenna averages close to 9 feet above ground. That and a wire gauge of #24 AWG indicates a characteristic impedance of 600-700 ohms. Since the ground resistance of the three rods as measured back through the wire with respect to receiver ground (which is tied to the Town of Grifton water system) averages 650 ohms, I terminated the wire directly to the rods without an intervening terminator resistor. True, the r-f resistance of the rods is likely higher, so additional rods are implied.

ENCEBE was erected mostly to give me first-hand experience with a beverage antenna. Being comparatively short for M-W frequencies, it wasn't expected to perform as a longer antenna; none-theless, the results were interesting and enlightening enough to justify the perhaps 5 hours total time expended in gathering materials for, and erecting the beverage.

OBSERVATIONS In general, as expected, ENCEBE shows a sensible gain at around 45° azimuth, as referenced to receptivity at right angles to the wire (135/315°). There is a sizeable rear lobe (around 225°), indicating the possibility of improving the match of the termination to the beverage wire. There are some deep nulls also—especially at an azimuth of 130°, wherein two graveyarders in New Bern practically disappear.

However, it is the skywave performance of ENCEBE that is the most remarkable. Understand that the accompanying graph depicts the O elevation receptivity pattern, i.e. toward the horizon. But, at some elevation toward an azimuth of 46°, ENCEBE has a very pronounced lobe—meaning that skywaves (which approach the

earth at a slant) arriving from 46° east of north, are captured with considerable gain.

In comparing the gain of ENCEBE to that of my Space Magnet SM-2, it was found that the two are very similar, such that I used the SM-2 as a reference for establishing approximate signal intensities from the stations listed in the graph, without using corrective factors. In order to set up the reference (CA), the SM-2 was carefully tuned for maximum at each frequency, and then turned until a peak was found on the station indicated. I avoided frequencies on which there were two signals of nearly equal intensity.

The headings of the graph, aside from callsign, location, and frequency, are <u>azi</u>, or the azimuth from which the signal arrives; eq, or the output of the SM-2 as registered on the carrier meter of my R-390A/URR, in dB; eq, or the output of EN-CEBE likewise registered; eq-eq, or the numerical value of the SM-2 output minus the ENCEBE output. * in the eq column indicates that the station in question was so weakened that the value of eq is influenced by interfering signals, and is higher than is the true value of the station's signal.

Note that two measurements were made of WEIS-1010 Kinston, one on R-390A band 500-1000 kHz, and one on R-390A band 1000-2000 kHz.

Finally, a list of line items and corresponding comments are to be found after the graph.

I hope that this will pique your interest in erecting your own beverage. I know it was well worth my time and effort, and I will seize the next opportunity to erect a longer one.
