# NOTES FROM HQ

Convention News: Start making plans to attend the 1988 Convention in Louisville, Kentucky. Our host, Ted Fleischaker, says it will most likely be held the weekend of July 29-31. The date will be confirmed next issue, when we'll also have full details on the hotel. In the interest of holding down costs, Ted is pursuing a hotel with 30% lower rates, and all the usual amenities (a nice meeting room, indoor pool, free parking, etc). A banquet, auction, & other activities are also being planned. loking for items you no longer need for donating to the auction: old radios, books, tapes, T-shirts, and other radio paraphernalia. auction is a great way to supplement our income and keep dues down.

This is our first issue under the new 25 cent postage rate. In case you haven't heard, the letter rate to Canada is now 30 cents for the first ounce and 22 cents after that! All other foreign rates have gone up, too. Contact your post office for details. Oddly enough, the rate to Mexico is still the same as for mail sent within the US.

Several of you have asked if we plan to raise dues because of the postage The answer is no, at increase. It appears least for US members. likely that Canadian and overseas members can expect a dues increase in the future, since it's hard to absorb that much of an increase in mailing costs. Eventually, we will need to raise dues or cut costs. One possibility would be to decrease the number of bulletins we publish each year. We currently publish 34 issues per year. As far as I know, that's more than any other major DX club in the world. Possibly a cut back to 30-32 issues would be appropriate, at some future date. If you have an opinion on the subject, let us know in a letter or Forum report.

Station Sales That Failed: WKXA-900-ME, WEZW-1040 TN, WSRG-1070-KY

Miscellaneous Programming Notes: The license of WGRI-1410 Griffin GA has been revoked. The station, silent since a reported fire in 1985, has not contacted the FCC since, and failed to respond to a September 87 FCC order to show cause why it shouldn't have its license eradicated. Another station, KKZU-1510 Mountlake Terrace WA, has been ordered to similarly show cause; it has been off the air since Feb. 11, 1985.

The National Association of Broadcasters wants to have a ban on licensing of new AM stations until "the band's competitive problems have been worked out." Given all the new simulcast formats this month, maybe one reform could be to make new AM operators pledge NOT to simulcast. Naah, that would infringe on the broadcaster's right to waste a facility...The FCC has begun its inquiry into domestic use of 1605 to 1705 KHz as a way of licensing new stations and/or giving remaining daytimers full time operation.

Arbitron has announced it will begin publishing overnight ratings (midnight-6 AM) with the winter book. Yet another incentive for stations in rated markets to go NSP.

Networks: Al Hamm's MUSIC OF YOUR LIFE format will be available to subscribing stations on satellite later this year; current affillates will have a choice of tape or satellite delivery...Financial News Network and Starstream Communications have announced a new financial news service beginning later this year: FNN Business Headline News. The business news format now on KMMY 1600 Pomona CA (Los Angeles) is going syndicated, also beginning later this year, as the Money Radic Network.



All news for 20 years: Los Angeles' top-rated all-news outlet, KFWB-AM (980), will celebrate the 20th anniversary of its "all news, all the time" format on

Thursday. But, it was actually March 11, 1968, that one-time top-40 rock 'n' roll station "Channel 98" became "News 98

We asked Charlie Brailer, a morning news anchor who has been at the station for 19 of its 20 years since going all-news, to reflect on the two decades of coverage.

"The kind of news has changed a lot," explained Brailer, who was instrumental in founding other all-news stations for Westinghouse Broadcasting, such as New York's WINS and Philadelphia's KYW before joining KFWB in the summer of 1969. "Back then there was a lot of turmoil with Vietnam. Since then, we have been through space and had great successes when man landed on the moon and great failures when the shuttle exploded.

"It's all been very exciting," Brailer said. Only veteran reporter Cleve Hermann, whose tenure with the the station extends eight years longer than the all-news format, has put in more years than Brailer

Another KFWB veteran, Ronald Reagan, sent the current staff a letter of congratulations. Reagan was featured in radio dramas broadcast on the station in the 30s. By the way, when KFWB went on the air in 1925, it was owned and operated by Warner Studios. And, the call letters stood for "Keep Filming Warner Brothers."



# 'Music of Your Life' to be satellite delivered

Al Ham's "Music of Your Life" radio format will become the eighth satellite-delivered radio format for Transtar Radio Networks, under an agreement reached last week.

The 10-year-old "Music of Your Life," the nation's best-known syndicated radio format of big band music, has traditionally been distributed as a non-automated format package that includes reel-to-reel music tapes, preproduced promotional spots and other elements.

Now, "Music of Your Life," which currently airs on about 150 radio stations in the United States, will become a 24-hour, satellite-delivered radio format with live air personalities originating from Transtar's studios in Hollywood.

"We plan to offer our affiliates major-market entertainment, plus the opportunity to dramatically reduce local operating costs." said Al Ham, the former big band leader and record producer whose Al Ham Productions is the parent company of "Music of Your

The format's current affiliates will be the

first stations to be offered the new satellitedelivered version.

According to Steve Rall, station manager of WECK-AM in Buffalo, N.Y., affiliates are permitted to continue programing "Music of Your Life" with their own air personalities or they can agree to take all or part of the new 24-hour version of the format.

"It's going to give stations a choice," said Mr. Rall, who added that his station has not yet decided how it will respond to Transtar's offer

Besides joining Transtar, Huntington, Conn.-based Al Ham Productions also announced last week that it is merging with Fairwest Satellite Programing, which is an Indianapolis-based radio programing consulting

The new company, as yet unnamed, will be involved in developing "live full-time radio formats for distribution via satellite," according to an announcement from Al Ham Produc-

Although its headquarters is in Indianapolis, Fairwest's programing operations are in La Jolla, Calif., where Fairwest's programing consultants, George and Reg Johns, are loElectronic Media 3-21-88 via John Johnson



# HIGHWAY TRAVELERS STATION

We still have several copies of the Traveller's Information Station and Highway Advisory Radio Guide. This handy guide lists all sorts of info on TIS/HAR stations, including their locations, prerecorded announcements and other material. It's a must for those of you who DX on 530 and 1600 kHz, or if you're going to do a lot of travelling this summer. To obtain your copy, send a check or MO for \$10 to IRCA, P.O. Travellers Information Stations are one of the more interesting types of stations you can hear on medium wave. TIS stations, as they are otherwise known, are low powered transmitters that generally transmit a continuous recording of interest to motorists and/or tourists. These stations operate on 530 and 1610 kHz in the US. In Canada, they have shown up on a number of other frequencies.

Most TIS stations are operated by government agencies. In fact, The FCC issues TIS licenses only to government agencies. They must adhere to a number of technical limitations, including a maximum power output of ten watts and limitations on antenna height. The stations must also adhere to other limitations to prevent interference with AM stations on 540, 550, 560, 1580, 1590, and 1600 kHz. A complete set of the FCC rules on TIS stations is included at the end of this article for those of you interested into them.

The 1610 outlet is the preferred frequency of operation for TIS stations. Many more TISs operate on 1610 than on 530. The main reason is that it is easier to "match" the transmitter output to the electrically short antenas allowed by the FCC. However, some stations must operate on 530 simply to prevent interference to or from nearby broadcast stations. That's why the TIS at the Los Angeles airport operates on 530: to prevent interference with KDAY-1580 in nearby Santa Monica. Likewise, we have six TIS stations in Seattle on 530 because of local KJET-1590.

As I mentioned earlier. only government entites are allowed to operate TIS stations. These would include the US National Park Service, the state of Illinois, the City of Gatlinburg, Cook County, and the South Succotash Sewer District. The Gatlinburg Chamber of Commerce and Disney-land aren't eligible, although Chambers of Commerce may supply material for some stations. If you've heard of such stations operated by private organizations, they're what are called "limited radiation devices", which can operate unlicensed on any clear frequency, using less than 100 milliwatts. As far as the FCC is concerned, they're in the same category as the wireless microphones you can buy at Radio Shack.

The "programming" on a TIS is usually a continuously repeating message. The content of the message obviously depends on where the station is located and why it was put there in the first place. The most common uses for the systems include:

Information about tourist sites, especially at national parks. The messages can vary from "Don't feed the bears", to a description of what you're seeing, to availability of campgrounds. Some of these stations are seasonal, operating only during the tourist season.

Information on road conditions, especially at mountain passes. The Washington Dept of Transportation has several such transmitters in operation. These, too, may be seasonal. They may operate only during the winter, when inclement weather can suddenly make roads impassible.

Airport information, such as locations of airline terminals, parking garages, baggage claim areas, etc. The airports at Toronto, Los Angeles, Cincinatti, and other cities have TIS transmitters.

Information on freeway and road construction work to advise motorists of potential delays and detours. Some of the stations are temporary. When the construction work is finished, the station is packed up and never heard from again.

Traffic reports. There is a TIS like this in Chicago, and one recently started operation in Orange County, California.

A typical TIS installation consists of a transmitter in a small weather-proof cabinet mounted right next to the antenna. The antenna is usually a whip or short tower. Some installations use what is known as leaky co-ax or Heliax cable, which is similar your antenna leadin. except it can radiate for short distances: this is usually buried underground and has the advantage of creating a long narrow coverage pattern.

The audio is usually fed via a phone line. or sometimes via a UHF radio link, to the transmitter. It is becoming quite common to have a dial up phone line (such as we all have in our homes and offices), as opposed to a much more expensive dedicated line (similar to the studio to transmitter, link operated by radio stations). It is now possible to install a solid state audio recorder (one with no moving parts) at the transmitter. The user then dials up the transmitter, the recorder answers the phone, the user recites his message and hits a "start" code on his touch tone phone. The recorder and transmitter then transmit the message over and over and over and over until someone tells them otherwise. Some of the earlier TISs had cassette recorders with continuous loop tapes, which proved to be extremely unreliable and had no end of mechanical problems due to things like temperature and humidity extremes.

The transmitters and antennas can be interesting to track down, but generally they aren't all that interesting to look at. I drive past one every day: it's just a grey box attached to a whip antenna in the grassy part of a freeway interchange. I've also seen several at Yellowstone Park, which are also small grey boxes attached to whip antennas. At Yellowstone, they're generally attached to the side of a rest room or some other utilitarian building. There are also a few solar powered units at Yellowstone, in out of the way areas without electricity.

The range of a typical TIS is about a mile or two on a typical car radio. A good TIS installation in a favorable location can be heard several miles farther during the day on a good receiver and antenna. At night, some TIS stations can be heard much farther. Under ideal circumstances, the range can be several hundred miles. I'm not sure what the record is for longest TIS reception, but several have been heard about 700 miles away under ideal circumstances.

DXing TIS stations can be a real challenge, and can require lots of patience and detective work. Due to the low power, the signals aren't very strong to begin with. You sometimes may encounter several of them fading in and out at the same time. A TIS only needs to stay within 100Hz of its assigned frequency, compared to 20Hz for broadcasters. So even if everyone is legal, a 200Hz buzz can accompany reception of two or more TIS stations. To make matters worse, eithe voices you hear are rarely those of professional announcers. More likely, they're whoever happened to be hanging around the office that morning. So yoursubject to whatever twang, monotone, or other speaking traits the person may have. Also, the audio quality isn't the greatest, due to limitations imposed by the FCC. Usually they're about as good as a telephone.


TIS stations have one really wonderful trait that regular broadcast stations don't have. The announcements are short and they are repeated over and over and over again. If you missed something the first time, there's always a second or third or fourth chance at it, or a 150th chance if the first 149 weren't successful. You can probably keep trying until the sun comes up.

Here are a few tips which may come in handy for TIS DXing:

 Be patient. The signal may be readable only every few minutes, or it may improve over time. If there are two or more stations fading in and out, try to concentrate on one of them, like you would do with

- regular broadcasters.
- After several sessions on 530 or 1610. you will begin to recognize the regulars by the announcers' voices or the message contents. This will help alert you to the prsence of new ones on the channel.
- Try to write down the complete message being sent. As it's repeated over and over, you'll be able to focus on the "hoies" in what you've copied, so you'll know which parts to concentrate on.
- It's usually possible to narrow down the identity of a station by the contents of the message. If you keep hearing "baggage claim". it's probably an airport. If you hear "chains required" and it's 4. wintertime, you probably have something on the highway leading to a mountain pass or ski resort. Listen carefully for highway numbers. call signs. and geographical locations. They can really pin down They can really pin down If I hear "the road to Paradise is closed" what you are hearing. on 1610 just after a January snowstorm. I know it's the TIS at Mount Rainier National, Park because Paradise is the name of a visitor center and lodge. On the other hand it could profound message from a preacher on the Caribbean Beacon.... be a road atlas and/or maps handy; they'll be a big help.
- The ears can sometimes fool you. Between the weak signal, the speakers' voices, and background noise, callsigns and names can come wrong. It's amazing how much KNEZ392 can sound like KNFB252 when the callsign is given.
- Use an audio filter if you have one. Have the bandpass set to get rid of the low frequency hum and the high frequency hiss. It will Have the bandpass set to get help improve the clarity of what you're hearing.

There are two publications available which list Travellers Information One is IRCA's Almanac, which has a list of TIS stations and Stations. The other is the TIS/HAR Station Guide. This book is a beacons in it. real goldmine of information on TIS stations. and includes addresses. and descriptions of typical installations.
ations. texts of messages. transmitter photos copies verifications. texts of message (latitude/longitude), and other facts. transmitter locations It's available from the Goodie Factory for \$10, or from Gilfer.



This is a diagram of the TIS system used by the Washington Dept of Transportation along I-90 across Snoqualmie Pass. They added a transmitter at the top of the pass since this drawing was produced. Note how the transmitters and signs are integrated together.

Once you have heard and identified a TIS station, you may want to send them a reception report, and hopefully receive a verification. As a minimum, you will need to determine who operates the station and then obtain an address for them. Most agencies will verify your report, if you can direct it to the right person. Some possible approaches include looking it up in the TIS/HAR guide or IRCAs Verifications Signers column, or by calling and asking for the person in charge of their radio system. After you've been transferred around the office, you'll hopefully have a name and address to send your report to. You may have even told them to expect your report. If all else tails, send your report to Communications Manager. Name of Government Agency. Street Address (if you have one). City, etc. If it's a state agency (Highway Dept., etc.), send it to the state Capital. Your report should at least include the text of what you heard (or as much as you could idecipher). Better yet, send them a cassette tape.

Along with this article. I've included a copy of the FCC rules on TIS stations. a copy of a typical verification, and a list of TIS stations which have been reported some distance away in recent years. Good luck in your quest!

Your letter of January 30, 1987, was received in which you indicate that you were able to pick up the signal from our low band AM radio on 530 KH2.

Our station is scheduled to operate 24 hours each day, although since the system is new we have experienced some operational problems that have precluded smooth continuous operation. The text you quoted in your letter is the tape which is played when there are no significant traffic congestion problems in the Disneyland commercial/recreation area.

The equipment was installed by LocRad, Inc., of Los Angeles, who also installed the system at LAX. It operates on a rated output of 10 watts using an LPB, Inc., TX 2-30 transmitter, a Dorrough Electronics Discriminate Audio Processor and a Broadcast Electronics 3100 tape player, using a Valcom VN530 antenna which has a height of 50 feet from a ground elevation of 120 feet utilizing a 40 foot hollow chemical salt filled copper grounding rod rather than a radial grounding system.

Thank you for your interest in our system. I hope I have sufficiently answered your inquiry.



# 90.242 Travelers' information stations.

(a) The frequencies 530 and 1610 kHz. May be assigned in the Local Government Radio Service for the operation of Travelers' Information States tions subject to the following condi-

tions and limitations:
(1) For Travelers' Information Station applications only, eligibility requirements as set forth in § 90.17(a) are extended to include park districts and authorities

(2) Each application for a station or

system shall be accompanied by:
(i) A statement certifying that the transmitting site of the Travelers Information Station will be located at least 15.0 km, (9.3 miles) measured orthogonally, outside the measured 0.5 mV/meter daytime contour of any AM broadcast station operating on a first adjacent channel (540 kHz or 1600 kHz). If the measured contour is not available, then the calculated 0.5 mV/ m field strength contour shall be acceptable. These contours are available for inspection at the concerned AM broadcast station and FCC offices in Washington, D.C.

(ii) In consideration of possible cross-modulation and inter-modulation interference effects which may result from the operation of a Travelers Information Station in the vicinity of an AM broadcast station on the second or third adjacent channel, the applicant shall certify that he has considered these possible interference effects and, to the best of his knowledge, does not foresee harmful interference occurring to broadcast stations operating on 550 kHz, 560 kHz, 1580 kHz, or 1590 kHz.


(iii) A map showing the geographical location of each transmitter site and an estimate of the signal strength at the contour of the desired coverage area. For a cable system, the contour to be shown is the estimated field strength at 60 meters (197 feet) from any point on the cable. For a conventional radiating antenna, the estimated field strength contour at 1.5 km (0.93 mile) shall be shown. A contour map comprised of actual on-the-air measurements shall be submitted to the Commission within 60 days after station authorization or completion of station construction, whichever occurs later. A sufficient number of points shall be chosen at the specified distances (extrapolated measurements are acceptable) to adequately show compliance with the field strength limits.

(lv) For each transmitter site, the transmitter's output power, the type of antenna utilized, its length (for a cable system), its height above ground, distance from transmitter to the antenna, and the elevation above sea level at the transmitting site.

(3) Travelers Information Stations will be authorized on a secondary basis to stations authorized on a primary basis in the bands 510-535 and 1605-1715 kHz.

(4) A Travelers Information Station authorization may be suspended, modified, or withdrawn by the Com-mission without prior notice of right to hearing if necessary to resolve interference conflicts, to implement agreements with foreign governments, or in other circumstances warranting such action.

(5) The transmitting site of each Travelers' Information Station shall be restricted to the immediate vicinity of the following specified areas: Air, train, and bus transportation terminals, public parks and historical sites. bridges, tunnels, and any intersection of a Federal Interstate Highway with any other Interstate, Federal, State, or local highway.



# Soothing AM radio voices sought to report Orange County traffic jams

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Wanted: People with pleasant voices willing to take part in a pioneering radio program to tell antsy motorists how long they can expect to be stuck in traffic caused by road construction. Apply to Caltrans.

Actually, transportation officials haven't had to run such recruiting ads for their new highway reports program because they've had plenty of volunteers from the staff at Caltrans' Orange County office, agency spokesman Albert Miranda said in a telephone interview from his Orange office Tuesday.

And with Miranda still checking Caltrans staffers' audition tapes, the agency is planning to take to Orange County's AM airwaves within two weeks to begin letting motorists know what to expect as they make their way to and from work on one of the most rapidly

expanding freeway systems in the

"Because of the amount of work we're doing out there and the conditions it is going to create for motorists, we decided to utilize the 530 frequency channel," Miranda

He said the channel is reserved by the Federal Communications Commission for emergency and road condition broadcasts. It's often tuned in by those approaching such congested areas as Disneyland and the Los Angeles and Orange County airports to learn of local traffic conditions. Winter travelers to the mountains also can tune it in in many areas to learn of road conditions.

However, Miranda said Caltrans officials believe this is the first time the 530-AM frequency has been used in California to pass out information about an ongoing road construction project.

If the broadcasts catch on, Miranda said Caltrans might expand them to other areas

"We have looked into doing the same type of thing on the Ventura Freeway in L.A. County," he said.

The first Orange County project Caltrans broadcasters will be telling motorists about will be the massive reconstruction of the Interstate 5-Costa Mesa Freeway in-

The broadcasts will not only tell of road conditions caused by that project but also will let drivers know the cost and how long the work will take to complete. Reports also will cover future projects Caltrans has planned.

"It's hopefully to help people plan their commute, especially if they are daily commuters," Miranda said. "If a ramp is going to be closed or a section narrowed by a lane or two, we can let them know ahead of time."

The broadcasts' range will be limited to two or three miles, Miranda said. He added that should notify drivers far enough down the road that they can think of taking alternate routes when they learn of traffic jams ahead.

# Reviving CFCF will be tough for new owners

The newest owners of Canada's oldest radio station have to figure out how to revive CFCF.

Pierre Béland and Pierre Arcand, two senior executives of the Télémédia broadcasting network, bought CFCF and CFQR for \$10 million last week. Once the deal is approved by the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission in a hearing and deliberation process likely to last through the summer, Béland and Arcand will have to roll up their sleeves and get to work on redeeming their investment.

It won't be easy.

Everyone in the Montreal radio business welcomed the news that CFCF Inc. was selling its stations to experienced, Montreal-based broadcasters. And everyone thinks that CFQR is rock solid. But the consensus opinion is that Béland and Arcand will have to make fundamental changes to the AM half of their new acquisition.

### Nightmare decade

You think you're having a tough decade? The 1980s have been a nightmare for CFCF, which signed on in 1919 and was once one of Montreal's most popular radio stations.

In 1980, CFCF had a weekly audiencs of 365,000 Montrealers. Its main rival on the AM band -CJAD — had 468,000 listeners.

Eight years later, CFCF has an audience of 190,000 compared to 386,000 for CJAD. And the declining ratings have produced gobs of red ink in CFCF's ledger books

The 1980s have not been golden years for any of Montreal's English AM radio stations. Mighty CJAD has seen its audience diminish, while CFCF and CKGM (525,000 in 1980, 232,000 this year) have watched theirs disappear.

Two factors - the changing demographics of Montreal's population and a general preference for stereo music on the FM band - have made English AM radio something of an elephant's

graveyard.

The move by Béland and Arcand to acquire CFCF/CFQR involves more than a drive uptown from the Télémédia offices on Mansfield to CFCF Inc. headquarters in Park Extension. The new owners are going from CKAC, the most popular of Montreal's 19 radio stations, to CFCF number 16, without a bullet.

The new owners can go two ways with CFCF: Either grey or green," says Rob Braide, general manager of CJAD and CJFM. Braide thinks that Béland and Arcand will have to change CFCF's format and demographic target group.

"Grey" means a switch to "music of your life" - big-band music and vocals from the 1950s and earlier - designed to attract listeners Braide says are aged "between 40 and death." The virtues of the format are economy (it is basically a pre-packaged, syndicated service; with local news, weather and traffic inserts) and no one else in Montreal is doing this type of prehistoric Golden Oldie music.

### Younger listeners

The other option, the way Braide sees it, is to go "green" by appealing to younger listeners with Top 40 hit radio. It may be the oldest style of radio known to man, but no one in Montreal is currently spinning all the hits, all

FM rock stations would love to play more hits, but the federal regulators won't let 'em. The CRTC - surveying AM radio in the 1960s, concluding it was hopeless and trying to prevent FM from becoming a similarly desolate wasteland of guitars and jingles — adopted stringent rules to make sure FM operators couldn't turn their stations into jukeboxes.

FM rockers can only devote 50 per cent of their playlists to hits. And they can play a record only 18 times a week - regardless of whether every kid in town wants to hear the tune 18 times a day

Top 40, non-stop hit radio is the way Peter Shurman wanted to go with CFCF. Shurman, former GM at CJAD and CJFM, was point man for Newfoundland Capital's unsuccessful bid to buy CFCF and CFQR. Shurman worked his way up from the operations staff at CJAD to running radio at Standard Broadcasting, and he knows Montreal's radio market as well as anyone and better than most

"Every city needs a radio sta-tion that plays hits." says Shurman, "and Montreal doesn't have one. I would move CFCF right into Top 40. I'd also hire a hot morning talent who would make Montreal laugh. And I'd drop all play-by-play sports.

No sports on CFCF? This is Montreal's most jock-oriented radio station. For as long as anyone in this town can remember, we have dialed 600 to hear Dave Van Horne and the Expos, Dick Irvin and the Canadiens, Ted Tevan and some 10-year-old kid in Chomedey who thinks wrestling is a sport.

Take sports off CFCF and what's left?

What's left, Shurman says, is a fighting chance for the station to make a few bucks.

"Sports are very expensive and they are probably more fitting in CJAD's format," Shurman ex-plains. "I'd let the sports rights go, use a music format to break even with CFCF and let profits come from the FM side of the operation.

### Definite niche

Lee Hambleton used to run a Top 40 radio station, CKGM. Hambleton became general manager of Montreal's traditional hit station and CHOM when CHUM of Toronto bought the stations from Geoff Stirling. One of Hambleton's early moves was to change the music mix on CKGM, adding more rock oldies in pursuit of older and more affluent listeners.

"There's a definite niche in the market for Top 40," Hambleton says. "But can you make any money at it? The world isn't getting younger, and nobody is growing teenagers."

Hambleton believes CFCF has to do what it has been doing, only better, CHUM's man in Montreal would counsel Beland and Arcand to take dead aim at CJAD. the English AM leader.

"CJAD has the biggest slice of the pie, so maybe CFCF can try to chip off a piece," says Hamb-leton. "Also, that's the kind of radio that Béland and Arcand know best. They're coming from CKAC, which is the CJAD of the French side of the dial.

There is no shortage of free advice for Montreal's newest radio entrepreneurs. But talk is cheap. Beland and Arcand are \$10 million out of pocket and have to devise a strategy to recoup their investment and start making some money in a very competitive bus-

"We have some definite ideas about what we want to do with the stations," Beland said last week, "but I'd prefer to keep them quiet for now.

"Radio is a jungle, and I don't want to give my competitors any advance hints of what we have in
