KNIX-FM knocks out another ratings victory

he debut of an FM country challenger did nothing to inhibit the ratings performance of KNIX-FM in the fall. Despite competition from newcomer KMLE, KNIX-FM's share of audience increased.

And, once again, it was the most popular station in the

Recently released Arbitron ratings showed KNIX-FM with a 12.5 percent share of the audience - the only station to hit double digits. Top 40 outlet KZZP-FM claimed the runner-up spot with a 9.1 share.

Easy-listening KMEO-FM was third with a 9.0 share; news-talk KTAR dropped to fourth (from a tie for second in summer) with 8.3; and rocker KUPD was fifth with 7.1.

Rounding out the top 10 were contemporary K-Lite (KKLT), top-40 Y-95 (KOY-FM), oldies KOOL-FM, contemporary KESZ and news-talk KFYI.

In general, music stations fared well in the fall while information-oriented stations didn't. The most likely reason was that Arbitron changed the format of the diaries it sends to rating participants so that passive listenership would be more accurately reflected.

As for KNIX-FM, it has been the top-rated station for seven consecutive rating periods - or 134 years - but autumn marked the first time during that run that it has faced a direct competitor on the FM band.

KMLE bowed with a 0.7 share, nearly double what the station had with its previous religious orientation, under former ownership, even though it kept a low promotional

KZZP-FM continued to be the top 40 force even if its listenership did slide somewhat. Meanwhile, the gap between Y-95, which finished second in the top 40 battle, and Power 92 (KKFR) widened. Y-95 was up and Power 92 down, with the lingering question being whether the market can support three top 40 stations on the FM band.

The biggest gainers, in addition to KNIX-FM, were K-Lite; KOOL-FM, which rebounded into the top 10 and whose performance indicates that its low summer ratings were a fluke; and KESZ, which cracked the top 10. All gained at least one share point.

The biggest losers were KZZP-FM, KTAR and KSLX, which fell out of the top 10. All lost at least one point.

In the morning battle, KNIX-FM's W. Steven Mortin recaptured the top spot as the market's most popular personality from KTAR's Bill Heywood. Heard on KNIX-FM and KNIX, Martin pulled a combined 15.1 share.

Heywood came in second with an 11.5 share, followed by KZZP and KZZP-FM's Bruce Kelly, 10.3; KMEO and KMEO-FM's R.C. Rogers, 8.4; and KUPD's Dave Pratt, 7 1.

Rounding out the morning top 10 were K-Lite's Craig Henderson, 5.3; Y-95's then-tandem of Tim Hattrick and Glenn Beck, 4.3; KOOL-FM's B.J. Hunter, 4.0; KFYI's Barry Young, 3.9, and KSLX's David K. Jones and Bob Boze Bell, 3.6.

Top 40 remained the preferred format out of the 11 choices available on the 28 stations showing up in the report. Led by KZZP-FM, top 40 commanded a 17.2

Country came in second with a 15.2 share. Rock was third with a 13.3 share, with KUPD's edge over KDKB widening.

News-talk's popularity slipped to fourth, with a 12.6 share. Although KTAR dropped 2 share points, it still easily walloped KFYI, which nearly fell out of the top 10.

Easy listening was fifth with a 9.7 share, followed by oldies, 7.2; big band, 3.9; Spanish, 2.0; New Age, 1.0; classical, 0.9; and religious, 0.5.

Quite a nice turnout this week with several reports received. Good to hear from many of you including Bill Harms in Bavaria with the final word on the ex-Monaco 1467 TWR outlet which is widely heard. Still some fair conditions every so often; but the band feels like it's open enough that when an aurora of substantial proportions occurs we'll certainly encounter some fine Latin DX. A phone call from George Hakiel on Long Island in New York state 1/28 with some interesting items. Some of George's recent DX includes: Senegal nightly on 765, HJJV R. Punto in Zulia, Colombia (nominal 980) high on 981 kHz, 985-08X4J Estacion X, Lima, Peru, 990-YVRT Caracas, Ven., 1000-YVNM Mundial Mil in Moron, Ven., also on 1000 was HJAQ-Cartagena, Colombia, a nice logging and on RCN netowrk per new 1989 WRTH. Going on George lists: 1220-HJAT R. Reloj, Barranquilla, Colombia, on 1170 was HJNW in Cartagena w/CARACOL, 1070-YVMA Mundial Zulia in Maracaibo, Venezuela, on 1150 YVMM-Mundial Caribe in Punto Fijo (which was new for me too last week), and a good one on 1020 with Radio Ritmo in Panama City, Pan. Central America. Included also were YVTI-1360 Catatumbo Internacional, Maracaibo, Vneezuela, which by the way has been heard here in PA several times (and has wide coverage as it's been heard in Hawaii too), and some tentatives in 745-HCSE4 Chone, Ecuador (R. Libertad w/variable freq.) (I have been getting a carrier and bits of SS audio at times there but as for the ID, audio level is still too weak with domestic even frequency slop), French on 1090 which George reports he hears often and believes it's Martinique, and also he's been getting Spanish on a seemingly new split or drift on 1255 kHz, which is presumably a Latin. Perhaps Honduras, George? live seen one reported thereabouts, but not recently. Finally to boot George reported an amazing item -- sure, many of us have heard with ease the likely ½-million or so watt Cuban Radio Taino on 830, but 1/29 he was able to hear them on 830 all day. At over 1200-miles distant this is evidence of the ridiculously high power the transmitter is using, but is still impressive as even the Rebelde shortwaves outlet on 5025 is not heard by day this far north. 


Father Sebastian Ruth at St. Martin's was pioneering radio on the college campus while it was expanding.

By January 1922 area listeners could look forward to regular programming on Sunday, Tuesday, and Friday evenings from a small wireless shack on the campus, In April 1922, Father Sebastian was issued "KGY" call numbers; his was only the 110th station in the United States. Father Sebastian brought a wide variety of programming, ranging from opera to live performances, to his little station at St. Martin's. The station was sold to commercial interests in 1932 but Father Sebastian continued his amateur radio broadcasting until his death in 1958. He was honored as one of the pioneers in northwest radio. After KGY moved from the log cabin on St. Martin's campus to the Capital Park Building in 1932, the station was owned by Archie Taft who also owned KOL in Seattle.

In 1939 the station was purchased by Tom Olsen who in 1941 moved KGY to the Rockway-Leland Building at State and Washington streets. Specially designed, acoustically perfect studios housed the station with a 150 foot-tall tower on the roof of the building.

IMPEDANCE MATCHING A BEVERAGE ANTENNA TO A RECEIVER

NICHOLAS HALL PATCH AND JOHN H. BRYANT

BRYANT:

Ever since I first read of Beverage antennas and their almost magical attributes, I have lusted after a Beverage. Every time that failing propagation caused an clusive catch to disappear unlogged, I would swear to construct a Beverage "next weekend." Although I read every technical article ever published in English on Beverages, "next weekend" never arrived. Finally, in 1986, I happened to be in Edmonton, Alberta and arranged to spend an afternoon with Don Moman, Executive Secretary of CIDX and certainly one of the more experienced Beveragers in North America. Don patiently answered my numerous "practical" Beverage question and stiffened my backbone. The winter of 1986-87 was spent planning a DXpedition with fellow FTers Allen and Sams and in acquiring 2000' of wire plus assorted accessories. In the early spring of 1987, the expedition was ON! We planned to go about 30 miles out on the true prairie in western Oklahoma at least 5 miles from the nearest man-made electricity, and give the thing a weekend trial. Calmer heads suggested that we string the Beverage up first at my semirural home to "make sure that we had all the kinks out" before going out 15 miles past the last flush toilet to stay for the weekend. We decided to test everything, including running the business end of the Beverage to my van and operating our radios on 12 volts.

The trial date arrived; after two hours of huffing and puffing, the Beverage was up and the moment had arrived to introduce the end of the wire to the back of my NRD-525! The NRD folks were even nice enough to provide two antenna ports, one for coax and one for wire antennas. As I hooked it up, I noticed the wire antenna port was labeled "High Z" (!!???).

As it turned out, even though the Beverage ran under two power lines (at about right angles), the directional and other special characteristics of the antenna allowed it to ignore all that potential noise; it proved to be an almost totally quiet antenna. Very quickly, we decided not to leave the flush toilets, refrigerator or the water bed behind to DX in a cow pasture. We had the DXpedition in my back yard!

The Beverage was everything I'd been led to believe. Our first night, we hit very fortunate propagation and logged both Europe and Japan (with multiple loggings) ON MEDIUM WAVE. Further, every band below 4 MHz was alive with superb DX! Later, I learned that if we'd been less greedy and only put up 1200', the Beverage would have worked for us up to at least 5.5 mHz! Well, when the DXpedition was over, I was not about to go back to my 'old' antennas and give up that Beverage. THAT'S WHEN THE WORDS ON THE BACK OF THE NRD "HIGH - Z" HIT ME BETWEEN THE EYES. All the reading came flooding back... "Z" means "impedance" and Beverages have characteristic impedances of from 300 to 700 ohms. The unfortunate part was that the nearest point to the shack that I could bring the Beverage — in a straight line — was over 70' from the shack. If I ran a bare wire lead-in (at about 90° to the Beverage) to the Shack, the directional characteristics of the Beverage would be badly compromised. If I ran a 400-700 ohm antenna through 50 ohm coax, I didn't know what would happen, but the words IMPEDANCE MISMATCH kept running through my mind. On the other hand, converting one of the two family cars into a semi-permanent DX shack in the backyard was causing major QRN at the dinner table... What to do?? What to do??

I called several technically proficient friends and they said - "No sweat, the Beverage has plenty of gain - use coax, come in out of the truck, its OK!" I tried that and it was nice to be inside, but now the Beverage seemed to perform as "just another wire antenna", particularly on weak signals. I was sure that I was suffering significant losses due to poor matching. I knew that Beverages were one of the most popular antennas for medium wave DXers and I knew that Nick Hall-Patch, Technical Editor for the medium wave Club IRCA, was technically astute and that he was a shameless Beverager. I contacted Nick and he solved the mismatch problem in a flash...thereby saving the Beverage and probably the marriage. He performed this miracle by introducing me to matching transformers constructed using toroidal shapes made from ferrite (sorta like iron Life Savers).

Looking back over this whole experience I realized that I DID NOT REALLY KNOW WHAT IMPEDANCE WASI, even though I'd been in and around this hobby for over 35 years. Further, I realized that other DXers might well make the mistake which I did: running a high Z antenna through 50 ohm coax and thus losing a substantial amount of gain. So, I imposed upon Nick once again and asked him to write up what we had done and to begin his article with an explanation of Impedance that even I could understand. I'm pleased to say that he has done so. Nick take it away......

HALL-PATCH: IMPEDANCE

"Impedance" is one of those mysterious electronic terms which I'll attempt to define before we proceed to the body of this discussion. The term "impedance" is obviously derived from the verb "to impede" and impedance is a quality which impedes the flow of electric current. A more common and accessible term is "resistance' which is also a quality which impedes the flow of electric current, and in doing so converts electrical energy into another form of energy (heat, mechanical or whatever). Resistance has a similar effect on electric current whether the current is AC or DC.


However, when we are speaking of AC, more than simple resistance can impede the flow of electric current. An AC electric motor often has negligible DC resistance — a couple of ohms. If resistance of such a motor winding was all that impeded the flow of current, by Ohm's Law (I=E/R), it would pass a current of 30 or 40 amps. But it doesn't. It can be more like one or two amps. The inductance of the motor's winding also impedes the passage of AC by a quality known as inductive reactance (this reactance will also initially impede direct current (DC) but we won't go into that).

Inductive reactance is also measured in ohms like resistance is, but is dependant on the frequency of the applied AC: ${\rm X_L}=2\pi{\rm fL}$ where ${\rm X_L}$ is inductive reactance, f is frequency in Hertz, and L in inductance in henries. Virtually no current would flow in our electric motor if RF type AC were applied to it, as its reactance would be so high. Inductive reactance impedes the flow of current, but it does not convert electrical energy to other forms of energy as resistance does; it simply stores the energy.

Another form of reactance is capacitive reactance, which is also measured in ohms and is frequency dependant: $X_C = \frac{1}{2 \text{ Tr f } C}$ where X_C is capacitive

reactance in ohms, f is frequency in Hertz, and C is capacitance in Farads, but in this case, increasing the frequency of applied AC lowers capacitive reactance. \mathbf{x}_{C} is usually denoted as a negative value, because capacitive reactance can cancel our inductive reactance when they're in series; this is the basis of tuned circuits. Capacitive reactance also impedes current flow, but stores electric energy rather than dissipating it in non-electrical energy.

So what is impedance then? It is the combination of capacitive and inductive reactance along with simple resistance in a circuit. Although these three qualities are all measured in ohms, they are not the same thing, and cannot simply be added together. Their common quality is that they impede the flow of alternating current, including AC at radio frequencies. Capacitive and inductive reactance can be added together in a series circuit, but the resulting value in ohms can't be then directly added to the resistance value in ohms. We must move into two dimensions to perform this addition, and refer to Sketch 1.



Resistance is a positive value on the x-axis of our two dimensional graph, X_L is on the positive y-axis, which X_C is on the negative y-axis. If X_C is 1 ohm and X_L is 4 ohms, then X is 3 ohms (an apparent inductive reactance).

Through the wonders of trigonometry and Sketch 2, we can now find a total value for our impedance (Z) which is 5 ohms. Hence the standard formula: $Z = \sqrt{X^2 + R^2}$, which is the same as the one used for finding the hypoteneuse of a right angle triangle. Note that Z determines what AC current will flow in a circuit for a given voltage, by replacing R in ohm's law with Z: Z = I/E. We won't address phase shifting here, but it can be important.

IMPEDANCE IN ANTENNAS

Now then, antennas are said to have impedance. They have capacitance to ground, and the length of the wire has inductance with itself. These are not large values, but can be significant at MW and SW frequencies. Because reactance varies with frequency, the total impedance of one's antenna will also vary with frequency. At some frequencies (resonant frequencies), the inductive and capacitive reactances of the wire will cancel out, leaving a pure resistive impedance. This resistive impedance is more than simply the resistance from one end of the wire to the other, and is not just a mathematical fiction; a certain RF voltage applied to the antenna at the resonant frequency will only be able to push so much current into the antenna as defined by Ohm's Law and the resistive impedance of the antenna. At non-resonant frequencies the antenna will show a different impedance which has an inductive or capacitive element to it, and once again, only so much current can be pushed into the antenna at a certain voltage as defined by Ohm's Law and the antenna Z.

Maximum power transfer takes place when the impedance of the current generator (usually a transmitter) is the same as that of the antenna. This condition is a desireable one, as maximum power is available for radiation. It is also not a bad condition to have between an antenna and a receiver; in this case, the antenna can be thought of as the generator:




When $Z_{\rm B}=Z_{\rm P}$, maximum power is transferred between the antenna and the receiver, even if it is only picowatts, and maximum signal strength will be noted at the receiver. (This condition assumes the $Z_{\rm B}$ and $Z_{\rm P}$ are both resistive impedance; if there is reactive impedance at the antenna, it should be cancelled out with an opposing value of reactive impedance at the receiver). However, below 10 MHz or so, note that weak DX signals are usually limited by atmospheric or man-made noise, and you won't hear DX any better by matching impedance between a random wire and a receiver if the DX is buried in external noise already. The receiver signal will certainly be stronger if the receiver and antenna are matched, but so will the external noise. If the random wire is short or close to the ground, or the receiver is insensitive, then impedance matching may allow weaker signals to be heard than would be otherwise (though still stronger than the external moise level) but generally one can say that impedance matching should not be necessary between a good random wire and a good receiver.

IMPEDANCE IN BEVERAGE ANTENNAS

Beverage antennas can be a different kettle of fish however. They are not very efficient, but are quite directional; the antenna will attenuate noise originating from outside its lobes. Also, there can actually be some noise cancellation over the length of the wire even if the noise is originating in the same direction as the desired signal. Therefore our signal to noise ratio may be improved quite markedly over that of a random wire, and in situations where weak signals are poking out of the mud (sunrise DXing for example), we may need every picowatt our Beverage can deliver to our receiver, as there have been cases where a DX signal is actually buried in the receiver noise floor even at medium wave frequencies.

Beverage antennas generally have an impedance in the region of 300 to 700 ohms which is a not unreasonable match to (mostly older) receivers with "high impedance" antenna inputs. Even when using such a receiver, one may want to try to cancel out reactive elements of the antenna impedance using a pi-network coupler (see National Radio Club's Antenna Reference Manual's article by Russ Edmunds "Antenna Tuning Devices for Longwires on the MW BCB" or A DXer's Technical Guide 2nd edition, p. 61, published by IRCA), but that would only be necessary if one felt that potential DX was being buried below the receiver noise floor as opposed to the atmospheric or local noise floor (see "Noise Levels and Useable Receiver Sensitivity" by Chuck Hutton, pp. 6ff in A DXer's Technical Guide, 2nd ed.).

(Since this article was written, I have tried a pi-network coupler with a 1000' Beverage antenna and found that it only works well below about 700 kHz. So I've tried the T-network coupler described below, and found it can give up to 6 dB "gain" through improved matching between antenna and receiver. This was from MW well into the SW bands.)



(L is about 140 uH. I used a T-157-6 Amidon core with 110 turns, tapped every 10 turns)

Frove Enterprises has announced a new receiver, the Grove SR1000 Spectrum Surveillance Receiver. It tunes from 100 kHz to 1000 MHz, and boasts the better bells and whistles: keyboard and knob tuning, with selectable tuning rate, digital readout to 100 Hz; 100 memories; FM, AM, USB, LSB; selectable preamp/attenuator etc. etc. But it also has a 3" CRT for a spectrum analyzer display (100 kHz to 10 MHz display width), and a +20 dB third order intercept point. Sensitivity seems OK, though it's a little difficult to interpret the figure given for the average DXer to understand, and selectivity seems pedestrian--"6 kHz AM" and "2.4 kHz SSB"; no shape factors given. It was to be priced at US\$1995 and to be available in fall of 1988, but the price is now heading for the stratosphere, and it's not yet on the market to my knowledge. More details from Grove Enterprises, P.O. Box 98, Brasstown, NC 28902. (Info from CIDX Messenger July 1988)

Radio Netherlands Media Network program of Nov 18, 1988 mentioned the following receivers:

ALR Ltd. Tokyo announced their AR-3000 receiver, covering 100 kHz to 2036 MHz with SSB, CW, AM,NBFM, WBFM modes. It's powered from 13.8 vDC and is intended for car or table top use, with 400 memories and an RS-232 interface. They claim 15 different microprocessor selected bandpass filters in the front end, and give acceptable sensitivity figures, but no specs are given for dynamic range. They also claim "superior selectivity" with -70 dB adjacent channel rejection, but the channel width is not defined. It should be available in the first quarter of 1989 at a price of US\$995. Ace Communication in Indianapolis is the sole US distributor.

RN also reviewed one of the new Kenwood RZ-1's covered by Bruce Portzer in the Dec 3, 1988 DX Monitor. They were not too impressed. There have been 17 modifications announced, but not all have been put into effect yet. They claim lousy SW performance, with overload, and 5 kHz separation impossible with stronger signals; synthesizer noise leads to reciprocal nixing, and the AM mode has 6% audio distortion. With its 5 kHz tuning steps they felt it was not much better than a cheap portable for SW...where does that leave MW? VHF was better, but still not as good as the Yaesu 9600, and not even in the same league as the ICOM R-7000. It seems you get what you pay for; this radio tries to do too much for its price?

IRCA Foreign DX Reference, Volumes 23-25

You're tuning around and hear a carrier from foreign origin on a frequency (say TA on 891). You want to quickly know which countries have been heard on the frequency and what type of programming was heard. Or, you're DXing and have heard several stations from one foreign area (say Japan) and want to quickly know what other stations have been heard from that area. These are the situations the IRCA Foreign DX Reference was created for. No longer will you need to thumb through tens of back issues of "DX Monitor" to find the information you need. With the IRCA Foreign DX Reference you can quickly determine which foreign stations might on a particular frequency or where to look for more stations from a particular area.

In honor of IRCA's 25th anniversary (and because it sounded like a good idea), this year's **Reference** was compiled from the last *three* years of "DX Monitor"!

The IRCA Foreign DX Reference is a cross reference listing of all the stations reported to DXWW-W and DXWW-E during volumes 23-25 of "DX Monitor" (9/85-8/88). Three sections are available: Trans-Atlantic, Pan American, and Trans-Pacific. Each section contains a frequency listing (countries reported for each frequency) and a country listing (frequencies reported for each country) including the "DX Monitor" issue in which they were reported (volume and number). The Reference is an indispensable guide to what was reported the last three years, and where to find specific information about the receptions.

WVWI, which broadcasts with 5,000 watts throughout much of the Caribbean, became a recognized source of news and information for the numerous Grenadian immigrants who reside in the Virgin Islands as well as for those having rela-

istance as well as for chose having rela-tives and friends living on Grenada. Particular praise has to go to the manager and vice president of WVWI. Mr. Rick Rleardo. Rick, who has been with WVWI since 1970, was instrumental in establishing on short notice a makeshift network to convey the news man mesaunishing on short notice a makeshift network to convey the news coming from Grenada and sending it along to mainiand stations, as well as to the citizens of the Virgin Islands and people throughout the Caribbean Basin. To illustrate WVWTs lightly of licent and swift news gathering efforts and Rick Ricardo's firsthand knowledge of events, news about the landing by U.S. Navy "Seals" on Grenada before the landing of Marines and Army Rangers was actually reported by WVWI as soon as the day after the intervention began, while many minland news media only reported this fact nearly I week after Rick and his highly professional crew had already done so.

ANARC REPORT FOR BEGINNING OF FEBRUARY 1989

In the February 1989 edition of Monitoring Times is an article which should be of great concern to all BCB DX'ers. The article appears on page 50 and is written by Larry Miller. In the article Larry spells out the certain death of AM Broadcasting. He says it cannot survive. The article is reproduce in its entirety below:

AM, then FM ... now DM !

Let's stop fooling ourselves. AM radio is not going to rebound, come back or survive. No longer acceptable for the transmission of consumer-grade audio, in ten years they'll be using the band to dispatch taxi cabs. Don't me wrong. AM is a blast to DX. But instead of wasting time trying to save struggling stations with short-term Band Aids like AM stereo and all-Elvis formats, broadcasters had best begin preparing for the future.

Michael Starling, writing in a recent issue of Radio World, thinks that AM and FM bands should be combined into an entirely new band called DM (digital modulation). Finding space for that new band will be, he says, "the industry's single most important issue in the 1990's.

Starling is no odd voice calling out from the fringes of technology. Some rather important, usually

conservative, organizations have echoed his views. In a recent edition of Federal Communications TechNews (12 issues/\$147 from New Signals Press, P.O. Box 435, Falls Church, VA 22046), editor Benn Kobb quotes the National Public Radio Network is saying "It does not seem likely that advanced radio systems incorporating digital technologies will be feasible using existing AM or FM bandwidths. In addition, downward compatibility (continued use of existing radio receivers to receive analog signals) for advanced radio systems would be impossible. Therefore, new spectrum will almost certainly be required."

Says Kobb, "Watch for DM advocates to add their voices to the clamor of interest asking the FCC to preserve or allocate spectrum [space] for [such] new technologies. Digital Modulation," he says, "is the ultrafidelity future for radio broadcasting."

This dx'er has said many times in the past and I will say it once again, We BCB DX'ers must unite. We must fight now to preserve the AM Broadcast band and our hobby. We all know that AM is a great broadcast medium and can survive if our governments (both the Canadian and American Governments) get off their fat bottoms and do their jobs properly. Those of us who have heard AM-Stereo know what I am talking about. With the proper receiver a good equalizer and good speakers AM-Stereo is just as good as FM-Stereo. In addition we need to persuade our governments to force AM stations to stop over modulating their signals. AM broadcasting in Europe thrives! AM Broadcasting in Europe sounds great only because the stations do not over modulate their signals. Write to your government officials NOW before it is too late! Also, send a copy of your letter to Larry Miller at P.O. Box 98, Brasstown NC 28902.


