Proceedings 1989

Proceedings 1989 is a publication of fine tuning, a club which emphasizes rare and difficult DX on the SW broadcast bands. Those who have seen Proceedings 1988 will know what to expect, but for those who haven't, Proceedings 1989 is a 220 page collection of DX related articles divided into several categories: propagation, antennas receivers, peripheral equipment, and "features", a miscellany of articles about DX target areas and QSL's which also includes various technical tips and reference sources.

An intriguing aspect of both these publications is that they are not just collections of articles garnered from various sources. Most of the articles were written specifically for the publication, and have been vetted by various editorial review boards for content before being accepted for publication. This is similar to the procedure used in academic journals and helps to guarantee accurate and informative articles, as one or two editors cannot be expected to be experts in all the fields included in a book such as this.

The propagation section is made up of a single lengthy article on transpolar signal paths through the auroral zone, which I found raised as many questions for me as it answered, especially as it describes some unexpected reception patterns, but can only speculate on reasons for such receptions. The article is solidly based on MW as well as tropical band observations.

The antenna section is a bit of a blockbuster, and ranges from the descriptive (very descriptive in some cases; "A Remotely Tuned Loop Antenna for the Tropical Bands" is very detailed) to the theoretical "Directional Antennas for Shortwave" which sets the brain buzzing. Also included are articles on a loaded delta loop, one of Mark Connelly's phasing units optimized for SW and a good treatise on practical Beverage antennas, from the cheap and quick overnighters to more permanent structures.

The receiver section includes reviews of the Collins 51J-4 the Yaesu FRG-8800, Kenwood R-2000, Icom ICR-70, Drake R4B and R4C, and the JRC NRD-525. I liked the mix of old and new receivers, and especially enjoyed the more detailed reviews, one of which also details modifications, but found I had some unanswered questions concerning the receivers which had shorter reviews.

The peripheral equipment section is almost entirely devoted to detailed reviews of four synchronous AM detector units, which is really fascinating, though I must say I came away from the section with the suspicion that synchronous detectors will not give an already good receiver much of a "bang-per-buck" as they're all quite expensive.

The features section is good reading with detailed articles on the stations and countryside of Java and Brazil, as well as a more general article concerning SW broadcasting in the Arab world. A pleasing aspect of these articles is that they do more than tell you about radio stations; they try to give you a ground level view of the countries and the people. The article on QSL'ing the Latins also tries to go beyond QSLing techniques to give the reader an understanding of the people who sign the cards. As someone who doesn't QSL Latins, I must say I found this one of the best articles in Proceedings, strictly from a human interest standpoint. Other articles include "Caring for QSL's", "Counting Countries", "International DXing on MW from the Midwest", and a collection of small articles concerning tips and techniques, as well as reviews of maps and books for the DXer and the technically inclined. Finally, there is a list of the National Radio Club reprints of interest to the SW DXer.

I tend to support publications of this sort simply because they bring good people out of the woodwork who will perhaps write even better articles in the future. But a look through Proceedings 1989 will show you that a lot of those better articles are being written now, and in a totally non-commercial publication. This is not a book aimed at the casual SWL or the domestic MW DXer, but the articles are generally well-written and compressions to the non-tone state of the non hensible to the non-technical listener who is willing to stretch his horizons a bit. My only complaint is that the photographs in the book needed much better preparation for publication. Some are virtually incomprehensible.

For the MW only DXer, much of this book is of more general interest only, but many of the technical articles were written by those knowledgeable in MW DX, and MW is not ignored. Any DXer with foreign interests will also benefit from some of the non-technical articles, and of course, the article on foreign MW DX from the midwest might be of interest to those in that part of the country.

SANGEAN ATS-803A by Ralph Sanserino, IRCA Publisher

I got to looking around for portable radios to use on the BCB and not to my disappearing from the marketplace, so I took a look at what was left and I had to go up in price to the Sangean ATS-803A; there is not much below the \$190 price tag for use on the BCB. If someone out there knows of a real good portable for BCB in a lower price range, please let me know. I have been checking out the 803A for awhile and it was just fair on the BCB. So off to get a service manual to see what could be done to make this go better on the BCB. The people at Sangean were thinking of the BCB DXer when they designed this radio; they put in an FET RF amp just for the BCB and LW bands. Here is this ferrite rod antenna hooked directly to this nice looking FET RF amp and I knew right off it was going to work great when I got done with it, and sure enough I was right; it does work great. I added an external 15" tuned ferrite rod antenna, the plug-in type, so when I unplug it, the internal ferrite antenna is back in use. The external antenna improves the 803A about 200% or more. Stations that could not be heard with the internal antenna were now audible using the external antenna. Splits were readable and you have a digital readout and a BFO with pitch control to help you tune them. I am not going to list all of the specs here; all I know is the radio works. You can get all the specs from a Sangean brochure.....Ralph Sanserino.

I spent Sat. 10/14 in Madison at a get-together at Tim Noonan's There must have been a dozen or more there, and, as Gary Siegel commented, that's more than we had at some IRCA conventions in the past. Tim and some others said that in a recent Billboard article, it was noted that WBT-1110 lost two of their three towers to Hugo, and thus are running non-directional at the moment. They also said the Jacksonville station on 1090 was running non-directional, but not extra power which I had heard a rumour about. It was nice seeing some of the veries, and also to see some old faces and some new ones. One subject that came up at the gathering was the possibility of guys who live in states on the western side of the Mississippi River (such as Iowa) being able to report to EDXF instead of WDXF. Seems they feel they identify more with the eastern forum rather than the western forum. How does the membership feel about it? The freedom that a member has to report to either column of his choice (but not to swing back and forth between columns) when he lives near the dividing line really applies only for a roundup section. 1990 ANARC CONVENTION, - QUESTIONNAIRE RESULTS

Over the summer a, questionnaire concerning the future of the ANARC Conventions was distributed (by letter to all ANARC Reps.), printed in the July ANARC Newsletter and handed out at ANARCON'89. A total of 35 people responded (6 Club Reps 'yours truly was one', 15 conventioneers and 17 Newsletter Subscribers). Support for an option was scored as +1, opposition as a -1. The tally for each option is this the net balance of positive and negative opinions. The responses show a strong preference for two options: keeping the convention as it is and soliciting a new round of bids for 1990 (+13), and/or trying to affiliate with another established and compatible annual meeting (+13). Seven indicated a preference for affiliating with the Dayton Hamvention, two suggested the EDXC. <Editors note: I suggested a separate ANARC Convention every year and a joint ANARC/EDXC Convention every other year. ASL> Having conventions every other year scored a +3. The most negative responses was to not having conventions at all and was a -6. Less than 1/2 of the club reps. turned in their questionnaires so their responses are not binding on the clubs. Let me know your opinions on this important question and I will vote the way the majority of IRCA Members tell me. If no one tells me what they want I will vote the way I want.

BIDS AGAIN OPEN FOR 1990 ANARC CONVENTION
