Ye editor passes along additional information on the subject off the WSCR-1160 website:

WSCR to 670am, Infinity Broadcasting Corporation has announced that "The Score", WSCR-AM, will begin broadcasting on 670 AM effective Tuesday, August 1, 2000. The change in frequency represents a significant upgrade in signal for WSCR, which will now operate as a 50,000-watt station.

In order to meet federal stipulations stemming from the Viacom/CBS merger, Infinity Broadcasting is required to divest one radio station in Chicago. The company is currently seeking a buyer for the 1160 AM frequency now used by WSCR.

Infinity has also announced that Chicago Bears Football broadcasts are moving from 670 to WBBM Newsradio 780. The current play-by-play team of Gary Bender, Bub Arkush, and Tom Thayer and pre-game host Jeff Joniak will make the move to 780 along with the Chicago Bears. "The Bears game is always the biggest news on Sundays in Chicago, "said Rod Zimmerman, Vice President and General Manager of WBBM and WMAQ. "The Chicago Bears fit well with WBBM's strategic position of providing live coverage of every major local event."

WBEM Newsradio 780 will launch its Bears coverage with four special reports daily from the Bears training camp in Platteville, Wisconsin beginning July 21, 2000. The Chicago Bears will also receive extensive coverage on The Score on 670, including updates at 8:30a and 5:30a each day, also beginning July 21, 2000. WSCR on 670 will also air the Dick Jauron Show and the Bears Management Report with Ted Phillips on Monday nights throughout the NFL Season, in addition to Monday Night Football, the NFL playoffs and the Super Bowl.

Chicago Blackhawks hockey broadcasts, featuring Pat Foley and Billy Gardner, will remain on 670 AM.

The transfer of WSCR and its programming to 670 AM retire the call letters WMAQ (We Must Ask Questions), which were assigned to the station on October 2, 1922 when the license was held by the Chicago Daily News.

"I'd like to express my deepest appreciation to the talented and

dedicated team at WMAQ who have represented the finest in news journalism for so many memorable years," added Zimmerman.

WMAQ will mark its final hours on the air July 31st with historic audio from the station's nearly 78 year history and a When Radio Was marathon, featuring many of the programs that first aired on WMAQ in the 1930's and 1940's.

WMAQ at this time (8/1/00-ye ed.) is still running "When Radio Was" and will until 6 AM local. While the official switch to "alls ports" is supposed to happen at noon, supposedly the oldtime radio programming ends at 6 AM. So not sure what to make of that. Officially, the WMAQ call will be used for another 2 weeks or so as 670 and 1160 will be simulcasting the WSCR programming for that time and each frequency requires its own unique FCC identifier.

Chicago's oldest radio call letters to leave airwaves  ${\tt July~31}\,,~2000$ 

CHICAGO (AP) -- The city's oldest radio station, where millions of fans turned the dial to hear "Amos 'n Andy" and "Fibber McGee and Molly" before television took over the night, is signing off this week for the final time.

On Tuesday, the frequency WMAQ-AM has held for nearly eight decades will become an all-sports station known as "The Score." Although WMAQ is based in Chicago, it was broadcast across the country.

"When one of the top 10 call letters in the history of the medium goes dark, it's a strong signal that times have significantly changed in the industry," said Bruce DuMont, founder and curator of the Museum of Broadcast Communications in Chicago.

WMAQ's demise stems directly from federal regulations and the marriage of broadcasting giants CBS Inc. and Viacom Corp. Federal ownership rules required that CBS subsidiary Infinity sell one of its eight Chicago radio stations. The company chose to get rid of a weaker frequency used by the sports station and move the sports station to the frequency held by WMAQ.

'We Must Ask Questions'

The station is all news now, but in its early years it was home to some of the most famous voices on radio.

Even its call letters had meaning -- We Must Ask Questions. They were chosen by then secretary of commerce and future president Herbert Hoover.

WMAQ began broadcasting on April 13, 1922, as WGU under the ownership of the Chicago Daily News and The Fair, a downtown department store where the original studios were located.

Six months later, the Daily News bought out the store's share of the station and renamed it WMAQ. NBC bought it in 1931 and boosted its power from 250 watts to 50,000 watts, enabling the signal to be heard nationwide.

Under NBC's ownership, WMAQ became the home of some of radio's most famous stars: Red Skelton, Dave Garroway, Garry Moore and Hugh Downs among them.

"Amos 'n Andy" premiered in 1928 and was broadcast each evening from WMAQ's studios. "Fibber McGee and Molly" followed in 1935.

"Those were the big ones," DuMont said. "Amos 'n Andy was probably the most important and most successful radio show of all time as far as a series is concerned."

Over the years, WMAQ switched to easy listening and then country music, but news always played a major role, said political reporter

Bill Cameron, whose 30 years at the station will end with the change.

"NBC News ran the local news department, and there was a big premium put on a professional approach to doing the news," he said. When the station was sold to Westinghouse in 1988, it changed to all-news programming, putting it in direct competition with CBS. Then, in 1996, Westinghouse and CBS merged. "We still competed to keep each other sharp, but it wasn't as keen as it was when Westinghouse didn't own CBS," Cameron said.

Georgeann Herbert, who has managed the news operations of both stations for the past year, said all-sports WSCR was chosen over WMAQ to give the company one news station and one sports station, rather than two competing news stations. It will mean the loss of about 60 employees.

In the newsroom, the mood has been glum, said Mo Whalen, a former reporter for WMAQ. News reporters bristled as WSCR workers came in for computer training and installed screen savers with photos of the new station's personalities.

"I kind of liked the fact that there were two news stations. One was a little more formal and one was a little less," said Whalen, who now runs a public affairs program for another radio station.

Dave Sachs, a 47-year-old Union Pacific police officer from Chicago, has relied on WMAQ for quick news fixes for years.

"That's all we need," Sachs said, a bit dismayed at the change. "Another sports station."

Bill Laye of Grande Prairie, AB. sends along the following:

Grande Prairie's own country radio CJXX will be going head-to-head with some of Canada's best during Canada Music Week next month. The award-winning station has been nominated with eight others by fellow members of the Canadian Radio Association (CRA) for Radio Station of the Year and 'XX music director Bob Martineau is among seven in the running for the CRA Music Director of the Year honours - both in the secondary-market category. The winners are to be announced in Toronto during Canada Music Week, March 1-5. "I'm shocked pleasantly surprised," said Martineau. Two years ago, Martineau won the Canadian Country Music Association's (CCMA) director-of-the-year award. But the CRA nomination is even sweeter, because it crosses all music genres and the nominations can even come from competitors. "With the CCMAs, to be nominated you have submit it yourself. With this, your peers vote on it," he said. "It doesn't even matter if we win. It just feels nice going in just to be recognized and be in the top few." Martineau also became a proud papa, as he and wife Val had their first child, daughter Paige Allison, this month. "She's better than any award I could ever be nominated for," he chuckled of the healthy eight-pound, 14 ounce girl, born at 9:20 a.m. Feb. 7. Another thing Martineau is gearing up for is the station's muchanticipated switch to the FM format. "The music that comes out of

Nashville is so slick and well-produced it's going to sound so great on FM, I can't wait," he said, adding the the station will still remain true to its substance. "People who love this station already won't be disappointed." The CRTC approved 'XX for FM with two others - one in Taber and one in Red Deer- in eight-station Monarch Broadcasting Ltd.'s Alberta chain this fall. CJXX station manager Ken Truhn says he expects work on the conversion to get going as soon as things warm up outside. "We're suspecting as soon as the snow melts and the ground is dry, we'll be working on the tower site up on the Saddle Hills," he said. As for the award nominations, he, too, is glad his peers in Radioland are listening. "It speaks well for a market our size. A lot of times I don't think people really realize just how good the two radio stations here in Grande Prairie are," he said.

Monarch Broadcasting Ltd., owners of Grande Prairie's CJXX radio, has been bought by The Jim Pattison Broadcast Group, the two companies announced Tuesday. Monarch president and CEO Bill Yuill said in this day and age of huge media conglomerates, selling the chain was the only viable option left for the family-owned business. "We'd gotten (Monarch) as large as we could - it will now take somebody bigger to carry the banner forward," he said from the company's Medicine Hat head office. The Jim Pattison Broadcast Group is a wholly-owned subsidiary of The Jim Pattison Group. In addition to broadcasting, the B.C.-based company's varied interests include supermarket chains, financial services and outdoor advertising signs. Its current annual international sales figures are in the range of \$4.6 billion. Though Yuill said couldn't comment directly on the new owners' plans, he confirmed CJXX's FM conversion is still on schedule, and the country-format station remains one of the network's strongest. "I can't see (Pattison making) any major changes - it's a good healthy operation up there." Yuill, who took over Monarch from his father in 1972, said he's also glad Monarch's 275 employees will be fitting into a company that is growth-oriented and has the resources to do it. "It's a huge opportunity," o'XX station manager Ken Truhn said this morning. "It makes the whole company a significant player in the broadcast industry in Alberta and B.C., " he said. Monarch first signed on in 1946 with CHAT radio in Medicine Hat and, along with CJXX, now operates a total 15 radio and two television stations in B.C. and Alberta. Pattison currently operates six radio and one television station, all in B.C. "The Monarch stations are leaders in the markets in which they operate and their addition will significantly strengthen our Group," Rick Arnish, president of Kamloops-based Pattison broadcasters, said in a prepared statement. The sale of Monarch Broadcasting is subject to CRTC approval, which may come by the end of August at the earliest. Details of the cash sale were not released under the terms of a confidentiality agreement. And by the fall, Grande Prairie CJXX listeners will be changing their dials from 840 AM to 93.1 FM, Truhn said. "We'll be taking delivery of our new transmitter by the middle of September," he said, adding the 'flip' is scheduled for Nov. 1.

Pat Martin passes along the following (reply from Bill Hale of Dallas, TX.):

I read that KCIS-630- Edmonds, WA is applying to drop power from U2 5000/2500 to U1 2300/53. I can understand why they might want a U1 status at night, but why the drop to 2300 watts day? Maybe 53 watts on 630 will cover the Seattle area OK. Any ideas?

Bill replies:

KCIS is a two-site operation. According to the FCC database, the 'new' day facility of 2300 watts non-directional is at their old nighttime site, now 3 towers at N47-51-00 W122-09-38, and the 'new'

night facility of 53 watts non-directional is at their old daytime site, which has 1 tower at N47-46-06 W122-21-07. So the 'new' nighttime site is about 15 or so miles west of the 'new' daytime site

Maybe they can make some \$\$\$ while selling the unneeded land and cut their electric bill at the same time. (??)

Dennis Gibson of Santa Barbara, CA. passes along the following:
What I presume to be KZPM-1100 Bakersfield, CA is on the air. I
say presume because I did not hear an ID, but the format is SS, as
rumored, and there are no other CP's on 1100 in California. KZPM
runs 4.2 KW ND days and 800 watts directional at night. They are
diplexing off KAFY-970. I am hearing them from Santa Maria, about an
hour north of my home in Santa Barbara. I'm not sure when they
signed on, but I was up here a week ago today and they were not on
then. I will probably not be able to hear them from home due to
splatter from XEPRS-1090, which is very strong. (Note: ye ed may
have heard them good in KFAX-1100 null on 7/31/00!).

Dennis also passes along the following:

"CA Costa Mesa KKGO-540 was classical//XEBACH, now jazz//KJAZ (KKGO is expected to go dark shortly (???-I thought they have been off the air for a long time. Can anyone in L.A. area confirm they are indeed on in Costa Mesa? I'd think they'd interfere with Tijuana's coverage area!-ye ed.)"

I was under the same impression as Bob (Wien, ye ed, that is) that they'd been off for at least a couple of years. About 3 years ago or so in many parts of the LA area, there was a \*huge\* overlap with 540 Tijuana.

Unfortunately, neither of our LA area experts (Mike Sanburn and Gary Larson) are online as far as I know (no they are not-ye ed.).

In the latest Soft DXM, Gary says "As I've been told, 540 KKGO Costa Mesa to go dark, probably July (?)". Maybe someone who corresponds with either of them via snail mail or twisted pair could ask them? I know this topic has come up from time to time on the news group, but I don't think it was ever settled; I don't know of any LA area DX'ers active on the news group. (I don't know their current status, but latest info I have now shows them as 'silent'!-ye ed.) (addendum: latest M Street says they were //KJAZ-1260, but now silent).

Pat sends along the following from Bill Hale:

The long-awaited (?) swap of frequencies between KCLE Cleburne, TX and KJSA Mineral Wells, TX will occur Monday, July 24.

KCLE will be on 1140 and KJSA will be on 1120.

Although they will be licensed for nighttime operation, KCLE on 1140 will temporarily remain a daytimer with 250 watts until all the directional bugs can be worked out. So . . . you may catch them at LSR/LSS, or better still, check 1140 for them testing at night.

The new daytime facility will direct 850 watts (3738 watts ERP) at 320 degrees from Cleburne, and the night CP is for 710 (3138 watts ERP) watts at 330 degrees. (Both almost heading right at Denver!)

Pat sends along the following from Marc DeLorenzo of Auburndale, MA.:

(Pat): Here is another X Bander that is not going to move. I think we will see more of them not moving in the future too.

1620 unID R.Soleil Internationale JUL 10 0100 - "Ici Radio Soleil 1620 AM" and French Caribbean music, weak in WHLY null. JUL 13 0100 - Talk in French under New York City NOAA weather radio relay. JUL 17 0130 - "Ici Radio Soleil Internationale" ID, romantic music, over NYC NOAA weather station with WHLY

Internet research in an attempt to identify this station produced the following info. According to e-mail from Radio Soleil D'Haiti broadcasting on WBKQ New York 97.9 FM SCA, it's not them. In an e-mail from WRRA US Virgin Islands, "DJ Wonder" says the station is staying on 1290. WRRA will not be going to 1620. Meanwhile Ron Gitschier on tour of duty the Caribbean reports no French Caribbean broadcasts heard on 1620. Perhaps this is another French-language Part 15 station in Boston, or did 1640 in Boston move to 1620?

Hi Bruce & Gang, The 1640 Creole/French speaker is alive and well. At home in Auburndale (Newton) their signal is fair all day long about equal to Logan Airport-1650. On 1620 I get nothing at all. So, I believe that the 1620 station is NOT located in Metro Boston.

I was reading that CJOC (1220 Lethbridge, AB.-ye ed) has an APP into the CRTC to move to FM too.

Goodie! 1220 will be another good frequency to the East with many stations running low power and U1, plus a bunch of directional eastern Canadians. Hopefully CJOC will make the move soon. There is a 300 watt one in ME on 1220, plus Cleveland Ohio (50 KW U3) and many others from 100-300 watts. Hopefully more Canadians will move to FM without someone else taking the frequency.

Pat sends along the following from Pete Taylor of Tacoma, WA. (Via Bruce Portzer of Seattle, WA.):

An interesting bit of trivia: Blaine, WA will probably have the largest frequency spread for a two station town (one on  $550\ \&$  the other on 1600).

# Pete Taylor wrote:

- 550 KARI Blaine: still mulling over whether or not to go through with the power increase. The main culprit remains the nearby FCC monitoring station.
- 850 KHHO Tacoma: still //KJR-950 but will split in November
- 950 KJR Seattle: new start date for 50kw from KHHO site is November 1
- 1070 KRAM West Klamath: is not on the air but will be about September 1

(Addendum: ye ed called KRAM-1070 Friday 7/28, found out station has actually been on the air but running very low power (about 15 watts or so), had been off 'last day or two' for repairs to xmtr, hoped to be back with full 1 kw. in about 10 days (about 8/8), but station has been on the air, just hasn't gotten out very well due to very low xmtr output.)

- 1300 KKOL Seattle: still 5kw U2. Their options are to move XR to KLFE-1590 or KIXI-880 but they are having legal and technical problems.
- 1600 KBLO Blaine: no construction yet but they definitely will be going on the air. They will be applying for different call letters.
- 1680 KAZJ Seattle: They are still deciding on whether or not to go through with it. I was told several months ago that they would be applying for KSEA but I haven't seen that happen.

Other than KARI and KRAM, these issues have been hanging around for a long time.

1) 0500 with blk gspl music, occasional ID as WEUP and "early

# SHORTWAVE

I mentioned previously that the directional characteristics of the an tenna are noticeable all of the way to 5.100 MHz. I must say, though that the terminated Beverage antennas, which are aimed directly at my favorite Tropical Band targets, prove to be superior to the K9AY on most occasions. However, since my Oklahoma beverages are over 500 fee long and require significant portions of the cow pasture in which I live, the fact that the Wellbrook K9AY works almost as well as my beverage array is really quite remarkable. In fact, the K9AY is the first antenna, other than the beverages, on which I can successfully

DX the very unusual signals from Indian regional stations which may be heard here with great difficulty for about 30 minutes at dawn and dusk during the winter half of the year. Except for the Beverages, no other antenna, active or passive, has done as well as the K9AY at detecting these signals. In fact, the K9AY often "hears" the Indian signals as well as does the beverage array. The only diffeence is the K9AY tends to hear more band noise on these frequencies than does the very narrowly directional beverage. On the international shortwave bands above 5 MHz, the K9AY performs very well. It tends to be a very quiet antenna and does, I understand, offer some possibilities of nulling local noise even on these frequencies.

What I have not done yet, nor to my knowledge has anyone else, is cut a set of loops to the proper length to operate well on 60 meters. It is my understanding that the largest circumference loop that should be used for a particular frequency is 0.25 of the wavelength. For 60 meters, that would be about 49 feet or about 16 feet per side. My loop and most of the others currently in use are almost double that circumference. I look forward to some experimentation with smaller loops late this summer. Even using the oversized loops as at present, I likely would abandon my Beverages entirely, even for shortwave, were it not for my interest in the DXing the very difficult weak long-range signals from the Indian Subcontinent on the lower bands. I certainly don't expect to use my beverages here in Oklahoma for MW DXing in the future. I never thought that I'd say that.

#### THE "ULTIMATE" K9AY ANTENNA SYSTEM?

My use of the Wellbrook K9AY antenna here in Oklahoma rather closely models my use in the Pacific Northwest. In both cases, the DX signals of interest come from about 180 degrees of the horizon, while interfering signals almost all come from the back-side half-circle. Given that the deepest null of a cardioid pattern is fairly narrow, I began wondering if having four loops (eight directions) with one antenna for each 45 degrees of azimuth would be useful in real DXing situations. Despite laying myself open to further charges of obsessive/compulsive disorder, I figured that the additional cost would be worth it, if I could benefit from the additional directional choices at least ten percent of the time. Andy Ikin of Wellbrook was kind enough to provide me with an Operators Unit that can control two separate Antenna Head Units... one for each two loops. (All four loops are mounted on the same mast, making a nice Christmas tree.)

My only formal test of the 6-way vs. the 4-way system consisted of two pre-dawn hours DXing Mexican MW stations from here in central Oklahoma. I checked 12 different frequencies, most below 1000 kHz. Of those 12, having a choice at 45 degrees was a significant advantage on nine of the channels. The three where it "was not an advantage" were all stations which so dominated their frequencies that they were to tally dominant through 135 degrees of azimuth or so.

On the 9 channels where the 45 degree choice made a difference, it was ALWAYS the advantage of achieving a more complete null on the dominant signal to be able to hear the desired signal more clearly. It also seemed that this extra nulling capability was the most useful when trying to ID a station in the very worst pile-ups.

Assuming that the stations were evenly distributed around the horizon, the above leads me to believe that the extra two loops would make a difference on about 40% of my DX targets. In subsequent months, that 40% to 50% has proven to be the case. GOOD ENOUGH FOR ME.

My findings make sense for people who DX MW, with the dense pile-ups coming from all angles of the compass. The cardioid pattern has a fairly sharp null and a very wide, more than semi-circular peak. I would guess that lowfers who DX NDBs would also find the extra nullin control an advantage, though I don't know by how much.

#### OTHER NOTES

Both Bruce Portzer and I noticed a distinct directional "peak" in sen sitivity while on our DXpedition. This was quite unexpected. The published horizontal (or azimuthal) sensitivity patterns of the K9AY antenna indicate a broad, even front lobe of almost 270 degrees of azimuth mated to a very sharp vee-shaped rearward null. That matches what we were hearing, except on weak signals which were otherwise in the clear. Sometimes, these stations were significantly stronger on just one wire. Since the wires were only 45 degrees apart in azimuth that really shouldn't have been happening. This effect was most noticeable on the 5 or so Russian long wave stations that we logged. Whether this was a unique effect of our superb ground plane or beachfront location, or whether this peak has been missed by DXers who are limited to only four directional choices, we had no way to determine. As other DXers with four-loop arrays gain experience, we should all b alert to this phenomenon.

Concerning the 4-loop array coupled with the DK9SQ antenna mast: the extra weight and downward tension from the extra two loops has caused my telescoping fibreglass mast to partly re-telescope during two of our storms here in Oklahoma. I had no such trouble when I had only tw loops of 20 gauge wire up. After having the same thing happen the first night on the Washington coast, I secured each joint of the tele scope with a stainless steel hose clamp. Problem solved.

I should also note that the experience with K9AYs at the Newfoundland DXpeditions, while good, do not appear to have been quite so wonderfu as mine. My guess is that differing ground conditions may be to blame The ground plane in Oklahoma was excellent: very moist clay. The ground in Washington was even better: Sandy soil completely saturated with brackish water. Ground conditions at the site in Newfoundland ar a mixture of dry sandy soil and rock, as I remember. I am unsure whether the K9AYs in Newfoundland were amplified, as is the Wellbrook version. The Wellbrook amplifier seems to not be needed much when do ing domestic/Mexican DX here in Oklahoma, but it made a world of difference in hearing weak trans-Pacific signals on the Washington Coast Also, Jean Burnell noted that their 2500 foot beverage was always superior (on MW) to any other antenna for the direction in which it was pointed. I'm sure that is true. I don't ever expect to entirely give up my addiction to beverage antennas. When I have th opportunity to string out at least 1500 or more feet of wire toward an area of inter est, I'm certainly going to do so. Unfortunately, those opportunitie are very rare, even here in the world's largest cow pasture. CONCLU-SION

The K9AY antenna as produced by Wellbrook Communications is a marvelous antenna for medium and long wave DXing. Even though I have not used a K9AY antenna cut for shortwave frequencies, my medium wave ver sion is second only to my 500 foot beverage antennas when DXing the Tropical Bands. The Wellbrook units are very well built and appear to be optimized for the needs of serious DXers. I recommend the Wellbrook K9AY enthusiastically and without reservation.



Using the A-index to predict good propagation?

As was mentioned in "Signal Strength Recording as an Aid to Propagation Studies" in DX Monitor, Volume 37, Number 5 and 6, I have been using a computer controlled radio to continuously record signal strengths of various DX stations from Victoria, B.C. So far, I have seriously analyzed only receptions from HLAZ-1566, and almost all receptions of that station over the period from September 1997 to March 2000 occurred in the hour previous to receiver sunrise.

In an effort to understand why sunrise enhancement occurs on some mornings and not others, I tabulated the dates of the strongest enhancements over this period, and attempted to correlate these dates at least with geomagnetic activity by using the planetary A index Ap. Other than the rather bizarre observation that the 30th of November seems to have been a good morning for East Asian DX for each of the last three years, I have not yet been able to find any obvious common circumstances behind each of these good openings. Table 1 doesn't really show us that these good DX mornings were related to geomagnetic activity or its lack, beyond the fact that no openings occurred as a major geomagnetic storm was taking place, i.e. the Ap index was not greater than 36 on the date of reception.

The rule of thumb that good high latitude conditions are preceded by prolonged periods of geomagnetic quiet has been popular among medium wave DXers, but is not borne out by this data. The rule is likely more applicable to paths through the auroral zone, such as those between western North America and Europe. It should be noted that the path from eastern Asia to the Pacific Northwest, although high latitude, runs to the south of that zone, so we really should not expect much absorption of signals from auroral activity except during geomagnetically stormy periods. However, that relatively clear path doesn't seem to guarantee good receptions. In fact, the last two weeks of December 1997 had quiet enough geomagnetic conditions to allow many receptions in Europe of western North American MW stations, yet good reception of HLAZ was limited to a single date during that period, so something other than a quiet geomagnetic field must determine reception of that station.

One could observe that the slightly fewer good openings in the last two DX seasons compared with the '97-98 season corresponded with increasing solar and geomagnetic activity as we approach the peak of the solar cycle, but it should also be noted that the strongest enhancement of HLAZ over the entire monitoring period was on 25 January 2000, after periods of minor geomagnetic storminess during the previous two days.

About 75% of these openings occurred when the solar flux was decreasing, and there does seem to be a preponderance in the above data set of good openings that recur after approximately one month, but any relationship between solar activity and sunrise enhanced signals seems difficult to establish. For example, the one month repetition rate in good receptions seems to be closer to 30 days rather to the solar equatorial rotation period of roughly 27 days. Unless someone wants to argue for a lunar influence on radio propagation, it's not certain where that leads us.

#### Vactrol replacements

Hermod Pedersen (hermod.pedersen@sydsvenskan.se) in a recent submission to the Topband Reflector (a 160 meter radio amateur group, information at http://www.contesting.com/FAQ/topband), pointed out that the Vactrol optocoupler used in Steve Byan's remotely terminated Beverage antenna design

(http://www.ultranet.com/~oakridge/Beverage\_info/RCT\_Beverage/RCT\_Be verage.html) and in some versions of the K9AY loop, has been discontinued. The company told him:

"The VTL3A series incandescent optocouplers were discontinued about 5-7 years ago. We do not have a direct replacement part. The only optocouplers we are making today are LED units. You could try our competitor Clairex at http://www.clairex.com . They have a part CLM310 that might be a close equivalent to our VTL3A27."

Unfortunately, there was no response from that group from anyone having experience with the Clairex unit. Mark Connelly describes how he is successfully using one of the LED style Vactrols for a variable termination of a Pennant antenna at http://members.aol.com/DXerCapeCod/pennant.htm I believe that Steve Byan originally specified the incandescent Vactrols because they were less susceptible to static discharge. The LED optocouplers are available from Allied Electronics (http://www.alliedelec.com/), and Hermod mentioned in his submission that they carried the following units: (Allied part no.) 980-0700 VTL5C1 (200 ~ 600 ohms for 40 to 10 ma input), 980-0705 VTL5C2 (200 ~ 800 ohms), 980-0715 VTL5C4 (75 - 125 ohms). Mark uses the latter one in his design.

Incidentally, Mark's Pennant article is very thorough and informative, so look at it if you have the chance. Mark also mentions that the July 2000 issue of QST has an article "Flags, Pennants and Other Ground-Independent Low Band Receiving Antennas" which provides more information on these antennas. (the Technical Column of Vol. 37 #14 gave a rundown of them too)

# Digital signal processing of recorded DX

Those of you with sound cards in your computers know that you can record and play back sound files; the exchange of such files with e-mail has enabled radio listeners to receive nearly instant identification of DX from listeners in other parts of the world. In a submission to Hard-Core DX

(http://www.kotalampi.com/hard-core-dx/), Bruce Fortzer (bportzer@home.com) mentioned the following tip:

"I've been trying DSP software on some old DX recordings. The two programs I've tried are DARTpro32

(http://www.dartpro.com/Products/New.asp) and Pristine Sounds 2000 (http://www.alienconnections.com/). Both are loaded with audio processing features and sell for about US \$100. You can download shareware versions from their web sites, the evaluation versions limit you to 30 seconds per recording but you can try most of the other features.

Both programs are good at improving the subjective listening quality of the recordings, in terms of reducing tape hiss, adjacent channel interference, atmospheric noise, and possibly electrical noise. However, you have to experiment with the settings many times before you get decent results (it's a lot easier to make a recording sound worse than it is to make it sound better!) Although the programs do make the recordings sound "cleaner", I've found very little improvement in readability. Sometimes there's a word or two I wasn't sure about that's now distinct, but that's about it."

This was in reply to a question from Guido Schotmans, who said that he had tried the following software for this purpose: Chroma Sound (http://www.siliconpixels.com), Swezey DSP (http://www.winternet.com/~swezeyt/dsp.htm), and CoolEdit (http://www.syntrillium.com/cep/prodemo.htm)

Jari Lehtinen (jln@jln.pp.fi), also contributing to HCDX, had this to say:

"I have been using CoolEdit96 as well as Goldwave and created a small DX-multimedia by digitizing audio samples with both tools. I noticed one important difference between Goldwave and Cooledit. In my ears - and probably with other ears too - CoolEdit noise reduction doesn't remove the background noise - especially if the original noise level is quite high, as it is in many DX situations. Cool Edit introduces a kind of "musical noise" in the background. If you didn't know the circumstances of recording, you would say that another station has suddenly appeared in the background, instead of white/brown/insert-your-favourite-colour-here noise. With different settings the result might be different. I am not saying that I am an expert with CoolEdit functions.

With Goldwave, the passband function is very helpful, and unlike CoolEdit, the depth of noise blanking gives a real digital-like reduction here. Practical example was the recording of Radio Morobe that suffered from low level atmospheric noise and crashes, and also from about 1.4 kHz tone. After editing the recording with Goldwave passband, ie. removing everything under 500 Hz and over 1 kHz, the voice of female announcer was stunningly clear compared to the original. Naturally, with just 500 Hz of audio frequency left, the sound was "narrow", but the readability improved drastically.

I would recommend Goldwave. At least I found its functions easy to learn and useful in practical situations. Goldwave is available from http://www.goldwave.com/ and various shareware download sites.

In another submission to HCDX, Vittorio De Tomasi (vdetomasi@tiscalinet.it) mentions:

"I did several experiments with homemade DSP systems and software to clean up DX recordings, with mixed results. The main reason is that the speech, music and so on that one wants to clarify is quite difficult to describe mathematically. The mathematical model of the signal used in much DSP is not sophisticated enough, and tries to describe the frequency spectrum of an incoming signal with a short polynomial approximation. The story is quite different if you want to process a CW signal; in that case you easily get very good results, because the signal model fits very well with the recorded signal!

I usually prefer to apply a properly cut band pass filter to the signal I receive. The sharp edges you can get from a DSP filter help a lot to remove noise without losing signal, and usually this is better than an adaptive noise reduction filter.

Adaptive noise reduction ("IMS" filters) work reasonably well on voice signals, but they need enough signal level to work, otherwise the filter will not be able to track the incoming signal. This type of filter works much better if a good AGC is placed in front of it (an audio AGC, not the RF one). [ed. note: "IMS", or "least mean square" filters work by comparing signal samples with previous digitally filtered samples to find the portion of the signal which is common to, or correlated, in all signal samples. The error signal generated by this comparison is then used to continually adjust the digital filter so that the error signal is minimized. The less error signal there is, the more the desired signal is in the clear]

I also tried frequency clipping (or spectral subtraction) filters

(so called Noise and Interference Reduction or "NIR" filters; a poor implementation is available in CoolEdit), but have found them inferior to adaptive filters, because they add too many artifacts to the signal (this is a consequence of the way they work).

Unfortunately, DSP noise reduction filters are not too effective when they are used after an AM detector."
