NOTICE OF UPCOMING ELECTIONS - Lee Freshwater, President

This is an advance notice to all members of IRCA that the election process for new officers for the 2001-2002 term will be beginning soon. Here is the calendar of events of importance to members as stipulated in the IRCA Constitution/Bylaws:

From December 1, 2001 thru January 15, 2001 nominations are open for President, Secretary-Treasurer, and the seven members of the Board of Directors. Only one nomination each for President, Secretary-Treasurer, and only seven nominations for the Board shall be allowed each IRCA member. An eligible member may nominate him/herself. All nominations must be submitted in written form (letter, fax or e-mail) to the Election Committee Chairman (ECC) by January 15, 2001.

The ECC will notify all nominees of their nomination by February 1, 2001. Each nominee (unless it is a self-nomination) must reply in writing (letter, fax, e-mail) if they accept their nomination, and each acceptance letter may include a campaign statement, not to exceed 20 bulletin lines in a March issue of DX Monitor. Campaign statements are not required. If a member is nominated for more than one office, he/she must decide which office, or offices, they choose to run for and may include a campaign statement for each office selected. All letters of acceptance and campaign statements must reach the ECC by February 20, 2001.

The campaign statements, in alphabetical order, and the ballot will be prepared by the ECC and sent to the Publisher by March 1 for distribution. All ballots must be received by the ECC no later than 0001, Mountain Local Time, May 1, 2001.

In addition to the balloting for the officers and Board of Directors, there will be voting for the 2001 Ted Vasilopoulos Award and the Ric Heald Award. As we get closer to the elections, there will be more information published on these two awards.

Also note that the Election Committee Chairman (ECC) is Reid Wheeler. His address is 5910 Boulevard Loop SE, Olympia, WA 98501-8408.

Pat Martin of Seaside, OR. sends along the following from Barry McLarnon (locale unknown):

There's a station on 1630 carrying the Westwood One feed of Monday Night Football. I missed the TOH ID at midnight EDT, but the call sign definitely started with a W. Good signal, about even with KCJJ right now. I'm pretty certain this would be WAWX in Augusta GA. (10/2/00-ye ed.) Check it out!

Pat also sends along the following:

1630 WAWX(WRDW) GA, Augusta, heard this new X Bander running the John and Ken show at 0355, then at 0359.55 a quick "WRDW-Augusta", into ABC net news. Good on top of KCJJ, 10/3. New. ID on tape. (10/3/00-ye ed.)

Pat sends along the following from Pat Griffith of Colorado:

I had a fantastic visit with KBLI/1620 Chief Engineer Carl Watkins this morning. He spent almost 4 hours showing me everything from the inside of the diplexer to a power up demonstration of the 1620 transmitter. As some of you may know (I didn't) 1620 is not actually on the air. They have only been on for testing and performance proof purposes. While driving in to Blackfoot last night I observed that they were not on. In fact about 45 minutes before local sunset KSMH in CA rose up from the background with a near local quality signal right on the outskirts of Blackfoot! I didn't know it but later last night (early this morning EST) KBLI did in fact come on the air for several hours for testing.

Mr. Watkins explained that they are having some problems with the proof. He believes that the problems are related to the antiquated tower and ground system which were constructed in the 1940s. He believes that the sections of the tower may have lost continuity and he plans to have the sections spot welded at the joints. If that doesn't help he may also have to replace part of the ground radials. The problem appears to be related to a varying feedpoint impedance at the tower. It also seems that when the 1620 transmitter is on at 10 kw it interferes with the telephone system and some other electronics in the studios which are only 40 feet away from the tower. These, as well as some paperwork problems with the FCC, are holding things up.

Before I talked to the CE, the GM told me they expected to have 1620 on with a regular schedule in 7 to 12 days. The CE was less optimistic. He also said they haven't made a firm decision on what the programming will be. He said they were trying to decide between

ESPN and a talk format. At any rate it will likely be automated, at least initially, since they don't have a studio available for 1620. 690 is presently automated and has no studio either.

Almost forgot, the CE from KBLI told me that he had talked to the CE from KXOL. He said KXOL was having problems getting their transmitter to power down to 1 kw at night for quite a while. Very interesting! I know a lot of you suspected they were running higher power at night even though they denied it.

He said it was powering down but would only go down to about 2 kw and that after numerous complaints they finally told the manufacturer to fix it or come and get it!

Pat sends along the following (Gary Jackson of Sacramento, CA. also added comments):

Per a phone call from Gary Jackson in Sacramento CA, KRCD 1500 Burbank, CA will be testing not on 1500 but on the X Band freq. of 1690 the last week of October and the first week of November 2000. The tests will be conducted during the day only with 1kW ND. Gary did not mention the hours of the tests, but if the tests are conducted near LSR or LSS, skip is possible and there isn't much on 1690 in the West except for a TIS or two. This information comes VIA Gary from Ed Stokes at QUAD 104 who will be conducting the tests.

Gary Jackson also passes on additional info regarding upcoming tests of KRCK-1500 (Burbank, CA) tests on 1690 khz. toward end of October: send reports to Mr. Edward Stolz, 801 K Street, Floor 27, Sacramento, CA. 95814, Gary mentions Mr. Stolz is very friendly towards DX ers and will verify all reports, and are part of Royce International.

Gary Larson of Burbank, CA. passes on info that with KRLA-1110 Pasadena, CA. going all sports that the new Fox Sports Net, a joint venture between Fox and Premiere networks, may eventually end up on KLAC-570 Los Angeles.

Gary Jackson passes on info that KIOQ-1030 Folsom, CA. will build their new xmtr and antenna in Sacramento County, they spent several years trying to build in Folsom, after they lost their antenna site, but they were unable to get permission.

Gary Jackson also sends along word that KRAK-1470 Sacramento, CA. is now simulcasting KNCI-FM Sacramento and will carry Imus in Morning 6 AM-10 AM weekdays, but ABC radio has no immediate plans for station format (rumor is it will go Radio Disney?)...

Pat Martin sends along the following:

1670 UNID Some station "very strong" running talk at 0430 EDT 10/24. Redding or Moreno Valley? Disappeared by 0435 Station was S9+10DB. Was strongest off EWE antenna, weaker off Eastern Beverage, so probably one of the CAs.

1670 KAZT (presumed) CA, Redding, //with 600 w/Sports talk at 0445 EDT 10/24. Signal now S9+20DB. Must be testing with 10KW. Unbelieveable signal. Stronger than any other X Bander tonight.

1670 KAZT CA, Redding, testing with 10 KW (presumed) as S9+20DB with ESPN Sports and ID at 0459.45 EDT 10/24 "Your Sports Leader in Redding is KNRO, AM 600" Into more Sports talk. Fantastic signal!

Pat sends along the following from Saul Chernos of Toronto, ON.: The 1250 CHWO Oakville ON switch-over to 740 Toronto is to take place immediately after the New Year" according to what DXers attending an Ontario DX Association tour of CHWO were told by station personnel.

740 of course will have a nostalgia format and will use the calls CFPT and slogan "Prime Time Radio".

The two stations are slated to simulcast until Feb 5, when 1250 CHWO will go all-religion (I assume Christian but do not know if other faiths will be included). 1320 in Mississauga ON will then go multilingual.

CJET Smiths Falls ON is still on 630 as of a few days ago. It has been approved to move to 92.3. Catch this one while you can - it's not an easy target (I've never heard it at Burnt River ON and I've tried).

Pat sends along the following from Mike Stonebridge of St. Isidore, AB:

CJXX-93.1 Grande Prairie, AB is up and running. Noted here earlier this AM with open carrier. Then about an hour later with C/W music. Had it on for about 3 hours while returning from Edmonton to hear that it is playing straight music, no ads, news or weather and definitely not paralleling the AM outlet. Every 10 mins or so there is a vocal announcement that says that you're listening to a test signal from the new CJXX-93.1 FM, and that the official sign on is November 1st at 8.00pm MST. At the moment I have no idea how much longer CJXX-840 AM will be on. If other new FM outlets are anything to go by, it'll be gone by the end of the year.

Pat sends along the following from Rich Toebe of Davis, CA.:
Did I miss this somehow? I noted Radio Unica on 990 last night
while tuning the dial, and find it on KATD this afternoon as well.
1010 KIQI sounds weaker than usual. Now, I just checked the Unica
website and found this news item dated 6/15! Unica has taken over
KATD, and is moving the station to Sacramento, so that the KIQI
coverage can be increased! Check the link:

KATD 990 will be Radio Unica soon and moving to the Sacramento market. (confirmed by ye ed. On 10/23/00)...

Pat sends along the following from Pete Taylor of Tacoma, WA.:
Anyone else getting a tone on 1640 10/23 2218? Both KPBC and KDIA
are readable and on frequency. KDYL-1280 (also Utah) was equal with
KIT at 2045 so that's why KBJA Sandy is likely. Tried to call but
the phone number in the old NRC log and the current M Street Journal
directory are invalid.

Pat sends along the following from Glenn Hauser of Enid, OK.: From Dino Bloise in Hollywood, as I translate:

A new station is about to go on the air in Florida, "Radio Aeropuerto Musical," WRHC on 1560 AM stereo with 50,000 watts and a musical format. This belongs to the Cuban Jorge Rodriguez who already owns "La Poderosa" 670 in Miami. (Dino)

I thought a station already existed on 1560, or 1550 (change of frequency without FCC permission), right? So this could be a change of ownership and/or format (gh)

Glenn, according to what he said in a special program, Sr. Jorge Rodriguez, owner of this station only lacks final approval from the FCC authorizing use of the new frequency 1560. In the short time I have been living here, I have not heard any signal on this frequency; it's empty (Dino Bloise, Oct 23, via Glenn Hauser)

Pat sends along the following from Russ Edmunds of Blue Bell, PA.:
The following is from DCRTV online: As of 10/21, Mega
Communications' 730 AM in Alexandria has picked up the Central
American/Mexican "Radio Capital" programming which is also on Mega's
WKDL (1050 AM) in Silver Spring. Currently the two AMers are
simulcasting, but expect 1050 to soon switch to the "Amor" Spanish AC
format currently being aired on WPLC (94.3 FM) in Warrenton. 1050
will become WPLC-AM, while 730 will take 1050's WKDL calls. 730's
former Spanish urban/tropical format can now be heard on Mega's
Prince Frederick outlet, 92.7, WBZS-FM. DCRTV also hears that Mega is
exploring the possibility of starting a Spanish all-news format in
the DC market; recently Mega started such a station in NYC..... Got
all that ?!

Pat sends along the following:

Does anyone have an address for this station?

1670 ARGENTINA, Buenos Aires, a great signal popped up from nowhere at 0900 UTC 10/14, with man in SS, followed by a woman with ID, mentioning "Buenos Aires, Argentina and "Ba Ba Ce" ID in SS. Anyone know the power on this? My third X Band Argentina. (PM-OR)

Pat sends along the following from Rich Toebe:

KRAK-1470 (Sacramento, CA.-ye ed.) ceased to exist as an independent station Monday at 6pm PLT when it began relaying sister station 105.1 KNCI. Apparently the station is being sold by Infinity to ABC-Disney (Radio Disney, anyone?). The staff was given minimal warning.

The calls are still KRAK, quickly given on the hour; otherwise you'll just hear references to KNCI.

Ye editor passes on additional information from Zeke Holst, PD. of Watt Radio-1670 AM Sacramento:

I didn't talk to Joey or Jim Hall about the KRAK sale. However, last Friday afternoon, I could tell something wasn't right cause Joey was sounding horrible...and I just knew what you had said was coming true. And, in this Tuesday's paper were your words about the sale to ABC/Disney. I wonder if they will be come a disney station? That is such a limited audience and this market is already quite fragmented.

Gary Jackson sends along additional information on this subject: So long, KRAK: It sells into the sunset By Dixie Reid Bee Staff Writer (Published Oct. 18, 2000)

A radio legend died this week in Sacramento. Gold Country KRAK (1470 AM) ceased to exist at 6 p.m. Monday after broadcasting country music for 38 years and 15 days. A spokesman for Infinity Broadcasting, the New York-based company that owns KRAK, confirmed Tuesday that the station was sold to ABC Radio. Until the deal is finalized early next year, KRAK likely will carry simulcast programming from sister station New Country 105.1 (KNCI FM), as it did Tuesday, and continue to air "Imus in the Morning" from 6 to 10 a.m. weekdays. ABC Radio has no immediate plans for the station's format. KRAK general manager Doug Harvill did not return The Bee's phone calls Tuesday. "Big" Jim Hall, who put in two decades at KRAK, said that 15 minutes before going on the air Monday morning, he was told of the sale and given the choice of doing his show or not. "I decided to do it, knowing I had four more hours in that legendary chair. I decided to take it all in," Hall said. He told listeners nothing about it being his last show until the final station break. "I talked about my role of almost 20 years there and the friends I had made. I thanked everybody for the dance, and then I played Garth Brooks' 'The Dance.' "The Tony Arata song, which was on Brooks' self-titled 1989 album, contains what Hall thought were appropriate

lyrics for the occasion: And now I'm glad I didn't know The way it all would end, the way it all would go. Our lives are better left to chance, I could have missed the pain But I'd of had to miss the dance." KRAK veteran Joey Mitchell, who spent 25 years at the microphone, had vertigo problems Monday and didn't go to work. Another DJ filled in. KRAK program director Don Langford soon rang his doorbell. "He said it wasn't a social call," Mitchell said. Langford, who also will be looking for work after next week, delivered the bad news and Mitchell's final paycheck. "I've lost my job," Mitchell said, "but even worse is that this station has been on the air since 1962. KRAK's call letters are legendary, and they're throwing them away." KRAK was a rock 'n' roll station before going country on Oct. 1, 1962. It was a powerhouse of sound, a 50,000-watt station that spread far and wide the music of such Nashville stars as George Jones, Kitty Wells, Loretta Lynn and Jim Reeves. Both Mitchell and Hall tell the story of a young singer and songwriter named Merle Haggard, who lived in Bakersfield in the early '60s. Late one night, after playing a gig at a country bar there, Haggard was working on his car and listening to the only country station he could pick up on the radio, KRAK. "All of a sudden," Hall said, "he heard the DJ say something about this new boy and the station's country pick hit of the week. It was 'Sing Me a Sad Song.' That was the first time Haggard ever heard himself on the radio." KRAK, with the nickname Gold Country, continued to play the music of "country legends," the artists whose work is largely ignored by "new country/fresh country" stations such as KNCI that focus on the latest tunes out of Nashville. KRAK twice won Billboard magazine's radio station of the year award, and Mitchell was named medium-market Country DJ of the Year in 1982. In the early 1990s, KRAK was one of four thriving country stations in Sacramento. It was found at 1140 on the AM dial, the position now occupied by sister station Sports 1140 (KHTK). To make room for KHTK, KRAK was moved in 1994 to 1470 AM, a frequency with a mere 5,000-watt signal. Sometimes the signal diminished to 1,000 watts on winter nights. KRAK management had planned to honor Mitchell for his quarter-century at the station with a \$35-per-person roast on Nov. 12. That now has been canceled, Mitchell said. Mitchell was at the station Tuesday, cleaning out his desk. "We had no ratings, but we made our budget every month. We were making money. This never gets any easier," he said of losing his job. "My wife said to me, 'When are you going to enjoy your success? You're always looking over your shoulder. ' " Mitchell, Hall and Langford have spent the past two days pondering their professional futures. Mitchell hopes the three can stay together and shop the Gold Country format to another station in town. Hall said, "More than me losing my radio job, my heart is broken because this very special radio station has gone away."

Rich Toebe passes on additional info:

I read the Dixie Reid article in the Bee that's delivered to my doorstep. I just love the ignorance she shows; catch the sentence "KRAK was moved in 1994 to 1470, a frequency with a mere 5,000 watt signal. Sometimes the signal diminished to 1000 watts on winter nights." My logbook shows 1470 became KOME in 1998; KRAK logged January '99.

Art Blair of Orangevale, CA. passes along the following:
Brother-in-law heard KNCI call sign on 1470 kHz and thought KRAK
had gone under. Truth is KRAK is // with KNCI 105.1 MHz.

"Newfie 2000": Another Excellent Adventure - Mark Connelly, WAIION From 26 to 29 October, 2000 I had the good fortune to attend the ninth Newfoundland DXpedition. This is the fifth one of these East Coast "DXtravaganzas" I've gone to; the previous ones were 1991, 1993, 1995, and 1998. The trip up there was routine: this was a good thing when you consider that on my last journey Air Canada had managed to lose important luggage for a day. The weather was occasionally rainy when I started my drive down Route 10 to Cappahayden around sundown. As things turned out, this was about as good as the weather would be. Normal en-route dial-scanning on the car radio revealed reasonably good conditions to northern Europe with "in your face" signals from Sweden, Norway, Russia-Kaliningrad, and others in the Baltic region. I was swapping between Trans-Atlantic DXing, checking easily-heard WCBS-880 for stock reports following the "Nortel plunge", and listening to the very enjoyable "Newfoundland music" format on CJYQ-930.

When I arrived at the DX Inn in Cappahayden that Thursday evening, I was greeted by local DXpedition host Jean Burnell and visiting US DXers Neil Kazaross and Jim Renfrew (our esteemed NRC IDXD editor). It was great to renew acquaintances with everyone and to be brought up to date on what had been heard so far. They mentioned that Canadian DXer John Fisher had been there earlier in the week. "receiver shack" room was all set up with two long tables that provided four operating positions. It wasn't long before I set up my "junk" next to Jim Renfrew's position and started sweeping the band. The two main "workhorse" antennas, the 1 km Brazil-Bev and the 500 m Euro-Bev were available, so I ran these to the inputs of my phasing unit. Sometimes I used a third Beverage, one of approximately 500 m that ran at a bearing 10 or 20 degrees more easterly of the Brazil-getter: this antenna could provide somewhat better African coverage than either of the other wires. Jean also had a K9AY antenna which he often had hooked to his receiving gear. Thursday evening's DX (going into Friday morning) included many huge TA's including a drifty Syrian on 831.5 and the new "Mega" Germans on 576 and 1575. Neil said "I'm going to get Turkmenistan on 279"... This distant longwaver had not been previously logged. Right on time, Turkmenistan-279 showed up at sign-on, parallel to its 5015 kHz shortwave outlet. We then requested Neil to declare that he was going to hear several other signals of substantially greater difficulty (Nepal, Saturn, etc.) in the "belief" that he had some magical powers with the ionospheric gods.

On Friday morning, Neil and I went out to do a bit of repositioning of the African antenna. The Lawlor's black Labrador retriever had great fun playing fetch with us with some of the wooden stakes that we'd brought out there for attaching strings to guy the Beverage support poles. Jean and Jim joined us to take a ride down to Trepassey for lunch. The fish plate I had was excellent, as always. The lunch also provided for a lot of good conversation that covered many common interests in and out of the radio hobby. As I attend more of these DXpeditions, I find that the camaraderie is even more valuable than the sounds that come through the headphones from faraway stations. The whole Newfoundland DXpedition experience is much more fulfilling than any of the many solitary DX sessions I do while sitting out in the car at a beach or pier somewhere.

Radios were fired up Friday afternoon just before 1800 UTC. Back in Massachusetts, the Trans-Atlantic channels seldom have more than two stations competing for dominance. The openings there are usually strongly dominated by signals from Spain, Portugal, France, Morocco, Algeria, Libya, Mauritania, the Canaries, and the Azores. Sometimes a good run towards the Middle East develops. British/Irish stations and the other big northern Europeans (e.g.

1314, 1386, 1422) can be loud, but they're not consistent on a nightly basis. Eastern Europeans are usually poorly represented for the kind of power some of them are running. Something with 500 kW from Russia is, at best, on par with something with 5 kW from Spain on the same channel. Generally the more northerly stuff doesn't compete with Iberia / North Africa until an hour or more after sunset.

In Newfoundland, DX is a bit different. The first signals that come in well before sunset are apt to be Norway-1314, Northern Ireland-1341, and Kaliningrad-1386 rather than the typical Saudi Arabia-1521 "band opener" noted pre-sunset at shore sites near home. At Cappahayden, once the big guns have been "in" for a while, the other channels fill up with stations. Rather than the typical one or two stations per channel noted at home, each channel can become a maelstrom of wildly-varying dominant stations. The pile-ups often consist of 5 or more stations and what's on top one minute can be hopelessly buried by something else the next. Central Europe and Russia can get "hot" and produce signals that blow away usual boomers like UK-1089. Expected "pests" from Spain and Morocco can often sound more like rare DX, deeply submerged below "killer" Russian, Hungarian, Czech, and Romanian stations. The Middle East can then come to life and drop Koranic chanting on top of the Europeans that had been "ruling the roost" moments earlier. The ebb and flow on the radio dial was much like the churning, crashing surf a short distance behind the "DX Inn". All of this dynamic vitality and unpredictability in reception conditions produces a level of excitement not likely to be duplicated by DXing elsewhere.

A few of that evening's highlights for me included the Iran clandestine on 1539.07, Botswana-909, and Angola-1484.55. These are all stations that I think may be audible back in MA on the right night. One that I doubt I'd ever hear is one we pulled up on 1233: a 200-watt Belgian normally used as a traffic information outlet. When noted at 0120 UTC, it was running an unlisted broadcast parallel to 1125. As at home, my main DX activity period was from two hours before sunset to two hours after sunset. The Trans-Atlantics were my main focus. Even with all the tea I drank, I still tended to want to go to sleep after 0430 UTC (2 a.m. local). Jim Renfrew turned out to be the "main man" for wee-hours DXing after 0600 UTC. This is when many of the best deep South American loggings were made: rare catches from Brazil, Argentina, Uruguay, Paraguay, and elsewhere. Neil and Jean also got into serious South American hunting at times. High-band Eastern Brazilians came in a bit before sunset: the huge 1 km wire pointed right at them glided these signals in by greatly reducing the European splash heard on the other antennas. It was cool to hear Brazilians "doing a job on" some of the Newfoundland stations when the Brazil-Bev was connected.

The rain and wind had got worse by Saturday morning. By midday, Neil and I went north to a new seafood restaurant in Cape Broyle, near Ferryland. I was served a platter with a large and delectable piece of salmon. We joined Jim back at the Inn. Jean had to go up to St. John's for a few hours. A possible strike was looming at Memorial University, his place of employment. The ever-worsening weather made us cancel a proposed set-up and test of a Pennant antenna. Neil is interested in setting up an array of pennants or K9AY's at his home QTH in the suburbs of Chicago. I took some pictures to put on the Web sometime.

Some DX signals were already rolling in at 1700 UTC. This was the first time I'd listened to Greenland on 720 with a decent signal. Hearing someone speaking Greenlandic was interesting, even though it sounded like some kind of a dull local meeting with the acoustics of the basement of a school or church. A heterodyne of a 1430 station against the 1431 kHz UK and Italian stations was noted at a time

(1830 UTC) too early to be a domestic. In a few minutes it got loud and overwhelmed 1431. I had been looking on 1431 for Iran parallel to 15084 shortwave: it turned out that the 1430 station was this Iranian, precisely 1 kHz low of its nominal frequency - seemingly too accurate a separation to be an accidental drift. I then found a reference to this 1430 Iranian in a recent "Medium Wave News" that Jim had brought. A little later that evening, back-home local WXKS-1430 faded up. It was a memorable and "daft" sounding reception when Iran's Koran recitation and WXKS's "Music of Your Life" Sinatra nostalgia and Boston mentions were blending evenly in an incongruous mix on 1430. That evening we all enjoyed a good run of Turks with parallel signals on 765, 891, 954, 1017, and 1062. The new Libyan on 972 had a butt-kickin' signal that I'm sure would soon make it to one of my DXpedition sites on Cape Cod with little difficulty. Madeira-1125 came through well when I couldn't hear the other ones on 531 and 603. For music and for general "local flavour", it's hard to beat the lower-powered British locals. These came through in great abundance and spiced up the general entertainment value of the listening experience. At home these little stations are at a far greater deficit to co-channel Spaniards of comparable power, so I don't get to enjoy them the way I can in Newfoundland. With domestic DX, I always have fun checking out how my home locals do at a long distance. WEEI-850 and WNRB-1510, along with a couple of Maine stations, were typically the earliest US stations to build up to a strong signal level about 2000 UTC: better than an hour before sunset on their end. This is comparable to the time that big-gun Trans-Atlantics would start to show at coastal sites in eastern Massachusetts. Before signing off, WMEX-1060 bombed in with a Boston-accented show that made me laugh when I heard the expression "people's republic of Cambridge" often used by conservative talkshow hosts and local politicians like Albert "Dapper" O'Neil. As always, the biggest US signals were from the Boston and New York City 50 kW blasters; that's also what I'd noted from Ireland back in 1977. My Saturday night activity wound down by about midnight local. I had to pack up my gear and get a few hours sleep so I could depart Cappahayden at 5 o'clock on Sunday morning.

I knew it was going to be a rough ride back to the airport that Sunday because heavy rain was moving horizontally on 110 km/h wind gusts. The normal 1 hour 45 minute ride took 2 hours 30 minutes. Some excellent Irish-Newfie tunes on CJYQ soothed me for what would have otherwise be a harrowing journey in hurricane-like weather from darkness into dim dawn light. Luckily I reached the airport gate in St. John's on time. I'd read (from other's previous experiences) that pilots could negotiate these conditions ably, though I had my doubts. I walked to the airport door feeling like I was in a boxing match with the wind-driven rain and ice pellets. The airport, under renovation, had some serious roof leaks: large plastic trash bins were strategically placed to catch the indoor cascades. Take-off at 8.40 a.m. local was remarkably smooth. Less than two hours later I was in Halifax: it was raining there as well. The second flight of that day got me back to Boston by noon. I was surprised to be greeted there by even colder temperatures and snow flurries. people figured I'd brought the "Great White North" back home with me. One huge storm system in the sea south of Nova Scotia covered the entire area from Newfoundland and Labrador to New England and New York. Local broadcasters called it a cool weather version of the tempest that was featured in the 1999 "Perfect Storm" film.

And so another enjoyable DXpedition goes into the history books. Jim Renfrew mentioned having logged 120 countries himself during the Dxpedition so it looks like Jean Burnell will have much material for the Big Report he's going to assemble after participants prepare their loggings and human-interest narratives.

During spring and summer, the station experiences up to 20 hours of daylight at its high latitude, but in winter as much as 20 hours of darkness. With the increase of static, electrical noise, and interference, the station does not get out as much as previously did (Catholic Radio Update 74, 7/29/00 via MWC)

AUSTRALIA: 3AB Melbourne 1116 moved to FM around mid August, paving the way for 3AK to move early next year. (Richard Jary, HCDX) 3AK will move to 1116 on 1/1/01, and will simulcast 1503 until 2/28 when the freq. will be available for a community station. Additional Melbourne narrowcast stations are expected on 1422 & 1593 (NZDXT) 2AM Sydney 1620 is now IDing as 2KM and playing oldies. Apparently 2KY 1017 has taken over the station (it is co-sited with the 2KY 1017 transmitter), and is now running its own. QSL route for this new station is *not* via John Wright, but presumably via 2KY 1017 Racing Radio. 1134 Avtoradio, Khabarovsk. Avtoradio is the new name for this station in Khabarovsk (ex- R. Nostalgie, ex- R. Invar). Retransmitting px from Moscow. (Guzei 25.06.2000 via EuroLog 5.8.2000) 765 R. Khabarovsk (?). New one on this frequency. Schedule:08-20 local time. Power 10 kW. License holder Teleradiokompania 'Delovoy

Mir'. (Guzei 25.06.2000 via EuroLog 5.8.2000) 1413 Russkoye Radio, Khabarovsk, new one on this frequency. Schedule 08-21 local time. (Guzei 6/25 via EuroLog)

THAILAND: Effective 9/1, Bangkok-918 is in English 2200-1600 mostly w/uninterrupted pop mx, Ids after top of hour as "R Thailand, the Sound & the Soul of Thailand" and occasionally as R Thailand Network 3, is //4830/6070/7115 & at least during evening on Pattani-1296. (Davies, Arctic)

VIETNAM: 740 correction to last issue (cf. Cambodia): This frequency has the VoV 2nd prgr. 1089 On further listening, I now believe the provincial station I reported last time on 1089 is Kien Giang rather than neighboring An Giang. At present I am observing the following from the Voice of Vietnam national services in Vietnamese: 1st Program: 2200-1600 (Fri -1700) on 594, 630, 648, 657 (s), 666, 675 (h), 690 (m), 711 (w) 2nd Program: 2200-1600 on 549, 558v (s), 702v (l), 729, 740, 783 (w) h: probably in Hanoi area

- 1: may also carry local opt-out programming
- m: also carries portions of the 4th network in minority languages s: believed to be in the Ho Chi Minh City (Saigon) area, WRTH lists location as Quan Tre
- w: believed to be in SW Vietnam, putting very powerful daytime signals into Cambodia & east coast of Peninsular Malaysia; there are also strong signals on 873 (apparently local programming in Vietnamese and Cambodian) and 1242 (external service) which appear to originate in the same area.

Their web-site (http://www.vov.org.vn/docs1/english/index.html) is rather out of date, but more or less corresponds with the above. They also list the first network on 945 and the 2nd on 1089. I haven't heard either, the only VTN station heard on 1089 being the ?Kien Giang local mentioned above. (Alan Davies in Thailand, 9/24, via HCDX)

TRANS ATLANTIC

FRANCE: Radio France is integrating three programs into a single one: Radio Bleue, Le Mouv and the network of local and regional stations become a single network called France Bleu. "France Bleu" is carried 24 hours a day but only on the few outlets that were on the air at night before the change: 1242, 1404, 1494 and 1557. The "national" version of "France Bleu" is from 5 AM to 7 PM on MW (except for the frequencies mentioned above, which remain on permanently) and on FM from 7 PM to 6 AM. Between 6 AM and 7 PM FM carries the local editions of France Bleu. The few regional optouts on MW (such as mass on Sundays on the Lyon station on 603 for example) will probably remain, which means that the so-called national version still isn't carried nationwide at all times. (Rémy Friess Montbeliard - France, via MWC 9/4)

GERMANY: Mega Radio has commenced programming on 576 from a site near Schwerin. Hip-Hop and Techno music. They intend to fire up almost all extinct frequencies of former GDR using powers of 1000 kW. I keep my fingers crossed that they are bankrupt before this happens. 576 is using a power of 250 kW. (Martin Elbe, HCDX, 8/28) Mega Radio fired up their second transmitter on 1575. Listed with a daytime-power of 250 or 500 kW and 1 Megawatt during nighttime. This will cause severe interference to the excellent TA frequencies 1570 and 1580. Location of the transmitter site is Burg near Magdeburg, about 50 or 60 km from my location. Judging from the signal strength I think they are not on full power yet, sounds like 50 or 100 kW.

Bad enough. (Martin Elbe, HCDX, 9/2)
AFN Germany operates parallel programming on 1143, 1107 & 873 at night, apart from local community messages e.g. at 2351 when all three transmitters carried separate local community information for about 1 minute. This formed the first half of an advert break in the satellite fed country music show that AFN was relaying. The second half of the break was AFN networked so all transmitters were in parallel. The local information seems to be precise enough to positively identify the transmitter you are listening to. (Steve Whitt via MWC e-mail news 8/13)

HUNGARY(?): 1188 An unidentified transmitter was heard from 9/23 with Radio Drina and B2-92 relays. Radio Drina is an FM station located in Bosnia-Hercegovina and B2-92 is the former Belgrade station that was closed by the Yugoslav authorities on 5/17 and has resumed broadcasting via Radio Drina. Programs are in Serbian. It has been reported that the station announced as follows: "Radio B2-92 programs can also be heard on the AM waves of Radio Sombor on 666 and 1188." Speculations are that the transmission on 1188 originates from Hungary or from the Bijeljina area of Bosnia-Hercegovina. R. Drina on inquiry says that 1188 is located in Hungary. The programme has been confirmed on 666 (from 2200) by Mauno Ritola, Finland. (Various sources.) This could be a temporary arrangement for election reports. 1188 may be the otherwise silent Szolnok transmitter in Hungary. (Olle Alm, Arctic)

MADEIRA: RDP Madeira still is active around the clock with relays of RDP Antena 1 program on 531, 603, 1125 and 1332. They have local programs during the morning. The signal on 531 is coming from Porto Santo Island. 603 is transmitted from Madeira Island but can also be heard well on Porto Santo. Posto Emissor do Funchal transmits on 1530 (//1017 Santana). They have a different program on 92.0 FM. The station recently celebrated its 50th anniversary. During the evening they relay Deutsche Welle in Portugese. From 2315h local time and during the night relay of Radio Renascença. 1530 also reaches neighboring Porto Santo Island in a good signal quality. Estação Rádio de Madeira, which used to transmit on 1485 (// 96.0 FM), currently is off the air after it was bought by another local station. Btw: The listed relay of Rádio Turista with programs in several European languages was non-existent already during a stay on Madeira three years ago. (Harald Kuhl via MWC e-mail news 25.08.00)

MAURITANIA: Nouakchott now hrd in Europe & Eastern NA on 783 ex 1349 //4845 until 0100 s/off (Various) MOLDOVA Moldovan state radio has eliminated its night broadcasts as of 8/8 due to a lack of funds, Romanian Radio reported the previous day. As of 8/14, the radio's second channel is also to be eliminated, while medium-wave broadcasts will be cut from 18 to 8 hours daily. The radio will continue its regular, 18 hours of daily broadcasts only on FM. The radio's management says the measures are "temporary" and due to MoldRadio being some \$1million in debt to the state company that relays the broadcasts. MoldRadio's entire budget for 2000 is \$2 million. (RFE/RL 8/8) I can add that the Chisinau tx on 1593 (RM1) which is still listed in WRTH2000, now is completely off the air. Since a longer time already it was switched on only for the night prgr from 2200. (Bernd Trutenau, MWC) Moldova has reactivated the frequency 873, heard today at 0300 with news in Rumanian, also on the September 19 about 1945. (Erich Bergmann, Ansbach, Germany, via HCDX)

NETHERLANDS: 675 According to a recent verification received the postal address of Radio10FM is: Postbus 910, 1000 AX Amsterdam. The

Internet site of Radio10FM is: www.radio10.nl. (Henk Poortvliet via HCDX 102)

1557 On board the former Laser vessel, the MV Communicator, which still has a berth at Almere harbour, a second transmitter will be put in the hole. Next to the 1224, which is used for the station Q the Beat, a second transmitter will be on for the station Colourful Radio. In the future the 1557 will be used for them. (Via Paul Bowery, MWC 9/12/00)

1584 According to Radiovisie, 1584 AM The Bells has changed its name to Radio Paradijs (Paradise in English) on August 31st. This was done because the owners believed that 1584 AM The Bells was too difficult a name for the audience. (Herman Boel via MWC e-mail news 04.09.00)

NORWAY: To celebrate the opening, NRK presented a special broadcast in Norwegian and English aired exclusively via this new transmitter on 10/6 between 1900 and 2300. The transmitter was switched on for the first time on 9/27 with reduced power, increased the following da to full power, 100 kW. As from Sunday October 1st the transmitter is in full operation, running 24 hours. The permanent program feed of NR Europakanalen with inserts of regional programs from NRK Finnmark was established on 10/3. From the initial feedback to longwave@dxlc.com, we've learned that the special broadcast on the 6th was received as far as 1500 km away on the Gotland Island in the Baltic Sea and on Newfoundland Canada, around 4500 km away! Ingøy Kringkaster (The Ingøy transmitter station) has been equipped with a new 100 kW Telefunken transmitter remotely controlled from Norway's AM control center at Kvitsøy. The antenna mast is among the tallest manmade constructions in Europe, and definitely the tallest on Norwegian soil. It is a 362-meter high steel construction. Including stays it weighs more than 300 tons. Surrounding the mast, 44 km of copper cables have been spread to form the best possible earthing. The station has its own 600 kW generator to provide sufficient power to both the station and all the homes on Ingøy during power failures from the mainland. In rough winters this is not uncommon. The total cost of Ingøy Kringkaster is estimated around 25 million NOK (2.75 million USD). Ingøy Kringkaster, like the rest of the Norwegian AM-transmitters will carry the NRK Europakanalen program. This is a mixture of domestic channels P1, P2 and P3, a daily hour of Radio Norway International, and some exclusive weather forecasts. Apart from Kvitsøy, the other AM'ers in addition to Europakanalen relay regional programs from their area. Ingøy Kringkaster will include programs from NRK Finnmark in Vadsø. The old medium wave transmitter in Vadsø on 702 (20 kW) will be closed by the end of the year. Inggy is located at 71°06'N, 23°50'E. The building of a new high powered AM-station in northern Norway is the result of decades of lobbying from pressure groups. The 1978 Geneva frequency plan brought changes to the usage of medium and longwave in Norway. Until then a few high powered transmitters and a large number of low powered fillers were used to cover the country. By the mid 70s the network of VHF- transmitters basically had replaced AM for domestic broadcasting, and the new frequency plan eliminated all the AM fillers and boosted power of a few remaining allocations, which were primarily intended for reaching remote parts of the country, neighboring countries and the oceans surrounding the country. The first superpower station was built, Kvitsøy with its 1.2 megawatt transmitter on 1314. Then NRK decided not to pursue their usage of AM, and gradually closed 216 in Oslo and 153 in Tromsø without replacing them with the proposed new high power plants. Pressure for a better radio coverage of the Arctic oceans where Norwegian fishery is still an important industry have never ended, and eventually NRK, together with the Ministry of Fisheries,

entered a long term agreement with Norwegian transmission facilities provider Norkring to rent transmission time on a new longwave transmitter in the county of Finnmark. Stage one of this plan was completed last spring with the old 675 transmitter at Bodø being replaced by a new 20 kW unit on the island of Røst improving reception along the northwestern coast, and now Ingøy will improve the coverage of the Barents Sea immensely. Ingøy Kringkaster will provide a daytime signal almost reaching Spitsbergen. (HCDX)

POLAND: Today I received, from the Polish company named Polskie Fale |rednie S.A., the following message regarding their plans relating to MW broadcasting in Poland; it may be of some interest for those who are expecting Polish MW DX-ing in the near future. "Our company has been incorporated with the purpose of realization of the project aimed at reviving the medium wave in Poland. In 1998 we convinced National Board of Radio and Television Network (KRRT) to launch the licensing process. We filed the license motions requesting the granting of 92 licenses. At the moment, after granting us with these licenses (in March 2000) we are waiting for necessary clearance from Ministry of Communication. It appeared that September 2000 is a quite real timing for launching the first breed of radio stations, but the matter stuck in PAR (Polish Radio Agency) - maybe due to holiday time !? When the legal circumstances allow us to broadcast, we start with two locations: Lipsko near Pu awy and Kluczbork. Both stations on 963 with the power of 100 W. Other frequencies are: 521, 531, 1062, 1332, 1395, 1413, 1485, 1584, 1602, but it is impossible to estimate at the moment, when they start. I know as well, that TP S.A. is conducting currently the study project in Gliwice station (with the wooden mast renown due to the so called 'Gliwice provocation in 1939"); the project's area of interest concentrates on the antennas suitable for low-powered MW stations. Witold Parzonka" (Krzysztof Rybus, Poland, HCDX)

RUSSIA:153, 261 Transmissions from Taldom were resumed on 30th August. Most probably this was at least in part caused by the Ostankino TV tower fire that took the channels off the FM band. (OA) 666 BBC WS via Yekaterinburg. On July 1st, after 7 years on 1260 this station moved onto 666. (Guzei 01.09.2000 via EuroLog 11.9.2000)

990 R. Slavyanka, Moscow. This radio station of the Ministry of Defence of Russia has schedule: Mo-Fr 1100-13.00. (Klub-DX 16.07.2000 via EuroLog 6.8.2000)

1053 R. Maria, Fund "Radio Mariya", nab. Kanala Griboedova, d. 82, kv. 25, 190068 St. Petersburg. Their schedule: (10 kW ND) 24 h a day. (Mikhail Timofeyev, St. Petersburg via HCDX 64)

1161 R. Orfey, Volgograd, reported to be inactive but heard around 9/11 // 1152, 1125, so it is back on the air. (OA)

1269 Radio Ussuri, Ussuriysk, new one here, previously on 1503 as R. Ussuriysk. (Klub-DX via EuroLog 8/6/00)

1386 LBH Radio, Kaliningrad. Acc to the QSL-card received today, LBH Radio returns to the air on Oct 1st. They do not mention the freq, but I guess 1386. (Stefan Björn-SWE, Sep 7, in BC-DX 482)

1386 Avtoradio - Narodnaya Marka, Irkutsk. This frequency in Irkutsk is now relaying the national edition of Avtoradio from Moscow.

Earlier occupant Radio Avtos is now only on FM (106,4 MHz). (Klub-DX 16.07.2000 via EuroLog 6.8.2000)

1386 Radiostation "L-centr", Stavropol, closed broadcasting on 1386. (Guzei via RUS-DX 86-C)

1503 Ekho Moskvy, Ussuriysk. For Radio Ussuriysk, earlier using this frequency, see 1269 above. (Klub-DX 7/9) Radio Rossii, the Russian main state broadcasting network, has just changed its program format. One and the same prograwithout any "time shifted versions"

is on the air 24 hrs a day starting on Sept 4th (there were five 20 hrs a day R Rossii versions with s-on at 1700, 1900, 2100, 2300 and 0100 in the summer - one hour later in the winter). (Mikhail Timofeyev-RUS, Sep 4, in BC-DX 482) Radio Rossii has also adopted an on the hour musical signature consisting of the first bar or so of the National Anthem played on a xylophone-type instrument. (Dave Kernick via HCDX 109)

SLOVAKIA: The first home service program is now called "Rádio Slovensko" (Radio Slovakia), ex Slovensko 1 (S 1). Main xmtrs: 702 Banska Bystrica/Laskomer (200 kW), 702 Presov/Haniska (200 kW), 1098 Nitra/Velke Zaluzie (750 kW) The new name might be now confused with R Slovakia International, a foreign svc of the Slovak Radio. (Honzek, HCDX)

UNITED ARAB EMIRATES: R Asia is operating on 1152 from Ras Al Khaimah-UAE with 200 kW. It is for Indian expatriates in the Gulf and progrs are in Hi, Ur and Malayalam. I have monitored it from time to time here in IND but they did not reply to my report. Their address is Dolphin Recording Studio, Box 8588, Dubai, UAE. Though this stn has been operating for several years now, I could not find it listed in WRTH. (WWDXC Topnews)

UNITED KINGDOM: The Orfordness 648 beam is targeted on 130 degrees. The gain of the 5 mast antenna array is 5.3 dB. Looking at the plot of the hrp there's a nibble up the North Sea- good reception in Aberdeen then the next pulse is towards the tip of Norway then the main beam with 130 degrees running through Luxembourg. Reception is for all the EU former Common Market countries day and night. The 1296 antenna is a 6 mast affair and is set to 96 degrees. The gain is 8 dB. Looking at the plot there is only one minor side lobe towards central Denmark. The main beam is Dusseldorf/ Prague. The night time service is intended for Poland, Czech Republic and the former East Germany. Daytime of course it all Benelux. The beam is non moveable on 648. On 1296 minor adjustments are possible and a "slew" of 10 degrees either side is technically possible but the two transmitters prefer to be on the 1296 true bearing as the system is then well balanced. On both antennas there is negligible back radiation into the UK except for bits of East Anglia and Kent. 1296 is much tighter on back radiation than the 648 service. (Mike Barraclough, Letchworth, England via Guido Schotmans) The new 17th edition of RADIO STATIONS IN THE UNITED KINGDOM (ISBN 09514723-9-9) is now available from the British DX Club. RADIO STATIONS IN THE UK is a comprehensive 56 page directory of mediumwave and FM radio stations in the UK. It covers all BBC, independent and long-term restricted service license services and is a must for anyone interested in UK domestic radio - either as a casual radio listener or specialised DXer. This edition again includes a free supplementary guide to radio stations in the Republic of Ireland.
