CPC DX tests

Thank you Lynn and Blaine for arranging tests for us this season!!

WGSR-1570, Fernandina Beach, FL - tested Saturday, February 3, 2001 from 12:00 - 2:00 am EST:

Stephen Howe in St. Albans, VT and Menands, NY, Neil Wolfish and Saul Chernos at Burnt River, ON (100 mil NE of Toronto), Bob Foxworth in Tampa, FL, Nigel Pimblett in Medicine Hat, AB and Barry McLarnon in Ottawa, ON all report hearing the test - or at least a CW ID. Frank Aden in Boise, ID and Stig Hartvig Nielsen in Eastern Jutland, Denmark both reported that they heard what *might* have been the test. Morris Soresen in Winnipeg, MB was unable to hear the test due to too much CKMW, Jim Renfew in Byron, NY heard no sign of WGSR on the frequency, Rick Lewis in Phoenix, AZ and Kevin Redding in Mesa, AZ tried for the test but didn't hear it, as did Chuck Boehnke in Keaau, HI and Pete Taylor in Tacoma, WA.

WILM-1450, Wilmington, DE - tested Sunday, February 4, 2001 from 12:00 - 2:00 am EST:

Gordon Bell near Troy, NY heard this test well and sent a detailed report. Stephen Howe in St. Albans, VT and Menands, NY says that WILM was very weak, but there was no sign of previously-heard CHUC on the frequency. Neil Wolfish and Saul Chernos in Burnt River, ON heard what they thought was the test at about 0015 ELT. Tim Noonan in Madison, WI reported that he tried for the test but was unable to hear it.

WGAI results: (* - NRC reflector, used by permission)
*Mike Brooker, Toronto ON: The WGAI-560 test was heard, with code
IDs at 2358 EST. Frequency dominated by CFOS (almost a groundwave).
Unusual to run a test before midnight. I thought tests had to take
place after 0000 local time. Or has yet another FCC regulation been
trashed?

Eric Bueneman: The test from WGAI-560 Elizabeth City, NC was not heard; only WIND and WHBQ were heard at this location.

*Steve Francis, Alcoa TN: WGAI-560 heard with code at both low and high pitches.

*Barry McLarnon VE3JF: WGAI-560: No problem hearing this one - the code was audible almost immediately after I tuned in around 2333, and I could hear it more or less continuously until midnight. It varied in slow fading from barely discernable to "armchair copy". On a few occasions I noticed a more abrupt change that I thought could have been a power/pattern change. The text of the code message was TEST DE WGAI (X5) ON 560 KHZ IN ELIZABETH CITY, NC TEST DE WGAI (X5). I also heard some musical WGAI IDs. Just a few stations, such as CFOS and WFIL, competing, plus a loud het from Spain on 558!

*Ronald Gitschier, Jacksonville FL: Feb-18-01, 0100-0200 eastern. Test heard in Jacksonville, Florida (Mayport Naval Station). Consisted of several minutes of morse code. Miami WQAM semi-dominant with ESPN programming, code punched in through the much really well. Did not hear jingles or Music CD that was on from 1:30AM eastern. GE Superadio III and RS DX 398 both barefoot. Called station, CE/OM Bob Carter stated he was using his night facility, 500 watts directional. Good catch, sold me all the more on the use of Morse Code IDs for tests, it really stood head and shoulders above the mud. At 2:31 AM WQAM 560 is dominant with ESPN programming. *David J. Twiggs: Just a quick note to let you know the saturday night test was making it into Bristol, CT., (20 miles west of Hartford.) Saturday night I set the frequency to 560, turned the volume to a moderate level and fell asleep... at 01:04 am Bastern Sunday morning I woke briefly to hear the WGAI CW ID on top of the jumble ... The other dominate station was CFOS Owen Sound, ONT. Happily satisfied I rolled over and went back to sleep. Radio here is Yaesu FRG-7 and the antenna is a Terk Loop... a small 9" loop.

strength, but encountered less interference.
*Kent Plourde, Bristol CT: I heard the WGAI Friday night test also from Bristol, CT. It was mostly in code with jingles interspersed. I heard one slogan at 2336, "WGAI, proud of the past ... excited about the future" and "WGAI Elizabeth City". I also heard WHYN Springfield MA IDing at the top of the hour. I was using a CCRadio barefoot.

*Rick Kenneally, Wilton CT: WGAI-560 - heard code IDs, but deep under CFOS-ON and others. Code "WGAI WGAI..." - didn't copy much more than that. The test back in 3/98 was similar in signal

*David Hochfelder, New Brunswick NJ: WGAI test on Friday/Saturday; caught it from midnight to 0030. No audio here, because of local WFIL Philadelphia on the channel. I nulled it as much as possible, and got limited copy of the frequent CW ID's, including the phrase "...BETH CITY, NC TEST DE WGAI" with the call letters repeated several times. I assume that "...BETH" was the tail end of "ELIZABETH." After WGAI cut power or changed pattern at 0030, I caught a bottom of the hour ID from CFOS, Owen Sound, ON, a new one for me. All in all, a great night on a channel on which I thought I'd logged everything I could hear under WFIL.

WFBS results:

*Barry McLarnon VE3JF: WFBS-1280: This was much tougher - 1280 was a graveyard-like jumble, with only WHTK in Rochester NY standing out of the crowd. However, I heard bits of the WFBS code ID at around 0020-0021, and again at 0041-0043. The call letters were repeated many times with two different tone frequencies - the higher of the two cut through the QRM better. I also heard some oldies (e.g., "Honeycomb" by Jimmy Rodgers, and a Buddy Holly tune), but I have no idea whether they came from WFBS.
*Rick Kenneally, Wilton CT: WFBS-1280 - surprisingly, local WADO-NYC

almost non-existent here northeast of New York. Heard code IDs, both high and low pitch. Heard odd calliope(?) music at 0528Z - don't know if this was WFBS or not. Someone asked who had "Yesterday" by Beatles - this was WFAU, Gardiner, ME. Also on channel were WHTK, Rochester; WADO, NYC; and CFYZ, Toronto (only 99 watts?).

*David Hochfelder, New Brunswick NJ: Nothing on the 1280 Berwick, PA test on Saturday night/Sunday morning. Jumble, including dominant WADO New York.

*Bob Klinger, New Cumberland PA: I was trying for the WFBS test tonight. Hearing WADO most of the time. I am getting something under though! At 12:05 AM I could hear I believe it's Herb Albert and his song called "Honey" or Taste of Honey" I am not sure of title. I also heard a man say... "thanks for Lee.....??????. I live maybe 30 to 50 miles give or take from Berwick, PA. I also thought I heard the Beatles "Yesterday"! Can anybody confirm these?
*Mike Brooker, Toronto ON: I heard some code at 0043 EST. I haven't played back the tape yet, but presume it's a code ID. Thus far (0055EST) I haven't been able to pull any mx out from under a nulled CFYZ and WADO.

Note: effective today, 1/18/01, Te Desert Radio Group has done a
format flip-flop on some of their local stations. The news-talk
format "K-News" is now on 970 KNWQ Coachella (New calls) and 1140
KNWZ Palm Springs. The Nostalgia format formerly on 970/1140 has
moved to 1010 (formerly KNWZ) and is now "10-10 Memories" KCMJ,
Thousand Palms. So the KCMJ callsign, which has been in use here
since 1946, has moved back to the original frequency, but with a new
city of license".

Terry Krueger (location unknown) passes along the following:

The local station on 570 kHz in Pinellas Park, Florida is silent - but likely only briefly. The former format was audio relay of CNN Headline News, but beginning next week it is supposedly become an affiliate of the Business Talk Radio network. The station (WTBN now, as per the St Petersburg Times on January 24) will also enter into a joint venture with WFLA-Channel 8 TV, which will provide news and weather. (They are moving into the same building that Channel 8 and the Tampa Tribune share.) Very loud in absence is the Radio Reloj affiliate from Santa Clara, Villa Clara province in Cuba local daytime (probably second strongest Reloj outlet next to 950).

Pat Martin of Seaside, OR. sends along the following re KUPL-970 Portland, OR.:

Not a peep of an ID on several tries today. No IDs at TOH or 10 minutes on either side. Just "The new 970, Cruisin' oldies" I tried to phone, but the old number wasn't any good. I'll have to work on this. They have not given any calls, just "The new AM 970, Cruisin' Oldies". I check several times at the TOH and also 10 mines on each side. The phone number wont work, so I am going to have to work on this.

I called 970 and they still are KUPL, no call letter change.

Air Time: It's likely Imus needs new home

Don Imus soon may be homeless in Sacramento. His nationally syndicated talk show, "Imus in the Morning," airs locally on KRAK (1470 AM), a station that has been sold to ABC Disney.

The programming on Radio Disney's new KIID (1470 AM) will target youngsters 12 and younger and the moms 25 to 54 years old who are driving them to soccer practice and ballet lessons. No launch date has been set for the new programming.

It's certain there's no place for the acerbic Imus in such a kidfriendly format. Word has it that his syndicator, Westwood One, is shopping the show to other Sacramento stations. One that isn't interested is his previous home, KHTK Sports (1140 AM).

Doug Harvill, general manager of both KRAK and KHTK, said he has no spot for Imus, whom he moved to KRAK in October 1999 and replaced with the Rise Guys.

"I wish we could do it," Harvill said. "It's a great show."

KIID will be the 49th Radio Disney station in the nation and the seventh in California. "We're in 17 of the top 20 markets," spokesman Marti Spisak said. "The way we're going, we'll be in the other three very soon. It's only our third year, and we're growing."

Radio Disney programming features about 70 percent Top 40 music (such as Britney Spears, 'N Sync, Backstreet Boys) and 30 percent of what Spisak calls "wooly-bully, twist-and-shout, 'YMCA,' 'Big Chill' stuff."

"There was a need for this type of station, one that parents can put their kids in front of and don't have to worry about the content," Spisak said. "They know it'll be safe and kid-friendly.

"I really pushed for a station in Sacramento. I lived there for 10 years, went to Sac State and was director of marketing for KFBK. I love Sacramento. It's a great radio town and a great family town." (Note: ye ed checked 1470's website (KNCI-FM, KRAK's sister station) and it is currently down while it is being moved, per message on site, as of 2/2/01).

Rich Toebe adds the following:

Today's Bee (2/2-ye ed. has a notice that KRAK will flip to Radio Disney and KIID calls; no date was given. It was also mentioned that Imus will be gone from the Sacramento market as a result; no other talk station has room for him. (See article above-ye ed.)

Checked KRAK this evening; still CWM, // 105.1 KNCI. I'll bet that the change comes Monday. Just seems like a good time for the change, hi... The article also said that 3 more markets were coming online soon, wonder who they are? (2/1/01-ye ed.).

Dennis Gibson of Santa Barbara, CA. passes along the following:
The top of the hour ID on 970 in Bakersfield at 10:00 this morning
(1/31/01-ye ed.) was "KKDJ Delano/Bakersfield; KZPM Bakersfield".
The format is oldies.

Pat Martin sends along the following:

I just got an e mail from Paul Shinn, CE for KAVT (1680 Fresno, CA.-ye ed.) stating they are now up to full power running Radio

Disney. I have not heard it here on the Oregon Coast today, because of poor cx.

It is now 2:15 here (1/31/01-ye ed.) and Radio Disney, KAVT is now coming in weakly.

Jim Hilliker of Pacific Grove, CA. passes along the following:
Not much new with 1200.... Once in a while, I've heard a legal ID in the middle of the night, like 2 or 3 am, "This is KOQI-Soquel, with transmitter testing at 12-hundred kilohertz", and that's it.... Just running his mostly country CDs from the xmtr site with dead air between each song. Still at only 1,000 watts. In my new car, I get a bad mix of 1200 and 540 on 660 on the radio in Salinas. Of course, they share towers, along with KTGE-1570.

1460-KTXX is about to change formats to news-talk as 14-60 KTX, and all news and traffic for other stations will come from the KTX newscenter or KTX traffic center, hi... So, 1380-KTOM will drop classic country and maybe change call letters, but I haven't heard...It will still run some play by play sports and will have a mostly male-slanted talk format. 1460 will have local newsblock 6-9 a and possibly some in afternoon, but lots of syndicated talk, Rush, Dr. Laura, and others, not all conservative, hi.... That should start soon, maybe next week on 1460. I'm going to part of the morning news show on KTX-1460 (I guess the legal KTXX ID will only be heard at top of the hour.

Eric Bueneman of St Louis, MO. passes along the following:
Some news of local interest: WCBW and WINU, both licensed to
Highland, IL, are swapping frequencies. WINU moves from 880 back to
it's original frequency of 1510, and becomes the St. Louis area's
third all-sports radio station (after KFNS-590 Wood River, IL and
KFNS-FM 100.7 Troy, MO). Programming will come from The Sporting
News

Radio Network (formerly One-On-One Sports), whose parent company is based in Olivette, MO. WINU signed on it's original 1510 spot in 1961. It is 1 kW, DA-D. WCBW moves from 1510 to 880, taking it's Christian Variety format with it. It is not known if some conservative talk shows will remain. WINU moved to 880 from 1510 in 1991. It is 1.75 kW day, 160 watts night, DA-2. Both stations are owned by New Life Evangelistic Center, Inc. of St. Louis, MO; they own several non-commercial FMs, as well as the New Life Radio Network and two full-power TV stations: KNLC Channel 24 St. Louis, MO and KNLJ Channel 25 Jefferson City, MO.

Eric Floden *** (location unknown) passes along the following:
As they (CKST Vancouver, BC.-ye ed.) are due to be The FAN-1040
eff. April 1, I thought I would drop in at lunch (1 block away) and
ask what was happening in the interim, and April 1. They had no
printed info to hand out (previously they did), and the fellow told

Pat Martin of Seaside, OR. passes along the following: 1700 KQXX TX, Brownsville, now Oldies rock as earlier thought with Oldies promo followed by "KQXX-McAllen-Brownsville" At 0459.50 EST 2/3.

Mike Brooker of Toronto, ON. sends along the following:

Just what this market needs (yeah, right. Hand me the shovel,
Satan!) After being //CHWO-740 since Jan. 8, "Joy 1250" CJYE signed
on today. Their AM drive show has a real, live host playing
Contemporary Christian songs. I can't comment much on their
programming, as I don't have the stomach to listen to more than a
few minutes of this format. But no doubt, they will fill much of
their schedule with satellite-fed U.S. fire & damnation. Just like
CHWO-740, there are no print ads, billboards, or transit ads for

I've been reading the various comments about TA DX recently. Bruce Conti and Ben Dangerfield have been hearing a lot over the past week. Neil Kazaross in IL said that the DX wasn't making it out there even on nights over the last 2 weeks when I was hearing Norway-1314 at S9+30 here in Billerica (15 miles NW of Boston).

Some of you have probably wondered what I've been doing lately. My mother passed away early in January. Following that period of sadness for me and the whole family, my brother and I have been involved in the sale of the house in W. Yarmouth, MA where my parents had lived in retirement since 1974. Yesterday (Friday, 16 FEB), the house sale went through and an era of my travelling to Cape Cod on a frequent basis came to an end.

During the past 27 years of these trips, DXing has often been a component - from my folks' house, from my brother-in-law's place in E. Harwich, and - most frequently of all - from the car at various beach sites yielding maximum foreign station signal levels. Back in the '70s, I DX'ed with Marc DeLorenzo when he lived around the corner in W. Yarmouth and from Skip Wolsieffer's (WAICML) QTH in Osterville. More recently I'd drop in on Vern Brownell (WIVB) in Chatham and on Steve Clang in Plymouth.

I remember the early days when my parents permitted me to leave a hulking R-390A in their basement and wires in their pine trees. The logs of goodies like Paraguay-645, China-1525, and Greenland-1425. Times that my wife and I stayed there for a week in the summer to enjoy the beach, fried clam dinners, and the room my mother dubbed "the honeymoon suite".

The house on Trowbridge Path had a lot of good memories associated with it, but since my mother had gone to a nursing home in April 2000, it became ghostly quiet except for when my brother and I would stop by to maintain things and gradually empty it out.

How fitting it was, DX wise, that my trip out to a favorite beach site in South Orleans, MA on Friday afternoon (following the closing on the house) brought conditions that I could only describe as "legendary". Virtually every TA channel had a good, often a huge, signal on it. Even some of the 10 kHz channel Europeans rolled over the co-channel domestics, for instance, SER Spain on 1080 was DEMOLISHING WTIC. Best TA DX this side of Newfoundland by my reckoning... it's going to take me a week to type the logs! Peak reception time was between 4 and 6 p.m. EST (2100-2300 UTC) though some early blasters like 549, 981, 1251, and 1521 showed up on the car radio as early as 3 p.m. before I got things set up over at the beach / town landing near Tar Kiln Road and Route 28. By 6 p.m. it was raining heavily, so I went over to the brother-in-law's house in E. Harwich (where I'd put up a temporary sloper off the top of a 70' pitch pine tree earlier that day).

DX continued to roll in through the evening. I slept awhile and then got up about 2 a.m. (0700 UTC Saturday, 17 FEB) to see if I could bag the Faroes sign-on on 531 kHz at 0715. Spain had that channel solidly in control, indeed they were as strong as adjacent Turks & Caicos on 530! So Faroes went unheard this time but the other TA's were still booming in.

Longwave and low band medium wave hung in there incredibly late those early hours of Saturday morning. I was getting Atlantic-252 at 5.05 a.m. EST (1005 UTC) and a remnant of Ireland-567 was noted

at the same time. This beats (by 5 minutes) my previous late TA reception time of 1000 UTC when I'd logged UK on 1214 (now 1215) from Menotomy Rocks Park in Arlington, MA back in December of 1966.

For another fitting conclusion of my "Cape Cod DX era", I tested out several loops during stable daytime conditions. These included the old and new Gerry Thomas Quantums, a Kiwa loop, and a homebrew broadband design. The results of these tests will be published within the next month in an article likely to be titled "Loop Shoot-Out at East Harwich".

On Friday, even though I couldn't make it to the local Boston Area DXers' meeting because my presence was required on Cape Cod, DX was still on my agenda that evening. I should be able to attend the 16 MAR BADX meeting with all the noise-reducing transformers I've been promising.

Though an era has ended, I still expect to take the 2-hour drive to the Cape a few times each year for recreation. I can stay over in East Harwich sometimes and maybe I can drop in on guys like Vern Brownell in Chatham and on other DXers a bit off Cape in nearby Plymouth and Marshfield. And who knows where I might wind up retiring 14 or so years from now. It's going to be near the ocean wherever it is, be it Massachusetts, North Carolina, Florida, or wherever. (Virgin Islands or Hawaii if the lottery tickets come through!)

In the mean time, closer to home, I can go out to coastal sites in Rockport or Rowley for "juiced up" DX on after-work outings once the weather gets a little milder and sunset roughly coincides with (or comes a bit after) my arrival time at the shore (typically 6 to 6.30 p.m. local). Sometime in March I expect to do my first after-work mini-DXpedition for year 2001.

At home, I can certainly hear some of the bigger guns (including nearly needle-pegging signals from Norway-1314 and Saudi Arabia-1521 on a frequent basis), but for the really excellent stuff, I have to drive to the seashore. Luckily this can be done (during good weather) in less than an hour from home in Billerica or from work in North Andover.

So as some people's DX season runs down in March, mine usually is just getting off the ground then.

Following the move of 3AK to 1116, the vacant channel of 1503 has been allocated to a new short-term community radio licensee, "Laugh Radio", based in Melbourne, with an anticipated start-up date of March. (Chris Hambly, Box Hill, Victoria)

Callsigns changes appear to be a problem. To take one example, 1071 3CV was reported to me a few months ago as having changed call to 3EL - this stands for Easy Listening Australia, a rather depressing networked program of oldies being heard on a large number of MW stations now. I sent a report and received a subsequent QSL without

a call being indicated. E-mails to the station engineer indicates he has been told by the Station Manager that the official call is "Radio 10-71" and there are no call letters, these now being used for the FM station. A request to the Australian Broadcasting Authority has generated the reply that stations have calls but are not obliged to use them, and there is no list publicly available on what they might be. Investigations continue. (Richard Jary via HCDX 05.01.2001)

A recent trip to Canberra has allowed me to check and confirm that 1008 Canberra and 1215 Bowral are not on the air as reported recently. (Richard Jary, ECDX 1/28)

CHINA (HONG KONG): 864 seems to have stopped calling itself Quote AM, and was noted in early January with IDs/ slogans such as 'The AM service of the Hong Kong Commercial Radio Company Limited', 'AM Eight-Six-Four', 'Hong Kong's Best Music' and an abbreviation which could be 'HMB'. I'm not sure which if any of these is now the 'official' name. (Alan Davies, 1/9 via Arctic)

JAPAN: Throughout most of my career as a university professor of architecture, I have been fortunate to serve as a conduit between the culture/history/geography of Japan and that of the West. In 1976-77, I served as a Senior Fulbright Research Scholar to Japan, spending a year traveling throughout Japan to study the ancient rural and urban Zen-based architectures of the 13th thru 19th Century. Since that time, I have lectured and written extensively on subjects related to Japan. I am also a life-long radio enthusiast, having found unending pleasure in using broadcast radio as a window on the cultures of the world. In recent years, I have specialized in listening to broadcasting from the Pacific and East Asia, especially of course, Japan. While some of these broadcasts are available on shortwave and now, the internet, my primary means of listening to Japanese radio in the past decade has been listening to longdistance medium wave broadcasts from my summer home located on the Canadian/US border, north of Seattle.

In recent years, it has become increasingly clear that the primary professional reference for worldwide radio, the World Radio and TV Handbook, was woefully inadequate and inaccurate in its coverage of Japanese broadcast radio. In January 2000, it appeared to me that the information available on the Internet had matured to the point that a much more accurate list of Japanese medium wave stations might be developed directly from various Japanese sources. The major difficulty in accomplishing this, of course, was the fact that virtually all websites of Japanese radio networks are written exclusively in the Japanese ideography called "kanji." Although I read a limited number of kanji, this year-long project would not have been possible without the extensive assistance of my former student and close friend, Professor Takazi Okuda of Nihon National University. Several Japanese students studying in the United States have also contributed to this effort. Professor Okuda and I are pleased to present this list for the use of broadcast professionals in the West as well as radio enthusiasts around the world. We believe that it the most complete and accurate list yet published.

The list is based on and cross-checked with a number of primary sources. The most important of these are the websites of the various commercial broadcasting networks and a recently web-published official listing of all transmitter sites in Japan. The latter, I might add, did not contain call letter or ownership information but did contain geographic coordinates. Finally, the efforts of a number of Japanese DXers to translate and publish lists of Japanese stations have also been very useful. The listing is currently offered in two forms:

The Comprehensive Listing of Japanese Medium Wave Stations in Japan is 34 pages in length and contains three lists: the basic data sorted by frequency, sorted by location and a third listing of the commercial stations sorted by broadcaster.

The Abridged Listing of Japanese Medium Wave Stations in Japan is 7 pages in length and contains a by-frequency-only sort of the 300 or so stations in Japan that operate on 300 watts or more. The lowest power (100 watt) repeater stations are noted collectively on the appropriate frequency.

This listing is offered without restriction for any non-commercial use by the international community of radio enthusiasts. Clubs and individuals are invited to link to the site below, or to place the two pdf document on their own web pages.

Currently, these two documents are offered only in 8.5 x 11 inch format. I hope to put up pdf documents in the international size very soon.

The two documents may be found on my university web site at http://bryant.ceat.okstate.edu/RADIO1.HTM

The files are quite small, since there are no graphics involved. Also, the cover sheet of each document is largely blank, so don't panic when it appears that you have downloaded a blank document. (John Bryant, Stillwater, OK)

THAILAND: 864 Radio Thailand has a new MW station in Sisaket on 864, operating 2200-1600 with substantial amounts of local programming as well as Bangkok relays. First noted early January 2001. (Alan Davies 1/9 via Arctic)

VIETNAM: Here's an almost certainly incomplete list of MW stations in Vietnam. Except where noted, all have been heard Nov 2000-Jan 2001. Further local transmissions are carried by many stations especially in the 2200-2400, 0330-0630 and 0930-1400 periods, details unknown. Interesting news Bengt. I didn't notice yet. This station is only playing continuous pop mx and you have to ID it by a jingle. This is a traffic station, and there are only announcements when there is traffic jam. That's mostly not when DX-conditions are favorable. If you want to catch some announcements try during European morning hours. Another way to identify the station is comparing it with the parallels 1125 and 1233. (Guido Schotmans via HCDX 1/14)

CYPRUS, NORTHERN: 1098 "Our transmission on MW is on 1098. As far as we know, there is currently no local transmission on 1071; The reference [in the WRTH] could be an outdated reference for CYBC's international channel. We have checked and get very clear reception of Syrian Radio on this frequency." (Bayrak Radio Television Corporation, brt@cc.emu.edu.tr via Bengt Ericson, 12/15, via Arctic)

FRANCE: A low powered station has started broadcasting in Paris, on 981. It currently carries an announcement saying the official start will be on January 18. The name of the station is CIEL AM. No transmitter power or location is indicated, but it should be 1 kW or less and I can't think of any other location than Romainville or Villebon. [From what I can gather (I haven't heard the station myself but was told about it by some friends) the station belongs to the Jewish community in Paris. Anyway it is the first operation of its kind in France and a few more are expected shortly, including a station for children. The webpage tells that 567 is now operated by a new transistorized transmitter using only 1.8 kW. This service was inaugurated in 1993 together with Radioropa on 693 and RTL-Radio on 603. 693 and 1359 both operated with 5 kW from Uhlenhorst, 603 with 20 kW from Königs Wusterhausen. While in December there was a full hour of VOA News Now at 0600/0700, from January English is until 0630 only, followed by Serbian at 0630. (Stefano Valianti via MWC e-mail news 1/14). ITALY: At 1835 all RAI Due local programs originate exclusively from the five autonomous regions (i.e. Friuli-Venezia Giulia, Sicilia, Sardegna, Valle d'Aosta, Trentino-Alto Adige). (Stefano Valianti via MWC e-mail news 12/22)

LEBANON: 756 The South Lebanon Army's radio station, which stopped broadcasting after Israel withdrew from South Lebanon in May, has recently gone back on the air. The station is now calling itself the "Voice of Experience from the Mediterranean Basin" rather than "Voice of the South," and it also now appears to be broadcasting from northern Israel. However, it has been broadcasting a few hours a day on the SLA's old frequency, 756 AM. (Daniel Sobelman, Ha'aretz Correspondent, via Paul Bowery via MWC e-mail news 12/27)

LUXEMBURG:1440 According to a report by Gregor Behr, RTL-Radio yesterday announced repeatedly that from January 1st Mega-Radio will be carried on Marnach 1440 Mon-Sat 0500-1800 and Sun 0630-1800. (Kai Ludwig 12/25)

Marnach 1440 now indeed carries Mega-Radio, no noticeable delay compared with 1431. The program of this commercial station, which consists almost entirely of nonstop music, is generated at Schwerin and distributed by an encrypted Eutelsat DVB feed to the transmitter sites. Mega-Radio already uses (in Germany) Wöbbelin 576, Wilsdruff 1431 and Burg 1575. (Kai Ludwig 1/1 via Arctic)

Joe Leyder reported to the German A-DX list that Marnach currently operates 1440 with 300 kW, but during the religious broadcasts they turn up the power to full 1200 kW. They switch the antenna pattern to skywave radiation at 1700. I checked today: Indeed 1440 was very strong after 1830 and a few moments after 1900 the signal dropped by some dB. (Kai Ludwig, 1/7)

MOLDOVA: 1548 Maiac reactivated 13 December, first with TWR at 1800-2000, using 150 kW and an omnidirectional antenna. (Nikolay Pashkevich in DX_BISTRO via Bernd Trutenau, 12/13) Nikolay Pashkevich reports in DX_BISTRO that the Malaya zarya antenna system in Maiac will again be operational around 30 December. (Bernd Trutenau 12/27 via Arctic) 999, 1548 Only the transmissions of TWR, DW and VOR in Romanian were resumed on 11 and 13 December on 999 and 1548. (Rumen Pankov, 12/17 via BCDX)

MONACO/ITALY: 702 It now looks as if the use of the R. Monte Carlo station on 702 for RAI Radio 2 is not - or not only - directly linked to the reduced power operation of the 846 Rome transmitter. On December 1st, RAI took the following Radio 2 transmitters off the

air: Genova/Granarolo on 936, Alessandria on 1449 and Pisa/Coltano on 1116. And the following message appears on the RAI website: "To receive Radio 2 in the areas that were covered by these transmitters please retune to 702". (Stefano Valianti via MWC e-mail news 1/4)

NETHERLANDS: 747 Radio 1, Flevoland. Radio 5 will move here from 1008 before 1 September and Radio 1 on this frequency will leave MW. (Gerben Vos via Pypers 02.01.2000, EuroLog 1/13) 1008 Radio 5, Flevoland. This frequency has to be vacated for commercial use before 1 September, causing Radio 5 to move to 747 and Radio 1 on that frequency to leave MW. (Gerben Vos via Pypers

1/2, EuroLog 1/13)
1035, 1332 There have been several reports on Dutch TV over the last week that Radio Nationaal, the station playing Dutch music on 1035 & 1332 is on the edge of bankruptcy. No listeners and no advertisers that is the problem. The presenters, like the singer Father Abraham are now busy with a last-minute campaign to save the station. So, if you still need to log or QSL this station. This development shows that most listeners in Holland do not listen to MW anymore, it has all shifted to FM only!! (Julius Hermans, Breedenbroek, Netherlands via MWC e-mail news 1/14)

1584AM-Radio Paradise is back on the air again, after being off the air for some weeks. The signal strength is very good, better then before, it sounds much more fresh. The frequency is owned by 'Gooiland Productions' and they are planning to go on the air as 'Radio 192'. They will use the old 'Paradijs' transmitter at first, later a 5 kW (?) one will be installed. (Piet Pypers 12/28 EuroLog 1/13)

NORWAY: Only two companies have applied for a private radio license to operate on 216 with up to 1200 kW of power. Northern Star International Broadcasters and an organization of Tamils in Norway. The NSIB started its work many years ago, and it is thanks to the NSIB that the license is being advertised at all, through their intense lobbying activities towards the government. The Tamils, organized in "Det Tamilske Samordningsutvalget i Norge", already operate a FM-station in Oslo (Radio Tamil Murasam 105.8 MHz) on a frequency shared with other organizations. They intend to put their proposed transmitter somewhere in the Oslo-area, airing programs aimed at the Tamil residents all over Norway, while the NSIB is working to establish their facilities somewhere in the southwestern coastal area of Norway, aiming at a more international audience. The licensing body will now hold meetings with the two groups, hoping to issue a license "in the near future", I would assume around this summer. The license will be issued for 7 years only, and may not be prolonged should the government at that stage want to use the frequency for "other purposes", i.e. digital transmissions. (Bernt Erfjord via MWC e-mail news 1/11)

POLAND: 963 Polskie Fale Srednie SA, the company conducting the project aimed at reviving mediumwave broadcasting in Poland, informs that they will commence daily broadcasts on February 1st, 2001, using a first transmitter near Lipsko (25 km south of Zwolen), on a frequency of 963 with a power of only 100 W. But be prepared to scan the airwaves already, because they say that during the next three weeks they plan to conduct test transmissions! (No exact schedule available). As regards other stations operated by PFS SA (more than 90 frequencies were registered) the formal procedures are still

underway. (Krzysztof Rybus via Wolfgang Büschel 1/9 with corrections by Bernd Trutenau)

PORTUGAL: 783 Rádio Comercial doesn't broadcast on MW anymore, only on FM. Another radio, belonging to the same media group, uses this frequency, as well as 1035. It is called Rádio Nacional, but it is a commercial radio, not state-owned. It has this name because it only broadcasts music sung in Portuguese. - The Miramar transmitter now belongs to RDP and is on 720. The transmitter belonging to Rádio Nacional, on 783, is located at a place called Afurada, close to Oporto. The website of Rádio Nacional doesn't specify the transmitter location, though; it only says it is in the North of Portugal. 1035 transmitter is at Porto Alto, near Lisbon. (F. S. GUATEMALA: There are two Radio Marías in Guatemala City, one on FM 103.3, called R Asunción de María, and another one on AM 1600, called "la Radio de María, la emisora de la familia". There is no relationship between the two, and the FM station (e-mail: asocrmaria@guate.net or dprogra@amigo.net.gt) is the only one affiliated to the international R Maria organization with HQ in Italy. "La Radio de María" has not received any reports from abroad so far, said Sister Virginia who I talked to today on the phone, +502 597 9578. "We are barely reaching out to the capital city", she said.

No wonder. Guatemala City is a big place, and so a fairly exact address is a must if you wish to send them a report. Here's where to, courtesy Sister Doris: Kilómetro 15, Carretera Roosevelt, Zona 2 Vía a Mixco, Ciudad de Guatemala.

There is a 412 kB mp3 clip on the net ("DX quality") which set me on the right track. It was kindly supplied by Humberto Molina, of San Salvador, El Salvador.

FALKLAND ISLANDS. Mauno Ritolo asked if both the 530 and 550 stations were on. Yes, and were clearly heard within a range of several hundred miles west and north of the islands. I would say that the 530 station seemed to be on a lower power than 550 which is listed as 10 kW. 530 IDs as FIBS but also relays London. 550 IDs as BSBS [sic, surely BFBS -gh] but also carries Radio 5 from London. You ought to be able to hear both in local station-free Finland! (Ben Dangerfield [now back home and far from the South Atlantic!], NRC-AM via DXLD)

PUERTO RICO: WGIT-1660 in Canóvanas (with an accent on the o), Carolina, San Juan has been testing, and is being heard in the eastern US and Europe (various sources) 1660 is still testing, mostly at night, with the name La Grande 16-60. This station was moved from Camuy, on the NW coast, to a suburb on the eastern side of the San Juan metro. The transmitter site is near that of WIDA-1400 in an area of Carolina called Hoyo Mula, near a riverbed in a partial mangrove swamp with good conductivity. The station is owned by Aureo Matos, Jr. His father owns several religious stations in PR, including WBRQ-97.7 in Cidra and a Mayaguez area evangelical Christian FM. Broadcasters in PR expect a nostalgia based oldies format using traditional Puerto Rican music when it goes on regular schedule. Tests are apparently being conducted using 10 w. in March, the NotiUno network will move to the by then defunct SuperKadena. This means that 630-910-760 will be the key stations of NotiUno, and 1320, 1040, 1490 and perhaps 1430 will leave the net for different programming. Probably the calls of WUNO will move to 630, too. The remaining NotiUno affiliates will stay the same for the moment. In any case, remember that NotiUno is both a net and a station, as the originating station for the net in San Juan is called NotiUno. There will be 4 full news networks in PR when the change I posted goes into effect. The reason there are networks is that no San Juan station covers either Ponce, Arecibo or Mayaguez or the rest of the Island, for that matter. To achieve total island coverage on AM, 5 or 6 stations are needed, although on FM three full B signals will do the job. Puerto Rico is a single Arbitron market, consisting of the entire Island, so survival requires a net. Radio Reloj net out of WKAQ San Juan. WAPA net out of WAPA San Juan NotiWapa. WUNO NotiUno out of San Juan 1320 soon to be 630. WIAC Cadena Radio Puerto Rico out of 740 San Juan. Not all affiliates are 24/7, with some just joining for Morning Drive news and special bulletins or paid net programming. Local stations have no identity during net broadcasts, and some even fail to do their legal IDs right. (Dave Gleason, AMDX Newsflash)

The Grundig Yacht Boy YB 400PE as a Medium Wave Receiver

I recently had a chance to try out the Yacht Boy YB 400PE, and to put it through its paces as a medium wave receiver in comparison with the venerable Sony ICF-2010. One might say outright that this could not be a fair comparison, as the 2010 lists for roughly twice the price of the YB400, even after over 15 years on the market, but after all that time, it remains a benchmark of portable radio design. A fairer comparison would be with the Sony ICF-7600G but I did not have that available for review. However, see "The SONY ICF-SW7600G, ICF-SW1000T, and ICF2010 as Medium Wave Receivers" in the June 21, 1997 DX Monitor for an indirect comparison.

Overall descriptions:

The YB is roughly 8x5x1.5", and tunes 144-353 kHz and 520 kHz to 30 MHz in 1 kHz steps (5, 9 and 10 kHz steps are also available depending on the band and settings), as well as FM. It has the usual clock and alarm as well as 40 memories. There are two IF filter settings, and SSB can be monitored using a "fine tuning" control to clarify the USB or LSB signal being received. Tone switch, a bar-graph S-meter, DX/local switch, external antenna jack, headphone jack and external power jack round out the features. (As you will know from other reviews, the ICF-2010 has a few more features as befits its greater cost. The principal features are synchronous AM detection, a switchable choice of LSB or USB rather than a fine tuning control, readout and tuning to 0.1 kHz, and a tuning knob rather than up/down tuning buttons.)

Sensitivity (using the DX position of the front end attenuator):

In all cases on medium wave, the ICF-2010 was more sensitive, when either set was using its internal loop antenna. This is not surprising, given that the '2010 has a larger ferrite loop antenna, but for example, the '2010 showed traces of audio on 1580 kHz on a winter afternoon, while only a faint sub-audible heterodyne was heard on the YB400. A similar result was noted with daytime reception of a TIS on 530 kHz, as well as on other MW frequencies.

Having said that, the YB400 was still sensitive enough to register a slight TA carrier on 1314 kHz in December 2000, though a large loop antenna was needed to verify the presence of that carrier. Note that the Yacht Boy seems to be a bit more sensitive than the '2010 on shortwave using the stock whip antenna.

In order to try to level the sensitivity playing field, I placed each radio in the center of an unamplified 3-foot air core box loop, with the loop lobes lined up with the internal loop lobes. The sensitivity difference between the two radios is not so pronounced under these circumstances, and most signals heard on the '2010 were also heard on the Yacht Boy, but when the received signal was marginal, as 1580 kHz was above, the YB400 still didn't deliver quite as solid a signal as the '2010 did.

Both receivers have external antenna jacks, but only the '2010 switches out the internal ferrite loop when that jack is used. Not only does the Yacht Boy continue to use its internal antenna, it seems to attenuate an external signal quite severely below 1600 kHz. In fact, below 1400 kHz, it was impossible to tell whether an external antenna was plugged in or not; presumably this is to prevent strong MW signals from overloading the set when it is tuned to shortwave using an outside antenna. The only way to couple a random wire to the set at MW and LW frequencies was to wrap a few turns of wire around the case, and feed the antenna and ground to either end of the wire. The external antenna connector does work fine for the tropical bands and above however.

Selectivity:

It's sometimes difficult to tell how much of a radio's performance is due to its selectivity and how much is due to signal handling capabilities, but the YB400 is capable of separating out most 10 kHz domestic channels quite nicely, even using its wide filter. Channels next to my two 10kw locals were more difficult, but that was as much due to the sheer volume of the splatter and to signal handling problems as to lack of selectivity (see further comments below). The filters on the Yacht Boy and on the '2010 seem comparable when I used the test of tuning past a local and noting where the signal became readable as the carrier was shifted into the IF passband, then became unreadable again as the carrier was shifted out. For example, the narrow filter on the YB400 delivered readable audio on my 900 kHz local between 898 and 902 kHz (i.e. tuning to 897 or 903 yielded just loud splatter) while the '2010 showed a readable signal between 897.3 and 902.8 kHz. Conditions lately have not been good for overseas stations, but I would imagine that there shouldn't be too much problem hearing split frequencies within 4 or 5 kHz of domestic channels.

Strong signal handling:

Using its internal antenna, the Yacht Boy was able to hear a mixing product from my two locals at only one spot, and that was in the longwave band. Those with many more locals may not be so lucky, and plenty of MW overload was found on longwave if an external random wire was coupled into the set through turns around the case as described above. (See "Spurious Responses and How To Recognize Them", IRCA reprint T10 for details on calculating second and third order products)

More importantly, without any external antenna I was able to get muddy but readable audio from local CKMO-900 (10 kw at about 3 miles) on top of semi-local KIXI-880, when maximizing CKMO's signal by rotating the radio. If one uses the YB400 inside an air-core loop, this effect is not noted, as long as one tunes carefully to

make sure the loop is tuned to the same frequency as the radio is. That's a good general rule in any case as overload can certainly occur in the Yacht Boy if the box loop antenna is mistuned to a strong signal.

An image 910 kHz below my local on 1070 kHz was found on the Yacht Boy, but the '2010 has that problem also, and overall image rejection seemed good enough that there were no birdies heard on 10 kHz channels below 790 kHz (1700 kHz-910 kHz), as has been a problem on some other portables tested including the ICF-7600G. Interestingly, there wasn't much evidence of images on the lower end of the MW band even with an external wire coupled in.

Finally, there were no internally generated "birdies" found in the LW and MW bands.

S-meter and memories:

The S-meter on this radio is not quite as impressive as it looks at first glance. Although there are 21 bars in the display, they are actually illuminated 4 bars at a time, so there are really only 5 gradations in signal strength, not quite as impressive as the 2010's 10 LED display, but good enough to indicate loop nulls in most cases.

The 40 memories store frequency only, as the filter passband and SSB on/off are controlled by slide switches and can't be "remembered". What is more of a concern to me is the delay (a good portion of a second) going from one memory to the next, effectively making the memories useless for checking parallels. I've been spoiled by the virtually instant response of the individual push button memories on the ICF-2010.

Synchronous detection:

It's hardly fair to evaluate the YB-400's lack of synchronous detection, but unfortunately, the ICF-2010's sync detector really does make a difference to the readability of medium strength signals which are suffering from interference. It substitutes for a steeper sided filter, and allows one to monitor the sideband which is affected less by adjacent channel splatter. For example, only traces of audio were noted when tuning the YB400 to the Calgary station on 1060 kHz next to my local on 1070, but using the 2010's synchronous detector on the low side of 1060 yielded a readable signal in the splatter, even though the IF filters on both radios had similar passbands.

In addition, non-synchronous heterodyne detection (using USB/LSB positions to demodulate AM) is not possible on the Yacht Boy because the continuously variable SSB fine tuning control does not tune to the edges of the passband of the narrow IF filter, so tends to receive both sidebands of an AM signal at once.

Overall, audio quality on the YB400 is crisper than on the ICF-2010, even when using the narrow IF filter.

Conclusion:

Unsurprisingly, the Grundig Yacht Boy YB400 is not a replacement for the Sony ICF-2010, but its narrow IF filter, 1 kHz tuning steps, good quality audio, and relatively good sensitivity and signal handling capability make it a reasonable starter radio for a MW DXer, particularly one with shortwave interests. However, it does suffer from an external antenna input which doesn't switch out the internal MW antenna, and attenuates severely MW signals from an outside antenna. In addition, the lack of synchronous AM detection means that it is not as capable as it could be in demodulating weak

signals next to stronger ones.

Of course, if I'd been offered this radio for MW DXing in the 60's, at the comparable 60's price, roughly equivalent to that of an "all-American 5", I would have been in DXer's heaven. We've come a long way in that time.

Awhile back, there was mention of various audio processing programs which could be used to try to clean up DX tapes. Another one is Spectran from DXers Vittorio De Tomasi and Alberto Di Bene. It was originally developed for radio amateurs bouncing signals off the moon, so has a strong emphasis on peaking signals. This is a free download from www.weaksignals.com, and the developers are interested in hearing your opinions and suggestions as to what the DXer wants in an audio processing program.

You can feed a recorder or receiver output to the PC sound card, and run Spectran to band-pass filter the audio, which is fed out to the PC speakers. There is a sharp peaking filter as well which longwave DXers have been using to highlight slow CW signals which cannot be distinguished by ear. Unfortunately, in my experience the de-noising filter doesn't seem to dig audio out from underneath splatter or line noise. The spectral "waterfall" display is very interesting, giving you an idea of where your DX and noise are in the audio spectrum. There is not very much documentation on how to use the program, but I have found Vittorio to be very helpful and enthusiastic about trying to create better audio recovery for DXers.


