Time: Midnight until 00:05AM Eastern Time (5 Minute test each week.) Modes of Operation: Special DX Test. 1,000 Watts, Non-Directional. Programming: Morse Code ID's, Sweep Tones, Voice ID. Notes: This DX friendly station is co-owned by two amateur radio operators, and they have decided to conduct this rare, on-going DX test, giving listeners a weekly opportunity to put this station into the log books.

**WMRO 1560kHz Gallatin, TN DX Test.** Date(s): Midnight to Five AM Central Time October 30th thru November 13th. (Two Week Test.) Time: Midnight until 5:00AM Central Time. Modes of Operation: "Inventory Insert" 60 Second Long Test. 0.003kw Non-Directional. (One night may include a brief full daytime power test.) Programming: Morse Code ID's, Sweep Tones, 60 Second Long "Inventory Insert" during local breaks. Notes: Transmitter audio chain testing. Exact times of the inserted spots will be given closer to the test time period. In general, look for the test to run near the Top of the Hour (TOH.) The extreme low power of this station at night should make this one a nice challenge!

Programming: Morse Code ID's, Sweep Tones, Voice ID. Notes: Transmitter audio chain testing. Listen for station jingles, special music, and other wild card items that may be transmitted by Paul Walker. Don't discount the ability of graveyard stations to be heard during DX tests, as we've had widespread reports during some past tests.

### SPECIAL "WEST COAST VERSION" WNTP/WFIL DX TEST

Rene Tetro has agreed to another test of stations WNTP/WFIL, this time with West Coast DX'ers in mind. Instead of the usual Midnight to 2AM tests of the past, this one will take place much later at night (0500AM local, making it 2:00AM on the West Coast). Having a 50KW test this late at night should really give some folks out West the chance to put this one in the log book. Ditto for the lower powered WFIL. Details below, and our sincere thanks to Rene Tetro!

**WNTP 990kHz Philadelphia, PA DX Test. WFIL 560 Philadelphia, PA DX Test** Date(s): Sunday Morning December 10th, 2006. Time: 0500-0600 Eastern Time. One hour test. Modes of Operation: Transmitter Testing to check on improvements to the new audio chain.

**WNTP:** 0500-0530 50kw Day Directional Pattern, 05530-0600 5kw Non-Directional

**WFIL:** 0500-0530 5kw Day Directional Pattern, 0530-0600 2.5kw Non-Directional

Programming: Morse Code ID's, Sweep Tones, Voice ID. Notes: Transmitter audio chain testing. With WNTP running daytime power for ½ hour (50KW) this should present a real opportunity for DX'ers on the West Coast to log this station/state.

### RESULTS OF WNJC 1360kHz DX Test

WNJC 1360kHz, Vineland, NJ. Test Date: October 1st, 2006. 4KW, Non-Directional Pattern.

Again, our special thanks to John "Duke" Hamann for arranging this test! You put New Jersey into the log books of quite a few DX'ers!

First report of the test arrived only minutes after it started. Bob Antoniuk of Clifton, NJ who logged not only WNJC, but also the WODI 1230kHz test from Brookneal, VA (which started at the same time) Both were pulled in on his stock Sony 2010. Other reports followed including Russ Johnson of Lexington, NC, Les Rayburn of Helena, AL (NJ #1), and Bert New of Watkinsville, GA. Bert reported this as the first logging of a Garden State station for him as well. Rene Tetro logged the test from his

shack in Lansdale, PA, as did Joe Miller in Troy, Michigan. Our neighbors to the North also heard the test signals with Jerry Coatsworth of Merlin, Ontario, Canada reporting reception of both WNJC and WODI. Other lucky DX'ers included Bill Dvorak of Madison, WI, Jim Pogue of Memphis, TN, and J.D. Stephens of Hampton Cove, Alabama. Vermont was added to the list of states receiving the test with a successful report from Steve Howe in St. Albans. Rick Shaftan of NW New Jersey reported the test, "Blowing through his local". Others in the Northeast also pulled in this regional test, including Paul Walker, Jr in Dover, NH who's helped set up quite a few tests lately and DX'er Roy Barstow (Old Roy) who caught WNJC "about equal to WDRC". Richard Line of Sterling Heights, MI used a Drake R8B and a N/S 100 foot wire to pull the test in, while Curt Degan relied on his trusty Ten Tec RX-320D and an LF Engineering active whip to log this one from Boca Raton, FL. Another Drake owner, Dave Hochfelder of Highland Park, NJ used a Kiwa Loop antenna to log this, while Willis Monk used the classic Drake R4-C and a longwire to snag the test from his home in Old Fort, Tennessee. Others hearing the test were John J. Rieger, of South Milwaukee, WI, Bill Bergadano of Colts Neck, NJ, and Greg Harris of Park Forest, IL. The test represented the first logging of New Jersey for many, including Greg Myers of Largo, FL. He reported the stations easily heard despite a strong het on 1359 which was reported by many. Also success in their attempts were Brett Saylor of Central PA, Dave Pyatt of Burlington, Ontario, and Carl Mann of Omaha, NE. No surprise that the test was heard by Barry McLarnon of Ottawa. WNJC is a semi-local, and past tests have proven that Barry can hear a pin drop on a graveyard station 2000 miles away! And (YAWN) Neil Kazaross "KAZ" pulled them in as well from his shack in Barrington, IL. For this pair, DX Tests amount to training wheels. A McKay of Ontario, Canada logged the test using a DX-394 receiver and a 50 foot wire, while Allan Loudell used a YB-400 with only it's internal antenna to pull the test in from Delaware. Others logging the test included Gerry Bishop of Niceville, FL, Tom Jasinski of Shorewood, IL, and Tim Noonan of Oak Creek, WI. Reports flowed in from folks like Steve Francis of Alcoa, TN, Larry Russell of Flushing, MI, and Phillip Chiello of Elm Grove, WI. The mail brought reports from R.C. Watts of Louisville, KY, and William Wilkins of Springfield, MO. That brings the totals to 16 states that logged the test, and some folks in Canada too! Great way to start the DX Season! Most unusual was the complete lack of "negative" reports this time around, though we're sure that someone out West must have tried for the test without success.

The sweep tones and tone mod CW cut through the interference. My receiver is an Icom R75. My antenna is a homebrew hula hoop loop coax fed to a MFJ956 ATU. The loop is indoors (I'm in a condo) hanging in a window. -Greg Harris, Park Forest, IL

Test heard here easily with sweep tones at tune in, 0010 EDT, and like others nice loud het on 1359 (which I believe was the Jacksonville station that has been off freq. in the past). Many thanks to those involved in the test- first NJ from here. -Greg Myers, Largo, FL

WNJC reaches Omaha, Nebraska. In most of the night with only sweep tones and Morse code IDs clearly audible in the mix, though poor by 3am. Thanks for the opportunity to hear this station. -Carl Mann, Omaha, NE

WNJC heard easily over 1kHz tone or het with sweep tones, step tones, Morse Code, and many fun sounds such as the 20th Century-Fox fanfare and the Final Jeopardy music. Don't think I've heard them since their frequency check days (nights?) of yore. -Steve Francis, Alcoa, Tennessee

#### RESULTS OF WODI 1230kHz DX Test

WODI 1230kHz Brookneal, VA. Test Date: October 1st, 2006--?? 1KW, Non-Directional Pattern

Our special thanks to Tony DeNicola and Dave Marthouse for running this unique test. They've arranged for each Saturday night from Midnight local until 00:05AM to run a five minute DX test with sweep tones, Morse Code IDs, etc. So far, it's been widely heard. This are the results as of 10/18/06 but remember, it's not too late to log this one! They'll be back on the air this Saturday night! Tune in!

The first night of this unique DX Test coincided with the WNJC Test, with many DX'ers attempting (and succeeding) to log both stations within minutes of each others. Russ Johnson in Lexington, NC was the first to pull off this "DX Double", reporting WODI's Morse Code signals, weak but readable. Next up was Bob Antoniuk of Clifton, NJ, who copied both stations on his stock Sony 2010 using just the internal antenna! Also logging the first week of the WODI test was Bert New of Watkinsville, GA, Jerry Coatsworth of Merlin, Ontario, Canada, J.D. Stephens in Hampton Cove, AL, and Steve Howe of St. Albans, VT. Rich Line of Sterling Heights, MI used a Drake R8B with a 100' N/S wire to pull in the test, while Brett Saylor used his Icom R-75 and Ten Tec RX-320 with a sloper antenna to turn the trick. Others hearing the test included Tom Jansinski of Shorewood, IL, and Joe Miller of Troy, MI. This was the 334th MW station that Joe has logged in his short "career" on the broadcast band. Larry Russell of Flushing, MI pulled the test in using a Radio Shack DX-400 and got it on tape. Nice catch, Larry! Saul Chernos actually heard the test from his car radio in downtown Toronto, Ontario, Canada.

Saul hears more DX on his car radio than I do with a shack full of gear! Barry McLarnon continues to hear pins drop from his home in Ottawa, Ontario. It must be something in the water up there. Barry logged the test but didn't need it, having heard WODI before. Ken Wilson in Central, KY reported the test "easy copy" there on his JRC NRD545 & Wellbrook 2 loop K9AY. Chris in Taylors, SC needed only a Sony Walkman to log the test through interference from WYSL. Another success story came in from Jim Pursel using his ICOM IC-T90A handheld and a homebrew antenna. His home is in Lancaster, PA. So far, that means this test has been logged in 15 states and Canada! But alas, some of us have not (YET!) been so successful in logging the tests. I appear to be just inside or outside the skip zone of WODI here in Central Alabama. I've heard not a trace of them so far. Likewise, Neil Kazaross reports no joy using his famous beverage on the ground (BOG) antennas either. Others who have so far been disappointed include Wade Smith of New Brunswick, Brandon Jordan, the hard working editor of the **DXTESTS.INFO** web site was rewarded yet for his efforts either, loved his comment though-"Maybe next week". How many DX tests can you say that about? Dennis in Vancouver, WA tried all his tricks including Quantum Phasers, a EWE antenna and even a KAZ special with no luck. Don't feel lonely Dave, I'm trying virtually the same guns here with no luck. Keep trying for this test, and we'll update all the results again in a few weeks.

Got them both here just after midnight local. Sweep tones and definitive Morse IDs on my 2010 with stock antenna. Thanks guys! -Bob Antoniuk, Clifton NJ

I managed to hear the Morse Code and Sweep tones of the WODI DX Test this week. So I am happy to report this as my 334th MW station logged. -Joe Miller, Troy, MI

In downtown Toronto ON in the car. Didn't have to go too far mobile - in front of my house was good enough. Thanks Dave et al at WODI! -Saul Chernos

We need to announce some changes in our policy for verifying QSL's for all DX tests that we've been asked to handle verification duties. Effective immediately, we will no longer be able to verify US Postal Service QSL requests from DX'ers who have e-mail capability.

As many of you are aware, we've moved towards "Electronic QSL's" which are simply .JPEG image files created especially for the tests by DX'er Joe Miller. When people send in Postal requests, we simply print that .JPEG image on an ordinary inkjet printer with no special paper, etc. There is no difference between the electronic version and the "printed" version at all.

In most cases, you'll be able to print a higher quality "card" at home, using photo paper and/or heavy cardstock. We've noticed that most Postal requests come from DX'ers who have already submitted electronic mail reports. In most cases, they have been receiving two QSL's.

We simply don't have enough time to handle the workload of verifying the tests, printing and cutting "cards", addressing envelopes, etc... and still find time to arrange for future tests. As I've stated many times, electronic QSL's, short notice DX tests, etc. are the future of our hobby.

Obviously, we'll continue to honor US Postal Mail reports that are received along with an SASE from DX'ers who don't have access to electronic mail, but we would really rather receive reports via e-mail and QSL them the same way.

Thanks for your understanding.

"Your new sound in Greenville and Pitt County and surrounding areas" - as above, sometimes with call letters following and sometimes not "Listen to (insert name of program) on 15-70 AM. The right choice." "Hi. I'm (insert listeners name) and I listen to the all new 15-70 AM." Of note on 1490, QRM at times from UNID ESPN affiliate. 1570 had no co-channel QRM, and was at least a fair level approaching Jacksonville - this with listed 3.8 kw. I don't know when WECU came on the air, so possibly this is already "old" news, but thought that I'd pass it along. (MH-NC)

FORT WORTH STAR-TELEGRAM, Sept. 22, 2006, Catholic company buys 2 area stations, By ROBERT PHILPOTSTAR-TELEGRAM STAFF WRITER

It appears that Air America, the liberal talk-radio network, won't be on the air much longer in Dallas-Fort Worth. Guadalupe Radio Network, a Midland-based Catholic broadcasting company, has announced on its Web site that it will take over two Dallas-Fort Worth stations as of Oct. 1: KXEB/910 AM, which is Air America's Dallas-Fort Worth station, and KJON/850 AM. Guadalupe Radio will broadcast in English on KXEB and in Spanish on KJON. "It's a done deal, contingent on FCC approval," said Dave Palmer, general manager of Guadalupe Radio Network. Under the deal, Guadalupe Radio Network will lease the stations from Border Media Partners, which owns KXEB and KJON. FCC approval could take up to 60 days, but Palmer says he doesn't foresee any problems. "We hope one of the first programs that airs will be the Mass, which airs at 10 a.m. Sundays," he said. "We don't exactly know what time of day the switch will take place, but it will happen on Oct. 1." For the time being, Guadalupe Radio Network will air programs from Eternal Word Television Network, a Catholic cable channel. Palmer is planning some local programs, including one that he will host, but he said they probably won't start until the beginning of the year. "We'll be teaching Catholics and non-Catholics alike about what Catholicism is all about," he said. "Even some Catholics don't know everything they need to know about Catholicism." Guadalupe Radio owns eight stations in Central and West Texas and one in New Mexico. With the new Dallas stations and a planned San Antonio station, Palmer said, the potential listenership will jump from 600,000 to 8 million. Officials with Border Media Partners did not return a request for comment. Phone and e-mail attempts to reach anyone at KXEB or at Air America's New York headquarters were unsuccessful. Air America debuted with much fanfare in 2004 -- and was also greeted with much skepticism from radio observers who saw talk radio as an almost exclusively conservative domain. It didn't debut in Dallas-Fort Worth until March 2005, and it never really registered in the local Arbitron ratings. Coincidentally, Al Franken: God Spoke, a documentary featuring Air America's best-known host, is scheduled to open Sept. 29 at Dallas' Angelika Film Center -- two days before Guadalupe Radio takes over KXEB. (DP-HI)

Clear Channel Re-Ups Hannity On 80 Stations, Sep. 27, 2006, By Al Peterson

Clear Channel Radio has inked a renewal with ABC Radio Networks that will keep ABC's "Sean Hannity Show" on the air at 80 of CC's stations for another three years. The new deal will keep Hannity's program on the air through 2010 at his Clear Channel Radio-owned affiliates in Houston, Miami, Phoenix, Minneapolis, Pittsburgh and Cincinnati, along with 74 other markets nationwide. Commenting on the Hannity renewal, Clear Channel Radio VP of programming Sean Compton said, "Sean has done an incredible job producing great ratings and, most importantly, desirable demographics for our stations." Since Hannity's launch into national syndication in 2001, his daily 3-6 p.m. ET show has grown to reach an estimated audience of 15 million listeners weekly on a reported 500-plus affiliates nationwide. The conservative talker has also earned numerous awards for his daily radio program, including two R&R Industry Achievement Awards for National Talk Show Host of the Year in 2003 and 2004, and three National Association of Broadcasters Marconi Awards for Talk Show Host of the Year in 2003, 2004 and 2005. Mike Gallagher Stops Planned Protests At Amish Funerals, Oct. 04, 2006, By Al Peterson

In a case where radio stepped in to craft a potentially volatile situation, Salem Radio Network talk host Mike Gallagher has successfully negotiated a stop to a planned protest by members of the Kansas-based Westboro Baptist Church at the funerals of several Amish girls slain earlier this week in Nickel Mines, Pa. Gallagher, who airs on nearby WNTD/Philadelphia, offered a representative of Westboro a live interview on his nationally syndicated SRN radio show if the group would call off its planned protest at the girls' funerals. The group, which is known for launching similar disruptive protests at funerals of soldiers killed in action during the Iraq war, had announced it would mount its latest protest outside services tomorrow for the young Amish girls who were gunned down at their school by Charles Roberts IV. The Westboro group said it planned to stage the protests to demonstrate its anger over Pennsylvania governor Ed Rendell's recent signing of legislation that amended the state's crimes code to make such demonstrations at funerals a

third-degree misdemeanor and to allow for the filing of civil actions against the demonstrators. A statement posted today on the Westboro Baptist Church Web site reads, "Above Picket Cancelled. In consideration for having WBC's representative on the Mike Gallagher Show from 10 to 11 a.m., Thursday, October 5, WBC has cancelled the above picket." Commenting on the deal, Salem Radio Network VP news and talk programming Tom Tradup told R&R, "All of us at SRN believe that shining the white hot light of public opinion on this protest group not only contributes to the marketplace of ideas but, more importantly, it preserves the dignity and privacy of the Amish families who have already suffered so greatly in this horrible incident. From Ft. Wayne.com: Posted on Fri, Aug. 25, 2006, Are you ready for football and religion? By Justin A. Cohn, The Journal Gazette

Redeemer Radio, WLKY, 1450 AM, is trying to make its presence felt locally through faith and football. A Catholic station based in Fort Wayne, it will broadcast Notre Dame's games this season. It will have other sports, too, including Fighting Irish men's basketball and high school football. "In the Catholic radio world, which is a really new, fast-growing phenomenon across the country, this is the typical model," said Chris Langford, president of Redeemer Radio. "We are a local group that has the zeal to evangelize the faith." And bring local fans their dose of Brady Quinn passes. Last season, Notre Dame football was available in the area only through Warsaw-based WRSW, 107.3 FM, while basketball was on its sister station, 1480 AM. That will continue this year. "We're just glad we are able to provide Fort Wayne with Notre Dame football," said Patrick Brown, general manager of 107.3-FM and 1480 AM, "and we'll still have football on the FM station. They'll be able to get us in Fort Wayne and as far as Van Wert, Ohio. To compete with (Redeemer Radio) is not something we're concerned about." But Redeemer Radio, which assumed its current format in December 2005, believes Notre Dame football should be available through a Fort Wayne-based station, too. "We were surprised to find out that ND football in particular, and men's basketball, did not have a Fort Wayne affiliate," Langford said. "As part of our mission to serve the Catholic community and foster Catholic education and the diocese, we thought that would be a great alignment with who we are as a Catholic radio station." Redeemer Radio, a not-for-profit entity, has 1,000 watts of power. According to the station, its broadcasts can be heard strongly throughout Allen County and at least as far as Ohio, Decatur, Columbia City and Auburn. Most of its programming consists of syndicated shows. Notre Dame football is aired via the Westwood One Radio Network, with Don Criqui as the play-by-play man and former Notre Dame running back Allen Pinkett as the color analyst. Westwood One officials were not available for comment. The Fighting Irish basketball broadcasts are aired through Notre Dame's own network. "Fort Wayne is an important market to us," said Scott Correia, general manager for Notre Dame sports properties, which handles the men's basketball broadcast rights. "We've got a lot of alumni and a lot of fans there in (northeast Indiana). We've played some games there. ... We know there's a high interest and this will help us reach that constituency and fan base. We're obviously a Catholic institution and for (Redeemer Radio) to be a Catholic station, they understand our values." Even though Redeemer Radio is a denominational network, it hopes people won't be afraid to tune in regardless of their beliefs. "Outreach to the community at large is part of why we're happy to have Notre Dame and the high-school programming," Langford said. "Our intent is to be evangelistic, to both Catholics and non-Catholics. We want to be there for everybody. We think this is an effective means to reaching more people. But if (people) want to tune in just for Notre Dame, they may do that, too." [jjohn@jg.net](mailto:john@jg.net). (DP-HI)

KTCT-1050 San Mateo, CA is heard ID'ing as "KNBR" not just the "KNBR2 1050" given in NRC Log 26<sup>th</sup> Edition. ID's as "KTCT" or even "KNBR2" are rare. This is similar to KBJD-1650 Denver, CO which often ID's as "KNUS" (KNUS is on 710). IRCAN's should watch out for such ID practices. (REW-HI)

CHMJ Vancouver, BC heard with a new format of conservative talk (the first time I have heard such a format from Canada) and ID'ing as "NW-98" or "KNW-98". It is unclear how it relates to CKNW-980 New Westminster, BC (a suburb of Vancouver). I agree with almost everything in the IRCA Countries List, compiled by Bruce Portzer, in DXM 10/6. However, I do think all countries should be listed under their political title when it differs significantly from the colloquial, or, every more so, the geographical title. Minor examples are Korea, North and Korea, South -- I use those myself; so do many, perhaps most, DXers. But do DXers say, or use, "Chagos Islands"? No, the British dependent territory issues stamps inscribed "British Indian Ocean Territory" and all mail should be so addressed. This topic has been discussed in the American Philatelist (articles by Steve Pendleton). "Chagos Islands" belongs to the same category as "Society Islands" -- a cross-reference, at most, but don't try addressing letters there! Malawi was never "Nyassaland". The only English spelling was Nyasaland. Nyassa was a province of Mozambique which issued stamps around 1900. On Page 14, the accent on Peru (accent over u) has slipped onto Peru (accent over e). But in English it isn't necessary, or even correct. Same with "Panama" (accent over last a). Just write, Peru, Panama. It may be confusing, but the only official name of the country listed as "Samoa, Western" is one word: Samoa. Should be listed as Samoa (formerly Western Samoa). Once again, check the country's postage stamps. Under South Africa, "the homeland republics" could be clarified by adding (former Bantustans). Correct spelling of the Dutch dependency is St. Eustatius (in Dutch, and in English, which is spoken there; the natives' affectionate nickname for it is Statia, again with a t). Under Taiwan, the current spelling of Quemoy is Kinmen, though Quemoy is historically acceptable. Finally, I believe loggings of the DPRK (N. Korea) "from before the Korean War in the 1950s" should be counted as DPRK, which was established in 1945. Also, among inactive and deleted countries, why is Wallis and Futuna, which I heard on 1189, omitted? (From rce, I need to add that I can't send my column using the accent marks and underlining because it is stripped out of

the column when I convert it to a text format so that it can be read by Phil. Thus, my insertions of the comments showing where the accent marks belong without actually showing it--rce)

Time for some statistics, as usual only on my catches since I reactivated in 11/05, and this time for North America (plus HI) only. Included are 2 talking houses and 1 TIS. Total US stations heard 298. US states heard 31. In order by state: CA 154, HI 35, WA 25, OR 18, TX 11, 4 stations each heard: CO and OK. 3 stns each; AK, AZ, NV, NY, OH, PA, UT. 2 each: GA, ID, IL, IA, LA, NE, NM, ND, WY. 1 each: FL, KY, MI, MN, MO, MT, ND, TN, also VI. Note the continued weak ranking of states only one state removed from the Pacific coast, ID, AZ, and NV, and contrast that with AB, which leads in Canada! On to Canada, no growth, stuck at 23 stations in 5 provinces: AB 10, BC 9, SK 2 and MB and ON one each. Big growth in Mexico, and 12 states heard there, 51 stations total. BCN 19, DF 10, JAL and SIN 5 each, CHI3 3; 2 each from BCS and COAH; 1 each CHIS, MICH, OAX. Closest unheard US states include SD, WI, MS and AL (all those were heard back in the 1980s). As I expected, the CKDO-1580 ON special was unheard. KBLA-CA is a ton of bricks here, with KMik close behind it and often on top at SSS. Of course, I'll be trying for all the promising DX tests. ## 2006 IRCA Convention (Seaside OR) Report

The Seaside IRCA convention was one of most successful ones in years with a whopping 36 in attendance. It was amazing how many came from East of the Mississippi. It was one fun filled 3 days with beautiful sunny weather, hardly a cloud anywhere and it the 70s-80s. The weather was perfect.

We had tours of all of the radio stations in Clatsop County, starting from KSWB Friday morning which was a one block walk from the Comfort Inn in downtown Seaside. The station is upstairs and we were greeted at the top of the stairs and had our tour. They have small studios on the second floor. We also had a very nice visit with John Chapman, the owner. We were given little packets of Coast 94.9 Seaside Coffee and coupons for McDonalds.

I started typing up the narrative on the convention and I received a wonderful narrative from John Bryant who did a fantastic job of the Saturday afternoon presentations. So I will let John take it from here and I will add the Sunday activities at the end.

**Notes on A Great Convention: IRCA's 2006 Convention in Seaside, Oregon, September 22 and 23, 2006**

"The Convention opened on Friday morning in the beautiful, small coastal town of Seaside, Oregon. Seaside first rose to prominence in the Roaring Twenties as a Summer Retreat for the well-to-do of Portland, then about a half-day drive inland from Seaside. The grand neo-classic hotel that was the

center of frivolity and elegance in the 20s has passed into history, with its site now occupied by a typical econo-box modern franchise hotel. Thankfully though, many of the other ornate commercial buildings that formed the compact heart of pre-War Seaside remain today and have been beautifully refurbished. So, a special elegance mixed with the near carney atmosphere of most beach tourist towns to form a backdrop for our 2006 Convention.

"The IRCA Board and Convention Host Patrick Martin are to be commended for their courage in holding the Convention at so remote a location: well over a 2 hour drive from Portland airport and double that from Seattle. The remote location plus moving the Convention beyond the traditional family vacation time period could have created an attendance disaster. Instead, the overall attendance was more than twice as large as any other recent Convention. BRAVO for everyone involved!!!

"After Friday morning check-in at the Comfort Inn, the first formal event was a very interesting tour of Seaside's own KSWB, a mere two blocks from our hotel. Friday afternoon featured a series of tours to Patrick Martin's home and DX Heaven. Patrick was kind enough to run three separate tours so that the crowd could be more easily accommodated. Frankly, Patrick's R-8 looks about like every other R-8 and his super-sized EWE also looks pretty much like every other tree-mounted EWE, albeit larger in size. In addition to Patrick's massive QSL collection, what really had everyone buzzing was Patrick's parabolic satellite antenna array and his ability to listen to all sorts of exotic foreign TV networks. The entire convention turned pale shades of green with jealousy.

"Those people not on a particular tour Friday afternoon congregated in Convention headquarters, meeting old friends and making new ones. There were contingents from the East Coast and Mid-West as well as from prairie Canada, so those of us from the West got a chance to meet a number of DXers face-to-face for the first time, after having seen their names, loggings and QSLs for years. DX techniques were discussed, tips shared and most of the old lies were trotted out one more time. Chris Black and John Bryant competed for the honor of telling the oldest joke and a great time was had by all.

"After dinner a various Seaside bistros, President Nick Hall-Patch convened the 2006 Annual Meeting promptly at 8:00 PM, as scheduled. Nick showed a real knack for leading a business meeting and moving us through a goodly amount of business in record time: 55 minutes flat. Bravo and Thank You, Nick!

"Some of the hardcore spent half of Friday night in the convention room, discussing DX and other appropriate subjects. A larger contingent slunk off to bed early, planning serious DXing from the motel balconies at dawn's early light.

"Saturday

"According to Nick Hall-Patch, the DX conditions on Saturday morning were not up to the exciting level of Friday's catches, but still, several folks enjoyed a plethora of hets and audios from several TP countries. With band fade, the Dawn DXers joined the slightly-saner majority of the group in the Breakfast Room for a sumptuous spread which included do-it-yourself waffles by the dozen. By 10:30, all were gathered for the twenty mile trek to the long-time bayside location of KAST, News & Talk 1370 in nearby Astoria, Oregon. The twin towers of KAST literally sit in the salty bay, about 50 feet off shore from the combined transmitter and studio building. Like many other middle sized towns, all radio stations in Astoria (two MW and five FM stations) are now owned by a single corporation, New Northwest Broadcasters. The Operations Manager of all seven stations gave us a superb tour of the facility. There were about seven on-air employees and around an equal number of Sales, Administrative and clerical staff. What a change from the Old Days when one station could have supported a staff of almost that size. Now it takes seven stations, most with some local programming, to support the staff. While we were at the station, we saw "The Future." In one room, seven black, normal-sized desktop computers with monitors were humming away. They were the seven new station servers for NNWB, Inc. Each dedicated to a single station, they will contain much of the programming, commercials, etc., to be fed to the transmitters on a pre-programmed basis, untouched by human hands. Although we should have thought how marvelous that technology could automate so much of the routine work so that the relatively small income from the stations could, in fact, support local staffs at all. Still, it was somehow appropriate to us old guys that the station/computers were all black.

"After a thought-provoking tour, we all scattered for lunch and headed toward Seaside. About a third of the group stopped for the tour of Patrick's QTH while the remainder had a few hours to enjoy Seaside. At three o'clock, John Bryant introduced the afternoon Presentation Session in the convention room to a packed house. Five presentations consumed the remainder of the afternoon. Nigel Pimblett of Alberta led off with an overview of International MW DXing from the Inland North, discussing the techniques, equipment and accomplishments of the Alberta gang over the last 20 years or so. One of the most interesting aspects of his presentation was the listing of countries heard, collectively. The Albertans, just across the Rockies from coastal British Columbia have heard 21 European Countries, but only three Asians (Japan, South Korea and Thailand.) They've also snared twenty in the Americas, including Argentina, 8 in Oceania and 3 in Africa, for a grand total of 55 countries... a compliment to all concerned! Steve Ratzlaff followed Nigel with a very interesting presentation on DXing Non-Directional Beacons, largely on the portion of MW that lays below the broadcast band. Steve provided us with an excellent primer in the form of a two-page handout with many tips and several helpful URLs. There is a decent chance that a few of us will add NDBs to our target list and most of the West Coast International gang are beginning to use NDBs across the Pacific as propagation indicators.

"John Bryant and Guy Atkins followed with an extended presentation on Computer-Controlled Receivers and Software-Defined Radios. Guy covered the first phase, the many advantages of controlling a "normal" solid state receiver with a good program. He used the highly regarded ERGO4 as an example of the assistance a computer can be to any of us. John Bryant followed with a thorough discussion of the WINRADIO 313E that he has used as his primary receiver for about a year. John, long in love with the SP-600 and other "real receivers," is so impressed with the capabilities of the WINRADIO 313 that he is selling his hotrodDED NRD-535 and his top-of-the-line TenTec 340. After John's presentation, Guy took us through the very similar capabilities of the SDR-1000 by FlexRadio. Guy, too, has abandoned normal receivers in favor of computer-driven black boxes and finds that their capabilities are such that he "can't imagine being limited to Old Fashioned radios in the future." Nick Hall-Patch closed out the afternoon session with a live demonstration of using Spectran software and his R-8A to detect the myriad of carriers that actually exist on a single channel, even during the day, and then measure the EXACT frequency (to the cycle, at least) of each one. We were all impressed to learn that doing such took only about 30 seconds of receiver time in one's normal DXing use of the radio. Further, the Spectran software is free. Nick recommended Spectran over some similar programs due to its simplicity of use.

"After a non-stop two and a half hour session, we were all ready to relax, so we headed for the Saturday evening banquet at the nearby Pig'nPancake restaurant. Some of us later admitted that we thought Convention Host Patrick Martin had lost his mind when he scheduled even an informal banquet at some place called "The Pig'nPancake." We should have known better. The food was superb and the service was even better! If you are ever in Seaside, Oregon at mealtime, the Pig'nPancake is right down in the center of Old Town on Broadway. Don't miss it!

"After the banquet, it was back to the main convention room for the annual Auction, ably led by the Head Auctioneer, Phil Bytheway. Phil and especially Patrick had worked long and hard to recruit auction items from various radio stations in the region. There were scads of stickers, surely over a hundred station shirts and other nice memorabilia. The high point of the auction was one of several receivers contributed, an RF-2800 Panasonic Command Series receiver from the 1980s. Happily, it was coveted by several DXers and the bidding was spirited. Quite a bit of money was raised for the club, by the way (\$410.50).

"Following the auction, the Convention was suitably closed by an hour long presentation by Scott Fybush titled "Tower Sites I Have Known and Photographed." Scott had made the same presentation to the NAB Convention last year. He spoke to a packed house. Frankly, a number of people were there to find out what could possibly be interesting about radio towers and what could cause an otherwise normal person to visit and photograph several thousand towers on several continents. It wasn't far into Scott's very professional presentation before he had the rapt attention of *everyone*. Scott showed us the oldest tower in continuous use (Mid-20s), the only remaining multi-wire flat-top transmission antenna (located in the Korean area of Los Angeles.) From there, he took us through a myriad of both historic and unusual towers and transmitting buildings in what was a very fitting climax to a superb radio convention.

"Sunday

"The breakfast room was the site for quick goodbyes on Sunday morning for most of us. Many needed to drive two or more hours to an airport, while others faced long drives and late arrivals at home. As we headed out of Seaside, we all left with more friends, both new and renewed and with a greater understanding of the fascinating avocation of MW DXing. In radio clubs, a few conventions are remembered for many years to come. Seaside 2006 was definitely one of those."

On Sunday morning, most attendees checked out and went on their way home or on trips down the Oregon Coast. I few stayed around. We took off after checking out of the Comfort Inn, and Neil Kazaross, Theo Donnally, Frank Merrill, Bill Block, and I all took off for Cannon Beach and drove along the beautiful coast. We stopped and several took pictures of the waves along the beach. We then drove up to Ecola State Park, North of Cannon Beach and sat at a picnic table talking and tuned across the dial on my Super Radio 1. DX is interesting up there hearing most of the Oregon coast stations. We headed back to the Comfort Inn and Neil and Theo left. Then Frank, Bill, and I went North to Fort Stevens State Park and walked along checking out Battery Russel and the remains from the days of WWII, where the area was shelled by the Japanese. After that we drove out to the Jetty and watched a beautiful sunset. It was the end of a fantastic weekend and convention.

I want to thank everyone for making the 2006 IRCA convention one of the best ever.



- 1323 **SOUTH KOREA** Ulleung/Yeonggwang HLCU/HLQJ KBS1. Oct 6 1420. A male in Korean under CRI. HLCU is more likely because it is on an island off the east coast of Korea. (Harms Oct 2006)
- 1332 **JAPAN** Nagoya JOSF Tokai Hoso. Oct 6 1044 Male in Japanese. Also a rapid fire male on Oct 7 0902 presumably announcing a sports event, and On Oct 7 1512 a man singing in EE, excited female announcer in Japanese, followed by ads by a man and a woman. (Harms Oct 2006)
