



From our good friend in Denmark and Chairman of the Danish Shortwave Listeners Club **Anker Petersen** comes the following news and information. "Through our member in Germany, **Robert Kipp**, the Danish Shortwave Club International (DSWCI) has contact with the new station manager of Radio St. Helena, Mr. Ralph Peters, to try to get the QSL situation settled for those DXers who did report their special broadcast on SW in 1999. About 250 QSLs were sent out to DXers around the world. Radio St. Helena has, however, no knowledge as to whether the DXers have received the QSLs. They have asked the DSWCI to try to help find out whether the QSLs have arrived or not. Thus, if you did send R St. Helena a reception report in 1999 and have received their QSL, please do nothing. But if you did so and did not receive their QSL, please inform before 31<sup>st</sup> Dec. 2003 Robert Kipp at RDC-Roberts-Data@t-online.de or by letter to Robert Kipp, Hugelstrasse 25, D-63225 Langen, Germany." Thanks Anker and Robert!

The Broadband over Power Line (BPL) issue continues to simmer. A meeting sponsored by the American Radio Relay League and hosted by the National Association of Broadcasters was scheduled for Washington, DC on November 7<sup>th</sup> to discuss BPL. Our own **Joe Buch** made the trip to represent the club and its shortwave listeners. You can read all about it in Joe's *Technical Topics* column this month. There were more than 4,600 com-

ments filed in response to the Notice of Inquiry at Docket 03-103. The vast majority of comments point out the threat of interference to radio services.

**Dr. Adrian Peterson** provides the results of Adventist World Radio's Wavescan DX Program DX contest that ran throughout the month of September 2003. A large number of entries came in from all areas of the world. The First Place winner, **Guntur Jacob** of Germany, received the coveted Bronze Medallion, as well as an autographed copy of Jerry Berg's book, *On the Shortwaves*.

The Association of International Broadcasters (AIB) has scheduled its 2004 Conference in Prague, Czech Republic on 12-13 May 2004. The third Global Media Business Conference is the only event on the broadcasting calendar that specifically addresses the issues facing the international broadcasting industry. Over 170 delegates from over 20 countries participated in the 2003 event in London earlier this year. AIB announced that Radio Free Europe/Radio Liberty will be the official partner, hosting the conference at its central Prague offices.

Once the holidays have passed, it's time to begin getting serious about attending the 17<sup>th</sup> annual Winter SWL Festival in March. Join hosts **Richard Cuff** and **John Figliozzi** and their team of elves at this club sponsored event that brings together a lot of radio enthusiasts for a great weekend of fun. Watch for updates in Rich's *Easy Listening* column, the *Calendar of Events* and the pages of the *Journal* for the registration form. This is one event you do not want to miss. 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## FRENDX: Twenty Five Years Ago (November 1978)

The *Roll Call* featured 48 new members including a Frederick J. Osterman from Pataskala, Ohio. Mac Leonhardt reported that Radio RSA cut its English language DX program on short notice. Program host Gerry E. Wood used the pages of *NASWA* to say a farewell. In his *Listeners Notebook* column, Glenn Hauser encouraged letters to Radio RSA urging them to bring Gerry back. In November, just over 1,700 copies of *Frendx* were mailed compared to 1,560 copies the previous November. In the *Shortwave Center*, Jerry Lineback wrote an article about "Selectivity." Based on his conversation with listeners visiting Gilfer Radio, Perry Ferrell wrote about WARC-79. David Mattis wrote about adding digital frequency readout to the DX-160 while Dave Valko wrote about antennas. In *Log Report A*, editor Dan Robinson reported that his antennas blew down after logging Radio Andorra on 6215 kHz at 2100 UTC. Donald Erickson was taking advance orders for the *WRTVH 1979* at \$12.00.

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# Musings

I am curious if any NASWA members are equipped to receive DRM? With some amount of fanfare, this new digital audio mode was officially inaugurated by the cooperating broadcasters of the DRM consortium in June. The trouble is, I doubt if they have more than a very tiny handful of listeners.

The obvious problem is the lack of a DRM receiver. The only available scheme at present involves a modified traditional shortwave receiver, a PC with soundcard, and some software. I don't know about you, but I have yet to find a way to keep the unintentional RF radiated by the computer and monitor from getting into the front end of any receiver, so I am reluctant to start modifying my receiver and computer to attempt to receive DRM. Also, is it really worth it? I have heard reports that the signal drop-put rate of DRM due to propagation is pretty high. With analog signals there is no total dropout, just degradation. Your analog receiver and your brain's perceptive abilities can work around that most of the time.

Another problem I have begun to notice now that there is more DRM on the air is interference. DRM signals are currently supposed to be confined to an occupied bandwidth of 10kHz, like analog signals. The theory here is that the 10kHz-bandwidth restriction protects signals on adjacent channels. But the reality is that the spectral density (amount of energy) contained in a DRM signal is at the same constant high level throughout that 10kHz channel, while for an analog signal limited to 10kHz, the amount of energy is concentrated near the carrier, with a gradual drop-off in energy toward the edges of the channel. The practical result is that with two 10kHz-wide analog signals of equal strength next to each other, there is relatively less spectral energy overlap at the channel edges, and you get that familiar, somewhat tolerable, splatter. On the other hand, an analog signal next to a DRM of equal strength suffers from the much higher energy available at the channel edge of the DRM. The result is that even strong analog signals are often overwhelmed by the growl from a nearby DRM that is of equal, or even somewhat lesser strength. Some people have even characterized this as being as effective as jamming, and I am inclined to agree partly, although the DRM interference is not intentional.

With this interference issue in mind, I think it would be a great benefit for frequency planners to try to keep analog and DRM separate in each of the various SW broadcast bands. This would be similar to what is done in the ham DRM where areas are allocated for CW, packet, phone, etc. For example, 10 meters could be set up so that 15375 kHz and above is all DRM, while 15350 kHz and below is all analog. Maybe a different ration would be appropriate. Maybe splitting the bands would also cause too much band crowding for existing broadcasters, but here I must point out that the characteristics of DRM already make the one or two channels on either side of it essentially useless anyway, so the available space for analog is already being diminished.

Something to think about, anyway.

Other than knowing the site was originally a degaussing station for minesweepers in WW II, personnel didn't know much about the history of the site or the radio connections. Younger NASWA members may not know this location was the original site for WWVH before it moved to Kauai. I filled them in on the history of the place, but they would like to put together some pictorial and anecdotal history for their visitors. Here is a musing for help for me. I need some opinions. I am about to build 200 foot longwire antenna for shortwave listening and DXing at my new very-rural home. It will be the standard 30 to 50 feet above the ground with one end connected to a tree and the other connected to the house. I will have about 20 feet of coax lead in with the center conductor connected to the longwire and the braid shield going directly to a ground rod outside below where it is fastened to the house. The ground rod will only have the antenna on it. It is not sharing the home electrical system or phone line ground. (Steve has now completed the project and plans to write about it in detail in the near future. RAD)

I am wondering if anyone has had any experience with the RF Systems balun for receive only from Universal Radio. This is said to couple your antenna to the radio to help eliminate a lot of interference from the coax line and to help match impedance between the two. Can anyone share his or her experience through Musings? Is it worth the \$70? It was such a nice day yesterday (Nov. 1) that I took my Sony ICF-SW7600G receiver and the AN-LP1 active antenna (which was hung to a fence) to an open athletic field in Vincentown, NJ to do my loggings for the *Flashsheet*. Listening to distant stations away from those usual noises at home is worth it if you can take a few hours of your time to find a good place to get the most out of your portable (or portatop) SW rig! I hope that other NASWA members take my idea under consideration. You don't have to go to some big DXpedition far away, just find a good open area away from any power lines, PCs, etc. Take a good portable with a short wire antenna (a roll-up antenna or a short wire tied to the radio's whip will do, or if you have a Sony combo like what I use, above, it's very good to try some weak-signal daytime listening) and set it up and see what results you can hear. Of course, results depend on location, the type of receiver/antenna you have, sensitivity of the receiver, and reception conditions!

I read with interest the letter from Mr. Fraser concerning IRCS, Aerograms, and U. S. Post Office International Money Orders.

According to the US Post Office's website, International Money Orders are only accepted in 30 countries throughout the world, with England not being one of them. Most of the countries listed were in the Caribbean, Latin America, or Africa.

IRCS are almost impossible to find in my part of the country. Only two Post Offices in my area stock them, and I have had others tell me it is impossible to special order them. I still can find and regularly use Aerograms for notes to overseas stations when too much detail is not required, but the difference in cost is getting so little that I usually just type a letter.

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## On the Short Waves by Jerry Berg

<[www.ontheshortwaves.com](http://www.ontheshortwaves.com)> Update, October 26, 2003—Under "Articles, Research, etc.," "Pot Pourri," some more station postcards. (1) Two 1935 views of the facility of WCAU, Philadelphia, which housed both the 50 kw MW transmitter and 1 kw SW transmitter, callsign W3XAU. (2) Two views of PRA8, Radio Clube de Pernambuco, Recife, Brazil, which was a regular on shortwave for many years. (3) Another view of the RCA transmitting facility at Rocky Point, Long Island (see last week's postings for the first).—Regarding my question in a previous posting about a Chinese postcard of a station in Taihoku, both Adrian Peterson and Henrik Klemetz referred me to Adrian's previous *Wavescan* articles on the early radio scene in Taiwan, in particular *Wavescans* #268 (February 13, 2000) and 342 (July 15, 2001; see the "Research" section under "Articles, Research, etc." for #342). Adrian points out that Taihoku was the name for Taipei, Taiwan, when the island was under the Japanese in the era before WW II. So the postcard is from Taiwan, and Adrian feels it probably dates from around 1940, most likely being from JFAB/JFAK, which broadcast first on shortwave and later on both SW and mediumwave. Thanks, AP and HK.—And in a late E-mail, ace DXer Tetsuya Hirahara of Japan notes as well that Taihoku is the Japanese pronunciation of Taipei, and that the station name is mentioned in Chinese characters which can be read as "Taihoku Hosokyoku" in Japanese, or "Taipei Broadcasting Station" (JFAK). These LW and MW listings are from around the 1941-1944 era. Note that the Podedhrad site in occupied Czechoslovakia is listed, along with various stations that are still on the air, e.g. Warsaw 224 (now 225), Luxembourg 232 (now 234), Stuttgart Muehlacker 574 (now 576), Vienna Bisamberg 592 (now ITU registered 585), Prague 638, Leipzig Wiederau 785 (now 783), and Warsaw 1384 (now Kaliningrad Bolshakovo [soon Sitkunai, Lithuania] 1386).

Although these cover a wide variety of technological events, of special interest to DXers will be those dealing with the Alexanderson alternator, code breaking at Bletchley Park, the directive shortwave antenna, shortwave transmissions from Byrd's 1934 Antarctic expedition, reception of Transatlantic radio signals, radio station KDKA, and others.

**STATIONS.** (1) Canadian Radio History <<http://www.odxa.on.ca/archives/timelinehome.html>> This part of the Ontario DX Association website presents three interesting aids to understanding Canadian radio history: a timeline for general Canadian broadcasting and a timeline for Canadian shortwave broadcasting (the only radio timelines I have seen going back to 1642), and a valuable list of books dealing with Canadian radio history. (2) Radio and TV Transmitters in France <<http://perso.wanadoo.fr/tvignaud/index.html>> Although this site is in French, English speakers may enjoy stumbling around it for the pictures alone. Look especially under "Allouis (F. Inter)" and "RFI-Issoudun/Allouis."

**VERIFICATIONS.** John Swatko's Radio Scrapbook, 1934 <[http://www.radiold.com/ephemera/radio\\_letters/sc\\_swatko.htm](http://www.radiold.com/ephemera/radio_letters/sc_swatko.htm)> This website shows the scrapbook of John Swatko, who appears to have been a *BCB* DXer from Homestead, Pennsylvania and a member of the Newark News Radio Club in 1934. Inside the scrapbook are a number of articles, membership cards and DX stickers that relate to Mr. Swatko's DX hobby. You can click on the pictures to see larger images of a few of the pages. Most important, the scrapbook contains some 116 QSL cards and letters, some with *EKKO* stamps and postmarks, which Mr. Swatko collected from the early 1930s, and all have been scanned in good quality and are nicely viewable on the site. The site's author notes: "When I was looking through the letters I noticed that one from 1932 is from my hometown of Manitowoc, Wisconsin. I also noticed that the station manager and owner had a surname that is shared by some of my relatives. After contacting some of my relatives, I was surprised to find out that he was a distant relative of mine."

**STATIONS AND VOICES OF WAR.** *Black Boomerang* <<http://www.seftondelmer.co.uk/>> *Black Boomerang* is a highly regarded book by Sefton Delmer which tells the story of the World War II psychological warfare effort that Delmer headed in Britain, in particular its clandestine broadcasting efforts which included stations like Gustav Siegfried Eins, Soldatensender Calais and Atlantiksender. The book was published in 1962. Now it is available in part on line, thanks to the efforts of Sefton Delmer's son, Felix Sefton Delmer. At this URL you will find the first part of the book. The second part is expected to be posted soon. In some respects the on-line version improves upon the original in that it includes photographs (none in the book) and references to an interesting on-line database of wartime black propaganda leaflets <<http://www.psywar.org/>> Thanks to Felix Delmer for informing [www.ontheshortwaves.com](http://www.ontheshortwaves.com) of this important effort.

**POST-WAR SHORTWAVE.** Radio jamming in Estonia <<http://www.okupatsioon.ee/english/mailbox/radio/radio.html>> This interesting website was composed by I. Hallas, who worked in an Estonian jamming station in 1955. The article details the jamming process, including frequencies, antennas, personnel, organization, and how the noise was made. One of the most interesting parts is the photos, made in 1956 and 1957. "It was strictly forbidden to talk to any acquaintance or relative about the work. Needless to say, photographing the objekt [the station] was just as strictly forbidden. Getting caught could have brought with it a 25 year prison sentence. Nevertheless, we took pictures, talked about our work, and sometimes, at night, even brought in friends to show them the jammers. No one got caught."

# Easy Listening

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## Holiday programming notes

With the Christmas and New Year's holidays upon us, you can expect some special programming once again, as is typical for most broadcasters. Here are some specials known to be in the works:

### Voice of America

**VOA News Now** will be featuring a Special Christmas program called *The 12 Hours of Christmas*. It is a syndicated program from Kris Eric Stevens Productions. The show features Christmas classics from yesterday and today plus holiday features and vignettes. This program will run from 0000 UTC through 23 hours UTC on Christmas day.

Kim Elliott (formerly of *Communications World*) will be hosting *Talk to America* on January 1<sup>st</sup>. The future of international broadcasting will be Kim's subject. *Talk to America* airs after the 1700 UTC news. Hearing the VOA on shortwave at that time of day isn't easy in North America; frequencies targeting Africa may be your best bet: 13710, 15240, 15445 and 17895 kHz. A live webcast is also available at the VOA website.

### BBC World Service

Wednesday, December 24<sup>th</sup> (Christmas Eve), 1306 UT, repeated Christmas Day 0006: *Outlook* will broadcast live from the courtyard of Somerset House, across from the World Service headquarters; each year this courtyard becomes a giant ice rink in December, and is one of the highlights of London over the holidays.

Wednesday, December 24<sup>th</sup> (Christmas Eve), 1502 (repeated Christmas Day 0132): It's the annual *Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols*, from King's College in Cambridge. This is a service of bible readings and beautiful choral music celebrating the birth of

Christ. Traditional music and new music specially composed for the occasion will be featured.

Thursday, December 25<sup>th</sup> (Christmas Day) 1606: It's the annual *Queen's Christmas Message to the Commonwealth*, a traditional component of the BBC's Christmas programming.

Friday, December 26<sup>th</sup> features a special Boxing Day edition of *Sportsworld* at 1506 UT. It's a day of special sporting events in many places.

Sunday, December 28<sup>th</sup>, 1332 and 2232: *In Praise of God* features a special on the Jewish festival of Hanukkah.

Friday, January 2<sup>nd</sup>, 1406, repeated Saturday, 0106: Colin Maitland looks back at the highlights of the 2003 sporting year in *Review of the Year*; you can send your thoughts on the most important sporting events of the year to [sportsworld@bbc.co.uk](mailto:sportsworld@bbc.co.uk).

### Radio Australia

As is usually the case, **Radio Australia's** schedule will see significant seasonal alterations in December and January as several programs take summer breaks.

Specifically, at Christmastide, you can expect Radio Australia to link with a domestic network for most of our day—a combination of Radio National and Metropolitan networks. Expect the special programming to begin at 2100 UT on December 24 and continue until 0900 UT on December 25. Their format will be similar to previous years with religious specials, Christmas music, Christmas stories and talkback with Australians as they celebrate Christmas Day. Each Australian state will likely contribute a couple of hours to the broadcast. (courtesy of John Figliozzi)

In addition to the specific items noted above, here are some programming suggestions compiled from past years. The ODXA's Fred Waterer, who writes the programming column for the ODXA's bulletin, *Listening In*, and John Figliozzi, no stranger to NASWA members, who writes about programming for *Monitoring Times*, helped out with much of this information.

#### **EWTN and Vatican Radio**

You can expect special Midnight Catholic masses from these stations, plus more detailed accounts of the Pope's Christmas activities than you would find elsewhere. (via Fred Waterer/ODXA)

#### **Radio Canada International / CBC**

*As It Happens*, especially on Christmas Eve, produces a special annual program. Each year, the program contacts members of the Canadian Armed Forces serving with the UN, NATO, NORAD and those serving in the far north. Each unit has 3 or 4 people speak for those serving with the unit. They send Christmas greetings to loved ones at home and describe how they are celebrating Christmas where they are. At the conclusion of the greetings, the units are each invited to sing a verse of a Christmas carol. In past years, the units have served in such diverse locations as Canadian Forces Base Alert (Arctic), Colorado Springs (NORAD), Germany, Cyprus, Golan Heights, Bermuda (!), the Persian Gulf, Somalia, Bosnia and Croatia, and Kosovo. No doubt there will be greetings from the task force in the Gulf. It is a really nice program. It also has its moments of humor, such as the time the Canadian naval personnel stationed in Bermuda tried to claim they missed the Canadian winter real bad! (via Fred Waterer/ODXA).

In general, *As It Happens* has had its own tradition of storytelling during the week or so leading up to Christmas. (via John Figliozzi)

#### **Deutsche Welle**

Last year, a Christmas special aired on December 24<sup>th</sup> in the English language editions airing from 0900 onward, and on December 25<sup>th</sup> through the 0600 English

release. One version of the special aired December 24<sup>th</sup> at 09, 11, 16, and 19 UT; the second edition aired December 24<sup>th</sup> at 20, 21, and 23 UT and also December 25<sup>th</sup> hourly from 01 to 06 UT, including the North American releases at 01, 03, and 05 UT. Also, Deutsche Welle aired a New Year's special on December 31<sup>st</sup> and January 1<sup>st</sup> using the same approach described above.

Also, Deutsche Welle's 24 hour German language service has always programmed a wide variety of Holiday music on Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, New Year's Eve and New Year's Day. Even though Deutsche Welle has scaled back their German language short-wave service to North America, you should have no trouble locating them on the dial during local evenings. (via John Figliozzi) One doesn't need to know German to appreciate good music!

#### **Eastern Europe (e.g. Ukraine, Russia, Bulgaria, Hungary, Czech Republic, Slovakia)**

The communist regimes governing these countries for most of the 1900s officially stifled the outward expression of religion, and it is interesting to see how many of these countries' broadcasters seem to be making up for lost time by including religious celebrations more overtly than their non-communist brethren. Fred Waterer recommends the shortwave services from Bulgaria, Russia, and Ukraine as likely sources for holiday music. Remember that the Orthodox Christian church celebrates Christmas on January 6<sup>th</sup>—so you'll hear New Year's programming before you hear Christmas programming!

#### **New Zealand**

Fred Waterer noted in 1999 that **Radio New Zealand International** featured, among other things a Maori rendition of Silent Night; a special Christmas edition of *Sounds Historical*; Christmas coincides with ANZAC Day and the anniversary of the foundation of the NZ Communist party.

#### **Other broadcasters**

As Fred Waterer reminded me, expect pre-recorded programming to prevail over the holidays, with heavy emphasis on year-in-review programs along with special

extended features that were recorded in advance. Broadcasters do this to enable their staffs to spend time with their families around the holidays.

Other examples reported by the ODXA's Harold Sellers from years past:

¶ **RAI Italy** presented an extensive report on the Pope's Christmas homily.

¶ **Channel Africa**, played a traditional African hymn during a brief tune-in.

¶ **AIR India (All India Radio)** from 2052 to the news at 2100 played several Christmas carols, performed by a children's choir in Hindi. For example, Harold recognized Hark The Herald Angels Sing and O Come All Ye Faithful.

## Radio Australia: *Feedback* leaves the air; other seasonal changes

Another radio and media-related program left the airwaves this past month: ***Feedback*** from **Radio Australia**. I, for one, will miss ***Feedback***. I came to enjoy the "behind the scenes" look at Radio Australia programming plans and strategies each week. Once ***Communications World*** left the air, ***Feedback*** became one of the best programs for coverage of *Digital Radio Mondiale* and the relationships of shortwave to other media.

This is also the time of year when Radio Australia has many seasonal changes as programs take summer holidays. This schedule isn't complete yet—more is known about the programs taking holidays, versus what will be replacing these programs. I'll pass along subsequent changes in the *NASWA Flashsheet* and the *swprograms* e-mail list.

Weekdays, 0000: ***Asia Pacific*** will finish on 24 December. Some form of current affairs will air in this slot and the 2300 UT slot, but there is no title for the program as yet. ***Asia Pacific*** will return on January 5<sup>th</sup>.

Weekdays, 0210: ***The World Today***'s final broadcast will be 19 December. The program will return on January 19<sup>th</sup>. You can expect the ***Margaret Throsby Interview*** (from 0410) to fill this slot in the interim.

Weekdays, 0320: ***Life Matters*** will finish on December 19<sup>th</sup>. Its replacement is not known at this time; the program returns January 28<sup>th</sup>.

Weekdays, 0410: With ***Margaret Throsby*** moving to 0210, repeat editions of other programs will fill this slot as follows: ***AWAYE*** (Mondays), ***Science Show*** (Tuesdays), ***The National Interest*** (Wednesdays), ***Background Briefing*** (Thursdays), ***Hindsight*** (Fridays)

Weekdays, 0810: ***PM***'s final broadcast will be December 19<sup>th</sup>. It will be replaced with an as-yet unnamed current affairs special program, followed at 0830 by ***Health Report*** (Mondays), ***Law Report*** (Tuesdays), ***Religion Report*** (Wednesdays), ***Media Report*** (Thursdays), ***Sports Factor*** (Fridays).

Weekdays 0910: ***Australia Talks Back***'s final broadcast will be December 19<sup>th</sup>; the program will return January 28<sup>th</sup>. A replacement program has not yet been identified for this time slot.

Weekdays 1005: ***Asia Pacific*** departs as of December 24<sup>th</sup> until January 5<sup>th</sup>; a current affairs special will replace it.

Weekdays 1105: ***Asia Pacific*** departs as noted above; the full 55-minute ***Life Matters*** program will take its slot. This also fills the ***Bush Telegraph*** slot; it will return January 28<sup>th</sup>.

Weekdays 1410: ***PM*** departs, as noted above; a replacement has not yet been identified.

Weekdays 1505: ***Asia Pacific*** departs, as previously noted. A replacement has not yet been identified.

Weekdays 1605: **Bush Telegraph** takes a holiday as of December 19<sup>th</sup>; a replacement hasn't yet been named. **Bush Telegraph** returns January 28<sup>th</sup>.

Weekdays 1705: **Australia Talks Back** takes a holiday from December 19<sup>th</sup> to December 28<sup>th</sup>; a replacement has not yet been named.

Saturdays, 2205, and Sundays 0105, 0705, and 1105: **Correspondent's Report** goes on holiday as of December 21<sup>st</sup>; it will return February 1<sup>st</sup>. A current affairs special program will air in its place.

Another change sees **Australia Now** ending its run; it will be replaced by a repeat airing of the 13-part series **Time to Talk**, a series about governance in the Pacific. People from around the region talk about their culture, politics and society in the 21st century. An interactive website is at URL [www.abc.net.au/timetotalk](http://www.abc.net.au/timetotalk). **Time to Talk** will air Wednesday 2130, Saturday 1505, Sunday 0830 UT.

I apologize in advance if this information turns out to be incorrect; I'll correct and amend this via the online information sources noted above.

## BBC World Service program highlights

Tuesdays, 1506 and 2206; Wednesdays, 0206: **Go Digital** will have two special programs asking whether or not digital technology can help alleviate world poverty. Special

webcast features will be available at the World Service website; click on "Technology" to reach the **Go Digital** features. The specific dates for these programs was not available at presstime; check the online sources noted above for updates.

Wednesdays, beginning December 17<sup>th</sup>, 1545 and 2245; repeated Thursdays, 0245: **Heart and Soul** will feature a four-week series called **Modern Muslim Marriage**; the program visits Muslim communities in Britain, Malaysia and Iran to assess how Muslims are struggling to reconcile cultural expectations with their commitment to Islam.

Wednesday, December 17<sup>th</sup>, 1506 and Thursday, 0206: **Discovery** airs a special program marking the centenary of the Wright brothers' first powered flight. One week later, **Discovery** takes up the landing of the spacecraft *Beagle 2* on Mars with a special feature called *Small Dog on Mars*.

This should give you plenty of reasons to listen to the radio in December. I'm still interested in hearing your ideas for programming topics for exploration in this column. Please get in touch via e-mail or postal mail as shown at the beginning of the column.

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## The Radio Boy Scouts

A DXpedition of sorts to Cedarlands Boy Scout Camp July 2003

All of our listening was done while teaching/earning the Shortwave Listener Radio Merit Badge at Cedarlands Boy Scout Camp, Long Lake, NY in the Adirondacks; July 19-25, 2003 for scouts from Troop 3 BSA, Hatboro, PA. A relaxing week in the Adirondacks at Boy Scout Camp you say? Sounds like fun; and it was. Especially given that I was again teaching the SWL version of the Radio merit badge to Boy Scouts from Troop 3 during this week.

I brought along a Lowe HF 150 and an ample supply of batteries, a Grundig FR-200 emergency AM/FM/SW radio and a hand-held scanner. Out of the 54 scouts and 20 adults who went on this trip, 5 scouts signed up for the merit badge, Bryan Cross, Corey Boyle, Dan Field, Will Wojik, and Teague Kelly.

The week was filled with many other activities and merit badges; i.e., swimming, camping, cooking, hiking, sailboating, rock

climbing, wilderness survival, rifle shooting, archery, canoeing, First Aid, Tenderfoot, 1<sup>st</sup> Class, 2<sup>nd</sup> Class and other skills. There was also ample time to just plain goof off!

The first few days, we found it difficult to find the time to learn the theory required and then turn on the radios. The camping was in tents, but the boys needed to work as patrols to slog through the mud to the commissary (it rained 60% of the week we were there; day and night) to pick up food for each meal, cook it and clean up after themselves. Sounds relatively easy? Try cooking outdoors and boiling your water to clean up- all in an hours time. But the reward of exotic signals from the other side of the world awaiting brought the boys together each day. Remember the thrill and anticipation of music out of the Arabian nights? How about the wonder of all of the different languages; the hope of hearing secret signals from government agents? All this brought many of us to shortwave—it's still there. Ask any of these boys. Adventure awaits each time you turn on the radio. You never know what you'll hear.

To earn the radio merit badge one needs to learn about propagation and the ionosphere. The boys learned the uses of WWV to determine conditions at different times of the day and different frequency ranges. We explored the use of the different frequency bands for commercial, amateur, and public radio. We looked at a bit of electronic theory: the different types of equipment to transmit and receive; block and schematic diagrams and the uses and symbols for different components. Thank goodness for the web! I'm no expert in electronic theory, but there are good references so even I could present the basic electronic theory to the scouts.

The reward for getting through the theory was for each boy to get his hands on the dials. We found the time to sit down and have the boys tune the dials and listen to shortwave for 4 evenings and 2 mornings during our week. Like all good DXers and

SWLs, loggings needed an ID to be recorded. Each boy got a chance to show their skills and unique talents here. These young men are middle and high school age and all currently taking language classes. It was great to have a scout describe the argument the man and woman were having during one Spanish broadcast!

During our radio time, each scout kept a sheet or two of their loggings—they can look back later at their radio adventure. What I'll remember the most was the enjoyment of these young men tuning a signal from a foreign land, with hopes of an exotic logging...listening long enough to discuss what it might be...then finally hearing the station identify itself—maybe delivering that rare logging, but even when not, delivering a rare glimpse into the thrill of shortwave, the learning about other cultures, other countries, other people. Pretty much the same magic that brings me back to shortwave, time after time.

# Organizing the Shack

I recently renewed my interest in DXing and QSL hunting. My reduced activity in recent years resulted in some incomplete record keeping and an incomplete picture of what stations were still out there that I needed. Therefore, I had to go through all my files and update such things as stations heard/verified, target lists, etc. What I did was not complex, but here is a synopsis which may help you in reorganizing that shack or organizing it for the first time. This is the inexpensive, bare bones version, not by any means all-inclusive. There are lots of commercially available resources and programs to help you do some of these things, but this is the homemade version of doing the "paper work" and a starting point.

**Stations Heard**—Go through your logbook and make a list of the stations you have heard. This should include station name, city, country, frequency, and whether you have a QSL. City and country should be that of the transmitter site. Next, enter this on the computer and sort by country. This can be done in a work processor or a data base. You may sort by frequency if you choose or make one list of each and print. This is helpful to determine whether what you have just logged is something you have or something you still need.

**QSLs**—I started years ago by keeping a chronological list of QSLs as I received them. Again, note the frequency and transmitter location you verified. This list can then aid you in applying for NASWA Awards.

**Stations/Countries Needed**—If you're country counting, take the *NASWA Country List* and make a list of the ones you don't have. Next, fill in the station name, frequency, and time where you might hear this in your area from information out of the Tropical and International Band Loggings Columns or Listener's Notebook. If it is from the

International Bands, you should also note the language it will be in. You may want to enter this list on the computer and sort by UTC time. If you're station hunting, you can again create your list from the Logging Columns, Flash Sheet, or by digging through the *WRTH*. Again, you want to jot down the UTC times through someone in your location may have a good shot of hearing the station. If you need scores of Tropical Band stations, you may be overwhelmed by just jotting down every station you don't have. I jot down the ones that were recently heard by other DXers. Then I also bandscan during prime DX hours (hours of darkness).

**Awards**—DX Centurion, etc.—From your by-country listing of stations heard/verified, make a list of one station per country so that you have that list ready for when you become eligible for the DX Centurion Award and its successors. You will need to plug in the dates of reception for each QSL. If you are doing this from scratch, it can be a job but it is worth it. Once you've done it, it's always at your disposal.

**Award Parameters**—Take the *NASWA Country List/Awards Booklet* and write down the awards you don't have. Next write down the requirements for each. For instance, the Brazilian award requires QSLs from 20 Brazilian states. What are these states? Look under Brazil in the *WRTH*. In the addresses section, the addresses are divided up by state. Write down the names of the states. Whenever you hear a new Brazilian, check what state it is from. If you QSL it, check it off of the list of Brazilian states. For all awards, keep your running list/tally up to date. That way, when you have all the requirements for that award, you can type it up and drop it in the mail instead of compiling the data at the last minute. I know when I become eligible for an award, I want to type up that application ASAP.

**Transmitter Sites**—Now that the Soviet Union has broken up, it is even easier to

determine which transmitter sites belong to which country. I am also thinking of Papua New Guinea and Indonesia here. You can pretty much figure these out by looking at the maps at your disposal and the addresses of the stations as shown in the *WRTH* or *Passport*. Make a list of the radio countries and which stations belong to these. This makes it easy to plug in whether what you are hearing on your radio is a new country for you.

**Maps**—I have a wall map with map tacks of all the station locations I've heard. I have one large pushpin in Manitowoc. Get a detailed world atlas for locating those tropical band stations. Then even if the city isn't on your wall map, you can put the map tack in the approximate place. You may also want to get individual fold-out country maps for the countries you are most interested in, such as Indonesia.

**Reception Reporting**—Writing your reports on the computer gives you an easy way to retain a copy for follow up if needed. Using a word processor or Microsoft Publisher, you can also make your own letterhead and add graphics to draw attention to your report once it reaches the station. For reporting to the international broadcasters, you may want to make up your own reception report form and just print blank copies to be filled in when needed. Make a list of the stations you have reports out to and the date each report and follow-up went out. Also note what enclosures or return postage you may have sent. Each week or month, go through the list and make a note to yourself of those stations which have not responded in 3-4 months and then do a follow-up. This is only for you diehard QSL hunters. Many of you may not want to put the effort into it. It sure beats years ago when we pounded out the reports on a manual typewriter.

## DX Target: Radio UNAMSIL

### The United Nations Mission in Sierra Leone

Sierra Leone is a Western African country that had been locked in civil war conflict

for over a decade. The United Nations ("UN") Security Council established the United Nations Mission in Sierra Leone ("UNAMSIL") to cooperate with the Government and the other parties in implementing the Lomé Peace Agreement and to assist in the implementation of the disarmament, demobilization and reintegration plan. On 22 October 1999, the UN Security Council ("Council") authorized the establishment of UNAMSIL. Subsequently, the Council has revised UNAMSIL's mandate and expanded its size on 7 February 2000, on 19 May 2000, and on 30 March 2001. Radio UNAMSIL is the voice of the United Nations Mission in Sierra Leone. This DX Target will focus on Sierra Leone and the radio station with a mission of providing radio programming aimed at maintaining calm and cultivating trust among groups and individuals in this war torn African country.



## The Country

Sierra Leone is a developing country in Western Africa, bordering the North Atlantic Ocean, between Guinea and Liberia that is emerging from a ten-year civil war. English is the official language, but Krio, an English-based dialect, is widely used.

The climate is tropical, hot and humid during the summer rainy season, which runs from May to December. The winter (December to April) is the dry season. Rainfall along the coast can reach 495 cm (195 inches) a year, making it one of the wettest places along coastal, western Africa

Sierra Leone is an extremely poor African nation with tremendous inequality in income distribution. It does have substantial mineral, agricultural, and fishery resources. However, the economic and social infrastructure is not well developed, and serious social disorders continue to hamper economic development, following a more than a decade long civil war. About two-thirds of the working-age population engages in subsistence agriculture. Manufacturing consists mainly of the processing of raw materials and of light manufacturing for the domestic market. There are plans to reopen bauxite and rutile mines shut down during the conflict. The major source of hard currency consists of the mining of diamonds. The fate of the economy depends upon the maintenance of domestic peace and the continuation of substantial aid from abroad.

## Background

Beginning in March 1991, a civil war in Sierra Leone between the government and the Revolutionary United Front ("RUF") resulted in tens of thousands of deaths and the displacement of more than 2 million people (well over one-third of the population) many of whom are now refugees in neighboring countries. After several setbacks, the end to the eleven-year conflict in Sierra Leone appears to be near.

With the support of the UN peacekeeping force and contributions from the World Bank and international community, demobilization and disarmament of the RUF and Civil Defense Forces combatants has been completed. Reestablishment of government authority throughout the country is slowly proceeding and national elections took place in May 2002.

The civil war commenced when fighters of the RUF launched a war from the east of the country near the border with Liberia to overthrow the government. Sierra Leone's army tried at first to defend the government however, the following year the army itself overthrew the government. Despite the change of power, the RUF continued its attacks.

In February 1995, the United Nations appointed a Special Envoy, Mr. Berhanu Dinka (Ethiopia) to negotiate a settlement to the conflict and return the country to civilian rule. Parliamentary and presidential elections were held in February 1996, and the army relinquished power to the winner, Alhaji Dr. Ahmed Tejan Kabbah. The RUF, however, did not participate in the elections and would not recognize the results, therefore, the conflict continued. Over the ensuing years numerous peace agreements were signed and subsequently derailed for various reasons continuing a pattern of disruption that kept the country in civil war.

In June 1998, the Security Council established the for an initial period of six months. The mission monitored and advised efforts to disarm combatants and restructure the nation's security forces. Unarmed UNOMSIL teams, under the protection of the Military Observer Group of the Economic Community of Western African States, documented reports of on-going atrocities and human rights abuses committed against civilians.

In early 1999, the Government and the RUF rebels signed an agreement in Lomé to end hostilities and form a government of

national unity. The parties to the conflict also requested an expanded role for UNOMSIL. On 20 August 1999, the UN Security Council authorized an increase in the number of military observers to 210. On 22 October 1999, the Security Council authorized the establishment of UNAMSIL, a new and much larger mission with a maximum of 6,000 military personnel, including 260 military observers, to assist the Government and the parties in carrying out provisions of the Lomé peace agreement. At the same time, the Council decided to terminate UNOMSIL. On 7 February 2000, the Security Council revised the mandate of UNAMSIL to include additional tasks. It decided to expand the military component to a maximum of 11,100 military personnel. The Council also authorized increases in the civil affairs, civilian police, administrative and technical components of UNAMSIL.

The Security Council again increased the authorized strength of UNAMSIL, to 13,000 military personnel. On 30 March 2001, a further increase was authorized to 17,500 military personnel. The Council approved a revised concept of operations.

## The Station

Radio UNAMSIL is the voice of the United Nations Mission in Sierra Leone. It is a Unit of the Public Information Section of the UN. The station is known as the *Voice of Peace* and broadcasts from Freetown, the country's capital city, on 103 FM and on shortwave using a nominal frequency 6,140 kHz although most reports have had them somewhat lower than that. Radio UNAMSIL utilizes a 1,000-watt Harris made transmitter, which has given it a sporadic worldwide reach. Its goal is to promote awareness, understanding, and tolerance among the peoples of Sierra Leone and help the people understand the implementation of the Lomé Peace Agreement.

UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan in establishing the station said "*Radio UNAMSIL would help the mission face the challenge of disseminating information on the peace*

*process in a country whose infrastructure has been damaged by years of warfare.*" Consequently, the Secretary-General expected the station to play a significant role in the mission's efforts to inform the people of Sierra Leone, independent of any party or affiliation.

The broadcasting equipment arrived in Freetown on 18 May 2000. Four days later, the station commenced test transmissions on FM for 12 hours a day. Shortwave transmissions began later that year enabling the station to reach about 85% of the more than four million inhabitants in this difficult terrain country. Radio UNAMSIL carries out its activities with a workforce of approximately 12 staff members, from its location at the Mammy Yoko Hotel in the West End of Freetown along Aberdeen Beach. The two production studios are also located at the Mammy Yoko Hotel. Radio UNAMSIL is now running 24 hours a day with programs aimed at maintaining a peaceful atmosphere and cultivating trust in the country. The station broadcasts 24 hours daily, airing programming featuring peace promotion, music, local news, and features relating to United Nations activities in Sierra Leone. Radio UNAMSIL, which is fully funded by the United Nations, operates with a stated objective to promote the peace process, entertainment and education, and to encourage the Revolutionary United Front rebel forces to disarm and bring the nation's decade long war to an end.

The station broadcasts a *Current Affairs Krio Magazine Program* from 2200 hours UTC. On Thursdays through Sundays from 2300 to 0600 UTC is *Contingent's Night* where each of the UN military contingents are given a chance to run its own program on these nights. These broadcasts feature music and stories. Other evenings feature a locally produced program called *NightLine*. Most of Radio UNAMSIL's programming is produced in a live format, with the exception of the station's official statements. The station airs phone-in public participation programs and pre-recorded mini-documentaries on an infrequent basis. All broadcasts are aired in English with the exception of

greetings in the different languages of countries that have contributed soldiers to the Peacekeeping Forces. About 70% of the programming features music and entertainment. Another 15% feature press releases from the UN headquarters in New York and 15% is devoted to reporting on UN activities on the ground. About a quarter of Radio UNAMSIL's programming is externally produced.

Sheila Patricia Dallas is the General Manager of Radio UNAMSIL, a station committed to offering objective information in an environment often charged with rumors and politically driven news from all sides. The airwaves have become a critical tool for supporting the UN peacekeeping mission. Her motto is, *"Misinformation is more deadly than no information at all."* Radio UNAMSIL's staff is comprised primarily of international broadcast professionals and a few Sierra Leone broadcast journalists who are receiving training in equipment and performance, news writing, reporting, production, editing, and broadcast studio techniques.

According to Ms. Dallas, *"Radio is cheap to produce and to receive. There is a reason that radio is the media of the masses in the poorest parts of the world. Illiteracy is rampant, therefore newspapers are ineffectual. Unlike in the United States and other wealthier countries where television is the primary means of communications, the broadcast technology here is expensive and the price of sets is out of the reach of most people. There is some TV here in Freetown, but it doesn't reach the whole country. Radio can. In most places, electricity is erratic or even nonexistent. Radios can be powered by batteries or even hand-crank."* Thus, the value of radio as a superior communications tool has been validated once again in another strife filled part of the world.

Radio UNAMSIL is modeling its efforts at building a national audience on UN efforts elsewhere, like the UN station, Radio Minurca, operated by the Central African Republic ("CAR") mission. The CAR equipment was donated to the United

Nations by the Danish government for use in the organization's peacekeeping operations. With the completion of the CAR mission, the radio equipment was available for redeployment for use in Sierra Leone.

Radio UNAMSIL develops and produces energetic programs directed at all ethnic groups, including women and children's shows. The station features special programming on health, current affairs, civic education, human rights, arts, theatre, etc. Arts programs, current affairs, news and sports are prominent in the broadcast line-up. Music is driving the station's message to the youth of the country. Music continues to promote peace and harmony among the youth in Sierra Leone. All of these programs aim at maintaining calm and cultivating trust among groups and individuals. Similar to commercial radio stations throughout the world, Radio UNAMSIL uses buttons, bumper stickers, posters and tee shirts to promote the station. I was fortunate to receive one of the station's new logo tee shirts with my QSL response letter from Ms. Dallas.

The station appears that it will be a good verifier of listener reception reports, however, hearing them could be a serious hurdle these days. I have not seen any recent logs for this station. A postal report may take some time but will be answered with a full data letter from Sheila Dallas, Station Manager and Executive Producer of Radio UNAMSIL. # Technical Topics

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## Anti-BPL Forces Muster For Battle

On November 7, 2003 the American Radio Relay League (ARRL) sponsored a meeting of various organizations that had previously expressed at least a cautionary posture to BPL regarding the FCC's Notice Of Inquiry 03-104. The National Association of Broadcasters in Washington, DC hosted the meeting. I represented NASWA and the interests of the entire shortwave listener community. The ARRL has published their summary of the meeting in the *ARRL Letter*, Vol. 22, No. 45, November 14, 2003. Quoted statements in this article are from that letter. Here are some observations from my personal notes.

One would think, that with the future of shortwave broadcasting in North America at stake, companies whose sales depend in large measure on shortwave radio would have been well represented. Only Yaesu, of all the receiver manufacturers and retailers, was present and ably represented by Chip Margelli. He is with the Engineering/R&D Department of Vertex Standard's Amateur Division and traveled from California to make important contributions to the discussion. However, Icom, MFJ, Sangean, Kenwood, Eton Corp. (Grundig North America), Grove Enterprises, and Passport To World Band Radio were invited to attend but for one reason or another did not show.

Many amateur radio organizations were represented at the meeting. The ARRL was there in spades including Dave Sumner, CEO; Paul Rinaldo, Manager of Technical Relations; Chris Imlay, General Counsel; and several representatives of the League's Washington lobbyist firm. In addition several representatives of the Amateur Satellite Corporation

(AMSAT) and the Amateur Radio Research and Development Corporation (AMRAD) attended.

A number of "inside the government" agencies participated as observers. They included the Department of Defense (DoD), ARINC, and The National Science Foundation (NSF). We all know what the DoD does. ARINC is a company that plans, installs and operates among other things the HF radio network used by the FAA for communications with aircraft. The NSF supports and funds radio astronomy telescopes. Some worldwide radio astronomy allocations are threatened by deployment of BPL technology.

Other represented organizations that do not fit into any of the above categories included NASWA, the National Association of Broadcasters, the Consumer Electronics Association, and APSCO International, the organization of public safety entities. George Jacobs represented The National Association of Shortwave Broadcasters (NASB). He heads George Jacobs & Associates, the engineering consulting firm representing many NASB member broadcasters to the FCC. He also has a long and distinguished background with the VOA and brought a reasoned and mature Washington-insider perspective to the BPL issue.

The primary purpose of the meeting was to share current information on where the NOI process stands and to allow each represented organization to express their specific concerns.

As you may remember from previous *Technical Topics* columns, one solution the BPL proponents have put forth is to provide protection to amateur radio by notching out certain frequencies. I expressed the

hope that all the attendees would reject that concept. Sparing amateur radio bands, for example, of interference will only mean that the energy will be diverted to frequencies used by other services like shortwave broadcast. I expressed the desire that we all work together to squash BPL rather than support a "not-in-my-back-yard" approach. I urged the attendees to avoid this trap and instead present a united front against BPL that protects all licensed spectrum users.

I also tossed out a possible argument that might be made that shortwave broadcasting and the right to freely access information should be protected under the First Amendment of the US Constitution. Those present with experience interfacing with the current FCC commissioners did not think such an argument would fall on friendly ears at the FCC. Another attendee pointed out that an argument could be made that BPL would actually expand most people's ability to access news and information by enhancing the ability to get high-speed Internet access. Instead of restricting free speech or a free press, it could be argued that BPL would actually expand these protected rights. Knowing a brick wall when I hit it, I quickly abandoned the idea.

The ARRL reported on the current status of their tests and field trials. A video presentation showed the interference on a typical amateur radio receiver at two different test locations. One site used a form of digital spread spectrum technology. The interference sounded like the antenna was loose and blowing in the wind. Rapid clicks were heard presumably in sync with packet data transfers. The other site used frequency division multiplexing. In this technique approximately 1000 separate carriers, each with FSK modulation, could be heard across the HF spectrum. As the receiver was tuned across the band, one heterodyne after another could easily be heard. The video showed the S-meter running S-9 on each carrier. The antenna for this test was a short horizontal dipole mounted a few feet above the roof of a station wagon as it drove

down the road under the power line. Signals could be detected up to one kilometer from the power line. If you have a high-speed Internet connection, you can download the video from the ARRL web site at:

In the November edition of the *NASWA Journal* I related the contents of a speech by FCC Commissioner Abernathy in which she projected unabashed support for BPL ignoring the thousands of comments warning of the interference potential of BPL. The ARRL CEO, Dave Sumner, related the gist of a communication he had with Commissioner Abernathy's Senior Legal Adviser, Matthew A. Brill. Brill is reported to have said, "We regret that the Commissioner's remarks may have been interpreted as suggesting an absence of concern over harmful interference." Mr. Brill is further quoted as saying Commissioner Abernathy did not intend to suggest that BPL "necessarily will emerge as a viable platform or that it does not present interference issues." Brill assured the ARRL that, "ensuring that BPL and all new technologies avoid causing harmful interference to licensed RF users is a bedrock position, for Commissioner Abernathy." Attendees at the meeting interpreted that response as good news.

The city of Manassas, Virginia has decided to provide BPL connectivity for all its citizens and businesses over its municipal power system. ARRL has put the City of Manassas "...on notice that on behalf of its members who live in and use public thoroughfares of Manassas, the ARRL will ensure that there is full compliance with the FCC regulations."

AMRAD has purchased some HomePlug modems to test their susceptibility to amateur radio radiation. In one test the antenna was located about 15 meters from the modems. At a transmitted power of only 10 watts on 14 MHz, 80% of the packets were interrupted. At 100 watts all com-

munications ceased. At higher power, RF irreversibly damaged the modems. With amateur radio operators presently permitted to use output powers up to 1000 watts, it is feared that once BPL is widely deployed and enough modems damaged, the FCC will be under the gun from the BPL lobby to severely reduce authorized power levels for amateur radio.

The US Government representatives were limited in how much they could reveal about what was happening inside their agencies. They stated that they were there to learn as observers. They did leave me with a strong impression that the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) of the US Department of Commerce is moving ahead with their own independent assessment of the interference potential of BPL technology. The NTIA is responsible for coordinating radio communications issues of the various elements of the US Government much as the FCC regulates private radio communications in the USA. The presentation by Paul Rinaldo of ARRL actually contained a photo of an NTIA truck parked in Emmaus, PA, the site of one of the BPL tests currently in progress.

The representative from ARINC told a horror story of an aeronautical HF receiving site near Half Moon Bay, California. In the adjacent community, off-the-shelf, in-home, power-line modems are widely in use. (Californians tend to be early adopters of new technology.) Some frequencies previously used at this site are no longer useful because of interference from the nearby modems. Even worse, there are so many different sources of interference that normal direction finding techniques cannot be used to locate specific homes with such devices.

Representatives of public safety organizations were opposed to any solution that involved use of the low VHF band frequencies. They pointed out that many volunteer fire departments still use those frequencies

and cannot afford to relocate to an 800 MHz trunked technology. They also pointed out that the federal government and many state police organizations use HF frequencies for long haul emergency communications.

Near the end of the discussion, George Jacobs opined that it seemed to him that the best arguments against BPL would be based upon the need for HF/VHF communications to support homeland security and safety of life. Another attendee said that hitching our arguments to homeland security could be dangerous because BPL proponents could argue that high-speed Internet access via BPL could actually enhance the ability of many to communicate via the Internet.

Dave Sumner presented some ideas for future possible actions by opponents of BPL. Presentations to FCC engineers and commissioners were mentioned. Other target government agencies were also suggested like NTIA and even the Department of State. One problem that was noted by ARRL is that the amateur radio community was overwhelmingly represented in the 5000 or more comments received by the FCC to date. A more diverse population of opponents would enhance the chances of leaving a lasting impression at any presentation. I volunteered to represent NASWA and shortwave listeners in any presentations the ARRL may schedule in the future to the FCC or other agencies.

The BPL issue is presently not on the RADAR screen of the US Congress. ARRL reported that BPL industry representatives have been talking to staff members of telecommunications subcommittees but that is as far as the process has gone to date.

A Notice of Proposed Rule making (NPRM) is expected some time in the first quarter of 2004 if the FCC decides to proceed. Once that notice is promulgated there will be another round of comments and reply comments. Stay tuned.

**COSTA RICA** 7445 **Radio For Peace International** was silenced November 5 by the University For Peace, which cut power to the station. (various sources). While a spate of angry activist press releases paint a picture of a noble broadcaster being persecuted for its philosophy, none seem to mention whether RFPF was paying its bills, which might make this a simple landlord foreclosure rather than a political vendetta. (aq)

**DENMARK** In December one of the pioneers of early European Music Radio, **World Music Radio**, originating in Holland in the 60's and 70's and broadcasting from Andorra, Milano

and Dublin in the 80's and 90's will be back on the air as the first privately owned and officially licensed shortwave station in Denmark. Stig Hartvig Nielsen, for many years a well-known DX'er, will play a leading role in the relaunch of the station.

any spare parts, the AIR Research & Development Dept. has been asked to design and produce a replacement exciter, but this could take a while yet. SW is only intended for the most Northern and Southern islands in the long island chain. This is especially so since last May a new 100 kW Thales MW transmitter came on the air on 684 to replace the old 20 kW transmitter which now serves as a standby unit. The SW and MW transmitters are located at Brookshabad, 8 km (as the crow flies) South of Port Blair, and a dipole array ensures North-South SW coverage.

The station is on the air as follows: 2355-0300 on 4760, 0310-0340/(0500 Sunday) on 7115, 0730-0930/(1000 Sunday) on 7115, 1030-1700/(1900 on Sat and Sun.) on 4760. The station's main broadcasting language is Hindi and only one or two programs in English are produced locally. There is a short daily program in Sanskrit at 0125-0130. Other languages are Malayalam 0700-0730 (daily except Sunday), Bengali 1200-1230 daily and 0930-1000 Sunday, Nicobari 1030-1100, Telugu 1100-1130 & Tamil 1130-1200, all daily. The correct address of the station is: AIR, Delanipur, Haddo Post, Port Blair 744102 (Maarten Van Delft, visiting Port Blair, DSWCI DX Window Nov 5/DX Listening Digest/Hauser-OK)

3390, **AIR Gangtok**, Sikkim, heard at 0100-0400 and 1030-1600 on 3390. The station mainly broadcasts in Nepali, but has daily programs in Hindi 1030-1100, Lepcha 1100-1130, Limboo 1130-1200 and Sikkimese 1200-1230. There are programs in Hindi every Friday at 1430 and in English every Saturday at 1430. It no longer broadcasts on 6085 at 0700-0930. **IRAN** Some clarification regarding **Voice of Justice/Voice of the Islamic Republic of Iran**, based on my monitoring of their satellite streams on 15th November:

The 1030-1130 English broadcast is beamed to Azerbaijan and the Indian subcontinent and identifies as "Voice of the Islamic Republic of Iran" throughout. Their website lists SW frequencies as 15480, 15550, 21470.

This is followed at 1130-1230 by a separate English broadcast for North America (unlisted on IRIB's website), announcing just two frequencies, 6035 and 9835. This is quite early for that part of the world, but the time of this broadcast is announced as 0130-0230! Identification throughout this broadcast is "the Voice of Justice broadcast, from the Islamic Republic of Iran", but the gong, signature tune, incidental music by Vangelis, etc., are as used in other VIRI broadcasts.

As for the Voice of Justice ID being heard on frequencies such as 15550, I think this can be explained by the engineers at VIRI often being very tardy in switching off or retuning their transmitters at the nominal end of transmission on a given frequency - on occasion I've heard a VIRI World Service broadcast on an apparent "new" frequency, only to find it disappearing after the first 5-10 minutes. So I would suggest that the Voice of Justice ID heard on 15550 around 1130 was in fact the start of the 1130 English transmission rather than the end of the

1030 one...

In recent weeks, there has been a lot of speculation about the future of shortwave broadcasting from Iran. In letters to listeners they were informing them that shortwave was being reduced in favor of the Internet. They encouraged feedback from listeners and a number of listeners, including myself, wrote in to the station about continuing shortwave broadcasting. After waiting for about a week or so, I received the following encouraging reply from the station:

"Dear Richard D'Angelo, Many thanks for your comments on the importance of short wave. We have again established frequencies for North America. I would be very pleased if you listen to it and send us a reception report. The frequencies are as follows: 9580 and 6120 at 0030 to 0230. I would also be pleased if you listen **IRIB** English radio through internet ([www.iribworld.com](http://www.iribworld.com)) and let us know the quality of the voice the its speed.




