The AIBs are a celebration of success in TV. radio and cross-platform broadcasting, and also recognize the best achievements in technology and marketing. Simon notes, "This year's entries have been outstanding and our international judging panel has had some tough decisions to make. Join us on 4 November when we'll reveal the winners in front of guests from all over the world, including leading broadcast executives, producers, editors and journalists. Countries represented at present include Ghana, Belgium, Australia, Germany, the UK, France, Turkey, the USA, the Netherlands, Qatar and Pakistan - broadcasters such as Samaa TV, VRT, BBC, BBG, Czech Radio and 6 News are among those who are attending the AIBs.". While attending is probably out of the question for most listeners, we will report the results as they become available.

Radio Heritage Foundation notes that China dominates Asia-Pacific medium wave (AM) radio dial in its latest PAL Radio Guide. China has almost a third of all AM radio stations currently broadcasting in the entire Asia-Pacific region. In the latest PAL AM Radio Log, available at www.radioheritage.net, there are almost 1,400 AM stations listed as on the air in China, out of some 4,800 stations across the entire region. Just five countries account for 70% of all AM broadcasters in the region, with China followed by Japan, Indonesia, Australia and the Philippines. The new PAL AM Radio Guide contains some 50,000 individual data entries for the 4.800 listed stations. This resource

Also, don't forget the Radio Free Asia (RFA) 13th anniversary QSL card which can be obtained for all confirmed reception reports dated September 1 through December 31, 2009. This QSL card celebrates RFA's 13 years

of broadcast excellence. RFA's first broadcast was in Mandarin on September 29, 1996 at 2100 UTC. A very pleasant day here in Martinez - about 85 degrees with a nice wind blowing from the northwest. I took my Grundiq YB 400PE out to the open space I have mentioned in earlier musings and tossed my 17' reel antenna along a branch on a California Bay Laurel tree. As I was preparing to put headphones on, a gentleman walked over to me and mentioned that his truck has been broken into a couple of days ago. He was parked in the staging are where I park. He was from Benicia (across the Carquinez Strait from Martinez) and was not aware of the hazards of this area. I told him, although my car had not been victimized, it is well known in this town that this piece of land is prone to monkey business from homeless folks and brazen youth. I should explain that this open space is located right off Carquinez Scenic Drive. In 1982, a furious winter storm caused much of the road to wash out. Consequently, a good deal of the road slipped into the ravine and resulted in about a 6 mile stretch being closed to cars. Last week I took the advice of a ham friend in Odenton, MD and installed a ground system for my wire antenna. I buried 50' of #6 bare wire and sank two 8' ground rods, all attached to the ground wire run up into my shack. The net effect has been a modest reduction in QRM. Now I'm waiting for delivery of an Alpha Delta DX-SWL Sloper, which should provide improved signal capture over the wire antenna; I hope I can find someone to climb up on my roof and install it before the snow flies.

The Alpha Delta DX-SWL Sloper arrived and was finally installed. I immediately connected the Alpha Delta DX-SWL Sloper to the R390A, which had been using the 35' wire / impedance matching xfmr. My initial reaction is that the sloper is not as noise prone but otherwise I cannot tell much difference. Any reduction of QRM is, of course, a good thing. Right now I'm listening to someone on 11905 kHz in what sounds to be Portuguese, and it's cleaner on the sloper than on the 35' wire. I did connect the ground lead to a ground rod but don't know if that has had any effect.

On August 19 Linda and Denise traveled to Quito, where a memorial service was held. Close to 300, including listeners, attended. While in Quito, they cleaned out the apartment where Jorge and Denise lived, selling some things while giving away others. The big project was to sort and give away Jorge's collection of CD's of Ecuadorian music. His program, "Musica del Ecuador", as you may remember was voted by "Passport to World Band Radio" as one of the top ten programs on shortwave radio. I have several of the CDs that he gave me when he visited here.

The visits started in the mid 80's when Jorge and his family visited our church. He knew our pastor, Jim Wilbar, as he had stayed in their home in Quito when he was working as a volunteer one summer. I remember the children – how they ran up and down the stairs as they explored our house. Another time we were ready to eat in our backyard when a wind storm came up. By the time we moved inside, the rain was really coming down. The last time I saw Jorge and Denise he said we were among their earliest financial supporters. I currently have a PAR EL-SWL antenna outside in an East-West orientation i.e. running South to North. I have it fed to my RX-340. I also have a "long" wire in my attic which feeds my RX-320D.

I am considering getting another antenna. Probably an Eavesdropper with the twin lead feed line. I would run it South to North and change my PAR EL-SWL to run West to East. I have about 60 feet South to North.

My questions have to do with couplers and splitters. Do I need to get one of the \$100+ ones for it to be effective? I do want an effective one. Can I put the coupler just inside my window and then have one feed line to the receiver? How about getting two and use one as a splitter back-to-back to the coupler to feed both receivers? Should I use switches instead? Should I just forget the whole thing and feed the East-West orientation one to my RX-340 and the other to my RX-320D and switch if I'm going for South America or Antarctica or such? I'm assuming both are better than my attic "long" wire.

Anyway, I am looking for advice. I will receive any you have gratefully.

Yesterday, I was supposed to be listening with my new antenna. However, I could not get the rock with the antenna rope wrapped around it to drop over the 35 foot high branch. I have another idea to try involving a third person, my son, (I already had a spotter, my spouse, watching from the side) which I will try when I have "we three" next available.

Have you thought of the possibility of using an antenna multicoupler? What I mean is you feed all of the antennas into a switch that feeds the multicoupler which all of your receivers work off of. I am the custodian of the ODXA's multicoupler which has a built in amplifier which allows several (16 or more) receivers to work off of the same antenna. I have always held the belief that it is better to have this sort of a set-up than having different antennas feeding different receivers.

If you are going to buy an Eavesdropper from a dealer like Universal, you might want to act quickly. I've used several Eavesdroppers over the years in both outdoor and attic locations. I currently use a PAR-SWL and a FlexTenna with an MLB balun. I run these two antennas thru an MFJ antenna switch and then into an RF Systems splitter. I use two receivers—an ICOM R-75 and an NRD-545. That system seems to work well for me.

Again—you might want to act quickly if an Eavesdropper is what you are after.

Thanks for the advice. Your reply caused me to look at the RF Systems antennas. The low noise talk around the MLBA-MK1 sounded good to me. I wanted to ask you what you think of the RF Systems SP-1 back-to-back. It would be expensive but do you believe it would work to combine the antennas and then split them back to the two receivers.

Regardless, I am thinking in terms of a switch as I would want to have a way to bring only the "low noise" antenna to bear. Also, perhaps, I am not so concerned about the antenna to my RX-320D now.

Again, thanks for your advice.

### **Book Review**

Christian Radio

The Growth of a Mainstream Broadcasting Force

By Bob Lochte

ISBN: 0-7864-2239-4

Religious programming has been on the airwaves since broadcasting began, but today it is one of the fastest growing categories in radio. This book examines the progression of Christian radio from its beginnings on tiny local stations (like WCAL from St. Olaf's College in Minnesota) to its presence on network and satellite radio of today. The author notes the factors that brought Christian music into the mainstream and discusses how network policies and regulations affected the development of Christian radio. Also considered are the changing demographics that have contributed to the success of Christian broadcasting. Major Christian networks and their evangelical missions are discussed, along with such programs A Money Minute, Life on the Edge and Focus on the Family, which offer practical topical advice for today's Christian. The final chapter considers the future of Christian radio.

The author covers his topic in eleven chapters. Here is a rundown of the various chapters in the book. Chapter 1: In the Beginning; Chapter 2: Sowing the Seeds; Chapter 3: Jesus Christ Superstar; Chapter 4: Advancing the Cause of Christ - The Moody Broadcasting Network; Chapter 5: Undisputed Leader - Salem Communications; Chapter 6: Tired of Cursing the Darkness - American Family Radio; Chapter 7: It's All about the Music - K-LOVE and WAY-FM; Chapter 8: In the Wilderness - Heartland Radio Ministries, Joy 89.3, and WTMV; Chapter 9: Sprouting the Seeds; Chapter 10: A Bountiful Harvest; and, Chapter 11: Revelations.

Author Bob Lochte is a Professor in the Department of Journalism and Mass Communications at Murray State University in Murray, Kentucky, where he has worked since 1988. He is a graduate of Bowdoin College, Columbia College - Los Angeles, and of the University of Tennessee - Knoxville where he received his Ph.D. in 1987. Previously, Dr. Lochte worked for 22 years in radio and television, beginning with a part-time job for WKDA-AM, Nashville, Tennessee, when he was in high school. Over the years he has worked in commercial and non-commercial broadcasting, cable television, and has owned and operated both radio and television stations.

Christian Radio: The Growth of a Mainstream Broadcasting Force is recommended reading for those with a serious interest in the beginnings of religious broadcasting, the development over time of various Christian broadcasting organizations, and where Christian radio broadcasting is headed in the future. It is a fairly easy, enjoyable read that even those with only a passing interest in this topic will find interesting. The serious radio hobbyists will find much of the discussion interesting because of the use of radio as a communications medium to transmit a message to the masses.

Christian Radio: The Growth of a Mainstream Broadcasting Force is a soft cover book measuring 6 inches by 9 inches and is 1/2 inch thick published by McFarland & Company who specializes in interesting hobby-related books. It is 222 pages with tables, chapter notes, bibliography and index. # Twenty Years in Shortwave Broadcasting

Yesterday and Today

From McFarland and Newell Productions

Well known international broadcaster Ian McFarland has turned out another series of CDs of interest to today's shortwave listeners. The latest product, "Twenty Years in Shortwave Broadcasting – Yesterday and Today" provides an interesting perspective on the recent past, current perspectives as well as the future of shortwave broadcasting. This is the third in a series of CDs about shortwave broadcasting. If you are interested in shortwave broadcastings and the changes that have happened over the last twenty years, this two CD set is what you need.

Before proceeding on to what is contained in the third series, let me briefly remind you about the first two offerings in this series. Series One featured over 100 identification and interval signals from shortwave stations. around the world that were part of the award winning SWL Digest program hosted by Ian McFarland on Radio Canada International. The two CD set is filled with nostalgia about the good old days of shortwave listening. Series Two is another two CD set with the first CD featuring The Foreign Language recognition course by DX'er and linguist the late Dr. Richard E. Wood, which contains 55 language samples and analysis. The second CD contains three classic programs hosted and produced by Ian McFarland. I have both of these earlier endeavors and recommend them highly. By the way, they can still be purchased along with Series Three using the information below.

Twenty Years in Shortwave Broadcasting - Yesterday and Today is a two CD set filled with many familiar voices to shortwave listeners. Hosted by Ian McFarland and with support from audio engineer Colin Newell, the CDs feature Bob Zanotti formerly of Swiss Radio International, Kim Elliott of the Voice of America, Jeff White of WRMI, author John Figliozzi and a cast of listeners from the 20th Anniversary Winter Short-

wave Listeners Festival in 2007. Among some of the historical remembrances from listeners was the fall of Saigon, the war in the Falkland Islands, listening to stations from the many islands in the Pacific region, the ability to learn geography and follow world issues, etc.

The first CD opens with words from Ian before hearing words from many shortwave listeners from the Kulpsville gathering 2007. Among those expressing their views about shortwave broadcasting and the changes over the years are Harold Cones. Michael Murray, Kris Field, Alan Johnson, Skip Arev. Mickey Delmage, Nolan Stepheny, Harold Sellers and the late Brian Smith. The next major component of the CD is a re-broadcast of special joint program featuring Ian McFarland, Bob Zanotti and Bob Thomann (The Two Bob's from the Swiss Shortwave Merry-Go-Round) from SRI' studios back in 1989 after an "International Radio Days" conference in West Berlin. The program featured an interesting forum with quest panelists Kim Andrew Elliott, and Professors Don Browne and Drew McDaniel, Closing out the first CD and a major portion of the second CD is a live Skype forum discussion featuring Ian, Bob along with Kim Elliott, Colin Newell and John Figliozzi which covered a full range of topics including changes in international broadcasting the last twenty years, the portability of shortwave radio vs. the Internet and government cutbacks over the last two decades. There is plenty of frank, open discussion about what went right and what went wrong over the years including some difficulties working with new management that didn't understand the old medium. Some interesting and very open conversations took place during the live Skype forum discussion that even questioned the honesty and integrity of some of the major broadcasters as they withdrew from shortwave broadcasting for other media. If you enjoy open, hard hitting discussions about shortwave broadcasting, shortwave broadcasters and value the opinions and thoughts of Messrs. McFarland,

Zanotti, Elliott and Figliozzi you will find the CD series thoroughly enjoyable and extremely valuable.

The third CD series closes with Jeff White and Ian McFarland discussing the ability of selling blocks of airtime to shortwave broadcasters to reach audiences through local shortwave operations; local re-transmission of programs. They also discussed past radio projects, Radio Discovery and Radio Earth, which Jeff has participated in previously. Today WRMI rents airtime to others interested in reaching an international audience. This was followed by more comments from various shortwave listeners with their views about shortwave radio both past and present.

Twenty Years in Shortwave Broadcasting – Yesterday and Today is an extremely valuable collection of thoughts, recollections and opinions about our favorite medium, shortwave radio. Insight into how and why many international shortwave broadcast-

ers moved away from shortwave radio as a communications mode is discussed in depth. The opinions expressed in insightful and provocative. Presenting well over two hours of terrific listening, this two CD series is highly recommended listening.

### Radio Cultural, Guatemala

Radio Cultural also uses other than shortwave transmitters to supplement its shortwave broadcasts as is shown in the following from the station.

"We have been occupied this year with the tale of two transmitters. The first is the one at our Lake Atitlán repeater which was confiscated in late November by the government due to a series of totally avoidable mistakes on their part. We did finally get it back, somewhat banged up but in reasonable shape, three months later.

The second is the 5 KW FM transmitter which we were able to buy through a generous gift received in 2007. That is, it was ordered and paid for. Then the manufacturer's agent in Guatemala died unexpectedly and it took three months to persuade the company that we were in fact the entity who had paid them. After that the factory had one delay after another, some with suppliers and others internal problems. We finally received word a month or so ago that the transmitter was ready to ship, then that it had been shipped, and finally that

it had arrived in Guatemala.

Predictably, the delays have continued, this time with Customs. The government is now enforcing a law intended to keep pirate stations from acquiring equipment, which doesn't seem to slow them down at all but complicates the lives of legal broadcasters like TGNA. I had hoped to be able to report by today that the new transmitter was sitting in our entrance hallway; hopefully, that will happen sometime next week."

### TGNA Update:

Recently, I wrote how the Guatemalan government, confusing a pirate station and TGNA-FM, confiscated TGNA's station. Finally the transmitter has been released from customs, and it is back on the air from a mountain top in the country. The station had to pay over \$1,100.00 in storage fees while the government had the transmitter.

The first of August TGNA celebrated its 59<sup>th</sup> year of broadcasting with over 10,000 listeners at a large exhibition park to take part of the festivities.

# WYFR, Family Radio

Oakland, California

Family Radio, WYFR, is celebrating fifty years of broadcasting this year, but its call letters were different in the beginning. In 1959 they were KEAR, and the station wasn't broadcasting on shortwave but FM.

Harold Camping before he became involved in radio was in the construction business in San Francisco. One day Dick Palmquist, who had been a missionary in Alaska but came back to San Francisco for his son's operation, suggested to Camping that a group of businessmen buy a radio station. The end result of the visit was the formation of a nonprofit corporation with Camping as its president and Palmquist as vice-president. A person who worked in Camping's office became the secretary.

About two months later – that was in 1958 – Palmquist reported that he had found a station, KEAR, in San Francisco for \$100,000. After the Federal Communications Commission approved the transfer of ownership, the station went on the air on 4 February 1959 at noon with the song, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name." These were the worlds in the initial broadcast of the station:

"Good afternoon on this fourth day of February, from the new KEAR, San Francisco. KEAR is owned and operated by Family Stations, Inc., and broadcasts on FM channel 2407, 97.3 megacycles with a radiated power of 82,000 watts; by authority of the Federal Communications Commission, Washington, DC. Our transmitter is located on

top of Mt. Beacon in Marin County; and our programs emanate from our studios at 51 O'Farrell Street in downtown San Francisco. We sincerely hope you'll enjoy the music, and the program we will present from now until 10:15 PM this evening."

Later KECR in the San Diego area was purchased followed by a request for affiliation by a station in Houston, Texas. After that stations along the eastern seaboard were purchased, including WEME in the New York area, WKDN in the Philadelphia area and WFSI in the Baltimore area. One problem with multiple stations all broadcasting the same program at the same time was how to do it. Telephone lines were considered, but they were too expensive. In the end the stations would be provided with tape recordings made in advance of the time they were scheduled to be broadcast.

In 1973 the station added shortwave, acquiring the facilities of WNYW, formerly WRUL, in Scituate, Massachusetts. It was then that the call letters, WYFR, were first used. The biggest expansion recently was the purchase of broadcasting facilities in Okeechobee, Florida. All programs, however, are still produced in the station's studios in Oakland, California.

WYFR's most recent schedule for the Eastern Time zone gives 25 FM stations. In addition, Family Radio broadcasts from such places as Meyerton in South Africa; Skelton and Woofferton in the United Kingdom; Wertachtal, Germany; Tashkent, Uzbekistan; and Madagascar. A complete listing of stations with schedules may be obtained from the Oakland address.

## HCJB's Other Ministries

HCJB is more than a shortwave radio station. One project is its hospital. I learned about its pre-tuned radio program back in the early 1960's when I started DXing and had a visit from Doug Peters of HCJB. Today it's pre-tuned solar powered radios. Recently around 600 of these were distributed to needy families in mountain communities as well as the government hospital in Lesotho.

Radio planting is another project of HCJB. In the past seventeen years HCJB has planted close to 350 radio stations in 100 countries. In one of these countries, Nepal, it took ten years from the initial request followed by follow-ups on a regular basis before the government would allow HCJB to plant a station in the country. Now there are two FM stations in Nepal.

# International broadcasting: too bizarre for political science?

"Public Diplomacy: Ideas for the War of Ideas," by MIT political scientists Peter Krause and Stephen Van Evera, was published in Middle East Policy, Fall 2009. The authors' ideas follow five themes: U.S. public diplomacy should 1) emphasize dialogue over one-way monologue, 2) emphasize objective facts over propaganda, 3) convey respect to the audience, 4) the United States should contest the al-Qaeda narrative directly, and 5) new nongovernmental organizations (NGOs) that address pernicious ideas around the world could help defeat the al-Qaeda narrative.

This is a thought provoking paper. I was provoked to write some notes about the authors' recommendations regarding U.S. international broadcasting.

Krause and Van Evera: Alhurra was launched in 2004 with the goal of providing pro-American coverage of U.S. and Middle East news to Arab publics. Surveys show that Alhurra attracts only a tiny audience and has very little credibility in the Arab world. An April/May 2009 University of Maryland/Zogby poll found that Alhurra was picked by a vanishingly small 0.5 percent of Arab respondents as their favorite TV news source.

The question in the University of Maryland/Zogby International 2009 Annual Arab Public Opinion Survey is: "When you watch international news, which of the following network's news broadcasts do you watch most often?"

Only in countries with exceptionally poor media environments, e.g. Burma and Zim-

babwe, is an international broadcaster the "favorite" news source. In most countries, international broadcasting is used by a fraction of the population, and as a supplement to domestic broadcasting.

Al Jazeera and Al Arabiya are, effectively, domestic broadcasters in the Arab "nation." It's not realistic to expect foreign broadcast broadcasters to overtake the two pan-Arab news stations in popularity. They should, however, be viewed by a respectable percentage of the audience, especially among elites. And Alhurra should compete well with the other foreign stations, especially BBC Arabic, but also the Arabic programming of France 24, EuroNews, Deutsche Welle, Russia Today, China's CCTV, and Iran's Al Alam.

By these criteria, the latest round of surveys commissioned by the Broadcasting Board of Governors, and conducted in seven Arab nations in late 2008/early 2009, show good results for Alhurra. For all major international and pan-Arab stations, the surveys measure yesterday, past-week, past-month, and past-year viewing or listening. In Jordan, Alhurra has a past-week audience of 23%. This is far lower than Al Jazeera's 92% and Al Arabiva's 78%. But 23% is a large audience for international broadcasting. Furthermore, Alhurra is (for now) ahead of the new BBC Arabic TV (at 12%) and well ahead of the other Arabic television services from non-Arab nations. \*

Unfortunately for Alhurra and Radio Sawa, the results of these surveys have not been issued by the BBG. For the time being, journal papers by scholars such as Krause and Van Evera and news reports such as a recent ProPublica story must refer to the UMD/Zogby results.

### Radio Sawa: not so bizarre

Krause and Van Evera: Radio Sawa, launched in 2002, attracts a larger audience than Alhurra but also has little impact. Its programming consists largely of music with a little news mixed in. The news content is too limited to affect opinion on policy issues.

When it launched Radio Sawa, the George W. Bush administration unwisely chose to cancel the VOA's Arabic-language service, replacing it with Radio Sawa. This bizarre decision created a large hole in U.S. media efforts. The VOA Arabic service served a valuable purpose by reaching a modest but important audience — government, business, academic and media elites — with important hard news. That audience has been lost.

In the Arab nations, as in much of the rest of the world, audiences for broadcast news have migrated from radio to television. Alhurra provides newscasts for elites and others interested in the news.

Many who still listen to radio do so to hear music. Radio Sawa was designed to follow that audience. Small elite audiences have their uses, but large audiences consisting of people from all strata are even more desirable. In the Jordan survey mentioned above, Radio Sawa has a past-week audience of 21%, well ahead of BBC Arabic radio and French-owned Radio Monte Carlo-Middle East, with 9% each.

The Radio Sawa newscasts and features, multiplied by all the people who listen to them, multiplied again by all the times they are heard over the years, result in the neutralization of a great deal of misinformation and disinformation from less salubrious sources.

Bizarre? Well, yes, in the sense that U.S. international broadcasting now has double-digit audiences in, of all places, the Arab world, and larger than, of all stations, BBC World Service.

### Beware the all-talk format

Krause and Van Evera: Recent U.S. public-diplomacy media efforts have favored monologue over give-and-take discussion. On Alhurra, recorded broadcasts have predominated over talk shows and call-in programs, and Radio Sawa has no political talk shows. All evidence indicates that this is the wrong approach. Monologue format is less effective than dialogue

Ken Burns' "The Civil War" was recorded. Should PBS have broadcast, instead, a program in which viewers call in with their opinions about the Civil War? Most of the best television is recorded for a good reason.

Audience participation can be a useful component of much radio and television programming. There is probably a place for talk shows on both Radio Sawa and Alhurra. But as for moving these stations to full-time talk formats, be careful what you wish for. The content is not always compelling. Call-in shows on television can spend much time with the presenter staring blankly into the screen while a caller provides his/her life history before, maybe, getting around to a question. Furthermore, calls from region will consist of many, many virulently anti-US and anti-Israeli comments. This might be an accurate depiction of Middle Eastern public opinion. But after several hours of this, what's the point?

#### CZECH REPUBLIC

I have just heard from Jonathan Murphy who writes in part: I have been in Prague this past week and met David Vaughan, the former head of the English Section. It has just been announced that the Czech Ministry of Foreign Affairs is looking for Radio Prague to end all shortwave transmissions from the Czech Republic at

the end of 2009. This would be an irreversible step. Radio Prague is the only customer at Litomysl and this would result in the closing and dismantling of that transmitter site.

Excerpts from Vaughan Letter: You are probably not yet aware that the future of Radio Prague - the international service of Czech Radio - is under serious threat. Like most international public service broadcasters, Radio Prague is state financed. It is paid for through the state budget, via the Czech Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Radio Praque is facing a 20% cut in its budget for 2010. The Foreign Ministry has stated explicitly that it considers shortwave to be an anachronistic means of broadcasting and has called on Radio Prague to terminate its shortwave broadcasts entirely from January 2010. As a result the transmitter in Litomysl (east of Prague), will almost certainly be dismantled. Radio Prague will continue primarily as a website. The news of the latest cuts puts the staff and management of Radio Prague in a difficult position. It will not be easy for them to launch a campaign to save the shortwave broadcasts, as they could find themselves facing the alternative of having to cut jobs instead. Given that the amount of money needed to save the shortwave broadcasts is so small, I am convinced that the cause is worth fighting for and that it does not have to be a case of pitching jobs against shortwave. If the decision-makers in the government and at the ministry can be made to understand what is at stake, I am sure that the money can be found. That is why I am writing this letter - to encourage listeners around the world to rally behind Radio Prague at this difficult time. Radio Prague needs to get listeners support at this time. The Czech Ministry of Foreign Affairs has decided to reduce Radio Prague's budget for 2010 by 20 percent as part of the government's cost-cutting measures. Czech Radio is now in talks with the ministry and a new broadcast schedule will be agreed on by the end of the year depending on developments. He built the nominally 1 kW SW xmtr from "parts" he scrounged up in the Dominican Rep. about 20 years ago. -The SW transmitter uses a vertical antenna, 18 ft. long aluminum pole with wire radials. He says it simulcasts with their 1580 kHz AM outlet. This is curious, since the stn announces and long has been on 1570. Perhaps this was a typo. Frankly, it looks like Socrates has pulled a bit of a con job on the stn mgr to get back on SW. FRANCE Court Orders Radio France Internationale To Change Job Cut Plan (Text of report by Radio France Internationale website on 29 September)

A Paris appeals court has ordered Radio France Internationale (RFI) to make adjustments to its plan to cut staff by 206 posts. In a decision handed down on Monday, the court found the RFI plan contained a number of irregularities, and ordered management to make more serious efforts to redeploy personnel to other public broadcasters.

Both unions who called the strike and management expressed satisfaction over the court decision. The unions point to the suspension of the redundancy process, saying that "it is a warning to other public broadcasters who may want to go down the same road". Management noted that the plan to lay off 206 personnel was not

rejected by the court. RFI's managing director, Geneviève Goetzinger, said that management would continue with the plan, by "rapidly including the two modifications demanded by the judge. The entire procedure should be completed within a few days."

In addition to its call for redeployment efforts and the waiving of trial periods for those redeployed, the court ordered RFI to treat all journalists as part of the same category, thus eliminating different criteria for redundancy between the Frenchlanguage and foreign-language journalists.

The court decision comes against the background of the longest strike in public broadcasting since the general strike of May 1968. The strike began on 12 May, was interrupted on 10 July, and started again at the beginning of September.

Management announced the redundancy plan, which included the closure of six language services (German, Albanian, Polish, Serbo-Croat, Turkish and Lao) in January, arguing that listenership was down and that the company had run up large deficits.

The External broadcasts were started on October 1, 1939 by the then British Government to counter the propaganda of the Nazis directed at the Afghan people. The first broadcasts were in Pushto beamed to Afghanistan and the then North West Frontier Province. Soon broadcasts were started in Dari, Persian, Arabic, English, Burmese, Japanese, Chinese, Malay, French, etc.

The External Services today broadcast in the 27 languages (16 foreign and 11 Indian languages) with a total program out put of about 70.25 hrs. per day. The foreign languages are: Arabic, Baluchi, Burmese, Chinese, Dari, English, French, Indonesian, Nepali, Persian, Pushtu, Russian, Sinhala, Swahili, Thai and Tibetan. The Indian

languages are: Bengali, Gujarati, Hindi, Kannada, Malayalam, Punjabi, Saraiki, Sindhi, Tamil, Telugu and Urdu.

The maximum duration is the Urdu Service to Pakistan round the clock on DTH and on Short Wave / Medium Wave for 12.15 hrs while English broadcasts to various parts of the world are there for 8.15 hrs. During the Haj season, there are special broadcasts in Urdu beamed to Saudi Arabia. The External Services of AIR is even broadcast to Europe in the new broadcasting mode DRM (Digital Radio Mondial).

These transmissions are broadcast by the High Power Transmitters located at Aligarh, Bengaluru, Chennai, Delhi, Gorakhpur, Guwahati, Mumbai and Panaji on Short Waves and from Jalandhar, Kolkata and Tuticorin on Medium Waves. People belonging to all walks of life in Baltistan Region (Skardo and Ghangche districts of Siachan and Kargil sectors of the country) thanked the Director General PBC Ghulam Murtaza Solangi for his personal interest in this regard. He demanded of the Director General PBC to issue immediate and special instructions to the respective engineering sector of PBC to install a shortwave transmitter (100 kW) at Radio Pakistan Skardo to air the programmes for Kargil, Ledakh and Srinagar and also to facilitate the people of farflung areas of Gilgit and Baltistan.

It may be mentioned here that the present mediumwave transmitter of Radio Pakistan Skardo is not able to air the programmes for more than 20 miles during day time and at least 50 miles at night time while it is an outstanding demand of the people of Baltistan to enhance the power of Radio Pakistan Skardo with the addition of a 100 kW shortwave transmitter and a 100 kW mediumwave transmitter. The Mobile Voice of Russia project is mainly designed for those living in countries which have a sophisticated telecommunication network - something that will help them swiftly get relevant information about the latest developments in Russia and beyond. Right now, the Mobile Voice of Russiarelated programs in 17 languages are available for owners of smart phones which have the Windows Mobile operating system. The smart phone owners should first visit VOR's website at www.ruvr.ru and download special software which is needed to listen to the VOR's mobile broadcasting. The software is distributed on a free-of-charge basis. The beginning of next year will see more mobile gadgets and relevant operating systems used by listeners to listen to the Mobile Voice of Russia, which plans to start broadcasting in 39 languages before the end of 2010. Russia's state-run broadcasting company Voice of Russia is founded in 1929 and daily broadcasts in 39 languages to 53 countries with the help of various transmitters, including those in digital format. ZIMBABWE Radio VOP Listenership Up: A recent survey has shown that listenership for Radio Voice of the People (VOP) is increasing, with 62 percent listenership in rural areas and 40 percent in urban areas. The survey, carried out by Research Bureau International, revealed the exiled station had, since its launch in 2000, achieved 90 percent penetration among both rural and urban areas audiences.

The survey further revealed that the rural audience preferred the evening segment more than the morning one while there was an almost equal listenership of both segments by the urbanites.

For a station that still depend heavily on word of mouth as a source of news, the survey revealed that most listenership habits were usually planned as listeners deliberately tuned in at the times of their favourite broadcasts. Because of the country's repressive media laws, the station broadcasts to Zimbabwe by RNW's transmitters in Madagascar. The station has continued to enjoy such good following despite a bomb attack, police raids and arrests as well as jamming by the state. Radio VOP was established in 2000 as an

alternative media. In 2006 it won the One World Broadcasting award for outstanding community media that promotes human rights and sustainable development.

"I am pleased of the good following that we are getting in both urban and rural areas," said Director, John Masuku. "It shows we are making meaningful contribution towards providing alternative broadcasting in the country. We are also pleased the station has established itself more in rural areas where people are generally not exposed to conventional media and that it is cutting literacy barriers, filling in news gaps which have resulted from the ZBC's monopoly of the airwaves". Q: When did you first become interested in Pirate Radio?

A: My interest in pirate radio started at the age of 12, when I received a Japanese modular electronics kit for my birthday. Although I enjoyed building the various receiver designs that were included with the kit, it was the "wireless microphone" that created the most excitement for me. It was a simple design, with a VFO tuned via a standard AM radio variable capacitor, and it enabled you to transmit on a clear frequency anywhere on the mediumwave (AM) band. It had a microphone input for audio, so my friends and I would just hold the microphone up to a phonograph's loudspeaker to "broadcast" music. Although the transmitter could only be heard within the confines of my home, to me it was "magic".

It wasn't until over 30 years later, with the Internet in full swing, that I found out about a listserve started by someone called "Steve Quest", and he was encouraging list members to try building his "Simple Transmitter" a/k/a the "Questmitter". He claimed close to 10 watts output on shortwave using just two very robust transistors. Unfortunately, he was a bit nonchalant about providing specific details for some of the critical coils and hand-wound RF transformers used in his design, so a novice builder would have a difficult time reproducing his results. Still, that was enough to kindle my interest in seeking out other simple shortwave transmitter designs on the Internet.

Q: What inspired you to become an op?

A: People get involved in pirate radio for various reasons. Some do it because of a political agenda, the desire to share their music or views with everyone, or simply for the thrill of doing something considered illegal. Personally, I don't like being called a pirate radio operator; I much prefer the term, "hobby broadcaster".

My main reason for starting Channel Z Radio was to explore the technical side of the hobby; specifically building transmitters, and experimenting with antennas and propagation. I'd be perfectly happy to be doing all this on a legal, low power, hobby broadcast band, but unfortunately that does not exist. And, I have no desire to get my ham license, as I'm not that interested in making point-to-point voice contacts and "rag chewing".

To date, I've successfully built seven different transmitter designs as follows: Commando (25 watts), LU8EHA's Class E rig (18 W), Grenade (14 W), Corsair (10 W), Guerilla (8 W), Buccaneer (3 W), and Corsette (1W). I've received reception reports from 20 US states and six countries, with the furthest reception report coming from Poland.

Q: How would you describe your programming or programming style?

A: The main focus of programming on Channel Z Radio has been to play music that isn't available on commercial radio. I don't see the point of playing music that can be heard on any FM oldies station. Recent shows have included a "classic rock" show, which featured groups that used to be played on the original free-format FM stations, a program of instrumental music that featured songs spanning over 100 years of music history, and a show featuring music from obscure new wave groups from the USA. These shows generated a lot of positive response from the listeners.

Q: Why do you enjoy listening to Pirate Radio?

A: In general, the pirate stations that I listen to have something unique about them. I always enjoy hearing new music groups, and many times my first exposure to these groups has been via shortwave pirate radio. I also enjoy stations that produce their own comedy or parody skits.

Some thoughts on reporting from an ops perspective

I don't think many DXers/listeners realize the amount of work that goes into producing a program, and the efforts that some operators go through to get their signal on the air. So my message to all pirate DXers is to always please provide comments on the programming content. It's very discouraging to receive

a reception report from a DXer where it's obvious all they are interested in is getting a QSL card. Worse still, is never hearing from that listener again, once he's received your QSL card. So, please don't be a "QSL whore". I really appreciate the many listeners (mostly the FRN crowd), that take the time to send me a quick e-mail, just to let me know they're hearing my signal, or that they enjoyed a particular song. Sometimes a real connection is made with a listener, as they haven't heard a particular song in 20 or more years.

Thank you, Mike for giving me this opportunity to share my story with the NASWA membership. I hope these series of articles will encourage more members to listen to pirate stations, or even possibly to start their own station. 


