The Danish Shortwave Club International (DSWCI) announced the winners of its 21st International DX Contest, "The Super Grand Tour With Cancer and Capricorn 2009". This year Siegbert Gerhard, Germany with 4,991.59 points and Roberto Pavanello, Italy with 4,975.72 points were declared the winner with each receiving a free copy of the DSWCI new Domestic Band Survey #12 which will be available in May. Our own Bill Patalon III managed to place a respectable 13th. He was only one of two participants from North America. The other eighteen participants were from Europe.

Ron Hunsicker sent some space weather news along about the sudden emergence of big sunspot 1045 over the February 6-7 weekend. It caused a sharp uptick in solar activity. The active region produced three M-class and almost a dozen C-class solar flares since it appeared on Saturday, February 6th. The strongest blast, an M6-class eruption on Feb. 7th, may have hurled a coronal mass ejection toward Earth. Space Weather says high-latitude sky watchers should be alert for auroras in the nights ahead as a result of this activity. Also, shortwave receivers are picking up strong solar radio bursts on equipment.

Don't forget that Bryan Clark bclark@paradise.net.nz in New Zealand has a nice sized collection of back issues of NASWA bulletins from 1972-March to July, September to December; 1973 through to 1985-complete annual sets; April to June, August & September 1989. These were exchange magazines received by Bryan as Chief Editor of the New Zealand DX Times during those periods. If

FRENDX: Twenty-Five Years Ago (March 1985)

The cover featured Mr. Hiroshi Shoiguchi and Miss Yuka Nukina of Radio Japan's DX Corner. Bill Oliver noted that Frendx was looking for one or two "SWL-types" to edit possible future columns. As described last year many times, the Japanese standard of PLC Equipment has serious defects which had been overlooking many type-certified PLC equipment emitting SW-band noise much higher than the noise level accepted at the technical committee a few years ago when introduction of PLC equipment into Japanese market was agreed. Ministry of Interior and Communications who controls PLC equipment had rejected our filing to claim cancellation of the certification because of high noise level on SW bands emitted from this type-certified equipment.

However there is good news. Sub-committee SC-I of CISPR, International Special Committee on Radio Interference has revealed NO body except Japan had supported the PLC standard proposed by Japan. Many countries pointed out that the Japanese PLC standard has defects to properly protect the radio communications on SW band. This is exactly the same as our claim and we believe the Japanese Government will initiate reevaluation of its PLC standard. Will let you know what action Japanese Government will take on this matter. Hope the action will not be too slow.

On Friday February 5, 2010, I witnessed a remarkable daytime propagation mode event from Asia on 7 MHz and 9 MHz, between 0300 and 0400, which is 1 pm to 2 pm here in Melbourne. This propagation was via the complex multi-hop Daytime Mode, with transmission path distances looking like this: Malaysia 6070 km, Thailand 7360 km, Vietnam 7700 km, Myanmar 7930 km, China 9100 km, Japan 8230 km, Sri Lanka 8359 km, N. Korea 8749 km, India 10080 km, Uzbekistan 11655 km, and Iran 12059 km.

The event was characterised by strong signals from many Chinese regional broadcasters on their daytime channels, some never or rarely audible here! This dispels the myth that long-haul mid-summer propagation up to 12000 km on 7 and 9 MHz requires a darkness path, for my reception zone here in Melbourne!

Monitoring was at one of my favourite field sites, at a place known as South Hill, in the Warrandyte State Park, 20 km east of the Melbourne CBD, using the little Eton E5, with about 5 m of random antenna tossed into a bushfire-blackened tree. This is in the former gold mining area, where gold was first discovered in 1851. Sorry, no nuggets, but I'll keep looking!

This is the summary of key occupancies, audible in the window 0300 to 0400: 7210 VIETNAM VOV Hanoi nat network; 7270 MALAYSIA RTM Sarawak *0400 dialects network; 7295 MALAYSIA RTM Kajang English relay of domestic FM service; 9335 KUWAIT R. In fairness to WinRadio, I thought I should update my comments that appear in the February Journal. I did solve my noise problem in two ways. First, my sound chip control software has some features that caused the WinRadio input settings to be ignored. Hence, the demodulator software was always clipping the input signal and boosting the back ground noise to a high level. This was fixed by upgrading my sound card software. The other issue was common mode noise. After exchanging several e-mails with Tariq Hasnie of Radixon's North American office in Austin, I stopped by for a visit and picked up the WinRadio common mode choke and installed a ground rod for it. This reduced the RFI levels and now I believe I have a well performing receiver. I am still working on getting a decent antenna. Right now I have a 66 foot random wire attic antenna connected through the WinRadio 9:1 balun, but I think the foil covered A/C duct work still causes problems on 60 and 90 meters. However, I consider this great progress considering my 35 year absence from DXing!

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Tariq seemed pretty excited about their new product, the Excalibur direct sampling radio. Perhaps they need another beta-tester!

On to some QSL news. A good month for returns for a change, Radio Australia - Shepparton verified with a full data "Shepparton International High Frequency Transmission Station" card from v/s Ian Johnson of the ARDXC. I reported the frequency as Brandon but Ian noted that despite internet posting showing Brandon, Radio Australia's operating schedule shows this as Shepparton. Ian included a copy of the current Radio Australia shortwave frequency guide. This got lost in the shack somewhere. Radio Free Europe / Radio Liberty via Sitkunai verified with a full data - including site - "Illuminate Your World" card for a broadcast in Tatar Bashkir language. Response came from office in Czech Republic, Radio Sweden via Talata-Volondry replied to an electronic report for my reception of the interrupted broadcast due to the Christmas Day fire with a postal letter in 26 days informing me that they no longer verify reception reports ("We regret to inform you that Radio Sweden no longer sends QSL-cards") and apologized for an inconvenience this causes. Silly me, I thought that there could be some interest at Radio Sweden due to the nature of the ill fated transmission. Although they could have easily responded by e-mail, they did a postal reply. Couldn't they have just as easily sent a QSL? Hi! The Voice of America verified two separate Philippines reports six weeks apart with one full data "Transmitters and Antennas at Sunset" card. The package included a 2009 calendar, bumper sticker and several program schedules. Far East Broadcasting Company verified with an electronic reply from v/s Jan B confirming my reception of the Iu Mien broadcast from Bocaue apologizing for the overdue response (they did in fact respond with a full data card previously). Jan did indicate that about five years ago the entire antenna curtain at Bocaue was renewed and this strengthened their signal but that there is little they can do to improve things further at this stage of the sunspot cycle. Finally, news USA station WJHR Radio International verified an electronic report with an electronic no data "Dear Shortwave Listener" form letter rich text file reply from v/s G. S. Mock including a picture of the transmitter. In his letter, Mock states: "It is always good to hear from a new listener! It is our desire to provide quality Christian programming to the world in these last days. Please keep listening and tell someone to tune in. Our station is new and needs your prayers. Someday in the near future we will have a web page to keep listeners abreast of latest developments which will be of interest to our listeners."

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Bandscan analysis of Radio Handbooks for 2010

On the 25th of October 2009 the B09 winter schedules became effective. Already on the 10th of December I received the "2010 edition of the World Radio TV Handbook" (WRTH) from its publisher Nicholas Hardyman, UK. The next day arrived the "2010 Shortwave Frequency Guide" (SWFG) with the 2010 Super Frequency List (SFL) on a CD from Joerg Klingenfuss, Germany. Both annual, printed Handbooks have kept their well-known, but different format.

The SWFG 2010 (14th edition) contains 440 pages in English (230 about Broadcasting and 210 about Utility stations). The Broadcasting part begins with an updated article about DRM including a list of DRM schedules on LW. MW and SW. It is followed by the comprehensive SW frequency list which for each frequency contains a line for each broadcast, practicably arranged in time order within each frequency. That includes exact times, transmitter site, language and target area. The Country section contains the same data listed by Station, but without details like geographical coordinates, addresses, web sites, QSL info, etc. Price: EUR 40,-.

At the same time Klingenfuss has published the16th Edition of the 2010 Super Frequency List (SFL) on a CD with the same 8,200 Broadcast frequencies and 8,400 utility frequencies in use plus 21,500 formerly active frequencies. This modern tool is very easy to use on a PC using Microsoft Windows and has excellent search functions for specific frequencies, countries, stations, languages, call signs and times - or any combination thereof! Price: EUR 30,-. More details at

The SWFG is a Frequency List with SW schedules on all broadcast stations, but without any other details about the stations. I prefer the SWFG when I scan the SW broadcast bands, because the current schedule and language is available at each frequency in time order. But I have no use of all the 210 pages about utility stations.

The WRTH 2010 (64th edition) has 672 pages, including 64 in full colour. Our good Italian friend Dario Monferini introduces himself as one of the numerous WRTH Contributors 2010. Next John Nelson reviews the following expensive SW-receivers Icom IC-7600 and IC-7000, Etón Satellit 750 and these very low cost portables: Go World Band, Crown CRMR-1, Texon 4029 and Palito PA-6622 (the latter costs only 8 Euros!). After a nostalgic article about Cold War Classics (Collins R390, Racal RA17, Harris RF-590 and Rohde & Schwarz EK 070), John Nelson interviews the BBC Director of Future Media. Transmission & Distribution and the Director of the Global News Division about the future in Globval broadcasting. Then follows a "Digital Update", "Samoan Radio Journey" and the traditional update by George Jacobs on reception conditions. After the maps, on page 65 begin the fully updated sections with all details about National and International Radio, MW and SW Frequency Lists, International broadcasts in English, French, German, Portuguese and Spanish. On page 606 is a useful list of current DRM International Broadcasts followed by terrestrial Television and on page 653 References. Read more at www.wrth.com . Price: GBP: 23,- . In contrary to the SWFG, the WRTH also contains LW, MW and some FM and TV information. Therefore I use the WRTH when I DX on the bands mentioned or need more information about the stations. It is highly appreciated that, like the two last years, an update free of charge will be published on their website in January 2010 and a full summer edition of the International Section will be available in May 2009.

Spot-check by bandscanning

As in my previous analyses, I also scanned through the SW-bands in mid December. I listened to 50 broadcast stations at random in frequency band and time and identified them 100%, no matter what language, and made a comparative analysis.

I then checked in the two Handbooks, if each particular broad-cast heard, was mentioned in the Country Section and in the SW frequency list. This must contain the five essential details: Station name, frequency, scheduled at that exact time, exact language and site of transmitter. Half of the stations heard carried domestic broadcasts, and half of them international broadcasts. Analysis

I consider the five details mentioned above to be essential for the DXer during his listening and identification of the transmitter and broadcast. Thus it was checked for each logging, if the Handbooks have all these essential details and if they are correct. This is then marked "+" in my detailed analysis. If just one is missing, the column got a "-".

I still consider it useful, if the Handbooks also can provide the DXer with additional information about Geographical Coordinates for his propagation calculations and Google Earth search, and ID in the language heard. Furthermore it is necessary to know current addresses (postal, e-mail and web) and QSL policy for his reception report writing. For listeners with Broadband internet (ATDL) is it also useful to know, if the station broadcasts live audio on the web. Most of these useful

details can be found in the WRTH, but they are still missing completely in the SWFG!

Comparison

I then counted how many essential details were correct for the 25 international and 25 domestic stations randomly heard. The results were (each figure out of 5x25 = 125 possible):

This year both the WRTH and the SWFG were missing a few *essential* details.

Please be aware that changes in broadcast schedules occur nearly each day and also during the period from the editorial deadline till the printed Handbook reaches the listener. It has always been so. Because of this, it is almost impossible to achieve a 100% score!

Conclusions

It is evident that the editors of both Handbooks once more have done a tremendous work to gather up-to-date broadcasting schedules and other information for the B09 period and have succeeded in this to a very high degree! Each of the Handbooks are useful for the DXer and ordinary shortwave listener. The details published are at a very high accuracy level and can hardly be much better!

An important feature when searching for and identifying broadcast stations, is their complete frequency schedules, so that all parallel frequencies can be checked, e.g. as an identification tool. The schedules are easily available and very complete both in the WRTH and SWFG, and on the SFL CD-version. (Petersen)

DX Target: Iraq

The Voice of Iraqi Kurdistan

With the commencement of bombing during the war in 2003, the shortwave country of Irag seemingly left the international shortwave bands. For shortwave listeners this was an unfortunate way to lose a country target. It is bad enough when governments determine it is time not to fund external broadcasting using the shortwave medium. However, what appeared on the surface to be a shortwave listener's hardship was actually an opportunity. Iraq was still heard on shortwave through the Voice of Iragi Kurdistan through July 2008. Just as important to OSL'ers, was the ability of this station to verify reception reports. This DX Target will focus on the only way to log and verify Iraq in recent years; through reception of the Voice of Iragi Kurdistan if the station returns to shortwave.

The Kurdistan Region

Iraqi Kurdistan also known as Kurdistan Region is a semi-autonomous, federally recognized political entity located in northern Iraq. It borders Iran to the east, Turkey to the north and Syria to the west. Its capital is the city of Arbil. The name Kurdistan literally means Land of the Kurds.

In the new Iraqi Constitution, it is referred to as Kurdistan Region. The regional government refers to it as Kurdistan-Iraq (or simply Kurdistan region) but avoids using Iraqi Kurdistan. The full name of the local government is Kurdistan Regional Government ("KRG").

The main four governorates of Arbil, Sulaimania, Dohuk and Kirkuk with parts of Dyala and Nineva cover 18% of the total land area of Iraq. In these governorates the five million Kurdish population lives, of which two-thirds inhabit the first three provinces. This area, which constitutes more than half of the total area of Iraqi Kurdistan, is now under the control of Kurdistan

Regional Government. The remaining population inhabits the areas under the control of Iraqi government.

The mountainous nature of Kurdistan, deep valleys and plains contributes to climate changes. Low temperatures and heavy snowfalls in the winters and hot and dry summers are common variations in the region's weather conditions.

Iraqi Kurdistan is largely mountainous, with the highest point being a 3,611 meters (11,847 feet) known locally as Cheekah Dar, or black tent. There are many rivers flowing and running through mountains of the region making it distinguished by its fertile lands, plentiful water, and picturesque nature.

The mountainous nature of Kurdistan, the difference of temperatures in its various parts, and its wealth of waters, make Kurdistan a land of agriculture and tourism. In addition to various minerals, oil in particular, which for a long time was being extracted via pipeline only in Kurdistan through Iraq.

It is worthy to note that the term "Northern Iraq" is a bit of a geographical ambiguity in usage. "North" typically refers to the Kurdistan Region. "Center" and "South" or "Center-South" when individually referring to the other areas of Iraq or the rest of the country that is not the Kurdistan Region. Most media sources continually refer to "North" and "Northern Iraq" as anywhere north of Baghdad.

The Economy

The Kurdistan region's economy is dominated by the oil industry, agriculture and tourism. Due to relative peace in the region it has a more developed economy in comparison to other parts of Iraq.

Prior to the removal of Saddam Hussein, the Kurdistan Regional Government received approximately 13% of the revenues from Iraq's Oil-for-Food Program. By the time of the US invasion of Iraq in 2003, the program had disbursed \$8.35 billion to the KRG. Iraqi Kurdistan's food security allowed for substantially more of the funds to be spent on development projects than in the rest of Iraq. By the program's end in 2003 \$4 billion of the KRG's oil-for-food funds remained unspent.

Following the removal of Saddam Hussein's administration and the subsequent violence, the three provinces fully under the KRG control were the only three in Iraq to be ranked "secure" by the US military. The relative security and stability of the region has allowed the KRG to sign a number of investment contracts with foreign companies. In 2006 the first new oil well since the invasion of Iraq was drilled in the Kurdistan region by a Norwegian energy company. The KRG has signed exploration agreements with two other oil companies.

The stability of the Kurdistan region has allowed it to achieve a higher level of development than other regions in Iraq. In 2004 the per capita income was 25% higher than in the rest of Iraq. Two international airports operate flights to destination in the Middle East and Europe. The government continues to receive a portion of the revenue from Iraq's oil exports. The KRG also has plans to build a media city in Arbil and free trade zones near the borders of Turkey and Iran. Since 2003, the stronger economy of Kurdistan has attracted around 20,000 Arab workers from the rest of Iraq to seek jobs in Iraqi Kurdistan.

The Station

The Voice of Iraqi Kurdistan ("VOK") operated on shortwave using 6,335 kHz through July 2008 according to the Domestic Band Survey No. 11 issued by the Danish Shortwave Club International in early 2009. When it operated, the station opened at 0300 UTC and could be heard in North America when conditions were good. Frequently, there was significant interference to the signal from utility stations operating in the same frequency area so careful tuning, and listening, was essential. Programs were in Kurd-

ish and Arabic languages. The station was believed to be based in Sulaymaniyah, Iraq.

The station was operated by the Kurdish Democratic Party - Iraq ("KDP"). The KDP was established on 16 August 1946 under the leadership of the late Mustafa Barzani. The KDP is the senior coalition political partner in the Kurdish Regional Government and Kurdish National Assembly. For the last five decades the KDP has lead the Kurdish. After fifty-four years of its existence, the KDP is the largest and strongest Kurdish political entity in the region. Although the KDP strongly believes in internal peace and regional stability, its party leadership has had internal disputes with the Patriotic Union of Kurdistan. Irag's Kurdistan Prime Minister Nechirvan Barzani continues to lead efforts to curb the activities of the rebel Kurdistan Workers Party, the PKK. Turkey's government is threatening to cross the border into Iragi Kurdistan to attack the rebels who have been launching raids into Turkey. Turkey blames the autonomous Kurdish government for not taking a tougher stance against the PKK rebels. This "hot" issue remains a major source of international tension in the region.

Radio "VOK" was the first free radio for the Kurds. It was established on 28 September 1963 during the September revolution in Kurdistan. The radio station was formed with the order of the KDP president Mustafa Barzani, who was the leader of September revolution. At the beginning, the station used a number of old military wireless equipment. These sets were joined together to form a short wave "sender." The center of broadcasting operation was a cave deep in a Kurdistan mountain of Salah-Aldeen which is north of Erbil. Naturally, the radio station was a target of Iragi air force for many years. A number of station personnel including technicians, editors and guards were killed during these air attacks. The radio was run by the KDP. The programs of Radio "VOK" consist of news, opinion of the KDP and features Kurdish culture and music. Station identification in the Kurdish lanquage was Aira dangi Kurdistana Iragiyah; station identification in the Arabic language was Sawt-o Kurdistani Iraga.

Since first appearing the station's transmitter location has shifted along with the Kurdish Democratic Party's benefactors. It broadcast with the support of Iran in the 1970's and 80's. It used Soviet transmitters in Azerbaijan for a period of time. Radio "VOK" ultimately became established in Sulaymaniyah, northern Iraq, under the protection of the United Nations No Fly Zone which was enforced after the 1991 Gulf War.

About two years ago, I heard a broadcast from the Voice of Iraqi Kurdistan and fired off an electronic reception report to the KDP office in the USA. I was rewarded with a reply in about 45 minutes from Alex Atroushi (who sometimes spells his name "Atrooshi"). Although I have not seen many recent reports, hopefully the station is still operating as this would be the only way to log and verify Iraq today. If the Voice of Iraqi Kurdistan returns to the shortwave bands, electronic reports can be sent to Alex Atroushi at the station's USA address by using the following e-mail address: Pdk7usa@aol.com or party@kdp.se.



Recently, I exchanged correspondence with Alex Atroushi about the current status of the Voice of Iragi Kurdistan shortwave operations. Alex informed me that he was uncertain about its current shortwave operations status but would seek additional information direct from the station staff. I am awaiting a response; however, current shortwave information does not show this station operating on shortwave at the present time. Alex did note that during the 1960 through 2003 period (the "liberation of Iraq"), most people had only the radio as a window to the outside world. However, today many people have access to live television channels diminishing the need, or value, of radio operations.

As always, remember to send in those Voice of Iraqi Kurdistan logs to electronic Flashsheet editor Mark Taylor and to Wally Treibel for the Log Report. Of course, QSL verifications should be sent to Sam Barto for inclusion in the QSL Report column. Good luck with this DX Target.



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Kim's Column

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Not shortwave, and not getting through

In the past couple of months, the new technologies of international broadcasting have been in the news. Specifically, we're reading about how they are blocked in countries whose governments don't want the information to get through to their people.

The most prominent target country of late is Iran. Iran has vigorously been jamming satellite television broadcasts coming into the country. The jamming takes two forms: interference sent to the receiver on the satellite, thus obliterating the content rebroadcast throughout the satellite's footprint. Sometimes the jamming affects other channels on the satellite (or at least on the same transponder), resulting in the jammed channel (e.g., VOA, BBC) being moved to another transponder or off the satellite altogether.

The other form of satellite jamming is on the ground: interference sent right into the satellite dishes of users. This is effective only in urban areas. It also involves high levels of RF at the Ku-band frequencies, 12 to 18 GHz, in the microwave range. There have been complaints and accusations of adverse health effects due to this on-the-ground jamming.

In past years, satellite broadcasting has occasionally been assessed as superior to shortwave in part because the former is "jam proof." Now the general public can see that this isn't true. Actually what was happening was the nearly-universal observance of a gentlemen's agreement, in which countries refrained from jamming satellites for fear or their own satellite communications being jammed.

Iran's aggressive departure from the gentlemen's agreement may bring about a new era in satellite broadcasting, one more similar to the Soviet jamming that pervaded shortwave during the Cold War, and the Chinese jamming that still does.

I know that NASWA has members more knowledgeable than I am about techniques of satellite jamming, and of evading this jamming. It would be interesting if they could share what they know in the Journal, and perhaps compare and contrast shortwave and satellite jamming.

Business pressure can also block satellite content

Business pressure is more often than electrical interference the cause of content not getting through. Writing in The Guardian, Garry Kasparov (yes, the chess grand master), wrote that the television channel Perviv Kavkazskiv "was, until the end of January, freely available to people living in Russian-speaking areas, Now, Eutelsat—the leading European satellite provider based in Paris-has taken the channel off the air and refuses to implement the contract negotiated with the TV. It seems the Russian company Intersputnik made Eutelsat an offer it couldn't refuse on 15 January. holding out the possibility of millions of dollars in business with the media holdings of Russian gas giant Gazprom on the condition that Eutelsat stop doing business with First-Caucasian. Eutelsat capitulated and sent a disastrous message to the world: no Russian-language television that is not controlled by the Kremlin will be allowed to be aired in the Russian Federation. Even if it is based abroad. Even if it has a contract with a European satellite provider. The Englishlanguage satellite channel, Russia Today, did not face such problems with European satellites."

Blocking, then unblocking, the internet, then blocking the unblockers

Iran is also blocking internet content in its various forms, including websites, social media, and e-mail. I've been reading accounts from those who are confident that workarounds can be found to get internet

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data in and out of Iran. Others, by contrast, are downright pessimistic in this regard, conceding that Iran has squeezed the information flow.

Here again, a NASWA member who has expertise in the internet might explain to us how blocking internet compares to jamming shortwave.

I know this much: internet communications within Iran generally involves landlines within Iran. Shortwave and satellite communications have the advantage in that their content drops into the country wirelessly. We all know the special advantage of shortwave in this regard: frequencies that favor propagation from afar usually do not favor propagation from nearer-by. This puts shortwave jamming transmitters at a disadvantage if they are located within the target country.

One software company, Haystack, claims that its product "encrypts online communication and then cloaks it to appear like normal Web traffic." An executive of rival technology Tor said that Haystack "has not opened it up for research ... No one has seen a copy of (Haystack's) specifications. There is no way we can understand if the claims that are made (by Haystack) are true."

Internet radio: similarities to shortwave radio

Internet radio has already been widely implemented as a substitute for shortwave radio. The internet also provides a way for us to hear domestic radio stations throughout the world that were never available to us on shortwave. But just as shortwave radio has limitations, internet radio also has limitations.

Glasgow-based internet station Radio Six International recently celebrated its tenth anniversary with a live broadcast, rather than the usual pre-recorded programs from Glasgow, Edinburgh, Belfast, Derby, London, West Virginia and Los Angeles. A very international station. But the news account noted: "Being an internet station, there will be, at any one time, only a limited number

of people able to 'tune in', because of bandwidth restrictions." So, on shortwave, ability to receive a domestic station is largely a factor of its transmitting power combined with propagation. Via internet radio, it is a factor of its bandwidth combined with the level of net congestion.

Major international broadcasters had less difficulty reaching their targets because of higher powered transmitters and networks of relays. Similarly, the big international broadcasters use content distribution services such as Akamai to ensure that the size and distribution of the audience present fewer problems for internet-delivered video and audio content.

Fascinating 1960 documentary about RFE

Here's a lengthy URL to type into your browser: http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=wEX\Z6atcRs It's a 1960 documentary produced by KCMO-TV (Kansas City) about a visit by 60 Americans to the RFE studios in Munich, and to its transmitter site in Gloria, Portugal.

At one point, the narrator says: "RFE, supported entirely by contributions from Americans to the Radio Free Europe Fund, has gained a reputation for truth and reliability in its five target countries, despite the best efforts of the Communists to discredit it." It's ironic that a sentence touting RFE's 'reputation for truth' contained a clause that was not true. RFE was, in those days, mostly funded, covertly, by the CIA. Contributions from Americans contributed an average of 19 percent of RFE's budget during the 1950s. That would have been sufficiently impressive. And it would have had the added benefit of being the truth, helpful given that international broadcasting efforts depend on credibility above all else.

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Listener Request: Radio Broadcasting in Tajikistan - Part 1

A while back, one of our listeners in India, Neelakandan Visvanathan in Tamilnadu, sent us an email message containing a request. He stated that it is difficult to obtain adequate information about the radio broadcasting scene in the former Russian republics in Asia, and he requested that we present an up-to-date Station Profile on each of these countries.

This is an excellent suggestion, Neelakandan, and over a period of time, we will follow your suggestion. On this occasion, we present the first Station Profile in this short series on former Russian Republics in Asia, and we choose the new country, Tajikistan.

As the encyclopedias tell us, Tajikistan is a landlocked country, surrounded by five other countries: China, Afghanistan, and three of the other former Russian republics. This country is very mountainous, 93% actually, with mountain glaciers forming the source of all of their rivers.

In 1910 there was a major earthquake in Tajikistan and as a result a huge lake was formed, Lake Sarez. Even down to this day, there is a continuing fear that another earthquake will loosen the dam holding back the waters and massive flooding will take place.

Tajikistan is an irregularly shaped country 500 miles long with a total area of 55,000 square miles. The total population is around seven million and their capital city is Dushanbe with one million. During the earlier Russian era, the city was known as Stalinabad but in 1961 it was re-named Dushanbe which means Monday in their language, a reminder that their market day in olden times always fell on a Monday.

The early history of Tajikistan goes way back some 5,000 years to the era of its original settlers. This territory was once part of the ancient Persian Empire; and in successive eras, it was conquered by Alexander the Great, and then by the Arabs from neighboring territories, followed by the oriental Mongols, and then by Afghanistan.

In the 1860s, the territory of Tajikistan was claimed by Russia. In 1929, Tajikistan was granted full republic status under the Soviet Union, and at the time of the breakup of the Russian Empire, this republic, along with several others, declared its own independence on December 21, 1991.

The people themselves are known as Tajik, and they speak the Tajik language which is akin to Persian, and very closely related to other neighboring languages, including Dari in Afghanistan and Uzbek in Uzbekistan.

According to the Russian Encyclopedia, the first radio station in Tajikistan was launched in the year 1928. This would have been an experimental facility, which, it would appear, did not remain on the scene for very long.

However, two years later, the provincial government announced plans to formulate a radio broadcasting service, and two years later again the State Committee for Broadcasting was established. Their original radio broadcasting station was established in Dushanbe in 1933 under the Russian callsign RV47, and it was on the air with 2-1/2 kW on the longwave channel, 712 metres, corresponding to 420 kHz. Programming was broadcast for a couple of hours each day and it was presented in three languages, Russian, Tajik and Uzbek.

In Tajikistan, there are now three major radio transmitter stations. The oldest of these was constructed in 1933 and it is located in downtown Dushanbe, right next to the large Oktober Hotel. Transmitter Hall No. 1 in this double facility contains six mediumwave transmitters; 5 at 7 kW and one at 40 kW, all for local coverage. Transmitter Hall No. 2 contains five shortwave transmitters; 1 at 1 kW, 2 at 5 kW, and 2 at 20 kW, all for regional coverage, with communication traffic and broadcast programming.

The massive transmitter station located near Yangiyul, fifteen miles south of Dushanbe, was constructed during the Russian era and it originally contained eight Russian made shortwave transmitters at 100 kW each. Separate Transmitter Halls are located between the towers and antenna systems which extend over a distance of two miles. In addition, there were three other transmitters; 1 at 50 kW and one at 150 kW for use on mediumwave, as well as the 150 kW longwave unit.

Currently, it is estimated that eight of these transmitters; one longwave, two mediumwave and five shortwave; are all in active on-air usage.

The newest transmitter site is located at Orzu near Kolkozabad, some 60 miles south of Dushanbe. This super powered site was constructed in 1971, and it contains a bevy of transmitters and antenna systems. On mediumwave, there were two transmitters at 1 megawatt each, as well as one at 150 kW and one at 40 kW. On shortwave, there were four transmitters at 500 kW each, and these could be operated at half power, or they could be combined in pairs to radiate one megawatt on shortwave channels.

In addition to the three massive transmitter complexes just described, there are currently three additional regional locations, each with its own mediumwave transmitter, thus ensuring nationwide coverage of their country from the one central location in Dushanbe.

All of the programming from the multitude of radio broadcast transmitters throughout Tajikistan is produced and co-ordinated at the studio complex located in Dushanbe. This is a seven story blue building that looks like a Russian theatre in its design.

Programming for nationwide coverage is presented in two networks, TR1 and TR2. Translated into English, the titles of these two networks would read, Radio Tajikistan National Network and the Voice of Dushanbe. This programming is presented in three languages, Tajik, Uzbek and Russian. In addition, nationwide relays from Radio Moscow are also heard throughout the country.

As a back up for their longwave and mediumwave coverage during the past more than half a century, shortwave has also been in use. Originally a pair of 25 kW transmitters were inaugurated on two separate channels, though these were subsequently replaced with 50 kW units. For a long period of time these two units were heard on 4635 and 4975 kHz. These days, one channel is still apparently in use, 4635 kHz.

It should also be stated that television was introduced into Tajikistan in 1959, and the first known FM stations were installed around 1993. In recent time, locally owned FM stations have been permitted to go on the air in various parts of Tajikistan.

Well, that's as far as we can go in Part 1 with the story of Radio Broadcasting in Tajikistan, but remember, we are planning to present Part 2 of this interesting information in Wavescan next week.

AUSTRALIA For the upcoming A10 season starting on March 28, Broadcast Australia, the transmission provider for Radio Australia, plans to use this array of offshore relays: Dhabbaya—Burmese and English; Kranji—Burmese and English; Palau— English, Mandarin, Indonesian, Burmese; Taiwan-English, Indonesian, and Mandarin. This expanded relay usage is a consequence of the impending closure of the Darwin complex on Jan 31 by the owner, Christian Vision Communications. From Feb 1, CVC SW transmissions are listed for Tashkent, Lusaka, and Santiago. The Darwin facility will be mothballed—six transmitters, directional antennas, and associated infrastructure. It is not known whether the facility will be sold to any other organization-to do so would require an extensive, protracted and complex process, which would need Federal Government approval. The station is also heard around 1330 and appears to s/off at 1400. Very hard to read, but when you know the language sounds you know it's them and the carrier goes off at 1400. However, the best ever reception I got from them was at 0820 or so on the day of the Eclipse and that's at 1.40 p.m. here in the tropics. The station doesn't appear to come on at 0000, or 0030 as in the past. We will keep watching and I urge DXers to get on it and observe as much as possible. By the way Bhutan is UTC+6 hours so according to their daily sked they should start at 0000, but during winter conditions at 0000 the ionosphere in these low Sunspot years won't hold propagation at almost a vertical return angle needed for local area coverage on 6 MHz. With the evolving technologies and continuous research in the broadcasting domain, the working scenario has witnessed a major shift from the conventional means. Well, the television broadcasting is fuming with HD and 3D, for Radio the US has sought refuge in HD Radio and the European and the Asian region is shifting towards the DRM model. Digital Radio Mondiale (DRM) is the one of the standardised system for digital broadcasting of radio that aims to provide affordable digital quality of sound and data services to the radio listeners for MW and SW bands.

India's national broadcaster, AIR is one such radio broadcasters that has already adopted the DRM standard and has installed a 250 kW short wave transmitter at its Khampur facility in Delhi. Expanding on this offering, AIR has placed an order for the supply of two 1000 kilowatt DRM capable medium wave transmitters. These will be deployed at Chinsurah (West Bengal) and Rajkot (Gujrat) facilities of AIR replacing the analogue transmitters.

The order is a step by the national radio broadcaster, having the widest reach in India, to digitize its operations and switch over from the existing analogue transmission facility. During the recently concluded BES Expo 2010, held in the national capital, AIR marked out that the broadcaster intends have more than 40 DRM capable transmitters replacing/ upgrading its analogue transmitters. IRAN Three international broadcasters have condemned Iran for 'deliberate electronic interference' in their broadcasts. Voice of America, the BBC and German service Deutsche Welle said the new wave of jamming of satellite services began yesterday as Iran marked the 31st anniversary of the Islamic revolution. In a joint statement, the three say the Iranian authorities were using the same satellite services to broadcast freely around the world while denying their own people programmes coming in from outside. Earlier, the US accused Iran of an 'information blockade' saying the phone network, text messages and internet had all been blocked. US State

Department spokesman Philip Crowley reiterated US calls on the Iranian leadership to grant citizens what it says are universal rights to gather and express themselves freely. 'It is clear that the Iranian government fears its own people,' Mr Crowley said. Iranians have a right to have access to information, communicate and express their views, he said. MALAYSIA ABU shortwave broadcasters meeting in Kuala Lumpur today renewed their support for the creation of a monitoring network to assess the reach and quality of their broadcasts. The backing came at a meeting of the Steering Committee of the ABU Shortwave Coordination Group, ABU-HFC.

Over the past few years the committee has been looking into the development of a monitoring unit. Audio monitoring within the ABU-HFC would be a bilateral process, with the ABU providing its support at no extra cost. Participants in the Kuala Lumpur meeting said the proposed network for ABU members could be extended to other shortwave broadcasters if required.

Among other issues discussed were ways to achieve an increase in the audience for

shortwave radio. Members noted that other, modern delivery media were overtaking shortwave with new, high quality programming. Participants said there was a need to concentrate not only on technical issues but also on good quality content. The committee also agreed to provide training content on new techniques used in coordination as well as on updated software tools on the ABU's online Media Learning Centre. Heard with TWO different Myanmar audio feeds; one was weak and clearly // 5985, while the other one was at a fair level and not // to 5915. Both in vernacular with indigenous songs. So Myanmar is clearly still on 5915, but they simply have an earlier sign off time now (sometime shortly after 1500), which mislead me to think they were off the air. By 1343 a heavy noise was heard blocking 5915 reception, which was the N. PAKISTAN ISLAMABAD, Feb 1 (APP): Minister of State for Foreign Affairs Nawabzada Malik Ammad Khan inaugurated the South Asian Broadcast Services under which programmes in three more languages: Nepali, Sinhala and Tamil had been launched. Pakistan Broadcasting Corporation is already broadcasting programmes in seven languages including Bangla, Hindi, Chines, Gujrati, Pashto, Dari and Farsi. Induction of three more services would make the number of foreign services to ten.

Speaking on the occasion, the minister said Pakistan had good neighborly relations with South Asian Countries, and intended to expand them for peace and economic prosperity in the region. "Pakistan wants to further promote relations with the neighboring countries," he added. He said the foreign Policy focused on strengthening of relations with neighboring countries and Radio Pakistan had been playing a significant role in this regard. He urged media to play its due role in image building of the country abroad to counter the menace of terrorism and extremism and establish peace. He said Pakistan was facing the scourge of terrorism and extremism, and hoped it would be eliminated with the cooperation of the people.

Speaking on the occasion High Commissioner of Sri Lanka Jayalath Weerakkody said Pakistan and Sri Lanka enjoyed close political, economic and cultural relations. He acknowledged Pakistan's role in war against terrorism in Sri Lanka. Deputy High Commissioner of Nepal D.P. Bhandari said launching of South Asian Broadcast Services was an important initiative by PBC and it would further improve relations with the countries in the region. He said Radio Pakistan was playing an important role in spreading the message of peace and friendship. Secretary Information and Broadcasting Mansoor Sohail said the launching of programmes in three more languages of South Asia by PBC was vital for enhancing close cooperation with the SAARC countries. He lauded the role of PBC in projecting Pakistan's policy objectives at international level.

Director General Radio Pakistan Murtaza Solangi said it was the effort of PBC to reach out to the neighbors in dissemination of information, focusing on message of peace and cooperation. He said Radio Pakistan always stood with the people and it had played important role in fight against terrorism and rehabilitation of internally displaced persons. He elaborated many initiatives taken to make PBC a vibrant and modern organization to face the new

challenges. He said a network of FM stations in big cities will be launched soon.

The launching of new programmes would help further in promoting mutual understanding and cooperation with the South Asian countries. (T.C. Patterson/EDXP Forum)

SOLOMON ISLANDS In a letter to the Solomon Star, Cornelius Rathamana, General Manager of the Solomon Islands Broadcasting Corporation (SIBC) says that the BBC radio relay on the National AM service after midnight has had to be switched off. The people of the Solomon Islands have been receiving BBC World Service relays from the SIBC National Service since the beginning of this millennium from 11 PM to 6 AM local time next day (= 1200-1900 UTC. Ed). Mr Rathamana says, that due to high cost of electricity, SIBC will no longer be supporting the relay, as it will have to shut down its transmitters as soon as the national broadcast finishes at 11 PM. He adds that SIBC has taken this decision with full understanding that the growing BBC audience in the Solomon Islands will be deprived of this service when it is switched off. However, Mr Rathamana says, that SIBC can restore the relay, if the electricity costs of the relay times were sponsored. The annual cost for the relay on one HF transmitter at 10kW is estimated at SBD \$90,000.00 (US\$11,471). (Solomon Star Jan 21, via Sennitt, via Hauser/DX Window)

Yet Nora San Martin made it clear that their intention is to revive soon Banda Oriental frequency to bring the entire world the happenings of the Yi Sarandi, especially the achievements of poets and musicians and horse raids, which constitute an event Verdere in the region.

It is the second city of the department. It has an estimated population of 6659 inhabitants (2004). Founded on the initiative of Mrs. Dolores Vidal Pereyra in 1875 is today one of the three cities in the world that was outlined before the start of the building. USA From Kim Andrew Elliott's webpage relating to international broadcasting, I learn that the budget proposal which President Obama recently submitted to Congress includes closure of Greenville transmitting station, last IBB shortwave facility in the US. Another site near Greenville recently closed, along with the one at Delano California. Stations at Dixon, California, and Bethany, Ohio, were shut down in the 1990s. Kim acknowledges that rates of short-wave listening are low in the Americas and that the present Greenville transmissions to Africa can probably be taken up by IBB from leased facilities in the eastern hemisphere, but he expresses serious misgivings about the complete absence of a Government short-wave facility on US soil feeling it could well be needed in some future crisis. One could point out to Kim that the IBB facilities on Tinian are on US soil, but that's in the far Pacific.

If this provision in the budget proposal is endorsed by Congress, the Greenville closure would be slated for the end of fiscal 2010. (30 Sept 2010)

Kim points out that under another provision in the budget submission, the BBG proposes restructuring operations at some of its overseas transmitting stations, as I understand it including Tinang [Philippines], Udon Thani [Thailand] and Iranawila [Sri Lanka]. The BBG will retain ownership of these facilities; however, it would turn over operations of these sites to a third party on a fee-for-service basis. BBC World Service took similar action in the 1990s. VT Communications operates the BBCWS transmitting stations. (T. C.

VANUATU I am a Shortwave Broadcast Engineer, and would like to know if a station I designed is being heard here in the U.S. The station is Radio Vanuatu, on 3.945. I finished building the transmitters and antenna systems around the middle of July, 2009. They are running half power, (5000 watts) temporarily until I get back for the finishing touches this weekend. I will be updating some portions of the equipment, and adding a second frequency. Either 5.055 or 7.260, depending on the testing. I am leaving for Vanuatu on Sunday, the 31st. I should be testing the 5.055 frequency by the 2nd week in Feb. Here is a little tech info about the system. It's a Solid State, broadband operating in Class E. Modulation is Pulse Width. The 3.945 antenna is a 180 foot long fan dipole, around 60 feet high. The 5.055 antenna is about 90 feet long, and up about 45 feet. I have also just finished a 2,500 watt transmitter for Liberia on 4.025, but won't be putting them on for

a month or so. I just want to add that this web site is fantastic, and will be joining when I get back. I need feedback from listeners, as I am not able to put antennas up where I live currently. Ms. Mtonga said the situation means that listeners in remote areas will not be able to access the service. 


