While keeping a log is important, for me listening to some far off country that I'll never visit is the hunt. The trophy is the verification QSL card or letter.

Having grown up in the New York City area in the 1950's, I bought my first shortwave radio, a used Hallicrafters S-38 from Harrison Electronics in lower Manhattan. I remember an area in lower Manhattan called "radio row" where you could walk down several streets and buy anything electronic from surplus tubes to old military radios. The merchandise was on the sidewalk in boxes just like the old vegetable stands.

But getting back to the S-38, I strung up about 20 feet of wire between my bedroom and my sisters and heard mostly stations from Europe and Asia. I had a bunch of QSL cards and would give a lot to have them old cards back.

But that was the past. Today I think is important that we let these stations know that we listen to them regularly and the importance a QSL from them is even if it cost us a buck or two.

I also feel there will be a resurgence in shortwave broadcasting after these countries see how easy it is for the Internet to be compromised.

The monthly meeting of the Reading Area DXers is always a spectacular event, but the gathering on 26 March was beyond extraordinary. I knew this evening was going to be a bit different when I arrived at The Flying Dog (the hot spot of eastern Pennsylvania), and saw two large vans in the parking lot - one marked "Icom" and the other "Japan Radio Corporation". I hurried into the restaurant to see what this was all about.

Apparently, Icom and JRC have been following the "Musings" column in the Journal for quite some time, and they've been very much impressed by the dedication of the RADX crew. To show their appreciation for these stalwarts of shortwave, they each sent a "Mobile Hospitality Center" to provide for the evening's merriment.

Inside the restaurant, a long table had been set up which was separated from the usual clientele by velvet ropes. Here, a scrumptious repast of Porterhouse steak, lobster, shrimp, and every imaginable fixing was served by world class chefs. Three half-barrels of a specialty brewed Dortmunder had been flown in from Germany especially for the event, and attractive Geisha girls provided entertainment and massages.

Next, our hostess again dipped her dainty fingers into the bowl to draw the evening's final winner. Wonder of wonders, it was our own Ed Mauger – he was the recipient of JRC's NRD-630! After the fanfare had subsided, Ed leaned across the table to ask if I might possibly be interested in trading radios with him. Apparently, the super-technology of the "9500 so appealed to him that he has been unable to get a decent night's sleep since it had first been introduced. "Sure", I told him, "no problem". I kind of liked the '630s spartan simplicity, and the magic of the evening had me in a sublime mood.

In addition to our radios, Ed and I must have taken home at least 35 pounds of exquisite food, carefully wrapped by our hosts and packed into Icom and JRC "doggie boxes". Two of the untapped Dortmund barrels were loaded into my truck by the Icom porters, and what remained of the third I donated to the bar's patronage.

What a remarkable event it was. Driving home with my new NRD-630, two barrels of super German beer, and 17 pounds of exotic food, I couldn't help but feel bad for Rich D'Angelo, Ron Hunsicker, Rich Cuff, Tom Ledoux and Dave Turnick for deciding not to attend. Fellows, you were indeed missed. However, Ed and I managed to have a nice time by ourselves!

The April Journal seemed quite funereal but the end of the radio as we know it is definitely in sight. However, I did enjoy the reminiscing and a few prompted my memories.

I must be older than all you people put together (77 actually). I was always into radio as a little kid. The radio and library books were the only entertainment, even a movie ticket (50 cents) was beyond my means in the Depression and World War II.

A major landmark in my radio life was in the late summer of 1940. I was going up to bed that evening and paused to look out a window. I noticed a ladder of red lights peeking above the distant forest beyond the pasturelands. My grandmother told me that it was the new WBZ towers just built on Nantasket Beach. Imagine, listening to a station while seeing the source of the program! Not too much later, I noticed other nearby radio towers – WRUL, the big shortwave station in nearby Scituate, MA, and the distant Bell radiotelephone station WOU. In time, I would hear these too.

As I got older, I got pretty good at tuning distant stations on the AM only radio. At times, I could pull KDKA out from behind WBZ. Radio was then big networks and the same program could be heard on several stations at the same time. Some stations, I soon discovered, delayed a program for later broadcast so I was able to hear a favorite for a second time.

I got into shortwave in the summer of 1973 with the purchase of an Astronaut 6 multi-band at a nearby Radio Shack. It had AM, FM, SW, and the Public Service Bands. I was in hog heaven.

The very first SW station I heard was Australia and then HCJB. Both were coming in like gangbusters and I remember being completely unimpressed with a signal from the other side of the world. I had read so much of shortwave that I expected a good clear signal.

Steve Price's remark on the nightingale signal of Radio Baghdad prompted another memory. When I was in high school in the late 1940's, a relative gave me a subscription to the "Open Road for Boys" magazine for Christmas. One issue had a feature on SW and mentioned the mechanical bird signal of Baghdad adding that it had been used since

1939. Thirty years later, I was able to hear this bird as I tuned in Baghdad. It had a few squeaks and I wondered at the time if it was still the same bird. It also reminded me of reading, as a kid, a fairy tale of a Chinese emperor who thought his mechanical singing bird was better than the real thing.

Over the years, I have had a number of radios, usually small ones due to lack of room. I even turned down a friend's offer of his NRD-525 (he was upgrading) because I had no space. I've tried to get more and more coverage. At one point, I borrowed a radio which had long wave, hearing first the Boston Lightship just offshore and its code "Z", then Highland Light's (Cape Cod) near identical "Q" signal. That hooked me for that band.

People seem to think that going digital or putting the stations on the Internet will bring back shortwave radio. No, it won't. What is now missing are the wonderful programs that used to be on: Australia's "Saturday Night Country," HCJB's "DX Partyline," Cracker Barrel," and "Passport;" the BBC's "Seeing Stars," "Goon Show," and "Round the Horne;" Russia's "Audio Book Club," "Roundabout the Soviet Union," and a host of more. One that should be mentioned was Netherlands "Happy Station," perhaps the most popular of them all.

And the stations interacted with their listeners with the DX and Mailbag programs. Besides the QSL cards (which are getting harder to receive), they offered pennants, magazines, travel brochures, T-shirts, caps, coffee cups! And contests too. I once won a set of camel bells from Turkey.

Sadly, it is all gone now or just about. I saw the same thing happen years ago when the wonderful programs on domestic AM radio moved to the new TV. Where once you used your imagination, now you can watch a flickering picture with your brain in neutral. Those in charge of radio stations today have no idea of radio, they were all raised in the TV era.

One thing I quickly learned as I listened to SW was that people are the same all over. These people were immensely proud of their country, their heritage, and their customs and they wanted the world to know about them.

Victor Goonetilleke raised an interesting point of SW vs. the Internet. I would guess that one quarter of all listeners write to a radio station. I wonder what the percentage is on Internet and e-mail? Where or how do they get the numbers anyway?

I have enjoyed radio over the years in various ways. One winter's evening years ago, I tracked an approaching blizzard by listening to WMEX, Boston, then to WPTR, Albany, then WKBW, Buffalo, and WCKY, Cincinnati. At times I have had the fun of listening to the increasing static of an approaching thunderstorm. I hope this isn't my future in radio listening.

The first topic is Radio St. Helena Day 2009 QSL card. Japan Short Wave Club has the honor of sponsoring QSL cards and envelopes of Radio St. Helena Day 2009 aired on 14th of November, 2009. The cards have been just printed out, and sample copies were airmailed from Mr. Kipp of Germany, who has been taking care of this revival project since 2006.

The basic card design is the same as 2007 and 2008 QSL cards, showing the call sign of ZD7RSD, but pictures shown in the card are panoramic views of Prince Andrew School in the islands and amateur radio club members of the school, who are enjoying contacting with people outside of St. Helena islands by using the ICOM transceiver donated by Japan Short Wave Club. The call sign of the station is ZD7PAS, or ZD7 Prince Andrew School.

The statistics of the number of the reception reports for Radio St. Helena Day 2009 are not available yet but Japan again ranked first in the number of reception reports sent, and it was the same ranking as the last year, according to Mr. Kipp, who heard from Mr. Gary Walters, the Station Manager of Radio St. Helena.

Due to the fact that RMS St. Helena carrying all the mail from out side countries is being in a dry dock for repair for a few weeks, so the QSL arrival in St. Helena will be in June or July. Accordingly the 2009 QSL cards are expected to be sent in late July or August from St. Helena Islands.

(some evenings) - 5005 R. Nacional, Equatorial Guinea (listened some late evenings only) - 5010 India & Madagascar (some evenings both mixed co-channel, usual India stronger than RTV Malagasy).

About usual Latin American Radios on 60 meters (on Sunday 4/11 also listened more than one hour after sunrise here in Rome at around 0430 UT): 4885.01 R.Clube do Para; 4914.97v R. Dif. Macapa; 4985 R. Brasil Central; Cuban 5025 R. Rebelde; new 5040 R. Habana in Spanish (heard with its IS at 0458 till 0500 then some IDs in English, then again brief IS at 0501 & ID), 5044.99v R. Cultura do Para. Last but not the least, R. Vision on 4789.93v (some late nights & on April 11, sometimes with qrm splats by strong Djibouti on 4780).

On 90 meters Tropical Band, I caught Radio Exterior de Espana, via Costa Rica on 3350 kHz (March 28 and April 11) & presumed R. Sondergrense, South Africa, on 3320 kHz.

Let's hope for the best conditions on Tropical Bands for the next days.

Radio Nederland - Tinang 1 verified with a full data "Cleaning the canals in Weesp" card. Finally, Trans World Radio - Meyerton verified through Sentech with a full data letter from v/s Sikander Hoosern, HF Coverage Planning who indicated the transmitter is a 250 kW Brown Boveri, located at the Meyerton Transmitting Station in South Africa at geographical coordinates 26S35 28E08.

## Radio Free Asia Releases Fourth Radio Pioneer QSL Card

Radio Free Asia announces the release of the fourth QSL card in its Radio Pioneer series. The card honors Russian physicist Alexander S. Popov. Popov demonstrated that a receiver could detect the electromagnetic waves produced by lightning discharges in the atmosphere many miles away. In 1895, Popov was able to receive and detect the radio waves produced by an oscillator circuit. In 1897 he successfully sent a ship-to-shore transmission over a distance of three miles and then persuaded

Russian naval authorities to begin installing radio equipment in its vessels. Just two years later he had increased the distance of ship-to-shore transmissions to 30 miles. Popov is credited with being the first to use an antenna in the transmission and reception of radio waves. The QSL card debuted in March at the 2010 NASWA SWL Winter Fest in Kulpsville, Pennsylvania and will be used for all confirmed RFA reception reports dated April 1 - June 30, 2010

## Obituary: Charlie Gillett

The Times

March 18, 2010

The radio DJ credited with discovering Dire Straits has died after a long illness.

Charlie Gillett, presenter on BBC Radio 3 and World Service, passed away in a London hospital on Wednesday. He was 68.

The Lancashire-born broadcaster, a big supporter of world music, contracted an autoimmune disease, and last week suffered a heart attack.

Known to millions of listeners for his World Service programme Charlie Gillett's World of Music, he wrote an acclaimed history of rock'n'roll, *The Sound of the City*, in the 1970s.

And in 1976 he played Sultans of Swing from the demo tape of an unknown band called Dire Straits on his Radio London show *Honky Tonk*.

World Service director Peter Horrocks said he was an inspiration whose spirit of adven-

ture and passion for the rich diversity of global music opened the ears of the world.

"His broadcasts brought together music and radio fans from far flung corners of the globe," he said. "His postbag was one of the biggest, most affectionate and diverse in Bush House, which confirmed his special place in listeners' lives.

"He was a very special broadcaster and he will be sorely missed."

Two months ago Gillett stepped back from his regular slot on Radio 3's *World on 3* for health reasons.

At the time Roger Wright, the station's controller, said: "Radio 3 has always valued Charlie's immense knowledge and passion for world music which has been much enjoyed by listeners."

Gillett, who was born in Morecambe and brought up in Stockton-on-Tees, Cleveland, discovered several stars of world music while on Radio London. They include Youssou N'Dour, Salif Keita, and the young singer

of Portuguese fado music, Mariza.

In the mid-1970s he formed a partnership with his dentist and went on to manage Kilburn and the High Roads, whose lead singer was Ian Dury.

Notable successes on his label and publishing company, Oval Music, were Lene Lovich's Lucky Number and Paul Hardcastle's No 1, 19.

In 1979 he moved to commercial station Capital Radio, where he began to feature music from around the world. More recently he appeared on BBC London.

He is survived by his wife Buffy, their daughters Suzy and Jody, their son Ivan, and two grandchildren.

## Solomon Star 18 March 2010

The Solomon Islands Broadcasting Corporation is back on air after the Solomon Islands Electricity Authority (SIEA) restored electricity following a long power blackout at its Henderson transmitter.

General Manager, Cornelius Rathamana, said he was pleased that the people of Solomon Islands were again able to hear broadcasts from both 1035 AM and 5020 Shortwave. He said SIEA power to the area was cut early on Tuesday morning.

It is thought a storm caused trees to fall and break the lines between the Lunga Power Station and the Henderson sub-station.

SIBC began broadcasting again throughout Solomon Islands on 1035 AM and 5020 Shortwave just after midday yesterday.

## The Science of Radio by Paul J. Nahin

(Springer, ISBN 1-0-387-95150-4)

Shortwave radio listeners can pursue their hobby easily without ever exploring electromagnetic physics or history. This is not to say that we do not want to know the first order principles behind radio or the ancestry of that sleek ICOM receiver on our desktop. Unfortunately, many of the books that cover these subjects are either excessively dry -- like a text book for engineering students or treat the history of radio as a side show to more interesting historical events. Paul Nahin cures both of these ills as he is one of the most entertaining and lucid technical writers around.

By interweaving the theoretical and technological histories of radio, Nahin creates a fascinating amalgam that can entertain

and enlighten radio enthusiasts at all technical levels. Read this book for its history if mathematics is not your bag. Most of the pioneers and key experimentalists are mentioned here, with Maxwell and Faraday getting their due and Tesla and DeForest receiving the right amount of debunking. Nahin points out that many of the early experimenters were really groping in the dark for solutions to problems, and it is surprising how long it took for the theory to actually guide the design of circuits. Some of the early mechanical inventions used in transmitters were quite clever and in some cases, very dangerous. Who today knows the original use of a "coher" and an "alternator?" Why were spark-gap transmissions abandoned in favor of the more familiar amplitude modulated transmissions? Nahin answers these questions along with many others that require mathematics to reach the answers. While other books cover

Maxwell's famous equations in more mathematical detail, few provide such a lucid picture of just what is going on with electric charges and electric and magnetic fields. If shortwave listeners had a saint, he would be John Poynting, because the Poynting vector explains why electromagnetic waves leave the antenna and propagate through space.

However, this is not a history book even though a great deal of it could stand alone as one. Nahin clearly loves mathematics and is quick to introduce vector calculus and partial differential equations with the same relish as Perry Mason cross-examining a witness. Even if you do not like math, you can appreciate the sublime beauty of Euler's identity: . Nahin is not shy in his use of mathematics here and he patiently walks the reader through the mathematics of AM sidebands and Fourier series, both of which involve invoking Euler's identity and doing calculus with complex variables. It is worth trying to follow this stuff because it does

enhance the understanding of the physics for the typical reader. In the latter chapters, more practical information is introduced on circuits, so readers must don their electrical engineer hat and explore resistors, capacitors, and inductors. He even suggests a simple experiment you can try with two heterodyne radios that illustrates the clever magic of the heterodyne concept. Finally, the appendices (and the MATLAB exercises and problems) are really a mini-course in circuit design.

While this subject matter could easily fall into the 'mash-up' category, Nahin makes it work with his clear writing style and clean treatment of every topic. The historical materials add a human face to perhaps one of the most important technologies human kind has invented. Every electrical engineer should have this book on their bookshelf, every shortwave listener can enjoy the history, and those in between will find this book fascinating.

## Ethiopia jams VOA Amharic, thoroughly

In early March, shortwave technical monitors and shortwave listeners (the former tend to come from the ranks of the latter) noticed that VOA Amharic broadcasts were jammed. This was not a complete surprise, because Ethiopia had dabbled with jamming in the past. But this was not dabbling. In March, I listened on the IBB RMS system, and found all five of the VOA Amharic frequencies blocked by white noise. This was the case with both the Addis Ababa and Nairobi remote receivers, so it wasn't groundwave jamming in Addis. By late April, VOA Amharic was on nine frequencies, and at least one or two are getting through.

I don't think I've ever heard such successful jamming. Usually, a jammed VOA service would get through on at least one frequency. Does Ethiopia have some superpower transmitters? Or does U.S. international broadcasting no longer have the transmitter capacity to overcome jamming?

As we know, the best way to overcome jamming is to use as many frequencies as possible, from as many transmitting sites as possible. This forces the target country government to buy a transmitter to match every incoming frequency. But it also increases the chances that propagation will favor at least one of those frequencies from one of those sites. For listeners with the patience to try all the frequencies, the broadcast will get through.

In the Soviet days, VOA and Radio Liberty transmitted at or just after dusk in the U.S.S.R. U.S. transmitters from Morocco and Spain could use the higher daytime frequencies that would not work for the Soviet jamming transmitters under darkness. (This is review for NASWA members.) Too bad the IBB site at Morocco is closed, because it could be put to similar use to overcome

Ethiopian jamming. (The broadcast time would probably have to be changed from mid-evening to earlier.) The surviving VOA shortwave transmitters at Botswana and São Tomé are 100 kW units.

The other big jamming story carried into April. EU foreign ministers are talking tough to Iran about its jamming of broadcast satellites, but so far they haven't proposed any specific sanctions.

## Encountering the history of international radio

Jonathan Marks writes in his Critical Distance Weblog writes: "I have been gradually digitizing old editions of Media Network in an attempt to rescue tapes before they crumble into pieces of ferric oxide and polyester. I plugged my Revox tape recorder into the line-input of a Zoom H2 recorder, and the results are amazing. In fact, since these programmes were broadcast on shortwave, this is the first time people have been able to hear these documentaries in 'studio quality'." The results, so far, are in the Media Network Vintage Vault—[jonathanmarks.libsyn.com](http://jonathanmarks.libsyn.com).

Jonathan is using a Zoom H2. I bought an Olympus DM-520 for the same purpose: mainly to digitalize my old cassette recordings of shortwave broadcasts, and maybe some of my old VOA Communications World programs. (Stored at the University of Maryland Library of American Broadcasting, they're not as memorable as the Media Network's.) I have been impressed by even the cheap digital voice recorders for recording off the radio or from tapes. You usually need an attenuating patch cord, although my DM-520 has a variable recording level.

Another source of international broadcasting history is Richard Cummings, an American retired Radio Free Europe employee who still lives in Germany. Look for his many

articles at Historytimes.com. His most recent is about a train in Czechoslovakia that was "hijacked" in 1951 and shunted across the border into Germany. RFE, of course, made hay from that story. Richard wrote *Cold War Radio: The Dangerous History of American Broadcasting in Europe, 1950-1989*, and his *Radio Free Europe's 'Crusade for Freedom': Rallying Americans Behind Cold War Broadcasting, 1950-1960* will be published later this year.

And, on the subject of history, Larry Magne has officially announced the end of his *Passport to World Band Radio*, and also the closing down of the accompanying website *passband.com*. Larry writes that some international broadcasters "reinvented themselves, while many phased down or terminated their shortwave operations. Add to that Sony's near-downfall, the growth of the Internet, and even the possible fading away of print publications — and it's sadly evident that the time has come to shutter Passport's declining operation."

Over the years, I've found that people in our hobby are somewhat interested in the content of shortwave broadcasts, but much more interested in the signals that carry that content, and much, much more interested in the receivers that pick up those signals. *Passport* therefore hit the right buttons. I'm grateful to Larry for his many contributions to shortwave — oops — world band broadcasting, and I'll miss *PWBR*.

## Goodbye to VOA Hindi

The memo came around on March 25. The VOA Hindi program "America Live" would be canceled as of April 1 (probably by the time you read this). All VOA webcasts will also end as of that date. VOA Hindi has been off radio for a while, but has continued as a television and web service. Now even that will end, and the employees will have to retire or find work elsewhere. I have suggested that Hindi become the eighth language of the U.S. public diplomacy web-

site America.gov. That way, India suddenly needs international broadcasts, the VOA Hindi talent will be on the government payroll and immediately available to get back behind the camera or in front of the camera. My e-mail to this effect has not yet been answered.

Another goodbye, maybe. Worldspace, the international satellite broadcasting service that once billed itself as a replacement for inferior shortwave, has received permission from a Delaware bankruptcy court to de-orbit its satellites. A deal for Liberty Media to take over Worldspace has fallen through, and Worldspace is now really, finally, utterly out of cash. It doesn't even have the money to pay staff to keep its two satellites in proper orbit. To prevent the satellites from colliding with other, still-solvent geostationary satellites, they will actually be super-orbited, sent to a higher, geo-moving-around orbit, into perpetuity. So far, no word that that has actually happened.

## DRM publishes receiver requirements

And, then, there is Digital Radio Mondiale (DRM), the technology that is trying to make shortwave FM-like. As announced at DRM.org: "The DRM Consortium's Technical Committee has completed the technical requirements for receivers designed for the DRM system below 30 MHz. This Minimum Receiver Requirement (MRR) document describes the minimum performance required for the technical parameters that provide a fully functioning DRM receiver." Check DRM.org for that document. Would availability for sale at a radio store be one of those minimum requirements? Maybe the next DRM document should be a Minimum Ionospheric Requirement.

**SOMALIA** The Somali Islamist movement al-Shabab has banned the BBC and closed down transmitters broadcasting the Somali language service inside the country. Al-Shabab accused the BBC of fighting against Islam and supporting the transitional federal government, which the rebels are fighting to overthrow. The group said the BBC had been broadcasting the agenda of crusaders and colonialists against Muslims. The BBC said it was strictly impartial and spoke to all sides in the conflict. The BBC has been broadcasting its services in Somali, Arabic and English across the country on a series of FM frequencies for at least a decade, and surveys suggest it is one of the most widely listened-to news services in Somalia. Al-Shabab ordered all of the BBC's transmitters to be shut down. A statement by al-Shabab

demanding that any organisation transmitting the BBC, or the Washington-based Voice of America, should cancel their contracts. Al-Shabab and its allies control most of southern and central Somalia and all but a few districts of the capital, Mogadishu. They have been fighting to establish an Islamist administration of their own in place of the current government. The BBC's broadcasts have been taken off the FM bandwidth, but are still available on shortwave and the internet. In response to the statement, the head of BBC Africa, Jerry Timmins, said the organisation spoke to all sides in the conflict, including al-Shabab, adhered to strict standards of impartiality and editorial independence and rejected any suggestion otherwise. Parliamentary Committee on Broadcasting and Information Services chairperson Mwansa Kapeya has expressed concern at the collapse of ZNBC's radio one signal to rural areas like Mpika. In an interview from Mpika, Kapeya, who is PF member of parliament for Mpika and a former broadcaster who worked for ZNBC for 38 years, blamed the government for the corporation's lack of radio spare parts. "Radio has proved to be the most significant media in disseminating informative and educative programmes to majority of Zambians. For the first time in the history of radio signal delivery in this country, large parts of the Zambian community especially the rural area has been completely cut off from knowing what is happening in and outside Zambia by ZNBC radio.

In short, ZNBC radio has completely collapsed," Kapeya said. "When broadcasting was cared for by previous governments, spare parts for radio transmitters were procured expressly to ensure minimum service outage. The short wave services have been off air since February 1, 2010 and as I speak to you the situation is still the same."

He said the government had neglected rural people who depended on ZNBC radio one.

"What I have noticed is that the problem with our current government is that of indecision. It's very difficult for our government to make a decision on how to buy the required spare parts from the suppliers in the United States of America," he said. Kapeya asked the government to quickly address the radio signal problems. "As a veteran broadcaster myself, who served ZNBC for 38 years, I have always advised those concerned especially the government never to use methods that will tend to push away credible spare parts suppliers for radio and encouraging dubious dealers in substandard products," Kapeya said.

"Public efficiency is being adversely affected in the name of checks and balances. For this kind of inertia by our government is a clear indicator that this MMD government has completely neglected rural areas from where they command a lot of support during general elections." He commended The Post for its role in information dissemination to urban and rural Zambia. "We in Mpika are so grateful to The Post newspaper for being the only media providing valuable information to the people of Mpika on a daily basis including other rural districts, which are completely cut off by ZNBC radio. The Post is the only media that we depend on here in Mpika," said Kapeya. (Post Zambia via Slaen/DXplorer)




