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Listening Review

Hello and welcome to Listening Review for March. I've been presenting this column now for a year already (how time flies!) and I'd love to hear from you: what you like or dislike about the column and what else you would like to see covered. Of course, any comments on programs that you have heard are especially welcomed.

Follow Up

I'll start with a quick follow-up on a couple of programs mentioned last time (in January).

First, regrettably, **R Rossii** has now ended its shortwave broadcasts, and has joined the ranks of on-line only. I'll miss R Rossii on-air, and will have to add it to my increasing list of web-broadcasts to tune into.

And talking of webcasts, Radio Bulgaria which I also mentioned last time has, since 13 January, scaled back its daily offerings. They do have a brand new website, which I have to say looks great, but unfortunately the daily webcast is reduced from about an hour to about 30 minutes each day. although some extended features can be found on the website which do not form part of the daily webcast. The archive of Daily Webcasts can be located by clicking on the "Listen" link at the bottom of a Daily Webcast page. The website is still "workin-progress", so this may become clearer in future. Also, you will need to use Internet Explorer or Google Chrome in order to skip forwards/backwards through a broadcast in the audio player - the controls do not currently work in Mozilla Firefox.

Radio Australia

Radio Australia was coming in very strong throughout the afternoon on Saturday 18 January on 12085. I joined the station for the last 15 minutes of Saturday Night Country – which is a four-hour program

from ABC Local – and tonight had the theme of "Cheating songs". The program was hosted by country music star Catherine Britt (sitting in for Felicity Urquardt on maternity leave), and who seemed to me to be doing a great job in presenting the show. However, songs with verses such as:

- "... if you're gonna cheat on me, don't cheat in our home town"
- "... Jolene, I'm begging of you don't take my man"
- "...You asked was I alone / Then I admitted it was true / I've found a new friend / I'm sleeping with the blues"

are not the most cheery of lyrics, and not really my thing; 15 minutes was probably long enough for me, but I know that Country Music has a huge following and I suspect that in the 10pm-2am Saturday night slot in Australia it has quite a large following..

Then into **ABC Local News** at 1500 with the lead news that:

"... the Rural Fire Service has issued an emergency warning for a fire [...] currently 2500 hectares in size [...] and is out of control [...] residents are told to leave NOW"

Quite dramatic, and the news report had that sense urgency and immediacy that you can often get from local radio.

At 1505 came *Hindsight*, a Radio National history program. Today featuring two items – first was an intriguing story about Alfred Russel Wallace, a contemporary of Charles Darwin who independently proposed his own theories of natural selection. Alfred Russel Wallace journeyed through the Malay Archipelago in the 1850's and noted that the fauna in the Indonesian archipelago was divided into two distinct parts and identified the faunal divide now termed the

Wallace Line. This story was told through the eyes of Australian artist John Wolseley who traced the journey 150 years later, with comment by Wolseley himself, and readings from Wallace's writings.

This feature was followed by a story which complemented the Wallace story, and was about two of Australia's most skilled natural history artists — Harriet and Helena Scott awarded honorary membership to the NSW Entomological Society in 1868 Similar to the previous item, use was made of readings from the sister's writings.

In DXLD 13-35, August 28, 2013, Harold Frodge noted a

"totally weird English docudrama about a princess who walked around with her legs apart and a man who thought his rear end was made of glass, complete with dramatic music inserts. (I am not making this up.)"

Glenn Hauser identified it as a Hindsight feature on "The Glass Piano", (and still available on the Hindsight page):

"...23 year old Princess Alexandra Amelie of Bavaria (1826-1875) was observed walking awkwardly sideways down the corridors of her family palace .[... and who...] when questioned by her worried royal parents, she announced that she had swallowed a glass grand piano. The Glass Piano examines this bizarre tale, combining speculation about the Princess's thoughts and actions with historical records of melancholia and mental delusion."

This is definitely a series worth an hour of anyone's time with some fascinating stories, and all the above, along with a large archive of other past programs are available on the Hindsight program pages at http://www.abc.net.au/radionational/programs/hindsight/.

China Radio International

I've been missing *Listener's Garden* recently on **China Radio Int.** Early January I found this announcement at the end of Listener's Garden for the weekend of 14/15 December 2013

"B: Before we conclude today's show, here's a little announcement.

A: Listeners' Garden is a long-time program of China Radio International and has been on the air for many years. But I'm afraid that today's show will be the last episode, which means that Listeners' Garden will no longer exist from now on. It will be replaced by some other new and fascinating shows on CRI. We hope you keep listening and enjoy the programs.

B: It's hard to say goodbye to a show that is so popular among the listeners. But, we still welcome our listeners' to write to CRI any time you like.

A: That's right! As we have done on Listeners' Garden, listeners' letters will be answered and read on air on other related programs regularly. So you can still hear your own letters read on air here at CRI.

B: That's right. And we would also like to thank our listeners' for tuning in to Listeners' Garden over the past years and writing to us with great comments and feedbacks about our programs. It's been great to be with you and read your letters.

A: Before we end today's show, let's enjoy a song sung by a group of children in China in both Chinese and English. It's Auld Lang Syne.

B: With that, we come to the end of this edition of Listeners' Garden. We hope you enjoyed it."

Keith Perron, now of PCJ/Happy Station fame who one time worked at CRI, commented in Glenn Hauser's dxld Yahoo Group:

"I'm not surprised it ended. In 2004 there was talk about ending the show at CRI. The reason was, when they looked over a one-year period they found it was the same people that wrote in over and over and over. Also within CRI, if someone was asked to produce the show, it was seen as a demotion. No one really wanted to do it. I remember discussion I had with the then head of the English Service Li Ping. I told her the problem was the show was too scripted and was dull. I worked with Stuart Parkins, a Brit who was there at the time. and we did a pilot on a new exciting version of the show. Everyone who heard it said it was much better than Listeners Garden, but the censors and the leadership at CRI didn't understand it, so it never went to air. The script was written by someone in the letters department, and when I say scripted, everything was. What you hear on air is exactly what you see on paper. The show needed to be off the cuff and improvised."

Never-the-less, I'm sorry to see the end of Listener's Garden — I always found it a relaxed and informative program. Also, I must say that it seems rather illogical to me "to say goodbye to a show that is so popular among the listeners." I wrote to CRI to tell them, but I'm sure that it'll make no difference.

Of course, the big problem for all "Listener Response" programs on all stations these days is the relative lack of response. Too often, it's the same people writing in. However, I wouldn't want to discourage anyone from writing in to Listener Response programs, preferably with some comment – no matter how short – about a program that they heard. It must help give encouragement to the presenters, and maybe – just maybe – help to delay the relentless trend of stations abandoning shortwave.

R Romania International

Each Sunday at 1900-2000UT on 5990 and 7430kHz, repeated Monday at 0100-0200UT on 5910 and 7340kHz is traditional Romanian music. You'll find the same music that you'll hear for 10 minutes or so in their English program The Skylark, however this program runs for a full hour. It is presented in Romanian, and some weeks there is a studio quest, but even so, at least half the show is still music, so a lack of understanding of the language is not a barrier to enjoying this program. It's called "Zi-le D-Alead-Ale Noastre!" According to a reply recently received from the RRI English section, this title roughly translates as "Play some good old traditional Romanian tunes!' Highly recommended.

Voice of Vietnam

I was browsing the **V of Vietnam** web pages recently and I saw a reference to an item in their **Saturday Report** program of 11 January headlined "The custom of 'buttock flapping' of Mong ethnic people". Well, I couldn't resist the hook, and browsed via the Daily archive of programs at http://vovworld.vn/en-US/Programs-of-the-week/435.vov to the broadcast of that date.

The Saturday Report program often includes short items relating to cultural or traditional activities in Vietnam, and is highly recommended. So, I'm sure you're also, like me, eager to know what is "buttock flapping". It seems that it's a newly revived tradition of the H'Mong people and is only observed during the Spring Festival at the start of the New Year.

"The action is considered a declaration of love between a boy and a girl have fallen for each other. According to the tradition, the couple has to smack each other's behind 9 times to make the romance official. Holding his girlfriend's hand, Mong boy Mi Say said: "I arrived at the spring festival at dawn to join in the fun activities and seek friends. My girlfriend lives

in another commune and it's not easy for us to meet each other often. She is a good girl and I want to marry her. Today she accepted my love and our wedding will take place with the help of a matchmaker."

For Mong people, this custom is not just for fun. It's a very special and unique cultural tradition. Boys and girls often know each other in advance. They just use this custom to declare their love out loud."

If they "...often know each other in advance" then that must mean that it's not a requirement to know your intended in advance – so, do you just walk up a smack them 9 times? I guess a smack on the rear in return means you're on, whereas a smack around the face in return means you've made a terrible mistake!

BBC World Service to reduce shortwave transmissions as part of savings drive.

Peter Horrocks, director of global news, says £15m must be saved to fund new investments over the next three years.

The BBC World Service will further reduce its shortwave transmissions next year as part of a £15m savings drive which staff have been warned will be a "real stretch".

The money will be used to invest in new TV and digital services, part of a programme called Invest to Innovate.

An extra £6.5m is being pumped into the World Service's budget this year, alongside an extra £1.5m of savings, helping to create 130 jobs. New initiatives include a global version of Radio 1's Newsbeat.

But the BBC's director of global news, Peter Horrocks, said further savings would be required in the future.

Horrocks told staff on Tuesday: "There will be a respite on editorial job cuts, for a year, but we will need significant further editorial and organisational savings in subsequent years.

"We need to save at least £15m to fund new investments across the World Service in the next three years. We have already identified about half that saving. So we need to find at least £8m extra ... that is going to be a real stretch."

Horrocks said changes would include more multilingual reporting, with staff filing for their own language service and in English, as well as a further reduction in shortwave transmissions.

He said the World Service would also have to integrate further with the main BBC News operation.

Horrocks also announced that the BBC's global news division, which includes its world news TV channel, would be renamed "World Service Group ... a sort of World Service-plus" and the World Service board would be axed with the change in its funding.

The new round of cuts comes after the World Service had to find £41m of savings after its budget was cut in the government's comprehensive spending review three years ago, leading to the loss of about 550 jobs.

It closed five language services, stopped radio broadcasts in seven languages, cut back on shortwave and medium-wave transmissions and axed a number of World Service English programmes.

The World Service is to be funded directly from the BBC licence fee, along with BBC Monitoring, rather than a Foreign Office direct grant, from 1 April. This switch was agreed between the BBC and the government as part of the 2010 licence fee settlement.

[Some comments filed by readers, including one from Jonathan Marks, bears reprintinged.]

Allibaba - For a very long time the BBC World Service on Shortwave and Medium Wave was one of my three most favourite programmes, besides Deutschlandfunk and Bayern 2 (I live in Bavaria, Germany). I can receive BBC World TV but this is absolutely no replacement for the radio program - just like Jonathan Marks wrote above. As an international broadcaster himself he knows what he is writing about. Even the Internet live stream is no replacement. I have a smartphone but reception requires UMTS which I often have no access to - for

example while driving my car. 648 kHz worked quite well while it was dark. BBC World Service should be funded by the Foreign Office, not by the British radio fee. It would be money very well spent - even without "tips for tourists" as the German service of the BBC WS offered ages ago. Perhaps the British government will change its mind after is has cut off the continent by leaving the EU. Otherwise I could then easily forget that GB exists at all.

jonathanmarks2- I wish that World Service radio had a wider range of programmes than simply news, news, and more news. It could cherry pick some brilliant analysis programmes from Radio 4, and then do its own version of File on 4. There are gems on WS, like Click! but listeners in the UK would never really know. Let TV do rolling news. Radio is much better at analysis, going deeper than where cameras fear to tread. It can be anonymous! At the moment, parts of the WS schedule sounds like a broken TV (Newsday is my switch off moment). I have enormous respect for the talent in World Service. But the vision has to be broader that television. Their competition is not from other broadcasters like VOA, RFI or Deutsche Welle. It's from Buzzfeed, Google, and the Huffington Post.

Global Perspective in a Digital World

"Our total estimated weekly audience is now a quarter of a billion. The **World Service** alone has an audience of 192m around the globe.

"Figures show that all the hard work to get our language sites into responsive design is paying dividends for our audience. We have seen significant increases in traffic after each launch. Seventeen language websites – including all African sites are now responsive, that's when their layout is automatically adjusted to the screen size and connectivity of the user's mobile phone.

"It was just a week ago that for the first time ever, visitors to World Service online broke the 50m monthly visitors mark.

"But we have also established a remarkable presence in the UK on the BBC's domestic output. World Service English has an audience of more than 1.4m in the UK- which takes us up to 2 million including the overnight audiences on other networks. It has also developed a strong relationship with BBC Radio 4 working jointly on global projects. A recent example was Today's live presentation from Nigeria for the MINT season which was done in collaboration with Newsday.

"Joining the Licence Fee makes contributing to and benefiting from the wider BBC News Group much easier. We have already taken advantage of the BBC's new technology in Broadcasting House. Under licence fee funding lots of FCO accounting rules fall away, which will make it much easier to share content across News. BBC Monitoring's contribution to the wider BBC has massively increased since their move to the Licence Fee. They now work more closely with the whole of news to share their unrivalled insight into media around the world, and Monitoring's News from Elsewhere on the online Magazine is just one great example."

World Service English

"Radio remains vital. It is our largest total platform by a long way. In spite of the impact of cuts on WS English, its audience has increased over the last three years period to 43m. WS English remains by far the biggest BBC radio network in terms of audience size.

"WS English has been revamped since its move to Broadcasting House in 2012. Its daily news and current affairs output has changed a great deal to include new programmes such as The Newsroom and Business Matters.

"A lot of WS English output is becoming multiplatform. The new programme, Outside Source, was launched on BBC World News yesterday following its successful introduction on radio a few months ago. As a graphics geek I loved seeing the programme go out last night and joining in with the team's discussion about how this fluid interactive style can be pushed further.

"A brilliant example of pioneering and collaborative journalism is BBC Trending, which is on WS English with a blog on the online Magazine page and regular live slots on BBC World News. It works closely with Language Services and BBC Monitoring to spot and report topics that are trending on social media around the world. We'll develop that concept further, for example with the Indian elections and the World Cup."

The Invest to Innovate plan

"The BBC's aim is for us to be the most trusted news provider in the world, while helping the BBC to reach the ambition of a total audience of 500 million people by 2022, the BBC's centenary.

"So how will we do that? Last week Tony Hall confirmed that the **World Service** budget from April 1 will be £245 million. That's £6.5 million more than it received in this last year of Foreign Office funding. By making extra savings in the financial year starting in April we actually have £8m to invest.

"This step up in funding in the next year is a deliberate decision by the BBC Executive and Trust to help repair some of the damage of the FCO cuts. The BBC will expect us to deliver a matching step up in creative and audience performance. I should be clear that BBC World Service is also expected to continue to find more efficient ways of working-saving money is not optional. I will say more on that in a minute.

"But in this coming financial year, we do have extra money to invest and I want to give you the details of the Invest to Innovate plan.

Radio innovation

"Let me start with radio. If the World Service is the foundation of the entire BBC, as the Director-General wrote last week, then radio is the bedrock on which those foundations have been built.

"And it is as important to our future as it has been to our past. So, we'll put investment into the Partner Production Hub that World Service English has pioneered so successfully – helping us to target World Service English content at specific partner stations and their audiences. More of our future listening is going to come to us through partners, so we need to invest more in this area.

"We will reach out to younger audiences who may not have traditionally listened to our network. A team of journalists from four different language services, African English, Swahili, Urdu and Pashto/Dari, is currently working on pilots with the working title of Global Newsbeat – creating radio bulletins with a style and agenda that appeals to young listeners, along with a digital offer that will engage them. This will allow us to build partnerships with a wider range of radio stations, and to introduce a new generation to the BBC.

"We'll also put more money into helping Witness, the epitome of a thoughtful and original World Service radio programme, turn itself into a multimedia, multilingual brand. It will deliver the many of its interviews in video, for TV and online and also for languages – Persian is already running the pilot video programmes.

"And I'm keen that our brilliant audio is delivered more cleverly to audiences on new platforms. The BBC iPlayer radio app will launch internationally later this year, with World Service radio at its heart. And my eye was caught by an article recently that wondered why audio doesn't 'go viral', as they say, as easily as pictures or words. I am putting aside some money for innovation in audio distribution. The Global Future project will be holding sessions to hear your ideas for innovative distribution of audio."

ABC Boss Lynley Marshall Defends Overseas Broadcasting

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The chief for the ABC broadcasting into the Asia Pacific insists the taxpayer funded network has a growing audience with better programs on the way - despite reports the service is for the chop in the May budget.

ABC International boss Lynley Marshall stoutly defended overseas broadcasts as a way of promoting Australia, saying the spread of social media and mobile devices in Asia has vastly extended the potential audience.

She told a Melbourne audience on Monday evening the service had more than 1 million supporters on its Facebook page for learning the English language.

"Imagine if we converted just 10 per cent of that number to come and study in Australia," Ms. Marshall said, adding the ABC had struck partnerships with local websites to extent its reach.

"So when people comment on our services and say we've only got a tiny audience, or only expats, it is because they are not understanding the strategy."

But she conceded the troubled Australia Network television channel, run by the ABC on a government contract, has been guilty of presenting a "hodgepodge" of programs.

The goal of the network is to promote Australia's image in the region, in a manner similar to the BBC World Service or the US Voice of America.

Commercial programs, such as Home and Away, are broadcast alongside ABC News bul-

letins and football matches but the programming has been panned as dull and repetitive.

Ms. Marshall said despite some media reports, the Foreign Affairs department was positive about a new strategy hammered out for the network in July and the ABC was "hopeful and confident" there would be time to demonstrate results.

Foreign Minister Julie Bishop's office had assured the ABC no decision had yet been taken on the future for the Australia Network, Ms. Marshall said.

A report in The Australian newspaper this month stated the Abbott government intended to scrap the service, unhappy with the cost and programming.

Former foreign minister Alexander Downer has also been a vocal critical of Australia Network, which presents a mix of news, sport, lifestyle and light entertainment programs to more than 40 countries.

Ms. Marshall said in a speech to the Australian Institute of International Affairs on Monday that improving the content of a television station took time, and commissioning and producing fresh programs had been held up during a protracted battle for the rights to run Australia Network.

The Gillard government put the service out to tender in 2011 but was heavily criticised for intervening in the process after an independent panel recommended Australia Network be awarded to Sky News.

The ABC was then awarded permanent rights to run the network.

Ms. Marshall said the embassies from each of the countries where Australia Network is presented had been involved in the drawing up the new strategy.

The ABC has been criticised by Coalition figures for broadcasting stories on Australia Network that have caused government embarrassment, including details of leaked documents revealing Australia spying in Indonesia.

But Ms. Marshall said why there was a "natural tension" inherent in international broadcasting, a free and independent media was a cornerstone of any democracy and a value Australia cherished.

She said the 3.3 billion mobile subscribers in Asia offered an enormous potential audience and other nations, including China, had boosting their international offerings.

She said a trial of a service targeting expatriate Australians was being run in Hong Kong.

BBG Expands Collaboration with Leading International Media

Paris, France - Representatives of leading government-supported international media organizations known collectively as the DG7 agreed to expand collaboration on research - both into technologies and about audiences - and to reduce costs where possible on shortwave and satellite transmissions.

Officials from the Australian Broadcasting Corporation (ABC), the British Broadcasting Corporation (BBC), the Broadcasting Board of Governors (BBG), Deutsche Welle, France Médias Monde, Japan Broadcasting Corporation (NHK) and Radio Netherlands Worldwide assembled in Paris on Dec. 2-3. Board members Michael Meehan and Matt Armstrong attended from the BBG.

"We can tackle challenges that cross international boundaries with greater success working as a group," observed BBG Governor Meehan. "Importantly, our tech teams will gather in Bonn in January 2014 to dig into this cost-saving effort."

Following the DG7 meeting, the group held a second round of discussions on Dec. 4 on information freedom and collaboration on Internet anti-censorship programs as a follow-up to its May 2013 meeting held in Brussels.

"I am pleased with the increasing collaboration on Internet circumvention programs and the pledges to increase efficiencies and effectiveness in areas of shared interest, including the use of shortwave broadcasting." said BBG Governor Armstrong.

"As information freedom continues to be attacked in the more than 100 countries we serve, the BBG must work creatively and cooperatively with these valuable partners, who all have very complimentary missions, to achieve our shared goals."

In November, the DG7 called upon the UN Security Council to stand up against media suppression and urge governments to bring to justice those who harm journalists and media workers.

Cuban Numbers Stations

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Even if you're not a Cuban spy, you too can receive secret messages sent by Havana to its spooks in Miami, Washington and around the world.

Every week, one short wave radio station in Cuba broadcasts 97 messages coded in fax-like tones. A computer program easily available to the public changes the tones into numbers, and the Cuban spies then decode the numbers into words.

A second Cuban spy station transmits 16 messages per week in the dots and dashes of the 175-year-old Morse code – secret messages to Havana spies who may be older or less technologically savvy.

Sixteen years after the arrests in Miami of five Cuban spies who got their secret orders by short wave transmissions, Havana is still using a system that fell out of favor in the cloak-anddagger world with the end of the Cold War.

There are many more modern and efficient ways of communicating secrets by using sat-

ellites, burst transmissions, one-time emails and other means, said Chris Simmons, a retired Pentagon counter-intelligence officer who specialized on Cuban affairs.

"But these Cuban transmissions may be for old spies, dinosaurs who have been listening to (short wave) for so long, long term agents, that they are comfortable with it and don't want or need a change," Simmons added.

The busiest Cuban station these days, and the only spy station in the world that uses the fax-like tones, has been baptized as HM01 by amateur eavesdroppers who run Web pages like Spooks List, Spynumbers, ShortwaveSchedule and Enigma2000.

It transmits 11 to 14 messages per day, a total of 96 per week, on the same schedule each week but using a dozen different short wave frequencies, said Chris Smolinski, 41, a Maryland software engineer who monitors the spy stations as a hobby.

Each message almost always has 150 fivedigit groups, so that eavesdroppers cannot measure the true length of the text. And some of the 10-minute transmissions are phonies, designed to mask the real number of spies receiving them. Anyone can hook up a radio receiver to a computer, where the DIGTRX program — widely used by ham radio aficionados to send and receive lengthy texts, turns the tones into numbers. Spies then use secret computer programs to turn numbers into text.

"HM01 is an ideal system because you don't have to teach any to anybody. The computer does all the work," said Smolinski.

For the less computer-savvy spooks there's the M08a station, which broadcasts 16 messages in Morse code, developed for the telegraph in 1836, on a set weekly schedule and on many of the same frequencies as Hm01.

Smolinski says Morse code indeed is easier to understand in difficult atmospheric conditions than voice transmissions. Simmons, who played a key role in the 2001 arrest of Pentagon analyst and Cuban spy Ana Belen Montes, said "it's probably an old-spy thing."

Walter Kendall Myers, 76, a retired State Department official, and his wife Gwendolyn, both convicted in 2009 of spying for Cuba for nearly 30 years, received their messages from Havana in the Morse code that Myers learned in the U.S. military.

The Cuban broadcasts are transmitted from different locations on the island and, although there's no way of determining how many real spooks are listening, they can provide hints to the spies' general locations.

The frequencies and footpaths of the most active Cuban spy station in the 1990s indicated it was transmitting mostly to two areas: Florida, home to the five Havana spies convicted in a 2001 trial; and a footpath that started in North Carolina, — home of the 82nd Airborne and several Special Forces units — and covered Washington and New York, monitors said.

During the heyday of the Cold War in the 1970s there were scores of short wave spy stations, known as "numbers stations" because they used blocks of numbers to broadcast coded messages, although some used music or tones, said Smolinski.

The United States ran several of the stations, and so did the Soviet Union, East Germany, Britain, Israel, France and China. But many went off the air with the end of the Cold War and the arrival of new technology and today Cuba, Russia, Vietnam and North Korea are the main users of the coded short-wave stations, Smolinski said.

Cuba's most famous numbers station, known as "Atención" because of the opening line of the deadpan female voice in Spanish that started its transmissions, went off the air just late last year, Smolinski.

The five spies convicted in Miami typed the numbers into a secret decryption program on their home computers to read the texts. The FBI surreptitiously broke into their homes, copied the program and was reading their messages long before their arrests in 1998.

Montes, a Defense Intelligence Agency expert on Cuba, received her marching orders from Atención on its Tuesday and Thursday evening broadcasts. She pleaded guilty to spying for Cuba in 2002 and is serving a 25-year sentence.

The lack of any accent in the voice of the Atención station was explained in December by Jorge García Vázquez, a Cuban in Berlin who has been researching the links between Havana and the STASI, the former East Germany' intelligence service.

A Jan. 10 1977 letter in the STASI archives shows Cuban intelligence Maj. Eddy Herrera had requested the equipment for a numbers station, preloaded with the Spanish words for one through zero, Attention, Goodbye and Final, Garcia Vasquez reported.

Smolinski says he laughs when he talks about the Atención station because it was infamous as one of the worst-run spy stations in the spook world. Its transmissions often started late, its signal drifted across frequencies and a buzz would make the messages unintelligible, he said.

CLANDESTINE La Voz del CID history ... About anti-Cuban station that was installed in Guatemala City: Dear amigo Michael, Just read the discussion about a now defunct station in the TopNews Bulletin, and could not resist to tell the amazing story that follows. Some time when the US sponsored anti-Cuban station known as La Voz del Cid was still on the air, a team of Radio Rebelde's sports commentators and an engineer from the station traveled to Guatemala City to broadcast a sports event that was going to take place in that Central American nation. They went early to the stadium and installed the solid state portable audio mixer with its two commentators positions, hooked it up to the two phone lines that connected to the local phone company in order to send the audio signals to Cuba on one 4 wire circuit and with the other two wire circuit keep in touch with the Radio Rebelde Master Control in Havana. But they could not make that hookup that had worked very well at many different locations to operate properly. They complained on the two wire direct line to Havana that there was a very loud audio signal in Span-

ish that leaked through without the possibility of removing that audio at all. They placed the telephone mouthpiece next to the local monitor at the mixer board and it was then that we realized that the audio was the infamous "program" from La Voz del Cid. We asked the engineer to look around the stadium for towers or masts with an antenna hanging between the two and a ladder type open wire transmission line coming down from the center of the antenna... Sure enough, from the top row of the grand stand of the stadium they could see the two steel masts that supported the antenna of the short wave station used by La Voz del Cid, the cause of the interference to the audio mixer board. The highly capable engineer always carried in his tools kit and accessories ferrite ring cores (toroid's) so he proceeded to place them at the proper places (microphone input, telephone lines input and output and the headsets of the commentators ... in order to remove the RF coming into the equipment from the nearby short wave station. So, they were able to broadcast the sports event and the Cuban audience was very happy with the transmissions... Of course that it was very interesting to learn, first hand, that the "clandestine" station was located not far from the center of Guatemala City, operating under the protection of the government of that country at the time. 73 and DX, Your amigo in sunny La Habana Cuba, Arnaldo (Arnie) Coro, Host of Dxers Unlimited radio hobby show, Radio Havana Cuba. THE BROADCASTING BOARD OF GOVERNORS IS REORGANIZING. The BBG manages U.S. overseas broadcasting like VOA and Radio Marti. The BBG says it's established an interim management for its International Broadcast Bureau that appoints three executives to manage daily operations and helps pave the way for a future chief executive officer. Readers will recall Congress recently held hearings on the future of the BBG and witnesses who used to lead the body split between being for or against putting it back under the auspices of the USAID. The BBG is struggling to reduce duplication among the broadcasters and focus more of its

resources away from Cold War sites like Europe to reach current areas of conflict in the Middle East. Under the interim management structure, André Mendes becomes director of Global Operations, Robert Bole is now director of Global Strategy and Suzie Carroll becomes director of Global Communications. Mendes, Bole and Carroll will provide oversight and direction to Voice of America and the Office of Cuba Broadcasting, as well as the other offices of the federal agency until a CEO is hired. BBG Board Chair Jeffrey Shell said the move prepares the IBB for reform. The board, meanwhile, has set up a committee to look for a CEO. Mendes has directed the IBB's Office of Technology, Services and Innovation for the past four years. Previously, he was Chief Technology Integration Officer for the Public Broadcasting Service, where he was responsible for both IT and broadcast engineering during a \$1.8 billion transition to digital television. Robert Bole joined the BBG in 2011 as Director of Innovation to lead the agency's use of technology to improve storytelling, news delivery and crisis response. Previously, Bole was vice president of Digital Media Strategies at the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, where he helped lead the creation of a unified digital distribution platform. Suzie Carroll has been with the BBG since 2012. As BBG Executive Director, she is the principal liaison for the chairman and members of the Broadcasting Board of Governors and manages implementation of board priorities. Before being tapped by the board, she was the agency's Congressional Coordinator. (Radio World Newsbytes)



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< www.ontheshortwaves.com> Update, January 26, 2014 -- We have upgraded one of our entries under "DX History/Lists, Logs, Guides & Columns," specifically the one dealing with the Foreign Broadcast Information Service publication, "Broadcasting Stations of the World" (BSW). ("FBIS" was earlier known as the Foreign Broadcast Monitoring Service and the Foreign Broadcast Intelligence Service.) Tetsuya Hirahara of Japan had informed us that a University of Illinois link < http://hdl.handle.net/10111/UIUCOCA:Scrial/broadcastingstat> led to full copies of various issues of BSW from 1953 to 1974, posted in several formats. Happily, this link still works. Although the "View holdings" info accessed via the link at the top of the Univ. of Illinois page says the first issue of BSW was in 1946, we have an earlier one, dated August 1, 1945. Previously we had posted selected pages from it. Now we have posted the entire 66-page document. We have also posted a database file containing all the data from this edition of BSW, sortable in different ways. It is compiled in Microsoft Access (free readers are available on line, or, with some limitations, you can read Access files in Excel). Asterisk = inactive. We will be posting more on FBIS over the next few weeks. -- And under "Specialized Resources/Wavescan" there is a new entry from Adrian Peterson: "Tribute to Shortwave WYFR-7: The Wartime Years and Beyond" (January 19, 2014).

< www.ontheshortwaves.com> Update, February 2, 2014 -- This time we again look at the Foreign Broadcast Information Service, which was originally part of the FCC, and later relocated to the ClA. America's governmental monitoring agency, FBIS was born in 1941. A narrative history of the early days of the agency was produced in 1969 by Joseph E. Roop, a 24-year veteran of the agency, but it was not released publicly until 2009. It is now available online at https://www.cia.gov/library/center-for-the-study-of-intelligence/csi-publications/books-and-monographs/foreign-broadcast-information-service/ Under "Book Reviews" we have posted a review of this 307-page document, which covers the history of the agency through 1946. Appended to the review is an informative article about FBIS from the January 1945 issue of Radio News. -- Also this time, under "Specialized Resources," this new entry from Adrian Peterson: "Freedom At Midnight: The Pakistan Radio Story" (January 26, 2014).

< www.ontheshortwayes.com > Update, February 9, 2014 -- During World War II, the FCC's Foreign Broadcast Intelligence Service gathered its information mainly through the various FBIS monitoring posts. However, the agency also benefited from the work of DXers and clubs, especially the International DXers Alliance, a major shortwave club of that time. When the IDA closed in the summer of 1943, FBIS formalized its connections with a small group of DXers, mostly former IDA members. Starting in October 1943, it produced a twice-monthly DX news compilation, "Short Wave Schedule and Reception Notes," in exchange for the DXers' monitoring reports on new stations, changes in times and frequencies, etc. The bulletin was produced by Roger Legge, a well-known DXer who was then an FBIS employee. Under "Specialized Resources/DX Newsletters" we have posted a file containing some issues of this FBIS bulletin. It is believed that the last issue was published in September 1946. Among the contributors are many familiar names of the era: August Balbi, Ken Boord, Arthur Cushen, Paul Dilg, Grady Ferguson, Jimmy Hart, Charles Sutton, Earl Roberts. Thanks to David Hochfelder, Asst. Professor at Univ. at Albany-SUNY, for alerting us to this material, and to the National Archives for providing the copies. -- And under "Specialized Resources/Wavescan," a new Wavescan entry from Dr. Adrian M. Peterson, reviewing the book, The Early Shortwave Stations (February 2, 2014).

< www.ontheshortwaves.com> Update, February 16, 2014 — This time we wrap up our several-week look at the Foreign Broadcast Information Service. In 1971, FBIS published "FBIS in Retrospect," a 56-page report highlighting various historic broadcasts that the agency had monitored over its then-30 year life. Among them: the attempted assassination of Hitler; Japan's surrender; the death of Stalin; the Soviet move into Hungary; the Soviet missile pullout from Cuba; Khrushchev's retirement; the start of the Six-Day War in the Middle East; etc. We have posted "FBIS In Retrospect" under "DX History/General Radio History."
