Thanks to Ron Hunsicker (and a handful of others) we learn through the ARRL Newsletter that the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) FY 2019 budget request includes shutting down "NIST radio stations in Colorado and Hawaii" — in other

words, WWV and WWVH. Radio amateurs, high frequency shortwave listeners, and others around the world routinely make use of the time and frequency standard signals. which also include propagation information. NIST said eliminating funding currently "supporting fundamental measurement dissemination" would include putting WWV and WWVH off the air for a saving of \$6.3 million. The NIST FY 2019 budget request for efforts related to Fundamental Measurement, Quantum Science and Measurement Dissemination is \$127 million, which, the agency said, is a net decrease of \$49 million from FY 2018 levels. The Administration's overall NIST budget request is more than \$629 million. "The proposed reductions will allow NIST to consolidate and focus on narrower core [fundamental] measurement programs while meeting budget levels," the agency said in its FY 2019 budget summary. "NIST will focus on basic research while reducing funding for efforts applying some of its breakthroughs into new measurement applications". I can't imagine a world without WWV and WWVH.

It appears that only about half our current membership have electronic mail addresses. Is this true? If you have an active e-mail address, Rich Cuff is still trying to get an accurate handle on how many Internet capable members we have in the club. If you have not provided Rich with your e-mail address, please take a few minutes to send him an e-mail with that important information. Thanks! As I have mentioned in the past, an accurate e-mail database would enable the club to contact the membership quickly should another emergency situation arise. Welcome to the September Publisher's Corner!

Hello again from Allentown, Pennsylvania. I thought I'd spend a couple minutes talking about postage and how we manage it! Yeah, I know, not nearly as exciting as hearing the Solomon Islands on shortwave.

If you're observant, you see that each month's Journal usually runs 40 pages plus the covers. That's not an accident: That size comes in just shy of two ounces in weight; any larger, and it would cost us an additional 21 cents to mail. Not much, you might say...but consistently missing that two-ounce target would necessitate a \$3 yearly increase in membership fees. No one wants that, of course.

We're able to come in just shy of two ounces only by slightly trimming each booklet after it's printed and stapled; our printer handles that for us. That's also the main reason we don't mail the *Journal* in an envelope, as the additional weight from the envelope takes us above the two-ounce threshold as well.

The feedback I've received so far indicates that the US Postal system doesn't maul or scuff the *Journal* too much. If, however, your copy arrives gnarled, let us know...we will send out a replacement.

This two-ounce threshold also applies to our International members, and we're experimenting with sending at least the Canadian copies out the same way. Do let us know if that is a problem for you.

Domestically, we're also able to save a smidgen of cost, and a bit of manual labor, by using a First Class Mail permit, but that's only available to us if we mail 200 or more copies domestically each month. We're still above that threshold; if we were to fall below that level, we'd need to stamp or meter each item individually or have a mailing service do that for us.

Online Payments - They're Back!

We now have PayPal set up for the club – and we can process renewals that way to save you the cost and hassle of a stamp and a check if you're Internet-savvy. Send PayPal payments to hq@naswa.net and they'll reach our account. Note that PayPal charges approximately \$1 for the convenience, so it would be appreciated if you tacked on that extra dollar when sending your payment in. That would make Membership rates \$33 for USA members, \$40 for Canada members, and \$55 for our other International members.

Starting later in the fall you can save that extra dollar if your bank uses an online payments tool called **Zelle**. If your bank offers Zelle it will be an option available in your online banking website or smartphone app. The bank where we have our account will be rolling out Zelle sometime this fall, they say. One advantage of Zelle is that the money shows up instantly in our account – literally within 5 minutes of when you complete the transaction!

Listening Review

Hello and welcome to the September edition of Listening Review. A reminder that this column is my look at programs that I have enjoyed on shortwave, and occasionally via podcast or internet stream. However, I do also welcome your contributions. What programs have you heard and enjoyed recently? Which are your favorite programs and/or stations? And why? All India Radio

AIR has a long running series called **Wisdom of India**, and for a few months now the program has been devoted to a series called **Yoga on Radio**. I've been meaning to catch this for some time, but I always seemed to miss it, until 20 August at 1920UT on 9445khz.

Today's episode featured the Ardha Chakrasana Asana (or half-wheel pose) which:

"increases the suppleness and strength of the muscles in and around the lower back; thus it helps in back pain, slipped disc and sciatica pain. It also gives strength and suppleness to the neck, back and waist".

The program then gives some cautions about when to stop performing the asana before going on to describe in clear detail how to perform it, all to the background of soothing music and bird calls.

A fascinating program, in its own way – although whilst listening I did wonder

how many people will actually follow along and attempt the poses described. A quick internet search revealed a UN report suggesting that 2 billion people practice yoga (with other estimates ranging upwards of 20 million people). Either way, that's a lot of people, so maybe more listeners follow along than I might otherwise have thought. Will I listen again? Probably not – but if you practice yoga, then this program may be for you.

Yoga on Radio is aired most weeks on Mondays at 1445, 1920 and 2210, and Tuesdays at 0005UTC. (All times are subject to change, and it has been scheduled over recent weeks, for example, at 1925, 2110, 2220 and 0035), so it is worth checking the current times in the daily program schedule each Monday at http://airworldservice.org/cuesheet/cuesheet.pdf.

Radio Japan

Haiku is as Japanese as sushi and karaoke, and R Japan has a monthly feature called *Japan Through Haiku*, which is always a pleasure to listen to. A haiku is a poem which follows a strictly defined form. Roughly speaking, the poem should contain 17 syllables (known as on) in three phrases of 5, 7 and 5 syllables and contain a specified seasonal or topical reference (known as kigo).

The August edition of Japan Through Haiku (heard 2 August at 0500UTC on 5975kHz via Austria) presented examples of haiku with a kigo of "Atomic Bombing Anniversary" commemorating the detonation of two nuclear weapons over Hiroshima on 6 August and Nagasaki on 9 August 1945

Here are the English translations of three of the haiku poems in today's program:

Atomic Bombing Anniversary

I wonder how many bones vanished
Without even leaving shadows.

Atomic Bombing Anniversary

Tens of thousands of citizens attend the ceremony

Their Shadows are short.

Breaking silence

Sharing experiences

Atomic Bombing Anniversary.

The program also included explanations and background information to the haikus, although I think largely un-needed in these examples above. A rather more sombre, but fitting, program than is normal, but it made for compelling listening. The program ended with a song called August Song (written by the son of an atomic bomb survivor).

By the way, the December edition of the program will feature haikus sent in by listeners (up to three per listener, with a deadline of 20 October). Listeners can, if they wish, make up their own kigo, and should send an explanation of the haiku with their submission.

Japan Through Haiku is aired on the first Thursday of the month at 0515, 1115 and 1415UTC.

Voice of Vietnam

One of several programs that I regularly enjoy on V of Vietnam is their Monday program *Colourful Vietnam: Vietnam's 54 Ethnic Groups*. The episode on 13 August (1900UTC on 7280kHz) featured the marriage and wedding ceremony of the Cao Lan

ethnic people in Bac Giang province. Here's a short extract from the program:

"To prepare for a wedding, the male's family hires a matchmaker, who takes care of everything from making the wedding proposal to organize the wedding ceremony and taking the bride to the groom's family home. [...]

"The groom's family then finds a man to lead the procession to the bride's house. The bride's relatives use bamboo poles to block the way. The bride's relatives ask riddles and the groom's relatives have to answer correctly to get through the bamboo barriers. [...] The procession leader represents the group in answering the questions. If he fails to answer quickly and correctly, the groom's delegation must wait. [...]

"At the groom's house, a shaman performs a ritual to chase away evil spirits. He ties red threads on the couple's wrists to wish them happiness forever."

An enjoyable talk about the traditions of this ethnic group.

Colourful Vietnam: Vietnam's 54 Ethnic Groups is broadcast in all Monday transmissions.

Voice of Nigeria

The DRM service of V of Nigeria is back on air after being missing for some months. The schedule is 1800-1930UTC on 15120kHz, although it is rather erratic, either missing completely on some days or starting half-hour, or more, late. Never-the-less it is providing a welcome opportunity to listen to some of their programs and when on air, the DRM transmission is providing a reliable signal with a good lock and few drop-outs.

On 5 August at 1820UTC (15120kHz) I enjoyed *Weekend Magazine*. This is a relaxed, magazine program presented by Glory Ohago (Glory, pronounced Glo-o-ory)

consisting of informal chat, reports and Nigerian music, and this edition starts off with a Nigerian proverb, which goes along the lines of

"take things slow and steady no matter the challenges you face in life"

which just about sums up the program.
 Next was an enjoyable modern Nigerian pop song (about the singer's expressing confidence for getting the girl he loves) which leads to a reminder

"to stay focused and positive to your life's goals and dreams no matter what the lemons are that life throws at you."

This was followed by a very short drama/ sketch about keeping positive, focused, optimistic and relaxed, which led into a feature report about a form of relaxation at a fish spa, where fish remove the dead skin from your feet. It's:

"a form of relaxation where fishes nibble and tickle your feet. Can I ask 'May you stand fish nibbling and tickling from fish?!"

Not for me, although I have seen this on one of my holidays somewhere. Next, another Nigerian pop song which led into a short, but interesting, discussion on whether women should be brought up different to men. The conclusion was that all should be brought up the same. Everyone should remember:

"train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it [...] everyone should be able up to keep a home irrespective of gender and must have the ability to cook because hunger is gender neutral, even though in Africa cooking is seen as a pride of a woman."

After a (very nice sounding!) fish recipe, the program ended with a final Nigerian pop song.

A very entertaining and informative program - I was sorry that it was only 25 minutes long.

The V of Nigeria programming doesn't seem to have changed much, if at all, since I last wrote about it in 2015, so here is a quick re-cap of the 1800-1930UTC transmission.

Voice of America

I always enjoy Heather Maxwell's *Music Time in Africa* on the VOA. During August, Heather has been in Africa visiting Nigeria and Ghana "co-hosting on popular radio shows, meeting artists and producers and DJs".

MTIA on 19 August featured the highlights of the mid-morning show which she copresented live with regular presenter Don K. on ATL FM 100.5 from Cape Coast in Ghana. It was good to hear the on-air discussions between the two presenters, along with interviews in the studio with singer/songwriter eShun, and of course the great African music. I was also very pleased that the MTIA highlights show included some of the ATL FM jingles. It really gave a good feel for the original live broadcast.

Music Time in Africa is broadcast Fridays at 2100, and on Saturdays and Sundays at 1500 and 2000UTC.

Program Previews

Stephen Howie's excellent *Grooveline* is back on Channel 292 6070khz on the first Sunday of the month at 1300UTC (ie 2 September and 7 October) on 6070khz.

Meanwhile Jordan Heyburn (owner/admin of the Shortwave Radio Listeners Appreciation Group on Facebook) starts a regular spot, Jordan's Radio Corner, in the Italian Broadcasting Corporation's English program on the second and fourth weeks of the month, which is scheduled as follows: To Europe on Wednesday 2000-2030 on 6070khz (via Channel 292) and Saturday at 1030-1100 on 6005kHz (via Shortwave Service); and to the Americas via WRMI Tuesday 0100-0130 on 5850 7780, Friday 0100-0130 on 9955 & 0330-0400 on 5985, Saturday 0130-0200 on 5850 7780, Sunday 0030-0100 on 5950 7730 9395kHz.

There will be a little nostalgia on Channel 292 (6070kHz) at the end of the month when the station will be airing archive recordings of the Last 4 hours of the English Service R Northsea Int (from 30 August 1974) on 30 August at 1500-1900UT and the Last 2 hours of the Dutch Service on 31 August at 1500-1700UT. Unless bumped by Overcomer

Ministry, these are scheduled to be repeated on 2 September at 1400-1800UT and 1 September at 1400-1600UT respectively.

I'll end this month with a few highlights that we can expect to hear on Bill Tilford's From The Isle of Music and Uncle Bill's Melting Pot during September. Note that the episode order is not yet set and the topics are provisional and may well change.

FTIOM: Sundays 1500-1600 on 9400kHz via Bulgaria; Tuesdays 0000-0100 on 7490kHz via WBCQ and Tuesdays 1900-2000 & Saturdays 1200-1300 on 6070khz via Channel 292, Germany. Some September highlights will include: Roxana Iglesias of the Cuban Fusion group Frasis (re-scheduled from August); Rafael Monteagudo, Jazz percussionist from Cuba with his new recording Rhythm Lab; and Steve Roitstein of Palo!, an Afro Cuban Funk band based in Miami.

UBMP: Sundays 2200-2230 on 7490kHz via WBCQ and Tuesdays 2000-2030 on 6070kHz via Channel 292, Germany. Some September highlights will include Accordions Around the World; music from Peru, Ukraine, and Russia and a "This just in" potpourri of things sent from various countries.

Be sure to listen, and remember to let the presenters Stephen, Jordan and Bill know that you heard their programs.

Remembering Radio Prague in 1968 Defiant for a while

August 21, 1968, was the Soviet-led invasion of Czechoslovakia, ending the Prague Spring. (Pop quiz: Five countries participated in the invasion. Can you name them?) Many NASWA members will remember listening to shortwave during that dramatic time. In the mid-1960s. I was a teen-aged shortwave listener (and NASWA member) in northern Indiana with a low-end radio (Knight-Kit Star Roamer) and no usable tape recorder. Here are my memories of that time...

Radio Prague's English Service was usually audible. Even in the years before the Prague Spring, I noticed that Radio Prague had a friendlier, more relaxed approach than the other English services from communist Europe. I thought that if reform came to the region (again), Czechoslovakia would probably be first.

When the Prague Spring did arrive, Radio Prague was a joy to listen to. It was even friendlier, with objective news, and less time devoted to "commentaries."

Of course, I tuned in the evening of the day when news of the Soviet-led invasion broke. It was 0100 GMT on 7345 kHz. Instead of the usual 10-note Radio Prague interval signal -- youtu.be/9oLltEixR8Y -- there was a continuous tune. Maybe someone at the transmitter site not want to broadcast the communist anthem "Forward Left" that night.

When the English broadcast started, it made no mention of the invasion. Apparently it was recorded before the invasion. In any case, Radio Prague's English Service to North America was not on the air the next evening. I was envious of listeners in Europe who could hear the low-powered anti-invasion radio stations, on medium wave and shortwave, following the invasion.

Radio Prague's English Service returned a few weeks later. The announcers thanked listeners for their letters of concern and support. And they stated that the Warsaw Pact forces were not invited. After a few weeks, those defiant voices disappeared from the Radio Prague airwaves. Radio Prague reverted to its predictable and stultifying communist tone.

But again, in the late 1980s, before the Velvet Revolution, Radio Prague regained some of its friendliness. And it could be mischievous, especially during its New Year's Eve broadcasts. After the Velvet Revolution began (late 1989), Radio Prague was again wonderful to listen to. It's no longer on shortwave (except for some relays via WRMI in Florida), but it is online: www.radio.cz/en

BBG becomes USAGM

As the tone of broadcasting at Radio Prague changed through the decades, so has that of U.S. international broadcasting. The Voice of America and Radio Free Europe were in full Cold War mode in the 1950s. Gradually, real journalism played a larger role. Arguably, the "Camelot" period of news independence was from the 1994 establishment of the Broadcasting Board of Governors until this year. Sometime in 2018, the BBG will be relegated to an advisory role, with a politically appointed CEO taking over.

Also, on August 22, the BBG changed its name to U.S. Agency for Global Media. The United States Government is not known for its snappy brand names. And "U.S. Agency" is a real credibility buster if the USAGM intends to remain in the news business.

Readily available?

Thomas Hill, a visiting fellow at the Brookings Institution, wrote in The Hill on August 20 (bit.ly/2BzoegL): "The BBG has long held that its value is providing uncensored news and information to people around the world. The first Voice of America broadcasters signed on by saying 'the news may be good or bad (but) we shall tell you the truth.'

"However, as the ability to access uncensored news and information has expanded, the challenge has been to cut through the cacophony of voices and reach target audiences. This has created tension within the BBG: Should it provide news and information that is readily available through other outlets and platforms, or should it try to reach audiences with strategic messaging intended to advance U.S. security objectives?"

Kim: From what other outlet is news in *58* languages "readily available"?

Hill: "The result has been the near-isolation of the BBG from other elements like the State Department ..."

Kim: And because audiences for international broadcasting are seeking news that is more credible than what they get from state controlled domestic media, the "nearisolation" of the BBG is a good thing. That was the whole point of the BBG: to keep the U.S. government from kibitzing in the news output of the BBG entities.

Real news does not try to "shape public opinion"?

Hill: "In addition, the agency has been unable to demonstrate an ability to shape public opinion in target communities. Instead, it has relied on traditional media metrics, touting that it 'provides content in 61 languages to a record measured audience of 278 million people each week in more than 100 countries on radio, television, and digital media platforms."

Kim: Real news does not try to "shape public opinion." Real news provides audiences with the information they need to form their own opinion about current events. This is a key process in the formation and maintenance of democracies.

ABC, CBS, and NBC depend on "traditional media metrics" to determine how many Americans tune in to their evening television newscast to obtain the information they need to form their opinions. They know better than to fret about how much their newscasts are able to "shape public opinion in target communities."

Hill: "According to the BBG, since 2010, audience size increased by 113 million — but many in Congress want success to be defined as being able 'to inform, engage, and connect people around the world in support of freedom and democracy."

Kim: Hill is quoting here from the BBG's unfortunate mission statement. Note that the statement does not specifically mention news or reliable journalism. It does contain "inform," but that verb covers a lot of territory. An advertisement for a used car dealer informs. It is no wonder that so many people, including members of Congress and employees of the BBG entities, are confused about what U.S. international broadcasting is supposed to do.

Shortwave® has nothing to do with shortwave

In another misappropriation of the fine word "shortwave," Google has introduced an app to play podcasts and has filed for a trademark on the word Shortwave. Does this mean NASWA will have to change its name? NAHFA is a bit awkward.

James Latham, the author of this 2002 article from Intelligence Report-the magazine of the Southern Poverty Law Center (SPLC)—was one of the three principals behind Radio For Peace International (RFPI), envisioned as a world community radio station that would broadcast exclusively on the topics of peace and disarmament, human rights and the environment.

RFPI went on the air on shortwave from the University for Peace in Costa Rica in September of 1987. By 1994, it produced and broadcast a number of independent programs. It set up a center to train students in radio production and media activism.

This same period marked the emergence of hard right wing radio programmers—some championing hate groups monitored by the SPLC—broadcasting through the purchase of time from U.S.-based private shortwave stations.

In response, Latham and Brad Heavener created "Far Right Radio Review", a program that took a critical look at that content and its producers. Simultaneously, RFPI came under constant threat—serious enough that the Costa Rican government stationed a team of Special Forces at the station.

Coinciding with the installation of a former U.N. official as president of the University in 2003, the station was forced off of shortwave and out of its facilities on the campus ostensibly due to a contractual dispute. Its buildings, antennas and studios were seized by force without compensation despite several Costa Rican and U.S. court decisions granting relief to the station and its owners. Curiously, the U.N., which had been the station's patron and praised its work on numerous occasions, never stepped into the dispute or moved to object.

As mentioned, Latham wrote the following article in 2002. Is it just coincidence that one year later the station was forced off the air under somewhat dubious circumstances? Perhaps it is interesting to note that much of the programming the article criticizes continues to be broadcast today. On the other hand, why weren't any of the programs carried on RFPI ever broadcast on any of the U.S.-based private shortwave stations? Did they ever ask? Were they denied access?

Radio Station Owners Broadcast Hate, Claim They Love Free Speech

In the anarchic world of underground radio, Allan Weiner is a certifiable legend. Weiner started to gain notoriety in the early 1970s with a series of unlicensed, or "pirate," AM and FM radio stations around New York.

His attempts to sneak onto the air were repeatedly shut down by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) — most spectacularly in 1987, when Weiner and a band of radio enthusiasts tried to broadcast alternative rock from a rusty fishing vessel anchored off Long Island.

Coast Guard officers boarded the boat, handcuffed Weiner and shackled him on deck while dismantling his equipment.

Free-speech advocates jumped to Weiner's defense — and many were outraged again in 1994, when Weiner's second attempt at ocean-based broadcasting was routed off the South Carolina coast.

Weiner's memoir, Access to the Airwaves, came out in 1997, with its back cover touting the radio pirate as a "heroic free-speech advocate."

Inside, Weiner struck the noble pose of a liberal-minded martyr. "All I wanted to do," he wrote, "was broadcast messages of peace, love and understanding to the world. Was that such a terrible crime?"

After a 14-year quest to license a legitimate shortwave station with the FCC, Weiner finally succeeded in 1998.

From his farm in little Monticello, Maine, station **WBCQ** began sending out radio waves that could be picked up in Mexico, Central America, the Caribbean and all of North America.

At long last, Weiner was beaming out his message of "peace, love and understanding" with the federal government's blessing.

Tune into WBCQ four years later, and you'll hear the message being delivered in the exaggerated accent of an Italian-American New Yorker, to the tune of John Lennon's "Imagine":

"Imagine there's no homos. I hate those little f--ge-packin' nancy-boy p---ks; Manolo, every time I see one, I wanna beat 'im in the friggin' head; You know what I mean? Then I'll rip his heart out, cut off his friggin' little [beeped out]; Imagine all the [gays], oh Manolo, just droppin' dead from AIDS...."

When the song ends, the regular voice of the show's host returns, chuckling. "You don't hear music like that on any radio show, but you hear it here on 'The Hal Turner Show."

And the place to hear "The Hal Turner Show" is WBCQ. [Ed. Note: And also today on WRMI.]

Though there are over a dozen privately owned shortwave stations in the United States, Weiner's sells airtime — Monday evening, 8 to 9 p.m. EST — to what Turner loves to call the "most controversial talk show in the world."

But several shortwave station owners sell airtime to radio show hosts with messages that would fit right in on "The Hal Turner Show."

Most owners, like Weiner, argue that they are simply supporting freedom of speech — not making a mint off hate speech.

"It's not a business thing," insists Jeff White, co-owner of Miami-based WRMI, which sends its mostly Latin American listeners a "religious" show that vilifies and ridicules anyone who's not a heterosexual Anglo-Saxon. "The money we're talking about is insignificant."

Not insignificant enough to consistently turn away, however. Other owners are more matter-of-fact about their motives for airing hate-filled broadcasts.

"We do have to stay alive," says George McClintock, general manager of **WWCR** in Nashville, which claims more than 10 million listeners worldwide.

Besides paying the bills, McClintock says hate broadcasters fill another important — and frightening — role: "They draw an audience."

But Isn't Lynching Murder?

Why would a self-styled peacemaker of the airwaves run the most inflammatory show on shortwave? Questioned by the Intelligence Report, Weiner noted that Hal Turner "has a lot of support and he has people sending him money so he can pay his bills."

But Weiner insists that he doesn't air Turner's show just because he's a good paying customer. It's a matter of principle. "The reason it's on," he said, "is because of a promise I made my listeners [to be] open to all kinds of people."

Turner, a former real-estate salesman in New Jersey who failed in a 2000 run for Congress, certainly takes aim at all kinds of people.

His frequent rants about "faggots" are only the tip of the iceberg. Turner talks about "savage Negro beasts," "lazy-ass Latinos ... slithering across the border with wet backs" and "bull-dyke lesbians." He has described Israeli soldiers as "the spawn of Satan" who "deserve to be hunted down and killed."

In the creative revision of John Lennon's classic song, listeners were asked to "Imagine there's no cripples," with the faux-Italian voice adding, "Christ, I wanna kill those goddamn little wheelchair gimps."

Hate murder is a theme of "The Hal Turner Show," which last year repeatedly advertised an imaginary product called the "Portable N----r Lyncher."

"Does the community where you live tend to be getting darker and darker?" asked a voice with an overblown Southern accent. "Are you looking for an evening of entertainment with your friends and family? Well, folks, this is the answer to your prayers. The one and only PNL — Portable N----r Lyncher. Complete with two ropes and custom hand-tied nooses."

Such messages appear to clearly violate Weiner's hate-speech policy, posted on the WBCQ website. "WBCQ Radio shall not broadcast any speech which incites hatred" likely to lead to "physical harm," it prom-

ises. The policy goes on to define off-limits hate speech as "advocating or promoting ... killing."

Doesn't lynching count? "Hal Turner doesn't build his whole show around this," Weiner replied. Besides, "Hal does know that I am upset with his program." In fact, he said in all seriousness, he's put Turner on "double-secret probation."

Weiner also noted that he yanked a show featuring William Pierce, head of the neo-Nazi National Alliance, because Pierce talked about "exterminating Jews."

Sad Testimony, Indeed

But soon after Weiner talked to the Report, Turner's show began carrying advertising for one of Pierce's latest brainstorms — "Ethnic Cleansing: The Video Game." This time, the product was real.

A few weeks after the ads started airing, Turner plugged the game with an enthusiastic description: "The media is in a tirade [sic] over 'Ethnic Cleansing' because it allows teenagers to dress up as either a Skinhead or, um, Ku Klux Klan member carrying an assault rifle ... and killing the savage Negro beasts that infest the urban area... . You are also able to mow down the Third World, savage mongrels, ah, Mexicans, et cetera. Actually, the goal of the game is to come across and capture or destroy Ariel Sharon, the Chief Jew, who along with his fellow Jews are helping to destroy the United States with their sick, perverted multiculturalism."

You heard about it first on the Hal Turner radio show, worldwide on radio station **WBCQ**.

WBCQ's owner is himself Jewish. But while Weiner calls Turner's views "wacko" and "ridiculous," he contends that we all have something to learn from tuning in.

"I think 'The Hal Turner Show' is a good lesson in people," Weiner said. "It's a sad testimony to the hearts of humans out there."

Helping Your Enemies

Such sad testimony is a programming staple on several shortwave stations based in the United States. Like the Internet, shortwave radio is a medium of choice for the radical right — and for some of the same reasons.

The price is right, with studio equipment running as low as \$1,000 and air time around \$25 to \$250 an hour. With 17 million receivers in the United States and a worldwide audience estimated at a whopping 2.5 billion, that's some serious bang for the buck.

Plus, as William Pierce once explained, shortwave is ideal for the far right because, unlike AM and FM radio, regulations on content are extremely lax.

"Commercial networks are hesitant to take any politically incorrect views," said Pierce, "because they face a lot of pressure from Jewish groups."

Ironically, some of the small number of people who really do have power over shortwave programming — the station owners themselves — are among the very minority groups vilified by Pierce, Turner, and other broadcasters of hate.

The shortwave operators who air the most hate-filled shows include not only Jews like Allan Weiner, but also Catholics and Hispanics.

Take Miami-based WRMI. Founded in 1994 by four men — three of them Hispanic — WRMI's original mission was to air anti-Castro exile programming.

Over the years, the station has broadened its reach with shows of special interest to listeners in Haiti, Brazil, Peru and other parts of Latin America. [Ed. Note: With its securing of the large Okeechobee FL transmitting facility, WRMI has since further diversified and expanded its programming.]

More recently, the station has branched out in a different way, broadcasting far-right shows.

'Nobody Seems to Mind'

"[Some of these are] theoretically doing a religious program," says Jeff White, one of WRMI's co-owners. "We do air...a strong disclaimer."

"I know that many would argue that [this] is spreading racism behind the cloak of religion," said White, a former public-radio employee who acknowledged that he and the other station owners find [this] message repugnant. "But we have all types of programs," he said, "and the people can sort it out for themselves."

That philosophy is mirrored by the FCC, which licenses and regulates shortwave stations.

"The FCC cannot prohibit such programming," said Audrey Spivack, a spokesperson for the federal agency.

That leaves it up to the station owners. But their decisions about whether or not to air extremism are anything but consistent.

"If we had a significant number of complaints about [a] program," White said, "we'd take it off. But nobody seems to mind."

"If you are broadcasting this stuff internationally, I think it goes in one ear and out the other," he said. "I think most of the international listeners barely listen — not only to some of the racist stuff, but some of the other political programming that's targeted at a domestic audience. They don't listen to it."

In Tennessee, a Cornucopia of Hate

It's the best bargain in shortwave broadcasting: For only \$25 an hour, you can air an hour's worth of vitriol on one of shortwave's most notorious stations, **WWRB**.

This leader in fringe programming, formerly known as WWFV, was long nestled incongruously in the gently rolling foothills of the Appalachian Mountains, where David Frantz started beaming out a 50,000-watt signal from McCaysville, Ga., in 1996.

Although he has since moved to Manchester, Tenn., Frantz still fills an extraordinary amount of his station's airtime with antigovernment, anti-Semitic, anti-gay and racist propaganda.

Asked about such programming, David Frantz refused comment. "We don't respond to any of your questions," he told the Intelligence Report.

But when his neighbors asked the FCC to shut down the station in 1998, claiming that its electromagnetic and radio waves were a public threat, Frantz did talk to the Chattanooga Free Press.

He called the complaints "a ruse," saying local citizens were trying to "run me out" because of the shows he was broadcasting.

"We have been accused of being part of a militia," complained Frantz, who before his shortwave days had a top security clearance as a federal aircraft inspector. "They tried to get DHS [Department of Human Services] to take our children away, and these clowns actually accused me of threatening the president."

Frantz noted that his station had been "given a clean bill of health" by the FCC. Anybody could buy a time slot, he said, even "blacks, Indians, Jews, or the average person on the street."

Who's Getting the Message?

Though shortwave radio beams in under most people's radar in the media-saturated United States, it is one of the most powerful tools for communicating with a worldwide audience.

Exact audience numbers are hard to come by, since there are no Arbitron ratings for shortwave. But Groupe France Telecom, the communications arm of the French government, published a report last year [2001 – ed.] estimating that at any given moment, over 200 million receivers are tuned in to shortwave broadcasts.

With much of the world unwired for the Internet, the agency concluded, "Shortwave remains the only means of reaching a broad audience anywhere in the world."

Thousands of people tune into shortwave broadcasts as a way to learn English. Thousands of others, living in countries with authoritarian regimes, look to their shortwave receivers for an even more pressing reason: They want objective news sources.

What they will get, if they dial up **WWCR** [also **WRMI** and others-ed.] out of Nashville, Tenn., might be the peculiar spin of Brother R.G. Stair,

A self-proclaimed "prophet of God," Stair sends out doomsday scenarios from the otherwise sleepy town of Walterboro, S.C., twenty-four hours a day on one of WWCR's four 100,000-watt transmitters.

Much of Stair's airtime is devoted to claiming that disasters — both natural and terrorist — are being caused by America's growing acceptance of homosexuality.

In 1999, he gave this example: "The last two Gay Pride days have resulted in an awesome earthquake that shook the entire Western area of the country and a flood that devastated the entire Midwest."

George McClintock, general manager of WWCR, told the Intelligence Report that Stair's views on homosexuality "are from a Biblical point of view. And according to the Constitution, he has a right to that point of view."

Stair doesn't stop with gay people. He has also targeted Catholics, calling them "Mary worshippers" and labeling the pope "the great whore."

That doesn't seem to phase McClintock, either, despite the fact that he is himself a Catholic.

"Those programs are a relatively small portion of what we do," he said. Besides, McClintock said, "Our job is not to make judgment calls."

What Would Ross Say?

Judgment calls abound on some of WWCR's programs. While Stair [still] rains hellfire on gays, Catholics and those who tolerate them, Pete Peters [now deceased] preached the anti-Semitic, homophobic word of Christian Identity.

Peters, who founded the La Porte Church of Christ in Colorado, hosted two shows on WWCR-3, "Healthy Trinity Today" and "Scriptures for America."

On the latter, Peters instructed a caller in 1997 on the proper etiquette to follow: "If you're going to talk about Jews on my program, talk about them as Antichrist Jews."

Though Peters has been a leading figure in the movement for more than two decades, McClintock insisted that Peters "does not" preach Christian Identity.

"He lives out in a ranch in Colo... whatever it is out there in the Midwest, kind of isolated, and I think the worst you can say about him is he's living in the 1950s, kind of a Ross Perot individual."

Perot might not relish the comparison.

Peters' Colorado church first came to national notice in 1985, when it was revealed that several members of The Order, the most violent far-right terrorist group of the '80s (see "The Firebrand"), had attended during their criminal heyday.

Presumably because of the negative connotations attached to the term "Identity," Peters later disavowed the word — but he didn't changed his message in any discernible way.

"Certain Jews of this day attempt to take the Israel truth labeled Identity and make it into racism, violence, Nazism and hatred in the minds of the populace," he wrote online in 2000.

"Now that the meaning has been transformed by our enemies, it is now foolish for one to call himself an 'Identity Christian.'"

For lack of a better term, Peters took to calling himself part of "the restoration movement now underway."

'Say Anything'

If station owners conveniently discount the impact their hate-filled shows can have on listeners, then they might want to talk to Pete Peters. [if he were still alive -ed.]

The pastor from Laporte credited radio with indoctrinating him into Christian Identity. As he tells it, it all started on a drive one lonely night, when a young Peters turned his dial to the blaring voice of a preacher.

That voice happened to belong to Sheldon Emry, who carried the torch for Christian Identity over AM radio stations from the mid-1960s through the 1970s.

Hearing Emry on the radio that night changed Peters' life forever.

Another radio fan, Timothy McVeigh, might tell a similar story if he could be reached for comment.

Most people know the Oklahoma City bomber was a big fan of William Pierce, who in addition to his [neo Nazi] broadcasting efforts wrote "The Turner Diaries", the pseudonymous novel that helped inspire McVeigh's mass murder.

Fewer know about McVeigh's other shortwave hero, William Cooper, whose "Hour of the Time" served up global conspiracy paranoia, complete with UFOs, most nights on shortwave stations including WWCR and WBCQ.

When he wasn't concocting a conspiracy, Cooper was recommending remedies: "I think the American people ought to go there bodily, rip down the United Nations building and kick those bastards off our soil," he once proclaimed on **WWCR**. "We're at war and I don't really care."

Supposedly quoting the Clinton White House, Rush Limbaugh called Cooper "the most dangerous radio host in America" after the Murrah Building was bombed.

James Nichols, brother of McVeigh's codefendant Terry Nichols, said during a 1996 court proceeding that McVeigh had regularly tuned in to Cooper's programs in the months leading up to Oklahoma City.

"Hour of the Time" came to a halt linNovember 2001, when its host was killed in a shootout after critically wounding an Arizona sheriff's deputy.

Cooper had holed up in Eagar, Ariz., since 1998, broadcasting relentlessly and claiming on the air that he had been pursued by "Nazi jack-booted thugs" ever since he failed to appear in court on charges that he paid no taxes from 1992 to 1994.

His death came when authorities tried to arrest him on another warrant — this one accusing him of aggravated assault on a passerby.

For more than a month after the death of the shortwave extremist, Allan Weiner aired selections from Cooper's old programs on WBCQ.

While that didn't do much for his reputation as a purveyor of "peace, love and understanding," it did provide still further proof of Weiner's unguarded view of shortwave radio: "You can just about get on the air and say anything you want."

Statement by ARRL on Potential Closure of WWV/WWVH

ARRL members and Amateur Radio clubs are expressing increased concern over the inclusion of WWV and WWVH on a list of proposed cuts in the White House's National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) Fiscal Year 2019 budget request. The proposed cuts also would include the Atomic Clock signal from WWVB used to synchronize specially equipped clocks and watches. Online petitions soliciting signatures include one established by Tom Kelly II, W7NSS, of Portland, Oregon, who would like to see funding for the stations maintained. At this point, the budget item is only a proposal, not a final decision. That would be up to the Congress to decide.

ARRL is among those worried over the possible loss of WWV, WWVH, and WWVB and is suggesting that members of the Amateur Radio community who value the stations for their precise time and frequency signals and other information sign Kelly's petition and/or contact their members of Congress promptly, explaining how the stations are

important to them, beyond government and military use.

Kelly's petition, which may be signed by US residents, notes that WWV is among the oldest radio stations in the US, having been established in 1920. "The station has transmitted the official US time for nearly 100 years, and is an instrumental part in the telecommunications field, ranging from broadcasting to scientific research and education," his petition says. "Additionally, these stations transmit marine storm warnings from the National Weather Service. GPS satellite health reports, and specific information concerning current solar activity and radio propagation conditions. These broadcasts are an essential resource to the worldwide communications industry."

NIST's full Fiscal Year (FY) 2019 budget request to Congress calls for the agency to "discontinue the dissemination of the US time and frequency via the NIST radio stations in Hawaii and Fort Collins, Colorado." The agency noted, "These radio stations transmit signals that are used to synchronize consumer electronic products like wall clocks, clock radios, and wristwatches, and

may be used in other applications like appliances, cameras, and irrigation controllers." The specific cut, which would come from the NIST Fundamental Measurement, Quantum Science, and Measurement Dissemination budget, would amount to \$6.3 million.

In its budget request, NIST said that it plans to consolidate and focus work on its efforts in quantum science while maintaining essential core capabilities in measurement science research and measurement dissemination, as well as eliminate "efforts that have been replaced by newer technologies, measurement science research that lies outside NIST's core mission space, and programs that can no longer be supported due to facility deterioration."

WWV and WWVH broadcast time and frequency information 24/7, including time announcements, standard time intervals, standard frequencies, UT1 time corrections, a BCD time code, geophysical alerts, and marine storm warnings. Transmissions are broadcast from separate transmitters on 5, 10, 15, and 20 MHz. An experimental 25 MHz signal is also currently on the air. WWVB transmits standard Coordinated Universal Time (UTC) signals on 60 kHz to appropriately equipped timekeeping devices.

NIST Public Relations Director Gail Porter told Tom Witherspoon, K4SWL — editor of The SWLing Post, which has been tracking developments — that NIST "is proud of the time and frequency services we provide through our radio stations, and understands that these services are important to many people."

NIST Director Walter Copan has supported the overall budget request. "This budget request ensures that NIST can continue to work at the frontiers of measurement science by preserving investment in core metrology research," Copan said. "Through its constitutionally mandated role, NIST performs work that only the government can do, and produces enormous return on US taxpayers' investment. Translating measurements into technically sound standards across all industries enables effective international trade and US competitiveness."

A petition has been set up, however it needs 96,344 signatures by September 15, 2018 to get a response from the White House. https://petitions.whitehouse.gov/petition/maintain-funding-nist-stations-wwv-wwvh

Additionally, these stations transmit marine storm warnings from the National Weather Service, GPS satellite health reports, and specific information concerning current solar activity, and radio propagation conditions. These broadcasts are an essential resource to the worldwide communications industry. This petition requests continued funding of these stations be maintained into the 21st century and beyond to ensure future operations."

Rampisham Down was designated a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) in 2014 for its special grassland and heathland habitats. British Solar Renewables (BSR) wanted to build a huge solar park there, but after a lengthy planning battle - in which the decision was 'called in' by the government' - the company shelved its plans. A site nearby not deemed of high importance for wildlife was instead chosen for the solar park and given planning permission. This solar park could help to power the new venture at Rampisham Down, it is said. All but one of the original telecommunications towers, which helped to broadcast the BBC World Service in Europe until the station was decommissioned in 2011, have been removed. The remaining tower has become a nesting platform for peregrine falcons, as part of work by BSR, in conjunction with Natural England, to restore the land and make it a home for wildlife. FRANCE The French government said Thursday that it would demand 190 million euros of spending cuts at its public broadcasting operations by 2022 as part of President Emmanuel Macron's pledge to improve state finances. The bulk of the cuts - 160 million euros - will be made at its various television operations. with the France O channel covering the country's overseas territories going off the air by 2020. The government has already announced plans to pull the plug on France 4, an entertainment channel. Last month it launched a revamp of the public audiovisual sector, which includes broadcasters like Arte and the France 24 news channel as well as a host of radio stations, including Radio France Internationale. Alongside the spending cuts, the government has called for 150 million euros of increased investments in digital technologies by 2022. Combined, the operations have a budget of 3.8 billion euros this year. In a speech last week Macron said a plan to cut public spending overall in order to keep the budget within European Union deficit targets would be unveiled in the

coming weeks. He said the cuts would be part of a broad reorganisation of the French state aimed at bolstering state services in remote and deprived areas while making them easier to manage. The president has pledged to balance the budget in France for the first time in more than 40 years by the end of his term in 2022. 

 Update, July 29, 2018—In shortwave days of yore, stations interested in making ongoing contact with listeners sent out periodic program schedules, informing listeners of upcoming programs. In "DX History/Stations" we have posted a schedule that was sent out by Radio Nacional in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil in 1943. It is in Portuguese and English, and it contains much interesting information, including a description (and photos) of the station, a day-by-day list of the programs, with fuller descriptions of certain programs, news of Brazil's war affort, and reception reports from listeners. (Note the "Special Broadcasts" for Portugal, Great Britain, "Spanish America," the U.S. and Canada.) Radio Nacional operated with 50 kw. on three shortwave frequencies: 9520 kHz. (PRL7), 11720 (PRL8), and 17850 (PRL9). Also listed on p. 1 of the booklet is PRE8, the mediumwave channel on 980 kHz. We have previously posted several other items relating to Radio Nacional, in particular an article from RCA Broadcast News https://www.americanradiohistory.com/RCA_Broadcast_News_Page_Range_Guide.htm (January 1944, p. 29). We have also posted Don Jensen's QSL from Radio Nacional, 1952.

<www.ontheshortwaves.com> Update, August 12, 2018—Trinkets-IV. Last time, we posted a small group of trinkets that were mostly from traditional-style radio clubs. This time, under "DX History/Clubs & Publications," we have a group of pins from "clubs" that were usually sponsored by equipment manufacturers or radio magazines. The magazine "clubs" were formed to promote the magazines or encourage contributions to various columns. The pins shown are from: (1) The American Bosch Radio Explorers Club, with its "commander and master mariner" James P. Barker, operated in the mid-1930s. It was often mentioned in American Bosch advertisements, alongside letters from customers attesting to their DX feats while using an American Bosch receiver. What do the letters "AMNH," to the left of the ship, stand for? For a time there was also an American Bosch Radio Explorers Club program on NBC. - (2) Sparton Radio Explorers Club. The origins of this club are unknown; perhaps it paralleled the American Bosch club, but for the Sparton receiver line. - (3) Junior Radio Guild. The history of this one can be found at < http:// www.ontheshortwaves/Clubs/The Junior Radio Guild.pdf> - (4) Radio International Guild. Two pins; the Guild was sponsored by Pilot Radio & Tube Corp. - (5) Radio League of America. Thie Leaque was a Gernsback-sponsored group of wireless experimenters founded in 1915, and this was their official button (cost: 20 cents, including postage). - (6) Short Wave League. The League was sponsored by Short Wave Craft magazine. - (7) World-Wide Radio Club. This is another unknown club. Anyone recognize the geography shown on the pin? - (8) Radio Association of America. An advertiser in radio magazines in the 1920s, this group was devoted to promoting radio servicing as a career.—Also, we have updated the "Active-Inactive Shortwave Countries" list that can be found under "Specialized Resources." We have moved Denmark from the inactive to the active list based on the operation of licensed broadcaster World Music Radio; and we have moved Russian Fed.-Asian (Asiatic RSFSR) from the active to the inactive list based on the apparent inactivity of the several shortwave stations in the Russian east. For all the new revisions, see p. 42 of the list. Total active countries as of August 6, 2018 remains the same: 117 plus three pirates, out of a total of 266 "all timers" on the NASWA list.
