LOUDENBOOMER REPORT

I'd thought this whole balony about "courtesy broadcasts" curled-in its toes and died years ago! Apparently not. I scanned one of my favorite DX bulletins the other day, and just like the 17-year locusts, the doggone thing has surfaced again. These recent efforts will no doubt learn what IWCDXA learned years ago...

Back in '52, even I was infected with the appealing prospect of arranging for a rare station to aim a broadcast right at me -- what could be better? And so, it was your old buddy CL writing to the most unhearable of the unhearables: Male Chef Radio.

It was surprising that I had the gumption to write Male Chef in the first place. But even more astounding, the station replied a month later!

As I recall, it was a QSL-postcard, marked "specimen only" with a scrawled message from the CE, a Mr. Gallapono Courami. My mouth hung open, my jaw wiping the dust off the top of my Hammagrub Super-Prop, as I read the magic words: "Okey doke, yankee, you on de air." Gad!

Then it registered: Gallapono obviously expected me to provide a taped program for them to air. Me. Loudenboomer. A listener, pure and simple, used to the other end of the radio game. To put it simply, I didn't know my coax from a hole in the ground wire.

Undaunted, and for the greater glory of the International Worldwide Continental DX Association, ol' CL went to it.

It took a few weeks I admit to master some of the niceties of producing a shortwave broadcast (like mumblin' in the funny English I'd heard on the bands, and simultaneously cranking down the gain on the tape recorder any time I said something important for DX log-taking purposes. You know, brand names of products and the like.)

But I finally mastered it, and it sounded great! ("Dis um Radio Maleee Chevs burdcastin' fum the Int-nashall Woo-Wy Contentall Dee-Eksin' Assosh...") Then fade out of OM and into Turkey in the Straw at 16rpm.) It was simply lovely.

As an afterthought, I included a short announcement that all accurate reports would (in addition to the QSL) get a "special prize souvenir," appropriate to the broadcast.

I wrapped the treasured program in old copies of the New York News bulletin, 20 feet of bell wire, and the bundle was on its way to Male Chef.

March 11, 1952 at 0940, or 1120 or 2300, the broadcast was supposed to be on 5047 kHz//3331 kHz. I put on the phones and there it was, clear as a bell! Gad, my XYL's voice crackled out of the set. Somehow, I'd sent my general-use tape!!!

"CHARRR-LEEE!! Get out from under those headphones and get the garbage out. NOW!!

And then another voice followed, a whimpering, soft voice that I recognized as my own!

"Yes, turtledove..."

The sound of a squeaking chair followed, and then, enter the voice of one of the kiddies..

"Testin'...doot...doot...doot...doot.." went the brat's song.

Irving Berlin need have no fear about the competition. I slumped in the chair and turned off the set.

And so, that's why I think these courtesy programs are for the birds. No, it wasn't just because of the embarrassment to myself or IWCDXA. Heck, my image was none too good to begin with.

It was just that silly promise I made about an "appropriate souvenir" for listeners. I didn't have enough tape to wrap up the XYL, and the truck had already hauled away the trash.

THE ANDAMAN "SAUDARA" RECEIVER

As a special service to our membership, NASWA would like to take this page to introduce a new piece of equipment only recently discovered by accident. The Andaman Electronics Company, Ltd, of British license is little known outside the Indian Ocean area and Indonesia. This small firm manufactures the Andaman model "Saudara" table-size receiver which might just answer the needs of the DX fraternity.

The "Saudara" is a hybrid circuit consisting of a solid-state front end of famed British Racal design, with a vacuum tube audio system. The Racal design is nearly revolutionary in that it permits close-tolerance readout of frequencies by dialing desired megaHertz on one dial and kiloHertz on a second dial. Frequencies as close as every 5 kHz are read with ease. A small vernier trimmer permits fractional kHz readings to within 100 cycles.



\$55.00 U.S.

NASWA got first wind of this receiver via a Japanese member of NASWA visiting friends in Indonesia who had such a receiver. With little trouble, a local dealer provided a manufacturer's handbook and schematic. The receiver costs about \$35.00 U.S. equivalent - and the dealer said that he could deliver these receivers for that price plus \$8.00 air freight charge to America. One could expect to also pay a duty of about \$10.00 more before the U. S. Postal Service would deliver. So, for a price of less than \$55.00, this excellent receiver could be made available to American DXers.

The following is a consumer's report from Sessue Mikkomishi of Sasebo, Japan: "The 'Saudara' radio is in wooden cabinetry measuring approximately 40 cm wide, 20 cm tall, and 30 cm from front to back. The controls include on/off switch, volume control, tone control, MHz dial from 0-18, kHz dial from 0-995, fine tuning (trimmer), antenna tuner, noise limiter switch, BFO with selectable Upper/Lower Side Band and pitch control, crystal filtering of .5, 1, 2.5, and 5 kHz with crystal phasing control, S-meter, combination AF/RF gain control, separate IF gain control, dial light switch, crystal calibrator for 5, 10, 25, 50, 100, 500, and 1,000 kHz, battery/house current switch, and 3-position antenna selector switch.

"The manufacturer's specifications give a sensitivity reading of one-quarter microvolt for 6 db signal/noise. Images are non-existent. The noise limiter really works to knock off annoying lightning crackle and street ignition. There are provisions in the rear of the chassis to attach a noise blander as well as some other provisions in case the receiver should be used with a transmitter. The 'Saudara' receiver performs best on 31 meters and below.

"Outstanding reception was noted during initial use in Indonesia. There are many small low frequency stations below 4,000 kHz. Other prized catches from Japan include CFVP on 6,030 in Calgary, Alberta; Radio Tanzania Zanzibar on 3,339, Austrian Army Radio on 9,150; and Radio Ulan Bator, Mongolia on 6,383. It compares favorably with my HQ-180 and Drake SPR-4 - and, this astounds me!"

NASWA members who would like to have more information on this receiver are invited to send name, address, and 2 IRC's to Charlie Loudenboomer's home address in care of: A-P-R-I-L P-O-O-L. (Gotcha!) (Hi) Actually, we didn't believe anyone would be caught by this baloney. And anyway, Charlie's receiver runs rings around most other receivers. Why would he want another one? His was manufactured by Jan Mayen Islanders. Ed Shaw.

A VISIT TO MALAYSIA AND SINGAPORE

About the author. Bob Padula is an Australian, and member of NASWA for many years. He has devoted much time to the hobby, particularly in the ministrations of ARDXC, Australian Radio DX Club. Bob's experiences shared in the following story provide interesting and useful pieces of knowledge to fill out our own DX knowledge. His normal use receiver is a Marconi CR-100, about which we may have a description in a future FRENDX.

I recently spent two weeks on a "packaged tour" organized by QANTAS Airline, which is the one you Americans usually see advertised by the cuddly koala on the beach. Our destination...Singapore and Malaysia. If you will examine your atlas, you will see that the independent city/state of Singapore is just on the southern-east most point of Malaysia. Whilst not intending specifically to do any serious DXing away from home, I found that the proximity to Sumatran Indonesia just too tempting and soon invested in a 5-band model from the duty-free choices manufactured in Singapore - to the tune of about \$42.00 U.S. It should be interesting to see what the airwaves some 5,000 miles from my own home town would bring.

DXing from hotel rooms is not without its problems - as I'm sure many of you realize - due to the lack of suitable external antenna facility...and, particularly so when one is located on the 21st floor of a hotel such as the magnificent Mandarin in Singapore! Equally aggravating the situation were the shielding effects of the building due to the steel frame construction. And too, the multitudes of TV horizontal oscillators and other man made nuisance noises made listening a practical impossibility.

Despite these limitations, I was able to establish the overall reception patterns, and a handful of reports were sent out. I stayed at four different places; the Hilton in Kuala Lumpur, the Mandarin in Singapore, the recently opened Rasa Sayang at Penang, and at the government-run Rest House in Malacca. The last was most fascinating as it was the original Portuguese settlement in the 14th century, and Portuguese is still spoken in parts of the town. However, most of my listening was attempted in Penang, Kuala Lumpur and Singapore.

In South East Asia, as in most tropical areas, and particularly where radio coverage in mountainous regions is desirable, the effectiveness of the standard medium wave band deteriorates, especially during daylight hours. This, combined with the relatively high noise level associated with the almost continuous thunderstorm activity, precluded reliable MW reception into the "out-back" areas. For these reasons, extensive use is made of the 125 and 90 meter bands, and the broadcasting pattern in South East Asia reflects this situation admirably. Useful daytime signals are possible for distances up to 500 miles or so during daytime hours on these low bands, far greater than any comparably-powered medium wave transmitter would reach. Local broadcasting, however, seems to be edging closer and closer to the VHF-FM system in the Singapore area.



From each of the places at which I stayed, there was always useful reception in daylight hours of a number of Indonesian stations. From Penang and Kuala Lumpur, a variety of Sumatra RRI outlets were audible in the early afternoons, including Banda Atjeh on 4955, Padang 3960, Medan 4765//3420, Pakanbaru 5860, and Bukittinggi 4885. Toward 5 p.m. (or 0930 GMT) which was 2 hours before sunset, the bands really came to life! And, by 1130 GMT, the lower bands were virtually packed solid with Indonesians! It was not practicable to make more than a purely superficial check of these, due to the poor calibration of my portable which measured in megahertz only. Trying to pinpoint a particular frequency is not easy, to say the least!

From Kuala Lumpur, the 49 mb outlet of Padang on 6190 offered a superb signal between 0630-0700 GMT, and the nightly English news roundup from Yogyakarta on 2350 from 1130-1145 GMT was also of interest. A whole host of Indonesian stations between 3400-3900 were noted, many of which are in the "Radio Khusus Pemerintah Daerah Kabupaten" network, but I could not sort any of these out. (To be concluded next month)

A Triple Crown for NASWA

Radio Malaysia forms a complex worth three countries for NASWA's purposes. Not only does Malaysia itself count as a country, but the Radio Malaysia complex also broadcasts from the regional areas of Sarawak (pronounced Sir-RAH-wah) and Sabah (pronounced S'BAH) - both on the big island once known as Borneo. Borneo is shared by Indonesia's Kalimantan province and the state of Brunei, which is nestled snugly between Sarawak and Sabah on Borneo's west coast.

The Sarawak station opened on the 7th of June 1954 with one AM and one SW transmitter. There were no experienced engineers or broadcasters, and the station was not truly sophisticated until 1963 when another short wave station was added - making two networks. By mid-1971, a total of "four nets" were broadcasting from Kuching, the capital of Sarawak province.

The Sabah station began in 1952, broadcasting only news and special announcements. In 1955, regular programs were inaugurated on SW in English, Malay, and Chinese languages. The first station was of 2.5 KW. New 10KW transmitters were established in 1972 at Kota Kinabalu.

The three NASWA countries - all under Radio Malaysia - are enviable catches. There are currently six transmitters at Sarawak with future plans for twelve more by the end of 1976. On Sabah, there are three transmitters and plans for four more. Most of these will be of the 10 kilowatt size

The national network broadcasts in Bahasa Malaysian only and presents around-the-clock services for all its people. Entertainment comprises 63% of its programming. There are other networks: the Blue, Green, and Red - each for different languages on both shortwave and AM. The overseas service of Radio Malaysia at Kuala Lumpur operates on five short wave frequencies. The Voice of Malaysia, or "Suara Malaysia" is now in its eleventh year. Broadcasts are in four languages: English, Indonesian (closely resembling Malaysian); Thai and Chinese. Reception reports numbered nearly 82,000 in 1971 - mainly from the south east asia area, and many from the western hemisphere, including America



Each of the three NASWA countries have their own QSL cards, and QSL policy has been quite congenial in past years. Please consult your WRTM for frequencies to the three countries. Please take note, however, that Voice of Malaysia is also relayed from Sabah on 15295 kHz.

SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT: Late news arriving at SWC address establishes likelihood of another special broadcast being aired for NASWA. The rare Polish Pathfinder Station, in a letter to your editor, indicates willingness to establish a special broadcast on May Day, the 1st of May 1974 on tentative frequency of 6,850 kHz. Times are also tentative, but will likely be 2300 GMT (which is still 30 April in America), and also 0200 GMT and 0500 GMT. Program details are being firmed with Polish Pathfinders at present. More word in mid-month FS.

EARTH'S WINDOWS TO EXOTIC DX



Along with UFO's, and other strange phenomena, are there windows that let in the exotic DX while denying it to other areas?

Perhaps you have wondered, as I have, why certain DXers in certain areas consistently pull in the weak, rare stations, far surpassing the efforts of others who put in just as much time - and with equivalent equipment. Sure, it is true that a viable knowledge of where and when to tune, a smattering of linguistics, and experience all helps. It also is well to have an ear accustomed to understanding weak voices sometimes buried deep in the QRM and QRN.

However, I have been in this hobby long enough to realize there is more to it than just these attributes of the top DXers. At least, it seems true with AM DXers.

Recently, I have discovered there are certain areas of magnetic faults in this country - and others - where the Earth's magnetic field is distorted. It is in these areas that a much greater percentage of UFOs are sighted, and more than normal numbers of reports of unusual phenomena and parapsychical entities. I have noted almost all of the top DXers live in or near these areas of deviation.

During a stint of five solid years of twisting the dials and gnashing my teeth as a fisherman in the ECB area of DXing, I am willing to bet that the same premise I have noted for AM DXers is true for SWC DXers. Centers of magnetic deviation, or thick clusters of them, include much of the states of Nebraska, Illinois, Michigan, Ohio, West Virginia, Florida, southern California, and the Washington, D.C. area - among others. It seems logical, to this non-technical DXer, that areas where the Earth's magnetic crust is distorted have a pronounced effect on weak radio waves struggling in from afar. And, that DXers who live around these areas have a better than average chance to experience some of the more exciting DX. Perhaps they are doing so.


Maps are available for about 50¢ showing where magnetic disturbances are located in your area. Other detailed charts are also available to show the Earth's variations of magnetic flux lines. The Office of the Geological Survey, Reston, Virginia 22092 will provide you information where to obtain such maps. If you decide to try seeking exotic DX, try from the top of a high altitude area or near a large body of water in an area of magnetic deviation. Walter Breville.

An interesting observation, Walter. Perhaps you will like to examine more closely the layman's explanation of WWV's A-index in last month's FRENEX (Mar '74). We are already advised that propagation is affected in varying degrees by changes in the Earth's magnetic flux, seemingly related to what you are suggesting. Personally interested in your premise, I obtained maps locally for my own examination and the membership may be interested in seeing an example which seems to corroborate your suggestion. Many of you will remember reading of successful DX-peditions to Red Oak Mountain, Virginia where great DX was available. The cut out map above shows that Red Oak DX area is, indeed surrounded by surface magnetic distortion areas, evidently from ore deposits or other sub-surface phenomena. (ed)



Many tnx for the pix, Jer, and hope the next I'll het is a girl. I'm partial to 'em. Ed.




NASWA TECHNICAL REVIEW: The KILBURG GEOCHRON - Jim Hagen
An Automatic Darkness Pattern Chart



Full enjoyment of any hobby always requires some investment, and the SWL hobby is no exception. The piece of equipment featured in this article is, without doubt an expensive frivolity for most DXers. But, NASWA is a large club with several members who might like this gadget. No doubt there will be some who buy this piece of equipment - as did Jim Hagen.



Kilburg - Geochron Corporation is the California manufacturer of this mechanical, electrically operated world time piece that displays a graphic chart of the world, and illuminates which areas are in daylight or night time. The chart sells for approximately \$550.00.



Geochron is a cabinet approximately 2x3 feet and 5 inches deep, the surface of which has a glass front covering over a colorful world map film on rollers which moves imperceptibly from left to right as day progresses. The bell shaped curve depicting daylight and darkness terminators remains in place, but changes shape throughout the months to compensate for changes in lengths of day and night as seasons go by.

Features of the Geochron wall chart show time anywhere in the world - even indicating those countries which differ from GMT by fractions of an hour, i.e. India (GMT plus 30 minutes). The date and positioned noon-day sun are also depicted.

Mechanical adjustment to the chart is simply accomplished by two or three knobs. The illumination from behind is provided by fluorescent bulbs. The cabinet is a beautiful addition to any office, den, or airport terminal lounge....but, it is ideal for the discriminating DXer for whom location of day/night terminators for any hour is of vital importance. BARLOW WADLEY

The Barlow-Wadley XCR-30 is an interesting attempt to build a non-traditional SW portable that really works. It is made in South Africa of all places. The receiver provides continuous coverage from 500 kHz to 30 MHz using the harmonics of a 1 MHz quartz xtal to control a VFO tuner. Tuning is accomplished as a composite of two dials; the MHz dial is calibrated from 0 to 30 MHz and it selects the 1000 kHz wide band which is in turn tuned by a second dial within 10 kHz visual accuracy. The receiver has an S-

meter, antenna trimmer, AF gain, and choice of AM or SSB with clarifier control. Other features are external antenna and ground sockets, earphone socket, and external power socket. All this is packed into a conventional sized, but heavy, nine pound portable. In use, tuning is easy. The dial can be read to within 5 kHz. Selectivity is 6 kHz on AM which is adequate, and 3 kHz on SSB. Drift is not detectable. Sensitivity with the whip antenna is good, but for good DX you will need an external antenna. I have compared the XCR with my SPR-4. The use of the outdoor antenna tends to overload the XCR-30, but a few feet of insulated wire thrown on the floor gives signal strengths nearly as good as the SPR-4 with an outdoor antenna. Unfortunately, there are some serious drawbacks. One look inside the cabinet will make you sick. If they had sent parts in a sack, I might have constructed a better circuit board. Blobs of solder on the circuit board and loose in the cabinet do not give you a good feeling. I understand many XCRs never worked well or gave up. The new series being sold by GILFER presumably has corrected the problems of the earlier models. Undoubtedly, there will be a residue of prejudice from a bad beginning. One problem I found includes the zero-set control on the kHz dial...poorly done and sensitive to touch. The SCR is also prone to show spurs like the SPR-4, and careful tuning is required to attenuate them. One may not want the XCR-30 as his primary receiver, but it makes a great portable, a second receiver for general coverage, or for use on DXpeditions. Cost is currently about \$255.00. We are given to understand that the XCR design is one which may show up in other receivers before long.

Upon the 10th Anniversary of ANARC

A welcome is extended to new associate club Transworld DX Club, 606 Saint Andrews Road, West Vancouver, Brit. Columbia V7S 1V4. President John Chapman will serve as a non-voting ANARC representative for the club with 11 members. They are SWC only, publish "DX World" monthly by mimeograph.

For the summer European traveler, news comes of a planned European DX Camp for 27 July through 18 August near Lake Millstätter in Austria. Planned, is a DX shack with twelve receiving posts and antenna outlets, with communications receivers of all kinds. About 40 DXers can be accommodated. 

PEACE SHIP SILENT, BROKE !

After operating successfully for a half-year, Abie Nathan's pet project, the clandestine floating station, "Voice of Peace", fell silent last November.

According to both Israeli monitor Offer Barth of the IBA and Paul Montgomery of The New York Times (see insert, next page), the bankrupt and barnacled former pirate ship is docked, mute, at Marseilles, France, while Nathan once again tours the West to try and drum up funds for the peacemaking pop voice.

Others are pitching in, as well.

Dallas' Corky Webb tells us that two attractive young ladies, Carol Witter and Deborah Earling, have started a "Shalom Fund" for the benefit of Lone Star State sympathizers.

Just before it went off the air it reportedly made itself widely heard. According to radio station WQRK, Norfolk, Virginia, the station was active throughout the October war. Notwithstanding other reports suggesting the Israeli Navy had silenced the Voice of Peace at the outbreak of the hostilities, WQRK News went on to report:

"A voice on the radio must have startled some Arabs and Israelis. It said, "If you have a gun in your hand, don't pull the trigger. If you control a weapon, don't use it. The man you will kill will leave a sorrowing wife, mother and children."

Speaking in all the languages of the Middle East, the appeal was repeated over and over again during the October war. The source was the Voice of Peace, on Abie Nathan's Peace Ship floating off Tel Aviv when the recent war broke out.

Despite warnings from the Israeli Navy, the Peace Ship reacted to the war news by sailing to a spot in the thick of the fighting 30 miles from the Suez Canal and increased its broadcasts from 14 to 24 hours a day.

After the cease fire the ship sailed first to Beirut and then back to Tel Aviv as a peace gesture.

Abie Nathan, the Israeli pacifist who started the Peace Ship several months ago, has vowed to continue his floating radio station until lasting peace comes to the Middle East."

NATHAN RECALLS PEACE-SHIP DAYS

**Calls Them 'Beautiful'—Asks
More Funds to Continue**

Able Nathan sat in the commercial hotel of Times Square and smiled as he remembered the brief career of his Peace Ship in the Middle East last year.

"When I look back, it was a beautiful thing," said the ebullient advocate of love and moderation, talking of the floating radio station that broadcast to Arabs and Jews last summer and fall, and through the Yom Kippur war.

"Every night at sunset we had the classical hour," Mr. Nathan said, laughing softly at the thought of it. "We'd tell everybody to stop what they were doing and look at the sun and the sky and the sea. It's the greatest show on earth, and it's all free."

Friday nights there was rock

music for the young people on both sides of the conflict.

"We found out the Arab kids and the Jewish kids like the same music," Mr. Nathan said. "We got requests for the 'Moody Blues' from Cairo, and we got requests for the 'Moody Blues' from Tel Aviv."

Seeking Funds Again
Mr. Nathan, one of the most quixotic figures produced by 25 years of Arab-Israeli fighting, is back in the United States seeking contributions to keep the Peace Ship afloat and broadcasting. He spent nearly four years here painstakingly raising the \$300,000 to refit the 180-foot coastal freighter for broadcasting, and now fears he might have to give up his dream.

"It's incredible how little we need for what we can accomplish," he said. "For \$120,000, we can keep the ship running for a year. That's less than 1 percent of the cost of one fighter plane."

Mr. Nathan is a 46-year-old Israeli who was a fighter pilot for the British in World War II, then had careers in Israel as a restaurateur and art dealer before turning to peace. He first won attention in 1966 by flying alone in an ancient biplane from Israel to Egypt to try to convince the leaders of the two countries to sit down and talk.

Devoted to the Cause

Since then, he has devoted all of his time and much of his fortune to the cause. His view is that hard-liners on both sides of the conflict have been allowed to put forth their views on war and confrontation without permitting attempts at mutual understanding.

Broadcasting in Israel and in the Arab countries is controlled by the Governments, and Mr. Nathan regards the stations as nothing more than instruments for propaganda—what he calls "screeching and screaming." His white-painted radio ship is an attempt to provide a voice of moderation for both sides, encouraging dialogue instead of one-sided speeches.

It took Mr. Nathan four years to raise the money here and in Europe. Volunteers from peace groups helped, but often he found himself working alone in what seemed a hopeless cause. It took a hunger strike by him to attract attention and raise the last \$48,000 needed to send the ship on its way.

Broadcast 3,000 Hours

The Peace Ship, with a volunteer crew, began broadcasting in the Mediterranean last May. Mr. Nathan estimates that its 50,000-watt transmitter can reach 30 million Arabs and Jews. The station was on the air for 3,000 hours before the money ran out last November.

The station pirated news from the international services and stations like the B.B.C. for re-broadcast with interspersed comments. During the war, Mr. Nathan said, he would try to lessen the tension by broadcasting funny items or news about Elizabeth Taylor or Princess Anne instead of concentrating on the fighting.

There was a lot of music. Once, the station broadcast 48 straight hours of the Beatles, followed by 24 hours of Israeli music and 24 hours of Arab music.

Mr. Nathan remembered one time when the Peace Ship was standing off Port Said during the mammoth tank battles in the Sinai Desert.

"Out there in the darkness you could see the flashes of the guns," he said, "and we were playing music and telling the people that the generals and the politicians were just finding excuses to use their war machines."

OIL: IRAQI KURDS REBEL, TAKE TO AIRWAVES

The New York Times, in a dispatch from Beirut on March 14, reports that the on-again, off-again 13-year war between Kurdish nationalists, led by General Mustafa al-Berzani, and the Baghdad authorities had flared up again into serious fighting.

The General's party, the Kurdish Democratic Party, which claims to speak for Iraq's 1½-2 million Kurds, has once again taken to the airwaves via a clandestine radio transmitter to air its point of view and claims to military successes at Dahuk and Zakho, near the Turkish border. As the Party's daily newspaper in Baghdad, Al-Taakhi, had been shut down March 12, the clandestine radio, "Voice of Kurdistan", has become the principal source of news of the conflict.

Although a similar Kurdish nationalist revolt in Iran led to the establishment of the now-defunct "Mahabad Republic", a pro-Soviet socialist state, the revolt in Iraq is believed to be, for reasons of convenience, somewhat pro-Western. One source even suggests

General al-Berzani's movement is supported in part by the CIA.

Although no details of the present schedule are available, the station is no stranger to radio monitors.

According to information from Don Jensen and Bill Matthews, the station broadcast in the 1960's from a cave located somewhere in northern Iraq or in Iran. Low-powered, it broadcast on 11695 kHz, the same channel used by the Sofia-based pro-Communist clandestine beamed to Iran, "Radio Courier of Iran" ("Radyo-ye Peyk-e Iran"). Unfortunately, while "Radio Courier of Iran" could be widely heard throughout the world, the little Kurdish operation was inaudible outside the Kurdish-held areas.

The rebellion is being watched closely throughout the West, as the Kurdish area of Iraq contains large reserves of oil, plus an operational network of pipelines and wells. Should these transfer from the pro-Soviet Baghdad administration to a Kurdish Republic friendly to the West and neighboring Iran, the balance of power among the oil producing countries would be more inclined to lean in a direction favorable to the United States.

USSR HINTS RADIO MOSCOW "JAMMER" BY U.S. HAMMERS !!

In what may be the most unusual complaint concerning pirate broadcasting yet, Radio Moscow, in its English-language service to Eastern North America, charged on February 22, 1974, that unusual interference had been encountered by it on its North American channels. The station alleged, "Unidentified shortwave transmitters in the United States are filling the air with nonsensical statements and obscenities. Such interference appeared accidental at first, but its regularity now suggests that there may be another interpretation of it. Could it be that some influential forces are behind those shortwave transmitters?"

Earlier in February Radio Moscow, in its new DX Program to North America, spoke of complaints from listeners of amateur interference in the 41 meter band and suggesting the Soviets shift their transmitters to a more suitable band. Radio Moscow publicly refused.

Confused? So were we, as despite our close monitoring of that band throughout the 2000-0530 period no such activity was ever encountered.

We checked with an official of the Amateur Radio Relay League in Connecticut, Mr. Bob White; he hadn't heard of any such broadcasts personally or from any of their tens of thousands of active members.

We checked with other short-wave monitoring sources. Again, negative.

Finally, we checked with an official source in an "influential" organization; he was genuinely surprised and indicated he had no knowledge of the alleged broadcasts.

Given all this, why would the Kremlin make such charges?

First, it's possible that overly-enthusiastic amateur radio operators have falsely reported to Moscow the presence of such interference. But the Soviets are in a position to check the veracity of these allegations before making them public.

The timing suggests a more likely reason.

Since the expulsion of Alexandr Solzhenitsyn, Soviet propaganda, at home and abroad, has tended to point out circumstances in which the United States has supposedly been more anti-libertarian than the Soviet government, e.g. the Kent State shootings, the Black Panther raids, the Angela Davis affair, and the supposed post-WW II jailing of "thousands" of members of the Communist Party, U.S.A. This last charge was checked out by scholars, who found that two -- not "thousands" -- Party members had been jailed around that time.

All this reassures the Faithful that while Sovietism in the U.S.S.R. may have had its blemishes, they are no worse than those of the U.S. -- at least the U.S. as described by Moscow.

Similarly, although several hams are known to have preferred rag-chewing on Radio Moscow's 41 meter band channels, this practice pretty much disappeared by the 1960's, thanks to pressure from the major amateur radio organizations. By contrast, the Soviet

Union is known to have "several thousand" jamming transmitters on its soil. Despite attempts to disguise these as defective "Majak" transmissions, their actual aim is obvious ...and probably embarrassing.

We welcome more data on Radio Moscow's charges. They are serious and suggest a basic shift in American values from freedom of the airwaves to the silencing of foreign critics. But with the facts we can come up with it appears this is simply a phony "you, too" Cold War tactic.

RADIO FREE SCOTLAND: 6248 kHz

Australia's whirlwind physics professor, John Campbell, has unearthed yet another station with the rubric, "Radio Free Scotland". Whether this one is related to earlier operations of the same name is not known.

Noted first on February 3, 1974, and again on March 1 and March 3, Radio Free Scotland broadcasts nationalist messages and (sometimes nonstop) bagpipe music. It called for the cessation of Scottish petroleum exports -- particularly offshore -- and also opposed any legislation which would implement the Kilbrandon Report, which recommends separate parliaments for Scotland and Wales. Commentary is described as not "too literate" and "rough".

Programming is brief and apparently irregular. In addition to the traced low-power shortwave outlet, the station announces a parallel channel somewhere in the FM-VHF band. The site has not been determined, but the alleged use of VHF suggests it is somewhere in Scotland proper.

Radio Free Scotland has signed off with "Scotland the Brave" and "Scots wha' hae". Although it is a low-powered station, its choice of broadcasting times and channel make it a possible -- but hardly probable -- DX catch in North America. So far, it has been traced as follows:

ANGOLA

According to reliable news reports, the Portuguese military position in its African colonies is shaky and getting worse. Entire large areas are totally lost to their control, while much of the remainder is threatened by African nationalist forces.

As a result, the Portuguese Army has recently been racked with dissent and even mutiny. Portugal's most powerful and popular Army commander has been forced to step down as a result of his publicly adopting a dovish stand.

Clandestine Bulletin has brought you the complete story on the Guinean and Mozambique revolutionary radio operations. Now we add to that Angola. The material from these operations, as well as that from official Portuguese operations, should help monitors better understand the situation in the Portuguese African colonies.

VOICE OF FIGHTING ANGOLA ("A Voz de Angola Combatente"): This is the program of the Moscow-oriented "Popular Liberation Movement of Angola" (MPLA). It broadcasts daily in French, Portuguese and Angolan vernaculars via the facilities of Radio Zambia and RTV Congolaise, the latter which began operation before 1967.

S/off: Officer shouting slogans, troops repeating back. S/on anthem is an orchestral march, while at s/off it is simply a choral anthem without instrumental accompaniment. VOICE OF FREE ANGOLA ("A Voz de Angola Livre"): Since 1967 this operation of the Angolan Provisional Government-in-Exile (GRAE) has broadcast via the facilities of the Voice of Zaire and Radio Lubumbashi. It signs on with an anthem, then drums, and signs off with a martial anthem. The current schedule is, in Portuguese, French, and Angolan vernaculars: 1800-1820 Mon & Fri 692, 836, 4880, 7115, 9770, 15245 kHz & 90.0 MHz VHF, all via the Voice of Zaire, plus 11865v kHz via R. Lubumbashi

These are all easy catches in North America. Best Bets: try 15190 kHz for Voice of Fighting Angola and either 11865v or 15245 kHz for Voice of Free Angola.

Signs on around 0930, but s/off time not known, as much QRM from Fides and Bucaramanga during evenings. Puerto Yguazu is located at the meeting point of Argentina, Brazil and Paraguay.

BOLIVIA 4548, R.Universo, La Paz, noted here 2/25 till 0309 s/off. Also hrd two separate occasions since. Back on 5021 on 3/5/74.....4845, R.Fides, now //6155 from 1030 s/on; previously evenings only.....4885 R.Sararenda, only possible Sun mornings around 1100 when QRM not prohibitive.....5045 LV del Altiplano, hrd only twice during recent weeks on 2/17 and 3/4.....Latest state of Bolivian stations hrd in Paraguay is therefore as follows:

3440 R. 37 de Diciembre; 4276 R.Riberalta (R.Paitambi seems to have moved);
4424 R. Tupiza (ex 4420); 4465 R.Melina (Santa Ana)(ex 4470); 4548 & 5021 Radio Universo (La Paz); 4600 Guayamerin (Presumed); 4700 R.San Miguel; 4728 Radio Abarea; 4795 Emisora Nueva America; 4824 R.Grigota; 4845 R.Fides; 4875 La Cruz del Sur; 4885 R. In addition, there are four other unidentified stations, viz. 4495(possibly ex4517) which signs off around 0300; 4775 and 5125, as mentioned in January FrenDX, and 5995, heard 3/5 w/broadcast in UNID lang from around 1035.

CHILE 6150 R.Cooperativa? Heard weakly most mornings, noted 2/25 at 1008 s/on after "Land of Hope and Glory" IS (same as 9690). However, ID at s/on was "Radio 76", and several programs have been observed beginning w/"En asociaci3n con Radio Cooperativa de Santiago presentames...." which suggests a regional outlet. The station on 9620 has always been heard announcing "Radio Cooperativa", but it is possible that other IDs are in use.

PERU 5816, LV del Altiplano, regular at 1000 s/on and again most nights past 0300.

URUGUAY Latest observations concerning CX stations are as follows:

4945, LV de Artigas, as per January FRENDX.....6155 R.Carve, first noted 2/14 around 1100 w/tx trouble. Has now sorted out the problem, on air almost daily from before 1015 1600 approx. European QRM prevents checks as to whether stn returns later in the day.9620 SODRE, this outlet still low powered, but //15273 much better. Stn fades in shortly after 1000, continues past 0030 when QRM makes further listening impossible.11735 This channel normally covered by R. Clube de Goiana(Brazil) and one very loud het. Occasionally, however, a few words of Spanish emerge from below, and are thought to emanate from R. Oriental..... 11835 R.El Espectador, good sig mornings to night and the strongest signal of all Uruguayan stations.

Our thanks to Tony for another LA report. He notes he will be unable to supply a report for the next FRENDX, but will be back after that.

WHAT DO YOU DO WITH LOG REPORT? We were rather surprised that fewer than 20 people requested the copy of the Feb LR A&B sections that did not appear in FRENDX due to arriving late. LR is intended to be a useful reference list, but few seem to use it that way. * LAOS Shortwave broadcasting activity from the Kingdom of Laos is limited, assuming that the transmitter site of Voix de la Pathet Lao is in North Viet Nam. RDF Nationale Lao operating from Vientiane has proven to be an extremely tough catch. The last known reception (to ye ed) of RDF Nationale Lao in the US was in 1972 by a Midwest DX'er, and in fact, monitors in SEA have had difficulty detecting the 6130 KHz outlet from Vientiane. It is always worth the effort to give 6130 a whirl around local sunrise and hope for a break in all the QRM. Our chances for logging Laos have increased over the last few months since the appearance of a new quasi-clandestine voice possibly located in Laos, the Voice of Peaceful Laos. VPL has been noted by the BBCMS relaying RNL news occasionally. The new station is scheduled from 0500-1400, 2300-0200 in Laotian, and from 1430-1500 in Vietnamese. Watch "Clandestine Bulletin" for more information on this station in the future.

* BURMA mothered some of the world's oldest oil fields in the 1930's. In 1970, the Burmese started driving on the right hand side of the road. But now Burma is heard not only on the high side of the 60 meter band and on the low side of 60 meters, but also in the middle of the tropical 60 meter band. The Burma Broadcasting Service operates on 5040 KHz and may be heard during local morning hours with relatively good signals. Excellent reception often occurs during periods of favorable Asian reception. Burmese is slated from 0930-1430 and English from 1430-1600 - all on 5040. Local languages are carried on 4725 KHz from 1100-1245, but signals on this frequency do not seem as strong as 5040, on the East Coast at least. Bruce Churchill, Calif., recently detected BBS operating on the new 60 meter band freq of 4810. This new outlet is // to 5040, the same schedule is assumed to apply.

* CAMBODIA International broadcasting activity from the Khmer Republic originates near the airport on the outskirts of refugee packed Phnom-Penh. Radiodiffusion Nationale Khmère has been well heard on medium wave as well as on shortwave throughout South East Asia. RDF Nationale Khmère has in fact been well heard in various parts of the world, including the US. Recently, ECNA, NASWA members have reported hearing RDF Nationale Khmère at around 1115, or so, on 4908. WCNA listeners have also noted reception at fair to good levels. Check 4908 KHz around local sunrise for best reception of Phnom-Penh. It is not entirely impossible to hear Phnom-Penh around sunset either. Several ECNA and Midwest DXers have noted the 4908 outlet around 2300...2330 or so. You might give a listen on 6092 during local mornings near sunrise too. Phnom-Penh has used this freq in the past and it may bare some checking every now and then. Watch out for VLI-6, Sydney, Australia, on 6090 though. Both Asian and western program material is aired and a number of languages are used including English, French, Vietnamese, Chinese, and Khmer. English has been noted by some monitors at 1230.

* LUXEMBOURG Radio Luxembourg is the international voice of the tiny industrialized European nation of Luxembourg. French is aired around the clock on 15350. This frequency may at times suffer from a broad band jammer which may be found in that neck of the woods. German is scheduled from 0515-0000 on 6090 KHz but is sometimes heard as early as 0400 sign on. English is slated from 0000-0230 also on 6090 which has proven to be a good frequency. Programming often consists of pop music and hard rock.

* GRENADA (WINDWARD ISLANDS) The newly independent Caribbean country of Grenada broadcasts to her neighbors and the world on a number of shortwave frequencies over Radio Grenada. Tune to 15105 around 2100 to hear Radio Grenada. Sign off time varies, and Radio Grenada has been noted running as late as 2230 on 15105. The frequency of 5015 may be heard around 2215 til sign off 0000 variable. After 5015 closes down, retune to 3300. This 90 meter band outlet runs as late as 0245, all with a variable sign off time. Signals are often S-9 plus and programming often contains pop music and, when in season, cricket matches may be heard. The announcers for Radio Grenada are British accented and in addition, the station relays the BBC news. Therefore, don't think that you are listening to the BBC when indeed you have a very fine catch from the warm, tropical island nation of Grenada.

LISTENER'S NOTEBOOK SPECIAL PROJECT - NUMBER III ... DX PROGRAMS

One of the easiest ways, and an enjoyable and entertaining way additionally, to eavesdrop on the current happenings of the shortwave listening hobby is to tune to a DX Program broadcast by many shortwave stations. Program material of course varies from station to station. Some stations air only DX tips while other stations are more entertaining and broadcast not only tips but also interval signals of various other shortwave stations, discussions, interviews, technical courses, and musical selections. However, some stations have programs which they call a DX Pgm but proves to be merely a mailbag show or is ham radio oriented. Material for portions of some DX Programs comes from some club bulletins. For instance, NASWA member Glenn Hauser aires the monthly North American - Report on the Radio Nederland DX Juke Box and often uses FRENDX and SPEEDX as references. Also NASWA member Gregg Calkin does the Asian Report over the Radio Nederland DX Juke Box. Radio Australia often aires tips provided by the Australian Radio DX Club which is headed by Bob Padula, who, by the way, is also a NASWA member. The aim of "Listener's Notebook-Special Project Number III" is to help you easily find that DX program you want to hear. The frequencies have not been listed due to the constantly changing schedules of various broadcasters. For easy frequency reference, please refer to "English Language Programs to North America", FRENDX - December, 1973; "Log Report", "Listener's Notebook", the WRTH, and of course - to various DX Programs. A special thanks goes out to Charley Wootten, Mike Ross, and Larry Talbot for their monitoring for this special project. Happy Listening!






