


Have you been listening to short wave lately? I mean really listening? Sure, sure, you've been working hard trying to log Radio Cordac and the Voice of the Great Pumpkin. But how about all the great programs you're missing out on?

Lately I've been doing a lot of short wave program listening and already have a list of regular favorites which I try and catch. Here they are:

Let's Speak Quechua: Mondays, Thursdays and Saturdays from 0045 to 0457 on Radio Jollysuyo. Light humor, typical of the Andean areas of Peru is sprinkled throughout the program making it a real delight for neophyte and expert alike!

Back and Forth: Newly added to the Radio Amsterdam schedule, B-F is a fast-moving debate between two proponents with opposing views on a timely issue. The verbal combat takes place as the debaters simultaneously play ping-pong in the studio. Wednesdays at 1600. First two games out of three wins.

The Edgar Rice Burroughs Dinner Theater: Aired Sunday nights (local) over Radio Moneymaker, a new, high-powered European pirate. This 14 thousand week-series will eventually dramatize all of ERB's works. A cast of two former Broadway stars handle all the parts and sound effects before a live audience in a Dr. Pepper garden outside the station's studios.

Ralph and Ron's Radio Repartee: Two bright, contemporary comedians handle this weekly half hour Fridays at 0200 over Radio Radio. Ralph and Ron look at the lighter side of the week's news, adding their own witty comments. Regular features include interpretive readings from selected international phone books, crossword puzzles and 4 moves in Ron and Ralph's ten-thousand square foot Monopoly game.

Papa Paul's Pop Party: The international pop music program. The music is based on a weekly survey of key radio stations throughout the world which results in a Top 222. Unfortunately, 15 minutes is not quite adequate to handle playing 222 recordings so the show is running a bit behind what may be number one in the listener's area. Right now on PPPP it's "Stardust."

Scientifically Speaking: Features Professor Leon Shortwig of the Manchester Academy of Lesser Known Subjects. The professor provides capsule courses in chemical engineering, computer design and application and so on. Thanks to this program I sunk an oil well in my back yard using common everyday materials and 14 hours of spare time after work on Tuesday nights.

Great Literature of the Subandis: Translated and interpreted by Irma Londondo, an expert on these Southeastern African people and their culture. The program is interspersed with the music of the area which features the mo-mo, a flute-like stringed device played with the left hand and right foot. Over Radio Zilch, Tuesdays at 1230.

Concerts in Miniature: The Berne Symphony Orchestra and Golden Coin Glee Club play and sing sixty second versions of the great masters while surrounded by great paintings of a matching period. The music is a bit fast but the pictures are pretty.

Lottie Bellweather, Lottie Bellweather: The continuing story of a young maid serving the household of Sir Anthony Greatcoat, formerly a first lt. in the NW Pakistani mounted Police and Tootsie Roll pitching club. Lottie is continually getting herself into at least temperate water. In the last episode Lottie and visiting cousin Henrietta are caught with their hands in Sir Anthony's private Tootsie Roll Jar.

As you can see, and hear if you will, there are all kinds of fascinating programs waiting to be enjoyed on short wave. Got to go. Almost time for High Adventure, this week featuring Martin J. Thornbitz who's going to tell about ascending the top of hotse I in a Rickshaw!

THE NASWA COUNTRY LIST

Recently, American Short Wave Listener's Club (ASWLC) announced that it will use the European DX Council (ARDX) country list as the standard for its awards program. Earlier, SPEEDX took similar action. There have been published statements in other clubs that imply there is a movement underway to get all clubs to use the EDXC list.

NASWA has it's own country list, adopted many years ago and kept current by a special NASWA committee. There is no thought being given to the adoption of the EDXC or any other country list by NASWA.

We recognize the attraction of having one universal country list. There have been many such attempts in the past, including two efforts by Association of North American Radio Clubs (ANARC). For a number of years the NASWA country list committee has informally worked with certain members of other U.S. clubs in an attempt to come to a suitable agreement for a jointly administered list based on the NASWA model. These efforts came to naught.

As attractive as the universal list proposition is, it is not so attractive as to cause the adoption of a country list that is less suitable than our present list. It should be recognized that no country list is ideal. There are some inherent problems in any list because of geographical, political, and hobby traditional factors that cannot be resolved. NASWA's list seems to have found workable solutions, compromises to be sure, to the worst of the problems.

The EDXC list, for example, by an adherence to political factors, which as we all know, frequently change, is divided into two sections, Existing Radio Countries and Former Radio Countries. If one hears a station before a certain date a certain country may be counted; after a certain date it may not. An Existing Radio Country may be counted today, but not tomorrow, if, for example a political change occurred last night. The preamble to the NASWA Country List explains these sorts of problems in greater specifics.

Additionally, the EDXC list, for example, considers the Soviet Union as one single radio country, since it is that politically. Yet from a radio reception standpoint, it is clear that there is little practical justification for considering reception of Khabarovsk to be no different from that of Kiev. When it comes to the U.S.A., the political rule goes out the window and Alaska counts separately. The list is different, and any group is entitled to chose it as a standard, as ASWLC and SPEEDX have done.

For the specific purposes of NASWA, an all SWBC club, it does not seem an improvement on the existing list. The NASWA 1976 Country List has been announced as being available from HQ for a .13¢ stamp, and the list has been included in all copies of "DXing According to NASWA" sold to date.



THERE IS A FROG IN YOUR FUTURE

Additional user reports on the Yaesu-Musen FRG-7 general coverage communications receiver

Compiled from independent reports by Jim Ronda, Youngstown OH, and Ed Insinger, North Plainfield, NJ

In the past year or so, three manufacturers have marketed new general coverage solid state receivers utilizing the Wadley loop circuit. The Drake SSR-1, the Kenwood QR-66 and the Yaesu-Musen FRG-7 all have the Wadley loop design in common. However, beyond that point of departure, all three receivers are quite different. This review will focus on the FRG-7 (now affectionately known as the Frog) and compares the Yaesu product with written comments made by others on the SSR-1 and QR-666. The Frog will also be compared with a four year old, but recently re-tubed Drake SW4-A during 30 hours of listening by Jim Ronda. Both receivers used a 65 foot indoor (attic strung) single-wire antenna, various home brew tuners, and Telex CS-1210 headphones.

Stability: The FRG-7 is a very stable receiver. Its solid state design makes for no warm-up drift. A one hour test with WWV showed no audible drift.-Jim

A minimal amount of drift is noticeable upon immediate use of the receiver after turning the power on. Fine tuning of the kHz control eliminates this with no difficulty. Optimum performance occurs after a 30 minute warmup when the greatest amount of drift one can experience is specified at ± 500 Hz.-Ed

Sensitivity: I tested the FRG-7 against the SW4-A and a Gilfer A-20 preselector, and found that the FRG-7 without the A-20 was just as or more sensitive than the SW4-A with the preselector. In more than 30 hours of listening with the Frog, I have found it to be a very sensitive receiver. The specifications claim sensitivity to be better than 2 μ V at S/N of 10 dB. Those numbers aside, my ears tell me this is a "hot" receiver.-Jim

The ability to surface a weak signal amidst a myriad of noises and uncontrollable atmospheric conditions is present in the FRG-7. Noise problems begin within a receiver itself; the FRG-7 is ultra-quiet from within. I cannot detect a trace of "hiss" from transistor operation. A husky power transformer provides hum-free audio. The generous S-meter dances and leaps along the active SW bands, while detecting weak signals with loud but visible readings. Sensitivity on AM is listed as better than 2 μ V at S/N of 10 dB on SSB better than 0.7 μ V at the same S/N. The AGC circuit eliminates extremes in signal strength caused by fading.-Ed

Selectivity: The ARRL Radio Handbook defines selectivity as "the ability to discriminate against signals of frequencies differing from that of the desired signal." At this task the Frog does an adequate job. My feeling is that the FRG vs SW4-A matchup, the Drake comes out slightly ahead. However, the Frog is surely up to the standards of a genuine communications receiver.-Jim

The FRG-7 has the ability to detect interference laden SW stations. With the use of the tone control, I have been able to separate two stations operating extremely close together. For example, I have been successful at separating RHC on 11930 from TWR on 11925 in the 0120 time slot. Cuba operates at 50 kW while the TWR booms in at 250 kW. Selectivity is enhanced by the use of a ceramic filter in the 455 kHz IF circuits. Specifications list the dial calibration accuracy at 10 kHz throughout the frequency coverage. This level of accuracy is both correct and modest. With the addition of the "dial set", the main tuning dial can be calibrated on any band with a time signal, strong station, or crystal calibrator. Due to the ultrafine hairline, the accuracy can be read to greater than 5 kHz on any frequency range.-Ed

The Frog obviously cannot duplicate the 1 kHz readout of the SW4-A or similar 500 kHz segment Drake receiver. However, I can usually read the dial to about 2 kHz. Calibration and alignment have been checked repeatedly against WWV/CHU/VNG/YTVO and the FRG has always been right on the nose.-Jim

Audio Quality: Both the FRG-7 and the SW4-A were tuned to one station and then monitored with Telex phones of the correct impedance. The audio quality of both was good with the Drake sounding a bit sharper. -Jim

Front Panel Layout: The front panel contains many useful controls deserving careful study

Attenuator: A three position sensitivity switch

Tone: A three position audio response switch providing variable selectivity

Mode: A four position control to choose USB/CW, LSB, AM, or AM/ANL (which reduces the level of impulse-type noise)

Record: A 1/8" phone jack output that maintains a constant level regardless of the volume control level

Preselector: Contains an ingenious pilot light arrangement which provides peak illumination according to frequencies chosen on the band switch. (This arrangement reminds me of the old Hammarlund "masking" design effective in reducing error in reading frequencies.)

Lock: Another new feature which visually provides "sides" on each MHz setting. This enables one to accurately center tune each MHz segment, virtually eliminating incorrect settings. Precise adjustment of the MHz dial turns off the lock light emitting diode. This tells the operator he or she has locked the oscillator on the frequency desired.

Dial set: A mechanical adjustment of the kHz hairline setting to compensate for dial inaccuracy.-Ed

The front panel layout is generally good, except for the following: The kHz marker line (thin and white) can be very hard to read against the black dial face. Also, because of the size and placement of the kHz dial on the FRG, there can be some parallax problems in reading frequencies. The S-meter is partially obscured by cabinet overhang. Jim

Rear Panel Layout: The rear panel reflects thoughtful design as well. One immediately notices a neat AC cord holder for wrapping the cord around when not in use. A receptacle is also provided for connection to a 12 VDC (negative ground) source. In addition, a very neat battery pack is accessible from the rear panel by simply loosening four snap-lock fasteners. The battery pack then slides outward, providing access to four sets of battery holders for 8 "D" size cells. Antenna connections can be made to the built-in SO-259 connector or the clever press antenna connectors. By simply pushing these connectors inward, an opening occurs to accept a single wire. The connector springs back, clamping the wire tightly against itself, making a quick mechanical contact easily removed or changed.-Ed

Physical Layout: The light gray cabinet is accentuated by a deep gray front panel and a black dial window inset. A handle is built into the right side of the receiver, along with four feet on the left side to stand the receiver on end for mobile use. The entire receiver is inclined, providing easier reading of controls and settings. It weighs approximately 16 pounds and measures 13½" wide by 6½" high and 11½" deep.

All three tuning controls (MHz, kHz, and preselect) are revolving gear-driven drums. The MHz control has "step" markings from 1 to 10 and 11 to 30 MHz. The kHz control scale is calibrated from 0 to 1000 kHz (with a 50 kHz overlap on each tuning extremity).-Ed

Tone Controls, Attenuator, and ANL Functions: These functions make the Frog stand out as a real bargain and a genuine communications receiver. The tone control alters the audio response of the receiver, doing wonders on the noise-ridden tropical bands. The ANL will be welcomed by all townhouse and apartment dwellers who are plagued by stray RF noise pollution.-Jim

Instruction Book: Yaesu-Musen needs to hire some talented writers! The instruction book is skimpy and assumes previous experience with communications receivers of the Wadley-loop design. This is especially true in the instructions on operation and function of the LED MHz lock light. Understanding how this light works and what it means is critical to the proper operation of the receiver, yet information on the lock light is buried in one obscure sentence.-Jim

Conclusions: Larry Magne once described the Drake SW4-A as a Volkswagen receiver - honest, dependable, but without any frills. Perhaps the FRG-7 can be best described as a Super Beetle! The Frog is an honest, dependable, and sensitive communications receiver. Recent written evaluations of the SSR-1 and QR-666 indicate that those receivers suffer from cross modulations and 1 MHz heterodyne repeat problems. The FRG-7 does not demonstrate any of those unfortunate defects. The added features of the Frog give it the kind of operation expected of receivers costing much more than the modest sticker price of around \$300. My experience with the Frog suggests that it is an outstanding buy. Clearly, the Frog is no toad!-Jim

At present, the FRG-7 is priced at slightly under \$300 from our friends at Gilfer Associates, Inc. That places it in a price class with the XCR-30, SSR-1, and QR-666 general coverage communications receivers. I was very impressed with the specifications of this receiver and equally impressed with its performance. Yaesu has created a professional piece of electronic gear with the DXer in mind. The FRG-7 has the potential to become a standard in our hobby.-Ed

ANTENNA NOTE

An important specification has been omitted from the descriptions of Indoor Antenna constructed by myself using wire wound around a plastic tube. That is, the lead-in should be attached at a point determined exactly at 0.6180339887 times (the Fibonacci ratio) the length of the Antenna wire proper. MILITARY SURPLUS PREFERRED BY MANY


R-390A

#2 in a series of reports for new and existing DXing aids available from easily accessible sources.

Thumbing through past copies of FRENEX and other club bulletins, one could easily get the idea that the consistently rare and better catches are being reported by owners of the big name receivers. The overwhelming most popular two receivers owned by a majority of NASWA members seems to be the Drake SPR-4 and the Allied SX-190, followed by the Realistic DX-160. The SPR-4 will cost you near \$600.00 by the time you get it home.

For less than that amount, and a little bit of judicious shopping, one can purchase a very good used R-390A military surplus receiver. Some previous reports on the R-390A receiver have not been complete enough, and so this article will attempt to introduce it and explain its features in some more detail.

To begin with, the R-390A is a tube receiver, circuit designed by Collins Radio. Manufacturing was parcelled out to several companies such as Motorola, Stewart-Warner, Electronic Assistance Corporation, and others. It is similar to the R-390 receiver, but has a slightly different circuit. Some people prefer the R-390 to the 390A model. The R-390 has a cleaner audio system in my opinion, but the 390A has the superior Collins mechanical filters for the ultimate in selectivity. Both have some tubes which are not easy to come by, and which have no substitutes, namely 6AK6, 5814, 26Z5, and 3TF7. Some people often try to substitute 12AU7 tubes for the 5814 tubes with good success; it is a similar tube, but correct designations are best. Purchasers of this receiver would be well advised to have a few spare 6AK6 and a spare 3TF7 on hand. One can always convert the 26Z5 rectifiers to solid-state easily enough.



The R-390A is a **heavy** machine! Depending on cabinetry, etc., weight averages about 70 pounds or more. It takes two people to manhandle this receiver comfortably. The cabinet weighs about 15 pounds, too.

Controls consists of 16 knobs on the front panel, two meters, and one window dial showing frequency. To tune in a given frequency, one has only to twist a knob to crank in the desired MegaHertz range between 0 and 30. A second knob permits dialing in KiloHertz from 000 to 999+ with additional 1/16 inch markers between single KHZ to represent 200 cycles each. The actual dial window is about 1/2 inch by 2 1/2 inches.

Two knobs are used to lock the odometer dial in a fixed position to prevent accidental twisting of the dial off frequency, and for minor adjustments to calibrate the dial numbers.

For control of volume, there are two separate amplification systems; one for your headphones on the front of the receiver and one for a separate speaker or P.A. system connected to the rear panel of the receiver. Controls for both systems are on the front.

The main function control switch positions are: OFF, STANDBY, AGC, MGC, and CAL. Standby cuts off the B+ voltage to mute the receiver. AGC is automatic gain control and MGC is manual gain control. The CAL crystal calibrator works every 100 KHz.

IF bandpass filtering is superb! As any practiced SWL realizes, all stations are normally every 5 KHz along the band. Filtration on the R-390A permits bandpass gates of 16, 8, 4 and 2 KHz using mechanical filters. 1 KHz and 100 Hz positions are accomplished by crystal. The widths of the bandpass mentioned here are for 6 dB of signal. For a stronger signal of 60 dB, the widths will increase somewhat; especially for the 1 KHz and 100 Hz positions not controlled by the mechanical filters. The more narrow selection made, the less high frequency audio response is passed, giving the signal a bassy tone and at some reduced gain (volume).

Another knob is for narrowing audio response to approximate a tone of about 800 Hz, and is used strictly for amateur or military radio operators for copying CW code...best heard at about 800 Hz.

Still another knob is for limiting noise by chopping the peaks off the tops of sudden bursts of white noise such as lightning crackle and ignition noises. While using this feature, one again loses some signal strength.

AGC response allows one to choose how fast his receiver will respond to varying signal strengths. Generally, the receiver is able to maintain a reasonably steady signal although the antenna signal may be fluctuating up and down 50 dB and more. Sharp bursts may cause the receiver to mute instantaneously, albeit only briefly, to regain strength in 1 second, 100 milliseconds, or 1 millisecond, depending on response chosen.

Of course, no worthy receiver would be complete without the very utile antenna trimmer knob to provide optimum peak of signals.



Two meters are for showing RF signal strength in dB and for speaker volume strength (VU). The first meter for RF is not marked off in the familiar S units as with other receivers, but is the same as all others should be.....60 dB equals S-9.

On the rear panel are found two antenna inputs; one for a balanced dipole coaxial or twin-lead, and the other for a simple unbalanced lead-in from a long wire. Other jacks and controls on the rear will not normally concern the SWL/DXer as those have to do with alignment procedures and coordination with transmitting equipment. Two tricks, however, will improve both signal strength reception and increase audio gain...as follows:

More audio gain can be achieved by connecting terminals 6 and 8 together with a jumper wire; a speaker then being attached to either 6/8 and to terminal 7. The front panel headphone jack will also be affected with increased gain. Output of the headphone jack and the audio terminals is at 600 Ohms and a normal 8 Ohm speaker will sound terrible. Merely purchase a step-down audio transformer (600 to 8) at better electronic suppliers. Radio Shack cannot help you here. Better antenna strength can be achieved by looking into the receiver where the antenna inputs come in. Cables are tagged. Find the cables tagged P205 and P206, and reverse their positions. Next, stick a jumper wire into the two holes of the balanced antenna input. Then use the center contact only of the unbalanced antenna input from a longwire. You are getting the full strength of your antenna now.

MILITARY R-390A RECEIVER (Continued)

REAR PANEL



A vast improvement in audio cleanness can be achieved by use of an external audio amplifier, taking its input off the rear of the R-390A at terminals 15 and 16. First make certain the 14 and 15 terminals are jumped together. You will also need to put a blocking capacitor of about .05/600VDC size between terminal 15 and the external amp.

Another rather surprising situation was discovered in the three 455 KHz IFs. Someone found out that the military often stagger-tuned those three IFs at approximately 453, 455, and 457 KHz. If you can get to a reputable R-390A wizard, have him retune those IFs- all three of them - to 455 KHz. The gain increase is immediately apparent and clarity increases. Of course, yours may not be like that.

Ads selling these and similar receivers are in the regular electronic and hobby magazines; CQ, 73, QST, etc. Another couple of sources are Ted Dames, 308 Hickory Street, Arlington, NJ 07032; Bob Herbig, 4178 Chasin Street, Oceanside, CA 92054; A.L. BRAND, Box 311, Sycamore, IL 60178; Fair Radio Sales, Lima, OH. R-390A receivers are available, but they are not cheap. Expect to pay upwards of \$400 from a private sale and upwards from \$500 in a commercial sale. They are worth it if you get one in good shape and not mistreated.

Remember too, that when you buy a Cadillac, you must anticipate Cadillac repair prices. Knowledgeable repairmen are few, especially where the R-390A is concerned. Your best bet is to make a few calls around your neck of the woods to ask local hams who is the nearest "wizard". Don't rush for the first name mentioned. Keep asking. You'll soon find out who really is a wizard and can whip your R-390A into shape. Don't ever take a chance on someone who will "try."

When you succeed in finding a likely purchasable receiver, don't forget to take into consideration that it will cost a fortune in shipping charges, too. 80 pounds by Greyhound once cost me \$40 from San Diego to Columbus, OH. Judge accordingly.

Finally, readers will likely be interested in some of my practical DXing observations using this receiver. I have found the very narrow selectivity positions to be of great use to me, and I also make good use of the BFO which is very stable, and which incidently emits an audible heterodyne easily heard long before I can detect the station's carrier depression in AM mode. Using the BFO to tune just one side band of a desired signal not only permits narrow selectivity, but still permits higher frequency fidelity for cleaner listening.

There is no way to determine if this receiver is the best in the world. Certainly, there are proponents of other receivers which are quite good. But, the combination of features in one package does make the R-390A an enviable receiver.

A PLEASANT VISIT TO ORF VIENNA AUSTRIA

In November 1975 I had the pleasure of visiting ORF, the Austrian Radio in Vienna. I was met by Mr. Herbert Kuhnle, Diplomatic Engineer. Herr Kuhnle is in charge of the frequency planning and liaison department; he manages the monitoring efforts of ORF for other broadcast stations and oversees the monitoring reports compiled on ORF by other stations and DXers.

We drove first to the temporary studios of the SW service situated near the heart of Vienna. The studios are housed in an older wooden building across the street from the modern facilities of ORF's mediumwave broadcast house. The SW studios are equipped with the most modern tape facilities and were at one time run by remote control 24 hours a day. However, there are now several technicians to oversee the operation. This permits changes in the programming if necessary. These studios will shortly move to the new ORF center, which was our next stop.

ORF Center is $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles southwest of the center of Vienna on a hill overlooking the Schoenbrunn Castle and grounds. It houses the TV studios and many offices of ORF including that of Herr Kuhnle. The ORF Center was recently completed and contains several large TV stages and atop the 7 floors of the most modern facility is a roof bristling with microwave antennas. There is even a ham beam (station on 7th floor) and a long wire for SW monitoring.

In his office Herr Kuhnle discussed SW frequency allocations and the value placed on listeners' reports. He said that due to budget restrictions a QSL would not be sent unless specifically requested. We discussed the poor reception of ORF in the USA and while this is well known, the budget will not permit new and larger transmitters or antennas. They plan to continue to use 6155 and 9770 KHz as they do not wish to change frequencies because of the possibility of losing these well known frequency spots. He gave me a copy of a report in German which he submits to his superior each year showing the number of listeners' reports received from around the world during the 4 seasonal periods of the year. This is broken down to show reception conditions from all areas during these periods. It was gratifying to see many reports from the USA when it was feared the ORF would cancel their SW service (see February 1976 SWC p. 10).

Listener reports come to his office and are handled by his attractive assistant who can read English perfectly but is a bit shy when it comes to speaking. One wall of his office is covered with a map of the world with Vienna at the center with great circle bearings radiating from this central point with distances indicated in km. Colored pins indicate beam headings of all of their transmissions.

Some shortwave monitoring is done from the 7th floor using a Collins 51 S-1 and a RACAL RA 17L. After a view from the roof we next drove some 14 miles to the TV transmitter located on the highest hill in the area, Kahlenberg, 5 miles northwest of the city.

The SW monitoring station located there has two German receivers which I would give my eye teeth to own. They (the receivers) are RHODE & SCHWARTZ EKO 7 models. These are large, heavy tube sets, but reception was phenomenal. Listening to Asian stations on 31 meters at 1630 UT at levels approaching locals was really something. There they also maintain frequency measuring equipment plus facilities for band scanning and tape recording. Another piece of equipment, a bed, was explained by Herr Kuhnle as a necessity during snowstorms when it takes days to clear the roads.

Here, monitoring is handled by 4 people for an average of about 30 hours a week. While there I also inspected the TV transmitter and switchboard. It was some experience to punch in Spain and watch the coronation of the king in such beautiful color. Incidentally, the European color system is vastly superior to our system and they are quite pleased with their decision to wait for its refinement in lieu of adopting our system. Imagine, they can set their color controls and never touch them again no matter what channel they tune to for a year or more. The colors are more lifelike and vibrant than those found on US TV. This completed our tour of ORF and Herr Kuhnle then invited me to his home some distance away for some local wine and a bull session.

His home is a stone's throw from the "blue" Danube and he built the two story home completely by himself over a period of 8 years. Although not fully detail-finished here and there, it is most attractive and imaginative with a large panelled rumpus room in the basement. He has a Collins 51 S-1 and his sons all have portables for SW listening. Between glasses of wine in the rumpus room, I found that he had learned his surprisingly fluent English as a POW in Louisiana during WW II. He was 17 years old when captured . . . his story was fascinating.

He has a large collection of tapes from listeners and the many friends he has made over the years. He gave me a copy of an interview he conducted on frequency planning presented on DX Panorama during October 1975, which explains how listeners can help a SW

station.

Time did not allow for a visit to the SW transmitter site at Moosbrunn, 12 miles SSW of Vienna, but I did get a plan of the site showing the 2 OMNI vertical cage antennas used for the European services. The Log-periodic Rotatable antenna and the four rhombics of which three can be used in either direction. The headings of the rhombics are 56, 90, 123, 175, 236, 270 and 303 degrees, the latter being the one used for the North America service. The Log-periodic is also used to North America because there is no other antenna available, although it was primarily designed for shorter distances. There are four 100 kW transmitters in use and bandswitching and antenna change can be completed in 60 seconds or less.

I have visited stations in many countries in the past but have never before been so warmly received as by Herbert Kuhnle and his charming wife, Hermione. If anyone plans a trip to Europe, please try to include beautiful Austria and the wonderful city of Vienna, and by all means make an effort to find time to visit Radio Austria.

The following interview was recorded on 29 October 1975 in Vienna and the announcer was David Hermges (H) interviewing Herr Kuhnle (K).

H: ORF, the Austrian Radio, like other shortwave broadcasting stations, has a Frequency Planning and Liaison Department. For the past fifteen years Herbert Kuhnle has been closely concerned with this operation. We asked him to tell us something about his work, and its practical implications for listeners.

K: Our main task is to work out the transmission schedule for each of the four periods of the year. This means fixing the time of radiation to a given area (in cooperation with the Director of Programs); the choice of which antenna (in consultation with the transmitter station manager); and after studying ionospheric predictions and propagation forecasts, the selection of the best frequency band and individual frequency. And, remember, all this has to be done nearly nine months in advance.

A lot depends on experience, but we have other aids. We are in regular contact with about forty radio stations around the world, as well as with PTT officials in a number of countries. With them we cooperate in running a monitoring service, exchanging monitoring reports, band scannings, tapes, and field strength measurements. Then there is the help given by the tentative HF broadcasting Schedule of IFRB, the International Frequency Registration Board in Geneva. Last, but not least, there are reports, tapes, and letters from listeners that reach us every day of the year. Evaluation of all these sources keeps me and my small staff very, very busy - and we have no computer!

For each transmission block (lasting for one hour or more) we work out an average SINPO rating for each of the four seasonal periods. Last year, 1974, for instance, we had 25 different transmission blocks. Four of them reached the rating "good", seventeen the rating of "fair" and four "poor to unreadable". With some seasonal variations, that represents an 84% success, and so we are quite happy. But we want to do still better, and this is where the individual listener can help. So here are a few tips.

First, as regards the listening conditions for shortwave broadcasts from Austria to Europe. For 15 years we have been operating on some standard frequencies, and we shall not depart from them. To do so, even for only a short period, would mean losing them forever. Propagation conditions in Europe up to a distance of about 2000 km are fairly well known, as is also the behavior of our non-directional vertical cage antennas and the log-periodic horizontal polarized directional antenna. We know, too, that these broadcasts are sometimes badly affected by fading. So what we need from listeners in Europe are not frequent reports on the reception of one frequency, but comparisons between different frequencies that we are operating at the same time, particularly in the early morning and late evening. We also want to hear about the effect of interference by the new higher power stations operating on lower or higher channels. So much for Europe, where, at any one time, you may be able to hear us on as many as three different frequencies.

For overseas listeners, the position is rather different. Theoretically you may only be able to pick up our signal on a single frequency. However, we know that in some cases, not only the main beam can be heard from our different directional antennas, but also the side-lobes and back-radiation. This is of great interest to us, particularly in areas outside the original target.

And so to summarize, the golden rule for DXers who want to help us is: look closely at our latest frequency schedule, compare reception conditions on various frequencies (intended for your area, and possibly, four other areas too), and let us know about interference from high power stations on neighboring channels. And the sooner you can get your reports in to us - preferably within three weeks - the more use they are to us.

THOSE MISSING QSLs by Al Sizer

Information for this article came from a survey of 11 foreign correspondents of the LA Times.

Many of us DXers gripe and moan about reception reports that are never answered and QSLs that are never received. Most often we blame it on the station involved - - they just didn't care enough to answer. More likely, if it was the station's fault, it was because they simply did not have the staff or funds to handle QSLs.

However, before you go blaming the station too heavily, consider another reason for the missing QSL - - the country's mail service.

Now it is well known that we have plenty of defects in our own mail service right here in the US and Americans are certainly vocal enough in listing these defects and complaining about them. But in the hullabaloo, let's not forget that compared with some other mail services in the world, ours ranks well. If you think the U.S. Postal Service is something less than perfect, it may comfort you to learn that the mail in most other countries is even slower and less reliable.

Russians would have you think, at least the officials, that everything runs like clockwork under the Communistic system, but in Moscow recently a citizen was heard to complain that mail delivery was faster in the time of the Czars.

If you had no answer to an Indian reception report, reflect that in New Delhi they are concerned not so much with late delivery as with nondelivery. Theft is common.

In Nairobi there is no home delivery and the main post office is located in a high-crime district. In Cairo it often takes several days for an "express" letter to go across town. Letters are routinely opened by censors in many countries and the wholesale destruction of mail by disgruntled postmen is fairly common too. (Was your reception report or QSL in the mailbag?)

It is common in many countries to pay a relatively steep surcharge to make sure that a letter gets to its destination. The additional service may be called registration or special handling or rapid delivery, but what it really is is insurance.

No special service can prevent the sort of disaster that occurs from time to time in almost every country. There is the documented case of the Russian postman who, unbalanced by drink, dumped thousands of letters on a garbage heap. And in South Africa, it was reported "occasionally a maverick mailman will go walk-about and scatter his deliveries to the winds". Letters are commonly opened by the authorities in Cairo and robbing the mails is not unusual in Kenya and Uganda. More than 30 employes of the East African Extelecommunications Co. were charged with theft recently. In such places sensitive mail goes either by courier or, if necessary, in the hands of some traveler at the airport who happens to have an honest face.

The best mail services appear to be in Britain, France, West Germany and Japan. Yet the quality of service is falling off, even in Great Britain. And in the Soviet Union, where people are not famous for speaking out publicly against the government or the way it does business, Pravda, the voice of the Soviet Communist Party, complained openly last year that the mail service was not everything it could be.

Perhaps the most improved mail service in the world is in Brazil, which only a few years ago was considered to be disastrous. In those days no bill or check or dinner invitation was entrusted to the mails. All were delivered by messenger - - usually an off-duty fireman. Postal systems in other countries do not appear to have worked out any particularly advanced means of handling the mails. Mechanical sorting has been adopted in most industrial countries, but even elementary steps, like use of a zip code are just taking hold elsewhere.

The mail goes by reindeer in Siberia. In other parts of the world they use bicycles and motorbikes. And until recently letters in parts of Africa were still carried in cleft sticks held aloft by runners. These African "postmen" were instructed to run as though they were carrying a hot coal in their hands and sometimes cried aloud as they ran: "A letter! A letter! It is burning me! Make way for a reception report from Gerry Dexter!"

Propagation Conditions

Two experienced DXers have prepared consumer's evaluations on the receiver. Veteran DXer, Al Sizer, also a former FRENDEX editor has written his opinion on a single sheet; and Ed J. Pyatt, long-time DXer too, offers his views in three sheets. Both are available from your QSO editor for two stamps on an envelope big enough to accept 4 sheets of typing paper - plus 25c for xeroxing. I consider these reviews well worth investigation.

CANADIAN OUTLET FOR FRG-7. Several Canadian members asked where they could find out more about receivers in Canada. Buying receivers from U.S. agencies is a no-no, involving expensive duties, etc. In Canada, members may contact Mr. Jack Reed, VE Sales, 3768 Bathurst Street, Downsview, Ontario. (416) 636-3636 is the phone number. We regret that the Canadian price is SUBSTANTIALLY greater.

NASWA DECAL is really attractive and can be stuck on anywhere.. side of a receiver, luggage, bumper, etc. Color is red, white, and blue. \$1 plus 25c postage from NASWA HDQ.

EARLY SHORT WAVE RECORDINGS. Member Jim Ronda has taken on an interest in early short wave broadcasting facts. A September 1934 issue of Radio News contains a story about one Horace Hall who made phonograph recordings directly off the air for later transcription over his domestic WBNX radio show.

GREAT LAKES DX ASSN gets new SW loggings editor as Jim Ronda relieves John Moritz. NASWA members are fortunate to have Moritz as our new DX Hotline editor.

WWV DROPS PROPAGATION INFO. Effective this month WWV was supposed to have dropped the propagation information at the 14th and 18th minutes past each hour. NASWA member George Poppin thought the information was so useful that he has written letters to Australian and South African sources to ask the feasibility of including such information in their programming.

NOT-ENOUGH-POWER AMPLIFIER, FOLLOW-UP. A couple of issues back we mentioned an instant where an R-392 power supply purchased from Fair Radio Sales in Lima, OH had failed because its design did not really provide enough power needed by the R-392. SEARS PLUGS NASWA. Thanks to Wesley Thompson who works for Sears in the Philadelphia area, their in-house newsletter "Group Talk" contained an 8 column-inch article about NASWA and short wave listening. This is a perfect example of how NASWA members can help boost their hobby. Perhaps others have work organization newsletter with space for your stories.

RECEIVER SPECIFICATIONS. Ed Ricchezza of Philadelphia writes to express his appreciation for QSO/NASWA and suggests that FRENDX readers might like to know more about receiver specifications, but in layman's language. Taking Ricchezza's advice, we offer an explanation of receiver selectivity specifications to shop for. When a likely receiver is being considered for purchase, look for the specification which says, Selectivity. It will look something like this: 6 KHz for 60dB, or 20 KHz at -50dB. The KHz measurements tell how wide the IF bandpass may be for the loudness of signal mentioned (60dB or 50dB). 50 or 60 dB of signal is a fairly strong signal, and for that strength you will desire the narrowest bandpass available. Therefore, the 6 KHz width would be better than the 20 KHz width. Remember, however, that this holds true only for a loud 50 or 60 dB signal. When a figure of 6 dB or 10 dB is given, the bandpass width should be much more narrow, the narrower the better. An ideal specification for a medium-priced receiver should be about 3 KHz at 6dB, and no wider than 7 KHz at 60dB. Some other listeners may have more stringent tastes, but this should prove adequate for most situations.

WHY DO I SOMETIMES HEAR ECHOS? If you ever listen to VOA, BBC, or other powerful broadcaster, and happen to hear what appears to be an echo, chances are that one of two things are happening: 1) The broadcaster is simulcasting the programs from two transmitters at once and you are hearing one slightly delayed by only milliseconds, or 2) You are hearing only one transmitter, but from two directions. That is, you are hearing the transmitter from the closest direction, and also from long-path around the globe back to your location. The latter takes slightly longer. Traveling at near the speed of light, radio waves can travel around the entire globe in less than 1/3 second, that is less than 330 milliseconds.

REPLIES to the September questionnaire cannot be tabulated in full due to lack of space. 49 replies were received, which means those people have disproportionate input compared to those who did not participate. 5-step questions were averaged; receiving highest positive rating was Quick-Reference Lists of English broadcasts (1.91), then Broadcasts in English section-- (2.00), background on DX stations (2.10), total pages for LN (2.24), material originated by gh (2.36) English program news (2.38). Most negative was one-freq LR-type loggings (4.34), DX programs-- other languages (3.72), BBCMS MW info as filler (3.68), UKOGBANI (3.60). All others fell in the mid range of (2.50-3.50). The grand mean was 2.82. On the Yes/No questions: only 23% wanted larger type; 60.4% did not subscribe to DXH, and of these, 50% said they would if midmonth LN were added. 63.6% would pay more for a 3-oz FRENDX; 61.9% prefer day/month dates (!), and 95.7% were satisfied with LN. How many pages for LN? The average was 10.7; this happens to be about what I need not to fall behind, but only 8 pages are assured, and others must be scrounged. Some comments will appear in "In My Opinion". Some suggested eliminating subsections of country-keyed items for one master listing. How about this? I hope this IBM Executive improves legibility, though it eats up more space than previous typewriter (gh)

PUBLICATIONS

A Historical Analysis of American Short Wave Broadcasting 1916-1942

by Michael Kent Sidel, is a thorough and readable unpublished Ph.D. dissertation for Northwestern University, June 1976. Hard copies can be ordered for about \$11 from University Microfilms, 300 N. Zeeb Rd., Ann Arbor, MI 48106. It covers the pre-VOA days when NEC, CBS, GE, Westinghouse, Crosley and others were deeply involved in ISWBC--the good old days of the 30's when SWling was as much a fad as CB is today. And it was all researched with hardly any reference to DX publications of the era, to a total of 274 double-space typed pages, the last 61 of which contain the 745 footnotes and bibliography, itself a valuable reference. Kent has just joined the University of Tennessee faculty, but I would not have become the sixth person to read his dissertation, had I not spotted him in the hall carrying a CBC Northern Service program schedule, and thus learned of our mutual interest(gh)

Far Eastern DX Review is an excellent new publication of the Japanese Association of DXers, Isao Ugusa, Hiroyuki Nagase, Takahiro Saito, Yoshiaki Hayashi, each of whom specializes in a certain geographical area--along the lines of DUDXC but without the band surveys. The first issue, dated 27/9, is xerox-reproduced, in English but with some Chinese/Pinyin anmts. The 16-page required 230 yen airmail postage, but no info was given on price or frequency of publication. Most notable in this one is a detailed article on Fujian Front Broadcasting Station, by Nagase, with a detailed program schedule constructed from monitoring. Another excellent piece of research. (gh)

INTRUDER WATCH

If you listen to SW at all, you will have been annoyed by the "Monster Jammer" as SWNS calls it, sending out rapid bursts of pulses over a wide frequency range. It's attracting attention everywhere, such as: (gh) It's a gigantic Russian transmitter sounding like a machine gun. Sweden, Britain and Australia have located it in the Poltava area of the Ukraine; one report puts its power as high as 2 megawatts. USSR has not answered inquiries through ITU channels. CE of the Defence Research Institute, FOA, theorizes it's a form of SW radar (R. Sweden 6/10 via BECMS) John Hutchinson, Comms. Dir. of Canadian Steamship Lines, Montreal says colleagues in Rome said newspapers there speculate it was jamming to disrupt NATO exercises off the Scandinavian coast, adversely affecting entire ham bands at a clip (CBC 29/9 via Magne) I find it tends to operate near the MUF of the N Atlantic path, perhaps coincidence. Presumably it uses backscatter to determine MUF moment-to-moment, making its operation totally unpredictable. I doubt it's jamming, and it has no properties of data transmission. However, something along the lines of over-the-horizon radar would not be inconceivable, or even a device to counteract same from the US--radar jammer or electronic warfare device (Magne, PA) The federal govt is investigating unusual communications interference from the USSR which has blanked out such SW communication in northern Canada (Hutchinson, via Winnipeg Tribune 24/9 via Bill Anyluk, SWNS) which wonders if we will ever know the truth about this? # The ham intruder watchers have a net GMT Tuesdays on 21260 at 2100 and 2330; and GMT Wednesdays on 14745 at 430 (NNRC 10/76) I suspect they are not charitable to legit 4km broadcasts (gh)

NASWA SURVEY COMMENTS (continued)

"I became a reckless tuner. Yes, I actually mized tuning and reading. I would skip across the bands, and a few times my hand slipped off the dial. It became a regular habit, and I was finally forced to admit it -- I was a DXholic! Many times I was found in the gutters putting up an antenna. I was at the low of my life when I received a Summer English Broadcast Guide from NASWA (Notorious Alcoholics of Shortwave Anonymous). This organization does not try to stop DXing but rather tries to make the DXer controllable and respectable. Well, I thought that maybe NASWA could help me, so I joined. They sent me informative magazines that contained every aspect of SWL. I learned when to tune what band. I found the joys of QSL cards. NASWA transformed me from a reckless, obnoxious DXholic to a clean, respectable DXer. I thank you NASWA."

"The club's bulletin is the best I have come across and I wouldn't give it up for anything. The only fault I can find is that the technical content is too deep for the average reader."

"Find NASWA to have to most fantastic magazine! I receive four other magazines and greatly prefer FRENDX!"

"My only fault is the small print if FRENDX, otherwise your material is good and most interesting."

"The hobby is for old men who, with plenty of cash, will succeed while others are left with a weird feeling as we look through FRENDX and know we cannot duplicate them without money."

"FRENDX is an outstanding publication but somebody ought to call SPEEDX to find out their secret for readable type and clarity in reproduction process."

"The majority of LR listings are from the North and Northeast. Need more people from South and Southeast. No DXer should be without NASWA."

"FRENDX is a great help even for the casual listener such as myself."

"NASWA should give mailing lists to responsible electronic manufacturers so we can find out about equipment or publications. There are some really good, small companies that deal with this type of stuff, but they are so small they are only known in a small part of the country."

"NASWA is the most progressive and publishes the best bulletin. Like the stations listed by frequency as you don't have to hunt through the bulletin to verify a frequency."

"I looked over all the majors before joining a SW club. NASWA was, and is, the best."

"My comments are first directed toward NASWA. First off, FRENDX is an excellent publication. But it still gives me an impression it is a 'stuffy' magazine. Regarding the log reports, they say 'send in only the best you have logged.' In other words, to me it should be some station very remote. There are a lot of stations left out in my opinion that can be useful. The log forms are a pile of poop! I feel this distribution editor for logs is a big waste. What will happen to NASWA when GH is no longer able to contribute? Well I will be looking forward to next month's bulletin for after reading it I will seriously think about renewing. ASWLC is friendlier, take a few tips. All original material from the members. Later!"

"NASWA is performing a fine service which I appreciate. I am amazed at the dedication of your contributors and the professional approach taken in all your endeavors, this survey being a good example."

"NASWA completely regenerated my interest about two years ago. I can only make one criticism -- we have a few members with a Godlike or 'holier than thou' attitude which is rather obvious and nauseating. However, I pray for them!"

"I for one have stopped contributing because my material is seldom used. My countries are not exotic enough, maybe, but to me and others not so experienced, they are good catches. Many editors seem to discourage participation, though probably unintentionally, by such action."

"DXing According to NASWA is one of the best shortwave books published! I highly recommend it to all DXers. One of the reasons NASWA is the largest sw club in North America is because FRENDX publishes outstanding research articles and its DX station listings are among the most complete and most helpful. NASWA is to be complimented on their initiative in compiling and issuing this survey which results will prove most valuable to the hobby."

"I have often suggested that FRENDX give more emphasis to English-language broadcasts, e.g. more frequent lists of EE transmissions and distinguishing marks in the Log Report for EE programs."

"Especially appreciate the newer features on program content."

"A feature I would like to see in FRENEX is short articles by the winners of awards specifying the techniques and equipment used in qualifying for the award."

"Don't make NASWA so sophisticated (like the 'elite' DX Hotline if you will) that newcomers and/or potential hobbyists turn off because of the appearance of being too complex."

"I have maintained as have others that more frequent bulletin publication would be useful especially in winter, with a musings section as opposed to the current SWC which has a lot of filler, and with a definite attempt to make technical features/projects/research a more predominant theme."

"As for NASWA I have been a member for several years and it is the best. I just cannot say enough for you fellows that keep it going. The hobby itself is in my opinion one of the best, not too expensive, and it certainly helps a man in learning all he can about this old world of ours. I have learned more about geography from shortwave than I ever did in school. I will soon be 80 years old, have a new Drake SPR-4, a Mosley SWL-7 50 feet in the air, am having a swell time so intend to sit out the rest of it and enjoy myself. The best of everything for everyone on the staff."

"If a person is a SWL and doesn't belong to NASWA, I can conceive of only two possibilities: 1) either the SWL is unaware of NASWA's existence, or 2) the SWL is a nut. Although I am only a casual listener, my pleasure in the hobby would be greatly diminished without FRENEX."

Finally, there were several comments about the survey itself. Most of the feedback was positive and the majority felt that the questionnaire would succeed in providing some information about SWL/DXers. Of course, the prevalence of favorable opinions has much to do with the fact that those who bothered to send back the questionnaire must have been somewhat positively disposed towards this project. Critical comments were very useful and well taken:

"This survey does not make much sense to the pure DXer. It is all predicated on SWL. I can't answer most of these questions intelligently because I only listen for DX."

"You should replicate this study among non-NASWA members. And how about a question asking 'do you listen more, the same, or less than a year ago?'"

"Your interest in this pastime makes me feel as though I'm not wasting my time."

"I think you might have formulated a question eliciting from SWL/DXers the reasons for listening to shortwave radio at all. For example, how many people believe that US media's failing in their coverage promotes SWling? How objective and informative are the various international broadcasters? I feel America's communications media do an inadequate job of reporting not only international but also US national events. Thanks for being interested in what SWLs think."

"Let's hope this survey opens some eyes and ears -- we need a bigger selection of receivers and equipment."

"I am very sorry the questionnaire did not ask us to rate how we like the programs of various countries, regardless of our ability to pick them up. Also, you should have included some questions about the SS broadcasts of LA stations."

"Great survey! I was beginning to think SWBCers thought we all died off, hi!"

"Have fun figuring the results. Ugh, what a job! Good luck!"

"This survey is the greatest thing since the transistor for the SWL/DXer. If it is successful, we might get better programming, more items on the market, and maybe even a few more stations."

"I don't like the taste of your adhesive glue!"





Cuenca, para todo el pais...Ecuatoriana...el programa principal." Nx from 1105-1130 f/o, using doorbell to separate items. Sousa march hrd twice as pgm theme song. Several IDs, all en ecc. Not here before as this area monitored more or less regularly for past couple mo's. Gud to have this one back on air..and at gud lvl! (Ralph W. Perry)...Same format noted by your editor on 10/20! All you Ecuadorian freaks go get em!

TANZANIA - RT 4785, noted from 0305 tune in to 0345 f/o. Soft drum mx was followed by African mx and then what sounded like a speech. All in Swahili. Gud level altho QRM was bad. Not a biggie for most people, but I've been chasin them on 60 meters for 3 years as I could nvr get them on 15435 (Kent Corson, Iowa) Congrats Kit! ed.

SWAZILAND - Swazi Commercial Radio on 2490 kHz from 1600 to 2200 hours GMT. // 1376 and 3223 kHz (Gerry E. Wood, DX Editor Radio RSA)

MONGOLIA - 5053a, R Ulan Bator, tlk by woman at 1240 and mx from 1247. Mentioned R. Moscow at 1300a. All on 10/8 and a new HIC for me! (John Tuchscherer, Wisconsin) Way to go JDT! Wish I could get em. ed.

BOLIVIA - 5965, Radio Nacional Huanuni, 0955-1017 could not believe my ears, but this one heard here with martial/military song, complete with drums at 0955, followed by M in SS, then a nice ID at 1000 for R. Nac. concluding with the words "en Bolivia." Into a couple amts, then some group songs by men and women. At fair level at first, but tapering off in noise to almost nothing by 1017. Pleased with this one! your ed on 10/16

INDONESIA - RRI Kupang, 3550, heard on several morns but best on 13 Oct when they were listenable for over an hour from 1205. Mostly talks in Indo, with Indo pops from 1248-1259 when RRI IS hrd (Corson)...RRI Jakarta, 4805, from 1229-1300 in Indo, chanting and sub cont type mx. Some amnts by a W, IS at 1258 and into nx at 1300. Super strong, but first time ever heard here, even though 4775 is heard often. 4805 was not // 4775 (Corson)

SRI LANKA - SLBC, 11835 heard from 0045-0207 with heavy QRM to 0100 from VOA on 11830. Lots of mx of Eastern variety, including chanting, to 0115. From 0115-0125 a man talked continuously. IDs at 0129 and 0130, then W in unid tlk to 0141, when mx until 0207 f/o (Jim Conrad, Iowa)

MAURITIUS - 9710a, Forest Side strongly believed the one here from 1247 to 1300 plug with very beautiful Indian instrumental music on string instruments. M on at 1253 in Indian lang, presume possibly listed Hindustani, followed by some sort of closing tune in noise. M back at 1259 with final amnt, but missed ID due noise. Lang not FF, and the programming sure fits what has usually been reported here. your ed. 10/24 9709t, Forest Side vy likely the one here 10/14 with poor sig and het w/ 9710, 1245 spot checks hrd YL in lang, FF or Indian, and gone by 1302 recheck (Bill Whitacre, Michigan)

Propagational picks.... I have never been good at this type of thing, but I am going to give it a whirl this time out. Look for the so-so condx of October to give way to good African reception, especially on the lower frees, in the first half of November. We may also be in for some SEAsian goodies during the middle to latter half of the month as well, I hope! Finally, try Greenland on 3999kHz during 2330-0000 period. Just might be there one night!

GREENLAND - R Grønlands from 2330 with orchestral pieces. No anmts due severe ham QRM. Unless another station on same freq with same prop characteristics, it's more than just likely this is them. Hrd by me at same time last year (Bill Whitacre) Sounds good to me whit. ed. Oops, that freq is 3999. scusa me! your ed.

THAILAND - RT, 9654, poor sig 1233-1245 with man in Thai news, 1241 Far Eastern music. Lost to VOA splatter 1245. rleased with this one, and thanks to Andy Robins for tip (Whitacre)

AUSTRALIA - Radio Australia has been announcing over the air that they will resume broadcasting from Carnarvon on 15410 kHz, on 25 Oct. (George Poppin, California)

RADIO RSA DX PROGRAM - English DX Corner sked as follows: on wed. at 1635 2135 and 2305GMT; Thurs at 1435 with repeat of Wed program; and Sat. at 1635, 2135 and 2305GMT (Gerry E. Wood, DX Editor, Radio RSA)



AGAIN, REPORTING PROCEDURE EXPLAINED: This is the last time I'm going to detail it out to you for a while, so please take note of this when you report. If you still aren't clear after reading this, then report anyway, and ask me whatever questions that you may have on it, and I'll try to answer it. (1)-If possible, use NASWA report forms, which can be gotten from me for 28¢ in stamps, and a large envelope. This will get you 20 report forms (which will give you room for 200 reports) via 3rd class mail. (2)-If you can't afford the forms, or just plain don't want to use them, then double-space between each line, and triple space between each report. (3)-Write or type up your reports from the lowest frequency to the highest. (4)-Cut apart the reports from each other, and put in order from low to high. (5)-If you don't use the report forms, use only one side of the paper. (6)-Send the reports to me, not the individual editors. (7)-Lastly, be a little neat. That about covers it. I did throw out some reports this last month, mainly because they wer single-spaced, or unreadable, or written on bothsides of the paper. So, if you'll do this stuff, you'll help standardise reporting technique, and make it ALOT EASIER! FOR US! Now you have no more excuses not to report. LET US KNOW WHAT YOU'RE HEARING!
