

NASWA RADIO COUNTRY LIST AND AWARDS PROGRAM: As announced in the August issue of FRENEX, a new and updated Country List and Awards Program pamphlet has been published and is available for the cost of postage upon request.

Since our first announcement, less than 150 copies have been requested and sent out. This first response is somewhat disappointing since we had been under the impression there was a lot more interest in this area than has been shown thus far. We have gone to considerable expense in the preparation and printing of this pamphlet, and not mention the time given by the two chairmen of the committees who make this program possible, so we sometimes wonder if it is worthwhile to go to all this expense and effort for such a few.

As stated in our original announcement, this 20 page pamphlet is available merely for the cost of postage. To obtain one, send a minimum of .28¢ in mint U.S. postage stamps or coins. Canadian members are to send a minimum of .30¢ in Canadian coins. No Canadian stamps accepted. Overseas members send three (3) IRC's for surface mail or five (5) for airmail.

NASWA MEMBERSHIP DIRECTORY: There are no more membership directories available. We had 500 copies printed, and the response was a little more than expected. As a result, our supply is exhausted until next years directory is published which will be during June or July, 1979. All future orders for this pamphlet will be returned.

WORTHY OF MENTION: Although not strictly SWBC, a couple of items received here at HQ this month are worthy of mention since there are many who may be interested in the other areas of the radio listening hobby.

Someone sent us a complimentary copy of NARA NEWS published by The North American Radio Archives, a non-profit organization with editorial offices at 3051 S. Jessica Street, Tucson, AZ 85730. The copy we received is 60 pages, offset printed with easy to read printing. It is published four times a year and it's main theme seems to be in the area of old time AM radio during the days of serials, dramas, etc. Anyone interested can obtain a sample copy of NARA NEWS by sending \$1.00 to the address given.

The second item is ACROSS THE DIAL, a guide to North American AM and FM radio stations, including formats and arranged alphabetically by city and state, has been published by Broadcasting Publications, Inc., 1735 DeSales Street, N.W., Washington, DC 20036. This is available from the publisher for \$2.25 plus .75¢ for postage and handling.

This would be a worthwhile aid to those who are on the move and would like to know what's on the AM and FM dials across the U.S. and Canada.

FRENEX MAILING DATES: We would like to remind everyone that FRENEX is not always mailed on the same day of the month. Generally, the mailing date will occur around the first weekend of each month, so it could be as early as the 1st or as late as the 6th. The mailing time is set for the convenience of the publisher rather than a specific date.





Survey

THE NASWA SURVEY

Presented by K. A. Elliott at ANARC 1978

Shortwave listening is an intensely personal and private activity -- usually we go off into a corner of the house to listen to shortwave. Usually there is nobody else around. It is not the type of activity that is easily observed. As a result, there is not much common knowledge about what is involved in the hobby of SWL. How do we do it, what kind of station preferences do we have, what types of programs do we like? Because SWLs tend to be scattered around the country and don't get together very often except in meetings like ANARC, there is very little knowledge about the activity of international broadcast listening in the United States.

Many scholars, however, are interested in the effects of international broadcasting on the North American audience. The conventional wisdom is that international broadcasting has very little effect because few people actually listen to them. That is the conventional wisdom and it may be correct for all I know, but it is worth investigating.

The Gallup Polls usually have a sampling of about 2,000 listeners as a representation of the entire U.S. population. Out of this you may get a handful of people who listen to shortwave on a regular basis, maybe 100 who own radios capable of receiving SW or who may have listened to Radio Moscow once or twice and then fled shortwave, back to AM or FM. The dishard SWLs are very few. The Radio Canada International/Gallup Poll is probably still the best indication we have.

In 1975, some speech-communication professors/journalists, Drew McDaniel and James Hall, in the summer issue of the Journal of Broadcasting, did a survey of the Newark News Radio Club. That was the first attempt at a survey, not of the general U.S. public, but of a specific group who are known shortwave listeners. Don D. Smith declared that SWLs were more interested in getting the "country" than in listening to program content -- that is, they were more politically interested listeners. Hall and McDaniel disagreed with this. That is, unfortunately, typical of many scholars in the U.S. who don't have any connection with the hobby and probably do not listen to shortwave themselves. The point being, that the NNRC was not an all shortwave club, but a combination of many different aspects of radio.

I have been a member of NASWA for 12 years and I thought it was about time that we improved upon the Hall-McDaniel study and try to get some good information of the SWL in the U.S. My main hypothesis was that not all people in NASWA were interested strictly in the DX aspect of shortwave listening. I suspected that there were those who were interested in listening to programs and that probably most of us were in both the DX and SWL categories.

So for my Master's thesis at the University of Minnesota I put together a survey with return postage and much pre-publicity from NASWA. At the time of the Survey in June-July 1976, there were about 1000 members in the United States. We managed to get 756 of them back, a 7% return, considered decent in mail survey research. We were glad to get such a response, especially because the surveys were rather long, tedious, and time-consuming.

We found that there were those who were interested in either DXing or program content, but then many fell in between those two extremes. There were only 4.4 percent diehard DXers and 2.5 percent who were only program listeners. 28, 25, and 18 percent fell in the categories in the middle. There were 31.2 percent who listened 3 to 6 hours per week, 27 percent 7 to 10 hours. They listen several hours per week and Gallup Polls are lucky to find 20 or 30 people who listen one hour per week. So we have here a sample of a very large group of shortwave listeners, by no means indicative of the general population.

Obviously, those stations that are clearer in signal/reception will be listened to more often. But there were some discrepancies. Radio Sweden was 21st in reception quality but 14th in listening frequency. People were actually trying to seek out Radio Sweden in the static for its superior programming. On the other hand, we have Radio Havana, 5th in reception quality and 15th in amount of listening. North Korea and South Korea shared the distinction of being 45th and 46th respectively. Spain, however, did well in both respects with its favorable transmitter location not subject to polar variations.

My next project is to phone interview a number of listeners to the major broadcasters, more casual listeners than are DXers and SWLs who are members of clubs. There is still much to be learned about the shortwave listener in the United States.

SWL Program

A SHORTWAVE LISTENING PROGRAM ON CABLE TV

St. John is a city of about 102,000 inhabitants and out of those we have about 20,000 subscribers to cable television. This figure is climbing rapidly, and on cable we now have about 7 channels; 5 channels are the usual major networks, 1 channel has all news, and we have a community channel. A community channel means that the public has access to put on their very own show, and as soon as I knew this, the SWL lamp lit up 100 watts, and I said, "why couldn't I put on a DX show even though it was on closed circuit--but a closed circuit with a potential of 20,000 viewers?" So, I decided to put on a pilot show. I had everything down at the studio that day for taping on channel 6.

We have what we call the Greater St. John's Community Council for cable television that keeps a finger on the pulse of the public and the people who work on the programs, partly from an ethics angle. What people see in St. John, New Brunswick, is the responsibility of the people in that city. It is unfortunate that people still regard these products as something to watch or not to watch rather than something to create. Even a passive viewer decides whether to watch on the basis of peripheral details such as lighting, sound, and the switching of sets and all the other trappings one gets with commercial TV which sometimes acts as a camouflage. Slickness is not what it is all about in community television. I began to look around in my first days at community TV and began to think that there weren't enough people who actually grasped the potential of community TV, and even fewer who exploited it. And when I looked at the programs, I saw that 40% of them were religious, 40% were Country and Western groups, and the rest were a hodge-podge of what the private interviewers could get in the city: gardens in the city, the social services, what church was doing this or that. And that was OK, but only 20% of the programs.

I approached the program controller and said, quite bluntly, "Can I put on a shortwave program?" And she said yes, let's give it a try. I discussed my program content with her and she gave me the green light. I had not seen a TV show just on DXing. Why not? Well, who wants to see a chap talking about megacycles, BFOs, or what ever. You can't just sit there and talk about shortwave, 19 metre band, Venezuela, Radio Nederland -- what does it mean? So I put on a pilot program--I had everything down there, including receivers and a globe. I sat back and waited for the feedback. There really was an interest in shortwave. I thought then that I had my foot in the door or on the bottom rung of the ladder.

Now I've got 12 programs, three already taped. Last night was the premier (on receivers): I introduced the first show on the subject of receivers. The second show was on antennas, the third on reporting. This program will go out now every two weeks.

The cable company's duty is to supply the studios, the equipment, and the technical personnel. The staff's responsibility is to keep the equipment in working order and the technical quality of the broadcasts high: we are always trying to improve things. We give about three hours of intensive instruction and then step back and let the people do their own shows. After that the equipment is booked out on a first come, first served basis. Have you got the idea -- you can walk in and say, "I want to talk about breeding dogs." An hour program is too long, a half hour is just right. It takes me two weeks to get my own program

together, to make my own props. I borrowed my granddaughter's doll house for an antenna demonstration. I demonstrated with string and white beads what a dipole is, grounding that doll house was the key to the whole piece. And at the end of the show, I put her in the credits. She got a great kick out of that.

Well, that's it, that is the whole thing about community cable TV. Everybody likes to see themselves on TV or they love to hear their own voice. It is a pleasant shock to see oneself on TV. The majority of the people who stated they were interested in using the community cable TV channel were in the 18 and under groups. Other statistics indicate just how far community cable has to go before it even approximates the ideal of large-scale community involvement. Less than 10 percent of the respondents indicated interest in producing programs. Again, this is where I say something has to be done. Does this kind of thing mean that St. John's people don't have anything worthwhile to say -- well, we do, we have a lot to say. Do they feel intimidated by the so-called professionalism of commercial TV? Has the creative urge been crushed by too many years of work at jobs that deny the use of their imaginations? Community cable television is hoping that the answers to these questions is eventually going to be "No". Perhaps the real answer lies in a paraphrase -- "by their programming so shall we know them."

Many of my programs are in the newspaper, sometimes a week ahead of the broadcast. The title of the program -- The World at Your Fingertips. The premier of an informative series on Shortwave Listening with host Alfred Thornton. This week, receivers, guest Harvey McPhee.

Monitoring vs DXing

MONITORING = DXING??? Or does it? Some thoughts and personal views

Although I have had the honor (or honour, as I'd prefer!) to be the UK representative of NASWA for several years, this is, I think, the first occasion on which I have felt impelled to sit down and write an article for FRENEX as a direct result of something contributed by another member of our great Association. The viewpoints of DXers in the United States and across the water are, inevitably, colored by their national origins: One would not be human if this were not the case. However, I feel that Bill Whitacre's article "Racal" (August 78 FRENEX, pp. 3-5) must stand corrected in its factual inaccuracies and this provides me with an opportunity to express a personal view which is colored by very many hours of discussion with professional monitors and by having used a 'Racal' receiver - and a variety of that manufacturer's auxiliary equipment - consistently for something like 7 years.

Firstly, let me correct the more glaring factual inaccuracies in the article. Whitacre says that the "RA-117 means that the receiver is the U.S. version of the RA-17 . . .": This is not correct. The 'Racal' RA-17 was the first receiver to use the Wadley (not Barlow-Wadley) loop circuit which, effectively eliminates drift from a receiver (the Barlow part of Barlow-Wadley refers to the South African manufacturer of the XCR-30 which, like so many other receivers, utilizes this circuit). However, the RA-117 is very definitely not the U.S. version of the RA-17! The RA-117 (usually found in the RA-117E variant) is, in fact, a military version of the RA-17 Mark 2, but the RA-117 has an additional IF stage and few users would agree that "the model number is about the only difference between these two versions." Rightly or wrongly, the RA-117 has a reputation for being a less drift-free and sensitive receiver than the RA-17 in its various forms. The RA-17 Mark 2 (the Mark 1 version is seldom, if ever, encountered) is normally found in versions with the type number RA-17X where 'X' is a suffix letter denoting the particular model: Illustrations of this are the (commonly encountered) RA-17K, which has a maximum bandwidth of 8 kHz, or the RA-17L with a maximum bandwidth of 13 kHz. There are a wide variety of RA-17 models, designed for various purposes including the RA-17P, RA-17R, RA-17S, and RA17W. The U.S. versions have a different numbering system and differ from the 'standard' UK versions in the tubes which they use and in the form of the various plugs and sockets with the U.S. versions using "U.S." fitting and the UK ones using generally NATO fittings. The U.S. versions are all designated RA-17-CX: The X here representing a suffix number - e.g. the UK RA-17K is known as the RA-17-C12 in its USA version. So much for the inaccuracies which, in themselves, are not of great importance (and which could be expanded were it worthwhile to do so!).

Let me turn now to the subject postulated in my heading - "MONITORING = DXING???". Most DXers, I think, have visions that - one day when they are rich! - there will come a time when they will sit in front of racks full of expensive equipment of professional-marque and that they will then find it easy to become the No. 1 DXer of their age. I confess to having gone through this phase and Bill Whitacre expresses his similar feeling when he writes: "I suppose my yearning for an RA-17 started way back . . . where I saw a picture of Gregg Calkin seated in the CBC monitoring post in Ottawa, surrounded by Racals". Ten years or so ago I was fortunate enough to make the first of many visits to the BEC's Monitoring Service station at

Caversham, not 40 miles west of London: a visit which marked the start of a long friendship with Gordon Weston, later the Chief Monitor of the Service's "Special Listening Section." In the course of a crowded day's visit to the "works" I recall commenting to Gordon, and later to John Sheringham, then assistant head of the Monitoring Service, that "it must be wonderful to be paid to do what I do as a hobby - DXing." Perhaps I may be forgiven - there were the British opposite numbers of Gregg Calkins "surrounded by Radals" and various other exotic pieces of monitoring equipment with an antenna farm backup which defied description. However, the important thing was that Messrs Weston and Sheringham made clear to be that professional monitoring is no way anything like DXing: the two occupations are as different as chalk is from cheese. "Monitoring" represents, in essentials, listening to a foreign broadcast which must be virtually 100% audible in order to capture from it its news or commentary content. DXing in contrast represents the capture of a foreign signal with the basic purpose of identifying the station and then extracting sufficient information from the signal to allow a report to be made (leading to a QSL, one hopes!). Put another way - a signal of 50% readability will suffice for the average DX report; a signal which isn't of say 90% readability is valueless for professional monitoring purposes. The professional monitor will, 9 times out of 10, know what he is listening to: his interest is in extracting valuable information from it - contrast this with the DXer carefully noting "IS and ID at 0300," and later "0304 - gamelan music with YL." The two worlds are quite different: and so are the receivers required for the pursuit of the two occupations.

Few DXers who have a wide experience of receivers would claim that the RA-17K (or -L) was the best receiver for DXing! Its audio quality leaves something (undefinable) to be desired and it certainly is not a match in that quarter for, say, the old G.E.C. BRT-400/402 series of receivers which are to be found at many monitoring stations, or even the old AR-88D. BUT given a signal that is readable then the RA-17 will hold it like a demented octopus and if you "LOCK" the frequency then it will stay on that frequency 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, for year after year! As a 'Racal' user for 7 years - and one who would not be parted from my RA-17K except by Armageddon itself! - let me admit that for DXing my choice is the "Eddystone" 730/4 (out of production for years) teamed with a good FET pre-selector and antenna matching unit. That will make readable signals which the 'Racal' doesn't want to know because it has the advantage of "crystal phasing" and much better audio quality: Nor let us forget the FRG-7's superb quality on easy-listening stations. One will find some strange receivers in regular use on monitoring stations (see my monograph "A Layman Looks at Caversham", now out of print): One must consider just what they are for. If you can provide an S9 + 40 dB signal then the monitor wants the receiver with the best audio quality to make his job of transcription easier -- it doesn't have to be anything as sophisticated as a 'Racal.' Ten years ago, or thereabouts, Caversham was using 'Drake' SPR-4 and 'Eddystone' EB-37 receivers in those circumstances (see, again, the monograph). Neither would qualify as the greatest DX receiver in my estimation!

The "comparison" which Whitacre makes between the R-4B, the "Collins" marque, and the RA-17 is, in my view, quite valueless -- one might as well compare a Rolls-Royce Silver Cloud, the Ford Model 'T' and the Polski Fiat. Each has its uses, within certain definite parameters -- the Polski Fiat would look rather silly carrying President Carter and his retinue of secret servicemen. The Rolls would look somewhat out of place carrying pigs to mart on a dirt road in Idaho. Horses for courses! But courses vary and what is good for one is not the best for another. Monitoring is not DXing as any professional, or semi-professional, monitor will testify, they are as far apart as a Muslim and a Seventh Day Adventist. Both hope to make Heaven but is their Heaven the same place -- I wonder!

Finally - lest anyone should read these words as a "slug" at Bill Whitacre, which it certainly is not - let me agree with his final comment on the RA-17 . . . "It's also the first new toy I've had which I wasn't bored with in the first week." It is a superb, finely tuned (like a racing car), delight-to-own, reliable, tough, versatile in operation, aesthetically pleasing, ergonomically admirable piece of radio gear: Get one and you will fall under its spell and become, maybe, a professional monitor. For that, there just isn't a better receiver than the RA-17! Proof? Well, the U.S. Navy (on at least one contract) bought them in preference to "Collins", Whitacre says that GRC used them - why not "Collins" or "Drake" (much, much cheaper)? They are sold around the world although the design goes back 20 odd years. Why? Because they are professional monitoring receivers, not DXing tools, and that's what the purchasers wanted. What about the R-4B did I hear someone say? A great receiver for DXing! Point made I trust. Professional monitoring organizations aren't exactly devoid of money, even if it is yours and mine - they buy the best for the job: That is why one finds "Racal" in so many locations.

Finally - and I mean it! - this article owes nothing to "Racal" (from whose Technical Department I have always had every assistance I could require) nor to BBC Monitoring Service beyond the fact they showed me that monitoring does not equal DXing and the needs of the activities are quite distinct. The thoughts and comments in this article are mine and owe nothing to anything or anyone but experience and conversation and discussion with many others interested in radio. The guy with the letter then asked his friend, can we give him a receipt for this and take it as evidence? "Na, this has nothing to do with the CB anyways!" It must be noted though, that when he said that he was going all he could to restrain himself from laughing. I then saw my life flash before my eyes when the first guy said, "but it has something to do with the Voice of the Voyager though." My response to this was, "well whats the Voice of the Voyager?" The way I saw it, I had only one choice, make a run for it, hop in my truck and head for the border! But it was just my luck, I remembered the gas tank was empty! Then I thought maybe I should just fight to the end, I firmly planted myself on the floor and waited with calm coolness to see what would happen. I was ready for anything, I would not let them scare me, no sir! So that was the bust, it was very exciting, really. I must confess that I almost enjoyed myself! So now that the government knows about the station, I guess you folks might as well.

The Voyager, what does it mean? It is a symbol of freedom, not radical political freedom such as in free radio, but more a personal freedom. The freedom to express yourself just the way you want, with no fear of reaction from some sort of higher force (such as Uncle Charley). Just as the early voyageurs were free as they explored the wilderness of America, so was the Voice of the Voyager free as it explored and tested the idea of free creative expression. Yes we did come to you in the spirit of the voyageurs; in the spirit of the freedom they had.

The one thing nice about free creative expression over free radio is that it is something that can not be taken away. They may take the radio away, but creativity is something we all have and always will. So even without the station, the thought still lives in another form. So that is why the station was there, we did try to liberate something, the human mind. For without the freedom to express ones free mind, we will no doubt retreat to the controlled state of some dictator who will tell us exactly what to think, and I don't think any of us want that. Or maybe the situation will become so bad that we will not know how to think for ourselves. In this age of computers and automation, we all must remember that we are people, and we all are different and we all have something to say; so we must not be afraid to say it. So whether you write, paint, speak, or sing, do it in the very best way you know how, it is your power to create, and it is vital to the human race if we are to survive that you use that power. Even if you don't think so, you do have something to give and you do have some input to make, so do it!

Well, if you have not guessed already I am a refugee from creative writing classes and am a strong believer in individual freedom to express ones self. Other than that I am kind of a nature freak, totally bummed out by natural beauty. I am also a semi-talented poet and a big dreamer. I think nothing is impossible until I have had a chance to try it out for myself. But I guess most of all, I am just plain old crazy. Too young to know any better and old enough to build and operate a shortwave station. I did get caught; I don't know exactly what will happen to me, but I won't let it bother me. I learned so much, about myself and about the radio world. Besides, I was fighting for something I truly believe in, and I guess for the rest of my life, I will keep on fighting for it. I suppose I was given that course to keep on fighting, even though the Voice of the Voyager is gone.


So the spirit of the voyageurs will still live, that the FCC can never take from me.

RADIO BUDAPEST

BudapestThe History of Radio Budapest

Radio broadcasting in Hungary began on the first of December, 1925, although experimental work had been going on previously. There had been quite a serious tradition in the transmitting of music and news bulletins in Hungary. As a matter of fact, it was the first country to make use of the Telephonograph, which began operating as early as 1894. The inventor of the Telephonograph was Hungarian, Tivadar Puskas, who later collaborated with Edison. The Telephonograph was used for the transmission of news to subscribers on a local telephone like line. It also transmitted musical programmes from the 4th floor of an apartment house at 22 Rakoczi Street, Budapest. This house was later to become the first set of studios of Radio Budapest. Actual wireless broadcasting began in 1923 by engineers of the Hungarian Experimental Post Institute in Budapest. In 1924, the experimental institute began to attempt the reception of foreign broadcasts with a one tube, regenerative set. In 1925 the construction of the PKI 2 kW transmitter began on Csepel Island in Budapest. When it first began to put programmes over the air, Radio Budapest had 15,000 subscribers, most of them radio enthusiasts who had built their own receivers. In one year's time the number had grown to 50,000.

In 1927 a new Telefunken 3 kW transmitter was built in Csepel and at the same time the daily broadcasts were lengthened from 4 to 10 hours. In that same year the Post Office began building a 20 kW transmitter in Lakihegy, also on Csepel Island. The broadcast began on 7 April, 1928. The antenna was built on two 150 metre high steel towers. In 1933 a giant transmitter on 120 kW was begun at Lakihegy. The entire manufacture and construction of this transmitter was carried out by the Hungarian Standard Electricity Factory.

This new transmitter began operating in December of 1933 and was officially named Budapest One. A new antenna 314 metres high was built, in proportions and method far ahead of countries that were richer and more developed than Hungary, and at that time it was the highest steel construction on earth. As a point of interest, it should be mentioned that the 480 ton weight of the tower was supported against the wind by a 9 cm thick porcelain insulator. The antenna was very good from the electrical point of view because its height passed half of the transmitted wavelengths. This ensured transmission without fading day and night. The 20 kW equipment was modernized and began transmitting the programmes of Radio Budapest Two. The shortwave station at Szekesfehervar began broadcasting in the 1930s and transmitted overseas programmes.

Unfortunately the Second World War completely demolished the equipment of the Hungarian Radio. The withdrawing Nazi troops not only blew up installations, but in many cases dismantled the equipment. So by the end of the war Hungary was without any radio station. The staff of the Post Office did heroic work in reconstructing the stations. One part of the equipment which had been carried off was found on the western frontier, and Radio Budapest was first heard again on 1 May 1945. By the end of 1948, the Hungarian Standard Factory had built the new 135 kW equipment which has been functioning without interruption ever since. The 314 metre antenna tower was rebuilt. Budapest two was reconstructed at its new location in Szolnok, also with a capacity of 135 kW and is also used for broadcasting to other countries on medium wave.

Our two shortwave transmitters of 100 kW each and 3 transmitters of 15 kW broadcast on several bands in six languages - English, Spanish, German, Italian, Greek, and Turkish. In 1974, two new 250 kW shortwave transmitters were put into operation near the town of Jaszbereny and equipped with up-to-date antennae directed to North America, Asia, Australia, and New Zealand for our overseas services. In addition we have modernized the antennae of the old 100 kW stations and now use a rotary log-periodic antennae for external services.

Radio Budapest began to broadcast its DX programmes in 1957, among the first stations in the world to transmit special programmes for DXers. At present, Radio Budapest transmits DX programmes in English, German, Italian, and Spanish. It has very good contacts with radio enthusiasts from clubs and DX organizations throughout the world. On the initiative of our DXers, we formed our international DXers organization - the Radio Budapest Short Wave Club - in 1965, which now has nearly 10,000 members from all continents who act as official monitors of Radio Budapest and maintain permanent contact with our station.

The above information was provided me during a visit to Radio Budapest on 21 July 1978. I would like to add some personal observations. There are 26 studios for the foreign section. There was certainly no time for a visitor to see them all, but I was introduced, guided, escorted, informed, about the many functions. All equipment was of first class quality and so are the crews and staff members. The various foreign languages are spoken well. Broadcasts are conducted in many languages and copies made are distributed to various parts of the world. For instance I saw one being made for Radio Australia and another for a Spanish speaking country. The operation seems well organized and there is a relaxed atmosphere. Workmen are building yet more studios, but without excessive noise that would disturb operations.

It sounded more like work in a hospital, where the volume of noise must be kept down. All equipment used in operation at Radio Budapest are almost completely produced in Hungary. The people I met during my tour included Dennis Herner, the editor of Radio Budapest Short Wave Club, Vera Sarkany, a news translator and reader, Julia Gero, secretary of the English section, Gyorgyi Jacabi, studio editor, and Laszlo Pinter, editor and announcer.



ANOTHER LOOK AT THE RADIO SHACK DX-300

Information provided by Michael Salay, Cincinnati, OH, provides more detail on the DX-300, that should be available in some places by the time you read this. We would like to have hands-on reviews ASAP, hopefully for the November SWC.

Radio Shack is entering the shortwave listening market with a more sophisticated successor to its popular DX-160 series. The DX-300 is designed along the same lines as the Yaesu FRG-7000 and uses the Quartz crystal controlled Wadley loop for frequency synthesis. It is a triple conversion receiver with the first IF at 54.5-55.5 MHz, the second at 2-3 MHz and the third at 455 kHz. Frequency coverage is 10 kHz to 30 MHz, presumably continuous. Sensitivity for 10 dB SN ratio is 1 uV at 900 kHz and 0.5 uV at 7.1 MHz. It includes a three step signal attenuator, LED frequency readout, a 6 element ceramic filter, a built in code oscillator, RF gain control, audio bandwidth control, a product detector and a screw-on whip antenna for portable use. Power is 120 VAC or 12 VDC. The dial lights are switchable. The antenna input accepts either a 50 ohm balanced load or unbalanced. Price, about \$400. Sounds great? Now the bad news. The selectivity is given as ± 3 kHz at -6 dB, that translates to 6 kHz, about par with the FRG-7000 and the RF-4800, and only marginally adequate for normal shortwave listening. It is inadequate for DXing and there is only the one bandwidth available. The selectivity is listed at 10 kHz at -70 dB, that is 20 kHz, much too broad for the strong stations. I hope that it is easily modified. DXers I have talked with generally find that a filter with 4 kHz and about 10 kHz is adequate for normal listening and most would like to have a filter of about 2.5 and 7 for DXing. There is some loss of audio quality to be sure, but why would anyone build a fine sounding triple conversion receiver like the DX-300 with 6 and 20 kHz filter, its beyond me.

Gilfer Associates, P. O. Box 239, Park Ridge, NJ 07656, has modified FRG-7 models with the GAR frequency counter still available. Prices on the FRG-7 will go up on 15 October and those on the modified FRG-7000 on 1 October. They also have the 1977 NRC Domestic Log available as well as the Danish Shortwave Club Tropical Band Survey. They offer the Mizuho SX-59 preselector \$87.00. We suggest you write for a price list or call them at 201-391-7887.





Distorted, certain not rx-generated fluke; next night BBC back. How did this audio feed mixup occur? (Harry Helms, SC) Sackville 9535 spur overriding 9410? (gh) LN-15

CAPE VERDE São Vicente on 3930 closes at 2400, "De República Cabo Verde, transmite Rádio Clube São Vicente". Nx in PT 2200-2225, local & sports nx 2300-2330. IS: two gongs (P. Karagianis, England, NL)

CENTRAL AFRICAN EMPIRE Bangui drifting down to 4991, varying to 5006, at *0430, 2300* (Pitt McNeil, 30/8) 4999 powerhouse 25/8 2154-2302*; next day on 4997 (Jerry Berg, MA) On Sun 10/9 hrd on 4999.5 (Caversham, BBC WRC 13/9) Also on 5005, 5020 at *0430, 2300* (Noël Green, BBC WRC 13/9) Nominally and formerly 5038, of course (gh)

CHINA On 16/8 R. Peking had two different EG programs on 25 and 31m freqs, judging from news coverage of Hua's travels, recorded days, perhaps weeks apart! (Todd Thompson, CA, Sept. REVIEW OF INTERNATIONAL BROADCASTING) And shipped to relays by muleback? (gh)

COLUMBIA R. Nueva Granada in Bogotá has changed name to R. Suceso (Santo Domingo DX Club, via SCDX 12/9) Letter dated 23/7 but R. Nueva Granada was hrd 30/7 on 6160 (John Trautschold, SPEEDX, SCDX 12/9). However, R. CONGO Brazzaville no longer uses 6115 and 9715 (R. Ginbey, RSA, NL) 15190 no longer available, but a FR stn with similar IS hrd *1000 on 15210 weakly u/Cairo 15210 (Karagianis, NL)

COSTA RICA R. Universidad on 6097, had a talk pgm, apparently weekly, around 0240 on a local Sat. Most other times, it's classical music (Pitt McNeil, DX, 27/8)

CUBA R. Habana is reported relaying R. Moscow programmes in SP on 15235 at 2340 (John Woodley, England, SCDX 12/9) Again, I doubt this very much; I heard nothing at that time and freq, but usual RHC on 15230 (gh)

CYPRUS R. Bayrak, I thought I would never hear, and never would have if it didn't quit 6118. But it came in on 6279m on the first look, right after hearing the change anc'd on RCI DX. At 0325 with vocal anthem, 0327 Turkish talk, vocals, no DJ interruption to 0351 f/out; SIO 332, station 302! (Richard Stoller, NY)

CHILE (Cf Sept LN-7) R. Agricultura has returned to 9630 (BBCMS 31/8)

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC In response to your questions, I found out that Rudy Espinal is no longer working at R. Clarín or at any other radio station in Santo Domingo. There is no possibility that R. Clarín resumes international service in English, as they were too dependent on Balaguer's government; that is, they received help for payroll, electric light and other services that are not going to be paid by the present government. Because of this there has been a reduction of employees at the station (César Objío, Sto. Domingo 7/9) R. HAITI A new Haiti SW stn is on the air on 5645, 0200*. Quite good in the daytime, but no ID whatsoever. You should be able to get and ID on this clear channel (Dick Clark, Dom Rep) Tried several times, but no luck here (gh) 4VEH is operating only on MW, 11835 having been taken off the air by order of the Haitian military government. Now Haiti is one of the rarest DX countries (SCDX via PLAY-DX 4/9) I think this is slightly out of date, but where did this 'by order of the military govt' story come from? (gh) 5645 "4VAM"? (Clark) LN-15

HUNGARY R. Budapest I visited 21/7. There are 26 studios in the Foreign Section. It is a very relaxed atmosphere and quiet as a hospital even though workmen are building more studios. Almost all their equipment is Hungarian-made, of first-class quality. So are the crews, and staff-members (Leslie Byron, CANDX, via Sept. REVIEW OF INT'L BROADCASTING)

INDIA AIR reported 6/9 that several of the Delhi MW xmtrs were off the air due to flood, as were the Kingsway group of SW xmtrs, but the HF xmtr at Khanpur was functioning (BBCMS)

ISRAEL There should be a significant reduction in jamming on the bands from sunset 10/10 to sunset 11/10, as Israel Radio takes its yearly day off the air for Yom Kippur (gh) IBA ES reported that for the first time since the Hebrew HS relay on SW began in 1974, frequency announcements were being made. There was some doubt as to how to phrase them in proper grammatical Hebrew. (Ugusa) Udom Sai weak with peak around 1130 on 6909. Vientiane HS almost untraceable on 6130 due to QRM and foreign language service completely lost--Laos one of few countries whose regional stns are received easier and stronger than centrals! (Isao Ugusa; all from FEDXR)

LIBYA R. of the Holy Qur'an was hrd briefly evening of 18/8 conducting, presumably, tests on 1611 kHz (BBCMS)

MADAGASCAR 3288 has moved to 3285 where it is co-channel to SABC at 1915 (Colin Miller, RSA, R. Australia Club Forum 23/9)

MEXICO XEWW still irr. active on 15177, local nx 0340 GMT Thu; hitherto more often hrd daylight weekends sports. Do not confuse with V. of Chile 15175v. XEQM, Su Pantera, Mérida, *1100 on 6105; might make it to winter Lapland DXpeditions (Richard E. Wood, NH)

NAMIBIA R. RSA announced 21/8 that the Administrator General of SWA said an interim Radio Board would assume control of radio services in the territory this week. The Board, consisting of prominent but not politically active SWAs would decide on the contents of radio services, 'to counteract the vicious and sometimes extremely dangerous enemy propaganda beamed to the territory by SW stations from places such as Lusaka and Luanda' Presumably a reference to SWAPO's "Voice of Namibia" programmes. Local BC is on FM only (BBCMS 24/8)

NETHERLANDS I've been wondering how long R. Nederland could go lacking a postal code, and here is the answer (gh) Please start using our new postal code, 1200-JG (DX Juke Box 22/9)

NEW HEBRIDES N.H. Broadcasting Service has been formed out of the two former Residency Broadcasting Depts (British & French) and the unified organisation is located at Melitco House, in the centre of Vila, headed by Mr Jean Massias (N.H. News via Kelvin King, NZDXT)

OMAN BBC audible on 11955 from 0300 3/9, QRM Lebanon; Cyprus on at 1330 same freq, better sig (Gerry Bishop, MT)

PAPUA NEW GUINEA R. Milne Bay apparently runs 15min nx 0930 in local lang, then full ID 0945, hrd 18/8 thru 20/8 on 3360 (Gerry Bishop, MT) (Cf Sept LN-5) Now Port Moresby hrd on 9780, 26/8 0750-0810, not on 4890 or 9520; but on 27/8 at 1045, on 4890. P2K4/P2T4 have capability for three normal freqs: 4890, 9520, 9575. Presumably the xtal oscillator also has LC nets for these freqs. If we assume the 'crystal switch' is defective, then these combinations of erroneous freqs are possible: 4760 (9520 xtal with 4890 LC net), 9780 --

(4890 xtal with 9520 or 9575 net), and 4787.5 (9575 xtal with 4890 net). 4787.5 explains the discrepancy between 4785 mentioned on R. Australia, and 4790 per Bill Heath (Richard M. Utter, NY) Right on! I confess not having checked when I heard '4790' to see if it was actually 4787.5 (gh)

PERU R. Ayaviri on 5035, OBX7F, ops at 1100-1700 & 2130-0400, per letter (NL) Radio Ayaviri now uses 5778 instead of 5035. R. Sicuani now on 4965, ex-4835. R. Esmeralda now on 5300, not R. Los Andes (Jean-Jacques Bloch, SAM, SCDX 22/8) R. Sicuani on 4865; R. Abancay on 4934 (J-J Bloch, on HCJB DX Party Line 19/9) Rarely hrd stn here is R. Mínería, La Oroya on 6145, hrd from *1100 to 1200, frequent IDs, fair, between ABC stns (P. Bunn, R.A.)

PHILIPPINES FEBC on 11763 ending "SW Mailbag" at 0900, amnt for 11765 only, where Brazil was strong; 8/9 (Jerry Berg, MA)

SIERRA LEONE SLBS 5980, Afr mx 2300, pgm preview 2310, "Great Worship Hour" from Peoria 2315, religious talk 2350, off 0001 after final ID and anthem; many TCs, usually low audio, 3/9 (Jerry Berg, MA) Leaping right in there the first day R. RSA off 5980 at 2230 (gh)

SURINAME The unID "Super Radio" on 4855 is "Super Radio Station" SRS, on 4850 (SCDX 19/9)

SWEDEN R. Sweden celebrated its 40th birthday 1/9. That day also marked the official retirement of our well-loved DX Editor Arne Skoog, who has promised to fade away rather than vanish, and will be filling in as DX Editor from time to time. There was also to be a special 1500th edition of SCDX 26/9 (SCDX 5/9)

U K O G B A N I Please note that the very small BBC MS section which produces World Broadcasting Information and schedules (amongst other things) is called World Schedules Section. It consists of myself, a full-time and a part-time secretary and one monitor at any one time. The use of the title Special Listening Section was discontinued some years ago (Richard G. Measham, Chief Monitor, W.S.S., 13/9)

Georgi Markov, once one of Bulgaria's most prominent playwrights, died 11/9, after saying he had been poisoned by a stab in the leg from an umbrella carried by a man with a foreign accent. An autopsy on Markov, 49, failed to determine 12/9 whether or not his death was natural. Modern poison agents are so sophisticated that science may never be able to ascertain how Markov died. But Markov himself was in no doubt about what had happened. He had been broadcaster for RFE, DW, and most recently, the BBC (Bernard D. Nossiter, Washington Post 13/9, via Paul Gough, CT) dateline: London

VENEZUELA R. Nueva Esparta, 2340, may be the only LAM station with a QSL Department; hrd around 0300 (Jan Tunér, RN DXJB 14/9) R. Guacáipuro has changed its name on 6150 to R. Armonía; R. San Cristóbal has reactivated 9750 (Ricardo Pérez M., Aconcagua DX Club)

CLANDESTINE CRANNY Voice of Burmese People on 6304 kHz has broken their monthly time change pattern, in Aug on at 1330-1430 instead of expected 1030-1130 (Isao Ugusa, FE DX Review)

Radio Freedom of South Yemen, hostile to P.D.R. of Yemen, on 9953 (ex 9960) and 5345, re-timed start of 3-hr eve xmsn to 1700 during Ramadan, but should revert to 1600 on or about 2/9. RFSY also broadcasts at 1130-1430 (BBCMS 31/8)

Voice of Arab Syria + Voice of One Lebanon reverted to 9510 from 9522 30/8 (BBCMS 7/9)

Voice of Palestine, Voice of Palestine Revolution pgm, in AR thru R. Baghdad, obs 1800-1900 on 11935 in addition to 9550 (BBCMS 24/8) VOPVOPR announced 12/9 that it would use 1138 kHz ex-1520 from 13/9, at 1000-1100 & 1400-1600, with duration of the latter increased some-time in future (BBCMS 14/9)

Free Voice of Corsica has been heard since 2/9 or 3/9 on the FM band in FR, Corsican (SCDX 19/9)

R. Sandino (Cf Aug LR-C-7449) Tho I know of no reports of this during the recent war in Nicaragua, Aaron Hywarren sent me a tape of his reception on 11/6, and I confirm that the station on the tape did indeed ID as R. Sandino (gh) According to press reports, there exists an anti-Somoza station in the Nicaragua mountains on the 40m band, changing location and frequency constantly. Its name is R. Sandino (Giovanni Mora Céspedes, ADXCI) UnID SP stn on 7090 at 0240 tune-in 14/9, male speaker mentioning Nicaragua, Africa, and Castro; heavy QRM, much apparently deliberate. No ID caught but not same voice previously hrd on R. Abdala and R. Rebelde; first anti-Castro activity hrd on 40m since June (H. Helms) KDOR pirate on 830 audible within 20mi of LA, strongest in Hollywood (Paul S. Lotsof, SWNS)

CFAB (cf Aug LN-9) I'm thinking this may be a Traveler's Info Station (TIS) at or near Niagara Falls. The freq of about 1620 would fit, and I recall reading of a TIS op in that area, but not sure if it's Canadian or USA operated. I'm checking into this one (Mike Hardester, Okinawa) I expect C.M. Stanbury can tell us if it's TIS or pirate (gh)

WGOR, 1630v, hrd back on the air 0337 17/9 with usual rock mx, young male ancrs; didn't hear which call using now. Hvy QRN, deep fades like a TA BCB signal--one minute of audio out of every five. Still at it past 0420; should be widely hrd this winter (Harry Helms SC)

WPNJ, 'commercial-free radio', hrd 0110-0130 18/8. No music; off the wall talks by OM; annnt of a special guest appearance Oct. 1 by Walt Disney on the wings of Houdini; also, an all-out attempt by WPNJ to make all the listeners' lights blink on the count of three. It didn't work. Announced location was New York, power 100 watts, on 1625 kHz. Audio quality poor due to hum; long periods of fade-out and static. SINPO 14211; lost at 0130 (Steven Kontos, Centereach NY) KQRM, IA LN-15

Voice of the Voyager hrd 20/8 *0401-0612 on 5850; announced this was their last xmsn, and accepted calls at 212 number. Reception very poor to 0430, lost after 0612, so did not hear any explanation (David Uglow, 27 Overhill Rd, Rocky Point NY 11778) Received QSL which to my surprise had return address: 4306 Adair Av. No., Crystal MN 55422. On the QSL where the words "Everyone is trying to catch (but never will...)" are written, the last part is scratched out in red ink and above it is written the words "and did". Were they caught by the FCC? (Ken George, MO) Yes--a week AFTER they had voluntarily closed down. That out of the way, the Top Man saw no further reason to hide his identity--Mike Martin. He's telling the VOV story in more detail elsewhere. While the 'bust' was quite cordial, I understand that the FCC subsequently threatened to revoke his FCC licenses. Meanwhile, Mike has moved to Ely MN (gh)

Britain Radio International first hit airwaves Sun 13/9/76, with 6 watts, a week later 10 watts, third and subsequently, with 50 watts ERP with class B modulator. Freqs used were 6210 6220 6265; aeriels were dipoles. Terminated 9/1/77 due to re-organisation of stn and equipment. On 26/12/76, spl xmsn of 200 w on 6265 was made, also on 7 and 21 MHz with 100 watts. 1/1/77 a xmsn of 250w on 6265. Since then, xmsns from time to time on 6225 on 25 or 80 watts; hopes to operate on VHF 96.8 MHz and possibly test on MW later (Pat Travers, Free Broadcasting Review, World DX Club August mid-monther)

R. Viking was raided at 1100 10/9 and closed down by Danish postal authorities (SCDX 19/9)

Spy Numbers Hrd typical series of numbers in Spanish 0820-0830 on 9362; a half hour later the same freq was used by R. Peking. Does this make any sense? (D. Cartner, Australia, SCDX 22/8) It gives one a rather good idea where the spy station is (Geo. Wood, SCDX Ed.)

FUTURE PLANS BANGLADESH R. Bangladesh reported 24/8 that the UN Development Programme had approved a project costing US\$ 2.8 million for the development of radio & TV broadcasting services in the country, to be carried out by UNESCO and ITU over a 3½ year period, mainly training personnel (BBCMS 31/8)

BOTSWANA (Cf July LN-11) A hot scoop: An agreement is being signed for VOA to put up in very short order here a new relay station of 6 250 kW xmtrs (Swiss SW MGR 26/8)

CAMEROON Projected fqs for Yaoundé International but not yet in use are 5960 7290 11875 15215 and 17750 (P. Karagianis, England, NL)

CANADA RCI is under the gun. Life and death situation again apparently confronts RCI, brought on by PM Trudeau's move to slash government spending, leading up to the next election expected this fall or early next year. In a letter addressed to employees in mid-August, CBC president Al Johnson said the proposed \$71 million cut from spending with the 1979-80 budget--not the present season's budget--will be made more deeply in areas of hardware than programming. This is the first guiding principle when deciding where the imposed cuts will be made. "The second principle is that activities which are ancillary to our central job of providing Canadian programming to Canadians will be cut more deeply than expenditures on Programming. For example, RCI, which broadcasts outside of Canada, will be subjected to a rigorous re-examination." RCI went thru such a re-examination in the past 2 years and some consolidation took place and firing of some staffers brought on by a re-organization. To just what extent RCI's activities will come under the axe will depend on the decision of the CBC board of directors, when the election takes place, and who is elected and the conviction to carry through with the promises of cuts, or actually freezes, on the CBC budget in the next fiscal year starting April 1 (David James, PQ, Sept. REVIEW OF INTERNATIONAL BROADCASTING) When I first learned of this I wrote the president of CBC indicating my disappointment at the possibility of another cut in RCI services. I received a prompt, courteous, but not too encouraging reply from Jack Lusher, CBC P.R. Manager: "We do have to respond to the cut in our budget and as RCI's activities are peripheral to our basic purpose, it will almost certainly be one of the services to feel some of the effects of the budget reduction. To what extent this might impinge on our SW service to the US, I cannot say at this time." His addr.: Box 8478, Ottawa K1G 3J5 (Brian Rogers, MI RIB) more CANADA LN-15

COSTA RICA TIUCR, R. Universidad de Costa Rica, has received permission to increase SW power on 6105 from 1 to 100 kW (R. Sweden's Jorge Ulate-Segura, SCDX 5/9) Widely heard on 6097-98 recently; already increased? (gh)

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC (Cf LN-7) In the new govt there is a reorganization of the official stn R. TV Dominicana. Everything is being checked to see what they have and what can be used. New transmitters will be bought and there is going to be an international service on SW, frequencies to be used will be the old ones, 5970 relaying the MW pgm, and 9505 for the I.S.; there is also a possibility that new freqs will be added in the 60, 49, 31, 19 and 16m bands. More information later (César Objfo, Dominican Republic, 7/9)

FINLAND When I visited the RF studios in July, I recorded a 10-minute talk on propagation from Finland to NAM, frequency choice, the pointlessness of competing with BBC and DW on 15105, etc. It may produce some results at least in the November sked (Richard E. Wood, NH)

FRANCE The expansion of RFI will be discussed by the govt probably in November. As far as we are informed, no changes will be made in 1979; that means no extension to the western hemisphere. We do hope to have the possibility to improve the actual transmission of France Inter in French but surely not in Spanish or English before 1980. The support of your Club is of great value to us. We are collecting all the petitions of your members as well as the letters of other American listeners in order to prepare a special document meant to prove to our govt that there are really interested listeners who wish a special transmission of RFI for the USA (M. Rick, RFI Public Relations, 4/9 letter to Matthew Brown, RFI Listeners Club, 3310 Picardy Ct, Mequon WI 53092)

HAWAII (Cf Aug LN-12, Sept LN-13) A number of questions cannot be answered until a construction permit has been granted. The application was originally made by the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association (not KAIM or WRMF-HCJB). HCJB's only involvement in this project was assistance in programming and engineering. The project was and still is a B.G.E.A. project. There has been no formal discussion of transfer, although we have heard the same rumors you have heard. To my knowledge, the BGEA has not had any indication from the FCC as to when they expect to take action on this application (Abe C. Van Der Puy, WRMF President, 22/8 letter to David L. Walcutt, TX)

LEBANON A new stn called The Voice of United Lebanon is to go on the air, with a 100 kW MW xmttr to cover Naf, and a SW xmttr directed towards the USA, SAM, Au, to be located in Ehen, northern Lebanon. Altho supported by the Zghorta of the former Christian president Soleiman Frangié, the station's director says it will be only 'nationalist' (newspaper L'Alsace, via Jean Marbach, France, SCDX 5/9)

MADAGASCAR R. Moscow reported 5/9 that among the various installations to be built in Madagascar with Soviet assistance is a powerful radio station (BBCMS 7/9)

MAURITANIA LN-15

MALDIVES With the help of UNDP, R. Maldives is going to modernise its entire set up. Ah SLBC engineer has recently given his recommendations. Studios are to be shifted to the other side of the island, and linked to xmttr site via FM. Also likely to get two or three 30 to 50 kW xmttrs, and are going to change antenna systems, since the present ones are ineffective and do not cover all the islands. With the new antennas the will also be able to cover India, Pakistan & Sri Lanka effectively (A. J. Sampath, visiting Maldives, IDXCI Sept)

NETHERLANDS Happy Station will issue a special 50th anniversary QSL on 19/11. 4000 special numbered QSLs twice the size of the usual ones and golden in colour are to be printed, and issued to the people who report that 'day's programme, on first-come, first-serve basis. Once gone they will not be reprinted (S. Muralidhar, Bangalore, Sept. IDXCI DX Digest)

NEW HEBRIDES R. Tanafo plans putting the 0730-0900 EC back on the air, and adding, probably after 0900, pgms in EG & FR for foreign listeners (John Campbell, NL)

NEW ZEALAND R. New Zealand has just celebrated its 30th anniversary on SW. The initial purpose was to present listeners abroad with 'an accurate picture of life in NZ'. In 30 years this role has been barely achieved, if at all, hindered from the outset by inadequate transmitter output. It would be difficult to find a technical parallel anywhere in the world. NZ is trying to provide a satisfactory service over a 3 million square mile area of the South Pacific with ageing, low powered transmitters. Interviewed this year in the NZ International Review, former BBC External Service staffer and now Director-General of RNZ, Geoffrey Whitehead said there is a case for a properly equipped SW service from NZ, but there is a continuing debate as to whether sending taped material to local stations is a better approach. A 1973 White Paper proposed two xmttrs of 50 or 100 kW to reach local communities in the South Pacific with good quality suitable for local relay. A change in govt since then resulted in no action. The gradual deterioration through age of the xmttrs and antennas at Titahi Bay will soon force a decision. Next year, WARC is sure to approve the extension of the ISWBC bands. It is vital that NZ be part of the action! As a nation, we have a contribution to make to the international community and ISWBC is one proven way to get the message across. We urge the govt to commit itself, thru the Foreign Affairs Ministry, to the upgrading of our SWBC service. (Aug. NZ DX Times editorial)

NORWAY Heard on this weekend's BC that approval has been given for new xmtrs which will come on stream in 1982 (David James, Québec, 22/8)

SEYCHELLES (?) A BBC team are touring the Indian Ocean islands looking for a new relay site, such as the Seychelles (SCDX 19/9) FEBA found the license fee rather high there (gh)

SRI LANKA SLBC is shortly to start a commercial service beamed to West Asian countries, in Arabic, English and Hindi. On 1/10, SLBC would also inaugurate a new DS "Channel 3" exclusively for sports, news, interviews, on the air 1½ hours per day Mon-Fri and 6 hours Sats & Suns. And TV is to start in 1/79 (newspaper 'Sun' via BBC MS 14/9)

SWITZERLAND We are definitely dropping the 'worldwide' reference to our omni-directional xmsns. Surprisingly, they do seem to get around the world well, but not to the extent that we can justify the term 'worldwide'. (Bob Zanotti, SBC DX editor, 14/9 letter to gh)

UKOGBANI I have heard that Capital Radio, the British commercial rocker, is planning to go SW with 2,000 kW. It is possible that such stations would broadcast live concerts and the like to attract a worldwide audience (Gordon L. Byrd, Jr., The Skywave Bulletin, FL) Doubt.

U S A RCA American Communications has been awarded a contract by ITT World Communications for a Washington-West Coast relay via satellite of VOA signals intended for broadcast to the eastern hemisphere. The contract covers approx. \$1.2 million of domestic satellite services over 47 months. The system will eliminate terrestrial segments of the VOA's relay to the West Coast. The NASA Goddard Space Flight Center earth station will transmit to the satellite, which will distribute the signals to three earth stations in California. Fifteen-foot receive-only stns will be built, owned and operated for govt's use by RCA Americom at Dixon and Delano. RCA's major San Francisco-area earth station will also receive the VOA signals. From there they will be carried by Comsat's Jamesburg Gateway stn for transmission by ITTWC to Intelsat for relay to the Philippines, and from there to Asia. This represents the use of double satellite hops to distribute communications, a first for the US govt, says RCA Americom. The domestic portion of the program will begin this summer, while the international portion will commence in spring 1979. VOA is expanding its xmsns from three to four 5 kHz audio circuits. All four will be fed directly from Goddard to the California stations via satellite (Communications News, July, via SWNS)

VENDA The govt of Venda has announced it will have its own radio service when the territory becomes a republic in mid-1979 (R. Ginbey, RSA, NL) Another "Transkei" homeland (gh)

IN MY OPINION

JAMMING (Andrew C. Robins, MI) As you recall, the Spanish service of R. Habana was jammed soon after the coup d'état in Chile. The speculation in U.S. DX circles was as you would expect: the jamming came from Chile. But as Richard Wood and others pointed out at the time, none of the known SWBC xmters in Chile were taken out of service during the jamming. This doesn't preclude the use of point-to-point equipment, altho this is generally of power too low to be effective for jamming a station over a wide area like Chile. Doubt has been added about the location of these jammers from Habana. A friend of mine who won an RHC essay contest and visited Habana last year spoke with the head of the English service at RHC. This individual indicated that RHC was acutely aware of the jamming. He said that in RHC's opinion, the signals could not have come from Chile due to propagation problems ("the skip wasn't right"). I have to assume he was getting some of his info from RHC engineers. The obvious implication (to RHC anyway) was that the U.S. was the culprit. Altho RHC has a well-known ideological axe to grind in accusing the U.S. of jamming, the known facts are enough to make me wary of automatically assuming Chile was the jammer. According to the WRTH of the year of the coup, the highest-powered SWBC xmt in Chile was 10 kW, hardly enough for the sometimes massive jamming signals noted on RHC's freqs. It takes a lot of time (and money) to set up high-power SWBC transmitters and the complex antennas they require. Since the jamming appeared so soon after the coup, one wonders if there was enough time to set up such gear in Chile. And, as was noted, none of the regular SW outlets disappeared for the duration. Where was all this RF coming from? If not Chile (no time), or the U.S. (morality?), who then? My only guess would be Brasil which is ideologically close to Chile and which apparently has a few spare 250 kW Brown Boveri transmitters at Parque Rodeador outside of Brasilia. I don't take the conspiracy theories (flying transmitters, et al.) of Stanbury seriously, but I thought you would be interested in RHC's comment on the jamming. ###

Soviet Radio Jamming Proves Huge Expense. The Soviet Union spends almost twice as much money jamming RFE-RL broadcasts as the radio stations spend on the broadcasts themselves. RFE-RL vice president Nathan Kingsley told members of the Hartford area World Affairs Center Sunday the jamming system operated by the USSR costs about \$135 million, involves about 2000 transmitters and 5000 workers. Kingsley said the U.S. makes no effort to jam international.

broadcasts from R. Moscow to North America. He said such jamming is prohibited by international agreements, but 'the Russians do it anyway.' (UPI, New Haven Register 10/9, Gough) VOA site closings a loss for us (Malcolm Kaufman, NY) In response to the comments of Robert LaRose re the projected closings of the Bethany and Dixon VOA sites (July LN-13). This news disappoints me. Since I have no independent info of my own, I must accept Bob's criticism of these sites in terms of their delivery of signal to the target areas. Still, what we have here is a dispute between a stateside SWL and a DXer. For us listeners here in the states the closing of these sites will mean the loss of clear (if not regular) reception of various VOA and AFRIS transmissions. VOA's evening bloc to Africa especially will be lost to us. It may prove to be a boon for overseas listeners, and stateside DXers, but for someone like myself it will just mean a loss in some good, intelligent programming.

Disclaiming the bootleggers (Richard M. Utter, NY) The continual FRENEX disclaimers every time a bootleg station is mentioned, start to look a wee bit ridiculous. Dan Robinson's, on page 41, August issue ('watch for this one...NASWA does not support...') is a particular prize. If the informal meeting in Montreal is any indication, SPEEDX will probably adopt a policy of basing pirate coverage on that which would be accorded a legal station; I hope that NASWA will decide upon a similar policy. At least I hope that FRENEX readers are not to be forever afflicted with little 'no-no' notices every time the subject of bootleg broadcasting is raised.

gh: Well, in Sept & Oct we haven't been. I had an entirely different impression of SPEEDX's new policy--to cut down on their coverage of bootleg broadcasters.
