

As stressed in the first article in this series, there is no substitute for the knowledge gained by experience.

Rare DX depends on "conditions." That goes without saying. But what a DXer comes up with when conditions are right depends, to a large extent, on the store house of information and know-how he has to apply to the given situation. A good place to start is with the bands themselves. Most of the rare DX will be found in the bands below about 7MHz, the 41, 60, 90 meter bands; plus, to a lesser extent, 120 meters and the out-of-band stations. To start with, emphasize 60 meters, the single best band.

Concentration!

Concentrate your maximum listening efforts on 60. Later, you can expand your attention, in a similar way, to the other DX bands. Hours; spend dozens of hours, hundreds of hours if you can, learning what there is to be heard under normal conditions, under unusual band conditions. Get to know that span of frequencies like the back of your hand. In order to get the rare ones, you have to be able to quickly sort the usual from the unusual signals. When extra good conditions occur, you can't waste time on re-logs of previously heard stations when you could be coming up with new ones.

Can you, at any particular time of day, cruise 60 meters and with a fairly high degree of certainty, tentatively ID within 15 seconds, each of the stronger signals on the band? If you can't, you're operating under a real handicap!

On a good winter afternoon opening to Africa, can you tick 'em off as you tune down the line? Lome, 5047, ...Bangui, 5038 or 39...? If you can do this, the unusual signal should stand out, catch your attention, and you can spend your time logging it.

Concentration!

Concentrate on learning as much as you can about shortwave propagation, if not from a "book larnin'" theoretical approach, then from a practical "What can I hear?" approach. Learn to recognize and take advantage of reception patterns.

Most beginners know you can't expect low SW frequency reception at high noon local time. It is assumed you know why this is the case. There is no black magic in DXing. Propagation of DX signals depends on natural phenomena. The more you know about how and why distant shortwave signals reach you, the better you will be able to determine when to tune. There is plenty of material available for study if you only take the time and effort to seek it out.

For too long DXers have neglected this field of study. Only recently have some attempted to systematically study the matter of propagation of weak DX signals on SW.

But, theories aside, careful observation and recordkeeping should give you a good working knowledge of practical propagation.

Do you know, for example, the time of day, the time of year, when your chances of hearing a rare station are optimum? Do you know the great circle path between your receiving location and the target DX stations? Do you know, at any particular time of year, when paths of darkness exist for these stations? Do you know when you can normally expect the 60 meter Latins to fade out and the Asians to fade in in the morning?

ON TO THE TOP -- (continued)

Do you know that your best chances to hear the domestic All India Radio outlets, and the ultra-rare Kashmir, will be from about mid-December to mid-January, but that Indonesian reception has a much broader seasonal "window?" Do you know that the rare quiet night in mid-summer can bring in good African reception?

Keep records of excellent openings from various parts of the world. Look for patterns, daily, seasonally, geographically.

Geographical patterns can be broad or very selective. When you note the Peruvians coming in with exceptional strength, don't waste time with random tuning. Go after the specific unheard Peruvians you most want. Unusually powerful station signals from Togo? Hunt for other West Africans you need!

Don has also sent along the following tidbit about the early history of FRENEX, which ought to interest all of you.

The North American Shortwave Association was only a year and a half old in March 1963. It had survived some trying times: a shortage of funds, no mimeo machine of its own, a revolving-door editorial staff. Bill Eddings, who joined the club during its first year, was assuming a larger role in club operations. Within several months he would advance to executive editor, the 100-member club's chief honcho. He was then, however, editor of what was called "Friendship Corner," roughly equivalent to a headquarters section of the still unnamed bulletin.

It was Eddings who announced, in that bulletin, a contest to name the NASA (it wasn't until later that the "W" would be added to NASWA to prevent confusion with the space agency) bulletin.

"Let's hear from all of you...a name for our bulletin! Send your suggestions to hdq.," Eddings urged.

The winner of the contest, he announced, would be awarded his choice of any three of the following: 100 club QSL cards, a club stamp, 100 letterheads, or a year's free membership.

On the front page of the June 1963 bulletin Eddings announced the winner:

"Quite a task it was to select the winning entry for the 'Name The Bulletin' Contest which ended on May 1st. All told, there were 43 entrants, and some sent in as many as ten suggestions. After the final tally, however, it was Member Bill Harris who won all the marbles with his one and only entered suggestion: FRENEX."

Harris, from South Wales in Great Britain, was only the club's second overseas member when he joined NASA in November 1962.

Why FRENEX? Harris explained: "We of NASA, via our bulletin, are efforting (sic) to promote friendship and at the same time pass along our reports, experiences, items, articles pertaining to DX. Therefore FRENEX with an X added incorporated both Friendship and DX."

Eddings added: "And so 'tis, fellow NASA members. Henceforth, our bulletin will be known by this name and for this reason."

In continuing our listing of vintage receiving equipment, one cannot omit one of the earliest radio parts and manufacturing companies. The twenties saw two companies as being preeminent in these fields: Hammarlund Manufacturing and the National Company, Inc.

The National Company was famous for their knobs, dials, and coil parts which graced many kits and honebrew rigs. Their Malden, MA QTH was world-famous, as was their monthly letter to hams in QST magazine. One of the engineers chosen to write these epistles even went on to establish his own line of high-quality amateur gear. His name was James Millen.

I hope that the following list may bring back some fine memories to some of you, or possibly generate some future ones for all of us.

ICOM IC-R70 REVIEW

The newest entry in the digital readout communications receiver market is the ICOM IC-R70. ICOM already has a fine reputation as a manufacturer of amateur transceivers. The IC-R70 is their first entry in the general coverage receiver market, at least in the USA. It should be noted that two of their recent transceivers boast general coverage receiver sections, however, so they are not trading on entirely new ground.

List price of the IC-R70 is \$750 net. Most dealers are selling for just under \$700. If you can't get it for less than \$680, keep shopping! I bought an R-70 almost as soon as it came out, as a backup receiver to my Drake R-7A, which had to go back to the factory for a few days for warranty work. No previously available receivers in the under \$1000 category had any of the features I wanted, so I took a chance on the IC-R70, since it offered most of these features at an attractive price. In addition, it offers micro-processor control of many functions -- something no communications-grade receiver under \$1000 offers. I guess my only doubt was: would it turn out to be communications grade, or semi-pro grade -- or would it turn out to be a big toy? You see, the low price scared me. You wonder how much they can pack into a receiver for that price. To give you a sneak preview answer, this receiver is packed with features, the box is packed with components, and the schematic is one of the most complex I have seen in a long time. And -- it works well. There are several of what I feel to be shortcomings, but those features have to go with a \$700 receiver. I mentioned that the box is closely packed with components. There are a number of available receivers in the \$320-\$650 list price range, with very little inside the box, and less shielding.

I have now used the IC-R70 stand-alone for 10 days, and next to my Drake R7A for 3 weeks on a comparison basis.

The IC-R70 is a tough, complex receiver to evaluate -- much more so than any others in its price class. Moreover, for the purposes of this review, I will be comparing it to an R7A by Drake, which lists for more than twice as much. However, I feel I must compare it to the Drake, for the IC-R70 far outstrips anything in its own price class, and the next rigs up the ladder are the NRD-515 and the R7A. I don't have an NRD-515, so it was the R7A or nothing. Please bear in mind when you see side-by-side comparisons in this article that seem to slightly downgrade the ICOM that it lists for \$750, and the Drake, with its options, lists for almost \$1800.

First off, bare facts and specs. Since the IC-R70 is so new and as yet little advertised, I will cover the basic specs. Nominal 50 ohm antenna input, unbalanced, all bands. Extra connector for optional low-frequency longwire. Coverage 100 kHz to 29.999 MHz. Pushbutton selectable continuous general coverage, or ham bands only (including the new WARC-provided bands). Ten Hz step CPU-controlled synthesizer (PLL). Quadruple conversion, upconversion. Optional FM detector. Six-digit frequency readout to 100 Hz. Claims of very high stability -- less than 50 Hz per hour after warmup. CPU-controlled options, dual VFO memory. Optical shaft encoder tuning. Button choice of three tuning speeds. RF preamplifier. Attenuator. Passband IF tuning. Notch filter. Noise blanker with dual blanking widths. Two AGC speeds plus off. RIT (receiver incremental tuning). Filters supplied for 500 Hz, 2.3 kHz, and 6 kHz (at 6 dB points). RF gain, squelch, tone control. Modes: AM, SSB, CW, RTTY (RTTY output on back panel accessory jack). Monitor output for transceive monitoring. Front panel monitor volume control. For mobile use, 13.8 V DC input on accessory jack. (As with most communications receivers, there is no provision for internal batteries). As with the Japan Radio Company NRD-515, there is an extensive accessory socket on rear providing for future options such as remote memory and keyboard tuning.

The receiver has an all-metal cabinet, well-shielded from the outside world. Head-
phone jack, recorder jack, and speaker jack. Built-in front panel speaker.

The receiver is very compact and quite sturdy and solid. As far as I can tell, the receiver I bought met all published specs listed in the operator's manual.

Discovering how to use a microprocessor-aided general coverage receiver was a pleasant surprise, such as tuning fast, or moving quickly from the top of one tuning range to the (contiguous) bottom of the next highest tuning range. These "chores" are a pleasure, and instantaneous, on the IC-R70.

The 6-digit readout is a high-intensity blue fluorescent display. Very easy on the eyes. There is a front-panel dimmer switch for display and S-meter backlighting.

All tuning is via a CPU-controlled step synthesizer, with user-selectable steps of 10 Hz, 100 Hz, or 1 kHz. This receiver is fairly clean with regard to synthesizer phase noise (or noise sidebands) on the local oscillator signal. I do not have the necessary spectrum analyzer to go inside the rig and measure actual local oscillator phase noise -- but in actual day-to-day use there is little in evidence. Using the 500 Hz CW bandwidth,

and tuning CW signals on a quiet band, there are occasional weak secondary 'beats' observed as you tune across the signal). So, the IC-R70 should be considered quite clean in this respect. As you probably know, synthesizer phase noise is an attendant problem in any fully PLL-synthesized receiver, transceiver, or transmitter; it's only lately that many manufacturers are getting it under control. Yet even now, the best fully synthesized receivers in the under-\$6,000 price range still exhibit much more phase noise than most "tunable local oscillator"-type rigs from much cheaper price classes. In this regard -- and it may be a quirk of just my unit -- my rig shows what may be either a "birdie" or moisy local oscillator. When tuning in CW mode there is an occasional, high pitch, fixed-pitch "second heterodyne" present in the audio. When present, the pitch does not change with tuning.

Stability of the receiver is phenomenal. Even after a 30-40 minute warmup, there is not user-detectable drift for hour after hour. I wish I could say the same for my R7A -- which, although it does not drift badly, does drift, and more than a \$1700 receiver should.

I love the main tuning knob on the ICOM. It's hefty, and the finger-spinner detent on the knob is big enough and deep enough for easy use (Are you hearing me, Drake?) I've already mentioned that the ICOM has three selectable tuning speeds. In 10 Hz step, one half turn of the tuning knob equals about 600 Hz. In 100 Hz step, one half turn equals 5.3 kHz, and in 1 kHz steps, one half turn of the knob passes 53 kHz. These steps are selectable via three vertically-arranged pushbuttons next to the main knob. For comparison, my R7A, which is not fully synthesized, uses a permeability-tuned oscillator (PTO) with only one tuning rate -- approximately 12.7 kHz per half turn of the tuning knob. It's a good compromise, but it can't equal three different speeds.

The ICOM tunes in 1 MHz bands. Band is stepped up or down via up and down push-buttons. This entire receiver is electronically tuned via the CPU -- it has no pre-selector or bandswitch knobs. Over a hundred PIN diodes under CPU control choose appropriate synthesizer dividers and parameters, IF filters, and front-end bandpass filters. More on the PINS later.

There are two "VFO's". Really, this is just a catchall phrase for an A memory and a B memory. A and B VFO are chosen via an in-out pushbutton. An appropriate A or B is displayed to the left of the frequency readout. So, if VFO A is set on 194 kHz, and VFO B is set on 7560 kHz, you can switch from one frequency to the other at the push of a button. This, coupled with selectable rate tuning, means you can scan the bands almost as fast as your mind can keep up. I would like to see about another ten memory frequencies, and I assume this (an external memory/access unit) will be offered in the future as an option.

The IC-R70's receiver incremental tuning (RIT), when chosen by button, will change frequency by plus or minus 800 Hz. In keeping with most modern amateur transceivers, this change is not shown on the frequency display. I have never seen the sense in this "invisible" frequency change, and would much rather it be reflected in the display.

There is a very convenient tuning lock pushbutton which disables the main tuning knob; in addition, there are function pushbuttons for AM, USB, LSB, RTTY, and CW wide and CW narrow modes.

When you are in each mode, you are 'married' to the manufacturer's choice of filter for that mode. In AM mode, you are stuck with a 6 kHz filter (and, worse, the filter has a shape factor of 3:1); in SSB you have a better shaped 2.7 kHz filter. This AM filter is a disaster; it's the only real disaster in the ICOM. Six kHz is just too wide for any serious MW or SW work. Although there is the 2.3 kHz filter for SSB, it uses a different center frequency, and in any case is not available in AM mode (at this point let me interject that 2nd IF center frequency in AM is 9.0100 MHz; SSB is 9.0115 MHz; and CW is 9.0601 MHz). The manual downplays the bandwidth limitation by pointing out that AM bandwidth is really adjustable down to 2.7 kHz via the passband tuning (PBT) control. That may be so, but I have three points I wish you to consider: even 2.7 kHz is far too wide for many of today's crowded bands; using the PBT on this receiver to its fullest extent requires judicious coordination of PBT and the main tuning knob; most damning is the skirt shape of the AM filter and the next filter downstream, the IF in mode -- it's just too broad and sloppy. This also applies to some extent to the broad-skirted 500 Hz CW filter. Usage bears this out. However, with judicious use of PBT under rough conditions, the receiver is usable and workable, but it does leave something to be desired. The owner's manual points out that user-installed optional CW and SSB filters of narrower bandwidth are available. No mention is made of a narrower AM filter. You cannot just solder in an SSB filter, because the IF center frequency is different, although this option is not entirely impossible. Look at the specs. A center frequency difference of only 1.5 kHz will still allow signals to fall well within the passband of subsequent tuned stages. The only problem is that the center frequency will be 1.5 kHz off.

on't know if ICOM makes a narrower AM filter with the exactly-correct center frequency. I'm also not sure whether the existing filters in the receiver are ceramic or crystal filters. The best impression I can get is that most stock filters are ceramic.

Now for an anomaly in AM mode only, which is not serious in actual use, but is certainly interesting. In ANY particular MHz range, you are actually not tuned to the played frequency when the receiver is tuned from X.000.0 through X.001.4, inclusive, where "X" can be any MHz from 0 to 29. It's like a foldover. At first, when I noticed this anomaly, I assumed that the receiver was tuned to 'nothing' when in this "ICOM Bermuda Triangle." However, I am a suspicious guy, and some bench tests with a digital RF generator proved that what we're really tuning in that 1.4 kHz No Man's Land is really a little MHz higher. So, for example, if you're tuned to 4.000.0 MHz your receiver is really tuning to 5.000.0 MHz, and so on. As you pass the magic demarcation point between 1.4 kHz digits and the 1.5 kHz digits, there is a tiny "click," and you're back where you belong. I first suspected that this was a flaw in my receiver only, but I have since heard that other IC-R70 owners notice this phenomenon, too. What, then, transpires here? It is a quirk of CPU programming and synthesizer loop programming, and apparently directly related to the fact that the 2nd IF center frequency in AM is 1.5 kHz lower than in SSB. There is also a smaller, similar quirk when in CW mode.

Now for SSB mode. Short and simple -- very good. You're stuck with the 2.3 kHz filter, and it's a good choice. Specs show a nice tight skirt shape, and tests bear this out. In practice it's a pleasure to use in SSB. I'm sure this is partly due to superior stability. When you touch the SSB button, mode selected is automatically displayed if frequency is below 9 MHz, and USB if over 9 MHz. Incidentally, mode selected is displayed by a single letter at the left of the fluorescent display: U, L, C, or R. (R for RTTY). If you wish USB reception below 9 MHz, or LSB above, you first tap the "function" button, then tap the SSB button. Selectivity, ease of tuning, and overall clarity in SSB are all very good. One weirdie: if you are TUNING in AM or LSB mode and happen to pass an USB signal, and in due course press the button to select AM, you'll not only get USB, but your displayed frequency (and actual frequency) will jump down by 3 kHz. VERY disconcerting until you get used to it. Similarly, if you go from USB to LSB or AM, you jump up 3 kHz. This happens on a smaller scale with CW. If you enter CW while in AM or LSB, your frequency goes down by 600 Hz. In order for the receiver to accurately display carrier frequency while listening in SSB or CW, this little "quirk" was tolerated.

As I mentioned before, in CW you can choose either the 500 Hz or 2.3 kHz filter. Performance on CW is quite good in my opinion; the 500 Hz filter does have broad skirts according to the manual, but in practice this is rarely a problem, unless a very strong signal is a few hundred Hz away.

In RTTY mode, mark frequency of the RTTY signal is displayed when tuned in. RTTY output is available on the rear panel. Normal RTTY bandwidth is the 2.3 kHz filter, but, via a switch inside a little door atop the receiver, you can select the 500 Hz filter for RTTY. This receiver has many nice little extras and niceties hidden in it, as this.

Notch filter works quite well, and it's good seeing one on a receiver in this price range. It is set up for SSB and CW primarily, so it is not centered in the IF on AM. In AM, with knob centered, notch is really about 2.2 kHz below display frequency, which means you really cannot notch signals much above the frequency you're tuned to. Notch works more or less centered in SSB and CW. PBT, which we discussed before, works per specs, but can be frustrating on some AM and CW reception, primarily due to filter skirts.

I don't expect perfection in this area, since this is a \$700 receiver, and notch, narrow SSB and CW filters, and digital readout to 100 Hz has not before been available in receivers of this type under \$1100. Obviously there ARE going to be "shortcomings" when I compare it to my R7A.

AGC works fine; the two selectable speeds make it more versatile. I find there is almost never a time when I turn off AGC and ride RF gain. Normally I leave RF gain at minimum. For most work, you'll use AGC slow speed. Fast is helpful in rapid bandscans and some weak signal CW reception.

The noise blanker works fairly well, especially on very fast rise time impulse noise. There are two noise blanker speeds, or widths: narrow and wide, with "narrow" being normal. Wide can mean two things, either that the noise blanker is learning to recognize as noise impulses that have slower rise times than conventional sharp noise, (i.e., "broadband" impulses), or it can mean that recognition criteria remain constant, but that the blanking pulse applied to the "gate" or electronic switch is broader (of longer duration). The manual does not make clear which is meant by "Broad Noise Blanker." I found it impossible to decipher from the schematic in the limited time I devoted to it, since the schematic (a very dense one) is only half schematic and half pictorial.

This was necessitated by the incredible amount of microprocessor control involved. Now, I would like to know which function they mean by broad noise blanking, because there is a time and a place for each. For example, I have considered adding a switch to broaden the blank pulse on my Drake R7A, which already has an excellent noise blanker, to make it even more versatile. There is good reason in many receiver applications for a noise blanker with a broader than normal blank pulse at times, particularly when dealing with the Russian woodpecker and 120-Hz power line hash noise, both of which exhibit a broad signature. In addition, "Woody" (the Woodpecker. ch) has an unusually slow rise time most nights -- more on the order of a sharp CW signal than "normal" noise. Conventional noise, on the other hand -- such as a lightning stroke from a distance, and spark ignition noise -- have a narrow noise pulse, easy to blank.

You can now see why I was rather excited when I learned the ICOM had dual blanking speeds or widths. This is a highly desirable feature nowadays, and never before available in this price class. After extensive use, I can say they should have left it out. I can notice almost no difference on any kind of noise I encounter between narrow and wide noise blanking. I've used it often on power line noise and "Woody." The Drake R7A noise blanker stands out head and shoulders above this one. And we could say that's to be expected for the price -- but the thing that disturbs me is that ICOM, I'd always heard, has built a good reputation in amateur transceivers for its noise blankers' effectiveness against "Woody." While this noise blanker does chop the top off "Woody," it is not exceptional. Let us recognize here that "Woody," due to his signature, IS a tough cookie to break. (I am pleased to see in this vein that AEA has finally come out with a "Moscow Muffler" -- an RF "Woody" blanker which triggers not on the signal itself but on an internal 10 Hz clock -- in other words, a synchronous blanker. This concept was covered at length in a series in Ham Radio magazine in early 1982 by Nichols.) I would add that the ICOM blanker takes almost nothing off power line noise, but it does a creditable job against 'traditional' noise sources.

I find the S-meter quite inaccurate below S-9, and quite accurate above S-9 in 10 dB steps. This is more than bearable -- most S-meters are wacky, and the ONLY accurate S-meter I have ever seen that is usable and accurate is the meter on the Drake R7A.

The RF preamp offers 15-20 dB gain at all frequencies, even 1F! The preamp works well, and most significantly, does not seem to introduce any significant intermod, or spurious third-order products in day-to-day use, even on the AM BC band. The attenuator offers about 20 dB when selected, and if you are only going to have one attenuator available, 20 dB is as good a choice as any. My R7A has no attenuator.

This receiver has an IF-Out! Thank the Lord! Drake left it out on my R7A, and claims no one has ever complained (except me). BUT -- the IF-Out is at 70 MHz. This is good and bad for me -- my scope only works up to 5 or 10 MHz. However, the output is designed for panadapters, and most panadapters work up to 70 MHz or so. In any case, 70 MHz is the first IF, and the IF signal up there is still broad enough in bandwidth that it's useful to scan for nearby signals.

I have been saving the best for last. We're now talking dynamic range, ultimate selectivity, spurious responses, and images. First, there are no IF images, as is true of most modern upconversion receivers. There are some birdies from the local oscillator chains and synthesizer, none really serious. There are a few weak carrier-type birdies detectable on the 0 and 1 MHz bands with the antenna disconnected and a 50-ohm load at the input. However, none of these are noticeable when you hook up any ordinary antenna, even on a very quiet day. On all MHz bands there are a few 'blip'-type birdies, the kind that seem very narrow; you can hear a weak sharp blip or click as you pass them, but you can't actually tune them in. In several spots in the receiver range there are whole combs of a dozen or two very weak birdies spread over 9 kHz or so (the blip type) but in actual use, tuning even weak signals, they cause no problems whatsoever. The little clicks can take you by surprise in places until you get accustomed to them.

Overall, regarding birdies, the receiver is much cleaner than I would have expected considering the price range and the fully-synthesized nature of the local oscillator.

In actual use I never had any problems with spurious response -- that is, signals popping up where they don't belong. The owner's manual simply states that spurious response is below 60 dB, and does not give a dynamic range at all. I can tell you that this is one of ICOM's best features. This receiver is remarkably resistant to overload, strong signal gain compression, third order products, and other nonlinear responses when working day-to-day with strong signals of all types. To be honest, I have not found one case of IMD or spurious products yet. As for general coverage receivers, the only other receiver I have used at this location that is capable of that is the Drake R7A. In other words, this receiver is almost "scrunch" proof -- remarkable at the price! What amazes me is that this performance follows through even in the 100 kHz to 500 kHz range -- where most receivers fall very short on front-end preselection and overload from strong BC band leakthrough.

Not only does this receiver preserve phenomenal sensitivity and gain in this low range, it is still totally free of spurs and IMD products down here. I would point out that many current receivers nominally designed for this range in the under \$1000 bracket not only exhibit atrociously low gain and lousy sensitivity as you go below 500 kHz, but they still manage to show terrible spurious response unless aided by filters/preselectors. No BC band garbage on Longwave -- even with a high-gain broadband active whip as the antenna -- and all this with phenomenal sensitivity -- A miracle! Only my Drake R7A equals that, and you would expect it to for the price.

It's even more of a miracle when you consider that there are no bandswitches to turn and no preselectors to tune on the ICOM. I must admit that when I first saw the schematic I was scared to death by all the PIN diodes used for remote DC-voltage-controlled switching of everything from front end bandpass filters to IF filters to pre-selector switching. There are about a hundred of these PIN diodes, and unless used in a properly designed circuit and well-biased, they can be a disaster. They can be a source of feedthrough, and unintentional nonlinear operation and mixing. No so with the ICOM. Remarkably clean, even when faced with very strong signals. Even with the 20 dB preamp on I have never seen the ICOM overload or create spurs in day-to-day use. ICOM has addressed some of the worst problems of receivers in the under \$1000 range and done a great job at it.

Audio is very clean in all modes: very good quality audio, much better than most communications receivers. Internal front panel speaker is more than adequate for normal listening, and is what I use day to day. I can't even suggest any audio improvements. There ARE two rather novel front panel controls on the IC-R70. These are the audio tone control, and a squelch! Both struck me as unusual extras. The audio tone control is VERY effective, and this, unaided, can often eliminate QRM or QRN. It has a wide range of action, and although new to me, I now cannot do without it. It almost removes the need for the 'sophisticated' external audio filters, even in rough reception conditions.

The squelch was new to me, too, and it works fine. It's the same squelch you find on scanners and business radios. I will admit that I never use the squelch -- I just can't get used to it. I prefer to hear the background noise when tuning for signals, and even when monitoring a channel. I feel the 'noise' offers many clues about weak signals, band conditions, and nearby signals -- and that these clues are a very necessary part of using a receiver such as this. I can see the need for squelch, however, for single channel monitoring, and for tuning for stronger signals. I should mention audio power is rated more than two watts -- more than enough for any speakers in my shack.

As I said, this receiver has very good sensitivity right down to 100 kHz. As expected, on MW and SW this receiver is HOT. Any particular location or antenna problem can be helped by the preamp. Although hot, this receiver did not overdo it in the gain department on MW and SW, which separates it from so many of the cheaper receivers. Up to now, critical decisions about receiver performance and utility have been based upon 'sensitivity' (of which most receivers have too much). In reality, the criteria which select a good receiver are nearby signal selectivity (i.e., selectivity at 1, 3, 5, and 10 kHz away from your desired signal); freedom from spurious response (i.e., audio from three local AM signals showing up at some weird spot such as 7.932 MHz.); and ultimate selectivity (i.e., how well does the receiver reject strong signals anywhere in its range while you're listening to your favorite signal). PBT and notch are also desirable.

To overcome the wide AM filter problem, the excellent stability of the receiver suggests use in exalted carrier mode, although I intend to replace the AM filter in any case.

Overall, I feel that this is a fine receiver, and one well worth the price. I will go further and say that it is better than any modern under the price class of the NRD-515 that I've ever used, and I've used quite a few. My favorite features are the stability, CPU-assisted rapid tuning, VFO memories, the little 'extra' refinements, and the phenomenal dynamic range. Obviously, it did not live up to the very rigorous and demanding specs of my R7A (except stability and ease of rapid tuning, where it exceeded the Drake), but then again it lists at less than half the price of my R7A package, and is worth every penny of its \$750 list, and then some.

For really tedious weak signal work (in any mode), or when tuning near powerhouse stations for very weak, QRMed stations, nothing can beat the Drake. But for MW or SW tuning for a majority of desired signals, even fairly weak or moderately QRMed, I prefer the ICOM. It does the job, and it is just as easy to tune.






HOW TO USE YOUR RECEIVER AS AN AUXILIARY AMPLIFIER

All receivers can be simply wired to allow use of the audio amplifier section for auxiliary uses, particularly bench experiments from this section in past and future FRENEX issues.

Needed: 1 - 3.5mm (1/8") phone jack (short-circuiting type) and bell wire.

Basic Task: To locate a suitable panel surface on your receiver to drill a hole and mount the phone jack, then to wire it to the volume control.



Description of Operation: In normal operation, the detector output signal of your receiver travels to Tab and Leaf C of the phone jack, which touches Leaf B and exits thru Tab B on to the volume control and then to the amp.

When external phone plug (mike or other input) is inserted into jack, Leaf B is disengaged from Leaf C, thereby isolating the radio's signal. The mike plug tip touches B, and signal goes directly to the volume control.

Suggestion: Make the photo transistor described in October FRENEX (Pg 10) and perform the modulated light experiments. An out-of-doors horn speaker fed into the jack will enable you to monitor what's going on out there and not be observed.

FOR TECHNICIANS ONLY - Which way does the current flow?

For years, the controversy has raged. Does current flow in the Positive direction or the Negative direction? We can help ourselves learn the answer by first asking...the flow of what? Well, the stuff that makes the filament burn is a flow of very real atomic material called electrons. R Nacional, 11955, mixed mx bag to 0530 ID, 13/11, and "Programa A"; then songs about Angola, comment on death of Brezhnev; SIO 343; BBC off all this time, but back on in mid-

sentence 0553, smothering RN (John Wilkins, Wheat Ridge CO)

Update on current regional activity; stns not mentioned continue to be hrd as listed previously. Em. Reg. de Benguela is also hrd on 5040.5 // 6151.8. Em. Prov. da Lunda is unhrd on listed 4860. Em. R Norte takes the award for the most extravagant letterhead in the SW world; it features a red "Radio Norte" with a blue smiling microphone holding yellow hat in red arms, a purple house perched on green lawn next to green trees and a field of golden wheat!

FRANCE France-Inter reported there'd be a strike at R France 0800-1630 18/11, called at initiative of nearly all trade unions, protesting reorganization of French radio currently in progress. 18/11, RF DS bc mx and limited nx instead of sked pgms (WBI 25/11) France-Inter reported 24/11 that a strike at RF called by Public Service & RTV Trade Union Fedn'd take place following day. Limited svc of nx & mx was again bc by FI 25/11, like 18/11, and end of strike ancd at 2300. FI also said strikers started being "a pirate pgm explaining reasons for work stoppage" 1730 on RF but had been "taken off the air" on instruxions from Dir-Gen of FI. Added that MinCom 'reacted vigorously to non-bc of midday TV nx, which was contrary to both instruxions by him to Dir-Gen of TF-1 and Antenne-2 and the 29/7/82 law which provides for a minimum pgm in case of strike'. Addl FI reports incl issuing of a further strike notice 3/12 by TUF, later cancelled by RF trade union. TU however "made it clear that campaign of RF staff had not been brought to an end but that from now on, it would take a different form" (WBI 9/12) more, L M I

GREECE Since *0345 15/11, Greek armed forces radio stn YENED has been calling itself the "ERT-2 radio network" (Greek: Radiofonikón Dhiktión ERT-Dhio) (WBI 18/11)
ERT reported 6/12 that Greek Comms Ministry'd acquire centre in 1983 for checking radio fqs, costing 300 megadrachmas, to be used 24h to aid in immediate location of illegal radio stns (WBI 9/12) GUAM, L M I

HONDURAS El Eco de Honduras, San Pedro Sula, 6000 kHz in SP, carrying R Variedades pgm 1109-1211 21/11; ranchera mx, barnyard noises, ads, TCs, dedications; 1211 ID as per last month's LN; SIO 322, PLA QRM (John Wilkins, CO)

R Havana ES in SP 21/11 reported members of "Lorenzo Zelaya Revolutionary People's Command" (LZRPC) had seized R San Pedro in northern Honduras (BECMS ed note: presumably the SPS stn on 850) the previous day and had bc a communiqué over it (WBI 2/12) AFP reported 4/12 from Tegucigalpa that guerrillas of LZRP Front had occupied R (?Fiesta) in Teguci (BECMS ed note: listed on 1120) previous day and bc a 15-min political communiqué (WBI 9/12)

INDIA AIR reported 17/11 that all strikes in AIR & Doordarsan (TV) had been prohibited "in the public interest". An order to that effect had been issued that day by Central Govt under the Essential Services Maintenance Act. Sound-alike radio is new anti-guerrilla tactic in Salvador

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador — Every morning and every night staccato bursts of recorded gunfire, martial music and Marxist rhetoric punctuated by the whoop of electronic interference are familiar sounds here as guerrillas take to the airwaves.

People listen because they sympathize, or because they are curious, or in many cases just to find out something about what is going on in the inaccessible northern and eastern parts of the country dominated by the insurgents.

Then, through the crackling noise that blocked a recent broadcast, many people thought they heard an insurgent report that the oldest and most famous rebel leader, Salvador Cayetano Carpio, was killed in action. Local newspapers reported his death. Foreign correspondents tried frantically to check it out.

But Carpio was not dead.

Instead, he was the victim of something he had denounced on the air only a week before: a new anti-guerrilla radio station.

"Using the same frequencies, schedule and style of the revolutionary stations," said Carpio, "it is spreading absolutely harebrained lies about the glorious revolutionary struggle."

In fact, a major electronic battle is running side-by-side with this region's shooting wars as clandestine transmitters and carefully plotted propaganda increasingly are used to supplement, amplify and often mystify what each side is doing with its guns and grenades.

In Central America, where many are illiterate, radio is the mass medium with the broadest reach and the biggest impact.

Revolutionaries were quick to see the possibilities. Nicaragua's Sandinistas were on the air long before they were in the capital and their Voice of Nicaragua and Radio Sandino now saturate a broad band of frequencies reaching out all over the region.

Those on the other side are just as accustomed to the advantages of underground media. As long ago as 1954, as has been documented in several recent studies, Central Intelligence Agency-financed broadcasts over a clandestine "Voice of Liberation" played a crucial role in ousting the leftist Guatemalan government of Jacobo Arbenz.

Now, the "counterrevolution" fights back at the Sandinistas with Radio 15 de Septiembre, spreading word of Sandinista atrocities that, true or not, quickly work themselves into the mythology of Miskito Indians and other groups opposed to Managua's Marxist leaders.

Another station called The Voice of Sandino is also beaming its message to Managua.

In El Salvador, the guerrillas have two stations in regular operation, run by two factions in two different parts of the country.

Radio Venceremos (which means "We will win") has been broadcasting the message of the guerrilla front as viewed by the People's Revolutionary Army faction on an occasional basis since early 1980 and regularly since last year. Radio Farabundo Marti (named for the 1930s Salvadoran communist admired by the rebels) came on the air more recently and with a weaker short-wave signal that broadcasts variations on the front's theme as seen by the more hard-line Popular Liberation Forces.

Despite vows to knock them out, the U.S.-backed Salvadoran Army has had little success forcing them off the air. Washington frequently charges, but has never publicly proved, that the main transmitter is next door in revolutionary Nicaragua.

The new short-wave weapon against the rebel radios went into action last month. As clandestine and mysterious as they are, it calls itself Radio Orientacion (Orientation) but is getting to be known on the street as Radio Mentiremos ("We will lie").

The guerrillas have told reporters they think the new station is broadcasting from somewhere in the wealthy neighborhood of Escalon de San Francisco in the capital, probably run by people associated with the right-wing political party of Assembly President Roberto D'Aubuisson. The guerrillas also guess that the money for the station comes from the CIA.

U.S. Embassy officials, asked who they think is running the new radio station, answer with "no comment," then explain in private that standard guidance is not to comment in any way on intelligence activities.

Does that mean it is connected with U.S. intelligence?

"No comment," they said.

"X-103", a pirate FM is active Fri, Sat and Sun afternoons with rock. DJ Scott says very low power, ancd phone (904) 255-8548, per Tim in Daytona Beach; unhrd here in St Cloud; on 103.5 MHz (Ron Trotto, FL)

UNIDENTIFIED 2500, stn noted lately around 2200 as WWV fades up. Never strong enough to make out format or lang, tho seems EG (Gerry Bishop, PA)

6236, europirate? w/BeeGees, other EG pops, songs recognizable, but ancr unintelligible due to severe ute QRM. SIO 211; still there at 0827, 0850 rechecks, hrd 13/11 only (Wilkins, CO)

During magnetic storm 28/11 noted a very strong stn on 9715 from 1600 w/non-stop instl mx to 2000*, mostly older pop tunes, no anmt or ID during entire bc; definitely a trans-Pacific sig, only other stns on band were Australia & Manila; suspect test from KYOI Saipan; a similar all-mx bc hrd next Sun 5/12 on 11763 until 1900*, again w/out anmts; are US srns allowed to test w/out IDs? Includes street addresses. Also a 3-page survey of activity on 3000 kHz band, a page of general SW mx by country, a nicely drawn original map by country of Vietnam, showing provincial SW xmr locations, provincial boundaries (which is a great deal since reunification) and background text on this subject. DUDXS are distributed by selling individual copies, rather than subscription or membership is 3 IRCs or 70c in mint Australian stamps, in Australia & NZ; 6 IRCs in the rest of the world, by airmail. Asian DXers. In Issue #100, Victor Goonatileke explains the club policies and whenever we receive return postage we send a copy with membership info. If we don't receive return postage from people in the Western countries and affluent areas of the world, requests are ignored. From the Third World, we do send samples to everyone who requests them and they mostly don't send return postage. The largest number of members is in the United States--over 20, closely followed by India, Sri Lanka and Australia. 


