


FRENDX MARCONI



OLIVER PERRY FERRELL 1920 - 1984

Most NASWA members and DXers knew Perry Ferrell as president of Gilfer Associates, Inc., one of the shortwave hobby's foremost supply houses. Perry was killed in an auto accident April 22. The DX/SWL hobby has lost a longtime supporter and friend. The following are excerpts from the Memorial Service held April 28 at the Central Unitarian Church, Paramus, New Jersey.

"Perry died early Easter morning in a car accident. He and Jeanne had been with good friends of many years for a lovely afternoon and evening of sociability. On their way home, an oncoming driver went to sleep at the wheel. He would have run into their car head-on at full speed; however, Perry was able to swerve so that Ferrell's car was hit on the driver's side. This last act of instinctive wisdom and courage almost undoubtedly saved Jeanne's life. Perry died at the time of the accident."

"Oliver P. Ferrell was born on May 8, 1920. He grew up in Atlantic City and neighboring Pleasantville, New Jersey. When Perry was seven years old, his father bought him a crystal radio set, and this began Perry on his life's work....By the time he was in high school, Perry was writing articles for national radio magazines. One of the high points of his youth was writing to and meeting Major Armstrong who initiated FM radio....He graduated from high school in 1938....He got a job with RCA in Camden, New Jersey, first in electrical maintenance, then as a radio engineering aide and finally in research on radio altimeter equipment."

"In 1942, he was drafted into the Army Air Force, where he became an expert in the new field of radar and continued his ground-breaking work on radio waves. He served with air stations and radar installations in Burma, India and China....Perry returned in 1945, from his hard years in service, with a wealth of experiences, a Bronze Star for his dedication and bravery, and a real expertise in the expanding field of radio waves and radar."

"...Perry made another important discovery, that of 'meteoric ionization by radar detection'. He was becoming a leader in his field and was already spending long hours, including evenings and weekends at his work. Then he was asked to become the Associate Editor of a national radio magazine, CQ MAGAZINE, in New York City.... As he took over chief-editorship, he hired a new secretary, Jeanne Carolyn Gillespie, and their relationship was soon much more than business....They married on September 17, 1954. Perry and Jeanne lived first in Queens....They moved to their present home in Park Ridge in February of 1961."

"Perry became editor of the important national magazine, POPULAR ELECTRONICS, in 1955....Perry built a strong reputation as an editor. He was unconditionally honest and a perfectionist. He was genuinely fascinated with his field and had made discoveries himself at a young age....One would think that this would surely be enough. But the truth is that Jeanne and he had established a business in his special area of interest at the very beginning of their marriage. A business solely devoted to shortwave radio....This business continued to grow and develop. Jeanne took care of most of the daily effort.... but Perry worked many an evening and weekend in helping the business to grow."

"By 1971, Perry was forced to resign as editor with the Ziff-Davis Corp., and he regretfully left his faithful and well-loved staff to turn his attentions fully to his and Jeanne's business, called Gilfer (for Gillespie and Ferrell)....Throughout his adult life, he got up at 6 a.m. every morning to go down and listen himself to far-off places and exotic radio messages. It was not just a job or an expertise, it remained throughout his life a fascination and a passion."

"The company also published related books and distributed books in the field and sold shortwave equipment. Perry worked all week at the office and most evenings and weekends at home in the lab. He was a member of the National Industry Advisory Committee of the Federal Communications Commission, a member of the Magazine Editors Organization and of the Radio Club of America. Perry Ferrell obviously lived very fully for his 63 years. He grew up in hard-working blue collar circumstances. He made impressive discoveries in the new fields of radio and radar as a young man. He served his country well. He married and had a son and took care of his mother, while becoming a leader in his chosen specialty. He moved to New York, became an editor of prominence and integrity. He married again and raised three more children with devotion. He loved his work and worked day and night week after week, year after year. Jeanne was for most of Perry's adulthood the other center of his life besides the radio waves...."

"In recent years, Perry was delighted to see his children well-grown and making headway in their own lives....Perry made friends with almost anyone he met. Many of you here knew him as a friend. You will not be surprised to hear that he had pen-pals clear around the world....Perry did savor life. He loved his work....He lived each day from 6 a.m. to bedtime. He was a remarkable man, and he will live on in each of your memories."

Indonesian Update By Bill Sparks

———— May 7, 1984 ————

In the review of the Indonesian stations that appeared in the November 1983 issue of *Frendx*, I made a point of the fact that Indonesian stations are constantly on the move with frequency changes and on and off the air. They have continued to do their best to prove that my statement was correct.

The following is an attempt to bring the Indonesian situation up to date as of May, 1984, including all changes that I have noted since November in the same order in which the stations appeared in the earlier article:

RRI Jambi has returned to its old frequency of 4927 for its evening schedule. The signal is from weak to fair.

RRI Tanjung Pinang returned to 3225 late in 1983 and now has one of the better signals on the 90 m. band and no longer signs off early.

RRI Bandung, 3204, has been heard again but with a very poor signal. It appears to be on greatly reduced power and possibly on an irregular schedule.

RRI Samarinda is still not being heard on any of its regular frequencies.

RPD T2 Bulungan, 2977, still is the only RPD heard with any degree of consistency.

RRI Ujung Pandang has not been heard on its regular 4719 frequency for over a month. It is now using 4753 exclusively for its evening schedule.

RRI Menado has been heard testing on its old 49 m. band frequency of 5987.5. It puts in an excellent signal between around 0900 - 1020 s/off. It was operating //3215. However this appears to be an extremely irregular schedule.


RRI Dili seems to be trying for the RRI black sheep award. I haven't been able to locate it on any of its former frequencies for several months. Manokwari has taken possession of the 3986 spot, and nothing is heard on 3306 or 3120. The last time I heard Dili several months ago, it was on 2456. Current 120 m. reception conditions are so poor that I can't say if Dili is still on 2456.

RRI Manokwari puts in a very nice signal on 3986.3 // 6188.

RRI Sorong is going after the wanderer award. It left 4785 in February and finally was discovered down on 4797 with transmitter problems including poor modulation and an over all miserable signal. In May it moved back up the band and is now heard on 4870.5 where it has been putting in a strong and clear signal again.

Two Irian Jaya stations mentioned only briefly in the November survey have been heard well enough to copy recently. RRI Wamena is starting to appear on quiet mornings on 5043.7 with a sign off at around 1310. RRI Nabire, 5055.5 has an even better signal until 1357 s/off, however QRM from TIFC is a problem until TIFC fades out.

(Bill adds: "If there are any other changes, I have not noted them as yet". - JH)



Polish Pathfinders' Station Close-up

Unfortunately the title of this article is a pun, as you will see if you read on. The first meaning of the title is straightforward, though. It follows from the fact that my regular daily route in Warsaw recently, which included Bolesław Prus street, took me past an intersection where the square U-shaped building in late 1940's Stalinist architectural style on one corner seemed to have more than the usual number of antennas on the roof. I read the name of the intersecting street and the various official-looking signs on the front of the building more or less simultaneously - Maria Konopnicka street, which sounded rather familiar for non-literary as well as literary reasons, and the confirmation of the familiarity, in a sign announcing the presence of

the Polish Pathfinders' Union, the nearest thing in Poland to a Boy Scout movement. By the way, somebody with a sense of humor must have named the streets, because Konopnicka's aesthetics in art followed people like Ruskin and the pre-Raphaelites, rather unreal stuff, while Prus founded a school of very down-to-earth (for his period) Polish realist writing.

In Poland one does not wander into official buildings without being invited (or being carried in feet first, which is a different story), but I found, somewhat surprisingly, that only one telephone call to the management was enough to produce an invitation.

The building houses a large number of good causes packed into a fairly small volume, starting with the Comedy Theater at basement level and a youth publishing organization. I was welcomed on the first floor by the sounds of singing practice, apparently from a Boy Scout chorus rehearsing for an inspirational (according to the official line, of course) musical, the sight of piles of yellow plastic crates of empty soft-drink bottles, and a blast of cooking odors, mostly cabbage. The resemblance to a YMCA building was rather strong, so it was no surprise to learn that in pre-war years the Warsaw YMCA had occupied the site.

The radio station has cramped quarters on the top two floors at the end of one of the arms of the U. There are two studios and control booths, one on each floor. The rest of the lower-floor space is taken up with administration, and on the top floor there is a small amount of working space besides the record and tape-archive library of the station's 27-year history. Everyone on the staff agrees that the filing system for the archive got out of hand years ago, and there are wishful thoughts about using a microcomputer (probably embargoed for U.S. export to Poland even if the Pathfinders had the necessary hard currency available, which they don't) to restore some kind of order to it. When an announcer is his own studio engineer, which happened while I was there, it is like witnessing the development of a new Olympic sport to see him sprint out of the control booth, leap over a pile of tape boxes in the passage, dodge around some other piles that are too high for hurdling at the studio door, arrives at the microphone before listeners begin to wonder why there has been a silence after the end of the last record, and announce the next item without giving the impression of being out of breath.

It is not clear how many of the production staff of 12 work for the station full-time, especially as resources for making new programs each day were said to be spread rather thinly. What was clear during my visit was that about 2 hours of program material is produced for each day, and that each 2-hour block is recorded and later repeated at least once. The schedule does not necessarily fit an exact pattern, but was quoted to me as 0800-1400 on weekdays and 1000-1400 at weekends. If I had had my WRTH with me, I would certainly have asked if those two ranges should have been interchanged, and whether or not Monday was still a silent day. However, the station was broadcasting live during my visit at a time when WRTH says that it is not on the air. Given the comments about 2-hour slots, I would guess that the 0800-1400 allocation often has a gap from 1000 to 1200.

Programming is mainly musical with a variety of styles. For example, I heard the First Symphony of Brahms (45 minutes long; a chance for the announcer to recover his breath) followed immediately by an early 1960's song by Frank Ifield, England's answer (and a highly unconvincing one) to Perry Como. Probably Mr. Ifield was brought out of the archive just to show that some staffers could find their way around it without a card index; everyone there regarded it as a point of honor that the station had been the first to introduce to Poland every new pop-music trend since the Beatles. Reggae is the most popular new discovery at present. For some of the music and other occasional features, volunteers are welcomed and are helped to produce their own programs, as long as these programs contain nothing that is officially embarrassing.

There seems to be no formal method of recruitment of production staff from inside the Pathfinders' Union. Most script-writers for Pathfinder information programs and most announcers have started as volunteers, even from outside the Union. There may be a career incentive to volunteer, because many present members of the domestic production staff of Polskie Radio got their start in broadcasting through the Pathfinders' Station.

Members of the Union throughout Poland are the primary targets of the broadcasts, but the station is aimed secondarily at an audience of Polish youth in general. This, and the original power limit of 350 watts or less, explains the use of SW. The original transmitter has now been replaced by an elderly one from Polskie Radio, rated at 20 kW but evidently running at a much lower power. The one fact about the output power that everyone agreed on was that nobody had any idea what it was, except that it was too low and that it was probably kept low to increase the lifetime of components like final-stage tubes, for which there was no money available for replacements. At this point I confirmed that the antennas on the roof (FM and TV, and obviously not SW) had nothing to do with the station, except to feed a TV set in one of the control booths: programs are sent by land-line to the transmitter, about 25 miles from Warsaw in a direction somewhere between north-east and north-west. The staff's views about the low power are easy to understand, since reception of the station in Warsaw itself is difficult, though it seems to be better at distances of more than 100 miles because of more favorable skip conditions. The frequency quoted in WRTS is correct: 6195.

The station does not particularly want a foreign audience, but enough is known about DXing from the DXers' viewpoint that well-written reception reports from abroad are always appreciated. The distance record for reports that the duty staff could remember is held by a DXer in Singapore. The supply of QSL-cards now seems to have run out, but I was promised that the dustier corners of the filing system would be searched to see if a few more could be found somewhere.

And now for the bad news. The unreliability of SW reception for the Pathfinders' intended audience, the decreasing quantity of new Polish receivers equipped coverage (a not-so-indirect result, as I was told, of the existence of the BBC, Radio Free Europe and the VOA), and the risk that an irreplaceable component of the transmitter may fail without notice, have all combined to produce a decision that 30 June will be the last day of SW broadcasting. From 1 July, the Pathfinders' Station will become a nationally-broadcast daily or near-daily 2-hour program on the Radio 4 FM channel of Polskie Radio.

There are not many stations where resource limitations are overcome so well by the obvious enthusiasm of the staff as at the Pathfinders' Station, and even fewer on SW. It is therefore sad to have to pass on the news about 30 June to DXers and SWLs but, as one Damon Runyon hero probably once said somewhere, facts is facts. To the dials, gentlemen! If what comes out of your speaker box in June when you are tuned to 6195 is the sound of panting or of Perry Como with indigestion, you can be almost sure that you've found what you should be looking for. And if it is the smell of large amounts of cabbage being cooked, you can be certain.

Perry Ferrell's untimely death inevitably lead to the question: What's going to happen to Gilfer? I'm pleased to say that, in a nice phone chat with Jeanne Ferrell, it's business as usual for Gilfer and a commitment to DXers "for years to come"! The QSL ADDRESS BOOK by Gerry Dexter is out (yes, buy it!) and Perry's labor of love, the CONFIDENTIAL FREQUENCY LIST, was about 95% complete at the time of his death and Jeanne intends to see it to completion, perhaps this summer. GOOD NEWS! We wish Jeanne well and hope you will too at; Gilfer Associates, Inc., 52 Park Avenue, P.O. Box 239, Park Ridge, NJ 07656. (JH)

Every DXer, I would think, has dreamed about the exotica of foreign locales...the chance to DX in a remote corner of the globe, or visit stations first-hand. Well, Don Moore, has turned that dream into a reality.

A note on QSLing....from Honduras

At present I have had the opportunity to visit eight Honduran SW stations (including inactives), five in Guatemala, and one in Mexico. One of my favorite pastimes during such visits is looking through reception reports. I have easily seen three or four hundred and it's interesting recognizing the names and learning a little from others' techniques. While this is not meant to be a "how to" article, at the risk of being a bit brutal, what observations have emerged from all this?

Quite simply, if a reception report was complete, attractively done, friendly, polite, and contained some little gifts, e.g. postcards, I almost always recognized the name of the DXer - and you likely would too. The amount of care and pride that stations take in regards these reports is evident too, e.g. Radio Tezulutlán keeps them in albums. On the other hand, if the report was not so neat, hastily done, demanding, in English, and used GMT and SINPO codes, I did not once recognize the name of the sender.

Obviously reports fall on a continuum between these two extremes, but the point is that those people that receive those fine QSLs do so because they deserve them. That's why they're at the top of the heap. If you want those types of QSLs, take note! You've probably heard it many times before; small stations don't understand GMT and SINPO. It really is true! I'm amazed at how many people use them anyway. Too many for me to believe that they've never heard otherwise.

Another point: with all the Spanish report forms available (e.g. NASWA and Radio Netherlands have them), there is no excuse for writing in English, except for the occasional American-owned Evangelist outlet (like TGNA and HRVC), even if you don't know Spanish. There is a lot of patience and respect down here for gringos who try to communicate in Spanish, no matter how poorly. There is little of either for gringos who assume "those people must study English". If you must write in English, drop your report in the trashcan and save yourself a walk to the mailbox. Your report will likely be the same.

As far as return postage goes, don't use IRCs to Honduras, except for HRVC. They are difficult to exchange. HRVC gets so many they arranged to have it done elsewhere. While IRCs appear to be more easily exchanged in Guatemala, you probably should still use mint stamps for stations outside the capital. And don't forget a "recuerdo" - a local postcard or two, or a small pennant from the nearby university.

I also must point out that outright faked reports do exist. I've had a few pointed out to me at stations. Would you want your name attached to one?

The stations in Central America, especially Guatemala, are generally friendly to reports and willing to reply. Why blow it?

DXing in Europe: Pt. 3

More easterly we come to the Indo-Chinese countries. Sometimes we catch Burma's Broadcasting Service on 4725 kHz during the afternoon. The joy of receiving this station is restricted a little by the miserable verification policies of the station. Since more than 2 years, IRC's are accepted in Burma, but the station seems uninterested in reception reports. I don't know anything about reception of the Burmese Army Station on 5060 kHz here in Europe and I don't know of anyone that has heard it.

After a long silence, Radio Thailand is receivable in Europe again. The reception on 9650 kHz is better than on 11905 kHz which is almost impossible here.

A highlight for European DXers is the Voice of the People of Kampuchea which sometimes gets through at 1228 GMT on 11918 kHz after the close down of Radio Bucharest and Radio Tirana, both operating on 11920 kHz.

I've never received any station from Laos but some months ago some logs appeared in European DX bulletins concerning reactivation of the Xieng Khouang station on 5613 kHz. I've also never heard of any verifications from Laos though the WRTM lists them.

The Voice of Vietnam is always receivable on 10044 kHz with a good signal and the station verifies after a few months.

DXing IN EUROPE (cont'd)

China has, apart from the many foreign services of Radio Beijing, some interesting local stations which are receivable afternoons and around midnight. The strongest are Xinjiang on 4500 kHz and 4735 kHz, Gansu on 4865 kHz, Fujian on 4330 kHz, Nei Menggu on 4750 kHz, and the Fujian Front Station on 4380 kHz. Concerning verifications, one can consult Jerry Berg's article about "Verifying Chinese Regional Stations" in the December 1983 PRENDX, which is the best I've ever read on the subject. (Agreed! - JH)

European DXers have a serious problem in receiving Ulan Bator, Mongolia. The only useful frequency is 12070 kHz which is blocked by Moscow most of the time. So one has to wait for the maintenance works of the Russian transmitter which takes place in irregular intervals every one or two months. Once provided with an acceptable report, Ulan Bator is known to be a good verifier.

Pyongyang is received daily on several frequencies. The station operates a German Service now since Fall 1983. With the QSL card you'll receive a huge number of "information materials" such as postcards and calendars. Furthermore, I received an English volume called, "On Juchee in our Revolution" telling great stories from the "land without problems".

Seoul is always heard on several frequencies and periodic reception reports will bring you up to date on the development of the Olympic stadiums by the changing QSL card series.

NHK-Tokyo is received both in the morning and in the evening on a number of frequencies. Some test transmissions have been made recently via Africa No. 1 in Gabon, and these tests have been verified by letter. Normally, a QSL card is received from NHK.

From the Philippines we receive Radio Veritas on 11955 kHz, the FEBC on 11850 kHz and lastly the VOA relay on many frequencies. Reception is normally in the afternoon but the VOA can be heard around midnight.

The Voice of Malaysia is received in the afternoon on 15295 kHz and sometimes on 4945 kHz. Sabah and Sarawak are very rare catches here in Europe.

Indonesia is a DXers paradise. One needs some experience to log these stations with any success. The Voice of Indonesia has a German Service at 1600 GMT and can be heard on 11790 kHz and 15150 kHz. But more interesting is reception of the regional stations in Indonesia, the strongest of which are RRI Medan on 4764 kHz, and RRI Ujung Pandang on 4719 kHz. Other stations heard last winter are RRI Tanjung Pinang on 3225 kHz, RRI Bukittinggi on 3232 kHz, RRI Tanjungkarang on 3395 kHz, RRI Banda Aceh on 3905 kHz, RRI Palu on 3960 kHz, RRI Padang on 4002 kHz, RRI Jakarta on 4774 kHz (which was reactivated last year), RRI Palembang on 4856 kHz and RRI Yogyakarta on 5046 kHz.

Best reception of Taiwan from Europe is on 9610 kHz during the evening. The station is a good verifier.

Radio Australia has stopped transmissions to Europe but is still received on many frequencies. The local stations in Australia are a particular highlight, such as VLM9-Lyndhurst on 9680 kHz, VLQ9-Brisbane on 9660 kHz and VLW9-Perth on 9610 kHz. Sometimes VLM4-Brisbane on 4920 kHz is heard and all the stations are known to be good verifiers.

KYOI-Saipan is receivable during the afternoon on 9670 kHz and with a good signal too.

TWR-Guam gets through quite often on 11840 kHz during the morning hours.

Some stations from Papua-New Guinea have been received in Europe lately but reception is very exceptional and rare. So is reception of Vanuatu and New Caledonia.

One other station heard more or less regularly here in Europe is Tahiti on 15170 kHz.

Church on the air

Radio Veritas, Asia's only Catholic station, beams the Gospel from the Philippines to half the world

"This is Radio Veritas." The words crackle out in Bengali, Japanese, Chinese, Burmese—13 languages in all—crossing oceans and rice paddies, spanning the world's mountains, reaching areas inhabited by more than half the world's population.

So begins another broadcast day for Asia's only Catholic owned and operated radio station. Located in the Philippines, Radio Veritas broadcasts from studios in Quezon City, a suburb of Manila. Established by the late Cardinal Rufino Santos in 1969 with modest local programming, the station's operations were reorganized by Cardinal Jaime Sin in 1981. With Auxiliary Bishop Teodoro Buhain executive vice president and general manager, broadcast services expanded throughout most of Asia, even to the east coast of Africa.

"We have two distinct services at Radio Veritas," explains Bishop Buhain, "the Philippine service, under the auspices of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of the Philippines, using medium wave, and an overseas service supported by the Federation of Asian Bishops' Conferences which uses shortwave."

Radio Veritas beams its shortwave from one 50 and two 100-kilowatt transmitters in Japanese, Korean, Mandarin Chinese and Tamil, which is spoken in Sri Lanka, the Philippines, South India, Singapore, Malaysia and parts of East Africa. Add to these Bengali, Burmese, English, Indonesian, Vietnamese, Kachin and Karen (spoken in Burma) and Sinhalese (Sri Lanka). Writing and programming are handled by a staff drawn from all these countries.

From "Maryknoll", the magazine of the Catholic Foreign Mission Society of America, given to me recently by a Maryknoll Father (JH)

Auxiliary Bishop Teodoro Buhain, 47, the station's general manager, receives 8,000 letters every month.

The station broadcasts 16 hours and 20 minutes daily in Pilipino to the Philippines and 29 hours daily to the rest of Asia in 30-minute segments for each language. The extra time results from utilizing the three transmitters simultaneously.

Bishop Buhain explains that Radio Veritas fulfills its mandate—"To proclaim the message of God's love to the peoples of Asia"—by producing both direct evangelization programs and others that focus on development, such as farming, nutrition and health care. The emphasis depends on the target audience. "For the Philippines, it is a 50 percent mixture. For the rest of Asia, we emphasize our evangelization programs," says Buhain, "because in many countries no air time is available to the Catholic Church due to financial difficulties or government restrictions."

Some 8,000 letters arrive monthly at the studio. One from Japan reads: "Through these programs your station plays a great role in Asia, uniting the countries in spite of the differences in culture, history and language." A letter from Sri Lanka states: "You educate us. You entertain us. I am glad to say that Radio Veritas is becoming more and more popular among the people here."

Support for Radio Veritas' operations—equipment, electrical power, a staff of 250 operators and programmers—comes from Catholics in the Philippines, from Propaganda Missio in Rome, Catholics of Germany through their overseas aid agency, *Misereor*, and volunteer fund raisers.


"Radio Veritas has the personnel to do the work, but we need the means with which to do it even more effectively," says Bishop Buhain. "I make that appeal everywhere and I want to direct it personally to the Church in the United States. Please help us." □

DXPEDITIONS

Have you ever gone on a DXpedition for several days? If you haven't, you're missing a very enjoyable aspect of our hobby. Since Summer is fast approaching, you may want to get out of the ole shack for a few days and engage in some outdoor DXing. The main advantage of this type of DXing is that one can listen with no threat of the neighbors electric razor or wives hair dryer generating RF from 2 to 30 mhz. Another advantage is that you have the opportunity to erect an antenna that you may not be able to back at the shack. i.e. beverages, rhombics, etc. One other advantage is that its a great excuse to let you get away from the wife and kids for a while. Before you pack to go, lets just take a look at a few things you should keep in mind.

Companions: Try to take someone along for safety reasons, etc. If you can take someone along who isn't a DXer, thats an added bonus (you don't want to lug all that radio equipment around by yourself, do you?). Taking another DXer is fine though. Remember, DX abounds in numbers, but just make sure he lets you know when hes listening to new stations or countries.

Supplies: If you plan to stay several days, take enough food and cloths. Don't forget your personal items, sleeping bag, and a first aid kit. Rope, an axe, paper, matches, compass, flashlight (lantern) are things that should be taken. (If you plan on going to a fully equiped cabin, some of the things above may not be needed). Better prepared than sorry.

Location: Your choice. A cabin back up in the mountains is obviously the best you can get. If you plan to rough it by using a tent, then choose a location by a non-polluted stream. Water is always a nice thing to have handy. Will there be supports for antennas? Will there be any power-lines close by? Find a spot that will satisfy all your requirements.

Equipment: Receivers, antenna wire, log book, power supplies, headphones, pen and paper, Frendx, WRTVH, possibly a tape recorder (sure don't want to miss that Zanzibar ID!), watch, and even wire cutters/strippers are a good thing to have. Take only what you need. The less weight the better.

Transportation: If you're fortunate enough to live close to wooded areas, you may only need to walk the distance. If you're driving, make sure you can get to where you plan to go. You wouldn't want to have to walk further than you planned. All that weight can tire you out faster than you think.

Setting up camp: Use common sense. Rocky terrain is rough to pitch a tent on. Find a place where the ground is soft. Tying the food in a garbage bag, and hanging it from a tree will keep animals from digging into it. Keep camp fires contained, under control, and away from close low hanging trees and the tent.

Antenna: The most popular antenna at DXpeditions is the beverage. When erecting the antenna, don't wear shorts! Try climbing a tree in shorts and you'll look like you were in a cat fight-and the cat won. It isn't required that you climb 40 feet, 15 feet or no feet at all, but the higher the antenna the better. Keep beverage antennas straight and as level as possible. (The above suggestions are for DXers with access to wooded areas). DXers with a different topography will have to plan accordingly.

DXing: The actual DXing itself can take place either inside or outside. Inside is more favorable since a campfire will attract insects. Always keep the tape recorder running as you never know when you'll hear something interesting.

The main thing is to have fun. Take some time out, think, and be prepared. Better to be prepared than have Mr. Murphy's laws ruin all your fun. When you hear all that good DX on your DXpedition, why not write about it right here in the pages of FRENEX.

So, when the Summertime comes and you're in a DXing slump, go on a DXpedition. There's plenty of DX, even in the Summer.



ESKA RX99PL RECEIVER

Wilder A. Pickard II, Evanston, Illinois, has provided us with information on the new ESKA RX99PL receiver, manufactured in Denmark. This receiver is a phase-locked loop (PLL) synthesized type featuring 99 memory channels and "phase-locked" AM detector.

Frequency tuning is accomplished by keyboard entry (direct-frequency tuning), or by manual tuning, i.e., up/down tuning in fixed steps. Manual tuning in the automatic mode provides 5 kHz on the shortwave broadcast bands, 9 kHz or 10 kHz on the medium/longwave bands, and 1 kHz outside of the broadcast bands. Fine tuning allows 10 Hz or 100 Hz increments.

"True Passband Tuning" tunes from the top edge of one sideband, through center, to the other sideband. The LSB and USB settings can also be selected with individual pushbuttons.

The RX99PL is the only receiver available on the market which incorporates a "phase-locked AM" detector, ensuring distortion free reception of AM SWBC stations even during severe fading and interference. (Ed note: for more information on this controversial subject, consult Larry Magne's article, "The High Fidelity Future of Shortwave and Mediumwave AM Radio," in the 1983 World Radio-TV Handbook.)

The memory is capable of storing 99 channels, direct entry and access via the keyboard. For each individual channel the mode, bandwidth, antenna gain, sideband selection, and AGC time constant are stored in the memory. The display shows the memory channel and the mode/bandwidth in use.

Scanning functions: Any number of memory channels can be scanned by programming the lowest and highest channel number into registers A and B. Any frequency spectrum can be scanned, by programming the upper and lower limits into registers A and B. Sophisticated automatic start/stop scanning facilities, with preset broadcast and amateur bands are available.

The display shows the frequency, memory channel, meter band, bandwidth, reception mode, time, and date. Optionally, the name of the station can be shown on the lowest line, using up to 20 alpha-numeric characters. The modes and bandwidths are selected with up/down keys, located on either side of the display.

Frequency coverage: 40 kHz through 30 MHz, in 10 Hz steps. The FM broadcast band covers 88-108 MHz in 100 kHz steps. Plug-in converters are available to provide coverage of 60-88 MHz and 140-170 MHz.

Antenna Gain Selection: plus 10 dB, 0 dB, and -15 dB settings are possible.

Four tone control modes can be selected: low-medium-high-music.

The sleep function allows for an automatic switching off function in 10 minute increments, up to 60 minutes, indicated on the display. The standby function allows the timer to switch on the receiver at preselected times. The display indicates the standby mode.

An optional "intelligent" timer shows the actual time/date and allows the receiver to be switched on and off, according to time slots, programmable hourly, daily, or according to the date, within 1 minute accuracy. Each time slot can also select any of the 99 memory channels. A relay contact is provided for remote control of an external tape recorder.

Front panel controls:

- a. Volume, with power lock.
- b. Passband tuning (PBT) and clarifier.
In the PBT mode this control is used as passband tuning for SSB and phase-locked AM reception. In the LSB/USB and AM mode, this control automatically changes into a clarifier.
- c. Notch/bandpass/lowpass audio filter. (option)

Selectivity: (independent of mode)

2.2 kHz and 4.0 kHz, with shape factors 6/60 dB Of 1:1.8. Other filters are available for 12 kHz, 8 kHz, 6 kHz, 1.8 kHz, 1.0 kHz, and 0.5 kHz.

Sensitivity: 0.4 uV for 10 dB S plus N/N.

Dynamic range: 95 dB.

3rd order intercept point, plus 10 dBm.


AGC range, 120 dB

Image rejection: 80 dB.

Audio output: 1.5 watts maximum.

The Eska RX99PL will be in full production in August 1984. Price for the receiver without optional extras is 7.995 Danish krone, which is roughly the equivalent of \$ 800 U.S. There is no U.S. distributor listed at the present time.

John D. Tuchscherer, Neenah, Wisconsin, sends us his version of the WA3TAD antenna system described last month. John's version is mounted in his attic, and uses a loading coil, consisting of 100 feet of #16 insulated solid copper wire wound on 2" PVC pipe. This is the same type of wire as used for the antenna:



This antenna can also be used outdoors if the loading coil is weatherproofed.

ANDORRA R Andorra will resume bcs in a few weeks, after almost 3 yrs inactivity, in accordance with verbal permission from the Andorran govt to the Spanish para-state enterprise PROESA (Promoción de la Radiodifusión y Explotación Radiofónica SA). The possibility of transmitting in three langs, Catalan, Castilian and French is one of the factors prolonging previous negotiations. The 4-year contract is being discussed by reps of the enterprise, Andorran authorities, and reps of the co-princes of France and Spain. The present authorization is based on a principle of parity with the French station Sud Radio (Levi P Iversen, Klavestad, Norway, March Latinoamérica DX)

R Andorra reactivated on 6221, hrd in late afternoon in Germany (Kirk the Kommander, R Viktoria DX program via Play-DX 9/4) Director of R Andorra, 6221 is Gualver Osorio (Madrid-DX via Play-DX 16/4)

RNMN reported 26/4 that Andorran govt still hadn't been able to reach agreement w/France & Spain about the radios they operated from And terr. Andorrans, who'd

gone so far as to shut down xmtrs of R Andorra and Sud Radio in order to exert pressure, were demanding payments which neighbouring govts considered too hi. Spaniards had been rather blunt and'd simply refused to pay 350 kdollars Andorra was asking for being permit for 702 kHz MW, and similar amount for SW fq they'd not been using anyway for quite some time. More diplomatic French had paid part of sum requested and gone back on air w/300 kW Sud-Radio from Toulouse studios. French threatened to withdraw their 300 kW stn from Andorra if govt there didn't reduce financial demands. They were thought to be bluffing and Andorrans remained inflexible, arguing that only by being from Andorra could French stn make money from ads, not allowed in France itself. Battle for commercial income was main reason Spaniards staying off; wanted promise to restore former privilege of being ads in FR as well as SP lang pgms, but under French pressure, Andorrans not willing to give in on that point. But from time to time Spaniards conducting test xmsns from R Andorra "for circuit adjustment purposes" but real pgming not so far renewed (WBI 3/5)

But came back after a few weeks, hrd again 17/3 1028-1100 t/out; F sig but nothing near Em Gran Colombia's power, which this day was absent but which also uses offset fq of 4910.8! Be very careful. 



VENEZUELA R Reloj Continente discovered reactivated on 5030 20/4 1025+ w/chimes, multiple IDs, ad for night club show at 1028; F strength w/loud audio (Mark Warner, Vic) "La Nueva Radio Continente de Caracas" reactivated after months of silence, on 5030 13/4 & 14/4, 2300-0500*--just in time to block the R Los Andes [PERU] DX pgm for all overseas listeners, Suns 0400-0500! (CoTroneo, Dondi, Zella, di Tomasi, Play-DX)

VIETNAM Hoang Lien Son fair/clear on 5603.1, and stronger but heavy ute/SSB QRM on 6679.9, 11/5 1211-1235. Viet pgm to 1230, full ID, into local lang; in 20 mins drifted down to 6679.8 (Mark Warner, Vic) HLS on 5604 // 6681, both awfully poor (Ugusa) Obs of Nghia Binh BCing Stn reveal this sked on 5080, all in Vietnamese: *1145-1200* Sat, or a few mins after 1200. *1200-1230* Mon/Tue/Thu. *1145-1300* Wed/Fri. *1145-variable Sun, e.g. 1257*, 1316*, 1400*. CLANDESTINE CRANNY Vietnamese Resistance Radio is the first Viet cland since fall of Saigon in Apr 75. 0900 & 1500 xmsns can be hrd here in Japan; actually they sign on 5 to 7 mins before, around 0854 & 1454. Opens w/a song w/female vocal and male anmts given several times during the song, but can't understand because mixed w/song. Opening anmt in EG xlt: "This is Vietnamese Resistance Radio, transmitting from Base Camp 15 of the National United Front for Liberation of Vietnam, in the wavelengths of 30 and 40 meters, or 10300 and

7400 kc. Broadcast 5 times daily in the morning from 5 to 6, and from 9 to 10, at noon from 12 to 1, in the afternoon from 4 to 5, at night from 10 to 11." The 2200 xmsn is unhrd due to domination of Soviet stn co-channel. Not hrd at 0200, 0500 due to propagation. Pgm ends at 1000, 1600 w/song called "Let's Liberate Vietnam" (Giải phóng Việt Nam). Opening ID goes "Đây là đài phát thanh Việt Nam Kháng Chiến". Talk pgms frequently mention "Kampuchea" problem. Songs are often light, rather than pop, often soft and somewhat sorrowful. Likely from southern China, where else? Highly unlikely frm inside Vietnam because as far as I know there is no such place as 'liberated zone'. Not very strong, but constant catch every night [on 7355]--watch for further info (Isao Ugusa, DX Front Line 31/3)

VOV, Hanoi reported this statement from a ForN Ministry spokesman 5/4: "Recently there appeared on Thai territory a radio being stn attributed to the Vietnamese reactionaries which bcs anti-Vietnam pgms daily, calling for fighting to topple the Viet socialist regime. This is a very important act that violates Vietnam's sovereignty, undermines the friendship between the Vietnamese and Thai peoples, infringes intl law, and runs counter to the interests, peace and stability of the region. The SRV govt vehemently condemns this act of the Thai rulers and resolutely demands that they put an immediate end to this illegal act. The Thai rulers must be held fully responsible for their act." This statement is believed to refer to "Vietnamese Resistance Radio" (WBI 12/4)

14/4, EG-lang nxpaper Bangkok Post reported claims that Vietnamese resistance forces fighting "Hanoi troops" in Cambodia planned to set up a rebel radio stn. A source linked to a Belgian-based Vietnamese libn net said that the rebels comprised rightists who had fled after the fall of Saigon and had settled in the US & Europe. It was understood that the group had approached Maj-Gen Sutsai Hatsadin, a former member of the Internal Security Operations Command, to buy non-combat supplies and radio equipment (WBI 19/4) Referring to V.R.R.? (gh)

Voice of Khmers (La Voix des Khmers). Khmer People's Natl Libn Front has a small radio xmtr which works well thanks to techs formed in the friendly countries. Since Jan 84, this stn has decided to increase power to 10 kW, because the stn hears fruits [sic], and 2nd station was given to Sihanoukist's movement. Both these nationalist stns have same name, same fq, each 3 hours daily, morn, aft, eve, individually keeping proper personality. But so far only KPFLF stn operates regularly since installation (Pong Kim Koan, Le Chef du Bureau d'Information du FNLPK, Paris, via Bernard Chenal, France, via DX Front Line 26/4) Resistance source stated 16/1 that two anti-Viet forces, Khmer Serika (KPFLF) and Sihanouk faxion began radio xmsn within Kampuchea 15/1, called V of the Khmers, on MW from frontier area w/Thailand. Prince Ranalith (spelling tentative), who is a son as well as a rep of Prince Sihanouk, talked to the AFP. "The radio stn has two mobile xmtrs, used in concert by Sihanouk faxion and KPFLF. The two faxions have each xmsn hours, and each promote mutual developments of their programs by their own holdings. Power 5 kW, received by res memb in Oddar Mean Chey, Siem Riap and Kompong Chhnang." Prince Ranalith avoided mentioning location of stn. Officially began being 24/1; thrice daily for 5 hour total. Re construxion of stn, there were disagreements between two faxions until late Dec, and Premier Son Sann had been trying to maintain their political originality, but currently these two faxions have been trying to decrease mutual disagreements (AFP Bangkok 16/1 & 24/1 via Jan South East Asia Monthly via DX Front Line 26/4) [Those wishing to read SEAs Monthly themselves should be aware it is only in Japanese]

V of National Army of Democratic Kampuchea, 5200 kHz, is coming in better than previously, obs *1000-1330 Kampuchean, 1330-1400* Viet. Viet anmt at 1330 reveals the Viet pgm is bc twice daily at 0015-0045 & 1330-1400. Kamp lang sked ancd at 1000, unreadable. Had spl extended sked 15-17/4, celebrating Kamp New Year and commemorating "libn" in 1975-17/4; +1000-1416* (1407* 16/4 & 17/4), preempting normal Viet pgm 1330-1400*; 18/4 back to usual sked (Isao Ugusa, Kobe, Japan, DX Front Line 26/4)

V of Democratic Kampuchea, which bcs from xmtrs in China material hostile to govt of Cambodia and to Viet involvement in that country, ancd that from 6/5 it'd be being its 2330-0030 xmsn on 9440 & 6185 //B345; 0400-0500 15400 11725, 0900-1000 17533 15115 11870, 1300-1400 15165 11675; "Samleung Kampuchea Pracheathipatei", pro-Pol Pot (WBI)

V of People of Malaysia, one of the most hard to hear clands of all time, stn of MCP ML faxion, can be received here on 7072v, *1130-1330* in Cantonese, Std Chinese, Malay & Tamil; again at *1430-1530* in Cantonese & Std Chinese. Stn has been using low-powered fq in hamband for years, making it quite difficult to pick up. This is the first time I ever received it. Fq varies 7070-7075, very frequently blocked by local hams, but at times w/fair strength, S3. Also in morn around 2200 in Malay, again w/heavy ham QRM--seems 40m more crowded this time of year due to students' spring vacation. Talk, mx, sound not so different from VOMD. Regret that I can't

understand Malay or other langs they use very well, as it might be interesting to know how the scathing attacks on MCP mainstream are going. Opening ID is "Inilah Suara Rakyat Malaysia." Sked is ancd as: 2130-2200 Cantonese, 2200-2230 Malay, 2230-2300 Chinese, 2300-2330 Tamil; 1130-1200 Cantonese, 1200-1230 Chinese, 1230-1300 Malay, 1300-1330 Tamil, 1400-1430 Chinese(hrd at 1500-1530 instead), 1430-1500 Cantonese (Isao Ugusa, DX Front Line, Japan, 31/3)

V of Malayan Democracy, MCP main stream stn, hrd on 6699 & 8999; former replaces 6670 which had been used since Nov 81. 6699 reception is much improved over 6670; and 8999 is only barely confirmable for several weeks. Hrd at *1215-1330* in Malay & Chinese. Opening ID in Malay is "Inilah Suara Demokrasi Malaya", gives wavelengths of 45 & 33 meters (Isao Ugusa, Japan, DX Front Line 31/3)

V of the Free Tamil State 22/4, AFP quoted SL govt owned npaper Sunday Times that Tamil-separatist radio bcs picked up in Sri Lanka and southern India were believed to be beamed from a North Korean ship anchored in the narrow straits between India & Sri Lanka, outside the new surveillance zone set up earlier this month by the Natl Security Ministry and "safely out of reach of the Navy and Air Force". The weekend bcs in EG, Sinhalese and Tamil, calling for a separate Tamil state in the north and east of Sri Lanka and advocating terrorism were said to be beamed by a powerful xmtr which was shifted around to avoid jamming (WBI 26/4)

R Salvation of Iran, hostile to Khomeyni & Iran govt, hrd 1630-1820 on 15555 & 9027, fq's normally used by R Homeland [Vatan], and have also been used, possibly by mistake by "R Iran". At 1630, R Salvation of Iran (Persian: Radyo Nejat-e Iran) IDed in EG as "Voice of Iran's Liberation" (WBI 12/4) Again hrd on Vatan channels, 22/4 1630-1715 on 15555 & 9027; previous day found at 1819 on 11640, channel on which R Iran operates 1830-1925. This is further evidence that R Homeland, R Iran, and R Salvation of Iran, all hostile to Khomeyni & Iranian govt, operate from same host country (WBI 26/4) Such as?

National Voice of Iran continues at 1730-1815 & 1930-2000 in Azeri & Persian on 6025 & 5915. Monitoring shows stn which was pro-Khomeyni til apx end of 1982, now carries anti-Khomeyni and pro-Tudeh Party commentaries. Too, stn is pro-Soviet and bcs anti-US commentaries (note: xmtr site is same as R Baku's DS & ES) (WBI 3/5) Persian ID: Seda-ye Melli-ye Iran (ibid.)

V of the Iraqi People (Arabic: Idha'at Sawt ash-Sha'b al-'Iraqi) (Surani Kurdish: Ere deng-y gel-y Iraqe), describes itself as voice of the Iraqi Communist Party; on 6952v 1330-1400 AR, 1400-1430 Surani Kurdish; first hrd 23/3/82. V of Iraqi Kurdistan ancd that pgms'd been inaugurated 21/3/82, tho similar anmt'd been carried a year previous ly (WBI 12/4)

V of Palestine, V of the Palestine Revolution, since 17/4 this stn hostile to Yasir Arafat and describing itself as the 'voice of natl unity' in Lebanon, hrd on 1504 kHz 1500-1700 apx instead of 1700-1900 (WBI 26/4)

V of the Mountain Kuwaiti npaper al-Watan reported 8/4 that its correspondents'd visited stn somewhere in mountainous area overlooking Beirut and the coast. Tho modest, stn's departments appeared to be major info institution, a honeycomb of activity. Was officially inaugurated 1/2/84; three daily nxcasts at 0830, 1430, 1930 local; hourly nx summaries and flash reports. The Progressive Socialist Party supervised the radio politically, but this didn't mean it was introvertedly regional, for it was truly the voice of the nationalist opposition in Leb, al-Watan said. Stn was pleasantly surprised that its 25 kw on 1080 kHz reached as far as Europe, USSR and planned increase to 50 kw in a few weeks, and would also xmit on a SW fq beamed to all countries (WBI 12/4)

V of the Arab Revolution fq continues varying; since 17/4 around 1387 kHz (WBI 26/4)

V of the Free Sons of the Yemeni South Monitoring confirms continuing existence of this stn hostile to govt of the PDR Yemen in Aden; AR apx 1300-1700 on 11180 (WBI 3/5)

V of the Sudanese Popular Revolution (Arabic: Sawt ath-Thawrah ash-Sha'b'iyah as-Sudan'iyah), hostile to Pres Numayri and the Sudanese govt, 1430-1730 AR on 17940 incl nx 1445-1500, 1600-1605, 1715-1720; closing anmts 1720. First obs 17/8/82; all times subject to variation. From xmtr in Libya; was off the air Jan, Feb, part of Mar 84. Reappeared 28/3 after several days of intermittent xmtr tests which included relay of Libyan radio DS (WBI 19/4) Since at least 18/4 carrying occl items in EQ; 18/4 at 1531, 20/4 1600, 21/4 1520 (WBI 26/4)

V of the Western Somali & Somali Abo Liberation Fronts, from xmtr in Mogadishu, now hrd in SM on 6095 1030-1100 instead of 1200-1230 (WBI 10/5)

V of the Resistance of the Black Cockerel, supporting Savimbi & UNITA movement, was first traced w/new 1200-1300 xmsn on 15180, 8/4 (WBI 12/4)

R Liberación An Amsterdam committee has started fund-raising for such a stn to be operated by the Chilean opposition. Does anyone have any further info on this? (Michiel Schaay, SWNS 30/4)

R Rebelión has been being again during the Viña del Mar [Chile] song festival in late Feb. Short xmsns contained severe criticism against politix of Pinochet and called for another "paro nacional". Supposed to come from mobile FM xmtrs w/max 100 W mounted in cars moving from place to place, making it harder for the authorities to locate them (Qué pasa via Christian Zettl, Austria, Radio Nuevo Mundo)

V of Pedro Joaquín Chamorro; 4/4, V of Sandino, hostile to Nic govt, invited listeners in Nicaragua to listen to this, the mouthpiece of ARDE (Democratic Revolutionary Alliance). It'd xmit on 555 kHz MW next to R Corporación at 1230 1830 2230 (WBI 12/4) Check of 555 6-9/4 failed to reveal existence of this stn (WBI 19/4) & on 1/5 around 0600 I hrd on 555 obviously pro-Sandinista Mayday celebration (gh)

La Voz de Cuba Independiente y Democrática Radio Camilo Cienfuegos stn on new 10040v, sometimes closer to 10041, from about 13/5, running all night, and almost all-day w/ breaks. About a week later hrd claiming 24h sked here; also has "línea directa" nx from phone-line; another time hrd using as 2-way stn, "Estudio 1 llamando estudio 2". Usual fare of entertainment and anti-Castro diatribes. This should be easy to DF; if FCC won't reveal site, how about 2 or 3 hams w/30m beams? (gh)

R Abdala plans a comeback w/3 kW xmtr when a secure site is available in July; now is on Tue & Thu nights at 7:30 EDT via other Florida stns. Also has broadcast to Cubans in Angola via foreign govt stns (Robert Horvitz, RN MN 3/5)

Spy Numbers 4-digit Spanish lady numbers xmsns have been traced to a heavily guarded installation bristling w/towers and ants, "U.S. Army Warrenton [VA] Training Center, Station D" per signs. Pentagon says mission classified. Same stn bcs KKN50, registered to State Dept but widely believed to be CIA. Voz de Nicaragua pamphlet about a US spy says he was carrying instruxions to listen to 11530, one of the Warrenton fqs, and a cipher pad stamped "Raven" (from a much longer article in 22/4 Los Angeles Herald Examiner by Kerry Webster, via May ASWLC)

NORTH AMERICAN PIRATES R Clandestine on 11850 2027-2051 3/3 w/ rock mx, 2029 ID by R F Burns and skit about Mr Wizard & Timmy making a nuclear reactor, 2039 w/Battle Creek addr, 2046 smothered by BBC IS (Richard A D'Angelo, Wyomissing PA) Also 29/4 0300 on 7355, taking advantage of the huge audience already tuned to that fq for World of Radio (gh)

"KMA" 30/4 0053-0122* on 7410--severe static at first but better toward end--pirate nx, rock; 0116 gave addr P O Box 3192, Joliet IL 60434; "tell 'em Dr. 'Y' sent you." 0119, "the rock of the pirates, KMA; this program is [not 'very proudly'] coming to you from the United States of America" (John Norfolk, Oklahoma City OK)

"KQRP" VG 30/4 0147-0154* on 7425 w/rock, s/off saying 73s to the G-men. 6-7/5 2301-2422* on 6233 playing Irish folk ballads, 2313 ID as relay of The Sons of Ireland, a fellow pirate beer, so probably my unID 25/3 0034-0118* on 7410 as same mx. Then Dr X said, "we bc from a secluded wilderness location known only to Smokey the Bear... avoiding the detexion finding direxional antennas of Uncle Charley and the IRS, two communist pinko organizations", more ballads, oocl rock; also briefly 0325-0327* on 6205 again relaying "The Sons of Ireland" (John Norfolk, OKC)







EQUATORIAL GUINEA R. Nacional de Bata, 7998.5, 2020-2055 when forced to tune out by amazing 30-minute hailstorm. Long talk by M, ID. (Krueger, FL 5-5)

GABON RJapan (Moyabi relay), 15315, in GM 0529-0559*; Clear "Hier ist Radio Japan mit Tokyo." Into FR. Good. (Krueger, FL 5-13)

MOROCCO Medi-un, 15250, in FR *0630-0642 carrier and into quickly potted-up nx summary by M. Ad, Beatles, "Ob-la-di, ob-la-da," second ID and into McCartney/Jackson, ""(This is) the Man." Excellent. (Krueger, FL 5-13)

PERU R. Chanchamayo, 4895.4, in SP 0235-0247; fair-good per Parks tip. Semi-slick LAM nx magazine w/ M anncr, ID 0246. Haven't heard this in years. (Krueger, FL 5-11)+++R. Acobamba, 5324.9, in SP 0058-0103; poor via ECSSB. Presumed w/ M anncr in monologue. (Krueger, FL 5-11)

First in the feature spot, a fascinating report from Ralph Perry on Radio Liberte, the Haitian clandestine stn:

9610, Radio Liberte, anti-Baby Doc clandestine. Finally a QSL received with some background on this intriguing outlet! I had sent reception reports to a number of organizations in Miami in the hope that one would forward my report to the RDNP, and the Haitian Refugee Center in Miami was able to do just that. Friendly letter from M. Jean Lescoflair, Coordonateur--Branche de Floride, the Rassemblement des Democratres Nationaux-Progressistes d'Haiti (RDNP) was received in both FR and EG. RDNP has 26 branches the world over, in Europe, Africa, USA, Canada, and LAM. "We want democracy and the same justice for all. We want to stop the flow of refugees to Florida by organizing the Haitian country, creating jobs and making Haitians proud again of the first Black Republic of the Americas." Pocket calendar gives further information on RDNP: the Secretary General is M. Leslie F. Manigat. The motto, which I've heard at every xmsn's end is, "Pour un grand sursat national, ensemble, ensemble, ensemble, jusqua la victoire finale!" Platform of RDNP is democratic (for fundamental liberties, human rights, periodic elections);

national (restoration of a sense of national dignity, control of strategic economic segments by the populace, international investment in Haiti directed by a national scheme of oversight); progressive (integrated social development).

QSL seekers can take a direct route now, since the letterhead indicates the following addresses: in the USA, P.O. Box 380171, Miami, FL 33138. Headquarters in Venezuela, Apartado Postal N. 18060, El Silencio, Caracas, 1012A Venezuela. They only transmit on one SW channel, no MW planned. Also sent a printed publicity sheet on the stn which says, "Hatiens, Captez les emissions du R.D.N.P. diffusees sur 31m 9610 K.C. (S.W. Mercredi et dimanche de 5h a 6h p.m. et de 7h a 8h p.m.)" A most pleasing verie and, I believe, the first in the world. Received 4-27-84.



On to our regular feature, a report from Juan Carlos Codina in Lima, Peru:

- 2950.1 Peru Radio Yungay, Yungay, Ancash. Confirming that this is an Ancash stn, I have now hrd them with a lot of anncmts for Yungay and Caraz. Sometimes IDing as "La nueva Radio Yungay." Seems to be a fundamental as 5900.1 not found at least today. S-9 plus signal and going till 0220, so should be possible from overseas. No mention of frequency, though, but a check of possible fundamental of 1475 found nothing so pretty sure that this is fundamental. Do not be confused about the strange frequency because as has been noted in the past, Peruvian stns can be expected to use any frequency in the spectrum with little regard for rules, licenses, etc. Later hrd on same freq anncing that they will be obtaining a new xmtr from Lima soon. And noted again the next night closing w/ NA 0231* and anncing opening as *1400.
- 3705.5 Colombia Began to notice a very low power LAm stn daily w/ a variety of mx, tropical, romantic ballads, etc. Barely audible but stable and regular. Later monitoring confirmed that this is a Colombian and that its name is Radio Lux. Relatively far away from here and also w/ very low power. Heard: "la hora en todo Colombia . . ." and "Radio Lux esta en todas partes."
- 4935.1 Peru R. Abancay, Abancay, Apurimac. Reactivated heard from several days ago but just identified. Very poor and with strong QRM from the lower side via Radio Tropical (4934.6) and later QRMed by R. Norte, Montero, Bolivia.
- 6229.8 Bolivia Radioemisoras Totoral, Oruro? First noted at 2301 w/ good signal and fairly stable, modulation not too bad. Tropical mx by request ("pedidos musicales") Later moved to 6230 and then going upwards. Saometimes FAX and CW QRM. Later back to 6229.6. Reached 6223 kHz about 0130. Later noted daily moving from 6232 to 6205 on average.
- 10243 Peru Radio Yuracyacu, Rioja, San Martin. Opening 2315 w/ NA and full ID but no mention of QTH. "Criolla" mx during the first hour and very poor signal, seemingly no more than 10 watts. Hrd "Oriente" 0320 which means is located in the selvatic, and upon rechecking the ID against a map found the true spelling and location near Rioja. Surely this also confirms that frequency was chosen to compete w/ R.Estacion 2000, Rioja, now inactive. Perhaps this is even that transmitter!?! Don't think so because 2000 had much better power. Closing 0403 w/ NA. Very amateur operation, sometimes with slogan "10242 kilociclos, en sus receptores" with rolled R. Must be clandestine.

I'M BACK FROM MY "VACATION!"




