






Cool weather at last! CONTACT correspondents have noticed a distinct improvement in reception conditions. The last week or so was not so good because of very bad ionospheric storms -- this too shall pass. We have a lot to get to this month, so let's get to it...

It appears very likely that the matter of the Communications Privacy Act will be settled very soon, one way or the other. First, here is the latest word from Robert Horvitz (Government Affairs Liaison, ANARC, 1634 15th Street NW, Washington DC 20009) dated 19 September 1986:

The senate Judiciary Committee this morning gave unanimous approval to S.2575, the Electronic Communications Privacy Act. Consideration of the bill took exactly 25 seconds.

Senator Paul Simon (D-IL) introduced two amendments to the bill on behalf of the Association of North American Radio Clubs (ANARC). One reduces the penalty for a first interception with no bad purpose of public land mobile radio services (including cellular, older carphones and paging) to a fine of \$500, eliminating the 6-month jail term. The other eliminates criminal penalties for interception with no bad purpose of broadcast remote pick-up stations, but permits the federal government to seek court injunctions against interceptors, accompanied by a \$500 civil fine. The Simon amendments, offered as compromises with those wanting stiffer penalties, were accepted and incorporated in the bill.

S.2575 now goes to the Subcommittee on Communications for a brief review, then to the floor of the Senate for a vote as early as next week. A related bill, HR.4952, has already passed the House of Representatives. If the Senate passes the bill approved this morning, a House-Senate conference may be needed to iron out differences between the two bills. Or the Senate version could simply be passed by the House. The latter is faster, and would preserve the gains ANARC made in the Senate version.

In its present form, S.2575 would make it legal to monitor the radio portion of a cordless telephone call or a tone pager; any marine and aeronautical radio communications; any communication transmitted "for the use of the general public;" any Amateur, CB, or General Mobile radio transmission; any governmental, law enforcement, civil defense, private land mobile, or public safety communications, including police and fire, which are "readily accessible to the public".

ANARC continues to oppose the bill's definition of "readily accessible" as contrary to physical reality in many cases. The definition also limits First Amendment rights in electronic media, by making it a crime to receive certain communications on a pretext that they are inaccessible, when they actually are accessible. But, given the likelihood of passage, we prefer the Senate version as the lesser of two evils, and regard the adoption of Sen. Simon's amendments as an important victory.

How depressing, and ironic: we are in the unenviable position of having to choose between two LAWS on the basis of the lesser of two EVILS. All this only to cater to business interests who have manipulated the nation's lawmakers into protecting ill-informed and even dishonest business practices. This situation is the more infuriating in that there are already *excellent* laws on the books that protect the integrity and security of communication, while not endangering fundamental freedoms. I say again: how depressing.

I thought that you might find it interesting to see what the Communications Act of 1934 (47 USC 605) does to protect the security of communication:

Section 607. Unauthorized publication or use of communications

Except as authorized by chapter 119, Title 18, no person receiving, assisting in receiving, transmitting, or assisting in transmitting, any interstate or foreign communication by wire or radio shall divulge or publish the existence, contents, substance, purport, effect, or meaning thereof, except through authorized channels of transmission or reception, (1) to any person other than the addressee, his agent, or attorney, (2) to a person employed or authorized to forward such communication to its destination, (3) to proper accounting or distributing officers of the various communicating centers over which the communication may be passed, (4) to the master of a ship under whom he is serving, (5) in response to a subpoena issued by a court of competent jurisdiction, or (6) on demand of other lawful authority. No person not being authorized by the sender shall intercept any radio communication and divulge or publish the existence, contents, substance, purport, effect, or meaning of such intercepted communication to any person. No person not being entitled thereto shall receive or assist in receiving any interstate or foreign communication by radio and use such communication (or any information therein contained) for his own benefit or the benefit of another not entitled thereto. No person having received any intercepted radio communication or having become acquainted with the contents, substance, purport, effect, or meaning of such communication (or any part thereof) knowing that such communication was intercepted, shall divulge or publish the existence, contents, substance, purport, effect or meaning of such communication (or part thereof) or use such communication (or any information therein contained) for his own benefit or for the benefit of another not entitled thereto. This section shall not apply to the receiving, divulging, publishing, or utilizing the contents of any radio communication which is broadcast or transmitted by amateurs or others for the use of the general public, or which relates to ships in distress.

It would be very difficult indeed to conceive of a law which gives greater protection to the rights of people who use radio for communication, while preserving freedoms which we in the United States have (until recently, apparently) considered essential and inviolable. Why we need a new law, when this superb example of the lawmaker's art has served us so well, is quite beyond me.

The original discussion about donating a transmitter to a needy country has taken yet another turn. It became clear that the original form of the idea would be very difficult to implement. That led some people to wonder about DXpeditions to interested countries with the purpose of relaying native radio broadcasts. The mention of DXpeditions, which are noteworthy activities in Amateur radio, led others to suggest that we could accomplish the some of the original goals of the project (i.e., listening to rare and exotic stations from countries with limited or with no SW broadcasting facilities) by tuning in on Ham transmissions. I still maintain that this is not quite the same thing: how many Hams play music from their locality, or read the local news, or conduct interviews with local personalities? I do, however, take the point that listening to the Ham bands can be, in its own way, very interesting and informative. Two people take up this theme. Thom Giella (League City, Texas) writes as follows:

[...] I would say say my DXing versus program listening is about 50/50 but about 25% of that time I spend listening to amateur radio operators. I've heard everything from Palmer Station, Antarctica to stateside AMers including Duke Alexander of EGE fame. The point I'm trying to make is the the Amateur bands are fascinating, with a lot to hear and learn. I've picked up many useful pointers on antennas, propagation, etc., and believe me they don't mind SWLs listening in. They would love to have us fill their ranks. It's a good way to pick up some QSL cards -- other than broadcast ones. I am not a licensed Amateur but probably will be some day; I just wish they would lower the code test down to, say, 9 words per minute for the General ticket! One nifty trick I learned was to attach a 10 micro-Henry RF choke coil [If memory serves, Radio Shack sells

these--sgm] at the end of my 188' lonwire to drain-off static electricity without signal loss. [This is a new one to me: any comments? -- sgm] By the way, I have noticed a gradual reduction of lightening static the past two weeks, which means the DX season is right around the corner.

If anyone is interested in getting his or her own monitoring station callsign, then the man to get in touch with is Hank Bennet at P.O. Box 3333, Cherry Hill, New Jersey, 08034 and be sure to enclose a SASE for a reply. I'm thinking about callsign ADX3TFG.

Last but not least, it sure is a pain to cut my loggings into individual strips. Also, I find it a bit annoying to see up to a third of my monthly logs omitted for whatever reason. Stamps and envelopes do cost money. Till next time.

P.S. I wonder if the new, soon-to-arrive Kenwood and TEN TEC receivers will be as good as the Icom is.

About the receivers, keep an eye on the Technical Topics column for further news. A lot of ground to cover here: Thom has accurately pointed out the major benefits of listening to the Ham bands -- are there any others we missed?

Back to the 2" strip business again: The consensus seems to be that it is a chore, but thus far, no real alternative has been offered. I take it that the individual (i.e., cut-up) strips are a necessary convenience in assembling the Log Reports; the alternative (talk about a chore!) would be to submit the loggings collected onto large pieces of paper: the Log editor would then have to cut apart and arrange them (often in the hundreds), or number the individual loggings and then hunt for successive entries. In either case, this would materially increase the time needed to assemble the columns which, in turn, would push back the due date for submitting the loggings to the editors thereby reducing the very attractive advantage of currency. The only other possibility that I have wondered about is the making-up of preprinted 3x5 index cards which could simply be filled out, put in frequency order and mailed; they could even be made, I suppose, into post cards for the quick submittal of a 'hot flash.' The disadvantage to this idea is, of course, that the index cards are bulky and expensive. Any other ideas? I'd be glad to work-up a form and see to the printing if anyone is interested.

I sympathize with you in the matter of 'dropped logs,' but the pressures of space require something of the sort. The Log Report editors do not usually repeat a log in two successive months; this seems to be about the best compromise possible. One way to avoid disappointment would be to check the previous month's listings to see if there are any duplications with yours: if so, then you might consider not sending that one along. In any case, please be aware that your logs - yes, even the dropped ones - are very much appreciated by virtue of the fact that we all know the work and effort it requires to write them up and send them off.

Finally, a letter from Rob Gerardi (Benton, Illinois). At some length, he discusses the listening possibilities open to SWLs on the Ham bands; this is not entirely surprising as he writes the HAM TIPS column for CIDXC:

James Hill's letter, in the September CONTACT, seems to have raised not only several valid points regarding the "buy-a-transmitter" discussion but several questions as well. Having edited a Ham DX column for the Canadian International DX Club for the past 10 years, as well as having been a SWL DXer of the Ham bands for the past 16 years of my 21 years as a SWL, I would like to address myself to those questions.

With regard to the question "...Would, for example, a concerted effort to expand SWL exposure to Hams' transmissions be as interesting, useful, informative, etc. as an effort to expand the standard broadcast facilities of a country?" I would answer definitely in the affirmative! When you listen to an Amateur from another country you are listening, for the most part, to someone who is just a "normal" citizen of his or her country. They may not speak English very well, or might surprise you how well they understand the English language. What you are listening to is communication between individuals, not news reports, comments, or feature programs by trained announcers expressing the views of their country's political or economic leaders. While the foreign amateur may

not always express political or economic views, he or she can give you something much more -- a view into the day-to-day life of a citizen their country.

I've had the pleasure, which seems to have eluded James Hill, of hearing Tom Christian, VR6TC, and his wife Betty, VR6YL, several times. Each time I have found out something new about their daily life on Pitcairn Island, such as the fact that the island has no physician; Betty (a nurse) is the only licensed medical person on the island. Thanks to the Christians, I have learned more about this remote place than I would have from several other sources.

Not only can you hear people from exotic locations, but it is also possible to listen to unusual events as they happen. SWLing the Ham bands has allowed me to 'be with' famed explorer Willy DeRoos as he successfully navigated the arctic 'Northwest Passage' alone in 1979, as I followed his nightly progress reports to friends and supporters by Ham radio. Also, I followed the progress of a group of Norwegians and Minnesotans as they sailed a replica of a viking ship across the Atlantic.

I'm sure that everyone has knowledge of the important rôle Ham radio played in relaying information regarding the Mexico City earthquake and the Grenada invasion in the last few years. Careful monitoring of the Ham bands provided more up-to-date and accurate information than the domestic or SWBC news services could provide.

Though, I must admit, the majority of signals you encounter on the HF Amateur bands will not be this exciting or interesting, you can carefully tune through the 20 meter band (USB-upper side band-signals from 14100 - 14350 kHz) and find several international conversations during the morning, afternoon or early evening hours. I must caution, though, that in many cases DX contacts between Amateurs may only be an exchange of signal reports and callsigns. Thus patience is required to find one of the more interesting or longer contacts. But they are there and can be found.

[...] A good start would be, as James Hill suggested, one of the various DX "net" frequencies. This would allow you to become accustomed to the callsigns, and Ham operating procedures. You can also hear interesting exchanges on these nets between the controlling stations and several of the DX stations, the four most easily heard are:

Rob is obviously very enthusiastic about this aspect of SWL. I will finish with his letter in next month's CONTACT -- he goes on to discuss Hams' attitudes about being overheard.

Easy Listening

SUNDAY

0015-0130: "Radio Club" (Spanish Foreign Radio). This is SFR's mailbag program. Letters read are usually from North America, but occasionally from other English speaking areas--like Australia or New Zealand--as well. Usually summarizes and answers brief questions for three letters a program, each letter followed by a Spanish song, usually selected with some relevance to the content of the letter just read. (9.630/6.125. Repeated at 0115 on the same frequencies and at 0515 on 9.630).

0110a-0115a: "Letter from Bonn" (Deutsche Welle). The usual "Letter from--" format, a loosely structured essay about goings on in the West German capital. The emphasis is more on human interest than on politics or current affairs--like the prevalence of bicycles in Bonn or carnival time. (6.040/6.085/6.145/ 9.545/9.565. Repeated at 0310 on 6.010/9.545/9.565/9.640 and at 0510 on 6.120/6.130/5.960)

MONDAY

0110a-0115a: "Sportorama" (Radio Budapest). Although Radio Budapest is not strictly "easy listening", it has been coming in better than usual this summer in Louisiana. "Sportorama" is a brief review of sports--soccer, track and field, Grand Prix auto racing, etc., usually with emphasis on Hungarian participation in international events. (6.025/9.520/9.835/12.000. Repeated at 0210 on the same frequencies).

0230-0235: "What's on Radio Japan?" (Radio Japan). An overview of the week's upcoming programs. The emphasis is on the week's features on Radio Japan's regularly scheduled programs--like "Asia Now;" "Japan Panorama," or "Japan Travelogue"--rather than on special programs that will be aired in the coming week. Actually there are very few "special" programs on Radio Japan since their format is already rather rigid. Sometimes played taped excerpts from a coming program (15.195/15.425/17.825).

TUESDAY

1309-1330: "Twenty-four Hours" (BBC). A current affairs program that covers just about any topic making the recent news headlines, and some stories otherwise more obscure (like Tamil separatists in Sri Lanka that has only recently made the major U.S. news networks). Usually averages six to seven feature segments a program and always ends with a summary of the news headlines and quotations from the Share Index (on weekdays). (11.775. Bx earlier at 0509 on 6.175/5.975 the night before). Daily

0110-0130: "The Song and the Singer" (Kol Israel). Each week features a different folk or pop singer or group in Israel, their music (about four songs per program) and background commentary about the performer. These songs are not necessarily topping the pop charts in Israel, but may be of a more specialized nature, such as folk songs or religious music. All songs done in Hebrew but English title given (9.435/5.885/7.465)

WEDNESDAY

2030-2100: "Listeners' Request Club" (Radio Moscow). A lively program of requests for Soviet music or any other kind though Soviet pop songs do seem predominant. Includes a "Pen Pal" segment where listeners interested in pen-pals may send a brief tape indicating their interests and preferences. Also features a "Rising Stars" featuring up and coming groups on the Soviet pop scene. (11.840) Every other week.

0140-0145: "Socialism Today and Tomorrow" (Radio Prague). This program is not limited to the practice of Socialism in Czechoslovakia, but ranges as far afield as hydro-electric plants in Siberia or the suitability of Sofia, Bulgaria, as a site for the 1992 winter olympics. Program usually ends with a quizz question. As a matter of fact, you have to pay pretty close attention to the program to answer the question--they're not exactly "gimmies". (5.930/7.345/11.990/9.740. Repeated at 0340 on the same frequencies).

THURSDAY

0025-0030: "Life in Cuba" (Radio Havana Cuba). This is a series of interviews with Cubans in various walks of life, although for the last few months they seem to have mainly featured people in the medical profession--graduating medical students, prospective medical students, and those involved in Cuba's "Family Doctor" program (6.100/9.740. Repeated at 0220 on 6.100/6.140/9.740 and at 0420 on 6.100/6.090/9.740).

0115-0130: "Tourist Newsletter" (Spanish Foreign Radio). An overview of events in Spain that would be of interest to tourists or prospective tourists--festivals, exhibits, etc. Usually features two or three items of interest and one or two Spanish songs as musical interludes. (9.630/6.125. Broadcast earlier at 0015 on the same frequencies at 0515 on 9.630).

FRIDAY

0010-0030: "Letters to the Editor" (Radio Australia). Letters gleaned from Australian newspapers are read in toto with the name and address of the writer given at the end of each letter. Letters are most often grouped around a specific theme--like foreign aid or education----and there are usually two or three topics per program. As a rule, they try to close with a humorous or light-hearted letter. (15.320/15.395/17.795).

0205-0215: "The Holy Koran and Its Meaning" (Radio Cairo). A simple but interesting program featuring the chanting of the Koran in Arabic followed by its English translation. The text is presented as is without interpretation (.9.475/9.675)


SATURDAY

1315--1325: "Industry and Technology" (BRT). Interview with those in some way connected with Belgian industry or technology. Past segments have included interviews with the head of a bus manufacturing concern, the Belgian film crew to be used by ABC in broadcasting the world cycling championships in Colorado, and the South Korean ambassador about trade relations between Belgium and South Korea (15.590. Broadcast earlier at 0045 the night before on 9.830)

2210-2215: "Outlook" (Voice of Turkey). Editorials covering Turkey's relations with foreign countries--France, West Germany and Bulgaria. Also includes other special features of current interest, such as an essay on international terrorism following the attack on the synagogue in Istanbul and the proposed reduction in American foreign aid to Turkey (9.560. Repeated at 0310 on the same frequency).

I also want to thank Kevin Klein (as well as apologize to him for losing his name) for his tip on Radio Nacional de Colombia that I mentioned in last month's column. He suggests that if AFRTS is a problem (as it is here in Louisiana) that you might get them via ECSS.

GOLDEN DAYS

OR

WHAT IS A GRID LEAK CAPACITOR ANYWAY???

Ah Yes...Autumn! The season always makes me wax nostalgic. I start missing things from my past. My Radio Shack DX160, Electronics Illustrated, those thick electronics catalogs put out by Allied and Lafayette. 25 cent air-variable capacitors. ARRL Novice license guides with the black and red covers. Small format CQ, 73 and QST magazines. My first soldering project (a code practice oscillator). CONELRAD marks on your radio dial. Heavy sigh!!!!

Anyway, since I'm in this mood and I am the column editor, I am happy to discover a letter from JOE ERWIN. Joe has some memories too. So I give you, for your nostalgic radio pleasure...

THE 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF STROMBERG-CARLSON

My earliest recollection of this old radio was at age four when my father would tune the shortwaves. The radio made such a racket that I would run upstairs to escape the noise. My father owned a business called Mercury Radio in Washington, D.C. and he would bring home a succession of old radios and televisions for the family to use. One of these was a 1936 Stromberg-Carlson console with acoustical labyrinth sound. Somehow it has survived moving from D.C. to Texas and a hurricane in Virginia. It's fifty years old this year, maybe it will make 100.

This big baby has 14 tubes including a tri-focal tuning eye. The chassis must weigh about 35 lbs. and the wood cabinet 50+ lbs. The five bands start at Long Wave-Weather 145-370 kc., Standard Broadcast 530-1700 kc., Amateur-Aircraft 1.7 to 5.6 mc., Shortwave-Foreign 5.6 to 18 mc., and Ultra Shortwave 18 to 60 mc. That's a lot of radio even if it doesn't have FM. A very long antenna is necessary to pick up any stations.

Around 1967 I began to use the hollow tube forest for pubescent SWL. Those first foreign stations, however common today, really gave you a charge as a novice when you first hear them. Radio Australia, where have you gone? Nowadays the Stromberg sits semi-retired, letting younger, more mobile receivers do the heavy work. The sound is a little raspy and the sensitivity diminished--but at age 50 this old radio can still swing to Radio Rumbos.

Thanks Joe. You bring up some very good points in your memories. Points also echoing through TOM KNEITEL K2AES editorial in the August 1986 issue of POPULAR COMMUNICATIONS. Okay, end of soapbox. A new portable radio has hit the streets. Our own ERNIE BEHR has taken the time to give us the straight poop on it. Take it away Ernie...

THE PHILIPS D-1835 MINI-PORTABLE
by ERNIE BEHR

The new Philips D-1835 travel portable, made in Hong Kong, is available from Philips dealers in Canada since May 1986, although it is not yet marketed in the U.S., I bought one of these sets recently at a special sale price of \$90 Can., which is equal to about \$65 US, but the regular list price is around \$120 Can.

The set is non-digital with a vertical tuning dial, and is similar to the Sony-ICF-7600A in size and appearance, measuring 7 1/2 x 4 3/4 x 1 1/2". The D-1835 covers all international SW bands from 49 to 11 meters in nine separate ranges, including the new 21 meter band. Three additional bands cover MW, LW, and FM. The set operates on 4 "aa" cells and has a 3" speaker with a clear, crisp sound, slider controls for volume, tone and band selection, and a LED tuning indicator.

LARRY MAGNE reviewed the D-1835 on SWL Digest and reported rather poor to mediocre performance, but I found its sensitivity and selectivity exceptionally good for a set of this size (even though I'm not easy to please when it comes to SW receivers). Perhaps they made some improvements in their most recent models for the Canadian market. Using the whip antenna, I was able to hear almost every station that was audible on my Drake SPR-4, including some weak ones like Equatorial Guinea on 9553 and Cook Islands on 11761 khz. The set also seems to have an excellent, sharp filter, which separates adjacent signals 5 khz apart without any difficulty. Columbia was noted with a clear signal on 11793, despite AFRTS on 11790, and Tahiti comes in like a ton of bricks on 11826 khz. I found no cross-modulation or overloading on any band, and although the set has a single conversion circuit, images are a very minor problem. A few CW signals appear in the 25 and 31 meter bands from time to time, but cause little interference and can be avoided by careful tuning.

The dial calibration of SW bands is not very accurate, but most stations can be easily located by sound, using the dial as an approximate guide. The set was obviously not designed for precision DXing; however, for casual listening outdoors, or while traveling, I actually prefer a small, non-digital portable with a few simple controls that are easy to use.

Although LARRY MAGNE found the D-1835 inferior to the much higher priced model D-2935 (which costs at least three times as much), it should really be compared to similar mini-portables such as the ICF-7600A, which is sold in Canada for around \$180 Canadian. The D-1835 is intended for those who need a good, compact multiband portable at a reasonable price. I found its performance equal to the much higher priced SONY model (which costs about twice as much), and the new Philips is, in my opinion, the best bargain in its category.

Thanks Ernie. We welcome another entry into the super competitive POCKET ROCKET class of radios. By the way, the above mentioned Philips D2935 seems to be available in the US as the Magnavox D2935 through Universal Shortwave Radio, 1280 Aida Drive, Reynoldsburg, Ohio 43068. Maybe you folks can persuade FRED OSTERMAN at USR to send one to Old Uncle Skip for review (who knows, I may even return it to him). Also you might write Fred for the US availability of the D-1835.

By the way, Ernie Behr also asks for you folks out there to send in a review of the SONY WA-8200 9-band mini cassette-radio, and the new Panasonic RF-B20 mini-portable.

I would like to thank my fellow editor STEPHEN G. MOVE for sending on a lot of Tech Topics type stuff to your humble editor.

Also a special note to JOE ERWIN: Yes that was I who you met at ANRCON 83. But your description of me was slightly wrong. It should have read CRAZY REDHEAD!

Keep those card and letters coming folks. And don't forget to support Software Sideshow, same time and station.

BOD BOD CONTROL: Last month in answering a question I inadvertently told the readers to hook their tape recorders across their antenna terminals. This will simply result in loss of signal. What I meant to say was hook your patch cord across your speaker terminals. Sorry about that folks.

THE UPS AND DOWNS OF ANARCON 86

The 1986 ANARC Convention in Montreal will long be remembered for its ups and downs. Not that it wasn't a great success - it certainly was - but because pride of place for the greatest impact on the weekend's events goes to the elevators at the Holiday Inn Place Dupuis. Following months of careful preparation by Convention organiser Ian McFarland, there were times when these inanimate objects seemed to possess the power to wreck the timetable. Access to the Convention areas could not be easily gained other than via these infernal things, and waits of 15 minutes were normal. Some people even got stuck inside for quite a long time! Indeed, there may well be a group of ANARC devotees even now attempting to escape from a point somewhere between the lobby and the top floor!

But despite this, things did go very much as planned as far as I am aware. I make that point, because in all truthfulness I wasn't able to attend some of the working sessions due to being involved with other things during the weekend. I do not wish to disclose what those "other things" were, but I can assure you that they were in no way involved with the visits of certain young ladies to a room on my floor (the 23rd). This floor was occupied by a number of well-known shortwave names plus a non-DXer who obviously enjoyed the company of young female "professionals". The former included a representative of the BRT, who was witnessed being reduced to silent incredulity at the activities of people who don't listen to shortwave.

For those of us who do - or at least, have a legitimate interest in it - more "normal" activities were indulged in (though I'm sure the gentleman on the 23rd floor thought that we were the ones who weren't quite normal!). These included the opening reception sponsored (ie. paid for) by the WRTH. Due to start at 7.00 pm, I found that I was the only one of the hosts who had arrived by the official starting time. The reason, of course, was those elevators. But once things got under way about 15 minutes late, everyone seemed well satisfied. Some even had sufficient wine to cloud their judgement enough to take part in the live Radio Earth broadcast at 11pm in the same room, which entailed humming the station's interval signal (Onward Christian Soldiers) at the start of the broadcast. Seriously, the broadcast went out successfully, with a little technical help from a locally-based international broadcaster. Hosts Mike and Suzanne Poulos were relieved when they learned that they were not, after all, required to broadcast a simultaneous translation in French.

I can't remember what happened after the broadcast, but witnesses tell me I had a good time. I even managed to get up reasonably early on Saturday morning to resume my vigil, along with Jens Frost and Glenn Heffernan, at the WRTH "stand". This had consisted, for the first few hours on the Friday, of a big table containing a personal computer that wasn't switched on. I fielded many questions about the significance of this display - eg. had we sold out to Radio Database International? - but was mightily relieved when Glenn Heffernan arrived from New York with the software that enabled us to display the first system test of our new WRTH bulletin board. Meanwhile, other impressive displays were put on by broadcasters and clubs, plus a few commercial dealers. The VOA had a huge professional picture display bearing the words "Voice of America" at the top in Special English for the benefit of local Quebecers visiting the stand. Nearby, Gene Reich was seen walking round silently, pointing a microphone towards the ceiling, and muttering something about "ambience". I asked about this at the bar later, but they said they didn't sell that particular type of cocktail.

Meanwhile, elsewhere there were other activities going on (including, I suppose, the 23rd floor). Easily the most important was the launch of the

special postage stamp marking the 50th anniversary of the CBC, several days ahead of its official launch to the Canadian public. This was the idea of Ian McFarland, and combined with an impressive display of past radio stamps and the opportunity to buy first day covers, made a unique package for philatelists, and also for those who collect stamps. It was a pity the Billboard's own "Jim Flatley" was not present (F/lat/ley, get it?).

Various working sessions covered subjects of perennial interest to attendees of ANARCON - jamming, the woodpecker, the future of shortwave etc. - all led by experts in their particular fields. It was fitting that one of them, Bob Horvitz, earned a special award for his services to the radio listening hobby. This was presented at the annual awards banquet on the Saturday evening, when guest of honour Arthur Cushen from New Zealand caught the mood of the Convention perfectly with a fascinating talk about his career in radio listening (not too strong a word, for Arthur has made it his profession) interspersed with humorous anecdotes and some historic and contemporary recordings.

My colleague Jens Frost found that when he appeared at any of the weekend's events, somebody was there to present him with an award marking the 40th anniversary of the WRTH! He was touched by this display of gratitude for his distinguished service, but wished that somebody had warned him of the extra luggage that he would be taking back to Denmark. Inevitably, Ian McFarland assisted by arranging to ship stuff over to Denmark while Jens completed his vacation in Canada.

The banquet itself was a most enjoyable feast, for which the chef was warmly applauded. Unfortunately, he didn't appear in person to receive the accolade. Or could it have been "she"? I was pleased to see Terry Colgan (don't edit this Terry!) receiving an honor for his exceptional contribution to the hobby as ANARC Executive Secretary, a post which he will soon relinquish after six years [actually only four years, but it's sometime seemed like six--tc]. Then there was John Kapinos - known to all as "Kap" - who served the handicapped so well with his tireless work for the now-defunct Handicapped Aid Program in the US. Perhaps the former HAP Auction ought to have been called a "Kap Auction"! Later, after the banquet, I went to join one of Kap's late night get-togethers, a legendary feature of ANARC Conventions. As expected, I found myself in the company of many well-known names in the hobby, who started reminiscing about some of the characters who have graced (and, alas, disgraced) our hobby over the years. Well, this was the 21st annual Convention, so it was a good time to reflect on these things. The beer and wine may have been another reason!

Sunday morning came all too quickly for me, and I had to fight the temptation to go absent without leave from the WRTH Quiz. But I managed to get there in time - despite the elevators - and thanks to the help of the technician from RCI, the teams had a microphone for each member so that their answers were heard clearly by the audience. Radio Tirana made an unexpected contribution to the Convention when they interrupted the quiz to review the 1986 WRTH, newly arrived in Albania!

Following lunch, the now traditional International Broadcasters Forum concluded the 1986 ANARC Convention, but not this account. I have to mention some of the things that happened away from the hotel. I don't mean the tours of Montreal and RCI, both of which I had to miss. I am thinking more of the strange expedition [known to some as the "International Broadcasters Death March"--tc] mounted on the eve of the Conference to find an elusive bar, rumoured to be near the hotel, which started with about 15 participants led by a Canadian guide (whose name I will not mention, firstly so as not to embarrass him, and secondly because I can't spell it!). After walking across

loads of traffic junctions, we lost most of our group en route, and finally reached our destination with only five survivors, after a walk of some 40 minutes. Terry Colgan would never forgive me for not mentioning that he was one of the hardy souls who survived the course! There was just time to have one drink, then trek back whence we came.

On the following evening, we found a guide who took us to an equally pleasing destination in around 5 minutes. The identity of this connoisseur of Montreal nightlife - none other than Deutsche Welle's Wolfgang Pleines (along with his delightful wife)> Next time I visit Cologne, I'll have to find a Canadian who knows where the nearest good bar is!

Once again this year, I found that it was the social side of the Convention that made the biggest impression on me. The chance to get to know people in the hobby and in broadcasting makes the expense of attending an ANARC Convention well justified. Sadly there are a few very good DXers who never attend ANARCON for that very reason - by its nature, the hobby can and does attract "loners". One other aspect was pleasing this year, namely the increased number of handicapped attendees and females, some being wives or girlfriends of male participants and the rest being there as full participants. There were even a few children too, making the whole atmosphere more like the "real" world than the male-only affairs associated with some DXpeditions.

There's no doubt that the nature of ANARC Conventions is changing, and in my view for the better. I didn't see many people with shortwave radios heading off for a lonely DX session. Everyone wanted to be part of the weekend's festivities. Some, due to the elevators, found it more difficult than expected, but all I can say is that if lousy elevators are the only thing worth complaining about, ANARCON 86 was an outstanding success.

U.S. RADIO BROADCASTS TO END IN WEST EUROPE

WASHINGTON- The Voice of America said Friday that money problems will force it to shut down VOA-Europe, the U.S. government's new radio service for Western Europe, at the end of this year.

VOA-Europe, with a fast paced format of news and modern music, was launched in October and targeted to West European listeners who were born after World War II and lacked the U.S. ties forged in the wartime and immediate postwar years.

"The decision to terminate VOA-Europe broadcasts at the end of 1986 has been a difficult one," but "stringent budgetary options required...strong, immediate action," said Charles Z. Wick, director of VOA's parent organization, the U.S. Information Agency.

Station Profile: Sani Radio

A New Voice From Honduras

During July test transmissions commenced from a new shortwave station located in the town of Puerto Lempira, Gracias a Dios. Established by the International Rescue Committee, Sani Radio broadcasts on a frequency of 4,755 kHz with 10 KW. Licensed by the government of Honduras, this new shortwave outlet broadcasts under the call sign HRRI at geographical coordinates of 15 degrees 16 minutes north and 83 degrees 46 minutes west.

The name Sani comes from a Miskito Indian word for a vine that is used as string which children use to make a "telephone" by connecting two coconut halves. The word Sani combined with Radio has evolved into a slang expression for oral communications of information like the phrase--"through the grapevine".

The grand opening of Sani Radio was originally scheduled for August 18, 1986 but due to a tragic accident of a Honduran military transport in the area the opening was postponed until August 25, 1986. The inaugural program featured live broadcasts that were attended by more than 200 local persons, as well as guests from the Honduran Ministry of Education, Ministry of the Interior and the United States AID mission. Sani Radios purpose is to provide bi-lingual (Spanish and Miskito) educational and public service broadcasts to the Miskito Indian population of the area. The stations programing will be in the Spanish, Miskito and Sumo languages and initially will cover cultural, informative and entertainment programs which hopefully will evolve rapidly to include extensive bilingual primary and adult education programs targeted to some 40 village study centers in remote areas.

Presently, the operation is financed by funds from the United States Agency for International Development. However, over the next year, Sani Radio hopes to commercialize the station to some extent in order to cover basic operational costs as well as possibly enter into a cooperative agreement for national educational broadcasting and will seek funding from private and public sectors both nationally and internationally. Various agreements expressly prohibit Sani Radio from transmitting partisan political or religious programs.

The transmitter is a Sintronic SI-A-10 with 10 KW of power and a simple 30 meter long dipole antenna at a height of 15 meters which is approximately 20 meters above sea level. The test transmissions in July and August not only stimulated responses from DXers but allowed the technical staff to enjoy radio broadcasting. Sani Radio will have English language broadcasts from time to time at irregular intervals but for the most part will follow the local language schedule. Transmission hours will be from 0600 to 1000 and 1500 to 20000 local Honduran time (1200 to 1600 and 2100 to 0200 UTC).

RADIO CHARITAS

"Paraguay is now one of only eight countries in the world --two right-wing, the others Communist--which jam radio broadcasts," said a Western ambassador. . . .

Franciscan priest Javier Arancon, the Spanish director of church-run Radio Charitas--a small broadcasting station which provided extensive coverage of public demonstrations against Stroessner's rule last April and May--was barred from re-entering Paraguay on June 30 after a trip to Argentina. The government announced two days later he would not be allowed to return, but it gave no reason.

"We are considered Communists and subversives," said Radio Charitas news editor Guillermo Yaluf. "The government says we are mixing in politics. We think that everyone has a right to his opinion and we have the duty to report it."

Trying to sound out the opinion of peasants in the South American country, Radio Charitas reporter Selso Velasques was seized recently by plainclothes police and frog-marched 7½ miles to the nearest jail, his hands manacled behind his back.

Yaluf said the reporter was held incommunicado for a week.

"There have also been death threats against people working for Radio Charitas," he said, "I had three anonymous telephone calls saying, 'If you don't change your (editorial) line, you will pay with your life.' We fear what the future might hold."

A \$20 MILLION RADIO STATION THAT DOESN'T WORK? ! ? ! ? ! ? ! ? ! ?

On March 6, 1986, House bill H.R. 4343 was introduced into Congress that would establish a Spanish language radio station that would transmit programming of news, commentaries and other information of interest to those in Nicaragua. The bill would direct that the station come under the VOA (Voice Of America) standards to ensure the programs would be objective, accurate, balanced and would present a variety of views. The funding of the station would be taken from appropriations currently available from the United States Information Agency (USIA) and in the event additional funds were needed, supplemental appropriations could be requested from Congress.

The preliminary costs of the independent facility which would include such things as a studio in Washington, D.C., a satellite transmission system for feeding programming, buildings and land in Central America, a 100,000 watt AM (MW) transmitter, security systems, antennas, generators, parts, salaries, etc. is roughly estimated at the cost of \$20 million for the first year of operation.

In spite of the large amount of money involved and the high powered 100,000 watt transmitter, there are political, legal and technical problems.

- ... It is not feasible to use the current VOA sites operating in Costa Rica and Belize as these stations cannot serve the main target area.
- ... Honduras is too close to the target area to provide a good nighttime skywave pattern and the rugged topography of the area which consists of poor soil, rocky hills and mountains makes coverage into the populated area of Nicaragua on the daytime ground wave impossible.
- ... The approval of the host country would be needed for the transmitting site and frequency selected.
- ... Central America already has a severe congestion of stations operating on the AM (MW) band and as a result, some stations already on the air will suffer interference. Furthermore, a problem of interference with stations in other countries of Central America, Mexico and even the United States must be resolved before this station is put on the air.
- ... The International Telecommunications Union permits a station to use 100,000 watts during day however at sunset, the station must reduce its power to 50,000 watts which will greatly affect the coverage of the target area.
- ... Consideration must be given in the event Nicaragua decides to jam the VOA signal.

In view of the facts stated above, the spending of \$20 million is not justified because by all technical standards, this station will not be able to serve the main target area of Nicaragua. The purpose of the station is to get the signal to the populated part of Nicaragua but by looking at the map of Central America, one can see that the radio signal just will not do the job Congress expects it to do.

One possible solution to this situation would be to set up a series of synchronized AM (MW) transmitters in Honduras and Costa Rica bordering Nicaragua. The network of VOA transmitters could be enhanced if another transmitter were placed aboard ship in the international waters outside of Managua. By strategically placing the synchronized transmitters, most of Nicaragua would be covered with the VOA signal. The job can be done with less powerful transmitters and at a more reasonable cost.

This may be valid, but then again.....

IN MY OPINION (Mike Hardester, N Versailles PA) [Re the previous discussions on KCBI's Radio Connection and one of its main contributors] My 2¢ worth on the Capitol DXers, as a FORMER MEMBER. Back in July 1985, while in Modesto CA, 70 mi S of Sacramento, I joined after reading of it in Monitoring Times. Bulletin looked good tho there were errors, and figuring it was new (and relatively close - having hoped for a meeting), I joined. So much for my \$10! Bulletins arrived, with errors--loggings very questionable due to SR/SS tables (tropical bands), other dominant stns on listed fq, or stns which had been silent for years. When I pointed these out (vy diplomatically and politely) to the editors, I was ignored: i.e., no acknowledgement either in the bulletin or via private correspondence. Logs I sent in were printed, but no credit given. When changes I had sent in were mentioned, they were attributed to new monitoring, usually by Phil Reefer or some woman whose name I have forgotten. After marking the bulletin with comments, I forwarded them to Dan Sheedy (longtime friend and vy competent DXer) in Encinitas CA. Dan checked on loggings and pointed out others. Our joint conclusion was simple: whatever the Capitol DXers were smoking, we wanted some! Such imagination. Such fantasy. Such list logging!! Such trash. The matter is unfortunate, but to the neophyte DXer/SWler, the KCBI program may be their first exposure to the hobby, and if so, I think it's up to the people who know the difference between quality and trash to help all concerned rid the bands of the trash promulgated by the Capitol DXers. 





The S86 season is upon us. Some notes (in no particular order): R RSA can finally be heard on 25m again at 2100+ UTC. Despite printed program schedule enclosures to the contrary, RSA has implemented only one frequency shift at 0200 (not 0300 as in the mid-September NASWA update). Israel has retimed all its broadcasts. Japan has announced its English service via Sackville at 1100-1130 UTC on 6120 kHz to commence October 1. On 9/26 Hauser on World of Radio indicated RCI will retime the European transmission (now at 2000) and SWL Digest due to DST ending in Europe but the final decision is not out yet; check 30 and 60 minutes later. I have been trying to confirm Yugoslavia's English language schedule listed in September's LN; beware, the weak English at 1430 on 15240 kHz finally came to a decent signal level one day, and it turned out to be an unannounced frequency of Radio Berlin International's English to Asia. No other Yugoslavian frequencies and times are audible here due to time of day and/or the frequency(-ies) occupied. On the 9/25 Media Network show an Indian subcontinent DXer reported that Radio Bras has retimed its European 1700 transmission on 15155 to 1800 on 15265, but according to the signon announcements checked last night it still is at 1700 on 15155; check for yourself. Tashkent at 1200 is only audible here on 7325 kHz; three other frequencies were announced but not readable in the heavy static here this morning. I think they were 11785, 9715, and 9600... all completely covered here with other signals. Belgium at 1630 will replace 15515 with 9905 beginning 11/2/86.


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
