

Dear DX editor,

At last the latest edition of "LA DXing", a 293 page booklet for serious Latin American DX'ers, is out! Supported by several DX'ers around the world, RNM was able to compile the fourth edition of the world famous booklet "LA DX'ing". The contents have been totally revised to include the latest information for sections like "Station Schedule", "List of Verie-signers" and "Station IDs". And that more than fifty (50) short wave radio station profiles are appeared, mainly featuring Colombian and Central American stations. In addition, you can enjoy reading articles like "Broadcasting in Suriname", "Latin American QSLing", etc. (For further details on the contents, please refer to the attached paper, thank you.)



Welcome to CONTACT for September. The slow but steady upward movement of the solar-flux index is coming just in time for the approaching DX season. I, for one, am looking forward to it. My fortieth birthday came and went last month leaving me relatively unscathed. Upon sober (and I mean that literally) reflection, I think that I can safely say that the best is yet to come.

Enough of the autobiography — on to the letters. New NASWA member Greg A. Jordan [2717 East Sunset Drive, Gastonia Drive NC 28054-2016; (704) 824-1307] writes in order to introduce himself, and to extend an invitation:

I don't know if you'll print something like this, in the CONTACT column, but I'll take a shot at it anyway. Can you print my telephone number and/or address? (Consider it done — sm) I'd like to get in touch with other SWLers in this area to exchange DX tips. There are a lot around here as I hear local suburbs mentioned all the time on mailbag [programs], WRNO, etc. Maybe I can get a few people together to attend ANARCON next year; who knows?

I have just recently joined NASWA but I'm not new to SW; I've been a daily SWLer since June '84 and I'm currently one of the monitors on the "Monitoring Times Monitoring Team." I use a Kenwood R2000 and an "Eavesdropper" trapped dipole. It works pretty well. I caught Seoul in English the other afternoon at 1:30pm — very unusual. I'll be ordering some log report forms!

...P.S. For the record, I'm 25 years old, but I have some teenaged nieces and nephews that make me feel a lot older! (In view of my recent 40th birthday, I trust that you're not looking for sympathy...sm)

An interesting note from Father John Eckert (Collegeville, Pennsylvania):

Back in June I sent you a letter concerning my AM/FM clock radio being able at night to pick up SW broadcasts. I haven't seen anything about this in CONTACT and I was wondering if you ever received my letter. (No, I didn't; many thanks for your persistence — sm) Here is what seems to be happening...

After nightfall, I scan the AM band on my clock radio. In the areas where there are no AM signals, I get a noise that sounds like a wave that jumps an octave high to low (it's hard to describe). It makes me think of a wave on an oscilloscope. It seems to pick up shortwave stations in the 6 MHz area. A typical night was June 9th:

Deutsche Welle (Antigua) on 6.085
BBC on 5.975
R. Prague on 5.930

R. Bucharest on 5.990

Swiss Radio International on 6.135 MHz

I can also state that some broadcasts were clearer on the clock radio than on my [GE] World Monitor. The above broadcasts were picked up on AM mode of the clock radio and I then traced and found them on the above listed frequencies on my World Monitor.

I don't know much about electronics but it seems to me that there is something WRONG with my radio that makes it possible to hear shortwave. Have you ever heard of this? One great thing — it's nice to be able to listen to shortwave while laying in bed using your unassuming clock radio.

Does anyone else have any experience ordinary radios picking up SW? Would any of our technically-minded members care to hazard a guess about why this should happen? (By the way, this *was* the first letter that I received from Fr. Eckert: the mail coming into and going out of Providence can do some strange things. If you haven't heard from me after a reasonable time, by all means, try again.)

From faithful CONTACT correspondent Cathy Turner (Yonkers, New York) come three interesting newspaper clippings. The following note accompanies them:

Did you hear those pirates calling themselves RNI? Did they get media coverage! The local CBS-TV station, WCBS, had them in the lead stories for two nights on the 6:00pm news. And the even mentioned shortwave!!! Perhaps it will tickle a few people into shortwave listening. I've enclosed clippings about RNI from the NY Times.

I've also enclosed a clipping from the editorial section of a past issue of the NY Times on [Radio Free Europe and Radio Liberty], written by James Michener. (The question is, is he a SWL, and if he is, why didn't he mention short wave in his article?)

Almost inevitably, pirate broadcasters feel that they are fulfilling a need that is not being fulfilled by already existing broadcasters. In this case*, Randi Steele, who organized the venture (based on \$100,000 of savings from him and his partners), asserted that the FCC regulations that have to do with what can and cannot be played on the air have made it impossible for radio stations to achieve any kind of individual identity; further a "pacifist" political outlook is shared by the group. So they bought a boat (a converted Japanese fishing vessel [described as aging and very rusty], and renamed by them the Sarah), sailed from Boston and arrived at a point just off Long Beach, Long Island where the lowered the anchor and began to broadcast an alternative to the "stagnant" state of NYC rock radio#.

RNI (Radio NewYork International) began broadcasting on Thursday 23 July 1987. On the ship were five transmitters and broadcasts took place on LW, AM (1620), SW, and FM (103.1). Transmitting power never exceeded 20% of the capacity of the transmitters. Still, the transmissions were heard in Boston, and as far away as Michigan. Typically, the FCC seemed to have a great deal of difficulty entering into the spirit of the thing, and so came down rather hard on the pirates. By the following Monday the Sarah was located, boarded, and shut down: another instance of how quickly the Government can move when it chooses.

The pirates had thought to avoid legal problems by securing a Honduran registry for the ship; it was thought that this would render them ex-

empt from American broadcast law. The fine print in all this is that Honduras is party to an international treaty that forbids broadcast operations aboard ships. (Did you know about that treaty? I didn't, and I may say that it comes as a surprise. Does anyone have any information on this point?) With the law on their side, then, the Coast Guard boarded the ship on Monday 27 July 1987 and arrested the chief engineer (Alan Weiner) and a disk jockey (Ivan Rothstein). Pending a hearing on 27 August, both men could be liable to up to 5 years in prison and fines of up to \$250,000. The charges: conspiracy to impede the FCC (a felony) and operating a broadcast station off the shores of the United States (a misdemeanor). You will notice which of the two charges is considered the more serious...

Michener's editorial in the *Times* (5 July 1987) is actually very interesting indeed. As Cathy points out, nowhere is the word shortwave mentioned. Did you ever see *The Seven Year Itch*? At one point in that wonderful movie, Tom Ewell (his wife is out of town for the summer) tries to seduce Marilyn Monroe (she has just moved into Ewell's apartment building). In a desperate attempt to choose music appropriate to seduction, Ewell looks frantically through his record collection: "Mozart? No. Beethoven? No. Brahms? No. Stravinsky? — no, that would only frighten her." I think that the common feeling is that the word "shortwave" will frighten people away; or, perhaps, that the concept of shortwave broadcasting is so arcane that readers won't take it (or anything to do with it) seriously. Additionally, there is the very real problem that in most people's minds the concepts of SWL and amateur radio are the same thing.

Michener's editorial pleads a powerful case on behalf of RFE and RL. This is not surprising in that he is a member of the Board for International Broadcasting which oversees the activities of RFE and RL. Some extracts:

[...] At a time when the Soviet Union is in flux; when glasnost is attracting attention worldwide* and when tension between the superpowers remains high, it would be folly for us to retire from international debate. Fifty million listeners rely on Radio Free Europe and Radio Liberty as the major source of news about their countries.

Congress should resist attempts to cut funding for the radios** in order to reduce the budget deficit.

RFE and RL were established in the early 1950s to provide the peoples of Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union with a source of detailed and balanced information about the events in their own countries. RFE broadcasts to Eastern Europe and RL to the Soviet Union. In 1972 the Munich-based radio stations were placed under the Board for International Broadcasting.

Unlike other Western broadcasters, these two stations focus on internal events in Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union. They have the unique mission of providing surrogate "home services" for the people of the Soviet bloc. The Soviet leaders will grudgingly tolerate Western broadcasts on world events or life in the West. But what they fear most — and have steadfastly refused to accept — is RFE and RL providing their people with information about developments at home.

For decades, the Soviet Union has conducted an intense propaganda campaign against these broadcasts. They have been denounced as "instruments of the CIA," "subversive radio stations" and as "a relic of the cold war."*** Soviet bitterness about the stations' role has sometimes left the impression in the West that the stations must be particularly strident and "propagandistic."

In fact, they are among the most careful of Western radio stations, adhering to the strictest standards of journalistic objectivity and balance. The stations have enormous appeal in Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union. In many countries, RFE enjoys an influence and stature hard to comprehend in the media saturated West.

[...] RFE and RL are no more relics of the cold war than is the Atlantic alliance. Both are important mainstream instruments of American foreign policy. But the Soviet Government's monopoly on information, denial of a free press and total control of all media are relics of the Dark Ages. The most appropriate response to Moscow's increased jamming of these broadcasts would be a clear national commitment to support this vital organization, which is little appreciated in the West yet highly valued by millions in the East.

Any comments?

Finally, from *Tom Cameron* (Northfield, New Jersey), comes an interesting note which makes a point about varieties of participation in NASWA:

I frequently see reminders for more log reports, more interest in DXing, etc. I would like to remind those make the reminders that there are *SW Listeners* who only listen to the major international SW broadcasters. They would only make news for a Log if they were *off* the air. I enjoy doing armchair traveling by reading the adventures of those who do DX. So please remember there are a lot of us out here who do support NASWA spiritually and financially and try to interest others in a great hobby.

Quite right! After all, the major broadcasters count on there being a lot of people around with just the interests that you describe — we all wish there were more, indeed. The reminders are aimed (implicitly, true enough) at DXers, and are only meant to make them yield up their riches. (Someone once quipped that if the BBC wanted to pick up a larger audience, it would have only to do some very low-power transmitting in the tropical bands.)

Contact Note

I am still mailing a series of forms (for reporting DX and keeping records of your listening). They're free — just drop me a note. There are 5 of them. They were printed on a LaserWriter and (if I say so myself) the look quite good. When you get yours, use them as originals from which you should make your working copies. The copies look good, too (if you use a good Xerox® machine or have the copies made by offset). This saves me having to mail out 50 copies of each form (250 total!) and saves you the postage. — Suggestions for changes, and for other forms are always welcome.

For the technically inclined, I recently came across the original article on which Radio Netherland's MICROMUF program is based. It is by R. Fricker (of the BBC External Services) and was contained in the proceedings of the Fourth International Conference on Antennas and Propagation (ICAP 85). It gives some interesting insights into the way the algorithm works, as well as the original form of the program. If you're interested, drop me a note and I'll send you a copy.



Easy Listening

SUNDAY

2340-2345: "DX Corner" (Radio Kiev). A brief DX spot mostly concerned with technical topics and some basic information about shortwave such as propagation and frequency allocation (13.645. Repeated at 0240 on the same frequency).

0315-0330: "Good Books" (BBC). Each week a guest in the studio discusses his choice of book with the program host. Critical analysis and relevant themes are discussed and some excerpts are read. Past book choices have included Gertrude Stein's Three Lives, Bram Stoker's Dracula and Stephan Heym's The Wandering Jew. (5.975/6.175)

MONDAY

0230-0245: "Youth Club" (Radio Bucharest). The program consists of a series of different features all somehow relating to young people. Past programs have included interviews with students who have won academic prizes, features on young Romanian performers and artists as well as a generous helping of Romanian popular music. (5.990/9.510/9.570).

0335-0355: "Polish on the Air" (Radio Polonia). Radio Polonia's language course which each week presents a long dialogue in a given situation (such as shopping or building a kite) in Polish. This followed by the introduction of Polish words and phrases and some limited grammatical analysis; then the dialogue is repeated. I don't know whether or not there is a textbook to go with this course, but it would be very difficult to follow without one. (7.145/7.170/9.525/11.815/15.120).

TUESDAY

2210-2215: "The Kemalist Reforms and Religion" (Voice of Turkey). This program discusses the reforms that led the modern republic of Turkey out of its medieval wilderness. Past programs have featured the introduction of the western hat in place of traditional Islamic headware, changes in the role of women in society, and reform of the alphabet. (9.560. Repeated at 0310 on the same frequency).

0145-0200: "Country Style" (BBC). Each week David Allen presents country music. Many of the performers are well-known American country stars, but quite a few of the performers are British and there are sometimes interviews with these. (5.975/6.175/9.590).

WEDNESDAY

1110-1125: "Arts Review" (Radio Finland). This is Radio Finland's program devoted to culture in the country. Past programs have featured interviews with well-known Finnish artists and writers and this summer a number of programs have been devoted to the numerous Arts Festivals being held in Finland. In the fall this program will only air every other week, but for the summer it is weekly. (15.400. Repeated at 1210 and 1310 on the same frequency).

2310-2315: "Living Here" (Kol Israel). This program features interviews with people who have made Israel their home. Quite a few programs are devoted to kibbutzniks, and there seems to be a propensity for interviewing North Americans who have settled in Israel. One of their best programs featured the reunion of those who had aided in the then illegal immigration to Israel when the country was still under British rule. (9.435/9.855/11.610. Repeated at 0110 on the same frequencies).

THURSDAY

1635-1640: "Made in France" (Radio France International). This program is actually on the "Paris Calling Africa" edition of RFI's broadcasts, but it is frequently audible in the United States. The program features French products made for export, and past programs have featured the French manufacture of sonar systems for submarines and other French high-tech products. (17.620/11.705).

2310-2320: "Spectrum" (Kol Israel). Kol Israel's program devoted to science. Each program consists of at least two short features and one longer one, all devoted to the progress made by Israeli scientists in the fields of agronomy, high tech, chemistry, physics, medicine, etc. (9.435/9.855/11.610. Repeated at 0110 on the same frequencies).

FRIDAY

0105-0110: "The Song of Today" (Radio Baghdad). This program features a popular Arab song, gives some information about the singer, and usually translates the lyrics of the song, and then plays it in its entirety. (11.705. Broadcast earlier at 2105 on 9.875). Daily.

0325-0345: "Japan Music Scene" (Radio Japan). Each program usually has a specific theme tying the music together--like the great synthesizer hits, jazz in Japan, popular Japanese duets, or even a single Japanese performer. Plays about four or five songs per program and songs are interspersed with brief commentary about Japan and the music scene there. (5.960).

SATURDAY

2230-2235: "From Turkey With Love" (Voice of Turkey). Each program is presented in the form of a letter to someone named "George" and features cultural information about Turkey. Past programs have featured a children's festival, the ruins of Ephesus, and a week long arts festival in Istanbul (9.560. Repeated at 0330 on the same frequency).

2330-2355: "Arts Roundabout" (Radio Australia). Radio Australia's weekly program devoted to Australian culture. Past programs have featured Australian opera star John Pringle, the notes Anthony Trollope made when he visited Australia, poetry and the publication of poetry in Australia, and an interview with a German born Australian writer (15.320/17.795).



Feeling like your 245th country might be "The Voice of Noise?" If your emphasis has recently been on the low bands, I can certainly understand that point of view. Take heart though, there is still DX to be found. I noted in issue #439 of F.T. that Cheryl Paszkiewicz in Wisconsin heard Voice of Kampuchean People 07/04 on 11.938 between 1246 and 1311*. Also, Kiribati has been heard about 0119 on 14.802 USB. The point being, plan your DX activities a manner that they are enhanced around the seasonal changes of the shortwave bands. Summer is the time to target DX catches found on 9 MHz and up. Just as in the case of the lower bands in winter, seasonal propagation changes enhance the higher frequency bands during the summer making them prime hunting grounds for DX targets. Broadcasters make regular use of this technique, why not the other way around?

A long time SWL and NASWA member since the early 70's, Rowland composed his article then took advantage of electronic text transfer to send his article in it's final form to me VIA modem. (Of course, because you read Computer Corner here in FRENDX, you know how that process works).

On to the Middle or Life after 50 (Countries Varied)

Congratulations. You've heard and verified your first 50 shortwave broadcast countries and in the process, become a confirmed shortwave enthusiast. You've established a good foundation for logging your next 50 countries, but many aspects of DXing are about to change for you. I want to help you cross that boundary from novice to intermediate with some practical advice gained from going through the transition myself. Of course, there is no real hard boundary at 50 countries, but somewhere around that number you will start to run out of high powered international broadcasters to log and QSL, and you will need to develop a new approach to DXing to add to your Verified In Countries (VIC) total.

Here are some of the major ways in which the targets you chase will change -- not every station will change in all these ways, many will have more than one attribute of the "Second 50" column:

AttributeFirst 50Second 50

Quality of Signal	Like a local station	Weak, may be unintelligible
Availability	Year round	Occasional
Schedule	Regular	Irregular

You will need to exercise and build on all the basic skills you have learned as a novice: understanding global time zones, basic propagation principles (which bands are active when), using reference books to aid in finding and identifying stations, writing effective reception reports. You will add to these basic skills by learning a lot about finding, logging, and verifying stations that are not audible every day, are hard to understand when you finally hear them, difficult to verify.

As I crossed into this new territory, I felt inadequate yet determined to succeed. I'd look at the loggings filling the back of FRENEX each month and wonder why I wasn't hearing all those exotic stations myself -- was I doing something wrong? Did I need to spend another \$1000 on a receiver? Did I need to wire my whole neighborhood into a giant antenna? The most fundamental advice I can give you is: "if it's easy to hear it isn't rare!" From 50 VIC to 100 VIC is tough, from 100 to 150 is tougher, and there is no way to make it easy short of travelling to all the countries you want to log, and that's not DXing!

Some of the topics I wish I had better advice on early in my DXing career include:

- * **Bagging the Weak Ones:** Digging them out of static and pileups.
- * **Radios:** What do you really get for a kilobuck?
- * **Antennas:** Can you hear 100 countries on an indoor antenna?
- * **Languages:** How to enjoy listening to hundreds of hours of people talking in a language you don't understand.
- * **Advanced Tuning Tips:** Wringing the last drop out of your receiver.
- * **Accessories:** Which ones really aid the DXer?
- * **Station Hunting:** Bandscanning versus targeting.
- * **QSLing:** What works; what's just throwing your money away?
- * **Propagation:** Beyond the basics without a PhD in physics.
- * **Character Building:** Patience, persistence, and staying awake.
- * **Organizing your DX:** With and without computers.

I can only cover one or two topics this month but I'll submit articles on more of these topics in the months ahead and Chuck can use them as he sees fit. I invite other DXers to write on the practical, behind the dials aspects of the hobby -- personally, I'd like to hear from some of the experts on how they got beyond the intermediate stage! (That's the "Forum" idea! ED)

Bagging the Weak Ones: Digging them Out of Static and Pileups

One of the biggest changes from the first 50 to the second 50 countries is the quality of the signal you have to work with. Your first 50 is filled with powerful major broadcasters like the VOA, BBC, and Radio Moscow. These may not come in as well as a local FM station, but you can usually sit back in your chair and listen comfortably, perhaps missing a word a minute to static or fading under poor conditions.

This situation reverses itself in the tougher second 50. You may feel lucky if you can understand one word a minute! This is the turning point in which you will find out if DXing is really for you. The thrill of

hunting and finally hearing a station that is difficult to log must override the fact that you may not be able to understand the content of the program being broadcast. Personally, I believe that the line between Short Wave Listening and DXing is a fuzzy one, and I have heard many exciting programs while DXing. On the other hand, as a DXer I have also spent a lot of time listening to signals that, if played for my spouse or neighbors, would make them have serious doubts about my sanity! Much DX sounds to the uninitiated like "nothing" or "noise." Enjoying DX is akin to the bird watcher's thrill on sighting a brief glimpse of a rare bird's wing before it flies away, or the small telescope user's joy at seeing a new galaxy or nebula, which doesn't look like the pictures taken at Palomar at all, but rather like a small blur or smudge of light.

All this is to say that part of the reason you may not be hearing the stations that more experienced DXers are logging and reporting to FRENDX each month is that you are tuning to the right frequency and the station you are seeking is there, but the quality of the signal is much poorer than anything you are used to hearing and you are giving up on it too easily. Try this exercise some evening or early morning on the 60 meter band: set your receiver to a single sideband mode (either USB or LSB) and tune across the band slowly. You will hear hetrodynes that drop in frequency as you tune higher, disappear at a point on the dial, and then increase in frequency again as you continue to tune. At each point where a whistle disappears, zero beat, a station of some sort can be found. It may be a utility station broadcasting radioteletype or some other encoded data, but often it will be a domestic or international broadcaster. Stop at that point and try to hear what's there. You might want to stay in single sideband mode and tune your radio's RIT (Receiver Incremental Tuning) or Fine Tuning control to find the exact center of the whistle (the "zero-beat.") Or, you may choose to flip back to AM mode and see what you can hear there. Some of the signals will be too weak to hear, but most of the time you should be able to make out something. Stick with each signal for several minutes if necessary. You should be able to determine what type of signal is there at least 8 times out of 10 (not necessarily a station identification, but decide if it's a broadcaster or utility or whatever).

You've just used a basic DXing technique. Tuning in SSB mode makes it easier to pick out where there's a signal strong enough to tickle your receiver's front end into action. Many times you will find that you can just tell that "there's something there," but the intelligibility of the signal may be only enough to distinguish music and voice, or perhaps male from female voices. When you come across a signal that is struggling against the static to be heard, there are ways to tweak it for maximum intelligibility which I'll discuss in a later article, but for now there's a very simple and effective technique: apply time to the problem! Stick with the station and see if reception conditions get better.

During a daily reception cycle, most DX signals fade in (go from inaudible to audible) and then fade out again (go from audible to inaudible) over a given period of time, sometimes as short as a few minutes or even seconds, and other times as long as several hours. This is in contrast to international broadcasters who are usually audible at a fairly constant level for the length of their broadcast on a given frequency. Because of this fade-in/fade-out effect, it is important that you stay tuned to a station once you locate it and note if it is getting stronger over time. It may be getting weaker if you've tuned in after it peaked in strength, but you must stay with it until the trend is clearly established. Changes are usually gradual, but can sometimes be rather sudden. Often a signal will get noticeably stronger over a period of 15 minutes or so, stay that way for 15 to 30 minutes, then start weakening and return to being essentially unusable in another 15 minutes.

Another major reason to stick with a signal even if it appears to be very poor at the moment is that some announcers or program material may be radically easier to understand and log than others on the same station,

even though the absolute signal strength and signal to noise ratio stays constant. There are a variety of reasons that this can happen: an announcer with a high-pitched voice may be easier to hear than one with a low-pitched voice or vice versa. The degree of modulation (amplitude of the voice component of the signal) often varies considerably from one announcer to another. A pre-recorded or phoned-in segment will sound different from a studio segment. Music is usually easier to hear than voice. A canned station identification or jingle may jump out at you after struggling without understanding a single word of a 15 minute talk.

If a station is just on the verge of audibility, it may fade-in for a few seconds or minutes, then out for an equal time, then come back again, etc. Once again, patience in staying with the station is the key to making a reliable logging. For example, I heard both Radio Dublin and Radio Cook Islands only by camping on their frequency and listening to literally nothing but noise for minutes at a time between snippets of programming that made it through. If I had given up because there was nothing there when I tuned in I would have missed the loggings and subsequent QSL's completely. I once heard the Voice of Indonesia fade in only long enough to hear the station identification ("This is the Voice of Indonesia...") and then it was gone, not to be heard from in that frequency for 6 years, but then for 90 minutes!

A pileup of two or more signals on the same channel adds another element to the challenge. This is something of a mental exercise in which you must concentrate on one of the signals and ignore the other(s). Knowing what characterizes the program content of the signal you are seeking out is a big help: what language are you trying to hear? Is there an identifying bell or series of tones played on the hour? What kind of music is played? Are the announcers calm or frenetic? Another helpful approach in a pileup situation is identifying the interfering signal then finding it on a parallel, clear frequency that you can check for reference. For example, the BBC and RIAS West Berlin both occupy 6005 kHz in the evening here. You can find the BBC on 5975, a clear channel, and by flipping back and forth between 5975 and 6005 you can identify the BBC component of the 6005 pileup, leaving the RIAS signal as the one to concentrate on. (not a guarantee by the way, you must hear the RIAS ID!). Even using these techniques, it's still easy to get fooled and is not uncommon to find out the signal you've been concentrating on for the last 20 minutes is the wrong one. Chalk it up to experience and try again.



RADIO DAZE OR THIS AND THAT

August is usually, for one reason or another, the busiest month of every year for me. And with each passing year it gets busier. So is it any wonder that I call up BILL OLIVER with a weak and tentative voice... "Er, Yo Bill!!!! Whenzadadline???" Anyway these lapses in journalist research and lead time lend themselves to a cleaning out of the incoming data bin. Lets just see what surfaces in the old editors mind and mailbox for this issue.

MOBILE POWER PROBLEMS

If your like me, every now and again you find reason or desire to use your receiver in your car. Pocket rockets and battery powered portables do the trick. You can even alligator clip your way to an outside antenna. Power is almost never a problem cause you have a whole lead acid battery full at your disposal. Thanks to all for the suggestions regarding new Awards. They are in the design stage now and we hope to be able to announce them soon.

The Fine Tuning organization has announced a rather neat Country Counting booklet that also doubles as an application for various NASWA Awards. An SASE/IRC to 8515 Scott, Wichita, KS 67210 will get you information on it as well as other FT Publications. As we mentioned several months ago FT is now open to all interested.

Our congratulations (?) to ANARC Chief Don Hosmer for obtaining the first (and surely only) McNASWA Award for his rather interesting verification. What next, Don, cordless phones?

Some folks have asked about the Ham Radio Special Event Stations that are often listed in the likes of CQ and QST Magazines. We have found that most of these operations will issue their Certificates or special QSLs to SWLs. We spent a bit of time chasing W87PAX, the Pan American Games Special Event Station and hope to get their Certificate.

We still have the Official NASWA Country List and Awards Booklets available; \$2.00 in North America and \$3.00 elsewhere. Yen notes will be accepted from certain Canadian DXers.

Hopefully many of you heard the special ANARC Convention Broadcasts on CRFX. We understand that the QSLs will be going out in early September.

Rather strong rumor has it that there will soon be a SWBC station in Aruba. Under current NASWA rules this would count as Netherlands Antilles (same as Bonaire), but it is quite possible that there may be a change and Aruba will be considered a separate Radio Country. The same should hold true if the proposed Curacao operation ever gets on the air.

It is rather unfortunate that WCSM chose to go the no-data QSL route. Perhaps if they receive polite requests they might change this policy.

Our policy for accepting no-data QSLs for Awards purposes is that if the applicant in good conscience feels that the card does in fact QSL a certain report and backup in the form of a solid logging is available the QSL can be counted. Back in 1983 Deutsche Welle did issue full data cards as part of their anniversary, perhaps they might do it again in 1988.

Also, full data QSLs have been coming from the BBC Singapore site, but we don't know how long this will continue. With any luck when the BBC Hong Kong site goes on the air they will issue full data cards also.

ALGERIA [Cf May LN] Am puzzled as to why WBI didn't include 17745 for RTA ch 3 in FR. Has been used for quite a while. From about Feb thru late Apr or early May, 17745 reception often quite good here; admittedly poor since. Looking thru my log, all fall in 1330-19 period; unsure of total span of RTA on fq. Wonder why WBI slipped up on this one, but am glad to have access to WBI thru LN (William Westenhover, Montréal PQ, 9/ 6)

AUSTRALIA R Australia, Shepparton on 15240: very interesting reception test: until 0100 beams to SAs on this fq, SIO 444. Then switches to Pac antenna and I hear echo, using longwire or whip ants. When I used my 3-element yagi and beam long path over Eu/USA to Au I get 444 sig w/out echo. When I beam direct to Au I get an echo. This is because the LP sig is stronger than SP. Thus when I beam LP, the stronger sig combined w/the effect of the beam --front to back ratio--, the ant doesn't pick up the weaker SP sig and also

the stronger LP signal suppresses the weaker SP signal. When I beam direct the beam ant picks the signal as propagation is good on the SP also and the better LP sig is still picked up by the beam ant tho weaker. Thus both paths being audible resulting in the echo. This echo takes place when propagation is possible on both paths. I find that being a radio ham using beam antennas for SWBC DXing is a tremendous thrill. Like the MW loops you can cut out QRM etc. Only thing is HF loops and beams are big and the real effects can be got with more effort than building a MW loop (Victor Goonetilleke, 4S7VK, May-July UADX)

The inland SW svc, VLM, VLQ and VLW, started going 24h from yesterday, 1/8. Brisbane VLM 4920 and VLQ 9660 will be 24h. Perth VLW 6140 0945-01, VLW 9610 24h, VLW 15425 21-0945 (RA Talkback 2/8 via WBI 7/8) What about VLX? (gh)

B A N G L A D E S H Dhaka has been using 6215 for HS 1230-1715 after a disastrous shortlived sojourn on 6195 during May/June obliterating BBC WS. Obviously BBC would have lodged a protest with Dhaka! HS now sked: 00-03 4880, 03-09 on 7080, 1130-1715 4890, 1230-17 unfound at this time (Sarath Weerakoon, Sri Lanka UADX May-July) Pity it was my job as BBC's Colombo monitor to inform them via cable! 4880 nom is measured on 4878.9 and latest monitoring shows the 1130-1715 xmsn is also on 4878.9 instead of 4890. As of 1322 15/7. Subsequently the 1230-1715 noted on 6220 (Victor Goonetilleke, SL, ibid.)

B H U T A N Bhutan BCng Svc currently providing G sigs thruout SAs, espily in evcs, sked Sun 06-09, M-Sat 11-14 on 6035. Last 30 min in EG. BBS f/in 1130 to 1400 s/off. Now free of USSR HS QRM but some peculiar noise hrd on fq every evening spoiling reception. Per info from Thimphu, BBS plans upgrade to 50 kW. Another report says 9615 (Sarath Weerakoon, SL, UADX May-July) As of 15/7 1340 still on 6035. Move to 31mb may give worldwide DX possibility depending how clear fq is. And if someone is thinking that Victor's juniors are pasting BBS QSLs in their scrapbooks, forget it. I have yet to QSL this. Reported it a decade ago when it first appeared. In fact they played my musical request but never got the QSL! These days we hardly ever collect QSLs. After all, I know I heard it!! (Victor Goonetilleke, Sri Lanka, May-July UADX)

B U R M A Burmese Armed Forces stn in Taunggyi is providing staggering reception on new 6570, 1030-1330. Not much talk but a lot of lovely mx. Burma was also reported a year ago to be shopping for a 10 kW xmtr. Perhaps that is what we hear on 6570 (Sarath Weerakoon, SL, UADX May-July) From my xmtr experience I feel it is a new one because of good modulation, stability, and superb strength. Should reach NAM w/out any problem unless there is a big ute sitting on it (Victor Goonetilleke, SL, ibid.)

C A M E R O O N R Cameroon, Yaoundé, reportd 18/7: Presidential Decree fixing new working hours in public svc comes into effect 20/7. In order to enable you to reach your working places on time, R Cameroon's morn pgm has also been modified slightly. New nx sked: Mon-Fri first bilingual [FR & EG] bulletin at 0430, and nx in both langs at 06. Sat, first bulletin at 05; EG at 06, FR 07. Midday FR nx now 12 ex-1230; rest unchanged (WBI 24/7)

We have two 5000 W xmtrs. The second is being readied for xmsn. My only problem is the time necessary to complete the task. Recent improvements have been made to the first xmtr which allow us to be hrd more clearly and with 100% modulation. At present we are running the first xmtr at 1500 watts in order to "burn it in." Stn eqp is as follows: 2 xmtrs made by Consasa, heavily modified; power 5 kW ave, 20 kW PEP, exciter Kenwood TS-430S, final tube Eimac 4CX5000. Eight antennas: two 5-element yagis of 12 dB gain, for 15460 and 11870; under construction three dipoles for 9.7 MHz and 3 more for 5.9 MHz. Three towers: 1) 32 meters, self-supporting; 2) 36 meters, guyed; 3) planned for next year. After some tests the dipoles may be changed to Lazy-H's. The yagi on 15460 is currently aimed north at 0 degrees. Within six months we'll be adding some new pgms and issuing new QSL cards (David L Gregory, Mgr/CE, AWR-LAM, 13/7 reply to Eric Falkenhan, Baltimore MD) Rubber stamp shows fqs as 15.460, 11.870, 9.725, 5.970 MHz. Also enclosed pgm sked showing pgms in these langs: 1355-14 SP, 14-15 Sun-Fri FR, 14-1430 Sat Papiamento & 1430-15 EG. 15-17 EG. 17-22+ SP (via Falkenhan)

RLI, Alajuela hrd on 15460 closing in SP & EG at 2207; call believed to be TINT, and addr P O Box 1177 (Richard Jary, RA JP DX Time, undated) Really? I thought it was TIASD (gh)

C U B A The foremost expert outside Cuba on broadcasting in that country, and a co-editor of the World Radio-TV Handbook, Ronald F. Schatz, died unexpectedly in his sleep 25/7. He was 42. Ron started as a mediumwave DXer; dissatisfied with the lack of accurate post-revolution station information available from official sources, and from official US sources, he set out to research it himself, and kept up with frequent unadvertised changes in networks and stations using specific frequencies. He also wrote technical articles, published mostly by the National Radio Club in years past, about antennas and propagation. Ron and I made several trips abroad together, and we saw each other occasionally, as he lived nearby in Pompano Beach. He is survived by his parents, in Pembroke Pines FL, a sister in Phoenix AZ, among other relatives. Many may have met him at ANARC, EDXC and NRC conventions. He will be greatly missed on a personal level by those who knew him, and on a professional level by those who benefited from and respected his work (gh)

Tim Hendel suggests that it would be fitting for ANARC to establish an annual award in Ron Schatz's name for the individual who has done the most to bring to light the broadcasting scene in one particular country (gh)

He also said foreigners will not be granted licences for any of the three new radio and two TV systems to be set up. Under a revised media policy ancd a week ago, Seaga promised to sell off the AM radio svc of the state-owned Jamaica BCing Corp (JBC) as well as grant licences for two other radio and two TV stns. The private commercial radio opn for the JBC's Radio One will start up by 1 October. A new gov't Public BCing Svc (PBS) will take over the existing JBC FM radio and its TV svc. PBS radio, per timetable will be on air by 1 Nov, and its TV svc will follow a month later. Seaga promised to issue licences for a commercial regional radio stn, plus a non-commercial religious stn to op on FM. There will also be a commercial TV stn plus a religious TV stn. The commercial TV should be xmtg by 1 Dec and the religious TV by next Apr. Both the regional and religious stns should be on air next Feb. Too, gov't plans to sell off its minority holdings in R Jamaica (RJR) by Oct, shortly before it completes awarding licences for new bcng systems. Seaga said licence fees for commercial bcng entities will be 2.5% of their gross revenues (WBI 31/7)

It will in addn produce jingles for public and private organisations. Prince Momoh emphasised that the revenue-generating activities of FRCN will not in any way be allowed to overshadow the public svc nature of the corporation's activities (WBI 31/7)

La Prensa reported 22/7: Ancrs of R Sonora, which shares offices and installations w/R Continente and R Fiesta, have asked the Atty Gen'l's office to allow them access to the offices so that they can resume their work. Anrc Pedro A. Vásquez, speaking on behalf of all ancrcs at R Sonora said "We want them to allow us to work; we want to reopen R Sonora because we have to work". Ministry of Govt & Justice told the workers that the office door is sealed "by orders of the Atty Gen'l's office". R Sonora xmits only folk mx. R Sonora operates by selling radio time to several concessionaires, who in turn sell advertising space. The

ancrs' income comes from the ad fees, which provide the cost of the concession and the ancrcs' salaries. Since R Sonora shares installation with KW Continente and the latter has been shut down, R Sonora has been shut down "indirectly". This closure is affecting some 10 heads of household - speaking solely of the ancrcs - who are now deprived of their livelihood. The ministry officials told the team of R Sonora ancrcs - Pedro A Vázquez, José Ángel Ortiz, Héctor Toribio and Felipe Cano - that there are no orders to close down the stn at the Ministry... (WBI 31/7)

Circuito RPC TV reported 27/7: We inform our viewers that as of today, our newscasts will be regulated by Decree 61 of 24/7, whereby Decree 155 of 28/5/62 which regulates being in Panama is extended to include a clause that states: [Radio and TV fqs may be cancelled] when there is an exhortation to disrupt public order or to perpetrate crimes, or a refusal to fulfil the constitution, the laws of the republic and the duties they impose; and to replace state branches thru violent means, and to disobey the laws and the authorities. The decree is signed by Pres Eric Arturo Delvalle and the govt minister Rodolfo Chiara de León. Article 40 of Decree 155 of 28th May 1962, establishes the reasons whereby the natl govt can declare the cancellation of radio & TV fqs in the country as required (WBI 7/8)

P A R A G U A Y [Cf May LN-26] According to El Diario report, via WBI 3/4, at least 29 ZP stn licences have lapsed. Govt said previously it'd return to Lopez the multi-megapeso bc facility on Bohol Ave in Quezon City. TV stn was owned by Lopez until Marcos' martial law govt grabbed it w/ minimal compensation. Malacañang's about-face was apparently result of mounting public clamour against return of mass media monopoly which is expressly prohibited in the 1986 constitution. The Lopezes now operate another TV studio and a newspaper, aside from other commercial interests. In spite of its decision, however, govt will not provide funds for Ch 4; the stn will be required to generate its own finances just like any other commercial TV net, Arroyo said. This is one of the provisions of exec order No 297 signed by Pres Aquino 15/7 last, reorganising the Office of the Press Secretary (OPS). The order prohibits the use of OPS funds to subsidise the operations of PTV4 and its affiliated stn. Malacañang sources said that because of this policy the OPS budget for 1988 proposed by Press Secy Teodoro Benigno was trimmed from 475 megapesos to 134. Benigno had proposed a 220 megapeso subsidy for PTV 4 (WBI 7/8)

In some DX ulletins it is stated that the TWR xmtr is the one from 11800. This is not the case. 11800 is a 100 kW Siemens carrying Indian svc until 1600 and then to ME 1645-1845 w/EG nx 1745. SLBC's 60mb out-

lets, esply 4870 and 4940 often suffer from distortion. We have brought it to attn of authorities. Let's hope something will be done soon. It's a heck of a problem to do any serious DX on 60m when they splatter all over (Victor Goonetilleke, Sri Lanka, May-July UADX)

S U D A N SUNA nx agcy, Kartoum reported 20/7: Radio and TV employees began a 24h strike at 1000 this morn, demanding removal of the Dir-Gen of the Natl Corp for R&TV on grounds that it's impossible to cooperate w/him and that he is against giving employees their rights. They also demand purging the corp of the May regime [former pres Numayri] supporters as well as the need to expedite implementation of the terms of svc in accordance w/the corp law approved during the transitional period. Meanwhile, the strike will halt radio and TV xmsns in the capital and in regional stns.

R SPLA reported 3/8: SPLA [Sudan Peoples Liberation Army - hostile to the Sudanese govt] souces have furnished R SPLA w/list of demands put to the Khar-toum govt by a number of public corporations which went on strike as from 20/7 to back these demands. Per our sources the bcng unions of R Omdurman and TV Corps went on strike 20/7 demanding:

- 1) implementation of their financial circular and improvement of poor condx.
- 2) Adoption of Radio & TV Act to avoid undue interference by ruling parties in matters pertaining to these important public institutions.
- 3) dismissal of the Genl Mgr, who was suspended and investigated following the Mar-Apr [1985] popular uprising on charges of corruption, but later reinstated because of pressure from one of the ruling parties.
- 4) complete purge of elements loyal to the defunct May [Numayri] regime from the Corp.
- 5) closing down of the illegal and unlicensed private Ummah radio bcng stn that bcs from the Ummah Party [of Premier Sadiq al-Mahdi], premises in Omdurman to the capital.

Monitoring 20 July to 3 Aug: Bcs from R Omdurman were disrupted from 20 to 23/7, returning more or less to normal on 24/7. However, since 26/7 the high power xmttr on 1296 kHz has not been hrd. Too soon to tell whether temporary or permanent. I wonder if the curious sked results from a quid-pro-quo w/USSR re number of hours on average RHC is relayed there (gh)

Armenian radio's mbg pgm on 1/8 reported: Yerevan R's xmsns for abroad began 10/8/47. In these first years, xmsns were in Armenian and Arabic for listeners in near and middle east. Xmsns for Europe began in 1958 and for NAM on 5/8/62. Currently, Yerevan R's ES xmsns total 8:10 daily in AM, AR, w/nx summaries in EG, FR, TK, SP and Persian... (WBI 14/8)

Eesti Raadio, 200 100 Tallinn, Estonian SSR, sent an original typed sheet giving info about the stn and sked, in local time of UTC+3 (Apr 1-Sept 30, +4): First Pgm: 1035, 1215, 1332 kHz: Estonian 0530-0005, except 07-0715 & 2350-24 when nx are replayed from Moscow. Nx bulletins at 0545, 0645, 0730, 08, 09, 11, 12, 14, 15, 16, 1830, 2130, 23. On 1215 and 1332 nx also relayed from Moscow 12-1230. § 1 - The project called LV de Venezuela which consists of the installation and placement into svc of a high-power radiostn and which the Natl Executive, thru the Ministry of the Secretariat of the Presidency and the Natl Telephone Co of Venezuela [CANTV], have been undertaking in a co-ordinated manner will from now on be executed exclusively by CANTV.

§ 2 - The Minister of the Secretariat of the Presidency will take the necessary measures so that the assets and credits obtained by the republic for LVV project will be transferred to CANTV.

§ 3 - The Transport and Comms Minister will adopt the necessary measures so that CANTV can carry out the project mentd in previous articles, in accordance w/the social statutes that are in effect.

§ 4 - The budget laws for the next financial years will allocate CANTV the resources it might need to fully carry out the aforementioned project.

§ 5 - Once the radio stn to which § 1 refers is installed, the transport and Comms Ministry, after the fulfilment of the legal formalities, will grant the corresponding permit for the operation of this radio stn to the institution that the natl executive indicates.

§ 6 - Transport & Comms Minister and the Minister of the Secretariat of the Presidency will be in charge of implementation of this decree. Issued in Caracas 14/7/87, 117th yr of independence and 128th of federation, Jaime Lusinchi.

Y U G O S L A V I A R Yugoslavia ancd in EG 22/7: RY is bcng its pgm on 5980 and 6100 from a new more powerful xmsn centre [at Bijeljina]. Reports appreciated to P O Box 200, Belgrade. Monitoring 21-22/7: RY using addl xmtr on 5980 for EG 1730-18 // 11735 7240 6100, 1830-20 FR, EG, GM // 9620 7240 6100. R Zagreb ended its rx bulletin at 20 (which is relayed by RY on Tue) 21/7 stating it had been from new more powerful xmtr on 6100 (WBI 31/7)

An ES sked issued 7/8 does not obviously show any further use of new xmtrs, with a maximum of 3 SW fqs for all other xmsns. The multilingual relays of various regional stns still seem to match WRTH 87 p 149, except all one hour earlier during summer; don't forget Mon 20-2030 R Ljubljana in Slovene and English (gh)

Z A M B I A RSP&P Moscow reported 4/8: Zamb govt has worked out plans for countering hostile S African propaganda which has noticeably been stepped up of late. In the Limpopo River valley in particular, it is planned to build a SW radio stn in order to intercept Pretoria's radio bcs [so by "intercept" do they mean just monitoring, or transmitting, or even jamming????? -gh]. Trying to undermine the internal position of neighbouring independent countries, the racist regime in addn to the notorious South African SABK [presumably SABC - South African BCin Corp - WBI note] radio stn has created such stns as the anti-Zambian stn "Truth" [presumably R Truth, which is in fact directed against Zimbabwe - WBI], the V of Mozambican National Resistance, and the UNITA band's V of the Black Hawk [presumably V of the Resistance of the Black Cockerel] in Angola (WBI 14/8) Congrats, RSP&P, you almost got something right (gh)

Z I M B A B W E ZBC Radio 1, Harare, reported 31/7: Minister of Info, Posts & Telecomms, comrade Nathan Shamuyarira, says Zimb has now reached an operational stage in its efforts to counter the racist S African regime's propaganda campaign. Comrade Shamuyarira was speaking to the ZBC in Bulawayo today after touring several PTC installations in Matebeleland-South province. The minister said the installation of a small xmtr at Beitbridge has proved very useful, adding that there are plans to establish a SW radio stn in Gweru. Com. Shamuyarira, accompanied by his deputy, comrade Naomi Mhivatiwa, also said there is room for improvement in the telephone exchange system between Bulawayo and the rural areas, especially those on the border (WBI 7/8)

R V of Ethiopian Unity Monitoring 15-21 July: stn hostile to Eth govt, on behalf of Eth People's Democratic Alliance, continues hrd 19-20 apx on 9660. 19/7 also traced on // 7200. Aerial bearings indicate xmtrs may be in Sudan. RVEU opening anmt in Amharic 1900 14/7: "This is R- V- E- U-. Good evening; RVEU is beginning its pgm which will discuss Ethiopian equality and unity, the common interests of society based on individual rights, the current objective reality of Ethiopia's political, economic and social situation and the prevailing oppression and crisis. Daily bc on 25, 31 and 41 mbs at 19-20. Ready to bc any independent opinion and comment from individuals or organisations and also from individuals who have defected from the present admn in Eth. This is RVEU."

It also accused Herbert Anaya, Secy Genl of the non-govtal Human Rights Comm, of being "one of the country's biggest misinformers abroad and of accusing offls and military men of unconfirmed offences". Accused him of being a commander of an extreme-left armed organisation, which for the past seven yrs in this country meant sentencing him to death. The stn, which reportedly carries items similar to those of the Contras' R Libertad [sic], asked the Duarte admn what it is waiting for to act against the so-called popular orgs that want the country to return to the era of 1979 and years following, which were the hardest of the civil war in this country. In El Salvador, the clans Farabundo Martí and Venceremos currently operate with much difficulty due to interference. Venceremos is the more regular of the two and IDs as the offl voice of the FMLN. The appearance of this stn, described as extreme rightwing by people who sent an initial recording to DPA, has caused much diverse comment (WBI 31/7)

compress. Members will also appreciate it if contributors will avoid reporting the same
high-power stations each month and send in some of the many rare outlets or details on new
xmsns or frequency shifts. Thanks again to those contributors who take the trouble to
arrange their logging slips in freq order and band them together. 73's

CONGRATULATIONS to the Jonathan Marks family on the birth of Hazel Stephany August 28 at 1330 UT! For those who came in late, Jonathan is the very popular host of Radio Nederland's Media Network.

Lou Josephs tells me that Radio Earth's programming was pulled from WHRI for non-payment of bills; Media Network is working on a feature story that may have aired by the time you read this. Radio Earth has returned as a weekly show on Tuesdays 03-04 UTC on WHRI on 7355 kHz. It includes repeat airings of SCDX and Swiss Merry-Go-Round.

Other Notes: Despite all attempts to hear Radio Discovery and the Voice of Nigaragua, these stations elude me. China moved up 10 kHz to 15455 at 00 and 03 UT to duck interference, and the new 11855 at 11 and 12 is normally excellent. Bulgaria announces specific frequencies for African transmissions, but only meter bands for NA/Eu. At 0300, 11735, 11840 and 9560 are announced for for Africa, but no mention of "42m" (i.e., 7115 kHz) for NA. That is given at 2130 and 2300. Algeria in English noted on 9508.77 kHz 19-20 UTC with more than 45 min of pop American music following news, 21 into French. More often than not, it appears that the postal service will cause Hauser's World of Radio on WRND Thursday night (Fri 02 UT) to be the previous weekend's show. It consistently runs late, starting as much as 10 to 15 minutes after the announced 0200 start. Syria at 2005 moved from 15020 to 11625, keeping 12085 in parallel. North Korea now has Spanish, not English, at 1100 on 9777. On 9777 at 1200 UT, the full English schedule is given but I cannot clearly hear it with the poor band conditions. How about some help?

A new, replacement NRD-525 is back on the table here. Gilfer also had an Info-Tech M-6000 Multi-Mode Code Receiver sitting on the counter, and that came home with me too. I must say it is fascinating to watch some of the press services, such as the Cuban relays of TASS on 14901 and 16348 and the Chinese XINHUA on 16136, print across the screen. From Universal SW came the Info-Tech M-610 RTTY scope and two press books; the scope really helps to decipher the oddball shifts. If you are into utility DXing and have a PC/MS-DOS micro, I put together a program to gather up the utility listings from magazines and club bulletins; download UTIL_LOG.ARC from the Pinelands RBBS.

I spent the week of August 10 in Seattle, on business, and dragged the Sony 2010 with me. I found a great receiver testbed in downtown Seattle. If it works there with the intermod, you have a good receiver. The Sony 2010 did not fair well at all. On SW, the only things I could hear were the BBC on 11750 up to 1615 s/off; Japan on 11705 at 1900 and on 17755 at 2100; and Radio Nederland's Caribbean outlets at 0530 on 9715 and 6165. No China, no North Korea and no European-based transmitters. I heard part of Radio Earth in the noise enough to know that it aired 8/11. WWV was only readable during parts of the day, usually on 15 MHz. On MW, the SEA-TAC airport FIS station (15 miles from downtown) could be heard on 530 kHz.

On Pinelands RBBS, we have new files. MINIPROP 2.0, an excellent upgrade to an already classic propagation prediction program, written by W6EL, is available for download as MP.ARC. Al Quaglieri, SPEEDX Publisher, uploads the latest African loggings column and list of DX shows each month. Radio Nederland's Fall Preview is on line too, thanks to Lou Josephs. George Woods and Bob Brown see that SCDX bulletins are available weekly. For catchup reading, the last six SCDX issues are available for download out of the RADIO directory. Helpful Pineland RBBS hint: if you want to read all messages in the main section or the SWL conference, use the wild card "*" to read all messages since your last logon. You do NOT have to type one message number after another, as I have seen some persons do. You have the opportunity of entering a reply or halting the read process at the end of each message.

More Notes: Yo, Glenn, the NDXE theme aired the weekend of August 27-30 ought to be taken out and buried. Really bad! There were flares at 0932 and 1648 UT 8/22, 2311 UT 8/23, and two geomagnetic storms 0900 UT 8/25 and 0426 UT 8/26. Take a look at the chart. The disruption came very close to effecting a total HF band wipeout. Anyone else note how bad the audio distortion and splatter is off Moscow's transmitters on 25m? As I write this at 1130+ UT, 11860 is tearing up +/- 20 kHz; also noted throughout the day off 11875, 11840.


