


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
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The new Drake R-8 is a microprocessor controlled, synthesized, all rx world band receiver offering excellent sensitivity, high dynamic range and features for the most demanding listener. It has been designed as a "comp package." You get many items as standard equipment, that would be extra on other receivers. Multi-mode reception is featured throughout the range of receiver (.1 to 30 MHz). A high-Q, 8-pole, electronically switched IF provides a range of five bandwidths. New "firmware" permits user select of bandwidths independent of mode and 100 Hz readout in AM. The front panel liquid crystal display provides visual feedback to the operator of the cur status of the receiver. In the AM mode, a selectable synchronous dete (SYNCHRO) allows for enhanced reception by eliminating or reducing distortion due to fading signals. A Passband Offset control also aids in reducing eliminating interfering signals by electronically shifting the receiver's IF quencies without disturbing the operating frequency. Other reception include selectable AGC, wide/narrow noise blanker, RF preamplifier enhancing weak signals, RF attenuator for further improvement of strong sk handling capabilities and an adjustable RF gain. A Notch filter is also supplied as an effective tool to eliminate offending tones (heterodynes). The provides exceptional audio to the built-in speaker.

Two VFOs (tuners) called A and B, are provided on the R-8. Selection is m with the VFO function key. Frequencies can be directly entered through keypad. A programmable memory area allows for 100 non-volatile memc segmented into blocks of ten. The memories store: frequency, m bandwidth, AGC setting, RF setting, antenna, notch on/off, noise bla setting and synchronous detector on/off. As a result of 3 scan methods three scan modes; nine distinct scan functions are supported in the R-8. three methods are: Stop at carrier detect, Pause 5 seconds on carrier. Pause at carrier until carrier drops for 5 seconds, then resume scan. TI modes are: Scan all memories, Scan all unlocked memories of user sele list and Scan from VFO A to B. A 24 hour clock-timer allows the R-8 to on and off at preset times. An RS-232C port is also supplied. For performe and features, the American-made R-8 is absolutely state-of-the-art!

Musings

For the last ten years of DXing the tropicals, I often wondered what it would be like to set up a listening post high in the Andes and listen away to the terrific music coming out of Bolivia and Peru. Well, in January I had that chance and I learned a few things I hadn't planned on.

I went to Quito, Ecuador for a three week traveling workshop to study the views of indigenous people on the Columbus event. It was part of the Latin American Council of Churches Quincentenary educational program. I wrote ahead to Rich McVicar and Ken McKarg at HCJB and packed a couple dozen tapes and recorders; ready to amass a collection of great music with local quality reception. I was in for a surprise. First of all, City DX in Ecuador is just about as bad as it is in downtown Chicago. Most trucks and taxis seem to broadcast on large segments of the 60 meter band. Their programming is all hash. I expected to hear Peruvians like locals and Ecuadorean shortwave stations like local FMers. Hah. I have concluded that DX is DX everywhere.

Although I was able to hear dozens of stations from Peru and Columbia as well as Ecuador, Brazilians were almost non-existent. Chile and other nearby countries were silent. Rich and I visited at his office with Ken one afternoon. I took a taxi and discovered that Ken was right. All I had to do was say "HCJB" and the driver dropped me off at the gate without a fuss. I took the tour and met John Beck, Jorge Zamora and the rest of the English folk and enjoyed their hospitality. Thanks, folks. Later that week, Rich and Lisa invited me to dinner and we spent a couple hours jabbering in DX while Lisa's eyes glazed over. Rich shared the secret that tropical band DX is better up in the states. Even though Ecuador has its advantages and one is able to hear many stations rarely heard in the states, the options are often limited. I managed to get decent tapes of all Ecuadorean stations on the air, even though many were just as covered by hash as they might be if heard from Iowa. I noted that R. Zaracuy is now

Radio Catolica. Its offices were just down the block from my Quito home, but I didn't have time for station tours. I visited Santo Domingo and didn't have time to see R. Zaracuy (now only A.M.) either. When in Otavalo, I didn't have time to stop in at R. Bahai. But folks told me they were hard to get into, anyway.

I did hear some terrific stuff though - R Cumanda, El Coca on 3351 with its overmodulated signal; Radio Tucuban 4212. very weak even in Ecuador; R. 27 de Diciembre on 3350, the only Bolivian I heard; R. Interoceanica on 4840 with a little jazz one morning (it's a slick station for being so far off in the jungle.); R. Federacion 4960 broadcast almost non-stop Shuar language programs. Most fun were the Peruvians early in the morning: R. Inca 4235; R. Tingo Marie 4759; R. Tarma 4775; R. Universal 3310; R. Atahualpa 4820; R. Ancash 4990 and good old R. Andina 4995. The best catch was R. Marañon in Jaen, Peru on 4835 -- almost impossible at my Iowa QTH.

I was surprised to hear a middle Eastern station on 4600 one evening and wondered what R. Kiev was doing on 4825 another night at 0312 sign off. It was in English besides! Even though I was a bit disappointed about the quantity of DX from Ecuador, I now have a precious feel for the band that I didn't have before. Living in the country and travelling to Esmeraldas, Santo Domingo, Cuenca and Otavalo as well as bumming around Quito for three weeks helped me understand many of the station habits and idiosyncracies of tropical band stations. I can now understand IDs a lot better even though I only learned a little survival Spanish. I visited with an agency that produces programs for local stations and came away with an appreciation of the work that goes into running a small station up in the mountains. I hope to do a small article on that later. Anyone interested in a tape of "local" quality DX from Ecuador can drop me a note. I came back with over 20 hours and some of it is pretty good. Thanks to the McVicars for a great evening and to Ken and Rich for a great tour of HCJB!

The best part of the fest for me, though, is the chance it gives to get together with whole bunch of people who also enjoy the radio hobby. I've gotten to know fellow DXers from as far away as Montreal and Ohio through the fest - people who share many of my interests and who I'd most likely not have met otherwise.

The diversity of people who attend is enormous: there are people who're interested in and knowledgeable just about every conceivable nook and cranny of the SWL/DX hobby. Everyone from absolute beginning SWL to hard-core veteran DXer is welcome and in attendance, and the mix of backgrounds works out just fine. It seems that everyone, no matter how new to the hobby, has some tip or piece of information to share.

The opportunity to hear talks by veteran DXers on their areas of interest is another great feature of the fest. I'm particularly fascinated in propagation and in DXing Asia and the Pacific, and have found Dave Clark's talks on these subjects particularly fascinating and helpful.

I heartily recommend the fest to any SWLer or DXer who hasn't yet gone to one. Where else can you get together with 200 people who enjoy the same hobby as you do FOR A WHOLE WEEKEND? If you haven't gone, you don't know what you're missing. The only downside of the fest is that it seems to end too soon; you'd really like it to last a full two or three days.

I'm already looking forward to next year's fest, and hope to persuade a bigger delegation from the BAD guys to show up in '93.

Thank you for highlighting the resumption of the BBC's "It's Your World" series in the February 1992 issue of the NASWA Journal.

Thanks to the information you provided, I was one of two Americans chosen to put a question to Mr. Gennady Burbulis, the State Secretary of Russia and First Deputy Premier of the Russian Federation, during the inaugural program on 23 February. (Unfortunately, Russian President Yeltsin could not participate. The BBC noted that Mr. Burbulis has been described as Yeltsin's "right-hand man in charge of the day-to-day running of the country.")

After reading your "Easy Listening" column in the Journal, I sent a list of seven possible questions to the address given. Imagine my surprise and delight when, forty minutes before the show was to air, I received a phone call from London!

One of my questions — a philosophical one — struck a responsive chord at the BBC and, as it happens, I got to close out the program by asking it of Mr. Burbulis, a former professor of philosophy.

Thanks again to you and the Journal crew for providing NASWA members with timely information that can be put to good use. I am delighted to be a member of such a fine organization.

I'm pretty sure David won't easily forget his conversation with the First Deputy Premier of Russia. If your friends ever ask what benefit one might gain from listening to shortwave radio, show them this letter - that's about as positive an experience as I've ever seen! - RC

The Association of North American Radio Clubs ("ANARC") is pleased to announce the recipients of its annual awards:

North American Shortwave Broadcast DXer of the Year - Jerry Berg

Jerry is well known to the hobby. He is past Log Report editor for the North American Shortwave Association ("NASWA") and a regular contributor to many clubs. He's a dedicated, active DXer. Jerry's reputation for accuracy and consistently high reporting standards is unmatched. And he shares unreservedly with other hobbyists, regardless of their experience and interest levels. His writing appears in Fine Tuning's PROCEEDINGS publications and the acclaimed Sams' book "Shortwave Listening With The Experts."

Jerry's leadership as Chairman has made the ANARC Committee to Preserve Radio Verifications the success it is today. With over 25,000 verifications in the committee's archives (which he painstakingly administers and documents), QSL collections that would have long been discarded are now preserved for future generations of radio enthusiasts to enjoy.

North American Specialty Band DXer of the Year - Ken Stryker

For a number of years, Ken has, almost single-handedly, been providing information to the DXer regarding navigational beacons. He subscribes to and purchases many varied sources of information regarding navigational beacons at his own expense. On his own time he sorts, collates and presents data in the beacon lists, in its updates, and in his column in the bulletin of the Long Wave Club of America ("LWCA"). He uses his own time to assist DXers to identify beacons that they are unable otherwise to do themselves.

Without Ken's efforts, the longwave beacon DXing fraternity would be in trouble, for each DXer would need to spend great amounts of his time and money to keep track of the weak dots and dashes logged.

International DXer of the Year - Arthur Cushen

Arthur began his DXing career in 1936. He has been a regular contributor to many of the world's DX bulletins. Arthur is an avid QSLer with 284 shortwave countries and 166 medium wave countries verified according to the SPARC list. Over the years, he has accumulated over 6,000 shortwave and over 2,100 medium wave QSL's in his collection.

Arthur is a frequent contributor to many of the world's DX bulletins. He has written books including his famous "The World In My Ears." He has provided DX tips on many different programs including Media Network and the DX Partyline. Currently, he is the Membership Secretary for the New Zealand Radio DX League.

The awards were announced at the Winter SWL Festival held in Kulpville, PA on Saturday 14 March 1992 at the banquet by Interim Coordinator Richard D'Angelo.

In addition to the above awards, ANARC honored two long time association supporters with "Certificates of Recognition." Tom Gavaras retired as the Club Representative of the Minnesota DX Club after 17 years of dedicated service to ANARC and its member clubs. John Trautschold retired from his current editing chores for the Society to Preserve the Engrossing Enjoyment of DXing ("SPEEDX") after serving the club for two decades in various capacities (Business Manager, Publisher, President of the Board of Directors, numerous editing roles, etc.) in addition to being the club's ANARC Representative for significant portions of that period. ANARC wishes Tom and John well in their retirement and thanks them for their many years of devoted service to the hobby community.

Anatolian Adventures, or, "How I wound up speaking German to a goat herder in Turkey."

The time - 7:00 a.m., August 1, 1990...

The place - home in Rhode Island, furiously trying to get everyone out the door for work and school...

The phone rings - "Hello, is this Henry J. Michalenka?" I instantly respond "You're from the Voice of Turkey! I recognize your voice." And the adventure started...

Actually, the adventure started a couple months before when I entered the Voice of Turkey's annual essay contest. Having put together my entry and pronounced to the wife that it was the winner, I got the same response we all usually get when related to the radio hobby (and some other things). At least I got to bang on the bathroom door when they called me; I can't print here what she said. I also can't print what she said the next day when Iraq invaded Kuwait! But I was not about to pass up an all expense paid two week tour of Turkey!!

After seven weeks of being told I wasn't going to go, I found myself on a Pan Am flight to JFK to hook up with THY (Turkish Airlines). I had no tickets to Istanbul, and when I got to THY in New York, neither did they! After an hour wait, someone in authority opened a desk drawer and found my passage to the East. THY isn't exactly the Orient Express, but the Airbus had a map projected in the cabins showing the

aircraft/direction/route thus far/airspeed/altitude/ETA, and lots of other information on a constantly rotating scale, even showing cities we were passing over. Made the flight most enjoyable, and I wish the other carriers would do that! After a lay-over in Brussels for fuel and cleaning, we resumed the journey and landed in Istanbul in early afternoon. It is constantly frightening to walk alone into a culture where you can't even read a sign! I did manage to follow the crowd to the passport control, then baggage claim, and was in customs when I spotted the famous "waving airport sign" with my name. Behind the sign were two smiling faces of Rafet Esit (Head of Foreign Language Programming) and Mina Tansel (Program Producer). International Broadcasting In a Changing World

In the Third World, Kim Elliot says, the typical shortwave receiver is of poor quality, worth about eight U.S. dollars. Yet, the Voice of America's research director says, millions in Latin America, the Middle East and Africa successfully receive the "commanding signals" of VOA, BBC and other large international broadcasters.

What are these broadcasters saying to developing countries? Who listens, and how do they react? These were the questions posed to a panel of Third World specialists in Washington DC recently as the Smithsonian Institute continued its forum on international broadcasting in a changing world, in cooperation with the VOA's 50th anniversary celebration.

Moderator Frank Cummins, chief of VOA's program review office, said more than half of the Voice's programming is beamed to the developing world. The panelists struggled, however, to characterize the target countries. Georgetown University history professor Luis Aguilar, the last president of Cuba's Christian Democratic Party, offered the evening's most satisfying definition: "where the majority of the people has no real access to the standard of living that exists in developed nations."

Sherwood "Woody" Demitz, a VOA veteran who is currently an international broadcasting specialist for the parent U.S. Information Agency (USIA), said shortwave listeners in the Third World are relatively young, well-educated, male and urban dwellers. The profile, he said, is the

result of standard survey research done by overseas firms. "Seventy percent of Albanians listen to VOA and our credibility is 'off the scale'."

Negussie Mengesha, chief of VOA's Amharic service to Ethiopia, put it in context. "Where people cannot read and write, shortwave broadcasting becomes the most important (information) factor in their lives.

"People in Third World countries do not trust their own media," said Mohammed Siddiqi, deputy chief of VOA's Near East and South East division. "They listen to us for music, science and sports, not just the news."

Jacobo Goldstein, Washington correspondent for the private HRN Radio Network of Honduras, said people there do listen for political news and currently, to developments in the U.S. presidential campaign. "If people believe you are telling the truth, they will listen to you," he said.

Hoda Tawfik, Washington bureau chief of Egypt's Al-Itihaad Daily, said "the whole world" has been tuned to America since the fall of Communism. "America is leading the peace process, and the whole world wants to know what is happening."

Technology is expanding the Third World audience. Neils Lindquist, chief of VOA's Brazilian branch, said the audience there has increased many times over because the signal is delivered by satellite to local broadcasters. "There's a ready market not only for VOA but for the BBC, Deutsche Welle and others on 300 radio stations inside Brazil," he said.

Demitz cautioned, however, that TV is asserting itself in developing countries. "As TV proliferates, it becomes the first source for news. CNN is becoming a radio equivalent of a wire service for local writers and editors," he said.

A new challenge facing radio programmers is how to attract a wider audience. "In the face of local competition," says Cummins, "you have to

make shows livelier. A long talk is not modern radio."

Practicality is the focus of contemporary VOA programming to Eastern Europe and the former Soviet Union, said Demitz. "How-to programming is designed to teach people how to fend for themselves."

February 13

On February 13, the discussion shifted to international broadcasting's role in the exportation of culture. Moderator Sanford Ungar, dean of American University's School of Communication, offered that the U.S. has been particularly successful at it. "There's hardly a place in the world you travel without experiencing it," he said. Among the examples cited was VOA Europe, a service described by its director, Terry Hourigan, as an attempt to reach a different kind of listener in a different way.

Hourigan said VOA Europe programming is delivered by satellite and carried to five million listeners per week - mostly by local FM stations - in 290 cities across 24 countries. Its target audience is young people in Western and Eastern Europe. "It sounds like a contemporary American station, but carries messages about how Americans live their lives," he said.

Panelists debated whether there is danger in "cultural imperialism," a criticism often directed at American television and movies. "For much of the world, Hollywood provides context for what America is like," said Lee Hall, retired West Coast Bureau chief for VOA. "You have to drip on their brain to break the misconception," responded Hourigan.

"To date there has not been the same kind of debate about radio," said Robert Fortner, an international communications specialist at Calvin

College in Grand Rapids, Michigan.

"News is culture," said CNN White House Correspondent Charles Bierbauer. "We had to walk a very careful line during the Persian Gulf War to be sure we were not perceived abroad as the Voice of America or the Bush Administration."

Great Britain's effort at communicating its culture through radio drama was cited by Gordon House, chief of the BBC's World Service drama unit. "It compliments BBC's information service," he said. "Britain has a great tradition of radio drama and, unlike other countries, we have actors and writers ready to perform." Yet, he said, Britain wants to exchange cultures and so devotes programs to the lifestyles of other nations. "If you are only promoting your own culture," he said, "you can be accused of cultural imperialism."

What about music as a cultural expression? "One of the most effective ways to communicate what this country is about is music," said Hourigan, "regardless of the listener's level of education." VOA jazz programming legend Willis Conover agreed. "Musicians in other countries learn jazz by listening to our broadcasts," he said. "All elements of jazz were born in other countries."

Judy Massa, VOA music director and country music show host, said surveys show that country is the music that touches people the most. "It gives them lessons in living - guiding them through difficult times."

One programming approach that is growing in popularity on the international bands is the call-in show. "These shows have been inviting dialogue," said USIA counselor McKinney Russell. "They give foreigners a chance to talk back."

Radio Nacional de Venezuela.

Radio Nacional de Venezuela's English service began as a means of informing listeners around the world about the position Venezuela was taking during the Persian Gulf War. Venezuela was in a precarious position. It was a solid member of OPEC, but months before the war started the United States had also been grooming Venezuela to become a reliable oil supplier to North America in times of crisis. This was the crisis.

The war began in mid-January 1991, and on January 19, 1991 Radio Nacional's English language news service took to the air for the first time. The station reported that President Carlos Andres Perez had warned Iraq that if it did not pull out of Kuwait, Venezuela would have no choice but to take the allied side. Similar broadcasts were begun in French.

Radio Nacional had been broadcasting on shortwave in Spanish for nine years. In 1989, a weekly review in English was added, and in 1990 a Saturday French cultural broadcast. It was not the first time that the state-owned radio had carried foreign languages, however. In the 1970's, Radio Nacional had carried transmissions in English, French, Portuguese, German and Arabic. That service had been the victim of an economic crisis. Oil was cheap back in the 70's, and Venezuela was experiencing a boom. When the boom ended, government cutbacks were made in all the state autonomous institutions, and Radio Nacional did not escape the budget axe. Today's foreign service is much smaller than the foreign service of the 1970's.

Radio Nacional attempts to compile its English newscasts from items that are the most interesting and important in order to

catch listeners' attention. The English section is staffed by dedicated broadcast journalists with years of experience, not only in Venezuela but abroad as well. The English news director is Martin "Marty" G. Delfin, who is originally from San Antonio. A graduate of the University of Texas at Austin, Marty worked as a TV reporter throughout Texas before going to South America.

On Saturdays, the English service presents "Crosstalk," a program of interviews with important people from all walks of life—heads of state, politicians, diplomats or just everyday people, all contributing to making Venezuela a leader in the world. The broadcasts in both English and French are short, the Creole program even shorter. The station plans to expand English and French this year, and hopes to bring back Portuguese.

The station receives hundreds of letters every month. Most come from the United States, Canada and Australia, but their signal reaches exotic places such as Azerbaijan, Gabon, Vanuatu and Ukraine as well. Almost everyone complains that the broadcasts are too short. The station is on 9540 kHz. with hour-long broadcasts at the nominal times of 1100, 1400, 1800, 2100, 2400 and 0300 UTC.

Radio Nacional verifies with an attractive green, full-data QSL-card. The address is Apartado Postal 3979, Caracas. They enjoy reading what listeners have to say about them in the different shortwave publications. Marty Delfin has been tuning the bands since 1976, and has a lot of veries himself.

Easy Listening

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Red Cross Broadcasting Service

In the May 1991 *Journal* I provided a profile of a typical month's program from the Red Cross Broadcasting Service. A recent mailing from the RCBS provides a bit of history on the broadcasts. I thought I'd share part of that with you this month.

The International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) began broadcasting in May 1945. In Europe, many ex-prisoners of war were waiting to be taken back to their homes, and they wanted their families to know they were alive. However, normal communications had broken down. Until the end of the 1940s, lists of prisoners of war and of displaced civilians were broadcast by the ICRC from the studios of Radio-Geneve, and were heard by listeners in various parts of Europe. In the first 3 1/2 years of operation, more than 600,000 names were broadcast.

The ICRC realized the usefulness of radio for rapid communication in times of crisis. The 1948 International Broadcasting Conference in Mexico City granted the ICRC its own frequency - a unique asset among international humanitarian organizations.

Test transmissions began in 1951, with the object of finding out whether listeners in different parts of the world could hear the broadcast. These continued sporadically until 1965, when the ICRC installed its own studio at its Geneva headquarters and formed the Red Cross Broadcasting Service. Broadcasts became more regular, and in 1978, the Swiss PTT gave permission for the ICRC to broadcast once a month omnidirectionally in English, French, German, Spanish and Arabic. Beamed transmissions were also made to Africa, Asia and the Middle East. Today, RCBS broadcasts omnidirectionally twice a month on 7,210 kHz, in English, French, German and Spanish. Furthermore, broadcasts in English, French, Spanish, Portuguese and Arabic are beamed to Africa, Asia, North and Latin America and the Middle East.

The note from the RCBS continues, with special mention made of the fact that the monthly RCBS program now includes occasional time for answering listeners' questions. The RCBS does acknowledge listeners' reception reports with QSL cards; an IRC for return postage is appreciated. Contact the ICRC at 19 Avenue de la Paix, CH-1202 Geneva, Switzerland.

BBC World Service April Highlights

July will bring changes to the Cuff household, as my wife and I embark on the thrills, chills, and spills of parenthood. I'll have my tape recorder at the ready in April for the BBC's special series **The Human Child**. A series of eight programs follows the development and maturation of a child from infant through mature adolescent. Doctors, psychologists, academicians, parents, teachers, and children themselves all will take part in the series. Penelope Leach, a well-known author of many childcare books, provides commentary during each program. The four programs in April will cover the womb through age six, with **Not Just A Blank Sheet** (April 5th) looking at the womb from the fetus's perspective and at infancy. **Stand By and Admire** (April 12th) looks at the toddler; **A Question of Gender** (April 19th) considers the characteristics of "girlishness" and "boyishness," debating how these notions differ across cultures. **The Social Child** (April 26th) looks at the role of playtime and the attendant social development of a three- to six-year old. Sundays 1401 (dates shown), with repeats Mondays at 0630 and 1001.

April also brings Christianity's most significant annual commemoration, Easter Sunday. The pope's annual Easter message to the city of Rome and the World, **Urbi et Orbi**, replete with the traditional Easter blessing, airs Easter Sunday, April 19th, at 1000. **The Resurrection and the Life** explores how contemporary Jewish beliefs

and practices influenced the gospel writers' documentation of the events of Easter Sunday. Easter Sunday, April 19th, 0230 and 1615, with a repeat Monday at 0730.

Fans of the BBC's many quiz series should note the debut of the latest 13-part quiz program, **Ned Sherrin's Counterpoint**. Musical knowledge will be tested, with questions from Bach to the Beatles, and from Rossini to Rap. Mondays beginning April 6th, at 1715. Repeats air Tuesdays 0030, Wednesdays 0830. Meanwhile, **The Litmus Test** pits teams of scientists against each other, with topics including courtship dances, which scientist one would most like to dine with, or what single question one wishes to ask God. Sundays beginning April 19th, 2030, repeated Mondays 1215 and Tuesdays 0230.

On a more serious note, **First Among Equals** looks at special programs reserved for minority communities. On April 10th, the program reviews the Indian government's policies on reserving government jobs for the "untouchables" caste. Disputes over these policies brought down the government of V. P. Sing and continue to bedevil Indian politics. April 17th's program looks at the indigenous Malay population in Malaysia; April 24th looks at the practice of Affirmative Action in the USA. Fridays, 0730, 1215, and 1930.

Eighty years later, the tragedy of the sinking of the Titanic continues to be immortalized by historians, film producers, poets, and songwriters. **The Unsinkable Legend**, a thirty-minute program on the 80th anniversary of the disaster examines the enduring fascination with the sea disaster. Sunday, April 12th, 0230 and 1615, repeated Monday at 0730.

The series **Truth To Tell** looks like a cross between the television series **That's Incredible** and **National Geographic**. The tale of the 43-year old film from a lost Swedish polar expedition, the story of the German geologists living the lives of prehistoric men in southwest Africa, and the 91 predecessors of Charles Lindbergh across the Atlantic are featured in April's installments. Mondays beginning April 13th, 0145, with repeats Tuesdays 1445 and Fridays 0415.

The World Service and the BBC's domestic radio drama departments have once again specially commissioned a series of plays collectively called **Globe Theatre 1992**.

What Happened With St. George?, a black comedy by David Cregan, is the author's reflection on the Persian Gulf conflict. The true story of George, a revered defender of the Christian faith and slayer of the dragon of evil, is told. Sunday, April 12th, 0101, 1201, and 1901.

Faith, written by Irish playwright Robin Glendinning, is a tragicomedy on an Eastern European communist adherent's perspective on the collapse of the one-party state. Sunday, April 26th, same times.

One highlight of **Off The Shelf** is **The Wayfarer's Staff**, the diary of a Russian priest (Father Nikiforov Volgin) forced to minister in secret. His loneliness, alienation, and suffering has many parallels with the events of Holy Week. April 6th through 10th, 0430 and 1430.

The obsessive, 50-year love of Irish poet William Butler Yeats for Irish nationalist and early feminist Maud Gonne found its manifestation in Yeats' poetry and in hundreds of private letters Yeats wrote to Gonne. Gonne's granddaughter has released hundreds of these previously unpublished letters in print. **My Dear Mr. Yeats** reviews what is considered some of the outstanding love poetry of the 20th century. Saturday, April 25th, 1901, repeated the following Monday 0101 and 1515.

An alphabetical odyssey through the more offbeat corners of the music business is the theme of the 13-part series **An A-Z of Rock 'N Pop**, Sundays beginning April 12th at 0415, with repeats Mondays at 1530, and Tuesdays 0915. The series is "...designed to help you answer those tricky little questions you come across in quiz games."

What would badminton play-by-play on the radio sound like? Guess no longer, the **European Badminton Championships** are featured on World Service sports programming from April 12th through the 18th. Other sports highlights: the London Marathon (April 12th), the NHL Stanley Cup Playoffs (April 8th), and the Masters golf tournament (April 9th - 12th).

Omnibus is a regular World Service feature covering diverse topics. **Chocolate With Everything** (April 15th) looks at the subtleties of flavor and taste that make good chocolate as hard to define as good wine. **From the Front Line** (April 22nd) looks at the challenges of military journalism - especially

interesting given the recent rumblings of the public relations effort surrounding the Persian Gulf conflict. Wednesdays, 0030, 1001, 1930.

The World Today, a daily BBC current affairs program, has taken on more of a field perspective to balance the studio-based current affairs coverage provided by now thrice-daily **Newshour**. The increased field correspondent participation means the home-base producers are freed up to research and plan more ambitious programs, according to the series editor, Tim Grout-Smith. **The World Today** can be heard Mondays through Fridays at 1645 and 2009, with repeats Tuesdays through Saturdays at 0615.

Last month, I talked about American politics viewed from abroad...this month, it's American amusement parks - **Outlook** attends the grand opening of EuroDisneyland outside of Paris. Presenter Dylan Winter joins Mickey and the gang for the April 12th event. Note: **Outlook** normally airs Mondays through Fridays at 1405 and 1905, with a Tuesday through Saturday repeat at 0105, so I am not sure exactly when the special EuroDisneyland broadcast will air - as April 12th is a Sunday.

Random Notes

National Public Radio can still be found on Shortwave, even after the departure of AFRTS. The **Voice of America** occasionally incorporates NPR's arts reporting into the VOA's regular features. For instance, the Sunday Evening (0030 Monday) magazine program to the Americas featured a music profile that was originally aired on NPR's **Morning Edition**. Perhaps NPR's use of Federal funding means the VOA (a Federal agency) gets access to any programming developed.

My September 1991 column mentioned several programs focusing on "Science on Shortwave." Here's another entry for that list: **New Horizons**, on VOA. **New Horizons** airs 0110 Mondays in the Americas and Caribbean release; a quick scan through the **Shortwave Radioguide** also shows 1110 (Southeast Asia/Pacific), 1510 (South Asia/Europe), and 2110 (Africa) for **New Horizons**.

I particularly enjoy programs like **New Horizons** that focus on the commercialization

of science and technology. I also recently sampled Radio Australia's entry, **Innovations**. The globalization of the processed foods business was featured - an industry in which the USA still excels, much to the chagrin of Australian-owned processed food businesses. I happened to catch the 1030 Tuesday release, my slightly stale Radio Australia schedule shows 1430 Wednesdays and 0730 Fridays in addition to the Tuesday broadcast.

Here in Eastern Pennsylvania, CFRX, the 1 kw shortwave relay (6070 khz) of the Canadian mediumwave station CFRB, comes in reliably most days. If you're looking for Canadian news with even more domestic content than RCI offers, consider **The World Today**, 90 minutes of news, interviews, sports, and commentary from 2100 to 2230 weekdays after April 5. UTC times are one hour later when Daylight Savings time is not in effect.

Feedback

In addition to the letter from David Trachtenberg, mentioned in this month's "Musings", I received a nice letter from Frank Richardson of Annandale, Virginia. Frank has a couple suggestions for future columns, which I'll take him up on starting next month.

Meanwhile, Frank does have one suggestion that I'll pass along right away: "All SWLers should be encouraged to write [to international broadcasters], especially in these tough budget times around the world." Frank is absolutely correct - for most international broadcasters that target broadcasts to North America, direct feedback from us — their listeners — is the only way they can demonstrate to their management that anyone listens to their broadcasts and appreciates the broadcaster's efforts. By comparison, most DXers don't have to provide this feedback, since we English-speaking North American listeners normally aren't the targets of their broadcasts anyway.

This no-longer in print collective block buster is the finest book about the listening hobbies ever published...in my less-than-humble opinion. Watch for this one at ham fests and join me in a DXers prayer that it will someday be re-issued. Also try Inter-Library Loan from your neighborhood branch library. They can get it for you - free.

HIT PARADE: RECEIVER BOOKS

Communications Receivers: The Vacuum Tube Era 1932-1981 by Raymond S. Moore. If you don't have this book or if you have the first edition rather than the greatly expanded second edition, BUY THIS BOOK NOW! It is by far the finest and the only nearly complete reference to ALL North American communications receivers. Currently in print at about \$20.00.

Receivers, Chance or Choice and More Receivers, Chance or Choice by Rainer Lichte. These two wonderful books review and critique receivers manufactured from about 1970 to 1987 and cover almost all solid state receivers. If you are interested in building a receiver reference library for the future (now what WAS a Sony CRF-1, anyway?) these are THE receiver reference books for the solid state era. Both of these great references are still in print for \$18 and \$12 respectively.

Buying A Used Shortwave Radio by Fred Osterman. Fred, the genius behind Universal Shortwave has produced a little beauty which goes into the nuts and bolts of how to buy a used receiver...this is followed by a photo illustrated buyer's guide. This gem costs less than \$5.00 from Universal at 1-800-431-3939. If you don't have one of their catalogues, GET ONE, at the same number.

The Collectors Guide to Antique Radios by Marty and Sue Bunis. This book is the current Bible of the Antique Radio Collecting hobby. It is an 8½" X 11" coated-stock perfect bound beauty. All of the photos (several hundred) are

in color! The book lists virtually every consumer radio ever built in the U.S. and gives a current worth (as of 1991.) If you have an interest in getting started in the antique radio hobby and can only afford one book, this is it. You can find it at Antique Electronics (602-820-5411) in Arizona or it is sold by *Antique Radio Classified* in Massachusetts (508-371-0512.) They both take plastic.

Zenith Radio Brochure Book by Alan Jespersen. Alan is THE Zenith man in the U.S. If you are interested in TransOceanics, and, especially, if you are interested in the big all-wave Black Round Dial Zeniths of the late 1930's, Alan's new compendium on Zenith is a "must have." Alan has collected the photo illustrated dealers product catalogues of Zenith covering all radio products from 1920 to 1946 and all TransOceanics through the 1970's. Alan did a great cut-and-paste job to produce an illustrated product guide, organized by years. Each product is illustrated with a picture - about 1½ inches square on average - and a concise paragraph of technical description. This compendium is reproduced by relatively high quality photo copy and is in an 11" X 19" format, copied both sides on 56 total sides. The cost is a high-but-worth-it \$28.95.

Alan also runs a company The Great Northern Company which stocks many wonderful Zenith items (from Tee shirts to repro knobs and dials) as well as some stuff of other vintage radio manufacturers. The catalogue is \$2.00 and is available from Great Northern, P.O. Box 17338, Minneapolis, MN 55417.

HIT PARADE: HALLICRAFTERS

The Hallicrafters Company: 1932-1982; A Partial Product Listing Covering 50 Years of Production by Chuck Dachis, "The Hallicrafters Collector." Chuck is THE EXPERT on the Hallicrafters Company and its products. He also owns over 400 different Hallicrafters products! This 23 page product list contains a several-page-long history of the company followed with by far the most extensive product list ever put together (even by Hallicrafters). Each product is listed by number, name, year produced, technical description and original selling price. This list is available from several hobby sources (including Tiare and *Antique Radio Classified* for under \$20.00). This is "must have" info for Hallicrafter freqs. There are no illustrations. However, this list combined with Moore's *Communications Receivers* book above (profusely illustrated) tells you about all you need to know about Hallicrafters until Chuck writes THE BOOK... about three years off.

The Hallicrafters Story: 1933-1975 by Max DeHensler. This just introduced book is published by Antique Radio Club of America for just under \$30.00. It is available from Antique Electronics and Antique Radio Classified is VERY DISAPPOINTING. It is an 8½" X 11" perfect bound nearly 300 page book that is typed double spaced (RIP OFF!). There are some fine illustrations and a few interesting tidbits in the narrative. There are also several helpful appendices (all the SAMS references for Hallicrafters gear, etc.). However, there is much less here than meets the eye. Do not buy this book sight unseen!

HIT PARADE: ANTENNA BOOKS

Easy-Up Antennas by Ed Noll. This is my favorite antenna book of all time; with *Easy-Up*, a bit of wire, an electric drill, a saw and usually some PVC pipe, you can build literally thousands of dollars worth of antennas for just a pittance. If I were exiled to a deserted island and could only take one radio book for reference -- this would be it! This book was out of print for a while. However, it is BACK for \$17.00 !!!

The Antenna Book; The Antenna Compendium I, The Antenna Compendium II (all edited and published by ARRL). The main reference, *The Antenna Book*, is a steal at under \$20.00. It is produced in new editions about every two years and is almost 1½" thick! It has over 1,000 pages. The last several editions have been substantial upgrades. If you don't one of these or if you don't have a 14th edition or later, you are in for a real treat. Even though this book is the basic reference for radio amateurs, fully 60% of it is DIRECTLY applicable to folks like you and me. This is a GOLD STAR BEST BUY, for sure. *The Antenna Compendium I and II* cover more experimental, less orthodox antennas and are also highly recommended at about \$15.00 each.

*** F*L*A*S*H ***

As part of the amateur community's 'outreach' efforts since the adoption of the no-code license, many local amateur clubs are contributing ARRL books to their local library. Check at your library, you may get lucky.

The Beverage Antenna Handbook by Victor Misek. (CQ Bookstore only.) This is THE book on beverage antennas -- if you are interested in double wire switchable beverages or null-steering beverage antennas. This book represents the work of a lifetime and is the only place where you can find information on steerable wave antennas, some as short as 150 feet. If you really want the 'straight skinny' on single wire beverages -- check FT's Proceedings 1988 and 1991 (and 1992 to come out in the Fall) I might add.

HIT PARADE: PERIODICALS

There is no better periodical for the shortwave broadcast listener and DXer than the *NASWA Journal*. PERIOD.

Fine Tuning: If you are a SWBC DXer, the weekly newsletter of *Fine Tuning* is a superb investment. Although *FT* was at one time a "closed" organization, it has been open to anyone interested in rare and difficult DX for a decade. The newsletter is usually four sheets of tightly packed loggings and is published weekly except in the North American summer (every 2 weeks then). The current subscription rate is 65 cents an issue; for Canada, 70 cents and issue; and overseas 80 cents an issue AIRMAIL. Minimum 30 issues, payable in U.S. funds only. *Fine Tuning* c/o Mitch Sams, 779 Galilea Ct., Blue Springs, MO 64014

Electric Radio is a monthly by and for radio enthusiasts interested in hollow state (tube) gear. At least half of each issue speaks directly to most Listeners/SWBC DXers. It is formatted like the *NASWA Journal*. The articles are superb and the photography is excellent. The latter half of each issue is BUY/SELL ads devoted entirely to tube gear. You may place one free buy/sell ad per month if you are a subscriber. Subscriptions to ER, P.O. Box 57, Hesperus, CO, 81326. \$20.00 per year 2nd Class, \$20.00 per year First Class Mail. Canada by Air (only)...U.S. \$32.00.

Antique Radio Classified is, in my judgement, the very best of several publications that are similar to *Electric Radio* but which are devoted almost exclusively to antique consumer radios -- the Atwater Kents, Zeniths and Philcos, etc. It also contains about 50% superb articles and 50% BUY/SELL classified ads. Like *ER* above, if you are a subscriber, you may publish one free ad per month. Further, *Antique Radio Classified* contains comprehensive listings of antique radio auctions, meetings, fests, etc. from across the country. VERY HIGHLY RECOMMENDED! A. R. C., P.O. PROCEEDINGS of Fine Tuning I have been rather reluctant to speak of PROCEEDINGS in this column, because I have been one of the main editors of this annual non-profit publication since its inception with the 1988 Edition. I sorta feel now, in my Swan Song column, that my reticence to discuss PROCEEDINGS has been a disservice to the readers of the Listeners Library and to the all the volunteers who labor so hard each year to produce PROCEEDINGS.

The PROCEEDINGS of Fine Tuning consists, each year, of about 200 single-spaced typed pages of very small type... about like you are reading now. We produce it at this very small size type face so that we might give each purchaser 50% more value/information than they would normally receive in a 200 page book. Each annual is divided into five sections: Propagation, Antennas, Receivers, Peripheral Equipment and Features. The Features section contains articles on broadcasting in target countries, historical articles, collective articles on technical and non-technical tips, articles about DXpeditioning, etc.


Unique in the radio hobbies, each article is reviewed in detail by a Blue Ribbon panel of "experts" and then rewritten prior to going to press. Each article is also edited for grammar and (most importantly) style, to make sure that readers who are not very knowledgeable about the subject area can still benefit from every article.

One of the other main goals of PROCEEDINGS is to act as a bridge between the SWBC hobby and our sister hobbies of MW DXing and amateur radio. We seem to be accomplishing that goal, as well. We have an increasing number of readers in those two hobbies. Further, in the 1991 edition, we had two of the very best of the amateur community join the ranks of authors. Bob Eldridge, VE7BS, wrote the finest Beverage antenna article since the one by Dr. Beverage in the 1920's. Bill Tippet, W0ZV, wrote the clearest most concise explanation of Long Path and Bent Path propagation ever published, in my opinion. (That stuff applies to Tropical Bands, fellas!!!!)

All of us involved with PROCEEDINGS wish that we could make these super articles available through the club bulletins but we cannot. The articles are just too long. Although the price, \$20 for 300 pages worth of material, is a superb bargain, we wish we could offer PROCEEDINGS at a lower price. Unfortunately, costs are such that it is just a break-even operation, now. If you would like more information on what is in the 1991 or earlier (still available) Editions, just drop me a SASE at the masthead address.

Asian Destinations

This month we zero in on the Islamic Republic of Iran. Ancient and exotic Persia, this country is quietly becoming a power in today's middle east politics, a bystander benefactor of Iraq's defeat in the gulf war and the fall of the Soviet Union.

With these dramatic new events, Iran is now turning their attention to other priorities. They have accelerated the pace of their arms purchases by inking major deals for Soviet aircraft & submarines. One deal even includes the establishment of a MiG factory in Iran. The Soviets are desperate to sell military hardware and Iran is ready to buy.

Internal Iranian information "leaked" to the media recently describes a plan formulated by Iran to annex Shiite-majority Azerbaijan. Based on not only religious motives, but economic ones as well, since Azerbaijan is oil-rich (See the January ASIAN-DESTINATIONS column). Iran also continues to support Shiite rebels in southern Iraq and Kurd rebels in northern Iraq as well as Shiites in Turkmenistan.

This creates quite a dilemma for the Soviets: by generating the much needed business for it's arms industry, it is also jeopardizing the stability of Turkmenistan and one of it's most unstable former states - Azerbaijan. Iran has the converse of this dilemma: how to continue to benefit from the CIS's military deals while covertly encouraging revolt across the border.

Propaganda is part of Iran's plan - leaflets and radio are the weapons. Iran has recently made some substantial upgrades to their radio and TV operations. New shortwave outlets are planned in Mashhad, Zahedan, Awhaz, and possibly Sirjan (Sa'idabad). Several new 500 kw shortwave transmitters have been ordered for installation, with some units now operational. The new locations create a "ring" of coverage around the country. Awhaz in the southwest of the country currently has only 1 medium wave outlet, and no FM. Mashhad,

in the northeast, has an established MW & FM network. Zahedan, in the southeast, has 2 mediumwave outlets and no FM. Sirjan has 1 mediumwaver and no FM.

There was a report in November from Alok Dasgupta in Australian DX News that Radio Zahedan was heard on 11930 at 1530-1630 with local programming in Urdu. I've seen nothing in print since this initial report.

Iran's Voice of the Islamic Republic of Iran is not difficult to catch on shortwave. 15084 kHz is a long time outlet that can be heard at several different times of the day. On rare occasions in the past some English has been heard on this frequency, but most likely you will not hear English. VOIRI's English service is now much easier to hear thanks to a fairly new release time of 0030-0130 UTC. Check 9022, 9720 and 15260 kHz. I find that 9022 is in the clear. Other English broadcasts are scheduled for 1130-1230 on 7215, 9525, 9685, 11930 and 11790 kHz; and at 1930-2030 on 6030, 9022, 15260 kHz. I used to try for the 1930 broadcast as a real DX target here in the central US on 9022 kHz.

If you want to try for some real tropical band DX from Iran then look for a relay of Tehran's home service on 3779 kHz at 1430 UTC sign-on. The time and frequency combination makes this one very difficult in North America., but it has been logged on rare occasions in the last 10 years. I haven't seen any reports for it recently, however.

The most interesting part of the shortwave scene in Iran is not the legitimate VOIRI activity, but the clandestine broadcasts that are both directed at Iran and originating from Iran. There are several outlets, running the gamut from rogue fly-by-night operations to well funded and government supported organizations. It is difficult to keep up with the latest in this area, so I've turned to Gerry Dexter and Hans Johnson, both experts in clandestine activity. Thanks!

Clandestines broadcasting from Iran

Voice of the People of Kurdistan. This is a station of the Patriotic Union of Kurdistan (PUK) headed by Jalal Talabani, which is the second largest group in the Kurdistan Front. ID as "Air dangi Gelli Kurdistan". Try 0400 on 7085v. Active since fall '88.

Voice of Rebellious Iraq. Station of the Supreme Assembly of the Islamic Revolution of Iraq. Started during the Shiite uprising in southern Iraq in March 1990 and claimed to operate from Basra. ID "Sowt al-Iraq ath-thair", at 0430 on 6330 kHz.

Voice of the Palestinian Islamic Revolution. Little known Iranian backed station rejecting current peace negotiations. Try for it at 1900 on 9610 kHz, ID "Sowt al-thawra al-filistinia al-islamia".

Voice of Iraqi Kurdistan. Possibly not originating from Iran. Run by the Kurdish Democratic Party headed by Massoud Barzani, who is also the head of a coalition of Kurdish groups known as the Kurdistan Front. ID "Air dangi Kurdistan Iraqa" at 0430 on 6295 kHz. Active off and on since 1965.

Clandestines directed at Iran

Voice of Iranian Kurdistan. Iraqi backed Iranian Kurdish Democratic Party station. ID "Air dangi Kurdistan Irana", at 0315 on 4065 kHz. Listen for 5 min. flute-type interval signal.

Voice of the Mojahed. Station of the Iraqi backed Mujahideen e-Khalq who are the best armed Iranian opposition group with their tank-equipped National Liberation Army which is based in Iraq. Try for them at 0230

on 5070 kHz, variable to avoid jamming. ID "Seda'ye Mojahed".

Radio Liberty of Iran. Via Egypt. This is the new name of what used to be called Radio Iran, the pro-Bakhtiar ex prime minister of Iran who was assassinated last year in Paris. Try 0230 on 9400 kHz or 0100-0300 on 15650 kHz, ID "Radio Azadi Iran".

Iran's Flag of Freedom. Egyptian backed group wanting a return to the monarchy in Iran. 0330 on 11470, 9250 and 9045 kHz. English IDs.

Most of these stations have been heard in North America.

KAZAKHSTAN. Last year in this column we discussed the central Asian Soviet republics and surmised that we might see some new shortwave stations or services appear from this area. While on a business trip to France in March I was able to listen to Radio Alma Ata with a very interesting, and fairly new, English service on shortwave.

The broadcast was filled with revelations of past crimes of the old rulers in Moscow. One report was very interesting, giving details of how Japanese POWs in WWII were secretly held in Kazakhstan. These details were supposedly kept secret until now.

There was a real "local" flavor to the program and the announcers were very friendly, asking for reports several times. I heard them on 5035, 5260 and 5960 kHz at 2100-2200 UTC (a bit early for North America). But look around, you may find a new time and frequency for this English service.

NASWA Portraits

HELP!! S.O.S.!! If you have put off writing to "PORTRAITS" NOW IS THE TIME to do it! I have but one profile left here, that of Dr. Cones and that's it! If possible, include a photo, but send us your story NOW!

This month we travel to one of the "prairie states". . . Kansas . . . and the home of Richard E. Hankison. A note accompanied Richards' profile and, because of the interesting content, I will incorporate parts of it into the this portrait.

"It was the late sixties and the world was getting smaller at a rapid pace. Satellite communications linked us with far-away places as they gave us live pictures of events in Europe and a daily dose of Vietnam. I was a high school sophomore living in New Jersey. I had a passion for science and history, so shortwave seemed like a natural. But my first exposure to radio was amateur radio, being fascinated by a friends Hallicrafters rig, his shack and a rotational beam in the back yard. The equipment probably belonged to Freds' dad but, at the time, that did not occur to me. Fred was a ham and I listened as he talked to people all over the place."

"So was my introduction to radio. Only one thing held me back from a lifetime of ham radio, the fact that I had nothing to say. The rag-chewing wasn't all that appealing to me. [amen - ed.] What appealed was the concept of long distance communication, the theory rather than content."

"I am not one of those people who remembers their first contact on shortwave. I do remember building a small Heathkit and stringing wire up in the attic. Viola, I was hooked. I was 'Dr. DX', listening in my room till 3:00 A.M., when my peers were sneaking out of their rooms for rendezvous downtown. I upgraded my shack with two more kits and strung a lot more wire before graduating from college. The Heathkits found there way to garage sales and the QSLs were lost somewhere between New Jersey and Los Angeles. What a loss!!" [yep - ed.]

"After fifteen years and many miles I returned to shortwave as suddenly as I left it. In January of 1989, it called, and I went out and bought a used Yeasu FRG-7700. Again, I have upgraded to a Kenwood R-5000 and I am back in a big way. I am still a DXer, and despite the fact that Kansas is a poorer listening post than New Jersey, I have managed to eclipse my previous totals. Now I am content and am amazed at the changes since the late sixties. Never mind the equipment, which is clearly superior these days [in some ways - ed.] but the program content is wonderful. Gone are the days of constant political rhetoric. There is travel, culture and relatively unbiased news and, of course, if you are into socio and political bashing there is still P'yongyang and Havana. Some things never change."

"I am bullish on shortwave, and really take exception to people who think shortwave is dead. Sure, Communism seems to be dead, and there does seem to be better alternatives in digital technology, but there is a bigger enemy in the world than Communism. It is called ignorance. And while digital technology is superior to shortwave, where are all those small, regional broadcasters going to find the bucks to invest in all that nice new equipment? No, I say that shortwave radio will be with us for quite a while. It is unfortunate that KOL Israel and RCI have cut back, but there will always be strange and mysterious signals from Africa and the Pacific."

"And so I have come full circle and then some. At age 38, shortwave is a major part of my recreational life, from DX to easy listening. It fulfills my childhood passions which, interestingly enough, have come full circle too. As we begin the '90s, I look forward to aging gracefully with my radio at my side, listening to the world grow smaller and smaller."

Thanks Richard. I could almost sign my name to that story . . . the similarities are amazing. The shortwave bug must have been very active in January of 1989.

I'm sure there are other very interesting stories out there. Let's hear from you!

ALBANIA - Financial problems of Albania's infant democratic regime have caused more cutbacks at R. Tirana. The old fanfare IS has been replaced by a folk melody for guitars. The current sked had not been fully traced as of early March. (RNMN 2/6) From 3/1 R. Tirana changed its sked. So far it has been traced at 2130-2200 in FF on 7260 & 1395 kHz, and at 2200-2230 in EE on 1395 kHz. (WBI 3/6) **English** broadcasts are announced as 0230-0300 & 0330-0400 on 9580 & 11825 kHz; 1430-1500 on 7155 & 9760 kHz; and 2200-2230 on 1395, 9760, 9580 kHz. (WBI 3/13)

R. Tirana has drastically cut its sked. A Media Network investigator is being sent to the scene. It seems the only way to keep the station going will be to use foreign sponsorship. At least three well-known int'l broadcasters have expressed interest in hiring the MW freq of 1395 kHz. (JM on RNMN 3/19) Noted with a clear signal on 3/21 on 11820 at 0230-0300 & 0330-0400; unable to find // 31 meter frequency, if any, but apparently no longer 9580. (John Norfolk, OK)

ALGERIA - *Radio Algiers International Service*: (frequencies marked 'a' are announced, but unconfirmed) 1700-1800 **English** to Af on 9535a, 17745; 1703-1800 AA (V. Palestine) to ME on 6145, 6160, 7145, 11715, 15205, 15215; 1800-1900 AA to ME on 7145, 11715, 15205, 15215; 1800-1900 SS to Eu/ME on 9640, 15215; 1900-2000 AA to Eu/ME on 7145, 11715, 15205; 2000-2100 **English** to Af on 11715; 2100-2300 FF (unconfirmed) to Af (no freqs given); 2200-2300 SS (V. of Free Sahara) to Af on 9640, 15215; 2300-2400 SS to Am on 9640, 15215. (WBI 2/28)

AUSTRALIA - The French firm of Thomson-CSF has won a contract for two 250-kw xmtrs for *Radio Australia* at Darwin. The contract is worth A\$4.75M, and will bring to five the number of xmtrs at Darwin. ASEA-Brown-Boveri has been awarded a contract for A\$500K to expand the antenna switching matrix and upgrade the computer control equipment. The whole Darwin project will cost A\$5.75M, and should be ready by 12/93. (Mike Bird on RNMN 1/20)

I see annoying references in DX newsletters as to reception and QSL's from "VL8A", "VL8T", "VL8K". This is incorrect, as these are merely callsigns allotted by Dept. of Transport and Communications to the designated transmitters. Reception should more correctly indicate the particular "studio" originating programme material, and the corresponding QSL should be similarly indicated - eg: ABC, Central Australian Aboriginal Media Association (CAAMA), Top End Radio, etc. (Bob Padula, Australia) Rather than incorrect, it would seem to me more to be a manifestation of the concept that a "station" is a transmitter, or grouping of transmitters, at a site, and that a new program does not make a new station. [df]

AUSTRIA - *R. Austria International* reorganized its EE program sked on 3/1. New times for Austrian Shortwave Panorama are: Sundays, 1030, 1130, 1330 and 1530; Mondays, 0330 and 0630. Only one freq change was made 3/1: the 1100-1400 transmission to the Far East was moved from 25m to 17730 kHz. (David Hermges, ASWP 3/1) For Z92, Austrian Radio plans the use of 17730, ex 11780, for its 1100-1400 service to the Far East. Parallel 15450 remains. Station now makes very few seasonal frequency changes, unlike other major European broadcasters! (Bob Padula)

BANGLADESH - *R. Bangladesh* heard on new 11705, from 1815 in **English** to 1900*; good 3/12, // not traced. (Ernie Behr, Kenora, Ontario)

BELGIUM - *BRT International*, from 3/29: 0500-0600 on 5910 to Eur, 17545 to Afr; 0600-0730 5910 Eur, 11695 Eur/Aus/As; 0730-0900 Mo-Sa 9906, 11695, 13675 to Eur; 0730-1130 Su

on 9905, 13675 to Eur, 21815 to Afr; 0900-1200 Mo-Sa on 9905 & 13675 to Eur; 1000-1200 Mo-Sa on 21815 to Afr; 1200-1500 Mo-Sa & 11-123- Sun on 21810 to SEA & 17555 to NA. 1230-1600 Su on 9905 & 13710 to Eur, 21815 to Afr; 1400-1600 Mo-Sa on 9905 to Eur; 1600-1800 on 9905 to Eur, 21815 to Afr; 1800-2100 on 9905 to Eur, 17550 to Afr. 2000-2130 Mo-Sa, 2030-2100 Su on 5910 & 9906 to Eur. 2130-0030 on 9930 to NA, 13655 to SA. BHUTAN - (see Feb LN) Believe a lot more monitoring is needed before it can be said *Bhutan Broadcasting Service* has changed its schedule. Thursday, 2/27, 1430-1445 heard local ID (The English Service of the BS), into N Radio w/"Scope" program on world health matters. Tuesday, 2/25, 1430 seemed to be a local interview till 1438, then local ID. In the past noted UN program "Perspective" on 11/7 and "Scope" on 11/28, both Thursday. Also noted 2/11 on 5025.3 & 2/21 on 5025.4; all other days on 5025.0 kHz. (Ron Howard, Carmel, CA)

BOLIVIA - *R. Frontera*, Cobija, listed on 4450 kHz is actually on 4449.9 kHz and IDs as "Frontera la Radio." (Henrik Klemetz [HK], traveling in Latin America/DXPL 2/7)

Radiodifusora Tropico, location and time not given, on 4552.6 kHz (HK/DXPL 2/7) [Not clear if this is La Voz del Tropico, Villa Tunari, ex 4435 kHz, or Radio El Tropico, Trinidad, ex 3405 kHz, or new--mf]

BOUGAINVILLE - *Radio Republic of Free Bougainville* has QSL'd promptly via Australia with a full data QSL letter signed by Sam Voron, VK2BVS. Radio RFB has provided only an irregular service since 2/13 due to shortage of fuel for its generator. VK2BVS' phone is (61) 2-4171-066. The reply also included a copy of the memorandum between the Bougainville interim government and the International Amateur Radio Network on the operation of the station. The mailing address of the interim government (complete with all mod. cons.) is P.O. Box 120, Arawa, Republic of Bougainville. The fax number is 97-1102. The telex number is 95-828. The telephones are 97-1101 and 97-1103. The reception report was sent via the Humanitarian Aid Coordinator in the Solomon Islands. (Nobuaki Takahashi on RJDXC 3/1) *RFB* is on 3880 kHz, apparently regular again, at 0800-1110 and as late as 1150; heard in New Zealand with fair signals. AC has had a QSL from VK2BVS. RFB has added an English newscast at 1000 daily; it said in a recent broadcast that RFB has received over 90 letters from listeners abroad. (AC on RNMN 3/12; repeated in part on RNZI 3/15)

CAMBODIA - *Voice of the Great National Union Front*, formed from a merger of the Khmer Rouge's Voice of Democratic Kampuchea and the Voice of the National Army of Democratic Kampuchea, switched from 5408 to 5200 kHz in mid-February. Sked is 0800-1000, 1200-1500, 2330-0200, in Cambodian. (WBI 2/28)

Voice of the People of Cambodia HS is heard on 918, 4985v, 6090 kHz. 9695 kHz, used by the FS, is inactive. (Hiroshi Fujita, via ADXN)

Voice of the Khmer (Cambodian: "Samleang Khmer") (Clandestine) operates 0200-0300, 0400-0700, 0900-1400 & 2330-0200 on 6325 kHz, and 1250(unconfirmed). (WBI 2/28)

CANADA - When the Ontario DX Assn. took over the QSLing duties at *CFRX*, Toronto, 6005 kHz, it sponsored a special Winter Equinox [? df] Test 12/21-12/23, which was promoted on Media Network. According to a QSL from Stephen Canney of the ODXA, for a February reception report to *CFRX*, the certificates for the Equinox test QSLs had not come back from the printer as of 2/26. (Mike Fern--CA)

CFVP, Calgary, 6030, much better sig since 3/6, from 1200 pop songs & "AM-106" IDs till VOA s/on; news at 1226, 1256, etc; strong & clear daily. (Ernie Behr, Kenora, Ontario)

CHINA - China's first provincial-level English service radio station was to go into official operation 2/28 in Guangzhou, capital of Guangdong Province, in south China. The service will feature news, economic reports and coverage on science & technology, culture, education & tourism, as well as information services for foreigners living & travelling in the province. English programs will be aired 13 hours daily. (Xinhua news agency, 2/19, via WBI 2/28) Test broadcasts of the *Radio Guangdong* English service were noted on 603 kHz, from 0330-0500 on 2/20. The same 5 minute newscast was aired at 0330, 0400, 0430 & 0455. (Monitoring Research, WBI 2/28) A Canton station executive said xmtrs to serve Hong Kong and Macau will be added by August. Shortwave xmtrs to serve Southeast Asia are also planned. Chinese-language lessons for visitors are planned. Many Chinese students have written or phoned R. Guangdong about the service because they want to learn English. English-speaking business travelers outnumber tourists in South China. (Reuter on DXPL 2/22)

R. Beijing has a new language, Hungarian, to Europe at *2030 on 6933 kHz. (Alex Wellner in ADXN)

The Chinese have announced that this year they will not be having summer time, which is a change from policy in the recent past. (Andy Sennitt on RNMN 3/19)

COLOMBIA - *La Voz del Guainia*, Inirida, 3500 kHz, heard closing at 0100. *R. Macarena*, Villavicencio, 5975 kHz, now closes at 2300 to avoid international b/c QRM. (HK/DXPL 2/7)

COSTA RICA - *Adventist World Radio Latin America* was heard in Japan on 9725 kHz with fair signals from 1200-1300 2/9. The morning sked includes EE from 1100-1300 and SS after 1300. (Nobuaki Takahashi on RJDXC 2/22)

R. Casino, Puerto Limon, 5953.4 kHz, heard at 1219 in Quito with program in SS from Voice of America. (HK/DXPL 2/7) Usually the last distant signal to fade out in the morning in Quito. (RMV/DXPL 2/7)

CROATIA - *Studio Zagreb*, Zagreb, is being heard at night in Europe with a new weak signal on 4990 kHz // 1134, 1557, 7240 and 9830 kHz (Dave Kernick, BDXC 2/92, via DXPL 2/23). *Zagreb Radio*, 21480, Croatian 0700-0800, parallel 9830, unheard on scheduled 7240. Puzzling, unsure as to whether an intended operation or harmonic. Zagreb listed ITU D91 on 7160 with 10 kW, but not at this time period. 21480 is 3 x 7160. 20 March. Heard with English 2203-2210, then into Croatian, 9830, as 3/14; this will probably shift to 2102-2110 during Summer Time. (Bob Padula) *Croatian Radio* has announced a news bulletin in Croat for North America at 2100 on 17272 kHz [sic] (Tony Rogers, BDXC 2/92, via DXPL 2/23)

CUBA - *Radio Habana Cuba* is planning test transmissions on 25800 kHz with 5 kw SSB. The tests are scheduled on weekends in May, to mark RHC's 31st birthday. Transmissions at 2000-2100 // 17705 with EE for Europe are certain; also possible are xmsns at 2200-2300 // 9620 kHz. with EE for the Caribbean. A special QSL card is being offered. (Arnie Coro and JM on RNMN 3/19) To avoid QRM from the Ukraine, RHC has moved its EE xmsn to NA to 11970 kHz. from 0000-0500. (JM on RNMN 3/19)

CZECHOSLOVAKIA - *R. Prague Int'l* has English (till 5/3) at 0000-0027 on 7345a, 9540b, 11990c; 0100-0130 on 5930c; 0300-0330 on 7345a; 0400-0430 (freq omitted); 0730-0800 on 17725a, 21705c; 1800-1827# on 5930c, 6055a, 7345b, 9605c; 1930-1957# on 6055a, 7345b; 2100-2130# on 5930c; 2200-2225# on 6055a, 7345b, 9605c. # = 1 hour earlier during Euro-summer time. Transmitter sites: a=Litomysl; b=Velke Kostolany; c=Rimavska Sobota. (Mike Ogrizek in ADXN) *RPI* may be expanding shortly, even though they are on a tight budget. On 3/29 transmissions to Europe shift one hour earlier, to 1700, 1830, 2000 & 2100, but remain on the same frequencies till early May. Times for the *DX Special* to NA, as monitored in mid-march: GMT Thursday at 0015 on 7345, 9540, 11990; Thursday 0315 & GMT Sunday 0110 & 0410 on 5930, 7345 & 9540. (John Norfolk, OK)

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC - *Radio Clarin* is back on 9950, hrd 3/27 from 0200 w/merengue music & SS IDs, past 0400; powerhouse signal; also heard 3/10, from 0200. (Ernie Behr)

R. Clarin, Santo Domingo, has reappeared on 9950 kHz; heard in Germany between 0200-0230 3/6. (Martin Elbe via DX Window and Andy Sennitt on RNMN 3/19)

ECUADOR - *Ecos del Oriente*, Lago Agrio, 3270 kHz, has been back on since 2/8; heard at 0118 with "Monje Mechor", Mechor the Monk, a Peruvian male Abby Landers. Usually excellent signals in Quito. (RMV/QLB/DXPL 2/22)

La Voz del Upano, Macas, has a fourth channel operating on 5020 kHz; did final testing // 5040 but is now separate. Also heard on 4762 kHz at 0128 with light vocals until signoff at 0305. Signals were loud but modulation was very distorted; also at 1205 the following day; both times // 5020 kHz. (RMV/QLB/DXPL 2/22)

La Voz de Saquisili Radio Libertador, Saquisili, 4900 kHz, was reactivated 1/23; heard in Quito at 1158 promoting famous Saquisili Market every Thursday; said power would go off in seven minutes, and it did. (RMV/QLB/DXPL 2/22)

Emisoras Gran Colombia, Quito, 4911 kHz, is apparently on the air. The manager, Grace Ceballos de Reyes, told Henrik Klemetz that it is only on SW from 1700-1930, and from 1400-2000 Sun (12n-2:30pm and 9am-3pm local time). Most tropical band stations use SW in the early morning and evening, staying silent when the band is out. Sra. Ceballos de Reyes said an evening program is planned to begin on 2/1 called "Sol de Media Noche" (the sun at midnight)

from 0400-0500. RMV checked at midday in early March but heard nothing. (HK/RMV/DXPL 2/7)

La Voz del Upano, Macas, has a spurious signal on 4505.3v kHz // 5020 kHz (HK/DXPL 2/7)

R. Catolica Nacional, Santo Domingo de los Colorados, has purchased the studios and AM and SW licenses of **R. Zaracay**. Station manager Juan Siquenza told Henrik Klemetz that **R. Catolica** is building a network of stations across Ecuador, hoping to model it after the COPE church network in Spain. **R. Zaracay** remains on FM. (HK/DXPL 2/7)

R. Jesus del Gran Poder, Quito, 5050 kHz, is silent Sundays, but its sked is otherwise unchanged. (HK/DXPL 2/7) [WRTH 92 says 0945-1500, 2300-0100--mf]

HCJB, 15140 kHz, carries **Cadena Nacional de Radio y Television** in SS from 0130-0200, formerly **Radio Nacional del Ecuador**. Reception was fair. **HCJB's** own SS programs can be heard from 0200-0505. (Nobuyoshi Aoi on RDXC 3/15) [This doesn't check out in CA. Tues 3/17 and Wed 3/18 were both **HCJB's** own programming, news in SS at 0130 and music or features until 0200. **R. Nacional** might be weekend-only.--mf]

EGYPT - From 3/1 **R. Cairo** added a new AA svc to Australia at 0900-1000 on 15435. The old svc at 2000-2100 is dropped. Also from 3/1 9926.5 kHz has been changed to 9770 for the 0350-0700 General Program in AA for NAF/Eur. Persian is retimed to 1330-1530 (ex 1745-1945) on 11560. (Bob Padula in ADXN 3/92)

EL SALVADOR - **R. Venceremos** anncd 2/20 it would increase power in an effort to cover most of El Salvador & beyond the border. It plans to broadcast 0000-0400, and 1200-1500. (WBI 2/28) The station ancd it is broadcasting "from Perquin", in northeastern Morazan Department. (WBI 3/6)

FRANCE - The English program of **Radio France International** is now IDing as "RFI World Service." An interview with RFI's director-general was scheduled for Sunday, 3/1. He was to answer questions about RFI's future sent in by listeners. (Larry Nebron, US, on RNMN 2/20)

GEORGIA - **Radio Georgia's** external service from Tbilisi was heard briefly and with poor reception signing on in EE at 0600 on 2/21 on 11803.23 kHz. (WBI 2/28) **Georgian Radio** has resumed broadcasting in English. It was heard in Japan from 1900-2000 on 7160 kHz. Reception was poor because of QRM from RFI Gabon. The format included 15-min programs in EE and RR, each repeated twice. The EE schedule [sic] as broadcast was: 0300-0400 on 6180 kHz; 0600-0700 on 11850 kHz; 1700-1800 on 9825 kHz; 1900-2200 on 6180 and 7160 kHz. These skeds may include errors, since reception was very poor. **Georgian Radio** had been silent from October until Feb. (Radio Moscow WS Russian DX Program, Shigenori Aoki and Yoshinori Kato on RDXC 3/8)

The **Georgian Radio** External Svc heard again since 3/3, after several months' absence; on 11805.3, from *0500 IS & RR, 0532 **English** & NA to 0604*v; on 11900.3 from *1957 in RR, 2030 **English** till 2100*v, both very strong 3/6, but badly distorted audio. IDs as **R. Stantsiya Gruzia** & "Georgian Radio". (Ernie Behr, Kenora, Ontario)

GERMANY - **Armed Forces Network Munich** closed 2/14, earlier than expected, as part of the U.S. troop withdrawal from Germany. Other AFN stations in Bavaria remain for now. (RNMN 2/20)

Deutsche Welle changes from 3/1: 2100-2150 EE on 13780 via Julich, ex 6185; 2200-2400 GG on 11795 via Russia, ex 7340; 1000-1400 GG on 15560 via Russia, ex 7340, and 21640 via Trincomalee, ex 15350. (Bob Padula in ADXN 3/92)

GUAM - Programming source for **DX-Asiawaves** is the ARDXC, on a contractual arrangement with **AWR-Asia**. For Z91, programme will be heard 0215 Sundays 13720, 1615 Saturdays 11980, 1815 Sundays 13720, 2330 Saturdays 15610. Special ARDXC full details QSLs are available direct from ARDXC, Box 227, Box Hill, Victoria 3128, Australia. Two IRCs for airmail reply. Cards are large, multicolored, glossy, showing Australian fauna and flora. Reports are mainly received from Europe, for either the 1615 or 1815 shows, where reception is excellent. (Bob Padula)

Effective 3/29, **KTWR** plans introduction of Korean programming: 2330-0000 Thursdays 11580, 1300-1315 Fridays 11700, 1145-1200 daily 11805. Also new is a segment in "Russian Dialects", 1600-1645 daily, 9785. The daily service to Africa, in "African Languages" continues on 11650, 1945-2100. Per engineering sked from **KTWR**. (Bob Padula)

HONDURAS - *Radio Luz y Vida*, HRPC, 3250 kHz, San Luis, has added more English programming to its sked and is looking for an international audience and reception reports. An International Friendship Program in EE began 3/1 at 0330 Sun and Mon UTC (Saturday and Sunday target dates). HRPC has a new QSL card. Return postage is not required but is appreciated. A new bi-lingual program "America Sings," at 0315-0345 Tues-Sat, began 2/10. Announcements are in SS but all songs have EE lyrics. Time of a release on Sun UTC had not been decided. HRPC's sked is 1100-0400 on 1600 kHz MW and 1100-1600, 2200-0400 on 3250 kHz. The address is: Radio Luz y Vida, Apartado 303, San Pedro Sula, Honduras. Fax mail may be sent to (504) 57-0394. INDONESIA - *RRI Palangkaraya* increased power from 10 kw to 50 kw on 3325 kHz in 10/91. The current sked is 2200-0100 and 0900-1300. RRI Palembang now has EE from 1000-1025 on 4855v kHz and 1287 kHz MW. (Aboy Nawan Thiriat, Indonesia, in OZ-DX via DXPL 3/15)

IRAQ - An Iraqi jammer has appeared on 9985 kHz. It is so strong in Europe that WCSN/WSHB have given up the channel and moved to 13770 and 15665 kHz between 2000-2400. The jammer's target is so far unknown. (Hugh Rees, Madrid, on RNMM 2/20)

R. Iraq International, Baghdad, heard at 2317 on 11830 kHz in EE to NA; also announced 15455 kHz to South America; good signals in February. (Wojtech Zaremba, Poland, on DXPL 3/7)

R. Baghdad Int'l carries EE to SAs & the Pacific at 0100-0105 on 15150 kHz. It is asking for reports to Box 8145, Baghdad. (AC on RNZI 3/15)

ISRAEL - The *Voice of Israel* has announced that the Israel B/C Authority will drastically curtail radio and TV broadcasts starting in March, since no solution has been found for the budget vs. usage fee problem. The management decided that as from 3/1, regular Hebrew and Arabic [TV] Service broadcasts will be stopped. These broadcasts will be replaced by slides, background music, and news headlines every hour. The Voice of Israel broadcasts on Network A, The Voice of Music, the Immigrants' Network, and the safety wavelengths in the north, providing drivers with traffic information and music, and overseas broadcasts will also stop. Networks B, C and D will continue to operate on a reduced basis. These networks will broadcast only news and music, and will be operated by IBA employees only. (David Hergmes on ASWP 3/1; emphasis added by DH) [That's one way to put pressure on the Knesset.--mf]

Kol Israel is back on SW as of 3/11 but with a very limited sked. Heard in CA from 0515-0605 on 11588 kHz, first noticed on 9435 from 0515-0518 or so; 0515-0530 in French, 0530-0605 news in Hebrew, including correspondents' reports before 0600, mixed with blocks of commercials. Left air in mid-sentence at 0606. WRTH 92 says Hebrew home service and French were on different 25m freqs before the budget crisis. Jerusalem Post of 3/7 carried the same sked as in 2/92, "until March 1992," probably caught short by the ministerial failure; its stories show TV that week was not cut as drastically as foreign press reports claimed. (Mike Fern--CA)

ITALY - *European Christian Radio*, Ravenna, 6210 kHz, heard from 0700-0717 in English; ID and interval signal at 0717 preceded change of language. (Gregory Dober, PA, on DXPL 3/7)

The *Voice of Europe*, Pordenone, heard on 13666 kHz, in Italian; short EE announcements heard around 1900. (AC on RNMM 3/12)

JAPAN - *Radio Japan* announced the following frequency changes effective 3/1: General Service: To Oceania at 0500-0900 on new 17860, ex 17890; to North America at 1200-1930 on new 11865, ex 9505; at 1800-1930 on new 17825, ex 11685; to Asia at 1300-1400 on new 9580, ex 6185; to the Middle East via the Ekala relay at 1700-1900 on new 15210, ex 15345; Regional Service to Oceania, in English on new 17860 kHz, ex 17890. (RJDXC 2/23)

A survey team from *NIK*, led by Yasushi Takeuchi, director-general of its international broadcasting department, visited the Soviet Ministry of Communications and the BBC in 9/91 and 10/91. The goal was to improve Radio Japan's signals in Europe, including the CIS and Eastern Europe. RJ and BBC have agreed on a program of relay broadcasts to Europe from the BBC site at Skelton, up to ten hours daily, five hours each in the morning and evening, starting in 7/92. Programs will be in GG, RR, JJ and EE. (Radio Japan News on ASWP 3/1)

KAZAKHSTAN - *R. Alma Ata* has EE from 0030-0100 and 1630-1700 on 900 kHz MW, 5915 and 6135 kHz. It is also on the air in EE from 1930-2000 and 2130-2200 on 3955, 5035, 5260, 5960, 5970, 9505, 11825, 15215, 15250, 15270, 15285, 15315, 15360, 15385, 17605, 17715, 17730, 17765 and 21490 kHz. The 1930 xmsn was added in 1992. The xmtrs used at

1930 and 2130 are thought to be former jammers. (Yoshinori Kato and Shigenori Kato on RJDXC 3/15)

KOREA (North) - North Korea began clandestine b/cs to South Korea in 1967, 2 hours daily on 760 kHz MW and 5210 kHz SW. The station claimed to be the voice of a South Korean underground organization, The Voice of the Democratic People's Federation for the Liberation of South Korea. On Aug. 15, 1969, the station announced that an underground political organization called the Revolutionary Party for Reunification had been set up in Seoul. On Jan. 15, 1970, the station took the name "The Voice of the Revolutionary Party for Reunification." On March 1, 1973, it began broadcasting six hours a day. On June 1, 1973 it began a 30-min xmsn in EE. In 1975 broadcasts expanded to 12 1/2 hours a day. In 1976 the MW xmtr increased power to 1500 kw. The station's interval signal, "Song of Dear Leader Comrade" is now used by Pyongyang FM B/c Station. On July 27, 1985, the Revolutionary Party for Reunification changed its name to the National Democratic Front of South Korea. On Aug. 8, the station was renamed "Voice of Nation Saving". A week later, North Korea began a second clandestine broadcast called "Echo of the Masses", pretending to broadcast from Seoul. A three-hour daily broadcast was later increased to nine hours. In early July 1989 it was confirmed that this station had been merged into the organization of the "Voice of Nation Saving," probably because of a change in DPRK policy toward South Korea.

The Echo of the Masses opened its transmission with a folk song, "Arirang," and a children's song, "O Bright Moon." The "Voice of Nation Saving" increased its output to 16 hours a day after the merger. It now broadcasts on 1053 kHz MW and 3480, 4400, 4450, 4557 kHz from 2000-1000, 0300-0700 [sic], and 1000-1700 UTC. It is also on 4120 kHz from 1000-1700 and on 6010 kHz from 1000-1400. Except for the 0300-1000 b/c in EE [sic], it's all in Korean. 4120 kHz shares a transmitter with KCBS on 9665 kHz. 6010 kHz shares with the Pyongyang B/c station on 6250 kHz. The "Voice of Nation Saving" also shares facilities with North Korea's External Service; on occasion it broadcasts R. Pyongyang by mistake.

DXers have repeatedly pointed out that the name "Voice of Nation Saving" is not good EE usage, and should be "The Voice of National Salvation." In November 1990 it was confirmed that the station had changed its name to this proper form. Its a South Korean children's song, "Spring of Home Country." (The ID sounds like "Kobugye Sodon Pangsong imnida" or "Kobugye Pa-re Pangsong imnida" with a very spooky low-pitched gong or bass drum.--mf) (Tooru Yamashita on RJDXC 2/23)

Voice of National Salvation, 6009.85, from 1300 Korean talk & brief music to 1400*; strong 3/4, but other days under noise jammer. Numbers station on 5869.2v, from *1400 IS & long anthem, 1407 numbers by woman to 1422*v, fair 3/12; same IS as R. Pyongyang, but different anthem; 5 digit numbers sounded EE w/heavy accent; not sure if this station has a name; heard them on the same frequency in 1988. (Ernie Behr, Kenora, Ontario)

Pyongyang KCBS, 2850 kHz, heard with weak signals on its 2nd harmonic of 5700 kHz from 1240-1250 3/11. (Mike Fern--CA)

KUWAIT - R. Kuwait returned to SW on 2/17 in AA only, and puts a good signal into Eur at 1900 on 15505 KHz. (RNMN 2/20) It was due to begin English broadcasts on its national day, 2/25; as of 2/27, nothing had been heard in EE; 15505 kHz continues to carry Arabic. (JM on RNMN 2/27). Heard on 11990 from 1400 in AA to 1745*, and on 15505 in AA at *1758-2313*v; very strong since 2/19. (Ernie Behr, Kenora, Ontario)

LAOS - *Lao National Radio* Foreign Svc observed only on 1030 kHz. The sw outlet is ancd, but presumably inactive since 1990. They announce EE at 0600 & 1300. *Lao National Radio*, Luang Prabang, is active on 705 & 7164 (ancd as 7000) kHz at 2225-0130, 0355-0600, 1025-1400. Has local nx 2330, 0530, 1130; national news relay at 0000, 0500, 1200; px in Hmong 2230 & 1330; in Khmu at 2300 & 1300. Every px is 30 minutes. ID is "Thini sathani withayu kachaisiang khueng Luang Prabang". *Lao National Radio*, Savannakhet, is on 1430 at 2225-0100, 0425-0600, 1025-1400; no sw ancd. *LNR, Xieng Khouang*, on 4991, is currently inactive. *Vientiane Capital Radio* is noted only on 1190, no SW ancd; was probably discontinued. Anncs 0030-1200, but actually irregular. (Hiroshi Fujita on a trip to Laos & Thailand, in ADXN 3/92)

LATVIA - R. Riga, 5935 kHz, heard 0510-0540 2/22 because WWCR2 was silent. Weak to fair signals, woman reading news, pop and light music, ID in Latvian and possibly EE at 0530, left air at 0540. (Mike Fern--CA)

Lithuania - R. Vilnius announced the week of 2/17 that plans for the spring would be announced late in February. As of 2/19 it had no ideas which xmtrs or freqs would be available

after 3/1 because of huge increases in xmtr rentals imposed by their Russian and Ukrainian operators. (RNMN 2/20)

R. Vilnius broadcast the following message twice in EE 2/24: "There is going to be a change in R. Vilnius frequencies as of 3/2. We are almost certain that, like before, you will hear us on 17690 and 17605 kHz. Two new frequencies are to be added: 9870 and 9530 KHz. I am sorry to say that is all the information we have at present." (Mike Fern--CA) *Do not send hard currency to Lithuania by ordinary mail.* Many Lithuanian-Americans put US\$10 or \$20 in each letter home. The letters never arrive. The Bank of Lithuania's official exchange rate for the CIS ruble -- Lithuania does not yet have its own currency -- is 90 rubles to US\$1. Many letter carriers are under-age girls just out of school, but there are lots of family men. A letter carrier's pay is 1500 rubles a month. A half-dozen foreign envelopes, each containing only US\$1 or \$5, will more than double that on the black market. The opened letters get thrown away. The Lithuanian Post Office has decided to treat all first-class mail from overseas as registered mail. The PTT also is not now accepting outgoing parcels for the U.S. or Canada because it must pay hard currency to the surface carrier. So prizes for a recent R. Vilnius contest have been delayed. (R. Vilnius Listeners' Club 2/23) [A priest at St. Casimir's Catholic Church in Los Angeles, a Lithuanian congregation, told me his two brothers have not heard from him since July. International registered mail costs \$5. The amateur radio magazine QST reported recently that a new, similar service, the Receipt for Recorded Delivery, costs \$2 plain, or \$2.50 if you want the addressee's signature returned to you. Since some post offices don't keep IRC's in stock, you may have to shop around. But buying a Receipt for Recorded Delivery over here means the Lithuanian Post Office will get its cut.--mf]

R. Vilnius' announced English sked at 0000 3/2 was 2230-2358 on 666 and 9535 kHz, and 0000-0028 on 9530, 17605 and 17690 kHz. 9530 kHz, location unknown, is buried under Radio Exterior de Espana, and carries RMWS in EE. 17605 (Petropavlovsk) is SIO 555 when it's on, but has missed three days, 2/29, 3/3 and 3/4 UTC, not limited to R. Vilnius. 17690 (Komsomolsk) is a good SIO 444 and more regular. The 0200 Lithuanian xmsn is good on both 16m freqs but, again, 9530 is Madrid in Spanish covering up RMWS EE. (Mike Fern--CA 3/4)

MOLDOVIA - The Moldova b/c authorities are assembling staff to start an external service on SW in EE, FF, and SS. The name *Radio Moldova International* will be used but no sign-on date has been announced. (Eugene Alexeyev, Moldova, on RNMN 2/20)

MONACO - *Trans-World Radio*, Monte Carlo has moved its 49m channel to 6200 kHz between *1700-2000*. (RNMN 2/20)

NETHERLANDS - Three of the six grand-prize winners in *Radio Nederland's* interval-signal contest were from the CIS. Some of the names are familiar to Journal readers. They are: Feodor Brazhnikov, Irkutsk; Alexander Sevchenkov, Moscow; Mikhail Denisov, Rostov-on-Don. Axel Fredrikssen, Denmark; Wojtek Zaremba, Poland, and Wellington S. Franca, Brazil. The IS's were from Radio Nederland, Deutsche Welle, Voice of America, Radio Prague International, Radio Moscow, and Polish Radio Warsaw. NASWA's own Bob Brown was heard on Media Network 2/20 with a strong pitch for the SWL Winterfest at Kulpville, PA, on 3/13-15. (RNMN 2/20)

Radio Netherlands has added a free newsletter for listeners called "On Target," which is separate from the regular freq sked. If you want it you'll have to write for it: Box 222, 1200 JG Hilversum. (RNMN 3/5)

NEW ZEALAND - RNZI went on the following sked 3/15 and it will be effective until the first week of October: 1645-1850 on 9675 kHz; 1850-1938 on 15120 kHz; 1939-0758 on 17770 kHz; 0758-1206 on 9700 kHz; after 1206 on 9510 kHz for sporting events. On 5/4 RNZI will drop 15120 and move to 11735 kHz. (Tony King on RNZI Mailbox 3/15)

"If you'd like to write to us, our address is Radio New Zealand International, P.O. Box 2092, Wellington, NZ, and if you seek a QSL card for your report, please include three International Reply Coupons." (Tony King, RNZI Mailbox 3/15) [This returns RNZI's QSL policy to what it was at the start of 1990.--mf]

NIGER - *Voice of the Sahel*, Niamey, operates: (a = alternate frequencies) 0430-0700 on 3260a, 5020, 7155a; 0700-1100 on 6060 (unconfirmed), 7155; 1100-1630 on 6060, 7155, 9705; 1630-1700 on 3260, 5020; 1700-2200 (-2300 Su) on 3260a, 5020, 7155a. (WBI 2/28)

NORTHERN MARIANA IS - *KFBS*, Saipan, has the following [winter] sked: 1400-2000 on 9465 kHz; 1900-2000 on 9475 kHz; 1110-1515 on 9495 kHz; 1300-1530 on 9670 kHz; 0855-1359 on 11650 kHz; 1200-1530 on 11665 kHz; 1125-1159 on 11705 kHz; 2155-0000 on

15320 kHz; 0925-1300 on 15380 kHz The only English is at 1930-2000 on 9465 kHz The mailing address is P.O. Box 209, Saipan, MP 96950, USA. (Direct to DXPL 3/7) [Looks like the "USA" may be necessary for those parts; see March LN on Palau.--mf]

PALAU - High Adventure Ministries expects its new SW xmtr to begin b/c at Easter (4/19 for the lapsed and forgetful). Call signs have not been assigned as of 3/11; one known freq is 11930 kHz for morning broadcasts. (John Taylor, High Adventure Ministries, via Mike Fern--CA).

PERU - *R. Central*, Bellavista, San Martin, 4922 kHz, heard in Quito at 1103 during Ecuadorian power cuts with "El Condor Pasa"; freq announced as 4920 kHz; ID is "Radio Central para todo el Peru." (RMV/QLB/DXPL 2/22) [WRTH 92 says 1000-0400--mf]

R. Cora del Peru, Lima, 4915 kHz, noted here 0452-0459 3/11 with the longest closing ritual I have ever heard, seven minutes from the required announcement of freqs and ownership to the final "muchas gracias y hasta luego." A recorded prayer and hymn are part of the signoff. The slogan is "R. Cora del Peru," not "Radio Cora." (Mike Fern--CA)

Emisora Chaves del Peru, Arequipa, 5067 kHz, new, heard with romantic music at 0250; time checks and ID, freq given as 5070 kHz.; only heard 1/22 with fair signals; not picked up in local morning, thought to be a test xmsn. (Daniel Camporini, R. Panorama, Argentina, on DXPL 3/15)

PHILIPPINES - *R. Veritas* will cease broadcasts in JJ at the end of June, according to a Japanese Catholic weekly. The station will be targeted at Communist communities and minority races. The demand for SW broadcasts has been decreasing in Japan. The station hopes to place new emphasis on broadcasts for Asia and the Middle East. It is believed the cut in JJ programs is related to a cut in funding from the German church group which supports R. Veritas. That group announced in 1990 that it would begin a phased reduction of funding in 1991 and end all financial support in 1994. The Japanese staff of R. Veritas Asia will return home in July 1992. (Hiroaki Nakada on RJDXC 3/1)

DZB2, Far East B/c Co., Baco, Mindoro, operates on 3345 kHz with 1 kw, according to Peter McIntire, head of FEBC's Overseas English Dept. It is being heard in Japan from *1000-1100* on 3330 kHz. (Nobuyoshi Aoi on RJDXC 3/8)

POLAND - *Polish Radio*, Warsaw, changed its EE sked on 1/13 and on 2/1. There are four 55-min programs in EE: 1300-1355 on 6135, 7145, 9525 and 11815 kHz; 1600-1655 on 7285, 9525 and 11840 kHz; 1800-1855 on 7145 and 9525 kHz; 2030-2055 on 6095, 6135, 7145, 7270 and 9525 kHz. (Tom Kuca, NY, on RJDXC 2/23)

PORTUGAL - *Radio Portugal* from 3/1 uses new 15375, ex 15295, at 1300-2100 Sa/Su in PP to USA. (Bob Padula in ADXN 3/92)

RUSSIA - *Arkhangelsk Radio* operates 0200-2200 on 5015 kHz. (WBI 3/6)

R. Pamyat expanded its sked as of 3/1. All programs are in Russian. To Europe from 1430-1600 on 15410 kHz; to the Moscow area from 1600-1900 on 12060 kHz; and to Siberia from 2300-0030 on 6145 kHz 12040 kHz will replace 15410 kHz on 3/29. (Yoshinori Kato and Shigenori Aoki on RJDXC 3/8) The station is asking for reports. Address is: R. Pamyat, c/o Yuri Milolyubov, Flat 4, Volovaj St. 32, Moscow 113054. (James Jordan and Clive Rooms, World DX Club Contact 2/92 via DXPL 2/22) [Same sked as given on RJDXC, but 1 hour later]

Adventist World Radio Russia began broadcasting from Novosibirsk 3/1 [sic] on 9835 kHz from 1700-2000 and 2100-0100, and on 11835 kHz from 0100-0800 and 0900-1700. The one hour transmissions are: Burmese, 0000 and 1200; EE, 0100, 0700, 1300 and 1800; Hindi, 0200 and 1400; Marathi SuTuThSa and Telugu MWF, 0300 and 1500; Malayalam SuTuThSa and Tamil MWF, 0400 and 1600; RR 0500, 0600, 1700 and 1800; CC 0900, 1000, 1100, 2100, 2200, 2300. (AWR Guam via Nobuyoshi Aoi on RJDXC 3/1) Doesn't look like they made it by 3/1 [df]: The full sked for *AWR-Russia* is: 0000-0100 Burmese 9835; 0100-0700 11855 English/Hindi/ Indian languages/ Russian; 0900-1600 11855 Mandarin/ Burmese/ English/ Indian langs; 1700-1900 9835 Russian / English; 9835 2100-2300 Mandarin. Station advises that reports should be sent to AWR-Europe, PO Box 383, 47100 Forli, Italy. Site is advised as Novosibirsk. Started on or about 3/14, and heard here well on all channels. (Bob Padula)

Changes at *Radio Moscow* were due to take place 3/29. The new name for the Radio Moscow World Service in RR will be *The Voice of Russia*, Golos Rossii. *Russia's Radio* will remain the name of the home service. Many frequency and programming changes were scheduled.

Russians living in the Ukraine are complaining, especially in the Crimea, where 70% of the population is Russian-speaking. Many parts of the Ukraine have switched off Radio 1, *Mayak*, and Russia's Radio, all from Moscow, and replaced them with programs from Kiev. (JM on RNMN 2/27)

The speculation that *R. Moscow* has funding through June or July is correct. After that, according to R. Moscow officials, the service is to gain a sort of autonomy from the Ostankino Co. (ex-Gosteleradio) by looking for independent sponsorship. Despite the Yeltsin takeover, R. Moscow is not and will not be part of Russian Radio and TV. *R. Moscow World Service* will change its name to *Radio Moscow International* between 3/1 and 8/1. (VS on RNMN 2/27)

Radio Moscow announced 2/27 that it would "suspend" Laotian broadcasts 2/29. (WBI 3/6)
RMWS said on 2/16, "We do not have any schedules, not even for ourselves. Very substantial changes are expected on all our frequencies in spring, and besides that, many amendments are apparently going to be made to our program schedule. We do not know how this will look in specific terms, so please do not ask us to send any schedules for the time being." (ASWP 3/1)

A new commercial station in Moscow, *R. Galaxy*, is being heard on 9880 kHz in English from 2000-2300. It is beamed to Western Europe and is also being heard with good signals in Eastern North America. *R. Galaxy* intends to concentrate on business news. (BBCM on RNMN 2/20) *R. Galaxy* disappeared from the air within days after its first appearance on 31m. R. Moscow's Frequency Department says *R. Galaxy's* broadcasts were intended for Moscow only, but, without consulting with R. Moscow, the Ministry of Communications sold a 700-kw (count 'em, 700) R. Moscow xmtr to *Radio Galaxy*. When the Freq Dept found out, they cut the studio-transmitter feed. So *Galaxy* was off the air for a few days. Later an agreement was reached to return *R. Galaxy* to 31m for Moscow only. *R. Galaxy* claims that, from the outset, they applied for an FM channel in Moscow. Since none were available, they took the SW outlet on 9880 kHz for broadcasts outside the country. *R. Galaxy* claims its biggest mistake was to use R. Moscow's studio address as its own, over the air, so listeners' letters landed in R. Moscow's Freq Dept which went red with alarm. *R. Galaxy* said the Freq Dept saw a rival in *R. Galaxy* and shut them down for a few days. After some talks, *R. Galaxy* acquired two 150-kw xmtrs and is back on the air, viz.: in RR from 2000-2300 on 9800 kHz. As of 3/1 *R. Galaxy* planned to resume EE on SW and start RR programming for Moscow on FM. (VS on RNMN 2/27) [Tell this story to your local AM or FM operator and watch him weep.--mf]

R. Uni (7300 kHz, Russian Far East--mf) or *R. Unis* (1494 kHz, European Russia) is actually *R. Yunost* ("Radio Youth" in EE), part of the Russian Radio 2 net. It carries announcements and ads in EE, including an EE ad for the LOT Polish airlines. One SW outlet near Moscow is on 4740 kHz. *R. Yunost* confirmed to VS that it carries the ad mentioned on RNMN 2/20. (VS on RNMN 2/27)

BBCM is hearing *Radio SNC* on 11735 kHz from 1300-2000. The station has been active for about a year. 11735 is grossly overloaded, the principal user of note being R. Sofia, Bulgaria. "SNC" stands for "Stas Nanin Center," named for a famous RR rock promoter. His station is on the air on 1260 kHz MW 22H featuring both Russian and Western rock. The 25m outlet is a regional service in St. Petersburg. (JM and VS on RNMN 2/27)

A new independent SW station in Russia began broadcasting 3/1; the early sked was 1500-1545 on 11945 kHz, 20 kw, on a xmtr at Balashikha, a former jamming site near Moscow. Reception rpts are welcome, and will be verified with a QSL card. The address is: *Radio Space*, 125015 Moscow, Russia, Butirskaya 23. The 24H fax line is 285-2860. (VS on RNMN 2/27)

Yegor Yakovlev, head of *Moscow Ostankino Co.*, formerly Gosteleradio, has proposed to the members of the CIS that Ostankino be made an international b/c organization for [and among??--mf] the former Soviet Republics. He has also proposed that a European-Asian B/C Union be set up to deal with common (technical, programming and administrative) problems of broadcasting in these nations. (R. Kiev in English to NA, 0110 3/5, via Mike Fern--CA)

Far East Christian Broadcasting has begun operations in Khabarovsk. The schedule is 0900-1030 on 4060 kHz USB, 5965, and 9560 kHz SW and 1224 kHz MW. All programs are in Russian except for announcements in English. It is using the former freqs of Dalny Vostok Radio which has not been heard since 10/91. It is the first home-grown religious broadcaster in Russia, and was first heard in Japan 3/4. (Yoshinori Kato on RJDXC 3/8)

Far East Christian Broadcasting Russia also calls itself FEBC Russia. The ID goes "You are listening to Far East Christian Broadcasting, FEBC Russia. Listen to us every evening from

7 to 8:30 p.m. Khabarovsk time, on MW 1224 kHz, on SW 5965, 9560, and 4060 kHz. We are situated in Khabarovsk, Russia. The mailing address is: FEBC Russia, Box 21-28, Khabarovsk 20, 680020 Russia." (Yoshinori Kato on RJDXC 3/15) [FEBC Hq. tells me that "FEBC Russia has been established." However, it is producing programs in RR for Radio Mayak, the nationwide domestic network. My source does not know about a Khabarovsk connection "but everything is changing very fast" in the CIS. --mf]

R. Novaya Volna, Moscow, heard in RR at 1715 on 9490 kHz. (Carl Fischetti, Germany, on Radio Budapest DX Show 3/6)

Radio Without Borders International is heard in Moscow from 1000-1200 and 1400-1830 [WBI 3/6 transcribed it as '-1800'] Sun. on 6235v kHz. The 100-watt xmtr is 50 km east of Moscow. RWBI will QSL reception reports to 119633 Moscow, Russia, P.O. Box 55. It plans to broadcast tapes of European pirates, such as the FF pirate **Radio Waves**. It calls itself "RWBI". No mention of radio on the envelope, please. (VS on RNMN 2/27) [Pre-WW2 Russian broadcasters used numbered calls in the RW series, e.g. RW1 or RW15.--mf]

SENEGAL - Radio Senegal Chaine Nationale, Dakar, operates at 0558-0815 on 4890; 0815-1515 on 7170; 1515-0100 on 4890 kHz. Multilingual anmts are at 0558 & 0659. Programming is in French & Senegalese languages. (WBI 2/28)

SOUTH AFRICA - Radio RSA - sked for 3/1 - 5/2 is: **0300-0500 FF** on 9675, 15120, 15220; **0400-0500 English** on 7270, 9695, 15230; **0400-0500 PP** on 7230; **0500-0700 FF** on 9675, 15220, 17710; **0500-0700 PP** on 11920; **0900-1000 Sa/Su** in Tsonga on 9585; **1000-12100 English** on 11900; **1400-1700 Swahili** on 9675, 11900; **1500-1800 Chichewa** on 5960; **1500-1800 English** on 9585 & 15160(fm 1600); **1500-800 Lozi** on 9555; **1800-2000 FF** on 11950, 15365; **2000-2100 PP** on 4965; **2100-2200 PP** on 11950. (WBI 3/6)

SRI LANKA - Sri Lanka B/C Corp. announced 2/26 that it would begin broadcasts to North America as from 3/3. The service was launched during a scheduled broadcast to SE Asia at 1030-1130 2/26. The NA service began with two 30 min xmsns: 2330-0000 on 15425 kHz using the Radio Japan 300 kw xmtr at Ekala, and 0445-0515 on 15425 kHz (35 kw) and 9720 kHz (100 kw) to WNA with a 35-degree beam heading. (VG on RNMN 2/27) [15425 eastbound is a no-hoper. WRTH 92 says it's a Russian RMWS English freq to WNA from Petropavlovsk, authorized with 100 kw from 2130-1000. It's the first RMWS freq I look for after the seasonal changes.--mf]

SLBC sked: **0030-0230 English** on 6005, 9720, 15425; **0030-0430 Hindi** on 7190 & 11800 (0330-0400 We is Nepalese, Sa is Urdu); **0230-0430 English** on 9720, 15425; **0430-0630 Su Hindi** on 7190, 11800; **0445-0515 English to NA** on 9720, 15425; **0630-0730 Hindi** on 7190, 11800 (Urdu Mo 0715-0730); **0730-0830 Kannada**, **0830-1000 Telugu**; **1000-1130 Malayalam**, all on 7190, 11800; **1030-1130 English to As/Au** on 11835, 15120, 17850 (1040-1045 We Sinhalese); **1130-1330 Tamil** on 7190, 11800; **1230-1730 English** on 6075, 9720, 15425; **1330-1730 Hindi** on 7190, 11800; **1745-1900 Sinhalese to ME/Af** on 11800; **1900-1950 Tamil to ME/Af** on 11800; **2000-2130 English** ("World Service") to Europe on 9720, 15120; **2330-2400 English to NA** on 15425. (All to Asia, unless stated.) (WBI 3/6)

TONGA - The SW xmtr on 5030 kHz was silenced when the December hurricane severely damaged the xmtr building and SW antenna masts. AC phoned the senior technician at 3AZ, who plans to move the still-intact SW xmtr to the MW xmtr building and put up a higher antenna tower by the end of March. The sked will be the same, 1750-1000. The station has lost clerical staff but the senior technician said he would handle QSLs if necessary. (AC on RNMN 3/12; in part on RNZI 3/15))

UKRAINE - 4940 kHz carries the Ukrainian external service in Ukrainian at 0200 // 4825 kHz; relays Mayak at other times. (Dave Kernick, BDXC 2/92, via DXPL 2/23) **Radio Ukraine** heard on many new frequencies since 3/3; 2300-2359* in Ukrainian on 13670, 11950, 9870, 7380, 7240 (ex 9860 & 7400). 1800 German, 1900-1929 & 2000-2059* Ukrainian on 13680 & 11960; also many other changes since full sked appeared in March LN; announced new station name in Ukrainian; no longer Radio Kiev. (Ernie Behr, Kenora, Ontario)

UNITED ARAB EMIRATES - UAE Radio Abu Dhabi, heard on new 15480, from *1600-2200* in AA; vy strong since 3/8; //11985 & 9780, past 0100. (Ernie Behr, Kenora, Ontario)

UNITED KINGDOM - For history buffs: The last transmission from BBC's *Davertry* site was to have ended at 1130 GMT March 29, on 15070 kHz. Prior to that time the frequency was to have been in use by three BBC UK sites; an announcement about the closing of Daventry & then the shutdown. I'd be interested in knowing if anyone was able to hear Daventry go off. [df]

Radio Japan will begin using BBC xmters at Skelton to improve its SW signal into Europe. Dennis Thompson, head of BBC's Broadcast Coverage Department, was asked if the BBC will get time on transmitters in Japan in exchange.

DT: The idea hopefully is to arrange a swap in due course. Initially BBC is hiring xmters to R. Japan so they can improve their coverage of both Europe and the USSR [sic]. When Radio Japan has more capacity at their transmitting station at Yamata, then it's hoped that BBC will be able to get reciprocal relays through Yamata to improve its coverage of East Asia.

JM: What languages will be used?

DT: Starting on 7/1/92 Radio Japan will have 10 hours of programming, and 17 1/2 hours of xmt time, in JJ, EE, RR, GG and FF.

JM: All your antennas are beamed out of the UK.

DT: Their intention is not to cover the UK; the service will be HF only. They will be beaming primarily eastwards into the USSR and southwards into West and Central Europe.

JM: Why does the BBC need facilities in Japan? You've got Hong Kong.

DT: We have only two xmters at Hong Kong, and one program feed. This means that we can do either CC or EE, but not both at the same time. We're very happy with the coverage from Hong Kong. We can't do both of our major languages simultaneously into China. When we are doing Mandarin out of Hong Kong, we can complement that with EE out of Yamata.

JM: Radio Nederland was forced to abandon plans to build a relay base with the BBC in Thailand.

DT: One thing we need to do is to beam better signals into the subcontinent. We are redeveloping our station at Masirah [Oman] with new antennas, and we would like to complement that development by the Thailand relay, which will give us the ability to cover the subcontinent very advantageously from the east as well as the west. There will be two xmters. After signing an agreement with the Thai government, the time scale would be about three years. (RNMN 2/20)

UNITED STATES - *WJCR* first heard here 3/16 at 0205 on 7490, ID 0208; religious music. (John Norfolk, OK) *WJCR*, Upton, KY, planned to start broadcasting *2/29* with four 50-kw SW xmters. Two xmters will be used in harness to drive one antenna. The xmters apparently were tested on dummy antennas at the factory and were due to arrive in Upton [all four!] about 2/24. The transmitter hall and antennas were already complete. *WJCR*'s European beam will be centered on Gdansk, Poland. The second beam will target Latin America. The FCC had been asked to approve freqs of 7485 and 15660 kHz. The tentative sked calls for 20 hours of gospel music and four hours of Bible teaching. (JM and Don Powell, manager, *WJCR*, on RNMN 2/20) *WJCR*, Upton, KY, made its appearance the week of Mar. 13-18 on 7490 kHz. A second 50-kw. xmt will go on the air in May. Programming is mainly gospel music. RNMN received 30 phone calls about the station's debut. (RNMN 3/19)

WRNO, New Orleans, heard on 7465 kHz NF ex 7355, excellent signals, like a new xmt, 0415-0430 2/22 with relay of R. Miami International in SS, "La Voz del Treinta de Noviembre" (Voice of Nov. 30), Cuban refugee political group. *WRNO* ID in EE was followed by a disclaimer of responsibility for the (RMI) program contents in EE and abrupt signoff. If *WRNO* is carrying RMI at this time it apparently carries only RMI material and does not continue to 0500 as its W92 freq authorization allows. No mention of other freqs in use. (Mike Fern--CA)

UZBEKISTAN - *Radio Tashkent* was to begin broadcasting in Turkish at 0400 and 1700 from March 1, in the 19 meter band. (R.Moscow via WBI 3/6)

VATICAN - *Vatican Radio* continues to make unannounced freq changes, and the quarterly Programme/Frequency Guide isn't too accurate. Noted on new 9500 with Japanese from *2130, into Russian 2200, as of 14 March. From 29 March, new 17550 is planned, 1230-1300 to Asiatic Russia, 1300-1330 to North Africa. Also new from 29 March is 21670 1000-1030 and 1200-1230 both to Africa. 5885 is listed 1930-0030 to Europe, currently heard on 5882.5. (Bob Padula, Australia)

VENEZUELA - *R. Rumbos*, Villa de Cura, 4970 kHz, heard signing off at 0454-0500 Sun 3/8 with announcements by a woman in English and French. Reports are wanted, to Apartado 2618, Caracas 1010A. WRTH 92 gives the sked as 0900-0600. (Mike Fern--CA)

VIETNAM - *Voice of Vietnam* HS noted on 680, 870, 4895, 5925 (ex 5920), 6448, 10059 kHz. %925 not noted in the morning. *VoV* svc for Hmong people is on new 6135 (ex 6560) at 1100-1330, //5020. *Quang Nam-Da BS* noted on 700 kHz; local px from 1130; then relays Hanoi to 1600*. ID: Da la dai phat thanh Quang Dam-Da Nan". *Pleyku* noted on 4788 at 2200-2300, 1030-1100, 1130-1200. VV 2245-2300, 1030-1100. Vernacular pgms other times. The station name seems to have changed from the former *Gia Lai-Con Tum BS*. This change related to the division of Gia Lai-Con Tum province into Gia Lai province & Con Tum province.

A new station IDd as *Yen Bai BS* noted on 6463 at 0000-0030, 1000-1030/1045, 1130-1215 (apparently ex inactive Hoang Lien Son BS). Vietnamese except for LL 1130-1200. Also it was decided to divide Hoang Lien province into Yen Bai & Lao Cai provinces, so this station may be related to this change. But if the station is located in the same place as former Hoang Lien Son BS (i.e., Lao Cai), why is the station named Yen Bai BS?

Other VV stations heard: *Son La BS* 6317, *Lai Chau* 6428 (irr), *Bac Thai BS* 6617, *Ha Tuyen BS* (presumably) 4817. *Cao Bang BS* is currently inactive. *Ha Tuyen BS* has possibly changed its name, because also Ha Tuyen province has been divided into Ha Giang & Tuyen Quang province. (Hiroshi Fujita, on a trip to Laos & Thailand, in ADXN 3/92)

R. Bac Tai has been heard on new 6525 kHz ex 6617 since late February. Local languages are broadcast prior to 1300, Vietnamese after. The sked seems unchanged at 1155-1400 but is unconfirmed because of poor reception. (Isao Ugusa on RJDXC 3/15)

YEMEN - *Sanaa* has been inactive on 9780 for several months in its local evening period. However, since 5 March, has been noted with the "Sanaa" network, Arabic, in period 2100-2230. Not to be confused with Abu Dhabi, also on 9780, opening at 2200, for Ramadan extended schedule. "Aden" network, as on 5970, also heard in 2100-2200 period, with different programming, 14 March. (Bob Padula)

UNIDENTIFIED - Mystery music station heard on 9575 several times; 2/25 1455-1510* w/only instrumental music; again 3/3 1545-1620* w/music. Powerhouse signal, but no anmts; could this be VOA testing new high-power transmitter? They have done this in the past on various unsked frequencies. (Ernie Behr, Kenora, Ontario) Not that I know of. Anything getting on the air would normally carry an ID. [df]

CLANDESTINE - Iran's *Flag of Freedom Radio* gives nine phone numbers to dial for special services. Six are voice lines in Los Angeles, London, Oslo, Copenhagen, Hamburg and Paris. The other three are fax lines in Frankfurt, Hamburg and Paris. The voice lines play back the Flag of Freedom IS and a five-minute news program on the activities of an anti-government group called "Suzmani Darashta Kaviane" [phonetic as heard], "Organization of the Flag of Freedom" in EE. The Los Angeles voice line is (818)792-4726. The London voice line is (44) (71) 376-1611. The radio broadcasts are heard in Japan at 1630 on 11670 and 15100 kHz. (Yuki Sakagami on RJDXC 2/23) [The voice line material in Los Angeles is all in Farsi, read very rapidly by a woman, and sounds as if it was downloaded onto a tape recorder from a satellite telephone link. No address or EE message is given.--mf]

The *Voice of the People of Kurdistan* ancd in AA at 1603, 3/2 that a 41 meter sw frequency, 7075 kHz, had that day joined the regular 75 meter channel. Monitoring observations have confirmed the new frequency. (WBI 3/6)

PIRATES - R. Harmony, 6305 kHz, in Europe, features EZL rather than the standard rock music. They give an address in ?Venus, TX, but their real location seems to be Ireland. (ASWP 3/1)





Notes

Cuba: On March 17 **R Havana** moved to 11970, from 11950, to escape heavy co-channel interference from a Ukrainian transmitter carrying **RMWS** and **R Ukraine** programming. There will be a special test broadcast May 1 and 2 (and possibly a few days thereafter) on 25800 kHz at 20-21 UT in celebration of RHC's 31st anniversary. It will be a 5 kw transmitter into an omni-directional antenna. Special QSLs will be issued.

Japan: *DX Corner* celebrates its 10 anniversary this month, and the program will be renamed *Media Roundup*. Its focus will expand beyond hobbyist DXing to include media and satellite news. From mid-March, the new presenter is **Ms. Hiromi Ito**.

Int'l Red Cross: The new schedule for March-August hasn't been decided due to the significant changes in the **SRI** programming and transmission schedules that took effect March 29. For the moment, the only publicized releases are 1100-1240 and 1700-1840 to Europe on 7210 kHz.

USA: From Upton, KY, the gospel music station "The Voice of the World" **WJCR** came on the air March 15 with a big signal. Gleaned from a telephone call, the initial broadcast was made at reduced

power (estimated 10 kw). The rhombic is aimed at Jerusalem. **WJCR** expects to operate 24 hours a day on 7490 kHz. The second transmitter is expected the week of April 20 or 27.

Quickies

The **SLBC** wNA service, as it turns out, is only one day a week, Monday evening in NA. **Austria's Shortwave Panorama** has some new air times, including Su 0330 and 1030 UT. **R Kiev** changed its name to **R Ukraine**. At **WWCR**, the decision to move from 7435 to 5920 kHz - despite all the late March publicity to the contrary - has been postponed for at least 3 to 4 weeks. The Monday 21 UT airing of *World of Radio and Signals* may flop frequencies. I've given up on trying to track **RFPI's** schedule and have opted to list all frequencies as 24 hours. The **R RSA** changes are based upon a tentative schedule in hand. Hopefully we have the correct **R New Zealand Int'l** schedule; I heard four variations from three sources during March, the last on the 27th.

In Closing

Lots of changes this month, and some typing errors may have crept in as faxes from **RCI** and **SRI** were particularly difficult to read. At the time we go to press I don't know if **R Tirana** - who announces the wrong frequencies - is shifting the SW service for summer time. Given the state of confusion in the former **USSR**, it's also unclear what effect the uncoordinated shift to summer time will have on the timing of **Ukraine**, **Vilnius** and **Yerevan**. Look an hour earlier for all of these, if necessary.
