The I.D.A. sent us their Bulletin this week and the first thing that attracted our attention was a little slip of paper which contained the information that they have just succeeded in lining up HIX, Santo Domingo for a DX on Thursday morning, November 30th (Thanksgiving Day) at 12:30 A.M., E.S.T. This is the first DX program that they have run in over 2 years.

Now don't just try one morning, but keep trying every morning for a month if need be, between the hours of 4:00 and 6:00 A.M., E.S.T. and we are certain that there will be quite a few of the boys that will be able to say that at last they have succeeded in landing an Australian station. We urge you to get on the job right away for they won't be coming in so much longer. You see they will soon be in the midst of their summer sesson down there and the result is that they won't be able to break through their static. Those Australians which are most commonly received are 2YA, 2BL, 4QG, 5CK, 3AR, 2CO and 4BC. We certainly want to wish all of you a lot of luck in bringing them in and above all do not become discouraged if you don't land them at the first opportunity or the first time
