Little do any of you realize how anxious we are to begin work on this week's Bulletin, we have some very important news for you this week, which we know will be of the greatest interest to many of our members.

Socoo-rather than keep you in suspense any longer, here goes: Walt Birch our East Lynn, Mass. CPCer seems to have gotten a hold of a bit of scoop news, which he has kindly passed on to us. He has received a letter from the U. S. Department of Commerce, National Bureau of Standards, Jashington, D. C. in which he has been advised that the National Bureau of Standards are conducting some experiments with foreign station The purpose of these test transmissions from Europe is to measure the field intensities of these stations and then compare the absorption of the radio waves at broadcast frequencies over this northern path with the absorption over paths farther from the magnetic pole. Special emissions have been arranged from several European and South American broadcast stations. They also advise that they shall be glad to have the DX fans measure the field intensities of these transmissions and report them direct to them. A schedule of stations participating in these tests follows:-

The South American stations will transmit each Thursday morning in January from 2:00 to 3:30 A.m., EST on the following frequencies: LR5 830; LR4 990; IR1 1070 and LS2 1190 kcs.

Fractically all of the European tests are already completed, however on Friday morning, January 17 there will be a test from Kootwyk, Netherlands, 160 kcs., using 120 Kw from 1:00 to 2:40 A.M., EST. Also on the same date there will be a test from London Regional, Great Britain, 877 kcs., using 50 kw between 1:00 and 3:00 A.M., EST. These two tests will conclude the European portion of these special test programs. Other stations from Europe that participated in these tests were Athlone, Ireland, Fost Parisien and Radio-Maroc, Morocco.

With the above information, we have given you the solution to the South American tests which have been on the air during the past three Thursday mornings. We hope that you will all avail yourselves of this opportunity to tune in these foreigners. Reception reports from all over the country, indicate that the South American broadcasts have all been a tremendeous success, hence we suggest that you do not pass up this golden opportunity of hearing these programs. We want to express our deepest gratitude to Walt Birch for having sent us this information.

We have learned that the DX program which was to have taken place from JOL, 1310 kcs. Jashington, D. C. on Jan. 12 from 4 to 5 A.M., EST, was ordered postponed until the 19th at the same hour by the F.C.C. Therefore if any of you were disappointed at not having heard this program from WOL, this accounts for it.

It is with regret that we note the passing of the Mid-Co DX Exchanged Pichita, Kansas. T. R. Grosvenor, the former president, feels that owing to the lack of membership, that it was to the best interests of the members in the club that it be discontinued. Ted has kindly consented to serve our club in the capacity of technical advisor, as mentioned in last week's Bulletin.

According to L. E. Jubb, president Philos Radio & Television Corp., states in spite of rumors to the contrary, television will not be commercialized during the year 1936.

The Honolulu Advertiser (owners of KGU) are avaiting FCC sanction for the establishment of a short wave station with directional antenna towards North America, to be operated by them. It is hoped to start broadcastin, by late March or the middle of April, as soon as the OK is given.

WIKAL, 11.79 megs., Boston, Mass., is broadcasting a course of instruction in the theory and practise of radio every Monday evening at 7, EST. The second lesson was given on January 13, and anyone desiring blueprints to simplify the lessons may receive same by paying a small charge to the University Extension Division, Massachusetts Department

SHORT TAVE DEPARTMENT

The station at Villejust is progressing very nicely, according to reports. As has been mentioned before, this new short wave transmitting station is planned to replace the present Radio-Colonial, which seems to be rather inefficient radio unit. The new station at Villejust, having two transmitters with a rating of one hundred thousand watts each, will doubtlessly be one of the most outstanding short wavers when it takes the air sometime this spring.

From the progressive column in the Newark News Radio Club's short wave department, ably conducted by Earl R. Roberts, we learn that the Chilean CEC will soon shift to 9545 kilocycles. This station is now operating on 10670 kilocycles with 4000 watts power. According to the Department of Commerce, Washington, CEC also has permission to use the following frequencies: 4895, 5265, 5820, 7740, 8710, 9350, 15865, 19680, 20620, 21110, and 22820 kilocycles.

Stanley Ledvesek, Slickville, Pa., (Box 4) will soon join the ranks of the short wave fans. Stanley says: "I can't tell you much about the S.L. reception over my way. I am strictly a BCB DXer, because my receiver only covers that band. However I like the S. Waves a lot and as soon as I do get a S. /. receiver, you can also count me in as a S. W. DXer." Stanley has been looking over the all wave jobs and in doing so, heard CGF4, Montreal contacting GSC in England (the Canadian was possibly misunderstood for CGA4 at Drummondville which is one of the phone stations—Ed.)

As you know the Radio Corporation of America has promised to 'Televise' the country in their extensive radio-vision program this year. Shortly after 1932, the television industry seemed to take a definite slump. At that time however many large corporations throught the country considered and effected plans for installation of television equipment. The spring reports of the Federal Radio Commission in 1932 listed thirty-two licensed television stations. Among the more important stations in the East were WZXR New York-WZXAP Washington-WXXK Washington-WXXV Boston. As Fred Allen said, "Television and cellophane are here to stay." At least we hope that the RCA will remain as confident in their developments in this field as Mr. Sarnoff represents.

The Japan Radio Broadcasting Association has inaugurated a one hour variety program for American listeners. The show is billed on their daily schedule for JVN, 10660 kc. from midnight to 1 A.M., EST.

DO TOU AMOV...that Radio Strasbourg, 859 kcs., France, is using 120 kw --probably accounting for their regularity in being heard...KFBK, 1490 kcs., Secramento, Cal., are now broadcasting on that frequency. They are on chain until 3 A.M., EST, but spot announcements at that time will give ample veri material...KFPY, 890 kcs., Spokane, Wash., is slated for a power increase of 5000 watts days, 1000 nights...it is understood that the Golden Empire Broadcasting Co., will be given the OK by the FCC to erect a new 100-watt station on 1200 kcs., at Redding, California... Randolph Hearst, the publisher, is expected to receive FCC sanction for new station in Albahy, lower power, and to use 970 kcs. However, this is not yet definite...KREG, 1500 kcs., Santa Ana, Calif. have changed call to KVOE...CJEK, 630 kcs., Yorkton, Sask., are now using their new power of 1000 watts days, 500 hights. Most of CJGK's programs emanate from Tinnipeg, Manitoba.

The United States Navy has clocated the source of the interference puzzling short wave listeners lately, and which we mentioned in DX Chatter. According to the navy department at Bellevue, Maine, the hoise (usually heard from twenty to forty meters) emanates from certain types of medical apparatus used by many of the hospitals throughout this countty. The FCC is undertaking conferences with the manufacturers of this type of equipment to the end that this interference be eliminated in the future.

Then Fred Gilman, engineer of CFNB, Fredericton, N.B., Canada tried to make an adjustment to the 1000-watt unit while it was operating, he met almost instantaneous death. Gilman touched a 100-watt high frequency condenser unit.

The opinion of the "trade" is, that the three 1400 kilocycles Brook byn stations (MARD, MVFW and WLTH), slated for deletion, will have their desise postponed until after the election.

Three-quarters of the USA is under quota on kilowatts, in spite of the power boosts given so many stations recently, the FCC reveals.
