SHORT MAVE DEPARTMENT . By Ed Brandon

Radio reception on the broadcast band is being tucked away for its usual mid-year rest. Many an ardent BCB fellow turns to the good old short waves to look for foreigners and hours of transoceanic entertainment. Between the hours of midnight and breakfast time, Australians may be heard in goodly numbers on the 20 meter fone band. Stations you should look for are: VK3KX, VK2BQ, VK3MN, VK5JC, VK2UC, VK2YW, VK3LM, VK2AC, VK2HZ. Bandoeng, Java is heard occasionally through its short wave transmitter YDB on 9.6 megacycles.

JIC, same location 5.89 phones 6 - 8 A.M. EST. JIB, 10.54 same local relays programs of Japanese Broadcasting Corp. Address Chief Engineer Tokujiro Seki, Tyure-ki, Taiwan. MEXICO - a new station is reported on 9.52 with call XEDQ. They relay XED. MADAGASCAR - Off the East Coast of Africa in the Indian Ocean. Station FIU on 5.6 megs. is on the air daily for short wave listeners from 7 - 7:45 A.M. PST or 10 - 10:45 A.M. EST.
