DX NEWS

SEPTEMBER 2, 1936

With the cool weather that we've had during the past week, we can already notice a big improvement in reception conditions, and from the reports at hand, quite a few of the members have already dusted off their headphones and are back at the dials, trying their luck at picking up some new catches.

For those who reside in the Middle Atlantic States, we find that WSPR, 1140 kcs., Springfield, Mass. can be heard well in this particular section until around 7:30 P.M., EST. This is one of the new stations that have taken the air during the summer months.

On Thursday evening of this week, ye editor will have resumed his series of WORK DX Club broadcasts, which this year will come to you each Thursday evening at 8:45 P.M., EST. We would appreciate all of you dropping a card or letter of appreciation to the management of WORK for having again permitted us to present this program to you.

The International DXers Alliance are interested in finding the Short Wave Champion DXer of the World for the season 1936/37. Mr. Dickenson of Regina, Sask. has sent us several copies of the rules of this contest, which incidentally is open to all radio enthusiasts in possession of a SW radio, and members of all radio Clubs are cordially invited to participate. Any of our members who are interested in taking part in this Contest, may have a set of rules free, if you will drop us a card or letter, inasmuch as the supply is limited, we cannot send each and every one of our members a copy of these rules; therefore we are taking this method of passing the rules out to those of you who are interested in the Contest.

Pat Reilley sends us several DX tips at this time. XEP, Juarez, Mexico has a DX Owl Program on the air every Sunday morning on 1160 kcs. KWSC, 1220 kcs., Pullman, Wash. on the air with a request DX program from 3:00 to 7:00 A.M., EST, the last Sunday morning of each month. Pat also says that he has been heard quite a strong signal on 790 kcs., on several occasions recently, which he believes might be 4YA. We suggest that you watch for a similiar signal on this frequency around 5 A.M., most any morning. Walt Birch tells Pat in a recent letter that the Europeans have begun to break through for him, so that those members who live along the Atlantic Coast might begin looking for them at this time. They can be heard in that locality at late afternoon, and early in the mornings, although we doubt that they are heard at this season of the year in the early mornings.

Art Brackbill, our CPC Chairman requests us to put the following announcement in this week's Bulletin: "This season the NRC has an excellent CPC, and we have been very fortunate in retaining our very best CPCmen. However we have an opening for a CPCman to handle the Mexican stations. If there is anyone in the club who has a fair knowledge of Spanish and would care to take the job, we should be greatly pleased."

#### SHORT WAVE COLUMN By Art Johnson

Having quite a lot of SW dope on hand, we will get right into it, and dispense with any unnecessary talk. I want to thank those members who have reported SW news, and the more reports received, the better the Column.

HCK has been reported as changing from their 5885 kcs. channel to that of 3750 kcs, right in the 80 meter band. Their schedule is 8:30-10:30 P.M., EST on Mondays.

A new country to log now is Jugoslavia. They have built a Short Wave station at Belgrade for operation on 6.1 meg. or 40.17 meters. Their power is now 400 watts, but later they say they are going to step it up to 2.5 Kilowatts. Programs are - French, Italian, Albanian, German and Hungarian.

**DEKKA**, the German dirigible Hindenburg is heard occasionally on 5280 kcs. altho the higher frequencies for this transmitter are better. I have been hearing that CMI is now on the air again on 12830 and 8035 kcs. I haven't heard a peep from them, but maybe someone else is?? That station on 9588-9590 kcs. Oxrieder reports being HJ2ABC, La Voz de Cucuta.

**VP3HR**, Georgetown, British Guiana has changed from that pretty bad 40 meter spot of theirs. They are now heard on 5996-7 kcs! It's just a recent change. Has been heard here at Fort Hamilton, N. Y., and comes thru fairly well. Oxrieder also reports it.

He also reports CSV, the National Broadcasting station of Portugal, at Lisbon. He heard them Aug. 22 at 6:00 P.M. on 9549 kcs. They announced in English as operating on 31.45 meters or 9540 kcs., but was wrong, as he was almost half way between DJA and DJN.

Mrs. Ida Rogers, reports purchasing a new Patterson Receiver and she says DX is swell on it. She reports hearing JVI on 14600 kcs. very well. Mrs. Rogers is one of those staunch BCB DXers, just recently converted into a SW DXer.

This information of Radio Centre Moscow, comes from Miss Iuna Marr, Chief Editor of Radio Centre Moscow, USSR.

Floyd W. Murphy reports the latest 20 m. QSL's he's gotten. They ARE:- FV2CK, G2XW, XE2AF, HIIC, VK2AS and VK4JK.

Does anyone know of the QRA of VK2ABD? They are not listed in the latest issue of the call book. He says he's using 15 watts power but does doesn't give any QRA.

DJL on 15.11 meg. has replaced DJB on 15.20 meg. DJL is using 40,000 watts. No wonder they are booming in:-

KZRM of Manila is planning to start a short wave relay station and are testing on SW Channels between 5-7 A.M., EST over 10.91 meg. A. J. Paul of Austin, Texas reports hearing him once a few months ago and has a verie to prove it.

COOQ, that Oppel mentioned on 9820 kcs. in last Bulletin is now on 9747 kcs. They do drift around a heck of a lot.

HIN "N" for Normandie, "The Voice of the Dominican Party" at Trujillo is a new station heard by Oxrieder operating on 6245 kcs.

HH3NW is definitely identified as the Port-au-Prince station on 6350 kcs. HH3W is on 9640 and the two should not be confused because of the similiarity of call letters.

LRX, Buenos Aires has decided to operate around 9660 kcs now as there is less interference there!

HI3C has moved again and is now coming in around 6725 kcs. altho, they may wander 3 or 4 kcs. off this frequency.

KENI has gone to 11900 kcs. from their former frequency of 11950.

TGWA on 9450 kcs. has been on regular of late until Midnight EST or later.

TI4NRI in Heredia, Costa Rica is a new station on 9685. Amando Cespedin the former operator of this famous station of other years, is again the operator. He claims 9070, but the exact frequency is 9685 kcs.

COCK in Havana on 12165 kcs. (he announced 11650 but was away off that) was heard last Sunday night talking to hams on the 20 meter ham band. Try for him this Sunday night at 11 P.M. or, as he usually

Radio Podebrady in Prague, Czechoslovakia was reported as early as July 24 by some DXers. Was heard August 13 on 15230 kcs., Oxfrieder also reports him at various times of the day. Heard once R7, although usually R4 here at Fort Hamilton.

HJ4ABU, La Voz de Pereira heard on 6145 kcs. Evidently the new call and location of the 6080 kcs. HJ4ABC. HJ4ABD is one that is going to fool a lot of DXers. He moved just recently into HJ4ABP's old spot of 6135 kcs. (HJ4ABP being heard now on 6028 kcs.)

HIZQ operating on 6240-6245 kcs. uses the slogan "La Voz de los Auchachos". The same slogan as HIZ uses, so don't let the use of this slogan on 6240-45 kcs. fool you into thinking it is the later station (HIZ.).

HJ1ABG has moved to 6038 kcs. This is "Empisora de Atlantico". He operated here a while last winter, then went back up again to his 6042.5 kcs., his assigned spot, but now is back on 6038 kcs.

HJ1ABJ, La Voz de Santa Marta finally located on 6017-18 kcs. Couldn't find him for awhile as I was looking for him on 6025 kcs. - his old spot.

That's the whole of it for this time, but want to thank Oxfrieder, Neilliey, Murphy & Rogers for their fine co-operation in reporting. So the rest of you continue sending reports to me at 472 - 83rd St., Fort Hamilton, Brooklyn. So 73 and lots of luck and DK until next time.

Miles I. Hart, Plainville, Conn. reports reception of a SW station at Prague, Czech. between 8 and 10:30 P.M., EST on Aug. 15. He said this station was operating on about 19.61 meters and was calling for reports.

Morgan B. Kent, Daytona Beach, Fla. advises us that Mrs. Kent will sing during the course of a test program emanating from WMFJ, 1420 kcs., Daytona Beach on Thursday morning, Sept. 10. beginning at 2:00 A.M., EST. It looks to us as though this was the regular monthly check, and in that event there has been a mistake in the date, inasmuch as WMFJ tests the second Wednesday of each month and not the second Thursday. Suggest you try both mornings around 2 A.M., EST inasmuch as Mr. Kent is very anxious to see how much ground this program will cover.

E. L. Peters, Westport, N. G. who has recently joined our club reports that he heard Radio Normandie at 7:45 P.M., AST on the evening of August 24. He says that this is the first year that he has ever succeeded in hearing any of the Europeans that early in the season. Mr. Peters as you know holds some very remarkable European and South American verifications in his possession. We hope that the good luck will continue again this season for you.

A letter from Mr. Irving R. Potts, Pres. MNRC suggests a central committee, composed of one representative of each club to receive and consider complaints against stations, who it seems are making no effort to send out the verifications that they have promised. This suggestion was made in regards to our letter to them concerning this matter, and it really appears to be about the best method of handling this situation. We will in the very near future try to make some sort of arrangements so that this Committee can become active during the next couple of weeks.

We had quite a scare at the beginning of last week, when we were notified that the Inter-Club Co-Operation Plan would be dropped this year, owing to apparent lack of interest. However since that time, there has been considerable interest shown in the matter, and we believe that the clubs will endorse the Plan again this season, with the result that it will continue to function the same as last year. It would be a serious mistake to permit this good work to go for naught, inasmuch as we believe that all clubs would soon regret any action which would result in this Plan being dropped. No longer would any club be able to schedule DXes without anxiety as to whether or not some other club hadn't also scheduled a broadcast on the same frequency from some other station, at the same time. We want to go on record as whole-heartedly approving the continuance of the ICCP for this year.

We hope to be able to get enough tips together until next week, to resume our regular DX Calendar, however, as most of you know, this early in the season such tips are very scarce and the result is that we do not have enough tips on hand as yet to start this feature. (Worcester, M.)
