Notes on calls: Colonial Heights is correct as above, our typo on the master list had WIVK and this was carried incorrectly several times in AM Switch. 1540 is in Spring Arbor, not Harbor as previously listed. WSWG is a new station, the first WSWG went off the air and a new facility was granted to new owners. They have applied for the old calls which were granted, thus a new WSWG takes over vacant 1540 in Greenwood. For the first time under the new rules a call letter dispute has been settled by the courts as the FCC wished. WMEY Fort Wayne, IN sued WMZZ Decatur, IL for "trademark infringement" when WADM became WMZZ, a phonetically similar call. The court ordered the WMZZ calls changed, they have become WQTZ. These are FM calls but it is used here to illustrate the procedure necessary since the FCC got out of the business of settling call letter disputes.

Radio ownership limit increases

WASHINGTON — Nobody is predicting an immediate flurry of trading, but the nation's group broadcasters are free to add more AM and FM radio stations to their portfolios.

As of 12:01 a.m. today, the Federal Communications Commission implemented the terms of a July decision raising its national ownership limits for radio. A single individual or company may own 12 AM stations and 12 FM stations, up from a 31-year-old limit of seven AM and seven FM outlets.

The FCC initially planned to raise its limits on TV ownership in the same fashion — from seven stations to 12 — but that part of the July ruling was set aside in August at the insistence of Congress.

FCC Chairman Mark S. Fowler has promised to take another look at the issue of TV ownership, in part because of congressional concerns about the major networks buying more local TV stations.

Congressional displeasure over the FCC's July 26 actions did not extend to radio, however, and the commission

proceeded to establish a Sept. 8 effective date for those new limits. The higher maximums are being welcomed by broadcasters and media brokers alike, but most broadcast executives say they will move deliberately in expanding their radio holdings.

The "7-7 rule" was adopted by the FCC in November 1983 with the goal of ensuring a diversity of ownership within the broadcast industry.

According to the FCC, there are now more 8,260 commercial radio stations on the air in addition to 1,150 educational outlets.

I recently put an antenna up at my work location in Providence. It's a 22 foot vertical on top of a tower and building totalling 85 feet in height. This is by far the best antenna I've ever used at this location. It picks up much less noise than either the 100 foot longwire or 2 foot loop previously used. I guess getting the antenna above the noise and away from things that absorb the signal really helps. The difference was much more than I expected to find. Anyone else use a similar setup?

That's it for now. Please listen and report. The best conditions have been early in the season the past couple of years. Don't miss it!

⑫ Mexican Meeting Yields Results For Class IV's

U.S. Class IV stations will be able to increase their nighttime operating power to 1 kw effective December 15, 1984, according to an agreement reached recently between the United States and Mexico. The agreement was reached during U.S./Mexican bilateral meetings on radio allocations held August 20-24 in Mexico City. Representing the United States on the delegation were FCC, State Department and U.S. Embassy officials, as well as consulting engineer Wally Johnson, on retainer by NAB to represent the broadcasting industry.

Among the items under consideration were Class IV power increases, extended hours of operation for U.S. daytime-only radio stations, and U.S. nighttime operation on Mexican clear channels.

All Class IV stations in the U.S. will be able to increase power to 1 kw on December 15 except for ten stations along the Mexican border. Those ten will be allowed to operate at 500 watts on December 15 and increase to 1 kw on July 15, 1985 (unless related Mexican stations can increase their power earlier). Canada has also agreed to the December 15 implementation date.

Several issues remain to be worked out with regard to daytimers' extended hours. An agreement was not reached in this area; extended hours will be a major subject for consideration at the next bilateral meeting in November or December of this year.

FORD GOES C-QUAM

Motorola AM Stereo Surge Seen Among Set Makers

An NRBA survey of about 15 major radio receiver manufacturers shows that all but three plan to market Motorola-only (C-QUAM) AM stereo receivers in 1985. Three companies, including Sansui and Sony, are committed to multi-system receivers, and only Panasonic expressed no current interest in AM stereo, according to the survey to be published later this month in NRBA's quarterly AM stereo report.

The findings tend to confirm Motorola's claims of an emerging marketplace trend in its favor. But the firm's chief rivals, Leonard Kahn and Harris Corp., dispute that such a trend is building. They remain strong advocates of multi-system sets that will pick up all four competing systems. "It's still a three-horse race," says Harris Product Marketing Manager Joe De Angelo, whose system can be picked up on both C-QUAM and multi-system sets.

Ford Motor: Motorola But . . .

Ford Motor Co. is the latest member of the Motorola lineup, but its commitment is by no means firm. "Our plan at this point is to offer on Ford's EED radio a C-QUAM decoder chip from Motorola," says spokesman Larry Weiss. It will be available as a dealer-installed option in radio/cassette units "sometime in the 1985 model year," he said, but a multi-system set hasn't been ruled out for the future. "We certainly would like to keep our options open for now," as Weiss puts it.

449 AM Stereo Stations

While receiver manufacturers are beginning to move, most AM broadcasters still seem to be awaiting a marketplace consensus. Figures supplied by the system proponents show that up to 415 or 87% of AM stations in the United States may be broadcasting in stereo today. That breaks down as Motorola, 130; Kahn, 100+; Harris, 170; Magnavox, 12-15.

Kahn asserts, "We are by far leading in

or most other major radio markets. "That's why we're doing what we're doing. This used to be a great MOR market. No one is playing MOR anymore," Joseph said, adding that KMFY's new brand of MOR is "exclusive in this market." As to the possibility that Joseph may have lost some listeners with 24 hours of "Make Yourself Comfortable," the station's unofficial theme, he isn't worried. "It created attention," he said. "It got people to listen. They haven't listened to this station in weeks."

KMFY is aiming for 35-54 demographically, according to Joseph, who said advertisers have responded well when contacted about the new sound. But he admitted it's a different approach in reaching the older audience. "Most high-demo stations put you to sleep," Joseph claimed. "We can't put anybody to sleep." KXSS had been an automated and known MOR station. But Joseph maintained that real MOR is not being played in this market.

Settlement For Daytimers, Class III Regionals

"An historic day for radio" is how NAB President Eddie Fritts characterized it. At a press conference held last Wednesday at NAB, spokesmen for the Daytime Broadcasters Association (DBA) and the Association for Broadcast Engineering Standards (ABES) buried a 50-year-old hatchet as they announced the joint filing at the FCC of a compromise they have reached on post-sunset technical standards for daytime-only AM radio stations.


Both groups acknowledged the contribution made to the settlement by Fritts, whose initiatives brought the two sides to the bargaining table.

Under the terms of the settlement, DBA and ABES have asked the FCC to modify its orders in the post-sunset extended hours proceeding to minimize interference to full-time Class III (regional) AM stations, while still providing for operation by daytime stations up to two hours after sunset with power adequate in most cases to serve their local communities. The compromise provides for staggered power levels of Class III daytime-only stations during the period from sunset to 6 p.m., local time, year-round. Daytimer power levels would be determined on the basis of the diurnal curve values for one-half hour, one hour and two hours after sunset.

Both groups expressed optimism regarding the FCC's acceptance of their compromise. Gregg Skall, attorney for DBA, encouraged the FCC to approve the agreement in time for full implementation for winter months.

The proposed standards differ from those adopted by the FCC on reconsideration in April of this year in the following respects. The power level for daytimers in the period from sunset to 6 p.m. was to be determined by reference to the diurnal curve values for sunset plus one-half hour after sunset with a 100-watt minimum power level for all Class III daytimers. Under the compromise, however, the sunset plus half-hour values would be used for the first thirty minutes of operation after sunset. At that point, the daytimer will reduce power to the level required by use of the diurnal curve values for sunset plus one hour. At sunset plus one hour a further power reduction based on the sunset plus two hours diurnal curve values will be required. Throughout the period from sunset to 6 p.m., all post-sunset operations by daytime Class III stations would be subject to minimum power levels of 50 watts, 75 watts or 100 watts depending on the power levels calculated on the basis of the diurnal curves.

ABES President and Executive Secretary Wally Johnson said that the terms of the compromise will greatly improve the lot of full-time Class III stations, most of which would have received new interference from daytime stations during the evening drive time in the winter months under the terms of the FCC's April order. While some full-time stations will still receive some new interference under the terms of the settlement, in most cases such interference will be only a fraction of what would have resulted had the FCC April order been implemented, Johnson said.

Gregg Skall said that the compromise also met the needs of the daytime-only stations in that, if adopted by the FCC, it will permit the early implementation of more liberal post-sunset operating standards that are now in effect. Skall also said that under the terms of the compromise, daytimers will be able to operate after sunset with power levels which are adequate to provide local service in the winter months, but which will permit extended post-sunset operation on a year-round basis.

Radio Marti Set For Late Fall Start-Up

The Voice of America (VOA) hopes to put Radio Marti on the air in late autumn. That's the word from Charles Wick, head of VOA's parent agency, the United States Information Agency (USIA). The station will share the existing VOA facility broadcasting towards Cuba from Marathon, FL on 1180 kHz.

Although Radio Marti is authorized for up to 14 hours of programming daily, a schedule of four to five hours is likely at first. By law, programming must meet VOA standards for objectivity. Music and print libraries are now being assembled, and new studios for Radio Marti are under construction in Washington. A Miami bureau is also planned.

Programming plans have yet to be announced, but several major appointments have been made: former WOON/Miami VP Humberto Medrano, Deputy Director/News and Programs; Saul Geffer, Deputy Director/Management; Ernesto Betancourt, Director/Research and Policy; David Bartlett, Chairman/Program Task Force; and Richard Araujo, Acting Chief/Programs. The Senate recently confirmed Cuban exile Jorge Mas Canosa to chair the advisory board that oversees Radio Marti.

ANDY SENNITT with ANARCON '84 — AN OUTSTANDING SUCCESS

The 1984 1984 Convention of the Association of North American Radio Clubs, held in Toronto, Canada from July 20-22, will long be remembered as the perfect DX Convention. From start to finish things went almost without a hitch, and the Ontario DX Association who organized this year's event have set a new standard which will be almost impossible to equal, never mind improved on. This isn't my opinion — it is the near unanimous verdict of all who attended and were made so welcome by the friendly people of the ODXA.

Things got off to a good start when I arrived at Toronto airport on the Thursday evening to be met by Steve Webster and his girlfriend Denise. Steve's family kindly put me up for four nights, but before being driven to their home I was taken by Steve to meet the other principle organizers of the Convention, who had organized a group meal for early arrivals at a nearby Chinese restaurant, at the expense of ODXA. Also in attendance from the U.K. were Michael Murray of EDXC and the BBC's Andrew Piper who was able to relax for the first time at a DX Convention, having been a principle organizer of the 1983 EDXC conference in London. Also present were Jeff White, Mike and Suzanne Poulos all from Radio Earth and 10 others including our hosts.

Friday morning saw the start of the actual Convention, with the registration desk doing brisk business all day. In the afternoon from 1-5 pm the ANARC exhibition was open, with displays from Clubs and SW Businesses. A bus trip was also available for those who wanted to do some shopping and sightseeing. The ANARC business meeting took place at 3 pm. Thus delegates had a choice of three activities — and choice was a major element in the whole Convention, and a major contributor to its success in my opinion.

In the evening Radio Canada International hosted a wine and cheese reception — Ian McFarland was asked how he managed to carry that lot from Montreal (he came by plane). Ian also introduced other RCI personalities, including the now-retired Earl Fischer, formerly host of Listener's Club. Earl hasn't aged a day since his retirement 10 years ago — a good advert for Canada's fresh air!

Following a brief and informal opening announcement by Terry Colgan, delegates applauded the organizers and hotel staff for the very obvious care which had been taken to make things go so well, and then settled down to listen to a highly amusing yet informative presentation by three of the organizers — Cedric Marshall, Ron Hopki, and Harold Sellers — on "Planning a Dxpedition". The do's and especially the don'ts were illustrated by actual slides of past expeditions by the said three. If the presentation went on somewhat longer than planned, nobody cared because it was so enjoyable.

The usual late-night get-togethers ensued around the hotel, including a suite which the hotel had given to the organizers to use throughout the Convention, and which was kept liberally stocked with wine and glasses for the benefit of visitors!

Saturday morning saw a further choice of activities. Those with families (or whose interest in DXing was not sufficiently high) could visit a local attraction called "Cullen's Country Barn" (sorry I have no idea what that was all about) while in the hotel there were concurrent seminars by various DXers, and Bob Groves of Monitoring Times and Grove Enterprises on the Tools and Techniques of Monitoring the spectrum. At this time I was involved in a business meeting and was not able to attend any of the sessions, but I understand that they went very well, as did the International Broadcasters Forum which took place in the second half of the morning, enabling listeners to question broadcasters on a range of subjects. Unfortunately there were relatively few broadcasters present, however, those who did attend more than made up for the lack of numbers by their willingness to get involved in the Convention activities.

In the afternoon, a further choice of activities took place, with many DXers going on a bus trip to visit CFRB/CFR and the famous CN tower, the latter being the highest free standing structure in the world! The only hitch of the weekend occurred on this trip when a major road accident blocked the route back to the hotel and caused a 1 1/2 hour delay in getting back. Those who had preferred to stay in the hotel for discussions or films were already dressed for the Banquet (jackets and ties mandatory, unlike EDXC equivalent) while others had to rush to make it. The banquet, preceded as one might expect by a cash bar, got underway on schedule with an excellent meal of veal (or vegetarian alternative) and polished and polite service from the hotel staff.

After the meal, the four annual ANARC awards were announced. Unfortunately the various DXers who had won three of the awards were not present to collect them, however, this disappointment was more than made up for when Jeff White of Radio Earth came to collect his award as International Broadcaster of the Year. A very popular choice, Jeff proceeded to give a detailed history of Radio Earth, and to credit everyone (hundreds) by name for their help...sensing an all-night session, Terry Colgan slid gracefully onto the stage and tried to get Jeff to wind things up. Jeff failed to respond, so Terry motioned two persons from the organizing committee and they jumped up and gently lifted Jeff off the stage and back to his seat! The room erupted in a mixture of laughter and applause, and if anything encapsulated the good humor and fun atmosphere it was that moment, Jeff, naturally took it the right way and endeared himself even more to the attendees.

The next speaker, scheduled this time, was Tony Ward who is a New Zealander, and Tony enthralled us with a witty and perceptive account of his travels and DXing achievements that earned him a prolonged standing ovation, the first I can recall at any Convention I have attended. Sunday morning saw yet more choice. Concurrent sessions were held for DXers interest in LW, MW, Utility, TV/FM and Public Service Band DXing, while some hardy souls braved my first attempt at running a WRTW quiz. We had two teams of three, Canada vs USA, and the home team won by 46 points to 42 although they did have Ian McFarland on their side. The verdict seemed to be that such an idea is worth doing again, so I was quite happy. I was followed by Tom Williamson, Tropical Bands Editor of DX Ontario, who showed slides and gave a fascinating social commentary on many of the Latin American countries he has visited as a teacher and doctor. Tom is British but lives in Canada. Once again, the ODXA had picked a speaker who not only knows his subject but can put it across with authority and humor.

After lunch, the annual HAP auction took place. This is always well attended, and this year was no exception. Thanks to the work of Sam Barto, Terry Colgan and Ian McFarland, who helped to keep the room full for three hours, a total of approx US\$1900 was raised to be shared among the various HAP organizations.

The closing ceremonies followed the auction, but in the evening there was an enjoyable one-hour cruise around Toronto Harbor and islands, which some of us followed with a group meal in a Pizza parlor. Transport for the evening was one of those yellow buses you see on the streets so often, but I had never been inside one before! I'll leave you to guess why we used a school bus.

So, that was ANARCON '84. I have only been able to outline what happened on an action packed week-end, but I hope I have conveyed something of the convivial atmosphere. It wasn't just the events which proved so enjoyable, it was things like the ANARCON reporter; a daily newsheet telling delegates what happened (usually humorously) and what was planned. Harold Sellers wrote this newsheet at 5 am, and it was ready on the registration desk by on-time arrival by delegates. It was things like the organizers going around the banquet tables to check that everyone was happy with the meal. Most of all, it was the obvious intention of everyone, organizers and visitors, to enter into the spirit of ANARCON '84 and go home with lasting memories of an enjoyable, informative and successful weekend. Thanks to all who attended, I am sure the spirit will live on and be reborn in Milwaukee in 1985. As a postscript, I was persuaded by Jeff White, Mike and Suzanne Poulos to travel back with them to Chicago to visit Radio Barth programmes with Jeff, and we made plans for future Radio Barth/WRTW cooperation, and I was impressed by the phone ringing almost non-stop, a sure indication of Radio Barth's enormous impact in North America, and hopefully soon in Europe.

I arrived back in Europe tired, but with memories of a great six days with some of the nicest people in the hobby. And with the knowledge that there are more good things ahead - watch this space!




I think we all should keep an eye on the funding and contact our Congressmen to voice our opinions concerning funding for WWV and continuation of services as currently provided by WWV.


AFR GRAPH/JUNE 1984

Greetings all ... England is planning a commercial nationwide network, in contrast to the four non-commercial networks currently in operation run by the BBC. The new network needs the approval of Parliament, with a target date of 1990, so don't fire up your receivers yet ... WMLF in Indianapolis has been sold to Broadcast Enterprises National ... Phil Wood and Arthur Donovan will co-host "Monday Night Live" prior to the Monday Night Football games on WCBH in Baltimore ... David Warner has left WSUN for a DJ spot of the WPLO in Atlanta ... L. A. Raiders football games will be broadcast on KNBR in their old stomping grounds ... August 15 is the target date for WXXF to hit the air in the Memphis area, operating 50 kw days and 1 kw nights ... The University of Pittsburgh has gotten out of the AM broadcasting business, dropping WPGH, and moving into the world of FM, starting up WPTS on August 26; they will be rock-formatted ... The powerful voice of WGAR, which is now a country station, has donated all of its jazz records to WCPN-FM, a new public service station to hit the air waves on September 8 ... KRLA, in Pasadena, has been sold to Greater Media, Inc., which will make it a sister-station to KHTZ-FM in LA ... A federal grand jury has indicted James Ryan of New Jersey for his part in a financial fraud scheme, involving Radio Caroline. Interesting to note that the Radio Caroline operation is headed by a company registered in Liechtenstein; now THERE is a naval power ... Bill Wilkerson, of the mighty KNOX sports staff, will be doing some regional NFL games for NBC in the fall ... Is there anything short of spending a mint on a "Blaupunkt" that has a receiving capability similar to the TRF 656? If someone knows of such a creature, let me know! The nearest radio station, AM or FM, is KVLF-1240, about 40 mi away at 1000 w. daytime/250 w. at night. KCRS-550 Odessa comes in rather well in daytime at 190 miles away. It's been ages since I last checked in from this foreign DX'er's paradise. I'm still very busy with work and night school, but I do manage to sneak in some dial time. Summer cx were still DX'able with less T-storm QRN here in Maine than at former RI QTH. TA's were weaker in general and most TA's north of Southern France were gone all summer. Brazilians were common around sunset in May, June, July, but now as August is winding down they seem to be less common. I've have no time to report to IDXD but will send a report summarizing the best of summer DX. This should be a great TA DX season. The lower-band TA's are improving rapidly this month and many are clearly audible from sunset until 10 pm bedtime. I'm rarely awake to observe high freq. TA's around midnight until fadeout at European sunrise, but George Hakiel tells me they are often in. I had a most enjoyable visit with Peter Weeks from New Brunswick on Aug. 9. Peter and his wife were vacationing in town. George Hakiel came to visit me at the Narragansett, RI QTH on May 26 and 27. His new R71A is superb! The R71A is, in my opinion, the best set available for difficult foreign DX. My ranking of top five commonly available sets for difficult foreign DX using long antennas or powerful amplified loops to dig weak splits out of the crowded bands are in order: R71A, R7A, R70, R390A, HQ180A. This is based on experience and comparisons (several side-by-side) with all of them. As time permits, I will expand my antenna farm by running a few more beverages into the woods. After Nov. 1, the neighbors next door leave for winter and I'll run a 335-degree beverage through their land (they allow me into the woods across the river). Maybe I can catch Alaska or Japan early mornings prior to work if the auroral zone permits. If I can't get them on a 1/2-mile beverage at a super quiet QTH and check every morning, I must assume Alaska, Japan, and Asian TP's are virtually impossible here, even during the coming sunspot minimum. Per phone call to Walt of WJCM-960, he says their CP for U3 5000/1000 will be on in Sept.; their only affiliations are with ABC Information and Florida Network and they will either be 24h or sign off at midnight. Tim King of WKHK-1000 says they are D1 1000 and CP for D3 5000 is expired. They're affiliated with AP. Larry Grover, asst. Mgr. of WCNV-1010 says they're D1 10,000 and affiliated with RKO and Florida Network. Also, address is now Box 1010. Per Donna Ross, sales asst. with Tobacco Radio Network, the Florida stations affiliated with TRN are WGTX-1250, WDNR-1340, WNBR-1250, WTOT-980, WCKC-1490, and WPFA-790. Per letter, Florida's affiliates with National Black Network as of July '84 are WMBM-1490, WFDQ-1560, W2A-1400, WRXB-1590, WTHP-1150, WRBD-1470, WOKB-1600, WBOP-980, WJAB-1330, and WANM. WCBS-FM has assembled a DJ lineup, which could be termed a Program Directors Dream Team: The All-American Formerly of WMCA/WNBC, now on an easy-listening FM station WHUD; Dan Ingram (WABC), Charlie Greer (WABC), Dean Anthony (Dino), former all-night man on WHCA; Herb Oscar Anderson (the Morning Mayor of New York, WABC), Bob Lewis (Bobaloo), the all-night man on WABC, Bruce Morrow (Cousin Bruce, WABC), WCBS-FM regulars: Ron Lundy (WABC), Harry Harrison (WMCA and WABC), Jack Spector (WHCA) and a host of top-notch DJ's calling in on the telephone and others visiting the studio to share the experience (Dan Daniels, Peter Bush, Bob Dayton, and more.) It sure was a trip listening to Herb Oscar singing "Hello Again", and reliving the jingles that characterized the AM Rock Era of the 50's and 60's in New York. I really do the Larry King Show, effective in September, to expand its Music of Your Life format ... KBRE-Houston has gone AM-stereo, and new programming format, described by their PD John Drew as "Baby Boom Music" catered to the children of the 60's and 70's ... KNIX-AM/FM are now simulcasting in the morning with DJ W. Steve Martin at the helm ... Gene Crane, WCAU-AM is now doing the weather on Noonbreak on WCAU-TV. Trivia nuts should know that he played the part of the Mayor of Philadelphia in Rocky III ... RAI will be celebrating its 60th Anniversary in Rome on November 5 ... Hal Lebovitz, former sports columnist for the Plain Dealer, will be doing a Saturday morning telephone show on Detroit's WJR ... Former Seattle quarterback Sam Adkins has taken on the responsibilities as sports director for KOMO-Seattle ... Roger Willoughby-Ray has moved WCAU, was once a DJ on WFUN in Miami. His ten-hour recordings of interviews with the Beatles, during their national tour 1964-65, are going to be syndicated by Radio International ... KXOK will be airing some of the Cardinal and University of MO football games this fall ... WPEN's Music and Memories host Bud Brees has been going strong for 50 years ... KJCI (FM) in Hollywood has been sold for 18 1/2 million dollars. This is believed to be one of the largest amounts ever paid for a single radio station (their format is BFL -pls) ... WGBH-Public Radio - Boston has been awarded a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts, to produce a series of operas for radio ... WPON-AM Pontiac has returned to local programming and news as its format after voyages in country mx and ethnic offerings ... Talk about a ratings drop - former early morning man at KTAR-Phoenix Charlie Van Dyke is now giving travel reports on a five-watt radio station serving the Sky Harbor International Airport ... Alan Combs has officially been named the morning host on WABC; he had been filling in since last June ... Big changes at UPI; its editorial employees have agreed to take a 25% decrease in pay, and the news service has pink-slipped 200 others to keep the wolf away from the accountant's door ... Mutual Broadcasting is adding the Mutual Business Report jazz DJ has been given his walking papers ... Boston's Arbitron's list the following AM stations in order: WHDH, WBZ, WBBI, WRKO, WJKS, and WILD. FM's dominate the bulk of the top spots, as is so often the case WISN ... The FCC has ruled that the Larry King Show has the same status as the Phil Donahue show, as an in-service course for Connecticut State teachers in Communications. One segment was spent introducing BCB listening. There are many ways to use creatively the humble AM radio in the classroom to augment the standard elements of instruction, Social Studies, Science-Physics (wave propagation), Math, Industrial Arts, Language Arts, and much more. The "students" really enjoyed using the loops, space magnets, and constructing long wires to beef up the signals. They also heard recordings of old radio shows. It was quite well received by the group, as we discussed the history of broadcasting, crystal radios, oatmeal

boxes, and even the Lone Ranger. It was nice to see them smile, reliving their collective youth. One radio that filled the bill well on AM was the new Uniden CR-2021. With a Space Magnet attached to the rear antenna jack, it was a solid performer. Just punch up the frequency, tweak up the proper antenna adjustments, sit back, and have fun. With its digital programming method, splits are a lot easier to find, the PLL circuitry is most stable, and the unit has a good audio punch with two jacks built in, one for a 1/4" phone plug (for headphones) and a standard miniature plug which can be used for taping purposes. With reference to my Rambling Back column, it was designed solely as a limited run series, to be published in conjunction with the NRC's 50th Anniversary year. All information was excerpted from old radio magazines circa 1934, and was intended to provide today's listeners with a feeling for times gone by. I have recently taken on Administrative responsibilities in the school system, as Chairman of the Related Arts Department K-12, in addition to overseeing the Instructional Media programs and teaching one classes too. Thus I will be kept very busy while I get all things in order. I hope that this will not keep me away from the august pages of the Musings (nor September, October ... hi! -pls) I have also been working with a Kenwood R-2000 on loan here. Details hopefully in a future Musings. My tenure as Connecticut Section Manager for the American Radio Relay League will be ending October 1, so hope to be spending more time at the dials this winter ... so much for now - 73.

DAVE SCHWEIKART - Fairfax, VA (pm 8-31; rec'd 9-7 after trip through black hole in P. O.) Since this is my first Muse, perhaps I should introduce myself ... Although I just recently joined the NRC, I've been DXing off and on for about 8 years. I'm a Junior Programmer at a Washington consulting firm, but also have a background in radio, having worked as a DJ at WKEK (1430), WJJJ (1260), and most recently WKW (1420)... Construction is progressing very nicely at WPWC (1530), and the station will be a 500-watt UU operation on 1430 by December 1. The upgraded WPWC will have a new 4-tower antenna system in Dumfries, VA as well as a new transmitter and new studio equipment... One of my former employers, WKEK(1430), now plans to be 5000 UU by the end of January, but don't hold your breath. The CP was granted back in '80 or '81, but for various reasons construction has never really begun. The main problem: back in the summer of '82, just as they were getting ready to begin construction, WKEK discovered that their property had been re-zoned from commercial to residential several years earlier, and, as a result, improvements to the property were prohibited. That touched off a dispute with the town zoning board that wasn't resolved until April '84. Construction was then supposed to begin immediately and be completed by now, but they've only cleared the land ... WVBK (1440), which has been silent for over a year while the bank has tried to find a buyer, has now been completely dismantled. The bank sold the station's equipment several months ago, and in mid-August the 3-tower antenna system was taken down. You may recall that shortly before it went silent, WVBK got national attention from the news media when DJ Paul Young barricaded himself in the studio and played "Take This Job and Shove It" for ten straight hours before the owner agreed to raise his \$100 a week salary ...

STEVE FRANCIS - 1620 Lodge Street - Alcoa, TN 37701 (pm 9-4; rec'd 9-6)

Hi, all. Newest local here (and TN #160) is WBZW-1040 in Powell. They carry the Stardust net from s/on to s/off and have SNN mx at the top of the hour. No local spots or PSA's that I've heard yet. Their s/off at 8:30 EDT on 8-15 said it was their first day on the air; also that they operate with an "assigned power of 2,500 watts", which is half of what's listed. A July newspaper article on the station also mentioned 2,500 w. Dunno if it's permanent or temporary, although "assigned power" would indicate the former. I'll monitor their s/off once a week or so this season and sound the alert in these pages if he starts saying 5,000. After 71 days of nothing but relogs, two newbies were heard on the morning of 7-28 (three-month anniversary of WRJ2's silence): WHE-629 NY surfaced for about a half-minute on its ND day rig at 5:37 am with an "Olympic Minute" promo and two call ID's before the Cuban horror took over. Long-wanted WCEH-610 GA was in weakly at its 6:00 s/on for GA #170; still needed here are WPZ-790, WPTB-850, WGHL-990, WNEA-1300, WAVO-1420, WKR-1500, and 14 GY's. HH 8-27: With WHAM in daylight, new WJJN-1180 IN was weak but largely alone at 7:00 s/on. It was in and out until 7:20 or so - tight, professional-sounding nostalgia format with frequent Evansville mentions. That's M60 here from the Hoosier state. WAI5 IS TO BE

I never took advantage of living in a town where a radio station was to be born. Nelsonville, OH was the site of proposed WNL-940, which got listed in Van's Jones logs in the mid 1970's but never came on the air. All I remember hearing about it is that it was the project of Werner Bush, editor of the Athens Messenger daily newspaper. I lived in Nelsonville from September 1978 to June 1980, but never investigated what happened to WNL. I was in town when the application for the 1120 was listed in 1980. Recently I saw the application first for Newark or Columbus. WYNQ didn't come on the air until September 1980. Recently I saw that Buchtel was chosen for city of license since Nelsonville already has a 5th and Buchtel (pop. 600) does not. When I visited Southeast Ohio last month, I set out to determine what people knew about this proposed station, and whether they felt Nelsonville could support two stations, being a town of 5000. I spoke to an engineer at the Ohio U. Telecommunications Center, a newspaper reporter in Nelsonville, an engineer at Lancaster's stations, and an employee of WYNO. I also noticed a site near the (US) 33 Drive-In with a small building in the middle, and metal rods in the ground evenly spaced, as if they would be the locations where guy wires meet to support a tower. The gentleman from OU told me that the Edwards family who runs the Nelsonville TV company are the owners of proposed WAI5, and it is going to happen." He confirmed the tower location, noting that it is less than a mile from WYNO (now 1120)'s site. WAI5 could give WATH-970 some competition in Athens; WYNO's low modulation makes them hard to listen to there. Everyone spoke well of Edwards saying that "he does things right." Further, the reporter noted WYNO's insufficient coverage of Nelsonville news and spots could be its downfall] if WAI5 properly serves the community's needs. Right now WYNO runs AM news only, on the hour, and has some network music programs. Format for WAI5 is in question, a WYNO staffer thought gospel; others suggest country or top 40. The reporter told me that only the adults in Nelsonville like country; the younger generation is into top 40 or AOR. Finally, I spoke by phone with an Edwards at the Cable Co., intending to set up an interview. But after a few questions that confirmed the frequency, call letters (no significance), and tower site, I was asked "What's your real interest?" I oversee all of the custom musical production for the station ... we do quite a bit... and we added several pieces to our ongoing Spirit of Texas image campaign. We revamped our new theme music with a large package of material, and somehow I found time to co-produce the station's fall employee and advertiser presentation. My main responsibilities with the station are in the audio area ... I keep telling everyone that I'm the only one on staff who could care less about the picture. And then there's stereo TV! But turning to a more appropriate subject I've acquired a Sony SRF-A100 AM stereo receiver, and I would like to share my thoughts. First off, AH stereo does work; you'll be amazed at the quality of the Sony unit if you plug it into a hi-fi amplifier and speaker system. The tuning is critical; it will remind you of the '60's WAI5 FM multiple tuning hassles. Even in these days of exotic AM audio processing, a strong signal, mono or stereo, in the wideband position of the Sony radio, will yield an almost magical sound on good speakers or earphones. I recently visited my folks in the South Suburban Chicago area and took the Sony along. Best-sound stereo station I had to have been WMAQ with WLS a close second (but why was the rebverb only on one channel) ... that's the way I heard it!. It's a puzzle as to why WGN brothers to broadcast in stereo since they do talk so much, and even though I enjoy big band music, I thought that it was odd that WAI5 was in stereo, with so little program material, excepting the "electronically damaged for stereo" variety available for the format. WSM-650 always puts a great signal into Chicago and theirs was strong enough to trigger tuning LBD on the Sony, and of course in stereo or late in the evening. Also caught WDU-290 in stereo and WIP-610, again late at night. Can I make a request? If you have an AH stereo outlet in your area please find out which one of the four stereo systems they are using and include that information in your next Muse. (it's interesting that some have two systems -pls) Here in Dallas-Fort Worth, three AM stations broadcast in stereo. KRLX (ex-WAF-AM-570) uses the Motorola system and a rock oldies format; KAM-1210 uses Kuhn, they too are rock oldies. KMEZ (ex-WBOO) broadcast beautiful music using the Motorola system. I'm about to acquire a Sherwood SS-2200 AM-FM tuner ... a hi-fidelity unit ... all tubes... with wideband AM response flat to 7500 Hertz. And it's in mint condition. I'm getting more for the uniqueness of the unit plus, I collect old Sherwood equipment plus evenings. Enough! Best wishes to all for the upcoming season and good listening.
