FCC to grant nighttime service to 21 daytimers

Of the 41 AM daytime-only U.S. radio stations operating on 1540 khz. 21 have been authorized for nightlime operation by the ECC. The action follows adoption of new rules aimed at opening up night hours for AM daytimers on the 14 foreign Class I-A clear channels.

The 21 stations affected by the FCCs action will not be released until 90 days after the issuance of the order, dated Oct. 15. According to an FCC spokeswoman, opening of nighttime hours for those stations could be canceled if objections are raised by Canada. Mexico or the Bahamas before a 90-day grace period.

Jerry Davies, general manager of KNIGLIAMI MCPherson, Kan one of the stations on 1540 khz, waiting to lind out whether it was among the 21 was gladdened by the news. "We've been very anxious and watching this in hopes that they would allow us to go nighttime. I think it's something that daylimers—like ours especially—need. When you get into the writer months and you're competing—you need those extra hours and we definitely need them this writer." Davies said.

Nighttime priority for 1540 kts has in the past belonged to stations operating in the Bahamas. Canada, Mexico and the Bahamas have nighttime priority over the 14 clear channels under international agreements. One of the pacts, the North American Regional Broadcasting Agreement, among Canada, the U.S. and the Bahamas eliminated inghttime broadcasting by U.S. stations within 650 miles of the two other countries. However, for stations outside that barrier, recent international agreements have cleared the way to operate at night, according to FCC interpretation of those agreements.

In a related issue, the National Association of Broadcasters has filed comments with the commission in favor of a proposal to allow more broadcasters to operate on the 14 foreign clear channels by eliminating the nontechnical criteria for operating in those channels. According to NAB engineer Michael Rau, allocation of spectrum in those channels has been controlled by "birth contol rules" aimed at limiting new station assignments to unserved or underserved areas. The NAB's stance is that stations on the AM band are now so numerous that in the future only technical criteria should be used in new station applications for those channels.

FCC continues limits on 'K,' 'W' eall signs

WASHINGTON, D.C. (AP) — The Federal Communications Commission voted 4-0 Tuesday to retain a geographic restriction that assigns call signs beginning with "K" to radio and television stations west of the Mississippi River and "" to those east of the river. The agency's mass media bureau had proposed the change last February to expand options available to broadcasters in choosing the series of letters that distinguish their stations.

"Pirates" Won't Be Prosecuted

New York NY ... The two men who were arrested and charged with operating an illegal ship-based radio station five miles off the Long Island coast in late July will not be prosecuted.

At a 27 August session in federal court in New York, charges of operating an illegal station, a misdemeanor, and impeding the functions of the FCC, a felony. against Ivan Rothstein, 25, and Allan Weiner, 34, were dropped.

The two, who operated "RNI-Radio New York International," each could have faced a maximum five year prison term and \$250,000 in fines.

Even though their immediate legal problems were behind them, Rothstein and Weiner indicated that they had hoped their case would have posed a legal challenge to the FCC's policy of silencing off-shore broadcasters. They said they planned to put RNI back on the air.

Assistant US Attorney Matthew Fishbein was quoted as saying that if RNI resumed operations, the two pirate radio buffs would be prosecuted.

July broadcasts

Coast Guard and FCC officials boarded "Sarah," a 200' Honduranregistered fishing ship 28 July and arrested Rothstein and Weiner, as well as a reporter for the Village Voice.

For several nights preceeding their arrest, the two broadcast RNI on 1620 kHz. 103.1 MHz, as well as on shortwave and longwave frequencies. The 5 kW clear channel AM signal was heard throughout North America.

After FCC officials boarded the ship Babylon, NY. and dismantled the equipment. Rothstein and Weiner were arraigned in federal court

Even though the ship was in international waters, the US received permission from Honduras to board the vessel.

Weiner, who was cited by the FCC in 1985 for broadcasting on unassigned frequencies, and in 1971 for operating a land-based pirate facility, was adament that the FCC did not have the right to board his ship and shut down RNL

Illegal search?

He indicated that RNI was building a case on its allegations that the FCC had not obtained a search and seizure document in order to board the vessel. He said that the FCC also did not produce any written, legal verification that Honduras had given permission to board the Holiday Broadcasting, Inc.

Weiner also contended that FCC officials damaged much of the equipment when they dismantled it, a point the FCC denied. The Commission did not confiscate gear because they could not get the ship's anchor up in order to tow it into port.

Approximately 20 people-with about seven involved in a core group-had donated \$150,000 in money, gear and time to get RNI on the air, Weiner maintained.

As of mid-September, the "Sarah" was in a Boston area port being repaired. Since the silencing of RNI, Rothstein and Weiner have also been invited to host a program on a legal station, WNYG in J.K

The two stations KIXI-AM and KLTX (formerly KIXI-AM-FM) will be split up and parceled to the competition, according to filings with the Federal Communications Commission.

It might seem an unnatural sale because KIXI-AM has been a remarkably successful station with its "Music You Remember" format, while KLTX was lost in the also-rans of "light, contemporary" formats. But the FM KLTX will be sold for \$8.7 million, twice as much as KIXI-AM's \$4.5 million price.

KIXI-AM-FM were built from the ground up by Wally and Ann Neiskog and sold to Thunder Bay Broadcasting in 1985 for \$8.6 million.

Approval for the transfers may take up to four months, but Ackerley Communications, licensee of KJR, expects speedy resolution, targeting the transfer for Sept. 15 — in time for fall advertising campaigns. Ackerley expects to continue the "K-Lite" format on the FM station.

Rick Scott, KJR's program director, said both stations are competitive — especially when one combines KJR and KLTX numbers in the 25-54 demographic eresin.





Daytimers Have a Longer Wait

Washington DC ... Daytimers who were expecting that by this fall the FCC would authorize nighttime operations may have to wait a bit longer, perhaps into winter.

At press time, the FCC was examining the possibility of acting on the plan by the end of September to give nighttime powers to many daytimers on domestic clear and regional channels.

However, according to FCC Audio if the FCC does get around to approv-

ing the plan in September, which was applicable interference protection renot a certainty, it would still have to inform both Canada and Mexico about the specific night powers.

That process, Eads said, involves up to a 60-day notification and comment period, which could delay the actual authorization of the night powers until November, at the earliest

The night powers plan, unveiled by the FCC last May, would allow many daytimers-including those on Class I and Class III channels-to operate at Services Division Chief Larry Eads, even night with up to a maximum of 500 W, provided such operation complies with quirements

Eads said that some daytimer owners at the September Radio '87 show in Anaheim CA were disappointed that the night powers would not be able to be approved for use earlier, such as in Sep-

One of those daytimer owners is Jim Wychor, former president of the Davtimer Broadcasters Association (DBA), which eventually became the NAB Daytimers Committee.

"We all hoped that all the work would be done by September," said Wychor, who owns KWOA in Worthington, MN. He indicated he had heard that most of the delay on the issue was caused by the FCC's heavy workload on other issues, such the the continuing Docket 80-90 issue. Ja

AM Faces Electrical Interference

by Michael Callaghan

Anaheim CA . . . If AM radio is going to stand a fighting chance, it's imperative that measures be taken to reduce interference as much as possible.

While interference from other stations soften unavoidable, static from power lines and electrical equipment can be controlled. This control was the topic of the session on Removing Electrical Interference.

Current Technology's Barry Epstein spoke on a number of important issues, including the effect of "dirty power" and what it can do to AM radio, and the need for conditioners to temper the 6000 V spikes coming in the power line.

Also of concern is the new SF6 "superfast" switches the utilities use that interrupt the power for "only" two cycles when they work.

He pointed out that during that two cycle siesta, computer power supplies can "ring" and produce high frequency outputs remarkably close (but not close enough) to the system clock frequency.

Epstein took the National Electrical Code to task as not being good enough When it was written, the power companies were feeding a much different type of load than they have now.

Jim Zoulek from the FCC's Long Beach office commented on the role his office plays in interference complaints. Typically power line RF noise problems are cured by the power company.

When complaints are caused by other than power lines, the process starts with a form filled out by the person suffering the problem

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The FCC sends a couple of letters to the person responsible, and if that fails, the enforcement section may get involved, with a lot more clout and the power to levy fines if needed.

Mike Rau from the NAB's Science and Jechnology Department pointed out that AM Improvement includes the reduction of electrical interference.

Rau said there aren't enough standards limiting interference levels. Enforcement of standards would command the installation of the necessary traps and filters at the time of manufacture, where it would be much less costly than the present "sniff and fix" situation.

He also pointed out that the NAB and the FCC are both keeping a close eye on the RF lighting issue

Recent attention aims at controlling emissions from devices using RF oscillators to excite fluorescent lamps, and producing a lot of unwanted carriers in the process. A Notice of Proposed Rulemaking is still undecided, even after two years of FCC study.

Rau also passed out copies of an NAB study entitled, "What Does The Public Do Whey They Experience Signal Interference?"

The study covered many different locations where interference was heard, causes and any action taken.

In not one case, according to the study, was the FCC summoned. Instead 76% tried fine-tuning the station, 73% put up with the interference and, 61% (here comes the program directors greatest

fear) changed the station.

The bottom line is that as audiences become more accustomed to the virtually static-free environment of FM, the need to remove as much static and other interference from the AM band becomes critical.

Power companies, equipment manufacturers and regulating agencies all have to work together to help achieve this obiective

Twice last February, I promised to recap the DX highlights of 1986, but never did, so I'll recap 1986 and the first half of 1987!

The highlight of 1986, DX or otherwise, was the arrival June 13 of William H. Hardy III. Billy has been happy and healthy and is just a joy. I don't get anything done when I'm at home because I spend all my time with him! He loves paying with radios. On vacation, he'd turn all the knobs on the portable. At home, he'll retune the stereo or the FRG-7, turn the volume up and down, play with the switches, and think it's delightful. When Mama or Daddy want to ID a station, though, and hold the knobs, he's most unhappy! Someday soon we'll be waiting for the ID "This is W---" and he'll change the station! I just know it! He certainly has the heritage and environment to become a radio hobbyist. (He'll probably become an FCC commissioner, hi! -pls)

Many 1986 loggings were call changes and such, but on 3-1-86 Arizona became an easy state for the first time with KTNN-660, "The Navajo Nation" on the air. Another brand new station, "1040 AM" Vancouver whose calls are not announced (supposedly CIOF) went on the air 9-14-86, the day we went to Expo 86. After Expo, we positively ID ed "Expo Information Radio" on 530 (400 watts) and 1600 (600 watts) plus an Expo-reated TIS at Bellingham on 1610. Iong-sought KWVR-1340 Enterprise, OR, formerly a 6 am-6 pm 250-watter, was bagged 12-27 at 2 am on its new 24-hour satellite country format with 1000 watts. We managed Homer, AK on 890 before CJDC moved to 890 from 1350. CJDC, much-wanted on 1350, is suddenly a pest!

So far, 1987 has brought 18 new catches, 14 of them in January and February. Robert Kramer's contest will motivate me to log many states and provinces, and probably hear some new stations in the process.

On July 25, we headed to the Canadian Rockies for a camping vacation. The radio scene in Calgary-Banff is mostly unchanged except that CFHC-1340/1450 is almost 100% local studio 7 am-6 pm Mountain time weekdays. 8-2: While heading back to the U.S. I noticed that CEK-540 had a good groundwave signal nearly to the Rockies. The area near Cardston has high ground conductivity and KMON-560 was potent, so a daytime bandscan from there would prove interesting if I hadn't been in a hurry. Glacier National Park, MT has TIS's on 1610 at both St. Mary and West Glacier with the usual national park visitor messages. KSKR-1450 Whitefish appears to be silent. KLCY-930 gave an "East Missoula" ID, suggesting they are now fulltime. On 8-6 we were in Spokane, where 1380 is still silent. They've been so for years; wouldn't their license be in jeopardy? (Shh; don't tell! -pls) In fact, KSYY-1550 Opportunity (ex-KXXR, which was MYL) announced they were operating "10 am to 10 pm," the minimum hours to keep a fulltime license; perhaps a bankruptcy thing similar to 1390 Denver? Opinion: If the FCC grants night power to the U. S. clear daytimers and those on regional channels, there will be less demmand for AM's to add expensive nighttime facilities, with or without a frequency change, especially in metropolitan areas. Why should a station like Boise 950, Spokane 1380, Spokane 1440/1550, Burien 800/820, Denver 1390, overextend itself by buying expensive land for a nighttime array, then not gain enough audience to pay for it and go broke? If a station can keep its daytime antenna and just drop in a power-reducing resistor to cover its city at night, especially for those stations with a fulltime FM already, that seems like the way to go. I've seen some loggings of new 24-hour activity on a few U. S. clears. Are these errors, or has the FCC authorized the night operations as proposed in the 6-8-87 AM Switch?

Hopefully, I'll have some good tips in upcoming weeks, here and in DDXD-West. 73 and good DX.

Greetings to all. The convention is over, so I thought that I should grace the hallowed pages of the Muse column so Paul could at least ponder my existence, hi. The convention went realy well, with a total of 45 in attendance. The club

received a lot of free press in the form of radio and television coverage. We even went national when Willard Scott talked about the National Radio Club on NBC's Today Show. Two members from the DX Audio Service attended and have confirmed that they will be in Milwaukee next year. Tours went well, and both Chief Engineers of Lima's two AM stations were generally impressed with the knowledge and the technical ability of the club's members. I would aso like to thank those, who are unknown to me, who wrote to both Dick Knowles and Ray Allen thanking them for their time to allow them in to see the stations. There were several high points of the convention. The first was obviously the food. For those that did not attend, it was an all-you-can-eat buffet on Saturday night and Sunday morning. I heard Bob Walker mention something about "smokin' bones", so I have to assume that everyone got their fill! The other high point was the little station we had, which was mostly automated. Saturday night was crazy with live programming and a special appearance by none other than Dr. Johnny from Pittsburgh (who?). By the way, John, my cassette wasn't running during that time; how about we swap airchecks? I did manage to get (3) C-90's scoped on the "personalities" on WNRC. (When will Weasel Whiz Beer appear in a friendly store near me, Fred? -pls) The Flyswatter, aka Ted Fleischaker, did a real good job on the NRC auction, despite a sore throat and a long auction. To my knowledge the only problem was a discontented non-member to the club (Sign 'im up and put 'im to work! -pls), but the club made a little money and everyone had a great time, and I feel that that's what made this convention a success. After all, these things are for us to get together and meet each other, have a good time, and talk hobby. If we wanted to raise hell we would be attending the Bork hearings, right? Well, enough of conventions; I'll see all you guys next year in Milwaukee, and possibly in Toledo in '89, hi.

DX here has been very nil. I have been having a very strange problem here at my OTH. There is severe AC line noise in our neighborhood which makes any DX'ing or ham radio work impossible! The Ohio Power Company will be out in a week to help me trace it. The noise, which is almost like alternator whine, runs from 150 kHz, all the way up to 200 mHz! It's intermittent, which makes it hard to trace, and is audible even thru loca AM's and FM's! On my ham rig, when it happens, the interference will read S-9 to 20 over 9. In talking to Ohio Power's expert on tracking of this sort of thing, he offered the following advice. Don't try using an AM radio to trace interference. The propagation in the lower frequencies makes it impossible to track. Use a portable radio which can tune the aircraft band (116 to 136 mHz/AM), which has some sort of S-meter, and if possible a method of using a dipole antenna. You are able to track it easier this way. Noise like this, according to Ohio Power, is usually the result of (a) bad insulators on poles, (b) loose connections on primary taps at the transformer, and(c) loose grounds on theneutral side of the high kV line. They can also be the result of heating pads, aquarium heaters, AC light dimmers using triacs, welders, or defective gas pilot light starters. As a rule of thumb, the problem is usually located within 1 mile of your home. Another suggestion ... if you own your own home, place your radio (air or standard BCB AM) above your breaker box. Turn off the main disconnect to the entire house. This will confirm if the source of the noise is in your house or coming from outside. This whole problem, which first started 4 months ago, is particularly frustrating since I have been working on a new loop for DX'ing. Tests indicated a good performance, and I hope to have it out soon, but I can't even null this \$#&# noise which is all over the neighborhood. I'm sure Mike will mention something about the loop when it is ready for release. Projections will be 2-3 weeks after the interference problem is located. Orders will be on a first-come, first-served basis. Recent tests out in the country with a Sony ICF-2010 yielded good nulling of locals 5 to 7 miles away. WIMA can be reduced 39 dB. Finaly to Bill Hale: Yes, I know, report the DX to the column. As soon as the interference is cured I promise to submit. Also, I may submit an article on tracking interference. (That would be of great value, Fred - pls) CUL DE KB8BMO.

(I'm not sure whether Ray intended the following to be a Muse or not, but as it includes interesting historic information, I'm typing it up -pls) I was surprised and saddened to read your Musing about the demise of WREN-1250, one of Kansas' pioneer radio stations. I was wondering if KFKU is still on the air or has it gone off, too? (When I worked briefly at KANU (FM) in the early '70's, I discovered that KFKU was simply a tape produced by the University of Kansas/KANU and sent to WREN, where it was played over their facilities. I haven't had time to do any research yet, but one my students said that WREN went off the air perhaps a day or two before I showed up in early September. I would assume that KFKU is no more, also - pls)

As late as the late WW II years WREN and KFKU could be heard regularly at night in the greater Chicago area. I lived in Congress Park (a section of Brookfied, IL) at that time.

Just two weeks ago I interviewed Bobby Dick, a fine singer of country songs who started on WREN in May 1942, and later worked at WIBW, KFPQ, back to WREN, and then to WHO. We had a great time reliving radio's olden days. Neither one of us knew at that time that WREN was off the air.

I have a WREN Barn Dance program on tape from January 1942.

WJRC-1510 Joliet is now WWHN-1510. I read in some publication that WEAW-1330 is to become WSSY. I'll have to try and listen to that heavy religion to see if it has happened.

The Future of Synchronous AM

by Geary Morrill

Anaheim CA ... Attendees at a technial session on Synchronous AM Transmission found out that benefits of the technology may well be outweighed by the expenses incurred to implement this experimental operation.

Many smaller broadcasters in attendance at the symposium, looking for a cost-effective way to improve deficiencies in their AM patterns short of re-locating their main sites, seemed taken aback by the magnitude of economy presented.

A case in point was the 300 W non-D daytime, 500 W DA nighttime synchronous operation in East Las Vegas, Nevada to supplement 10 kW day, 1 kW might DA-2 primary coverage on 870 kHz from Laughlin, some 60 miles away.

According to Slim Sulvma of Advanced Broadcast Consultants (the consultant to Laughlin Roughrider), the licensee has spent in the neighborhood of \$600,000 to implement the experimental technology.

Initially Laughlin hoped to syn-

chronize carriers precisely, but has settled for independently operating tolerance oscillators due to difficulties experienced in "locking" the carrier frequency of the satellite to the main.

Questions concerning AM stereo operation remain to be answered as well, due to the need for phase as well as frequency coherency for such operation to succeed.

Some encouragement was found in the fact that the area of interference between the two sites-where signal strength from both transmitters approached a unity level—is not as large as theory would indicate.

Once the carrier from the dominant site roughly doubles the "interference" transmitter level, that signal is fully listenable.

Due to the unpopulated area between the experimental synchronous sites, this area is of little concern. In a more populous area of the country, however, this could become a much greater factor.

Al Resnick of CapCities, another panelist on the symposium, explained how a simple synchronous solution for WLS-AM in Chicago was scrapped once a \$60,000 initial price tag was placed on

Guidelines needed

While the technology has been utilized elsewhere in the world, and even in the Northeast US for some time. Wally Johnson, of Moffet, Larson and Johnson, who moderated the panel, indicated that much remains to be resolved regarding FCC guidelines for eventually establishing licensing procedures for such operations

It is unclear whether such facilities should be limited to supplement inadequate coverage within a station's existing market, or allowed to exist as "satellite" TV operations have for years.

Questions regarding current duopoly restrictions and interference contours remain to be addressed as well, according

The Commission is soliciting comments on the issues, technical and legal, brought up by the proposed and existing synchronous experimental opera-
