AM FREEZE

The FCC has finally announced the date the "AM Freeze" will end, April 19, 1992, the same day their new AM technical rules go into effect. The lifting of the freeze will once again allow the FCC to accept applications for major technical facility changes and applications for new AM stations. The one exception to this is the expanded AM broadcast band. Requests for a move to the 1600-1705 kHz band will be accepted during a "filing window" to be announced later. We expect this to not take place until much later this year.

■ One of nation's first commercial radio stations drops music format for news

PITTSBURGH - The last disc jockey on one of the country's bioneer commercial radio stations ended his final show Friday with the song that refers to "the day the music died.

KINGSTON: Plans are underway for the establishment of a religious radio station in Jamaica.

A group called the National Religious Media Company (NRMC) is putting up J\$5.5 million as investment capital for the station.

The company is made up of the Jamaica Council of Churches, Jamaica Association of Evangelicals. Jamaica Pentecostal Union, Jamaica Full Gospel Chuches, Jamaica Union of Seventh Day Adventists and the Church of God in Jamaica.

THE NRMC received its broadcasting licence at a signing ceremony attended by Senator Paul Robertson, the Minister of Public Service and Information.

He said that the government was pleased to grant the licence, since there was a need for more channels through which Jamaicans could express their opinions.

Reverend Orville Neil, who is Chairman of NRMC, said the station is expected to be in operation by June of this year. He said that it is expected to broadcast 24 hours a day, offering a blend of news, music, in formation, discussion and

WOSU dons party hats to toast AM station's 70th anniversary

Take a very deep breath and prepare to blow out a lot of candles, WOSU-AM-FM-TV celebrates the 70th anniversary of its AM radio

On April 24, 1922, Ohio State University's radio station began daibroadcasts -- making it one of the oldest stations in the country and certainly the first to serve the Cohumbus area

"Even people who are 50 years old and grew up in Columbus listen-ing to WOSU don't think about it," ald Dale K. Ouzts, general manager of the WOSU stations. "Someone has been here, all this time, thinking sbout and covering the news. It's kind of acary when you think about

OSU's association with radio dates back even earlier than 1922, etation records indicate. The first recorded use of radio at OSU was in 1919 at its department of electrical

In 1918, OSU wireless operafors, who were the only means of communication between Columbus and the rest of Ohio chiring a great food, worked 70 continuous hours.

In 1920, an experimental license with the call letters 8XL was issued to OSU. The same year, radio operators were hired for limited hours. The next year, student operators were hired to do weather and market reports, university news and other news twice daily.

When the station finally and officially began daily broadcasts in 1922, it did so under other call letters - WEAO, short for Willing, Eager, Athletic Ohio.

William Oxley Thompson, then president of OSU, delivered the inaugural address. Other broadcasting that day included national baseball scores, a news account of a \$10,000 fire in Columbus and some recorded

From then on, the station became part of Columbus' landscape. It covered news and sports, and during the Great Decression it had the only Works Progress Administration orchestra in the country, employing 20 musicians.

During the same period, the station's programs were so popular that as many as 10 commercial stations rebroadcast its educational ma-

WOSU was granted its second 4:30 p.m. from the Fawcett Center

Alarming reports to the contrary, WOSU-AM-FM-TV expects to celebrate not only its AM station's birthday today but also many more.

Ohio State University President Gordon Gee recently mentioned eliminating WOSU as an example of costcutting measures that OSU could take if the state slashed university support.



Radio industry raising its voice

CRTC sits back and listens as broadcasters chart a bolder course for survival

BY JOHN PARTRIDGE Media Reporter

A growing number of radio station owners are taking bolder steps toward solving their economic woes instead of waiting for Canada's broadcasting regulator to spoon-feed them a solution

So far, much of the action has been in Quebec. Its electronic media have been hit especially hard in the recession, which has accelerated a long-term decline in radio's financial fortunes, especially on the AM band.

The latest example came last week, when rivals Telemedia Inc. and Radiomutuel Inc. announced they are taking the unprecedented step of, in effect, merging management at two of their AM stations.

The two Montreal-based broadcasters have set up a jointly owned company to run the stations - Telemedia's CJMT-AM in Chicoutimi and CKRS-AM in nearby Jonquière. which Radiomutuel is buying from Radio Saguenay Liée.

The object, Telemedia and Radiomutuel said, is to ensure the survival of AM radio in Quebec's Saguenay region.

Behind the station owners' new push to sort themselves out is a greater willingness by the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission to let them do

This appears to stem partly from the fact that the CRTC is understaffed and overworked. But it also is a result of heavy lobbying by the Canadian Association of Broadcasters

for looser, more flexible regulation The CAB acknowledged the regulator's changed attitude in a letter to radio station members this month

"There is definitely receptivity to change on the part of the commission," it said. "The fact is that many stations have moved to rationalize their operations in ways that nobody thought the CRTC would have easily accepted a couple of years ago.

The economic backdrop is a decade-long financial slump in radio that culminated in 1990 with a collective loss among the country's approximately 500 private stations of \$26-million, on revenue of about \$790-million

The decline has flowed mostly from a falling share of advertising and greater competition, not least because of the CRTC's licencing of a host of FM stations, which have captured listeners and admitisers from

All this has proved too much for some owners

One veteran radio briker said he has never seen so many stations for sale at one time. In a single week last November, for example, 14 went on the block.

Diane Rheaume, acting directorgeneral of the CRTC's radio division, generally concurred that there has been a shift in attitude on both sides of the regulatory fence.

But she indicated that the CRTC concerned about communities being left with no local radio service, is no ready to countenance what some

broadcasters see as the simplest so- ative steps to avoid outright shutlution: the wholesale shutdown of unprofitable stations

We can't let stations close down from one end of the country to the

There is little the CRTC can do to prevent station shutdowns when they occur. However, it does have plenty of leverage to make life difficult for broadcasters who pull the plug, once those same broadcasters return before the CRTC on other

As it happens, one of the proposals CAB made in what it called a survival strategy for private radio that it submitted to Ottawa last fall was broadcasters be allowed to shut down stations without fear of CRTC retaliation.

Some have been willing to take the risk without this assurance, espe-

Only about 10 days ago, Power Broadcasting Ltd., a subsidiary of the Desmarais family's giant Montreal-based Power Corp., closed its Shawinigan, Que., AM station

That was the fifth station killed off in the province in a little more than a year, with Telemedia accounting for one and Cogeco Inc., also based in Montreal, for two. Elsewhere, one other station has closed during the same period - CFIQ-AM in Harbour Grace, Nfld.

Telemedia, which owns a total of 27 stations in Quebec and Ontario, and Radiomutuel, which owns 13 in Quebec, had already taken other cre-

Acting on another CAB proposal. Radiomutuel, for instance, has converted its French-language AM station in Sherbrooke, Que., CJRS, from a fully staffed originating station into a rebroadcaster for its Montreal flagship station CJMS.

Telemedia last fall struck a similar deal with Toronto-based Standard Broadcasting Ltd., by which it converted its money-losing Sherbrooke English-language station CKTS-AM into a rebroadcaster for Standard's Montreal station CJAD-AM. As part of the deal, CJAD expanded its news and weather coverage to include Sherbrooke.

Like other broadcasters. Telemedia also is looking to cut costs through greater use of automation and syndicated and network pro-

One initiative it has under way is converting five AM stations in central and Northern Ontario to the same country and western format James McCoubrey, president and chief executive officer, said in a telephone interview. Instead of having a program director at each station putting together playlists, the company now has centralized this.

"Ît's not just a matter of cost re duction," Mr. McCoubrey said. "We believe we can do a better job . . . if we combine resources and program the stations from one place. We're trying to put out a better product less

THE QUANTUM LOOP

A COMPACT, HIGH-GAIN FERRITE ROD ANTENNA

Gerry Thomas

With the price of ferrite rods going through the roof, I decided to see if I could design a loop antenna using a minimum of ferrite and a maximum of amplifier. The result of this experimentation is a loop I call the *Quantum Loop* ("quantum" - a small packet of energy; "loop" -- well, you know loop).

Whereas most loop amplifiers for antennas using 10"-16" rods put out between 15 dB and 25 dB of gain, my more modest 8" rod antenna would require an additional 6-12 dB of gain. So, I was shooting for amplification in the 30-35 dB range. As it turned out, I was able to design an amp that delivers between 42-48 dB of gain across its tuning range. Of course, this degree of amplification would be of little benefit if you had 20 dB of amplifier hiss to go along with it. So, low-noise components were chosen and the result is quite satisfying. Also, because this level of gain is not always desirable (overloading problems can occur in receivers with lesser front-ends/mixers), a gain control was included in the design.

In addition to the preceding requirements, I also have a few preferences of my own regarding loop operation: (1) I prefer the tuning knob to be on the stationary loop base and not on the revolving loop head; (2) I like a loop head which rotates continuously (without stops) and, of course, tilts; (3) I also wanted a loop head that was removable so that the antenna could easily be placed in a suitcase; and (4) for the sake of domestic tranquility, I desired a finished loop which looked sufficiently attractive to spare me from the critical comments which loops usually evoke from my wife.

BRIEF DESCRIPTION




Figure 1. Quantum Loop dimensions.

The Quantum Loop measures approximately 10°(H) x 7°(D) x 8-1/2°(W) at its maximum points (see Figure 1). The loop head housing is constructed of black plexiglas and is connected to the black, sloped-front amplifier base by a chromed tube pedestal. The amplifier is a two-stage, balanced input/unbalanced output design with low-noise JFETs in the first stage and a low-noise MOSFET in the second; both stages are arranged in a commonsource configuration.

The loop tunes from 530 kHz to 2000 kHz in two ranges and has a variable gain control and on/off switch. Power is supplied by either a 9VDC battery or an AC wall adapter (switch selectable). Figure 2 shows the front panel lay-out.



CONSTRUCTION DETAILS

Be aware that the construction of the *Quantum Loop* is LABOR INTENSIVE! If this project is beyond your available time or abilities, see the last paragraph of this article.

A. Loop Head Housing --




Figure 3. Loop housing panel dimensions.

The overall dimensions of the housing are $8-1/2"(L) \times 1-3/4"(H) \times 2-1/2"(D)$. The Quantum Loop's ferrite housing is constructed of black plexiglas; all panels are 1/8" thick with the exception of the base panel which is a sturdier 3/16" in thickness. The pieces are cut to the dimensions illustrated in Figure 3.

One hole (1/8" diameter) is drilled in the base panel to allow the passage of the loop coil's wires down to the amplifier base and two 3/16" holes are drilled to permit the fastening of the tilting assembly. The panels are glued together to form the box-like housing with the front panel left off until the rod/coil assembly is installed.

B. Tilt Assembly --




Figure 4. Tilt, pedestal, and plug assembly.

The tilt assembly is constructed of the stationary part of a Radio Shack microphone holder (#33-371). Remove the screws holding the two parts of the holder together and discard the upper part and the screws. Drill out the center of the holder to allow the passage of the coil wires to the 1/4" phone plug (to be installed later). Tap the holes which held the pivoting portion of the holder with a 5/16" tap to accept two 5/16" x 3/8" cap screws. Use two 1/2" angle brackets to form the platform upon which the base of housing will be attached and fasten to the tapped mike holder with the tap screws (nylon washers can be added to make tilting smoother, if you wish). The holes in the angle brackets will have to be enlarged and the right angles of one end rounded to permit unobstructed tilting. Figure 4 illustrates the tilt

Figure 4 illustrates the tilt assembly, the chromed tube pedestral, and phone plug bearing.

C. Chrome Pedestal and Base --

The chrome tube pedestal is a threaded microphone tube and screws into the

microphone holder (preceding section). I bought the 6" model (Atlas Sound AD-8B) and cut it in half to provide a 3" pedestal. I also used a chrome base collar (Atlas Sound AD-11B) to add lateral stability. Unfortunately, these collars have an interior thread which must be removed by filing or reaming before the pedestal tube can rotate freely. Because the chrome tube is grounded and because it shares ground with loop coil and electronic circuitry, it is noticeably "RF hot" in some situations (e.g., deep nulls). To remedy this, I slid a 1-1/2" length of 5/8" (ID) clear vinyl tubing onto the tube to insulate it and provide a comfortable grip for loop head rotation.

D. Phone Plug Bearing --

The loop head rotates on a standard 1/4" phone jack which has been epoxied into the interior of the chrome tube (see Figure 4). Wires from the loop coil are routed down through the microphone holder and chrome tube and are soldered to the plug's terminals. Don't waste your time with the Taiwanese/Korean/Japanese phone plugs and jacks; they are generally constructed of inferior materials and will break or wear out in relatively short order. Use only American-made Switchcraft components (#12B and #297); they are heavy, nickel-plated brass and are still going strong after six years in my loops.

E. Loop Amplifier Base --

I chose a sloped-front aluminum cabinet (which allows more comfortable tuning) to house the loop's amplifier. The LMB752 (from Mouser) fits the bill nicely but comes in a beige/tan color scheme which I changed to satin black. First, mount the Switchcraft 1/4" phone jack in the center of the top of the cabinet, then mount the chrome collar (which reinforces the chrome pedestal) so that it too is centered (sheet metal screws are fine). Drill holes in the rear of the cabinet to accommodate the battery holder, patch cord connection, and AC adapter jack and install these components. The other holes in the cabinet depend on your lay-out of the electronic circuitry, so I won't give specific dimensions for those. I have found the sloped front of the cabinet to be ergonomically effective in permitting fine tuning knob adjustments and reducing arm/wrist fatigue so a sloped front cabinet is definitely recommended.

F. Amplifier Details --




Figure 5. Loop amplifier schematic.

Figure 5 provides the schematic of the loop amplifier. Parts lay-out is not particularly critical as long as straight-line design and minimal lead length principles are followed.

VC1 is a dual-ganged, 15-266 pF polyvaricon variable capacitor (Mouser # 24WC001) with the two gangs connected to provide a capacitance range of about 30-530 pF. (This capacitor requires a shaft extension — a .625" x .25" nylon spacer glued and held in place by a 2.5mm x .75" machine screw; VC1 must be mounted on a plastic base). C1 is a 470 pF silver mica capacitor which is switched across VC1 to allow low-end tuning. The signals from the rotor and stator tabs of the VC1 are routed to the gates of Q1 and Q2. Transistors Q1 and Q2 are J310 JFETS. These are extremely low noise devices and provide approximately 20 dB of gain across the tuning range. They are arranged in a common source configuration with source by-pass capacitance (C2 and C3). The signal is taken of

the drain of one transistor and capacitively coupled (C4) to Gate 1 of Q3. Transistor Q3 is a dual-gate, diode protected, low-noise MOSFET (40673); it, too, is in the common source configuration with gain being controlled at the source by R7. [NOTE: After designing and testing this circuit, I learned that Motorola and RCA were ceasing production of the 40673 MOSFET; the recommended substitute is the 3N201, but I have not yet tried it]. L2 is an inductor measuring 820 uH which resonates with the stray capacitance of the components and circuit to provide an amplification peak at the low end of the tuning range. Actually any choke in the 800 - 1200 uH range should be suitable because the stray capacitances can vary a bit depending on a number of factors. The output of Q3 is taken off the drain and is capacitively coupled to the output jack for connection to the receiver. You may notice that there is no impedance matching network or low impedance emitter-follower circuitry in this amplifier design. The gain of the amplifier is such that I decided to design for a medium impedance output to adequately match either high (500-1000 Ohm) or low (50 Ohm) receiver inputs. The gain of the Quantum Loop is sufficiently high that I didn't feel it was worth it to perfectly match impedances to gain a couple of dB.

G. Coil Winding/Ferrite Rod --

The ferrite rod I used has a permeability of 125 mu and is 8" in length and 3/8" in diameter. The coil is of litz wire (64") resulting in 31 turns (with a center tap at turn 16) on a 1/2" polystyrene coil form (this tubing is available from aquarium supply houses). If you are using the more popular Amidon 7-1/2" rod, you will need 66-68" of litz and 33 turns to cover the tuning range. The overall inductance of the coil is 100 uH when centered on the ferrite rod. It is extremely important that both legs (to ground) be exactly equal in inductance in order to attain perfect loop balance. (An inductance meter is invaluable here and is well worth the \$125-\$150 outlay to the inveterate experimenter.) The coil's center tap and ends are soldered to a three-lug terminal strip mounted in the loop housing and RG-174U coax continues the signal path out of the housing, down the chrome tube to terminate on the lugs of the 1/4" phone jack. RG-174U coax then routes the signal from the jack to the circuit board and the rotor and stator of VC1. Equal lengths of coax from each side of the coil must be used throughout this routing to preserve the balance of the coil.

The ferrite rod/coil assembly is shock-mounted in a length of pipe insulating foam (available from hardware stores) which fits snugly in the loop housing. At this point, you can wrap a width of conductive tape (aluminum or copper) 3/4ths of the way around the foam which, when connected to the terminal strip's ground lug, will provide shielding for the loop. Quite frankly, I've found that shielded loops work only in certain situations and generally reduce the coil's Q (and therefore, loop gain) so, there's a trade-off.

- H. <u>Power Supply</u> The <u>Quantum Loop</u> requires 9VDC which can be supplied by either a 9-volt battery or a 9-volt AC adapter and can be selected by a front panel-mounted switch. The <u>Quantum Loop</u> draws between 10 and 15 mA which is about 2X-3X the current requirements of some of my earlier amplifiers but, nonetheless, a 9-volt battery should last a fair length of time.
- I. Signal Output The output of the JFET/MOSFET amplifier is routed to a cabinet-mounted jack and ultimately fed via cable to the receiver. Over the years I must have tried about two dozen different kinds of patch cables. It's been my experience that in loop applications the impedance of these cables is irrelevant. I've used everything from 50 Ohm coax to high impedance microphone cable and have never been able to discern any difference at all. What is important, however, is the amount of shielding the cable possesses. Coax cable shielding runs from about 70% to 100%; choose 100% shielded cable and your site/night/vertical effects will be minimized. The best cable I've found is computer Local Area Network trunk cable such as "Ethernet." Unfortunately, this stuff is really expensive and hard to find in short lengths. There exists 100% shield RG-8/M, RG-58, and various microphone cables; use one of these.

LOOP OPERATION

A. Set-up -- Plug the loop head fully into the amplifier base and connect the patch cable to both the loop base and receiver. Install a 9-volt battery or plug in the AC adapter and

turn the loop and receiver on. Position the loop away from the radio's digital display (if it has one) and as far away from electrical wiring and other antennas as is practical. Positioning the *Quantum Loop* too near radios with poorly shielded cabinets (e.g., portables) could result in antenna/circuitry interactions and a resulting oscillation.

- B. <u>Tuning</u> -- The <u>Quantum Loop</u> tunes in two ranges: 530-700 kHz in the "L" position; and 700-2000 kHz in the "H" position. In lieu of a vernier tuning dial, I opted for a dual diameter tuning knob. This is nothing more than a skirted knob measuring 1-1/2" at the skirt and about 7/8" at the grip. The smaller diameter grip allows for fast tuning while tuning by using the wider skirt permits easier fine tuning. Tuning of the <u>Quantum Loop</u> is very sharp and should be done carefully.
- C. Gain Setting -- The Quantum Loop possesses more than adequate gain for most of my DXing situations. I've found that most radios (at least those I own) tend to perform best if the station of interest is producing no higher than an S-9 on the S-meter. Running the Quantum Loop so that most signals are in this ball park will take a load off your radio's front-end and mixer. As you are adjusting the gain, you will notice that the range of adjustment does not allow you to completely eliminate moderately strong and strong stations. This was a design decision on my part because I've never had the need to completely eliminate the signal (via gain setting) of a desired station. A brouhaha by users, however, would cause me to change the design. On a related topic, the dynamic range of the front-end J310 JFETs is in excess of 100 dB (according to the manufacturer and my own tests). I've not measured the present JFET/MOSFET amplifier for dynamic range because I've only used it in loop applications where signal levels are pitifully low.
- D. <u>Nulling</u> I usually position the loop so that my elbow rests on the desktop and my fingers grip and rotate either the insulated vinyl tube or the microphone holder; I don't use the loop housing to rotate the antenna because the height is a little less comfortable and because the added leverage could strain the plug/jack.

To null weak to moderately strong stations, simply rotate the antenna for a minimum signal. As the null approaches, slow down, the null is very sharp and the deepest null is at a single point in the semi-circular rotation. On strong stations, especially locals in the daytime, it will probably be necessary to both rotate and tilt the loop. For this, I usually grip the loop housing to simultaneously tilt and rotate the loop. Here too, the deepest null will occur at a precise combination of tilt and rotation. I have no problem completely eliminating all of my locals but the strongest is only 10 kW; it is possible that a station producing unusual signal polarization will resist all attempts at nulling. Luckily, these stations are fairly rare.

On a related note: If the Quantum Loop is constructed as described, i.e., ensuring identical inductances in each leg of the coil path, you will end up with a nearly perfectly balanced loop (except for the fact that I've found a very slight measureable difference in the rotor's and stator's capacitances to ground). If you were to operate this loop far from antennas, housing wiring, metal cabinets, etc., the two opposite nulls would be virtually identical in depth and exactly 180 degrees apart. However, this ideal DXing location is not the typical one. Consequently, depending upon your location, you may find one null to be slightly deeper than the other and one null to be slightly skewed by a few degrees. In practical DXing terms, there's little you can do about this.

E. Routine Maintenance – I've been using this basic design since about 1986 with no major failures. About the only thing I do to maintain the loop is occasionally remove the loop head from the amplifier base and clean and lubricate the phone plug with WD-40. I similarly clean and lubricate the stabilizing collar on the top of the base periodically.

All in all, I'm quite satisfied with the overall design and performance of the *Quantum Loop* but am open to suggestions for improvement. As I mentioned earlier, this is a very labor intensive construction project which requires tools and test equipment that may not be available to everyone. For this reason, I've assembled the components to make about 20 *Quantum Loops*. The price for one of these initial 20 is \$125 (plus \$4 UPS). This includes the AC adapter, patch cord, and connector of your choice (specify standard UHF, BNC, RCA, or alligator clips). You can contact me at 3635 Chastain Way, Pensacola, FL 32504.



News of the industry, of interest to DX'ers

Greetings and salutations, all static fans! Time again for more news of the industry, of interest to DXers ... In light of the demise of the Birch radio ratings service, Willhight Research has decided to make its service available nationwide. Willhight is a 10-year-old Seattle-based ratings firm which regularly surveys many Northwestern markets. Willhight says it has no plans to provide a nationwide service such as that provided by Birch; rather, it will survey a market only if there is station support for its service. Willhight uses a 24-hour telephone recall method with larger-than-normal sample sizes. For example, in Yakima County, WA, Arbitron bases its ratings survey on a 350diary sample, while Willhight's in-tab sample size there is 1,000. The company's research is also rather detailed, asking respondents for call letters, band and dial position, city, format, slogans, special programs, and DJ names ... On a related note, Arbitron has listed WPLJ-FM NYC below the line in the fall '91 ratings. Though no ratings distortion occurred, Arbitron stated that "radiothon" promotions which blend discussion of ratings from prior surveys with requests for listener support and/or statements emphasizing the importance of ratings, have the potential to create bias in current or future surveys." I see WPLJ has finally dropped the "Mojo" moniker. Guess they figured out nobody knows (or cares) what it's supposed to mean ... Mom and Pop radio stations could become separate entities as a result of an FCC ruling late in February. The Commission abolished its policy that the media holdings of one marriage partner are automatically attributable to the other, unless the spouses prove that they maintain separate careers and don't exert control over each other's media

holdings. Spousal relationships will now be treated the same as other family relationships, the bottom line being that Mom and Pop may now compete within the same market! ... An update on WJDM-1530, Elizabeth, NJ's bide for going full-time: The NI congressional delegation recently tacked a rider onto telemarketing legislation which requires the FCC to find a way to get larger-market daytimers on the air at night. The daytimer must be the only station in a city of more than 100,000, and the city must be within the FCCrecognized service contours of a protected clear-channel AM on an U. S.-controlled frequency, to qualify for the legislation. According to research by Radio Business Report and the M Street Journal, only two other stations might benefit: KIDZ-1510 Independence, MO, and WUFL-1030, Sterling Heights, MI. WJDM owner John Quinn says he doesn't expect to get nighttime authorization in the current AM band. Instead, "I want to be the first station authorized in the new, expanded AM band." ... And lastly, the FCC has been asked to reconsider some provisions of the recentlyintroduced AM rule change package. A major problem, according to the Association of Fed. Comm. Consulting Engineers, is the "10% Rule", requiring any AM station that wants to increase power or move its tower to cut its signal radiation by 10% in the direction of all stations within a few hundred miles, even if it is not presently required to protect such stations. AFCCE says this new rule "will discourage facilities changes that could be beneficial to the AM industry."

Is AM Dying? ... via César Objío

What you are about to read is the translation of one article published in a Santo domingo newspaper related to radio, more exactly to Medium Wave, or AM as it is named now, even though it does not say so directly, with its importance being diminished by television and FM, and its becoming more and more outdated or obsolete, as it has been mentioned in other clippings from U. S. newspapers I have read in DX News.

Who Pays Attention to the Radio? by José Luis Sáez, S. J. (from El Siglo, March 10, 1992

Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic)

Perhaps This is a bad selection for a title to this little article. To the reader, if there is anyone who might read it, perhaps he would have liked to ask: "Who listens to the radio?" "Who hears the radio while doing something else?" That expression, "pays attention", is the same as saying that nobody pays attention to the radio at all, because listeners have lost the faith they had in it. Maybe the reader is right, although if that is his reasoning, he reveals himself as a nominalist, and, for that reason, he would like to start useless arguments.

It is of no importance what is the meaning or where that expression "pays attention" leads to. In a vulgar language we have always said that we should not hear what is being said, but just that: "nobody pays attention to it."

The world radio, and, in the same way, our radio, have entered since some years ago into a new stage in its commercial history, which is already seventy years old. Television, and in some cases, the same flat press, have been forced to renew itself or just adopt a new style and, probably, a new objective.

When I was a child, and I hope I am not the only one who has had that experience, radio was a household instrument which completed the winter evenings around the heater, and to many it was the beginning of sleeping. When there were still readers, and the soap operas had already started, based on second-hand literature, radio challenged but it did not reject the community reading. At least in my home, after listening to the radio versions of three or four novels, we used to read those same novels in groups, perhaps with the intention of checking if the radio novel was as exact as the original. So, that way we read, for instance, "Sinfonía Pastoral" by Armando Palacio Valdes, "Marianela" by Benito Pérez Galsós, and "Cristina Guzmán",

one of those big books as we used to call them today, by Carmen de Icaza. [Those are famous Spanish novels -C. O.]

Interview programs had not yet been introduced, and we did not know what a panel was, except for that thing tat separates once space from another one. "The round table" was not yet conceived, and the newsreels, in spite of being entitled as "the spoken daily news", did not go beyond the government opinion. That is the reason why for a long time people denominated these newsreels as "the part" (or the report), remind you that something like this used to be broadcast during the war, any war.

As radio wanted to be everywhere, some dramas were broadcast directly from the stage. I think that all those interested in it, and I was one of them, had to develop their imagination, as the only thing that the speaker did was to read the cast, and, then in a low voice, describe the setting before saying goodby until the intermission.

A long time later, radio defined its social role, its finality and style. No doubt that the newspapers must have been one of the decisive factors for the new stage of radio. The same had happened with documental films; the Second World War made radio a very fast and more trusted source of information and a lot more when it came from a foreign radio station.

Since then, and still more when several countries lived in a stage of political freedom or just tolerance, radio ratified its role of a trusted communicator. Due to the lack, then, of portable recording equipment, and, with a great deal of imagination, radio information won its place with rapidity and even with dynamism. When the speaker said: "Now we connect with our microphones installed at the place of the action," the family seated at the table ordered the forks to be quiet, and we all looked toward the receiver, as if in this way the news could be heard much better. We don't know why but the ear required the eye in order to catch much better what was being said.

When television entered in a real competence with radio - and much more now when we have other resources of simultaneous transmissions - the second one had to question itself seriously what was its real work. And one of its salvation boards was to become a "background music station", because it could do this better than anybody else. because of that, radio, during the sixties and seventies, starts to change its face and becomes a simple broadcaster of music for all tastes, only interrupted by the announcer who

speaks at the same volume of that music and then the unavoidable set of commercials.

With that kind of radio, the traveling companion, or just as a work complement, who is going to pay any attention to it? Who is going to stop and listen as we did during the forties? And finally, who is going to care for that?

In our country, in order to stay alive, our radio (meaning AM radio) has dedicated its time to several well-defined programs: newsreels, world and local news during the day and at special times: in the morning before going to work and while you are preparing yourself to leave for work, later after six o'clock when you are supposed to arrive home. In the afternoons and evenings, presentation of major league baseball

games during the U.S. season or in our winter season; local basketball games or NBA or old romantic music, nostalgia-wise, for the older people who still dream with they bygone times, remembering those beautiful songs they used to sing or listen to during their youth, avoiding the actual rock or disco music which makes no sense for them. Because of this, many local stations have been sold to religious groups, as the owners have seen themselves in bankruptcy and no longer able to support the stations, all advertisements going to TV or stereophonic FM. And these religious groups, as they collect a steady quota from their members, they always have enough money to support a radio station and spend the whole day and night with their talks and religious

A New Tune For Radio: Hard Times

HOUGH a dedicated optimist, Randall Harris looks out from his tiny AM radio station in Sarasotis, Fla., and periodically wonders whether survival is possible. When his father bought WSP it wo years ago to air classical music, the station was so unprofitable that its former owner had turned off the transmitter. Since then, at least two other stations in the city have "gone dark," in industry jargon, and two more broadcast on and off as their owners search for successful formats.

Robot Stations

But the Government refused to order the industry to adopt a particular standard in the early 188%, and broadcasters became split between two rival technical approaches. disers rely more on national advertising than local radio. What may be the biggest challenge yet is still on the horizon: digital radio, which proponents say can offer the clarity of compact disks and may be broadcast from satellities within the next several years.

Yet, Just as the advent of television failed to stop the growth of radio, and just as videocassette recorders hardly spelled the end of movie theaters, radio continues to have certain unique advantages. It is cheap, local and, at least for now, the only form of broadcasting most people can

MARK CONNELLY - 30 WILLIAMS ROAD - BILLERICA, MA 01821-6079 Local stuff first - WMVU "News 900" is on from Nashua, NH w/a news/sports/talk format. It is probably using the facilities of long silent WOTW, the signal is about the same as that from WOTW's old 1 kw rig. They clearly dominate the channel here days, way o/WCLZ (ME). WCLZ can only be brought in clearly by phasing or looping WMVU. WKPE-1170 has been off for a while now, I'm not sure if this is permanent. I miss them as I liked their rock and because they were useful here for judging performance of antenna systems on signal paths to the eastern Caribbean and Brazil. If they were loud compared to stations in the "pest" direction (eg: west), a given Antenna-Under-Test would clear up during an aurora. With both WKPE S WJCC gone, 1170 is now fairly empty here days (line noise is heard). Maybe pre-sunset 1170 TA's will be more likely now. I'll have to check out 1170 throughout the day from a good beach/saltmarsh location such as Salisbury, MA. WNSH-1570 is still off - maybe forever! WUDK (ex-WOCB) has been on with CNN News format for a while, it dominates 1240 w/WOON/WFTN in the background. For the last few months, local WUNR-1600 seems to have dropped power considerably (perhaps to 1 kw or less from former 5 kw). WUNR used to be within 3 db of WNTN-1550 but now it is at least 10 db weaker. WLNG can be heard days more easily in a loop or phaser null. AT night, even within 15 miles of the Newton WUNR transmitter, interference from WWAL can be bad. Recent activities: I've been more active at DX-project building/testing than dial twisting. Conditions haven't been too


