50 years ago ... from the March 8, 1947 DXN:
Several members reported tests from WBCC, BethesdaChevy Chase, MD on 1120 and 1420 kHz to check the
feasibility of 30 kHz separation of stations in the same
area instead of the current 40 kHz ... from the March 15
DXN: It was suggested that DX'ers write to the editor of
Broadcasting encouraging all-night stations to remain
silent on Monday mornings to permit frequency checks
and equipment tests from new stations to be heard.
However, member Al Maley believed that there weren't
enough DX'ers to make their weight felt with the FCC.

25 years ago ... from the March 11, 1972 DXN: César Objío profiled Radio Mil-1180, Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic ... from the March 18 DXN: fire ripped through Gordon P. Nelson's house, but club "vitals" were rescued by Cary Pall and Big George Kelley shortly after the fire.

10 years ago ... from the March 9, 1987 DXN: Walt Breville reported that the Kenwood Multi-system AM stereo tuner sold for \$999, and the Kenwood KRC-8001 C-QUAM cassette/receiver sold for \$450.

#### THE DAY THE AXE FELL

As we are all aware the deadline for stations that were silent for more than a year to return to the air was February 8th. As you can see above many stations have returned albeit with some dubious programming schemes. During that period were were traveling to Florida and had a chance to observe what some stations have done to keep their license. Several appear to have lashed something together to get on the air for a day or so. Both WALD-1080 and WWFL-1340 were heard tracking albums with very bad audio and low power. WALD had faded out less than 10 miles from Walterboro. Two subsequent checks made while in Clermont showed WWFL must have been on no more than two days before going silent again. WALD was gone a week later. WCGA-1100 (call stands for Wonderful Coastal GA) was tracking albums but with beautiful audio and a great signal and was still on two weeks later. We were treated to an entire Henry Mancini Greatest Hits CD on WCGA followed by the entire Peter Gunn soundtrack album (must be a big Mancini fan here) and occasional announcements.

Stations that we were close enough to to hear if they had been on that were not heard included WBEU-960, WACL-570, WJZS-1150 and WNFO-1430. I assume these may all be victims. According to the FCC, 32 of the 87 AM stations on the "kill" list have expired. 59 stations have received a STA (Special Temporary Authority) to operate with modified facilities in order to return to the air. These stations appear to have forestalled their fate since the FCC is allowing a short grace period to stations with STA status and expects them to return to the air "in relatively short order". The question of how long a station must operate upon returning to be considered in full operation is unclear. But this quote from Stuart Bedell, assistant chief of the FCC Audio Services Division may shed some light. "In those cases where it appears or seems very clear that someone went on the air strictly as an evasive tactic or strictly to buy themselves another year, and it appears to be an abuse of our processes and procedures we still have the right and ability to issue orders to show cause why the licenses shouldn't be revoked because of their silent status." According to an article in Radio World the FCC sent letters to stations still thought to be silent. These stations have 30 days to document that operations have resumed. If the Commission doesn't hear from a station in that time the call will be deleted and the station will be removed from the Commission records. And of course there is always the possibility that a new prospective licensee can apply for a new station to replace facilities that are deleted. We haven't seen a list of the deleted stations yet because of the 30-day answer period. Hopefully in the next issue or two we should have an idea who made it and who didn't.

Changes in programming status; reported by listeners

This column is quite late partly because of the following personal note - Dad died on 10-16 in Auburn, ME, after a long illness, He died peacefully, with no pain at the age of 82, after a wonderful life of traveling all over the world. Of course we will miss him greatly. I had made lots of trips to Maine in the past few months, to be with and help him as much as I could, and while en route, have heard the following items of interest. On Bob Bittner's "Let's Talk about Radio", I heard that one person could legally own all of the few AM radio stations in Maine (if one wished to do so!), with the exception of the Portland market, where six AM stations operate, 1150 in Boston is now WROR, with the Kidstar pre teen format aired (the most common word heard on WROR is "cool"!). It was noted on Bob Bittner's program, on WJIB-740, that of 1200 youngsters surveyed, 1198 had never heard of their local kids' radio programming outlet, one "used to listen", and the 1200th stopped listening because the format delivery was "silly" (true!).

In the metro New York area, WXMC-1310, Parsippany, NJ, has dropped its adult standards for a Spanish contemporary format. This is interesting in that the extremely directional signal from four in line towers off I-80 goes away from New York and Paterson. No doubt WXMC is trying to serve the small Hispanic populations in Morristown and Dover, NJ

On FM, New England's highest FM station, WZPK-103.7, Berlin, with transmitter atop 6280 foot Mt Washington, now simulcasts WOKQ-97.5, Dover, with country music. And here is a bountiful column, with plenty of changes (many to a satellite-fed adult standard format), courtesy of the M Street Journal.

According to the M Street Journal WKBR-1250, Manchester, NH, has a new owner, who will replace Bob Bitner's easy listening with a mix of talk and adult contemporary music. Congratulations, however, to Bob who has added WNEB to his "network". WNEB is simulcasting WJIB-740, with a dual ID on the hour.

WMMW-1470, here in Meridan, CT, has been totally brokered to a Spanish outfit in Waterbury. The owner, whose air name is "El Principe", in a burst of modesty, airs a "tropical" format -"tropical' being defined as a mix of meringue, salsa, slow romantic ballads, and one urban contemporary song per hour, mixed with hip hop. WMMW ID's as "La Brava 1470" or 'The Fierce One" (makes one really want to listen). The station runs paid Spanish religion nightly from 9:00pm until 6:00am. And Spanish will soon flow from WNEZ-910, New Britain, which has been sold to Mega Broadcasting for \$750,000. These two stations join at least nine other fully Spanish AM stations in the New Haven, Waterbury, Hartford, Springfield area.

In Boston, WBNW-590 has been sold for six million dollars to Salem Communications, who already owns religion - formatted WEZE-1260, with studio and three towers in North Ouincy. Salem expects to move much of its paid preaching to 590 with its superior signal, and, according to the Boston Globe, use 1260 for contemporary Christian music and teaching programs from local ministers. 590 was for decades WEEI (for "Edison Electric Illuminating"), Boston's first radio station. The WBNW Bloomburg feed will go to WADN-1120, in suburban Concord, which will augment its folk music with business news and features.

Old WYNY-103.5 country music listeners (I am included) in New York got sort of a mini Christmas present with the advent of "Y-107", two small FM stations simulcasting from Briarcliff Manor, NY, and Long Branch New Jersey on 107.1. These two stations, soon to be joined by a tiny station on eastern Long Island on 107.1, are airing automated country music, introduced by a tinny sounding computer - generated voice. Good to have the country music back, but the extras leave a lot to be desired...try live local DJ's for example. Hey, if you cannot get a 50,000 watt frequency, buy a few locals on the same frequency in the same area and try to blanket your market that way! John Hanz forwarded some info on this odd little venture for us. Thank you, John.

## What's Killing Mexican Radio?

"If you do criticize a public official and later do something wrong, don't expect any mercy from him or her."

here is some confusion about who first started broadcasting near the California-Mexico border," said my uncle Marcos, lighting a cigarette. "XEAA, started by my father [in the '30s], claims to be the first [in Mexicali]. However, another AM station

called XEAO, started by the Cha-INTERVIEW vez family, was also in Mexical VICTOR ESQUER about the same time. Because both stations began transmitting with

out permits, there is no official documentation to verify the initial date of broadcast." Like his father, my uncle Marcos had a caree

in Mexican radio. He built the first FM station is Mexicali, Baja "Estereo Rey 103.3," during the early '60s, a few blocks from the border.

Does he think the Zedillo presidency has loos ened its reins on the media, as claimed by Tijuana's weekly Zeta? My uncle smiled and said, "I have not seen any dramatic change in public policy. I has always been legal to criticize the government. It is legal to criticize the public officials. What you can't do is oppose the government by trying to start a riot, aid terrorist groups, or air o scenities. Most of the codes limiting what is airable are common sense. At the same time, if you do criticize a public official and then later do something wrong yourself, don't expect any mercy

On this side of the border, we have the FCC regulating radio content and ensuring that stations don't share the same frequency. The Mexican equivalent to the FCC is the Secretaria de Co municaciones y Transportes. My uncle mentioned rittingly played a song with an obscenity and a complaint was filed, the station's owner could write on the complaint that he was unaware of the song's content. If enough violations accumulate, the station could lose its license. My uncle has never heard of a station losing its

The Mexican National Network 90.7 Televisa is the largest Mexicali broadcaster with English and Spanish programming, Some lis teners criticize the station for lacking a defined format, but that's what enables them to reach such a wide audience.

The newest Mexicali station, 98.3 FM, has an "alternative" format most similar to San Diego's 91X. Lately they play Pearl Jam, Soundgarden, No Doubt, and the Presidents of the United States of America. Norteño, played on 89.9 FM, is rejected (along with other traditional styles of Mexican music) by most Mexicali teenagers. Besides 98.3, the teen crowd goes for 91.5 FM, a pop-rock station similar to SD's 92.5 FM/The

San Diego radio listeners hear stations such as The Flash, 91X, Z90, and MORE-FM 98.9 give their call letters in Spanish. Why?

"Americans rent Mexican radio stations [in Tiiuanal," my uncle said, "In order to comply with Mexican communications laws, they must identify themselves hourly in Spanish. They can identify themselves in English as much as they like, but the communications regulations state it must be hourly and in Spanish." These stations also air The Mexican National Hour (often called the hora de silencio because nobody listens to it)

"The Mexican National Hour is broadcast on every channel at the same time every Sunday

night," said my uncle. "If a Mexican tional Hour because it is unable to receive it or for any other reason. then the air time must be left empty. No music may be played or com-

lasked some of my cousins if they listen to the National Hour, They laughed and said, "Never all the way through. We usually listen to a CD." The National Hour gives information about the Mexican congress, economic reports, and news from

When I asked my uncle what he thought the biggest problem with Mexican radio was, he paused for a moment. "When my father started in

this business, he was working at Imperial Hardware, in Calexico. After he finished his day shift, he went to junkyards on both sides of the border to look for scrap metal for the AM station. My mother and I brought him lunch at work. At the time, there were not a lot of radios around, so many people didn't understand what he was trying to do. He was ridiculed and likened to Noah from the Bible with his own version of an ark. Sometimes, he would work until one in the morning, welding and sifting through twisted metal. He faced many obstacles. Money was in short supply.

"(When my father's station went on the air) there was no union, no social security, no retire ment pensions, or health plans. There were three great disc jockeys in Baja: Chico Padilla, Eduardo Reyes, and Chulo Miramontes. Once XEAA was operational, he recruited these three by offering them 20 days' vacation a year, health benefits and a good salary. The three accepted and made the radio station a hit. My father gave them anything they wanted. He loaned them money to buy a home, provided a pension for their retirement, and treated them well. They stayed. Since then, much has changed. In 1957, radio disc jockeys formed a union. In the beginning it was to stop abuses from less-reputable emple

The union formed in the nation's capital now has tremendous power. For example, if a disc jockey fails to show for work repeatedly, I can fire him. The union, however, will send me thre others from which to choose to replace the fired jockey. These new jockeys may not have any experience or formal training. Most of the time they are worthless. The new jockeys entering the field are usually the sons of former jockeys. This structured nepotism is killing the industry with

"[Deejays] earn about 1000 dollars, base pay, month, plus any commission from ads they create or sell. For announcers, shifts are four hours on the microphone daily and a five-day work week. For operators, technicians, it's a six-hour day and a five-day work week."

How does one enter the union? You take a test, based on international culture - who is the president of Uganda?

"I don't know," I said

He laughed, "Well, then you fail. Just forget career in radio. So how then does anyone pass They are bought off, the son of a jockey pays off the guy in charge of the 'cultural' exam and gives him his radio card and he is on his way. This is what is killing Mexican radio."

- Bruce speaks: "I joined Mark Connelly for a brief after-work DXpedition at the Granite Pier site in Rockport, MA (March 5 UTC); for me the first remote-site DX session of '97. Much of what was heard wasn't any different than what's been logged in Nashua, NH this season, with the exception that it was nice to have clear "arm-chair copy" instead of fighting the noise and lower signal levels typical of TA reception from home-base. Hearing Yugoslavia barrel over Spain on 684 was also exceptional, and considering the signal strength should be a good target for adding a new country to my home DX logs."

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## NRC IDXD Supplement CONNELLY COMMENTS

There was a great high-band opening on medium-wave between 0400 and 0600 UTC on 1 MAR. Earlier the band seemed slightly auroral with Colombia-1170 over WWVA, etc. At 0152 UTC, there was some evidence of dawn enhancement into the Middle East region: on the "Eurosloper" antenna, a bubble jammer was clobbering WSAI-1530 on the lower sideband, bits of audio from VOA Kuwait - 1548, a 1476 carrier (likely UAE), and Saudi Arabia on 1512 getting by 15 km distant 50 kW powerhouse WNRB-1510. Still, as late as 0304, conditions seemed slanted to the southerly regions: at that time there was an absolutely enormous signal from VOA Sao Tome on 1530. Any of the other channel occupants - WSAI, Vatican, and Middle East jammers - were so far under São Tome that they were barely perceptible. Saudi Arabia - 1521 was good, but not exceptional, at the time. By 0400, things got more interesting and the effects of the grey-line terminator approaching the transmitter-dense western Europe area became apparent. For the next two hours, nearly every channel from 999 to 1611 had European signals coming through. The low end of the dial just had some of the routine "bone crushers" from Spain, France, etc. The real action was on the high end. Some of the channels shared with US stations were as good as the "splits": notably Vatican-1530 (now taking over from São Tome and totally burying WSAI as well) and Luxembourg-1440. Also I had Spain-1080 almost even with a weaker-than-usual ("skipping over") WTIC. The loggings go to several pages. These were made at home, about 25 km inland, not from a "super" beach site. I have found that local sunset period logs (winter: 2000-2300 UTC) are more adversely affected by moving away from the immediate seashore. Euro-dawn (typically 0400-0700 UTC) skip arrival angles must be a bit higher above the horizon. Signals are still best right on the coast, but they don't die off as fast as you go inland (compared to sunset DX). I might be going out to Rockport or Manchester-by-the-Sea, MA after work on Tuesday (4 MAR) to look for anything I may have missed this weekend. Sometimes a good run of European DX precedes an auroral "blow-out". That would certainly be a welcome event. At a top-notch site such as Rockport, one can dig for those rare Africans and deep South Americans when the aurora blanks out domestic skip and the big Europeans that often get in the way of the truly rare DX, Mark Connelly - WA1ION - Billerica, MA, USA

On 12/27, KXBT-1630 was heard with the strongest signal ever 12:35-12:50AM, but some interference from WPCE863, a new TIS on the same frequency from the commuter train station in N suburban Deerfield. On 12/28, WATX-1590 heard with One-On-One sports 1:20-2AM, finally IDed over WVNA. Local WONX was off. Also, KJJK-1020 heard with oldies and ID at 2:12AM. On 1/13. both of the McComb, MS tests (WAKK-1140 and WAPF-980) were heard here. On 1/19, WLS-890 was off and a pretty strong Mexican was noted 12:30-1:20AM with Fiesta Mexicana programming, ranchero music, announcements but no ID. Monday AM 1/20, can you call it a good old fashioned Monday Morning when 2 stations are off? Both KOA-850 and local WEJM-950 were noted off at 1:05AM. 1/26 KFI-640 heard at 11:05PM with weather and ID, in pretty well. This one has been in more frequently this season, as has KNX-1070. Thanks to all who sent Christmas and Holiday greetings, cards and letters. I was hoping 1 might get a Christmas present in the form of a verie, but no such luck. I have a GE Superadio I which still gives me good service (for a portable) but it gets very scratchy on the low end of the dial, whether it's on AM or FM. Anybody out there who might be able to fix it? Reports have gone out to: WOIX-820, WEGM-1370, WPNW-550, WROR-1150 (now WNFT), WBPS-890, WWTL-700, WYRV-770, WOON-1240 and WZBZ-1070. After some 64 years of DXing, I now use a different method of tuning. I select a channel where there is a station I need, and which I have at least some chance of hearing and just keep parked there, hoping to catch an ID. So far, this has worked on 700, 770 and 820khz. I'd been hearing some Arabic sounding music under WLW-700, and finally on 12/7, I got a solid ID from WWTL at their 4:45PM sign off, and on 770, hearing a station under WABC with southern style gospel songs, I got an ID from WYRV on 11/23 at their Nov. sign off time of 5:15PM. ## Radio hot again in era of Internet

NEW YORK — In the era of the Internet, satellite television and cable channels by the fistful, a far older technology has emerged as a powerful force.

Radio is hot again.

Westinghouse's \$3.9 billion deal to buy Infinity Broadcasting and its 44 radio stations illustrates more than anything else just how important the business has become to the nation's media giants.

"As a radio guy, I absolutely love it," says Rush Limbaugh, one of the medium's modern-day stars. "Radio has always been the stepchild, the lowest rung on the ladder. Now, it's being taken more seriously."

Seriously is right. While the number of U.S. radio stations has grown by about 30 percent since 1980 to more than 10,000, the money they take in from advertising has more than tripled to \$11.5 billion, according to the Radio Advertising Bureau.

With that has come the emergence of bona fide superstars like Limbaugh, Howard Stern and Don Imus. The latter two work for Infinity.

Why has radio not only endured technology's blindingly fast advances bit thrived? After all, radio still functions much as it did during its heyday, when listeners tuned in Edward R. Murrow and "Amos and Andy."

The answer is as simple as driving a car. Literally. Radio listening is, and always will be, a hands-free effort.

"It makes the day go faster," says Bert Madia, a Fairfield, N.J., truck driver with 30 years behind the wheel. "It tells you the weather. It tells you the accidents. It tells you what's shead of you. The radio helps you more than the CB."

Of course, that's not the only reason for radio's popularity.

"There are a lot more different formats today then there were 10 years ago," says Dennis McAlpine, a media and entertainment analyst at Josephthal, Lyon & Ross, a brokerage firm. In the most recent ratings period, even some disco stations posted gains. That's right, disco.

Advertisers, who pay the bills, love to be able to speak to specific audiences so they can target their products. And they'll pay for the privilege. Ownership by big media companies can help stations more aggressively peddle advertising.

For behemoths like Westinghouse, which gobbled up CBS just seven months ago, radio looks like a big winner.

In fact, Westinghouse chairman Michael H. Jordan said Thursday that radio has been the company's top development priority since the CBS pur-

ia companies can help staassemble bigger clusters of stations in the same market, was behind the purchase.

No doubt, more such deals will follow.

"Radio was the real hidden jewel of

Still, somehow it's strange that radio is bringing in buckets of money despite the emergence of flashy new ways to deliver information and entertainment.

Consumers today can get more and more channels on cable takevision, TV programs beamed into their homes directly off satellites, and interactive programming of all sorts carried into their personal computers. Shouldn't that hurt radio? The evidence suggests, it bear?

"Radio is far more intimate than TV can ever be," Limbaugh says. For one thing, he says, radio listeners have to use their imaginations to picture whatever's going on.

Computer users can now hear "radio" broadcasts on the World Wide Web. But until the Internet is available behind the wheel, the PC is unlikely to displace radio from its premier role: a tireless companion to drivers like Madia.
