#### JUBILEE REPORT

Warm southern hospitality and temperatures soaring into the 20's greeted members, wives and parents who attended the NZRDXL's 25th Jubilee Celebrations in Dunedin 29 September. Following a buffet luncheon and roll call at the well-appointed venue - Cherry Court Motel. we boarded our bus for the somewhat tortuous climb to the summit of Mount Cargill, several thousand feet above Dunedin and Port Chalmers for an interesting inspection of DNTV2's transmitting facilities and, of course, take in the panoramic view. Frank Wilson appeared a little reluctant to point out to curious 'foreigners' the location of Long Beach, for fear of a mass immigration of DXers to this 'venerated' DX locality. While many said their prayers. Peter Aburn directed manoeuvres to turn our bus around in the very limited area available and we returned to Cherry Court via a scenic drive through the Dunedin Town Belt.

47 were present at the Jubilee Dinner to hear Jack Fox open proceedings by paying tribute to outgoing League President Merv Branks, who had played a major role in the League's formation in 1947/48. In reply Merv spoke of the early days of radio - when every listener was a DXer and our DX organisations claimed memberships into the thousands. Among lighthearted moments recalled was Merv's 'Giraffe Farm' at Riverton Rocks - why else would someone run long 'electric fences' at a height of 10 feet above the sand dunes. He concluded by saying that increased difficulties for todays' DXers required greater dedication to the hobby.

The next speaker, past President Ross Gibson called upon younger members to put something back into the hobby which gave them so much enjoyment. After a delicious dinner, Mrs Branks spoke on behalf of the so-called 'DX Widows' and cut the anniversary cake which had been prepared by a 'committee' headed by Mrs Burtenshaw. Proceedings then transferred to the Conference Room, where Merv spoke of his Aussie holiday - critically comparing NZ radio programming. Arthur Cushen spoke of the early days of SW DX and expressed the hope that the 'power struggle' on SW could soon come under some control. Murray Lamont spoke on behalf of those who 'had fallen by the wayside' and expressed pleasure at the renewed vigour he could see in the League today. Jubilee Guest Speaker was John Kennedy, Editor of 'The Tablet' and well known as a forthright commentator on current affairs on radio & TV. CONTINUED ON PAGE 16

The great majority of stations on the medium and shortwave bands operate as a business. International broadcasters promote their country's life style, ideologies and culture, and are often supported by government finance. Domestic broadcasters on the other hand aim to communicate with the local populace, and adopt a programme policy geared to capture a sizeable audience. Non-commercial stations rely on government support or that of ideological groups, whilst the commercial station operates strictly as a business - to a budget, respecting the priorities any profitable organisation aims for, i.e. profit, maximum manpower utilisation, and maximum effectiveness. Into this environment the DXer plunges his DX report - an unsolicited account of reception of a station (sometimes not positively identified) which the DXer hopes will strike a sympathetic and appreciative chord and result in some response in the form of a QSL card or letter. Let us overlook the international broadcaster who readily responds to our correspondence, and consider how welcome our reports are in the world of the domestic broadcaster. He operates a business, and consequently employs skilled technical personnel to ensure his business reaches his customers. He knows where his signal goes and how well. His total manpower at the station is geared to operating his enterprise economically and efficiently. In Austral--ia in 1971-2 nine commercial stations operated at a loss; in 1972-3 nineteen stations failed to make a profit. Understandably none of these are likely to devote manpower and money to a non-essential activity like QSL'ing.

We've grown beyond the novelty era of radio and in today's competitive environment the station has to be convinced that spending time on a DXers' correspondence is worth it.

Mery Branks, in an impressive address at the League's Annual General Meeting emphasised these points and highlighted the following as keys to the future of consistent QSL ing.

1. Aim for a high standard of report. Factual. Neat. Verifiable mater-ial. (A report stating: "Man speaking, lady speaking; Orchestral item. Station call." is useless. Specific, unique material such as slogans, identified commercials, time announcements coupled with commercials, interval signals, presentation styles, are verifiable. Put quality in the report and make it worthwhile reading. Imagine receiving a report at a kw station in the States reporting reception of an ad. for Millies' Pancake Kitchen, 2201 South Boulevard - quite a novelty for the station; whereas "man and lady doing commercial" won't move anyone.

2. Length is unimportant if quality is there

3. Respectful tone is all important. Remember we are asking the

station to 'put themselves out.'

4. Provide maximum QSL assistance. Prepared cards, postage in stamps of the country, coupled with lures of postcards, pennants, etc. pave the way to a favourable response to your request for acknowledgement of your report. With rising postal charges in most countries this becomes a major expenditure item - even sending the Times to our sprinkling of overseas members costs \$100 a year. Taxpayer-financed stations will generally respond without these stimuli, as a public relations gesture, but the quality must still be there for them to afford the time.

Permaps there are some answers above to the cry that stations are harder to verify these days - we have to be practical, and make more effort - and strangely the rewards always seem more worthwhile.

LEACHE LADDEDS -

The report spends much time on the future of radio (specifically on 46 pages compared with less than 28 for TV!). A series of goals is suggested, including the following:-

(a) achieving mear total primary coverage— to give us all good reception of at least one station, the report advocates early completion at Queenstown. Plans are underway already to resite an NZBC Hamilton station to improve King Country coverage, the major North Island problem area.

(b) extending a choice between two stations to all remaining areas. The Committee estimates that 3.% of the population cannot reasonably receive the National Programme, and 4.% a public commercial programme. Points mentioned for additional stations are Kaitaia & Kaikohe (both already on the way), Alexandra (National Programme station was recently replaced by a mainly commercial mixture) and Oamaru, which qualifies as the largest town without it's own studio and seems earmarked for a ministation, 2ZE style.

(c) establishing at least 1 Polynesian station to express the other main cultures in NZ. The report suggests possible conversion of 1ZM Auckland to a Polynesian Commercial Station:

"..for the expression, enjoyment & understanding of NZ's Polynesian cultures by New Zealanders of all cultures". A repeater at Rotorua is also envisaged.

(d) spreading the Concert Service (YC Network). Phase One is suggested as: a 20kw directional coverage of the Gisborne, Napier, Dannevirke region; 10kw covering Tauranga, Rotorua and Whakatane; and 10kw for Southland. Phase Two sees low-powered repeater stations at Hamilton, New Plymouth, Palmerston North, Whangarei, the West Coast, the Central North Island Plateau and Nelson. "In NZ there are still many unused channels in the medium frequency band. Despite the presence of distant Australian signals on them, (thats not all!! Ed.) the Committee considers that the Concert Service should be provided at these centres, even with low transmitter power".

(e) moving the Concert Service to FM, one of the reasons being the supposed shortage of space on MW. The report states that this "argument does not yet apply to this country, but eventually it will ... meanwhile frequencies and the opportunity still exist for NZ to bring coverage of a third choice of daily programme to a level approaching that now achieved on the national and commercial stations. This would require modern techniques of transmitting on directional aerials..and, for optimum use of medium-frequency channels, careful consideration of the possibility of changing the frequencies of some existing stations." Space has already been reserved at television stations for FM transmitters and aerials it was noted. With regard to frequencies for FM it is pointed out that only 90-94MHz is currently available out of the accepted 88-108MHz FM VHF band in NZ, and for this reason favour seems to be directed to following Australia into the UHF band. Unfortunately FM won't mean an emptier band for BCB DXers as "the 3-programme radio choice must. be (always) receivable by listeners with AM sets."

That, briefly is a summary of those parts of the Report on Broadcasting prepared by the Adam Committee, which have relevance to the DX hobby. Next step in transformation of the NZ broadcasting scene will probably be another enquiry 'sounding' out the Committee -s findings.

#### FROM THE A.G.M

In his address upon his retirement as League President, Merv Branks reminded the 24 members present at the 25th A.G.M of their status as DXers in the eyes of the different types of broadcasters. Generally, international stations are keen to hear from overseas listeners, but stations on both medium and short-wave intended for local audiences were usually not interested in reports and QSL'd only as a goodwill gesture. Skilled technical advice was always available to the professional broadcaster for him to gauge his listener penetration and signal potency, and the DXers report was usually of little interest. It was therefore most important that the DX listener, if he wants to stand a good chance of receiving a QSL, must send a report to the station that is worthwhile reading, contains significant verifiable material, and is supported by such courtesies as prepared cards and postage. Further thoughts of A.M.B. appear els@where in this issue.

The success of the A.G.M was highlighted by a conducive venue and an interesting venue. After a round-the-room roll call, members heard reports on matters associated with the Leagues administrative year. Peter Grenfell (North Otago) reported that the League's ARCHIVES had received a notable boost during the year and reminded members to ferret out old QSL collections, radios and press clippings on early broadcasting in NZ. The club's FRANCIAL SITUATION was shown as satisfactory. 1972/73 had been a year of some strain while all subscriptions were adjusted to the higher rates. The TIMES Editor Bryan Clark reported on a most encouraging year with increased contributions and marked enthusiasm for the new sections introduced during the year. Members were acquainted with Times costs and plans for the new year by Publisher Tony King, and Merv Branks added that HQ would approve a regular increase in pages in future issues. PUBLIC RELATIONS Officer Arthur Cushen noted that 261 enquiries relating to the DX hobby had been processed during the year - double the number of 4 years ago, and this indicated the growing interest in overseas radio reception.

Assuming office as the <u>NEW PRESIDENT</u>, Eric McIntosh expressed his gratitude for the masterly eye Merv had cast upon League affairs, and was pleased to have found a niche for him as Immediate Past President on the new committee. Sutton Burtenshaw is our new Vice President. A letter to the Minister of Customs about the excessive <u>IMPORT DUTY</u> on communications receivers (130%), and the the Minister's acknowledgement was tabled. The outcome of discussions between the Minister and his department will be awaited with interest. The desirability of making representations to the <u>SELECT COMMITTEE</u> ON BROAD—CASTING on behalf of the League was considered and Wellington members will present the Leagues case later this month. The League will support the increase in power of Radio New Zealand and discuss the wisdom of all-night unmodulated transmitters and the

frequency synchronisation of identically programmed stations.

The COUNTRIES LIST and Points System, now heavily revised, would be submitted to branches for comment immediately and it was hoped to finalise it before the end of the year. The Inter-Branch Competitions were not announced due to discrepancies in one branches entry but these have now been resolved and the winners appear on page 1 of this issue. Individual Best of the Year Trophys went to: Shortwave Nick Kendall and Arthur Williams for Cordac Burundi 3985; Broadcast George Masson for WVON Illinois 1450kHz 250 watts. Camaru has tentatively been set as the venue for the 26th A.G.M to be held at Labour Weekend 1974. It is proposed that a full CONVENTION will coincide with the A.G.M.

Other topics discussed included: BRANCH NEWSHEETS If 30 or more are published, two copies must be forwarded to the General Assembly Library, Wellington. MEMBERSHIP LIST This will be published before the end of this year and distributed to all members. STATIONERY Before the next bulk order of stationery is made by Adcom, the findings of Wellington branch s study of the report form layout will be considered. JOINT BEST-OF-YEAR WINNERS Adcom is to look at ways of Laking a single & rd in these competitions. FAMILY MEMBERSHIP When more than one member of a family is & League member and only one copy of the Times was required, first member pays \$4.00 and subsequent members \$2.00. So concluded a most convivial and worthwhile weekend in sundrenched Dunedin.

Radio Sweden plans to have its third 500kw transmitter in operation next month, while the Belgium Radic has announced that their new 250kw trans--mitter will come into service on February 19th 1974. The Vatican Radio are carrying out research into increasing their power to 500kw from 100kw, while Radio Australia has been told that the Government are looking towards a replacement for the 50 and 100kw transmitters at Shepparton in terms of units of 250kw, as some of the Shepparton transmitters are 30 years old. This continuation of a love to higher power is regretted in some quarters by DXers, but one risce of good news this months is that as from 9 September the USSR stopped jaming broadcasts in the Soviet languages made by the BBC VOA and Deutsche Welle. WINB is at present noted on 3 frequencies: 17720kHz 1900-2000 GMT, 15185 2035-2200 and 11830kHz 2205-2315 hours GMT, Listeners letters are replied to on Saturdays in a programme called Mail Call, at 1930, 2115 and 2215 GMT. UNDER 9; Steven Greenyer with Gabon 3350 4kw 131 points.

OVER 9: No entry!! A lost opportunity for everyone. Please don't let this happen again!

First up this month is <u>Jonathan Aitchison</u> of Dunedin, who uses a 'middle-aged' <u>5 valve</u>
<u>Philips</u> radio, with about 115 feet of wire in a 'U' shape at a height of 10 feet for an aerial.

<u>Ian Harris</u> of Wellington is studying electrical engineering at Canterbury University, which no doubt helped when he built his <u>Heathkit SW717</u> from a kitset. A 15 metre longwire, 5 metres high running NTW - ESE serves as an aerial. Ian says the Heathkit goes quite well but is not too selective.

Roy Knox, Hamilton has an 'elderly' Eddystone 740 and 'modest' longwire for his short-wave listening.

Nick Kendall, Wanganui also uses an Eddystone 740 to pull in the Africans, when not attending lectures at Canterbury University.

Graeme Shillito, Dunedin gets some good BCB results from his 1961 model  $\underline{\text{Murphy M66}}$  with 6 tubes. Aerial is a 130 foot longwire to NNE, 20 feet high.

Mike Smith of Matamata writes that he now uses a recently acquired National Panasonic  $\overline{\text{S-100}}$  replacing a 5 valve Gulbransen and 9 valve Ultimate. A 40 foot tower and 3 x 20 ft poles support a series of 3 stacked ves-beams pointing in different directions.

Erin Ardley, Auckland recently purchased a 34 ft mast from Valentines for use with his Eddystone EC10 communications receiver.

From Twizel, <u>John Newman</u> writes: "I use a <u>Trio 9R-59De</u> receiver, Digital Frequency Meter made by Medical Teletronics (up to 30 mHz readout), tape recorder, antenna tuner and switching unit (home brew), Heathkit Q-multiplier, Practical Wireless AF Processing Unit and typewriter".

Gavin Waters of Wellington gives a detailed description of his receiver, an AWA 4-band tuner/amplifier, model ASM A 16/47 with a similar tuner circuit to a 4-band portable marketed by both AWA and Murphy. Frequency coverage MW 510 - 1630kHz, SW1 1.9 - 6.3mHz, SW2 8.9 - 16mHz, SW3 was 16 - 24mHz tut Gavin has changed this to 17.5 - 26.5mHz by twisting the right coils in the oscillator section of the tuner. The tuner has 4 transistors, 1 diode, 3 IF stages, narrow or broad bandwidth selector and cheap tuning meter. Tuning coils for the 3 stages plus trimming capacitors have enabled him to improve peaking. A Radio Nederland Q-multiplier is being constructed for use with the tuner. As for the antenna; it's a wire strung around the ceiling and finishing at the bed springs!
