WORLD ADMINISTRATIVE RADIO CONFERENCE 1979

While medium wave DXers look forward to November of this year and the introduction of 9kHz spacing for Asia and Australasia on the broadcast band, there will be great significance for the shortwave enthusiast in the outcome of the World Administrative Radio Conference (WARC for short), to be held in Geneva in September next year. The gathering will be under the auspices of the International Telecommunications Union (ITU), with the purpose of revising, where necessary, the International Radio Regulations. The last such revision took place 20 years ago.

Without a doubt the most important task of WARC will be to amend the international frequency allocation table to take account of the changing frequency requirements of the various radio communications services, and to meet any additional frequency requirements likely to arise in these services up to the end of this century. All over the world, government agencies and broadcasting organisations are preparing their submissions. To bring readers up to date with developments to date, here are the BBC's thoughts, as submitted to the British Home Office last year, and reprinted in COMBROAD, journal of the Commonwealth Broadcasting Association:

- 1) The whole of the low frequency band 150kHz-285kHz should be allocated to broadcasting on an exclusive basis. Currently 150-160kHz and 255-285kHz are shared with maritime mobile services and aeronautical radio navigation services.
- 2) A sub-band of 10kHz in the range 415-525kHz, ie immediately below the present MW band, should be allocated to broadcasting services, in order to accommodate a possible traffic information broadcast service. In this connection the BBC is currently engaged in experimental transmissions of a system employing amplitude modulation in time-division-multiplex.
- 3) The medium wave band limits should be adjusted to 526.5kHz to 1606.5kHz.
- 4) The FM Band, currently 87.5-100mHz in the UK, should be extended to the 88-108mHz range. Many other European countries are seeking a similar extension to at least 104mHz.

But of greatest interest are proposals to extend the SW bands. Quoting from the BBC proposals -

5) "The tropical (SW broadcasting) bands were originally allocated many years ago because of alleged unsuitability of the MF bands due to high levels of atmospheric interference in tropical regions. However, in view of the fact that most of the tropical countries present at the recent LF/MF Broadcasting Conference (Geneva 1975) negotiated numerous MF assignments for domestic use, it appears that the MF (medium wave) band is no longer regarded as unsatisfactory in tropical regions, and thus the claim of tropical broadcasters to exclusive use of (these) HF bands is no longer valid.

The Listener magazine is usually a little behind the action when it comes to publishing frequency details, so we were most impressed to see the frequency of 1ZB listed as 1080kHz from the actual change date of 30 April. On the other hand however there's 2ZP New Plymouth which moved from 1370 to 1050kHz on 2 April. In the Listener the change was listed for 22 April onwards, but in their enthusiasm they have listed 2ZP on it's 1053 spot, 7 months before they move there'.



Although the number of contributors appears to be down on recent months. it is evident that better conditions are being experienced. To those of you considering erecting longwires and beverages, there is not much time left for North American reception. About now, South American reception could be in full swing, but as every one has commitments to attend to . the Tiwai house has been unattended of recent weeks. THE VOICE OF PEACE

Variety and local identity: these are the twin themes of ILR. The ILR companies broadcast over 2000 hours of locally originated programming each week, all of it special to each station and each area. The following takes a broad look at the main subject areas and some of the common features.

MUSIC --- Music is a major part of ILR entertainment. The stations set out to provide the companionship of music-based programming and to serve a wide range of musical interests and tastes. Popular contemporary music provides common ground for local listeners. Although its growth and influence is international, ILR, by playing the best of such music and selecting it to suit local interests, gives local expression to a universal taste. The stations involve local listeners with their choice but also encourage their audience to sample and enjoy new types of music. In general, the popular music played aims to be the best of its kind; and the music-makers as well as the listeners welcome an alternative outlet for broadcast music. This type of entertainment, where records and other music are interlinked with plenty of news, information, humour and discussion, is shown to be something which the majority of people like, value and listen to.

As well as the mixed musical programming there is also a wide range of specialist music programs. These cover classical music and folk, 'progressive' pop and blues. jazz. reggae and country music and the various and different facets of musical interest. Local specialties are included, be they brass band music in Sheffield or Welsh chiors in Swansea. Although these are still early days, there have been some notable broadcasts of live music, including full-scale orchestral concerts, early Italian music, pop groups, soloists and small bands and more.

NEWS --- The ILR stations gather news in two ways; they have their own newsrooms and journalists, who collect and broadcast local news; and they get national and international news from a company called Independent Radio News (IRN) which is part of the London Broadcasting Company (LBC), the company holding the franchise for the London news and information service.

IRN is a completely new source of news for radio listeners. It has its own staff and correspondents in the U.K. and around the world, and it prepares news bulletins and features - and a full 'agency style' news service - for ILR 24 hours a day. Each station receives a teleprinter 'feed' from IRN and an 'audio' service, and it can broadcast the IRN bulletin live or use it to build up its own news programming. In this way, every ILR station can have intervies from Saigon, Melbourne, Ulster or Westminster. In addition, stories from each ILR area can be 'fed' to the other stations through IRN.

SPECIAL INTEREST PROGRAMS --- The local arts and entertainment scene enjoys on ILR stations the type of wide but popylar coverage which can bring local theatre, art gallery and concert hall right into the homes of people in the area. As well as regular arts features, stations can talk in detail with actors and producers. painters and poets, established or eccentric.

Sport is one of the principal ways in which people express their local identity. So ILR is there at the local football grounds, be they First Division or Sunday league. But soccer is not the only sport and across the whole range of sports from lacrosse to gliding, from water polo to Highland Games, from cricket to rugby union or rugby league, enthusiasts can hear results, news and comment from a local angle TEES on ILR.

ILR program planners do not believe that education can only happen in a classroom, Helping local people to a greater awareness of the history of their area, showing them how local government works, advising them on theirlegal rights, are some examples of the useful education which is included through the day's ILR output, not just in a particular program. There are some special programs - would you like to learn Welsh with Swansea Sound, for example? - but the educative part of ILR goes on all the time in differing ways.

The religious content of ILR also varies - as all ILR programs vary - from station to station. Some broadcast regular, formal religious programs, some short talks; and 'religion' will encompass the faiths of the people in each area. ILR's programming goes out into the community as well, with counselling on-air often followed up by clubs and social welfare helpers in the transmission area. Continued ...

In a QSL letter to Phil Brooks last year, G.S. Arklay, Manager of 2MO Gunnedah Pty Ltd gave the following information about the station:

2MO operates at 2 kilowatts on a frequency of 1080kHz, 278 metres. The station was licensed on 16 January 1930, with Licence No.4 for Australia. The official opening and commencement of regular transmission was on 16 June 1930.

The present studios are situated in Rodney Street, Gunnedah. The whole building is air conditioned and has two studios and a control room. Radio 2MO also operates a studio at Narrabri, which is 60 miles NNW of Gunnedah. Broadcasts are made from this studio Monday to Friday, from 2 till 5pm.

There are two transmitters - one at the studio, which runs on an auxiliary diesel in case of power failure; it also supplies power to the studios - and the main on-air transmitter, a BTM-2J containing solid state rectifiers, situated on the Oxley Highway 3 miles from the 2MO studios. Both transmitters are remotely operated from the studio control room. Most of the studio on-air presentation is remotely controlled, and the studio/transmitter equipment is mainly RME custom built.

2MO is now automated and broadcast sessions are on automation from 10am to 11pm Monday to Friday, with breaks for news inserts. At the time of writing, the automation unit was unique, being the only one of it's kind at present in Australia. The computer section (the memory bank) is by Control Design Corporation, and the tape recorders by Revox. The cartridge machines (the time announcer unit and instant access) were supplied by Consolidated Electronics.

The address for reception reports is 2NO Gunnedah Pty Ltd, Box 62, PO, Gunnedah 2380, Australia.

Territory and New South Wales: Radio 3SR is owned and operated by Associated Broadcasting Services Ltd, which also operates the following stations in Victoria: 3UL Central Gippsland 530 and 3YB Warrnambool 880kHz. The station operates on 1260kHz with an aerial power of 2000 watts non-directional.


3SR began life as Radio 3WR at Wangaratta in January 1931. In January 1935, 3WR transferred operation to Shepparton, and a year later took the callsign 3SR, with studios in Fraser Street and transmitter at Congupna. The present 3SR with studios were occupied in 1955 and now comprise 2 identical wyndham street studios were occupied in 1955 and now comprise 2 identical 'air' studios and a smaller 'talks' studio equipped with modern solid state equipment together with record library, production, technical & other offices.

The present staff comprises some 20 persons who include announcers, technicians, copywriters, sales and office staff. Transmission hours average from 5am to 10.30pm each day. As one of Australia's 120 commercial radio stations, 5sx is self supporting by sales of advertising, which is either prepared and 5SR is self supporting by sales of advertising, which is either prepared and produced by commercial agencies, or by 3SR's own scriptwriting and production staff.

The transmitters of 3SR are located some 12km east of Sherperton on the Old Dookie Road, where there are 2 identical AWA type BTM-2 transmitters, remotely controlled by landline from the studio. NEW V.O.A PROGRAMME "WEEKEND"

The Voice of America, on Saturday, May 13, will begin broadcasting a new weekly programme worldwide in English. Entitled "Weekend," it represents a substantial departure from much of VOA's previous programming.

Perhaps the most noticeable difference between "Weekend" and its predecessors will not be what but how. News and cultural events will ve covered, but with some differences. To supplement straight reports on substantive matters from correspondents VOA plans to have some "live" conversations between the reporters and its Washington host to provide local colour and a sense of immediacy. The programme will be timely, fast-paced and informal, with an emphasis on what is happening around the world and how it affects people.

For instance, if President Carter is overseas, VOA might add to its regular news coverage a conversation with a member of the President's party on some "human aspect" of the trip that is usually not called for in traditional coverage.

VOA also plans to have music that's being heard that weekend -- the Number One song on the charts may be juxtaposed with a report on a Metropolitan Opera premiere, or a visit to the Grand Old Opry in Nashville. Answers to listeners' questions and reviews of books and films will be interspersed with background and expansion pieces on topics in the news. Five minutes of news (exclusive of correspondent reports) will be broadcast shortly after the programme begins. Midway through the hour there will be a sports report as well as a news summary.

"Weekend" will bring a new sound to the VOA english weekend programming, a new approach to fulfilling its new International Communication Agency charter responsibilities. It is designed to be as listenable as possible while at the same time increasing VOA's coverage of important events.

The programme will be heard in East Asia and the Pacific at 1300 GMT.

"The short-to-medium distance HF broadcasting services operated by the BEC and other broadcasters in the European area require frequencies below 6mHz for reliable propogation during winter night-time conditions at all phases of the sunspot cycle. In order to overcome these propagation problems it is proposed that: THE BANDS 4750-4995KHZ AND 5005-5060KHZ BE ALLOCATED TO THE BROADCASTING SERVICE ON A WORLD-WIDE BASIS, SHARED, IF NECESSARY, WITH

6) "The HF (International SW) broadcasting bands were already overcrowded in EXISTING SERVICES. 1959 when the bands were last allocated. Since then, congestion has increased and is expected to increase still further; at present during certain hours of the day the bands are overloaded by a factor of 3 or more. In an effort to overcome the interference problem many broadcasters, including the BEC, are operating on frequencies outside but adjacent to allocated broadcasting bands, a situation which can be tolerated only as long as harmful interference is not caused to the rightful occupants.

"The BBC has endeavoured to make the most effective use of it's frequency assignments by synchronising (up to 5) transmissions to different areas on the same frequency, while coordination with other Western broadcasters has helped to alleviate some of the more serious mutual interference problems. "An increase in it's present authorised complement of out-of-band channels usable at overseas relay stations as well as in the UK would go some towards easing the BBC's own problems but any solution to the general interference problem, which takes into account worldwide interests, must derive from a reallocation of the HF spectrum. The alternative is a continuation of the present power race and an increase in unregulated out-of-band usage, amounting to a de facto expansion of the broadcast bands.

"The problem of the long-standing sharing of the band 7100-7300kHz between the amateur service in the Americas and the broadcasting service in the rest of the world, to the satisfaction of neither, needs to be resolved by

"It is thought that with the rapid development of cable networks and satelite communications, some of the major non-broadcasting services are making less use of the HF spectrum than hitherto, and that spectrum space is likely to become available for re-allocation.

"It is proposed therefore that the HF broadcasting allocations be substantially increased to reduce the present overloading. EACH BROADCASTING BAND BELOW 20MHZ NEEDS TO BE APPROXIMATELY DOUBLED IN SIZE AND AN ADDITIONAL BAND BETWEEN 11975 AND 15100KHZ IS NEEDED TO ELIMINATE THE PRESENT LARGE via Worldwide DX Club 1/78 FREQUENCY DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THESE BANDS.

For another view of the evolving situation we quote the 4/78 issue of FRENDX: "At a meeting in Vienna last February a group of 14 broadcasting and 4 PTT organisations met to seek a common position for WARC-79. The following international SW bands were proposed: 3900-4060kHz, 4750-4995 and 5005-5060kHz, 5740-6200kHz, 7100-7500kHz, 9400-9900kHz, 11500-12025kHz, 13600-14000kHz, 15100-15700, 17500-17900kHz and 21450-21850kHz. Only the 11 metre band would national SW bands were proposed: remain unchanged. From the DXers point of view, the main points are the elimination of hams from the 41 and 75 metre bands, the introduction of a new 22 metre band, and the allocation of international broadcasting to the 60 metre

An FCC representative has stated that investigations have established that many tropical countries use the tropical bands not for broadcasting but for fixed use. Second, most tropical band broadcast transmitters are used for studio-to-transmitter links. However, as any keen DXer knows, or can see by referring to the WRTVH, many tropical countries have broadcast transmitters only on the tropical bands. It seems the Europeans, Americans and Canadians broadcasters support such a 'sharing' of 60 metres.

Ralph Sanserino. NATIONAL PANASONIC'S DR48 or RF-4800 (as illustrated in the 1978 WRTVH pages 26, 27 and page 7 of the "Listen to the World Supplement" supplement) was recently displayed at an Auckland Branch meeting, courtesy of local Duty Free company Miles & Carlaw. Here are Bryan Marsh's comments on this new communic ations receiver: The DR48 is a large table model receiver almost the same size as an Eddystone, but less than half the weight (8kg without batteries). It has good looks but rather small dials, and consequently a difficult-to-read MW scale, whereas the SW scale is adequate because of the digital readout. Medium wave performance was not up to expectations in a set of this price range, and the DR22 model was way ahead. Image rejection was poor, and when an external antenna was connected the set overloaded with stations popping up in several places. The loop antenna fitted to the rear panel folded out but could only be rotated through 90°. Although effective, it's use would be limited. When a 3' frame loop antenna was connected to the 75 ohm input, Radio Haurakis image could be nulled to listen to 2YA on 570kHz. The 20kHz spaced graduations on the MW scale were much too close for an accurate readout. The SW range of 1.6 to 3.0mHz uses the same dial and tuning set-up, again with no digital frequency readout, and coupled with poor performance, would not interest a serious listener. The FM and LW bands on the same dial were not tested. On the other hand, the 7 shortwave bands covering 3.0 to 27.5mHz with digital readout to 1kHz were a pleasure to use. The 2-speed tuning, operated by pulling out on the large size knob for super-slow use, meant that the bands could be scanned with ease. Sensitivity was good, but selectivity, even in the narrow band position, gave splash from nearby strong signals 10kHz away. The alignment of these bands was excellent, in that one could dial up a wanted frequency and be spot on. An example - 5603kHz with upper sideband in the SSB mode, San Francisco HFRT circuit came in, using only a short antenna. For normal use an inverted L antenna of 50' is recommended, as anything longer overloaded the receiver. An inverted V dipole was tried - while giving quieter performance, it still overloaded the circuit. The digital readout showed a slight drift down in frequency on the set tested. The antenna trim control could peak up a signal, but the signal was audible at all points on it's 180° rotation.

The DR48's audio was very good, with bass and treble controls for pleasant listening. When a set of 8 chm headphones was used there was a slight hum audible, increasing to an annoying level when the dial lights were in use. PTO

Agood procedure for reporting a station gives one a better chance of getting that verification back. In the diagramatic presentation opposite, we look at the reporting of a radio station in a rather different way.

The Flow Chart is a tool of industry and commerce and here we have applied it to our hobby. It tells, in a simple visual form, what would take some time to express in writing. The Flow Chart is self-explanatory. Decisions are made at the DECISION diamonds and some form of action taken at the ACTION squares. Follow the chart, making the necessary decisions and taking the required a ction, and your standard of reporting will improve. Consequently your reply percentage will in crease. Good DXing.

Divers have a simple but potentially effective recourse to the proposal that the 60 metre tropical band be "shared", ie taken over by international broadcasting. When reporting reception to any tropical band broadcaster which uses the 60 metre band, Divers should express dismay that reception may not be possible after 1979, as a result of decisions reached at the next WARC conference. The nations that most benefit from tropical broadcasting have a majority of votes in the ITU, but it is most important that the tropical band broadcasters make their respective governments aware of the possible situation.

Editorial note: If we get sufficient feedback from members, a written submission from the League to the appropriate people, presumably the BCNZ, will be considered. Already some overseas DX clubs have formally supported extending of the international SW bands. Douglas Doull of Auckland feels that the 41, 31, 19 and 16 metre bands could well be extended, but sees problems in that some sets will not have coverage of the band extensions, and redesign by manufacturers will be necessary. 
EQUIPMENT REVIEW Continuing Bryan Marsh's review of the DR-48

SSB reception with the good pitch control was acceptable. The noise limiter could cut car ignition noise by half. The recessed SW calibrator was not used after initial setting of the digital display. Battery consumption was tested with a variable 12 volt supply, and gave undistorted reception down to 7 volts, corresponding to the lower edge of the black line on the tuning meter. At zero volume draw was 60ma; with digital display on - 155ma, but with dial lights on, the meter registered 230ma. A medium listening level without dial lights or display drew 75ma.

Overall, an interesting receiver which I think could be improved by a better MW band, increased selectivity and digital readout for all bands.

ARTHUR CUSHEN'S SHORTWAVE REVIEW

This month sees the introduction of single side band broadcasts from Switzerland which will carry the English programme to North America 0145-0215 on 11780 and 1315-1345 on 17740kHz. Radio Sweden has cancelled its broadcast in Swedish to New Zealand but will also carry this programme on single side band for our reception. There are many changes coming into effect on May 7 and this information is included in this review. These details were first broadcast on Sunday, May 7, at 1015GMT on the medium and shortwave services of Radio New Zealand.

All times GMT.

All frequencies in kHz.

Belgium: Brussels broadcasts in English 0015-0100 on 6080 and 9685kHz. English to Africa now on new frequencies 1615-1700 on 15280 and 17740kHz. (John Mainland).

Brazil: 9585kHz Radio Excelsior heard with popular English recordings 0945 but at 1000 suffers side band from VOA and Korea on 9580kHz. On 9645 Radio Bandeirantes heard at 0430 during 24 hour a day operation.

Bulgaria: Sofia on 15135 opens with English 2130 but mixed with KTWR Guam which has Russian at that time.

Canada: Radio Canada advise that they have dropped the idea of using 11940kHz in place of 9605kHz to North America 0200-0229 and 0300-0329 and will use the old schedule.

Ecuador: HCJB has rescheduled the DX Party Line broadcast to the South Pacific and it is now heard 0900-0930 on Monday, Thursday and Saturday on 6130, 9745 and 11900kHz.

Egypt: Cairo advise that the latest English schedule is as follows: 0200-0330 on 6230, 9475; 1215-1330 on 17920; 1715-1845 on 15255; 2030-2200 on 11790; 2230-2345GMT on 9805kHz.

Guam: KTWR at 1100GMT is using 15425 and 11850kHz and asking for reports on comparison between these frequencies. John Mainland reports that at 1430GMT KTWR is using 11845 and 15135kHz.

Hungary: Radio Budapest is using 6105kHz with English at 0400GMT.

Korea South: Seoul is using 7550kHz in Korean to 1900 and then time signal and a programme in Arabic. The frequency of 9580kHz is heard at 1000GMT in parallel with 9525kHz.

Luxembourg: Heard on 15350kHz after VOA closes at 2200 in Arabic. Luxembourg has news in French for five minutes and at 2205 has popular music with some English announcements.

Mongolia: Ulan Bator on 12070kHz heard with English 1219-1245GNT and Saturday's has a Mailbag according to John Mainland.

New Zealand: Radio New Zealand Shortwave Service from May 7 will operate to the Pacific 6105kHz 0500-1030GMT; 6105 1800-2045; 11800 1800-2015; 15130 0400-0730; 15380 2030-0345; 17710 2100-0445. To Australia 9620kHz 0745-1030GMT.

Norway: Oslo to Australia and New Zealand 0700-0830 on 9590kHz also uses 15135 and 15175kHz and hus English on Sundays only 0800-0830GMT.

Peru: 5025kHz OAX7Q opens at 1010GMT with the National anthem. 9507kHz Radio america heard at 0245 and generally news at 0300 after time signal.

Sweden: Radio Sweden has reduced its transmitters to two for use from May 7 and a third transmitter is being held at a stand-by. This has resulted in the cancelling of the service in Swedish 0630-0830GMT on 21690kHz. The broadcast in English to Australia and New Zealand 1100-1130GMT continues on 15125kHz. The Single Side band transmissions 0500-0830 on 21550 are beamed to Australia and New Zealand. The other transmission times are 0930-1600 on 21555; 1600-2000 on 17785 and 2000-2130 on 15190kHz. ••NZ Sked above corrected per info 4/5.BC
