## RADIO NZ SHORTWAVE - HAPPY RETURNS!

It is now over 30 years since two war-surplus high frequncy transmitters, each with an output of 7.5 kilowatts, were installed at the NZBS transmitter site at Titahi Bay, 15 miles north of Wellington. The purpose envisaged by Prime Minister Peter Fraser, when the Shortwave Service officially began on 25 Sptember 1948, was to present listeners abroad with "an accurate picture of life in NZ."

In 30 years this role has been barely achieved, if at all, hindered from the outset by the inadequate transmitter output. It would be difficult to find a technical parallel anywhere in the world. While the major nations and most developing countries are recognising the need to develop the shortwave spectrum for international communication, New Zealand has ageing, low powered transmitters, charged with providing a satisfactory broadcast service over an area encompassing the Pacific from East Australia in the west to the Cook Islands group in the east, encompassing in excess of 3 million square miles of the South Pacific. Only the avid DXer would appreciate this scenario – offering us one of the few remaining challenges to catch a very low powered SW broadcaster on the international bands.

What of the future? In recent years we have seen the eclipsing of NZ's role as natural leader in the South Pacific, by Australia. Previously the main thrust of Australian foreign policy, and of Radio Australia's transmissions, has been towards Asia, but since the Malcolm Fraser government came to power, Australia has increased it's aid to the Pacific by 400%, and is now clearly outpacing NZ in it's involvement in the grea.

Interviewed earlier this year in the NZ International Review, former BBC External Service staffer and now Director-General of Radio New Zealand, Geoffrey Whitehead was asked what hope there was for upgrading the external service. He said that he personally saw a case for a properly equipped and staffed shortwave transmission from NZ, if only because of the need for an inter-island news service for the Pacific. It was also his experience that listeners wanted an alternative to the Australian shortwave service. There was a continuing debate, he said, as to whether the Foreign Affairs financed External Service operation was best served by making greater use of sending taped material to other broadcasting organisations, or whether external services do have a role. "The question will turn on the provision of government finance for the proper set of higher powered transmitters we need in order to do the work properly." He concluded his comments by linking evolution of the government's foreign policy with a possible revival of interest in shortwave broadcasting.

A comprehensive study of NZ's external shortwave services was included in the 1973 White Paper on Broadcasting, produced by the Adam Committee. This proposed ... (Turn to page 8)

Earlier this year while in Colombo I had the opportunity of visiting the two installations operated by Trans World Radio in the former Ceylon.

In Colombo, quite close to the area where I used to live some 4 years ago, is a residential building which has been procured for the use of the offices and studios of TWR. The TWR studios in Colombo are used for editing, dubbing and production. The broadcasting of these tapes is carried out by the Sri Lanka Broadcasting Corporation from it's studios in Torrington Square.

Early one morning, the Communication Director for the Seventh-Day Adventist Church in Ceylon, Mr R. Aranze, took me by car the 70 miles up to Puttalam, site of the TWR transmitter. The highway running past the airport meanders through very attractive tropical scenery with coconut, pineapple and rice growing in abundance. By midmorning we could see the 2 towers of TWR Sri Lanka from the highway, even though the station is some distance towards the coast. Soon we were bumping along the uncompleted access roadway into the transmitter base. A large 2 storey building has been constructed and this houses the transmitter, as well as the other operational functions of the station, such as maintenance, repairs, offices, and temporary accommodation. At the time of our visit, the transmitter was under final installation, and 2 TWR engineers from overseas were attending to the final touches. The transmitter, of 400kw, was originally in use somewhere in Germany. It is thought that it was originally the Heusweil-

er transmitter used in Germany for the French Service.

The radiator system consists of 2 towers fed unequally to give a northern lobe or a southern lobe as desired. It is intended that during darkness hours TWR will broadcast to India and during the hours of daylight SLBC will use the transmitter to broadcast to Ceylon.

Programmes for the transmitter are fed by FM link from the Torrington Square studios of the SLBC up to the FM relay station located at Radula, high in the central mountains of Ceylon. From there the signals are rebroadcast on FM and picked up at the transmitter base for broadcast to the target area.

According to Victor Goonetilleke in the bulletin of the Union of Asian DXers, the first test broadcast from TWR Puttalam was made at half power on 31 May at 1032 GMT. The first on-air test consisted only of an unmodulated carrier, and lasted for just 2 minutes. Modulated test transmissions began

10 days later, and the broadcasts consisted mainly of Hindi programmes with occasional English announcements. The station identifies as Vishwa Wani, "World Voice", 890kHz. When TWR commences regular broadcasting, programmes will be

entirely in Indian languages. Although no QSLs have as yet been processed, TWR intends to issue an attractive card.

Back in May we invited member comment on the future of the shortwave spectrum, to assist in preparation for a League submission towards the 1979 World Administrative Radio Conference. KEVIN JENSEN of Motueka has suggested the extension of certain bands and also a novel approach to overcoming the problem of overcrowding on the bands – to restrict transmitter power according to the target distance. For a transmitter to cover a distance of say, 10000 miles (eg Europe to NZ), power could be unlimited or perhaps limited to a maximum of 250kw. For lesser distances between transmitter and target area, a lower maximum would be applied. If you have any thoughts on the points raised in the May DX Times drop us a line soon. Ed). # Radio New Zealand

EXTERNAL SERVICES DIVISION (OVERSEAS PROGRAMME UNIT)

To mark the 30th anniversary of New Zealand
-s External Shortwave Service, some facts...

TECHNICAL: The Shortwave Service's two
7.5 kilowatt transmitters are located at the BCNZ

Titahi Bay site (G.C. 174.50 E/41.05 S), sharing facilities with mediumwave stations 2YA, 2YB, 2YC & 2ZB.

The aerials are orientated in such a manner that the main coverage areas are the Pacific (beam 30°) and Australia (285°). They fall into 2 main types - those for the 11, 15 and 17mHz bands have 2 tiers of 3 wire, half wave folded dipoles, with single wire half wave parasitic reflectors. Those for 6 and 9mHz bands consist of 4 coplaner squares.  $\frac{1}{2}$  wavelength per side, interconnected and phased so that the radiating elements are the 5 vertical half wave elements, whose ends are folded to form these saugres. An exactly similar parasitic reflector is placed behind the radiator and tuned to resonance. The aerials are not reversible and the reflectors are tuned for minimum backward radiation. Each is fed with 4 wire transmission lines of 310 ohm impedance. The horizontal aerial pattern for 11, 15 and 17mHz is a 3dB horizontal beam width of 45°, and on 6, 9mHz - 40°. Vertical main lobes are 21° on 11mHz, 15° on 15mHz, 17° on 17mHz and 10° on 6 and 9mHz frequencies. The hours of transmission are 1800 GMT till approximately 1030 GMT daily. Up till 0730 GMT both transmitters are beamed to the primary target area - the Pacific. At this time one transmitter is switched to the Australian beam for the period through to closedown. Note that when NZ is on Daylight Saving Time (late October till late March) all times mentioned are advanced one hour - ea the total transmission period is 1700-0930 GMT. PROGRAMMING: The shortwave broadcasts are currently a relay of the domestic National Programme Network (YA stations), with Sports Network commentaries from time to time. Special taped identifications prepared by the Overseas Programme Unit are prerecorded and inserted into programming several times each hour, by the transmission staff at Titahi Bay. The use of SW relay facilities is also well advertised through frequent mentions in the domestic National Network identifications.

SWLs are catered for by 2 distinctive programmes of the Overseas Programme Unit, and carried on both SW and MW - Arthur Cushen's DX World (1015 GMT first Sunday in the month) and Mailbox, compered by League member Tony King of Wellington (1015 third Sunday). Since the External Service was reactivated after the 5 week shock closure in May/June 1976, there has been a significant increase in Maori and Pacific Island language programming of particular relevance to the shortwave target area. Spoken programming in Maori (NZ & Cook Islands), Samoan, Tongan and Niuean now totals 205 minutes a week. When the External Service produced it's own programmes in the early 70's, a typical week's schedule contained 135 minutes of material for the Pacific Islands audiences out of  $136\frac{1}{2}$  hours transmission weekly.

EARLY DAYS: League member Tony Marr, working at the Titahi Bay transmitter site, recently unearthed some old transmitter logbooks in a disused storeroom. Although the Shortwave Service was officially opened on 25 September 1948, it seems that the first external broadcasts were many months earlier. At 10.30am on Tuesday

13 January 1948, the logbook first records frequency tests being carried out over transmitter HF1 on 9539.930kHz and HF2 11780.07kHz. Another subsequent test frequency was measured as 15280.080kHz. Logbook entries in the days leading up to the official opening include- Saturday 11 September and Sunday 12 September 1948 "relay of 2YA 12.20-11.35pm", Saturday 18 September 1948 "smell of something burning so closed down to investigate"; the official opening date is recorded in the logbook with the simple entry Saturday 25 September 1948 "2YA relay with half-hourly announcements." To the right is a reproduction of a Radio New Zealand QSL card from the 1960's. This includes a representation of a third target area for the shortwave operation – a short programme was broadcast once a week to New Zealanders stationed at Scott Base, Antarctica, using the Australian antenna in reverse.

Frequency Schedule 3/9/78-28/10/78: To the Pacific - 1800-2105 GMT on 11960kHz; 1800-0245 on 15345kHz; 2115-0730 on 17860kHz; 0300-0515 on 15280kHz; 0530-1030 on 6105kHz. To Australia 0745-1030 on 9620kHz till 10/9, then 6105kHz. Major NZ winter season sports event -s are carried on 15mHz frequencies in the 0230-0430 GMT period, with National Programme relay continuing on alternative frequency. Matches in NZ Rugby Tour of Europe will be on 6905 or 11960 from 1400 GMT.

two transmitters of 50 or 100kw each, possibly located at the Post Office site at Himatangi, 75 miles north of Wellington. The revitalised service would be aimed essentially at reaching local communities in the South Pacific, with good quality, topical programmes suitable for local relay. The Committee said that the service will do much to promote a closer relationship between the South Pacific and NZ, more closely matching and lending conviction to our other activities in the area.

A change in government since the White Paper resulted in no action towards the recommended goals, and our understanding of the present administration's attitude towards the need for shortwave transmissions from NZ is coloured by their shock closure of the service in mid-1976 on economic grounds. Listener representations were instrumental in reactivating the operation as a National Programme relay 5 weeks later. But the present arrangement must be seen as a holding operation only. The gradual deterioration, through age, of the transmitters and antennas at Titahi Bay will soon force a decision by the authorities.

Next year, the World Administrative Radio Conference in Geneva is sure to approve the extension of the International shortwave Bands to allow their even greater use as a primary means of communication between the peoples of the world. It is vital that NZ be part of the action. Frequently we hear of events on which it is important for NZ's attitude to be clearly heard. As a nation, we have a contribution to make to the international community and international shortwave broadcasting is one proven way to get the message across.

We urge government to commit itself, through the Foreign Affairs Ministry, to the upgrading of our shortwave broadcasting service, to provide a strong and clear radio voice to our neighbours in the Pacific.

On the occasion of the 30th anniversary of Radio New Zealand's External Shortwave Service, the League sends warm greetings to the Broadcasting Corporation personnel responsible for it's operation. Particular tribute must be paid to Geoffrey Haggett, RNZ Overseas Programme Manager, on who's shoulders rests responsibility for most aspects of the present service.

#### SPRING - SUMMER RECEPTION

Some suggestions on what to look for on the shortwave bands in the coming months, by JOHN MAINLAND

During September last year, Maputo in Mozambique was noted with Portuguese programming on 11819′kHz, drifting from nominal 11820, at 0505 GMT. On 4 September 1977, Radio Cook Islands suddenly appeared on 9695kHz, and was observed at 0800 GMT with a relay of Radio Australia news and sign-off at 0832.

On 3 September this year, many international broadcasting stations will make some frequency changes in the course of their broadcasts. These alterations in frequency will probably mean using a lower frequency for the listening audience. This also applies to the seasonal change on 5 November.

During this spring-summer listening period, improved reception, particularly of European, African, Mid East and Asian stations will become evident during the hours of darkness, ie 0800–1700 GMT, on almost all bands, including 6 to 22mHz.

Watch for openings to Africa during December on the 15mHz band at approximately 1800 GMT.

Last year, during October, an extremely good opening was noted from East and North East Africa at around 1700 GMT on 3 and 4mHz. Summer time, nearly in force at this time, means it's not so early rising.

During the daytime openings to the Latin American area will be observed on 9, 11, 15 and 17mHz. Look for Mexico 15385, Brazil 17815 and Colombia 15335kHz. The various Brazilian transmitters on 25 metres (11mHz) will be heard after midday our time. On 8 November last year Venezuela was heard briefly on 15400 at 2000 GMT. It could reappear this year.

December last year revealed Nicaragua on 5920kHz at 0630 GMT, so possibly 49 metres is worth watching. Asian signals should be heard during daylight hours due to the absence of the powerful European signals, etc.

With a reasonably calibrated communications receiver coupled to an external aerial, it should be possible to hear at least some of these stations. Good listening!

Many members have been successful in verifying Radio Moscow transmitter sites this year, but how many of us know where those odd sounding places are located in the vast expanses of Russia. We hope to bring out a map of RM's transmitter sites shortly, so from you we want the following details:from your QSLs:

Site verified, Frequency verified, Time of Reception, Language/Target Area. This applies to veries from Moscow received this year only. Contributions to Box 2956, Wellington by 8 September at latest please.

Already schedules which come into effect on September 3 have been received and austria is to use two new frequencies in the 13 metre band while other stations plan frequency changes. Gabon testing with high power should be heard in this area when interference permits while 49 metre South Americans are in abundance during our late evenings. This report was first broadcast on Radio New Zealand mediumwave and shortwave on Sunday August 6 at 1015GMT.

Bolivia: Radio Crystal 5005kHz heard all night during recent Bolivian elections. 6125 Radio Stentor returned to this frequency from 6173 and heard at 1100. Radio Batallon 6185 opens at 1100 and has a bugle call at 1130.

Canada: A new frequency 17780kHz has replaced 15105kHz for the period 2100-21570MT. Radio Canada advises of a power reduction from 250 to 125kW due to technical difficulties on the transmission on 9535 0030-0127 and on 11845 0130-0427GMT.

Colombia: Radio Sur Colombiana 5010kHz heard at 0600GMT with Caracol Network

Costa Rica: Radio Universidad 6100kHz opens 1200GMT having moved from 6105kHz according to Ray Crawford of Invercargill NZ.

Cyprus: Cyprus heard in Greek on 9695kHz replacing 9690 Friday, Saturday and Sunday 2215-2227 to the United Kingdom also using 6155 and 7190.

Finland: Helsinki in English to Australia and New Zealand 0930-1000 on new 17875khz replacing 17840kHz according to John Mainland of Wellington.

Gabon: Four new 500kW transmitters now being used on a test basis from 0700-1900GMT on 6030, 7200, 9650 and 15300kHz. The station is asking for reception reports to Box 270, Franceville, Gabon according to Richard Ginby. Reception in New Zealand on all channels is spoilt by interference.

Pakistan: Radio Pakistan heard on 21625kHz 0715-1100 in Urdu and 1100-1115 with slow speed English news. Also using 17665kHz.

Spain: Madrid has retimed its English to North America and is now 0000-0200 and 0515-0615 on 9630 and 11880kHz the broadcast not on Monday. To Europe 2030-2230 on 9505, 9580, 11840kHz no broadcast on Sunday. The address is now Box 150039, Madrid 24, Spain.
