The following is the text of a press release from ADCOM in Invercargill:

A third international group of radio clubs has been formed with the founding of the SOUTH PACIFIC ASSOCIATION OF RADIO CLUBS. SPARC is based on similar lines to the European DX Council and the Association of North American Radio Clubs and will be seeking full affiliation with those two groups. SPARC has been formed by the Southern Cross DX Club, Adelaide, the Down Under DX Circle, Melbourne, the New Zealand DX Radio Association, Dunedin and the New Zealand Radio DX League, Invercargill, as foundation members with the aim of promoting radio listening in Australia, New Zealand and the South Pacific. The New Zealand Radio DX League, through its National President, Arthur Cushen, has been responsible for negotiations and will provide the secretariat during the formation period.

SPARC will publish a newsletter for circulation to member Clubs and will make this available to EDXC and ANARC. Competitions, standard points systems, country lists etc. are planned to be used jointly by member clubs to encourage competition between members of SPARC. It is hoped that other clubs in the area will also seek affiliation with SPARC.

Now that leads nicely to a note from ARTHUR WILLIAMS. 26 Centre Street. Invercargill, who says that in response to a letter from an American Dxer, he is going to do a survey of receivers used by League members. But NOT the modern solid state variety but the old valve driven machines of the 30s thru to 60s, particularly Hammarlund, Hallicrafters, National and other makes. He would also like to hear of any other older models - domestic sets such as Philco, Pye, Philips, Columbus etc. He'd like comments on performance compared with modern sets - drop him a line with details of the receiver and its DX performance and he hopes to get some sort of list compiled for comparisons. Arthur's letter ends up - "Tell you what! To make it more interesting I will offer a copy of Art Cushen's bookto the member with the oldest or most unusual receiver. Sounds interesting - Arthur or course will be the sole judge and I hope he will send us his results for publication.

Also concern with antiquity is <u>VICTOR GODNETILLEKE</u> of the Union of Asian Dxers. Victor is trying to collect material about R.Ceylon and, before that. 'Colombo Calling' from the point of view of foreign reception. He would like any information from DXers who heard Ceylon in the early years, photocopies of QSLs, programme skeds etc. He will reimburse postage and other costs. MIKE SMITH, Opunake, isn't exactly an antiquity even if he did start DXing in 1966.. He started off joing the NZDXRA because his uncle. Bill Woller, was a member of the League and that way they got both the 'Times' and 'Tune In'. He's just started subscribing to 'Tune In' again and finds the Ham/Ute section useful. Likes the idea of amalgamation as long as it can be achieved without too much parochialism or 'acoro'.

Another old timer is DES DAVEY, Te Kuiti, to whom the very mention of 'Utilities' is like a red rag to a bull. Basically Des does not want to see the 'Times' cluttered up with 'rubbish' like utilities. Ham stations, boat RTs, trucking company CB and the rest. Stick to AM and shortwave as the only basis for the hobby - well, that is one point of view. To some the very idea of covering other sections of the spectrum is anathema but then you get others like Mike Smith. young Tim Austin and Owen Cullen who have a wider range of interests. Is this to be catered for or just ignored?

So on to another type of antiquity - and I am sure my correspondents BOB and EVELYN WATSON, 77 years old DXers of New Plymouth, will forgive me for using the term in regard to them. They've been DXing for the last 9 years and are using a DR49 with a.20 foot whip on the house top and a 60 foot wire. They reckon their posie at the bottom of a valley is a poor one as while they hear the big stations they miss out on the smaller, weak powered ones. They'e made a lot of contacts overseas though and joined clubs and won one or two prizes and are having fun. This letter prompts me to enquire - Who is the oldest among our members - what advance on 77years? Anyhow thanks for your letter 8ob and Evelyn and may you both have many more hours and years of happy listening.

Next up DAVID McINTOSH, 70A Kings Crescent, Lower Hutt, who wants comments on the Magna Wave Aerial Booster advertised in the 'Listener'. I recall that earlier in the year there were two comments from members on this - one quite favourable, the other equally unfavourable. Neither got published. Would any one like to drop David a note telling him of their experience with this gadget. MORE LETTERS

The next letter was from JACK SEARLE, Haumoana, who was very bitter about an apparent 'cock up' in the Ladders. Well, the full ladders will appear this

month and. I think/hope, answer your complaint - and, by the way, Jack. have you never made a mistake? Your letter will go to Stuart Forsyth for comment.

JIM WEBB, Manakau, sent a copy of a letter from DW outlining their QSL policy. Thanks but I think this is fairly well know so I'm not going to repeat it here.

We had our usual letter from DEXTER POWLEY. Unfortunately a lot is out of date by the time it gets here while other parts are of very local interest. Please keep it coming though as we can pick bits here and there.

KEN GRAHAM is another old timer who now lives at Mount Maunganui. He has written giving some of his experiences with Beverages which he first used in 1933. At that time he lived on a back country sheep station owned by his father. He started with a 3 valve De Forest and later got a 9 valve Majestic. He ran a wire 1000 foot up a slight hill and fixed it to a fence 30 inches above the ground. It gave good results. In very dry summers they used the 3 wire fence which ran 3 miles and had very good results between 500 and 900 kHz. Now he uses two 187 ft. wires in the form of a 'V' to feed his FRG7000 and FRG7700.

Lastly I come to CLEVE COSTELLO, Wellington, who has sent me a copy of his submissions to the 'Inquiry into FM Services. In essence the submission was a plea for improvement of the RNZ External Service rather than the introduction of FM at unknown cost and of doubtful benefit. Sadly there appears to have been no support from any other source and it seems probable that this votecatching gimmick will proceed at the expense of the most potent means this country has of projecting its image and its philosopies on the international scene.

RADIO · DENMARK

According to DWSCI SW News the present. old transmitter site used by Radio Denmark, at Herstedvester, is now surrounded by bungalows in the western part of Copenhagen and this is causing a lot of problems.

For the future 500 kW transmitters a new site is being planned on the island of Mors in the "Limfjorden". North Jutland. The site will be on a narrow tongue of land out in the sea. The cost of the new transmitters is estimated at 88 million Danish Kroner.

Considers a tape recorder a must. Antenna - 36" loop with FET preamp and an inverted V $\frac{1}{2}$ wave dipole on 3.9 MHz about 30 ft. at centre. Halso uses a Sharp casette tape recorder and a digital clock. His antenna are 90 ft. inverted 'L' east/west and a 70 ft. inverted 'L' north/south both at 25 ft. Also an 11 metre dipole east/west at 18 ft. The antenna are coupled to a switching system so that reception on any antenna can be compared without difficulty.

In an article appearing in the May 1981 issue of the OSLing the USSR WRTVH Newsletter, co-editor Olle Alm. an electronics engineer with the Swedish Patents Office and a long time Oxer, comments on the full data, i.e. transmitter site in addition to frequency and other details, QSL cards currently being issued by Radio Moscow. He states that the sites shown on QSLs are usually those to be found in the lists submitted to the International Frequency Registration Board for their winter and summer tentative high frequency broadcast schedules. These lists show the frequency usage for the previous year in the case of the D (winter) and J (summer) schedules, ie for DBO they submit their D79 definite schedule etc. For the M (spring) and S (autumn) issues they submit the actual schedules but RM QSL secretaries do not receive these so they continue to use the D79 lists for M81 and so on. (Ed. note - the seasons mentioned are, of course, northern hemisphere) This, he continues, leads to some obvious contradictions between what is heard and what appears on the QSL. For instance a Far East site used the previous year for transmissions to N.America and appearing on QSLs may have been substituted by a European (usually Ukrainian) site the next year on the same frequency so that listeners on the East Coast (of N. America) suddenly get a "Far East" site booming in in a most incredible way. The actual D and J schedules are submitted to the IFR8 about mid-season in the form of corrections but QSL secretaries do not receive these either. For transmissions which cannot be matched with any data in the outdated schedules they probably 'phone a technician who gives them something to put on the QSL. Another pitfall which is mentioned is possible confusion of sites used by R.Sofia and R.M. jointly

From the article it appears that in the USA and Europe, the art or science of establishing the location of USSR transmitter sites is highly developed. The author prepares charts of USSR high frequency transmissions for the four major seasons and information from these is available to the public through the USSR High Frequency Broadcast Newsletter, c/o Roger Legge, Box 232, McLean, VA 22101.

and which may or may not be what they purport to be.

Another item in the same Newsletter mentions that as from the start of the M81 SW broadcast season, the IFRB is using the term 'UTC' - 'UNiversal Co-ordinated Time' instead of the familiar 'GMT'. This apparently results from a decision at the 1979 WARC and some stations, e.g. R.C.I. have already started using UTC in their announcements and schedules.

It appears that part of the reason for the change is that some years ago the Greenwich Observatory, through which the so-called 'Greenwich Meridian' runs was moved out of Greenwich and in consequence the term 'Greenwich Mean Time' has not quite the same significance.

Well times change — even UTC as has happened in recent weeks — but I know that I for one shall not find the change from GMT to UTC half as traumatic as those from £.s.d to \$.c or from gallons and pints to litres, or from miles to kilometres for after all we've been hearing the expression for years now every time we check our clocks with WWV or WWVH.

COMPETITIONS & AWARDS

First my thanks to those who responded to my comments on 'Competitions' in a recent editorial. I shall be passing yourletters on to that they be considered by the Competition.

ADCOM with a recommendation that they be considered by the Competitions Committee for consideration and hopefully some action.

Thinking about it further it seems that one should probably distinguish between 'competitions' and 'awards'. In the former each of those involved is trying to achieve better results than the others. An award on the other hand need involve no competition and could be made simply as a result of completing a specified task. So far as the League is concerned the only competition open to individual members seems to the the Best of Month and, of course, winning the appropriate section of the Ladder in each half year.

IAN CATTERMOLE has come up with a suggestion which could give a more competitive element to the Ladders. His suggestion is that each competition should run for a specified period, say 12 months, with 2 monthly entries as at present. However while retaining total QSLs as at present and the various categories, the ladder would be arranged so that the member with the greatest increase was at the top. He gave the following example:

In this instance Michael would obviously win not only the Junior Section but also the overall Ladder for that period. Ian makes the point that he believes that this method would give newer members a greater incentive and also points out that they would have some advantage in that the fewer QSLs one has the easier it is to find stations/frequencies which have not already been reported. Lastly he suggests that it could lead to fiercer competition which is good for all hobbyists.

On the Award side, <u>REG MOSS</u> suggested the award of Certificates to members who have verified 50, 100, 150, 200 etc. countries with a Master DXer Certificate for he who does it on both MW and SW. This is a modificatiom of what is done by NASWA which has over 25 Awards including, European Continent', Asian DXpert', 'Soviet Sphere DXer', 'Ecclesiastic Dxer', 'Senior Brazilian DXer' and the top Award 'Master DX Centurion' for verification of 200 Countries — these among many others — each with their own requirements.

Members will no doubt have noted how appropriate to our hobby is the acronym of the new regional organisation announced in this issue. It is also interesting to note that among the objectives of the new body is the promotion of 'competions planned to be used jointly by member clubs'. Can we, the members, hope that the imaginations of the members of the governing body will be "SPARC - ed"

into offering us some Competitions and Awards which while being a challenge to the 'professional' DXers will also give the 'amateurs' a chance.


How about this for a starter - "The Pacific DXer Award" - one for each in the MW and SW Bands. A certificate would go to each member who verified, say, 10 countries on either MW or SW.during a twelve month period. A member who verified the requisite number of countries on both MW and SW might be given a "Master Pacific DXer Certificate".

It would be nice to see the Competitions Committee take the 'bit between its teeth' and anounce, say, that from 1 January 1982 such and such Awards would be available to members fulfilling certain conditions. I could be much more direct in my urging but will limit myself to asking — 'Please, please do some thinking and go beyond the confines of what has been done for the last thirty years in this snug little, tight little country of New Zealand.'

NETWORKS

According to an item reproduced from the New York Times in 'Sweden Calling DXers' there is an explosion of radio networks in the USA. By the end of the year, the big four - ABC, CBS, NMC and Mutual' - will have increased to 19, some of the newest being RKO Radio, Wall Street Journal and Satellite Music Networks. This growth is traced to the increase in radio stations from 4000 to nearly 8000 in the last ten years and theneed for the new stations for additional resources to enable them to compete in the market place. The Satellite Music Network plans to provide two 24 hour day networks, one with adult pop the other with contemporary country music. The smallest is the Octor's Network which provides special medical news over an FM subchannel. Other specials provide sports, drama, women's programmes etc.

The title " My Favourite QSL " is an apt one as with most DXers their " best " QSL is usually not their favourite nor most memorable . I have two QSLs which bring back very pleasant memories and which I treasure. Both stations were well heard at the time . One was relatively

uncommon, the other extremely rare. Possibly the fact that these stations were heard when I was a teenager and of a more impressionable age has instilled them on my memory .

The first verification is memorable because it was the first Real DX station I heard , identified and verified . A NZ first ; Radio Haiti 4VRW . 500 watts on 10080 kcs heard on the 31.7.53 while still attending High School .

At the time I did not pocess a SW set of my own and my DXing was done on the family's old 6 valve Pacific . At 0245 GMT in the afternoon .NZ time , while tuning the bands I came across this out-of band station broadcasting in English . It identified as Radio Haiti .At that time there were two stations on SW one Radio Haiti the other Radio Raitie . I did not know which I had heard . The solution, send off a report to both .

Several months went by , then one day arriving home from school my mother handed me a letter; I saw the postage stamp, and couldn't get it opened fast enough . It was a letter from the English announcer of 4VRW . Radio Haiti . Without a doubt this verification gave me the greatest thrill I have ever had when getting a verie back, even though many better stations have been verified since . For me it was the start on the road of serious DXing .

The second station was again heard while I was a student . It was heard on the 12.6.55 and if my memory serves me well , a Wednesday . The fact of hearing the station at 0330 GMP on a Wednesday was probably why I was the only DXer, that I am aware of, who heard it. Probably all others were at work . The station was 2AP Apia , Western Samoa broadcasting on 6040 kcs. The reason the station was on shortwave was that it was transmitting a commentary on a Rugby football match between Fiji and Samoa . Obviously the transmission was for listeners in Fiji . As far as I am aware Western Samoa has not been heard on SW since . The fact I was tuning the bands at that time and the fact that it was a Rugby commentary, which drew my attention, all lead to the unique logging. Strangely the receipt of the QSL card did not move me greatly as it was only as the years passed by that the rar ity of the station has sunk in .

Today when I get back that good catch or new country it is more satisfaction I get than the thrill of earlier years . Being the first to hear, identify and

verify a station is something to be proud of and aimed for .

BANDWATCH SHORTWAVE

with BARRY WILLIAMS of Auckland

Quality not quantity this month with some excellent catches reported on 60 metres. We could almost make up a band survey with all the contributions received . Dene Lynneberg and Tony Marr recently had a night at the Radio New Zealand monitoring station at Quartz Hill , Wellington . For those interested in propagation note the time in the morning the Africans were held to . I have very rarely , heard 60 metre Africans to 2200 but never to after 2300 . Tony did mention that V beams and rhombics beamed South and South East were used . The main logging of interest this month would be the tentative report by

John Durham of Cape Verde on 3930 khz . A very rare station that is seldom heard here in New Zealand . For those of you who did not log Radio Clarin 11700 John Mainland has reported it back there again . Their QSL card would be one of the most attractive I have seen and well worth trying for .

A new Brazilian has been noted on 6020kHz, a switch of frequencies in Papua New Duinea and tests from Madrid are highlights this month, while the Red Cross Edvise of tests on July 28 0945-1015 on 9560, 15305, 21520, 21695kHz. As broadcast on the External Service of Radio New Zealand on Monday July 6, at 0315GMT on 15485, 17860kHz and at 1015GMT on 11945kHz. All times GMT and frequencies in kilohertz.

*RGENTINA: Radio Rivadavia 5882kHz heard closing at 0400 with a full announcement after time signal and popular music. On some occasions they broadcast as late as 0430GMT.

AUSTRALIA: Radio Australia's new programme 'Spectrum' compered by Dick Speekman formerly of DX Juke Box of Radio Netherland is a new programme for shortwave listeners and broadcast on the first Sunday of each month from Sunday July 5. It will be heard at 0612, 0810, 1612, 2112 and on Monday at 0112 on Radio Australia's usual frequencies.

RRAZIL: 4975kHz Radio Timbira heard closing at 0500. On 6020kHz a new station Radio Universo in Curitiba has been heard at 0800GMT after VOA closes.

CHILE: Radio Nacional 9550 heard on Mondays with sports programme at 0400.

CCLOMBIA: On 4817 Radio Guatapuri heard with music at 0930 opening 1000 with march followed by sound of farm animals. On 5040kHz Radio Cinco heard with full identification at 0500.

COSTA RICA: Radio Reloj has returned to 6006kHz from 5950kHz and heard at ORCOGMT.

ECUADOR: HCJB Quito has made the following frequency changes: 17875 replaces 17885 0030-0200 in English; 17790 replaces 17835 1600-2200 and 15285 replaces 15305 2200-2230.
