



CAMEROON Radio Douala is a new stn 4800.heard from 2000 to close-down 2308. broadcasts in FF and EE. programmes supplied from the main station in the network. B.Fransson(Sweden) SCDX 25/7 A new transmitter carrying pxs from the regional stn. Radio Douala. was observed on 20th and 21st July on 4795. A news bulletin in EE was relayed from Yaounde at 2100 & the stn closed down at 2305.BBC MS 28/7 SEYCHELLES/HONG KONG(BBC) During the Waveguide px the Chief Engineer External Ser-EE 15575, 9570;1300-1330 DO EE 15575, 9750;1500vices spoke about additional relay stns: "We are in the midst of negotitations for additional relay stations one in the Indian Ocean in the Seychelles and one in Hong Kong. Transmitters will be in service by about 1987 in Hong Kong and hopefully by 1988 in the Seychelles. They will be automatically fed by satellite".BBCWS8/8 DJIBOUTI In a bc on 27th June,Djibouti Radio reported that the President had inaugurated a new transmitter for Djibouti Radio.Monitoring observations over the past month have revealed a noticeable improvement in the reception of trans-BBC MS 4/8 missions on 4780.

## Arthur Cushen's Shortwave Review

The reception of KNLS Anchor Point Alaska has been the highlight of listening over the past month. while the move to shortwave by the Voice of Peace broadcasting from a ship off the coast of Israel has allowed the opportunity of listening to a low powered test transmission using only 400 watts. Latin American signals still are very active 1000-1200GmT on the lower frequencies. while some September frequency changes which take place on September 4 have also been included in this feature. All times are GMT. 12 hours behind NZST and frequencies in kHz.

ALASKA: The first Alaskan shortwave station, KNLS, has commenced operation with gospel programming. Broadcasts are in Russian on 11820 up to 1200, and then in Chinese-Mandarin on 9690. The closing announcement at 1158GMT is "This is KNLS the New Life Station located at Anchor Point. Alaska. Our mailino address is P.O. Box 473. Anchor Point, Alaska 99556. KALS how concludes this portion of its broadcast service on 11820kHz. In just a few moments KNLS will begin a broadcast service in the Chinese-Mandarin language on 9690kHz. in the 31 metre band, Good evening." The schedule is 0900-1200 11820kHz in Russian: 1200-1330 9690 in Chinese-Mandarin: 1330-1630 11820 in Russian.

ARGENTINE: RAE 6060kHz with English 0430-0500 at good strength, and DX Prooramme heard on Thursdays.

BELGIUM: Brussels on the new frequency 5895 in English from 2100 at excellent strength, also using 15595 for listeners in Africa.

BRAZIL: Radio Braz observed on new frequency 15105kHz closing at 2200 after a broadcast in Portuguese.

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC: Radio Earth broadcasts in English retimed 0200-0300 on 11700kHz Tuesday - Sunday.

INDIA: All India Radio frequency change to 15170kHz for the broadcast 1000-1100 in English to Australia.

ISRAEL: Voice of Peace operating off the coast of Israel testing on 624UkHz 400 W 0600-2400 and best reception 2000-2100 but severe RTTY.

ITALY: Rome from September 4 to the Pacific 0830-0930 9585. 11810. 15330. 17780, 21615kHz; 2050-2130 9710, 11800, 15330kHz in Italian; 0350-0410 on 11905, 15330, 17795; 2200-2225 on 5990, 9710, 11800 in English.

NEPAL: Signals on 3425 with English at 1500 offer poor reception, 5005 is fair but sideband interference from WWVH with 9590 giving excellent reception.

NEW ZEALAND: RNZ External Service from September 4 1800-0510 15485. 17705; 0520-1215 9620, 11960kHz.

NICARAGUA: La Voz de Nicaragua 5950kHz heard with English 0400-0500, also heard opening 1100 in Spanish.

SPAIN: On 11690kHz with English 1900-2000 then French to 2100 beamed to the Middle East. The broadcast to Europe is on 9765 and 11840kHz.

SWEDEN: Stockholm to NZ in English 1100-1130 on 17820 to November 6. English services 0230-0300 9695, 11705; 1230-1300 15190, 21690; 1400-1430 17845, 21615; 2100-2130 11845, 11955, 2300-2330 9695, 11705kHz.

TURKEY: 2200-2300 using 7155 in place of 9610 in English to Europe.

VATICAN: Now using the new frequency of 15115kHz English 0200-0215, while 15190kHz is used 0500-0515 in English to Africa.

U.S.A.: VOA service to New Zealand from 1100 is now on 6110. 9565, 11715. The transmission 2200-2400 is on 17740, 26000 with secondary coverage on 9770, 11760, 15185, 15290, 17820, 21460. At 1100 15160 and 15425 are now used for secondary coverage to this area.

#### ARE YOU CONCERNED?

In January. 1994 the World Administrative Radio Conference will meet again in Geneva, this time to discuss the future of international shortwave broadcastino and as we are the consumers in this matter. we should feel that involvement is necessary in planning the future of our nobby.

The Maw Zealand Post Office which will represent this country has provided Arthur Cushen. our dational President, with the agenda and a request for comment. Arthur has provided the Director of Telecommunications with a comprehensive report, band survey sheets showing frequency usage and the degree of co-channel and jamming interference, and it is indeed of concern to us that at this Conference there seems to be little interest in enabling the practicing listener who has so much to add in the final result of world wide broadcast - how the signals reaches his receiver - a place in the discussions at Geneva.

The 1979 WARC meeting was significant as it affected all mediumwave listeners throughout the world, except in the Americas, as all countries adopted a 9kHz spacing on mediumwave, which has now been implemented. The shortwave bands were also expanded with the creation of a new hand and this extended shortwave frequency range is gradually being used. It is of concern that the decisions made in January will affect the world wide listening audience to shortwave broadcasts and the consumer will have little input into the decision. The major fields of discussion will centre around the multiple use of a single programme on several frequencies in the one band - the extension of outer band broadcasting - the greater use of the tropical bands (60. 90 and 120 m) and the increasing problem of jamming and deliberate interference.

During our monitoring of various bands which are conducted on a regular basis. we find that between 0200-0430UTC the 9mHz band is jammed up to 60% of the frequencies available. Similar observations of the SmHz band - 96 different signals were heard on 48 channels and here again 15 frequencies were jammed with 10 suffering from sideband interference making 50% of the

band unusable.

The Conference no doubt will have in attendance the best brains in the broadcasting world. technicians and theorists, but the listeners they serve. the world wide audience of shortwave listeners, whose practical experience in listening makes the whole project possible, appears to be ignored. The present broadcasting plan is based on theory when four times each year international stations make frequency adjustment due to seasonal changes: this plan for frequency sharing and co-operation is devised in Geneva but when the plan goes into effect the listener with years of listening experience is called in to sort out the co-channel interference. Poor frequency allocation means the listener has to try to get some resemblance of order so that the audience can enjoy clear reception. We here in the Antipodes have the best view of world wide broadcasting being able to observe the interference created by poor frequency co-ordination and in the case of the writer, recommends to the major international broadcasters who employ him, new frequencies. which in turn means interference free reception, and so a more satisfied listening audience able to hear, for instance the BBC with good quality signals.

No matter how high powered the transmitter, millions of dollars spent on equipment, studios and aerials, top class programmes, if the audience cannot hear an entertaining programme, they will shift off shortwave. The audience is the consumer in the field of international broadcasting and this is the reason for him being on the air, and at the WARC meeting next year it is hoped that some representation from the shortwave audience will be present to out forward their views to the international broadcasters - as the listener has a practical knowledge of frequency usage and the interference problem.

In this regard it has been recommended to SPARC that they should suggest to the EDXC that some representation at the Geneva Conference should be sought so that the listener will be represented at this vital Conference (A. Cushen)

## Office Questions ght to Listen

v the Post Office that it is illegal to listen and view overseas through satellite transmissions has already caused a resentment by the radio and television enthusiasts of this

in position so that it can give maximum coverage throughout the world is not allowed to be tuned to by a radio listener.

We are not talking about the television side of the programme, that is a different aspect; it is the fact that the Post Office states that to listen to a voice transmission from a satellite is also against radio regulations, vet satellites are used in many fields of communication linking radio stations with their transmitting sites overseas, linking one radio amateur from one part of the world to another, carrying telephone transmiscione television in all manner of modes of communication

There is a tendency to feel that the Post Office is moving into a field in which it is trying to prevent freedom of the enjoyment of listening and viewing which has been an established practice in New Zealand.

In 1904 the Post Office had the sole monopoly of receiving and transmitting radio signals in the country and this monopoly was covered by a heavy fine, imprisonment or confiscation of equipment for any individual taking part in radio reception.

The pioneers of those years had to face this prevention to listen and were able to show to the country that radio was a means of communication in time of disaster. The then Government decided to legalize radio listen. ing, and it became accessible to the

#### DEFINITION DIFFICULT

It was obvious from the interview. with Mr Rose that the legal definition is difficult to spell out of what a listener can hear or see on the radio or television when a satellite is involved. But he did admit that in the not too distant future there may have to be changes in the regulations to allow the reception of television signals on a home-based situation.

He said that if a satellite over New Zealand was carrying television programmes for reception by the general public, and provided the intention of the transmission was for internal reception, the general public could pick up this transmission without breaking the law.

So long as it was the intention of the broadcaster that the programme was for New Zealand reception, this

was acceptable to the Post Office.
It seems the legality of the act is governed by the intention of the broadcasting authority for the transmission to be received no matter what country that comes from.

Mr Rose said that it would appear that no changes in the law in New Zealand were necessary if this country was to establish a broadcasting satellite system of its own and the signals were to be radiated directly

lite which is located many thousands of the public. They would receive the of kilometres above the earth, placed signal on a satellite receiving dish on the roof of their houses, and as their receiver was licensed the same way as an ordinary television receiver. there would be no problem

Mr Rose failed to give an indication of what means were reguired to find out the intention of a broadcaster, and in this World Communications Year, in which every endeavour is being made to promote world-wide communication, the refusal of the Post Office to accept that signals are present in our environment and are able to be intercepted. one is faced with the question of who do we ask for permission to listen.

He is, in fact, one of the world's most experienced DX-ers and is technical representative in New Zealand for the BBC. Voice of America, Radio Canada and several other international broadcasting organis-

DX-er? "The DX," says Cushen, "Is an old telegraphic code for 'long distance', the 'D' being for distance. And it should be made clear that DX-ers are not amateur radio operators. We don't talk, we just listen monitor stations all around the world."

As technical representative overseas broadcasters he reports back on the quality of reception of broadcasts in New Zealand, checking new channels and noting interference problems and frequency hopping, "We have international radio chaos at the moment, with people hopping on top of other broadcasts. And since the crises in Poland and Afghanistan it has become There's a sort of psychological warfare being waged with more and more stations coming in, and more jamming. It's a pity because there are millions of dollars invested in the international shortwave service but the interference is getting so bad that many people wouldn't bother to listen now." For example, one band checked recently was found to be carrying 106 transmissions - on only 55 channels

Officially broadcasters are meant to use only frequencies OK'd by the international co-ordinators in Geneva: "But that's only theory. A lot of countries don't tie in with the regulations." But Cushen can identify those who aren't playing ball. He is familiar with 25 languages. "Well, I can tell Korean from Japanese from Chinese from Thai and I can also tell the source by the type of news broadcast - and also where it's coming from through my aerial system."

He has been writing a column for DX-ers for the Listener, since 1950 and besides doing Radio World for Radio Rhema also does a weekly programme for Radio Netherlands. Radio World is a magazine-type programme

with interviews and feature Items of interest to all radio listeners - both medium and shortwave. "It's not a hard DX programme. Modern radio receivers of the type found in most homes now are capable of picking up the broadcasts I monitor.

## Station of the Month

The World Christian Broadcasting Corporation's new international shortwave station, KNIS -"The New Life Station", is on the air. KNLS broadcasts from near the top of the

world, from a 71 acre site at Anchor Point on

the scenic Kenai Peninsula in Alaska, 125 miles south of Anchorage.

Initial tests were broadcast in early July, mainly on 11940kHz but also o 17880kHz, with a 30 second test tape loop consisting of the song 'Go tel it on the Mountain' and station identification. Following FCC appraisal of the tests, regular programming began on 23 July 1983.

A single 100kw transmitter and 2 antennae are located at Anchor Point. although problems with the transmitter have meant initial operations have been on reduced power, about 50kw. One antenna is beamed towards Peking and provides coverage to Japan, throughout China and most of the Soviet Union. The second antenna is directed due north across the North Pole for broadcasts to European Russia. Propogation experts are watching the results of the latter operation with interest as the signal path through the northern auroral regions has always been considered unreliable. KNLS station publicity estimates that over a third of the earth's population fall

within broadcast range from Anchor Point (see map of the 2 signal beams below). World Christian Broadcasting, the organisation behind KNLS, is a non-profit corporation, incorporated in

Texas in 1976. Using linguists and cultural experts, WCBC intends developing and airing programming in various languages, and featuring news, music, sports and information to supplement the religious content, to attract and hold the largest possible listenina audience. Initial programming from KNLS has included music from the American 'big band' era. WCBC's future plans are for 2 more strategically located stations the first to be situated in the Southeast USA or Caribbean, the second in the Indian Ocean area. From it's 3 locations, WCBC hopes to ultimately bring the Christian gospel to much of the globe.

In NZ, this new radio station KNLS Alaska has been an easy catch, with an English identification at 0900 GMT sign-on on the frequency of 11820kHz, before Russian programming begins. But be quick with your log, as their advance transmission schedule

(see box above) shows a move to 31 metres on 4 September, and the frequency chosen may not be as well heard as 11820kHz. Note also that, at time of writing, (mid-August), KNLS is still experiencing transmitter problems, with sporadic breaks in signal.



Another impression gained is the narrow mindedness of some listeners in metropolitan areas towards their rural counterparts who have suffered for years through poor reception. If advertising is the only way of providing an improved service to listeners then it is a small price to pay.

## Maori radio goes on air

A NEW radio show entirely in Maori, hits Wellington's airwayes on Thursday morn-

The programme marks. the launching of Te Reo O Poneke (the voice of Wellington). New Zealand's first private Maori radio station Using Radio Active's studio at Victoria University and its FM band of 89 mHZ it will beam out programmes to Wellington and the Hutt Vallev for the following five days, opening with a broadcast from the university's Te Herenga Waka marae.

Programme content will be a lively mix of music mainly Polynesian and reggae, and talk, mostly in Maori though some discussions of Maori issues may be conducted in English.

The aim is marae on radio and each day's broadcasts will begin and end in traditional marae style with karakia (prayers) and mihi (greetings).

## RHEMA'S **NATIONWIDE** PLANS

## No room to move on AM band

RADIO Rhema's desire to extend its "good news" to the northern half of the North Island could well see public broadcasting, private interests and regulatory agencies forced to face the unpalatable fact: there isn't enough spare spectrum to go around

Rhema's intentions are clearcut; the Christchurch-based gospel station, with repeater stations in Wellington and, from the end of this month, Nelson, wants to extend its broadcasts into Auckland. So it has applied for a warrant for Auckland, with synchronised relay stations in Hamilton, Tauranga and Whangarei.

Rhema knows there is a spare broadcast frequency allocated to Auckland, 603kHz, and that this frequency is also available for "synchronous" use in the Bay of Pleny for a relay of the Auckland programme.

So in 1981 it went ahead and applied to use 603, carefully engineering its application to take in two low-powered relays in the other two centres to provide for saturation coverage for the whole region.

So far so good, but the application has been deferred by the Broadcasting Tribunal, despite Rhema's strenuous efforts to have the case heard.

The real issue here, however, is the realisation that medium-wave frequencies are fast running out, in the main centres at

Radio New Zealand has

made no secret of its long-term plans to set up a "1YB" in Auckland, along the lines of the existing 2YB in Wellington, to provide community access "doit-yourself" programming, fulltime parliamentary broadcasts and, even more significantly, a regular outlet for the Maori and Polynesian programmes produced at its Te Reo o Aotearoa unit at Papatotete.

And that's where the real problem lies; in the main centres, there is only one spare frequency on the broadcast band on which AM stations operate.

The only relief possible in main centries has been for the student stations in Auckland, Christchurch, Hamilton and Palmerston North (Wellington's Radio Active is now on FM). These stations are so low-powered that frequencies reserved for other areas of the country can be assigned "on loan" to them in the interim.

Post Office officials charged with monitoring frequency assignments know that over-crowding of the band has become increasingly a problem as both RNZ and private interests have jockeyed to put more and more new stations on the air since the 1976 Broad-casting Act reopened procedures for licensing new stations through the tribunal.

But the NZPO has to live with the frequency plan agreed on at an international conference in Geneva in 1975. Even though extra frequencies were opened up in 1978, when stations everywhere outside the Americas, switched from 10kHz to 9kHz spacing, the fact remains that New Zealand is restricted by the competing needs of Australian, Papua-New Guinea, Fijian and other Pacific users.

And if you wonder why there are spare frequencies languishing in the Chathams, on Stewart Island and other remote, unpopulated areas—well, that's a combination of horse-trading at Geneva and engineering horse sense.

Obviously, frequencies are allocated with geographical separation in mind; the frequency plans worked out at Geneva are carefully designed to ensure minimal interference, with transmitter power and the specific geography of each area also taken into consideration.

And, given the chance, the New Zealand engineers grabbed as many allocations as they could whether the areas specified would ever conceivably have any need of a radio service.

The Post Office, however, is convinced that it has sufficient flexibility to juggle allocations at the moment; as in the case of Palmerston North private station 2XS when the NZPO was able to transfer a frequency allocated for the central North Island.

Rhema's plans to establish Christian Stations in every major town and city in New Zealand are well under way.

Permanent facilities, all capable of originating their own programmes have been established and licenced in Christchurch, Wellington and Nelson and facilities in various stages of construction have been purchased in Whangarei, Auckland, and Timaru. Active branches are busy locating suitable premises in Hamilton, Tauranga and Palmerston North, and Dunedin is just commencing a new membership thrust.

Other centres planning to open up shortly are New Plymouth, Wanganui, Hastings/Napier, Gisborne and Invercargill. Several other centres are being studied.

Rhema's Executive are seeking willing people, who love the Lord, to help establish Christian radio in ALL the above areas.

If you love the Lord and would be prepared to do anything from lending an occasional hand to heading up a

Rhema branch, please contact the National Director.

The ultimate vision is to have Nation Wide Christian Radio Network. It is envisaged that some of the programme will originate from one of the main stations say 12pm to 6am when local stations will broadcast from their own local studios.

In the interim however, it is first planned that all programmes will originate from Auckland, Wellington or Christchurch and only public service announcements, special broadcasts and local newscast will be local.

Ultimately, the tremendous savings in costs by a National sharing network will be immense. The network can also run programmes for smaller stations who cannot afford to establish full facilities and relay transmitters can be employed in otherwise completely unserviced areas.


