Ralph Sutton, Wellington reminds Wellington area DXers (and visitors to the region) that the former Radio NZ receiving station at Quartz Hill is now an amateur radio DX site. Operated by the local Wellington NZART branch, the site has accommodation and power, and a marvellous array of aerials.

Until 1996, Quartz Hill was used for monitoring MW/SW signals for Radio NZ. It's almost 1000ft above sealevel, located on the western coast near Makara. NZRDXL members are welcome to use the facilities through membership of the Quartz Hill User Group. League member Ralph handles bookings and inquiries. Phil van de Paverd, Auckland has some useful links. With some help from Tom Rushbrooke he suggests checking out www.intervalsignals.com for a long list of stations, including domestic, external, clandestine etc. Tune into the station, get frequency lists, live audio or other info about the station.

There's also a pre-recorded list of interval signals, IDs in various languages, signature tunes and national anthems. Ideal stuff to ID unknown catches. Phil also recommends www.latinworld.com/radio for those interested in Latin music.

The Committee on Democratic Communications is a San Francisco group leading the 'fight for microradio' in the USA. Recently, the FCC has started calling for applications for thousands of new LPFM (Low Power FM) stations. All have a maximum power of 100 watts and must be non-commercial educational or TIS stations. In the Pacific area, the June batch includes the Mariana Islands. In November, American Samoa and Hawaii applications are opened, followed by Guam in May 2001. There's a challenge for our FM members! More info at www.nlgcdc.org (via MediaWatch).

Tonga also welcomes new stations. Radio Tonga has been granted a TV channel, and is planning FM repeaters at Vava'u and H'apai islands. Oceania Broadcasting Network gets a second TV channel, plus a new FM radio network for Nuku'alofa and other islands. (Matangi Tonga Magazine). Meanwhile, TV Tonga is another new station, run by the Friendly Island Broadcasting Network. They begin streaming video TV direct from Nuku'alofa shortly at www.tvtonga.com .

Firm FM 100.8 FM Wellington has been on-air for 9 months now. Run by two local club DJ's the station promotes new tracks for other DJs, and is co-located with Firm Records at Shop 6, 120 Victoria Street, Wellington. A power boost is expected soon, format is dance

Paul Aronsen, Invercargill is editor of Southland DX Digest the local rag for DXers which will soon celebrate its 64th continuous year of publication since starting in 1936. Now available from Paul via email, it's an ideal way for present and oldtime Southlanders to stay in touch with the local branch news and events.

Paul Ormandy, Oamaru writes: Over the past 26 years I've been a fervent hunter of QSL's. I've had a persistent attitude, used consulates, embassies, visits, emails, Prime Ministers (ZNS Bahamas) and would attempt to QSL every station I heard. Hold on to copies, send follow-ups, USD, tapes, IRCs, souvenirs and pursue stations for 10+ years. It's cost me and arm and a Watkins Johnson probably! However, I've been reappraising my attitude over the past year.

(1) Proof: in all my years of DXing, only one person has said 'show me your QSL as I don't believe you'. (2) NZRDXL competitions used to be hotly contested. No longer, and the incentive to QSL has gone too. (3) Collecting QSLs in albums no-one asks to see, and the novelty value of 3000 QSLs is wearing thin. (4) Achievement is one area I can focus on, like 250 Latins on MW. (5) If a station asks for reports and offers QSLs, I'll reciprocate. The upshot is I guess I'll maintain an audio ID database on the PC and chase the odd QSL to treasure. I still get a kick out of hearing rare stations and love DXpeditions with a technical approach to new aerials and devices. I also enjoy sharing my beverage site with visiting DXers!

Commonwealth Broadcasting Association (www.oneworld.org/cba/) news for the month includes: Solomon Islands Broadcasting Corporation continues to transmit normally despite reports of the station being taken over by armed militants in the Honiara coup attempt. (However, Gizo has been occupied by a third militant group and the 945 AM situation is unclear) (Radio Australia). SW listeners check 5020 SW for live transmissions from the new transmitter mentioned last month.

AIR Delhi launches a a new digital radio service for Middle East/NE Africa via WorldSpace on August 1 (Deccan Herald) and, the South African Broadcasting Corporation launched Radio Sonder Grense (RSG) with a multimedia platform of radio, internet, TV and WAP (Wireless Application Protocol) on May 19 (SABC). Barry Williams, Auckland checks in: George Beardsmore's recent comments about striking the 'right night' brought back a few memories of my own. Over the years, I've experienced quite a few memorable DX occasions, but two in particular were special.

The first one was back in June 1958 while spending a few days DXing at Claydens farm at Whangaparaoa. This was in the days when Yank BC stations had 'tone tests' usually on a Monday night NZ time. Normally, it was lucky to hear one or two new stations testing, but this night, in a matter of an hour, five stations were ID'd and logged. Four of them were 250 watters and the other a 500 watter! As George said, the band was full of DX, but one had to concentrate on certain frequencies to get IDs as signals floated up and down.

The second was a DX weekend Jim Gorman and I had at Parau, on the northern shore of the Manukau Harbour. A DX Convention was held there in the early 1980s. In July 1982, we heard Yaounde 4850, Cayenne 5050, Lebanon 6215, Rio Muni 4925, Conakry 4910 and a 1kW Angolan in Cabinda on 4970. A very good weekend's DX in anyone's logbook! But, what made the weekend extraordinary was the signal from Radio Apinte, Suriname on 4995. This station, always a difficult logging was word perfect at speaker strength for 3 hours! We both sat there in amazement! It's moments like these that make the hobby so fascinating.

Singapore Press Holdings gets two new FM radio networks and two new free-to-air TV channels in a loosening up of media control in Singapore. They publish ten newspapers. State owned broadcaster MediaCorp gets the right to publish a newspaper at the same time. (AsiaMedia at www.asiamedia.ucla.edu)

After many years, the Pacific Radio Heritage Collection (c) project has finally got underway. This is initially based on my own collection of Pacific radio material and visits to various stations from Hawaii to Tahiti to Norfolk to Noumea and more in between. With the help of webmaster Paul Ormandy, the PRHC is hosted at www.radiodx.com/spdxr and will feature an ongoing release of previously published and new articles about Pacific radio.

The first article is WXLE Memories, the story of WXLE 1385. This has quickly attracted help from DXers in the USA who've supplied rare photos of the studio caravan, studio console and 'that' 250 watt transmitter. Another WXLE article is being prepared, based on an exclusive on-line interview with one of the WXLE DJs. An audio clip of a WXLE ID from Chris Martin has added another dimension to the Canton Island site. In many ways, this is a test article, to see how DXers and others respond so we can be prepared as other articles are released.

The PRHC is ambitious: I plan to bring together every known article about Pacific radio ever published onto the one site, plus commission others. Author permissions and copyright clearances are already underway, and we have something like 20 articles in the schedule with Paul Ormandy's ZK2ZN Sunshine Radio Niue already on site. Radio Vemerama, KMTH, the WWII Mosquito Network, KUAI, Radio Norfolk and 2AP are amongst others in preparation.

You can help. Check your Pacific QSL letters, cards and collections for interesting items, magazines for articles, even books (we're getting clearances of excerpts about Hawaiian Radio and 'Hawaii Calls' the famous radio show from a major reference book) and tapes of rare recordings (like Radio Fiji on SW from the 1960s and early 1970s) and write and tell us what you've found. We'll also be accessing the NZRDXL Archives in Dunedin. Plus sources in Australia, the USA and other locations.

In the meantime, write to Pacific Radio Heritage Collection (c) c/o David Ricquish, PO Box 14339, Wellington, New Zealand or email talkback@radiodx.com and we'll contact you about your material. This project relies on the goodwill of many people in the DX hobby and beyond. We'll have some clear protocols for handling material ready shortly. For those without web access, PRHC material will steadily be licenced to hardcopy publications such as magazines, and several books are planned for 2001.

A reminder that Talkback is your column, a place to talk about the hobby and that your thoughts and views are very welcome. The mailbag has room for more news and views for July!

In the meantime, Paul Ormandy's South Pacific DX Report continues to be broadcast with David Miller in Dunedin (every second Sunday at 8:30pm on the NUU Country program, Hills AM 1575); David Ricquish in Wellington (now at the new time of 12:20pm every second Saturday on Access Radio 783 AM) and David Norrie in Auckland (every second Friday at 1:05pm on Access Radio 810 AM). Let your friends know and listen yourself for the latest in SW news.

This month, my station of the month is Radio Monte Carlo, Monaco. From studios in the Blvd Princesse Charlotte in this small Mediterranean principality, the Italian Service features contemporary Italian pop and American soft jazz music for listeners across the French Riviera, Italy and parts of southern Switzerland. In Monaco, 106.8 FM carries the signal. You can listen live at www.radiomontecarlo.net using WindowsPlayer. It's much cheaper than visiting there! Enjoy. Ciao.

ANTIGUA: I was reading about Deutsche Welle's use of 6160 via Antigua to the Pacific in English at 0900-0945. This freq has been in use for many years now, yet even with the high MUF levels, and RNW-Bonaire heard on 9 MHz, etc. I wonder as to why DW's technical people isn't giving any thought to using a higher freq for this txion? When DW started using Antigua to the Pacific for the English broadcasts, back in 1983 or so, it was using a 9 MHz channel, and I think they also tried an 11 MHz channel too. Now for quite a long time they have been sticking with the 49 mb, and yes in AUS/NZ there is some interference noticed on the channel. When the B00 schedule goes into effect at the end of Oct, I hope that DW will have a better choice of freq and thus reception quality of the 0900 broadcast will be improved. (Joe Hanlon-USA, BCDX) What's the view of listeners in this, the target region? (Francis)

AUSTRALIA: The UK-based religious broadcaster, Christian Vision, has won the lease for the former Radio Australia transmitters at Cox Peninsula near Darwin. CV will operate the site under a 10-year temporary lease. They outbid Merlin for the rights. There has been a huge political furore in Australia over the government decision, particularly the loss of the site for use by RA. Christian Voice plans to commence broadcasts within a few months, targeting India with plans for several hours of English and Hindi programming each day. CV also operates from Zambia and Chile. Then into programme of talk, music and patriotic songs, and another clear ID at around 0329. Off at 0659, also noted 9 June on by 0105. Possibly a recent reactivation as I don't recall hearing it myself or seeing it reported recently. Excellent daytime signal here, but with some intermittent audio/modulation problems. NORTH/SOUTH KOREA: Following this month's historic summit meeting between the

leaders of North and South Korea, there has been some speculation about the future of the propaganda broadcasts that each side directs at the other. The BBC reported "South Korea is suspending all anti-North Korean propaganda, ... And South Korean monitors said North Korean radio stations had dropped reports on South Korean affairs which contained fierce denunciations of the Seoul government." (Hans Johnson, Cumbre, 16 June). But the various stations were still on air a day later according to Sonny Ashimori in Japan — although the rhetoric had been toned down. Perhaps a good opportunity to tune in these stations before the march of history overtakes them. Hi all, well it may be winter but the Sun is having an influence on listening conditions - not from the heat but rather the flares and coronal mass ejections which have been upsetting things. And a goodly number of contributors this time round. And some surprising signals too - 1570kHz (one of Bill Woller's favourites) has produced a new Argentine - as yet a bit of a mystery, and another WGSR Fernandina Beach, from Florida see the trail further on...

Laurie Boyer, Invercargill, "Just three in this month. Have re written seven reports over six years old and surprisingly three came back immediately they were WKNG 1060, WGGA 1240 and WDUN 550 along with 2ZH Hawera." Presume those Yanks logged on one of your USA odysseys???

Sutton Burtenshaw, Hamilton "Reports out this month to Southern Star 882, 531PI, 1XC, Tarana 1386, Access 1206. Veries in from BBC 1476, SS 882 and 1YA." Sutton has plans to run a radial wire down the driveway as well as a tower!

Nev McKenty, Tamatea "Here are some loggings from Lagoon Farm May 18th. I worked on USA, Peter worked South America." Some good stuff Nev... you'll be giving up SW soon!

Peter Chambers, Eskdale "Actually got around to some MW DXing during May. Was most surprised to pick up the 1630 Argentine rather well from home on the vertical aerial. The Taumarunui beacon only puts out it's CW code on USB. With the Drake on LSB and off-tuned to knock down the carrier, I can get excellent reception on 1630 until the 1629 Aussies fade in. First heard the 1630 Argentine on May 16th, on May 17th from home picked up R El Mundo 1070 quite good. May 18th Neville McKenty and myself set up at Napier Airport for the evening. On a 140 metre radial wire at 150 degree I picked up some of the Argentines quite well, especially 1150 & 1190. I think however that propagation was on the way down. Absolutely no signal level peak with sunrise in Argentina. Stable peak signal levels all evening

through to just after 1030z then rapid decline to total fade-out. May 19th I went to Ocean Beach and ran a 120 metre radial-wire at 150 degrees down a very steep hillside having to throw the wire across a slip-face and large blackberry areas. Argentine reception through to Buenos Aires had gone right off. The 1630 station was poor and others non-existent, However, Chile 1380 was still getting through well. What really made the effort worth-while was hitting a new Argentine on 1570 that really came in well. First heard it at 0330 and stayed with it more or less continuously till sign-off 0612. Caught it signing on at 0955." (I wonder if it was R Familia del Maule from Talca, Chile as Argentina is UTC -3 hours??-ed).

Arthur de Maine, Wellington "Trip to Cape Palliser two weekends ago did not produce much in the way of logs on Mediumwave except for two Australians. 2ME heard at 1043 hours songs in English and at 1104 announcement in English "Steve Jacob to raise a million dollars and then mentioned Coles. The other one was 2NTC 1701 at 1706 hours - Classic hits and at 1718 hours mention the best of yesterday NTC. Heard on the Drake R-8 with 80 metre longwire. Maybe need a few extra reels of wire for good MW DX...

Note that the ratings now are commercial stations only — National Radio is excluded. (Research International via Median Strip)

Canadian media giant CanWest, operators of TV3, TV4 plus More FM, Channel Z and The Breeze, is now majority owner of radio rival RadioWorks, which operates the Radio Pacific talk network, and a number of FM music formats including Solid Gold. Last year RadioWorks merged with the Radio Otago group. (via Median Strip) The government is releasing a series of "high-level" policy papers to facilitate public discussion on broadcastingwill be prepared this month. Topics include youth radio and reservation of radio spectrum for non-commercial purposes. (Via Median Strip 4/00) There are indications that we will soon see more National Radio outlets on FM to address reception problems on MW. (BC)

ANGUILLA Radio Anguilla's 1505 AM tower was toppled by weather, silencing the AM service as of December 26, 1999. It is suspected that Radio Anguilla is now solely on 95.5 FM. GOODBYE TELETEXT After more than 15 years, Television New Zealand have discontinued free access to the Teletext service by the NZ Radio DX League and the NZ Association of Radio Transmitters. BRYAN CLARK has been visiting the TVNZ headquarters building every month to personal update shortwave listening tips on page 397. The page prompted a steady stream of enquiries and a number of our members 'discovered' the League through this medium. AMATEUR RADIO LICENCING CHANGES PROPOSED Member YURI MUZYKA highlights

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possible changes to the regulations covering amateur radio in NZ. The Radio Spectrum Management Group of the Ministry of Economic Development has advised NZART that it is considering the following changes to promote and encourage the further development of Amateur Radio in this country:

- 3 levels of amateur radio operator qualification and radio licence to be retained, with Novice and Limited grades to be renamed Entry and Technician respectively.
- Callsigns no longer grouped to indicate grading or to change when grade changes.
- An exam pass at the present Novice level to give immediate access to Novice band 144-148mHz at existing power levels. Access to Novice bands below 30mHz when credited with a Morse test pass at 5 words per minute.



BOOK REVIEW: THE AIB GLOBAL BROADCASTING GUIDE by Mike Butler

This is a neat 15 x 21cm booklet of around 30 pages setting out the schedules of international shortwave broadcasters in an easy-to-read format in alphabetical order of country then broadcaster's name. Included are postal, web and e-mail addresses as well as phone and fax numbers for each broadcaster.

Not included are English speaking DOMESTIC shortwave broadcasters such as the Solomon Islands Broadcasting Corporation, Papua New Guinea National Broadcasting Corporation, Radio Malaysia and Radio Nigeria. This may disappoint some listeners. Many private, mainly reliaious, stations are also excluded.

Although the target areas of transmissions are shown, no details of the locations of transmitting sites are given. This makes it impossible to estimate how well a frequency will work into your region-if yours is not in the target area - and even if it is!

The booklet is published in January and May. As the seasonal schedule changes occur close to the beginning of the months of November and April it means that at least three months of your year's listening will not be accurately served by the publication - ie. November, December and April. However, full marks must be accorded to the Global Broadcasting Guide for at least supplying an update - which is more than can be said for the two most prominent shortwave bibles!

Unlike local DX sessions and local monthly publications reporting ACTUAL reception, the booklet is unable to indicate whether a particular frequency will perform well at your location - so it is left to you to try all the frequencies listed. Also, stations sometimes make alterations AFTER the seasonal change-over date for which the booklet cannot possibly cover.

To attempt to ascertain the level of accuracy/freshness of the data supplied, I checked about 50 items against my log and found the following frequencies missing in the JANUARY issue:

- 1. first logged September 1999, rechecked February 2000 Australia 11550 at 0900 UTC;
- 2. logged or checked November 1999, rechecked January or February 2000 Austria 6015 at 0630 UTC, Thailand 9535 at 1900 UTC, Germany 12055 at 0900 UTC, Russia 9830 at 1900 UTC, Malta 7150 at 0702΋–V'µ«n≥M4ōrd So the booklet is not infallible-but largely correct.

In having solely a country/broadcaster listing, this Guide of course cannot concisely tell you what reception is available to you during a particular hour. Only a listing by time will achieve this.

Despite these limitations, the little book will be useful to those who have no access to more local and comprehensive sources of shortwave information.

The price of the Guide is approx.NZ6.50 per issue or about NZ5.70 if a 2 year subscription is taken out - subject to the exchange rate. Precisely in British pounds - £1.95 for a single issue; £3.50 for two issues; £6.85 for 4 issues, all post paid to anywhere in the world.

REVIEW: SONY ICF-SW07 WORLD BAND RECEIVER reviewed by John West

Labeled a "FM Stereo/SW/MW/LW PLL synthesized receiver", the Sony ICF-SW07 is a small pocket receiver designed principally for the (high-tech) traveler, and includes many features found on serious communications receivers.

CONCEPT


Sony have recognized that the most difficult factor in tuning shortwave is to find the best frequency for a particular station - because there are so many frequencies and they are being changed often. The SW07 is designed around a ROM (Read-Only Memory chip) which contains pre-programmed frequencies for BBC, VOA, DW and others. (The user can also select R. Nederland, RFI, R. Japan, REE Spain or CRI). To keep up to date Sony will produce a new ROM in October each year for users to purchase. The ROM will be programmed with those frequencies on which the station will be heard in a particular time-zone (region). The set can scan through all possible frequencies (of one of the stations above) and stop on the frequency giving the best reception.

A 6-character alphanumeric display allows the user to view/edit a station description label for each stored frequency.

BASIC SPECS

Frequency coverage: 150 - 29999 kHz (LW/MW/SW) and 76 - 108 MHz (FM). A back-lit LCD display gives a digital readout of frequency (to the nearest kHz on LW/MW/SW, or nearest 0.1 MHz on FM). There are a number of tuning modes: Manual, using "up-down" buttons, direct key-pad input of frequency, selecting the pre-programmed or user-programmed memory channels, and a SCAN mode.

Modes of demodulation: AM, FM, LSB/CW, USB plus synchronous AM (LSB or USB selectable). Power: 3VDC ($2 \times AA$ batteries) or optional AC power adapter. In addition to the pre-programmed memories mentioned above, there is 100 memory channels



available for the user to use ("MY" button).

There is a Line Out socket (3.5 mm) stereo) for recording programs on an external tape recorder. If you have a stereo recorder, you can even record FM in stereo! A tone switch - music quality (also enables stereo reception in FM), and news quality (narrower audio bandwidth - mono reception in FM). A variable RF attenuator can be switched in and out. The external antenna socket (3.5 mm stereo) can supply power to the active antenna, if used, or a long wire can be connected to the inner pin. A world clock is provided so that you can fine the time in any time-zone around the world. The clock can also be programmed as an alarm clock - either to activate a beep or to turn the radio on. Weight is 257a with batteries.

The receiver comes with the following accessories: stereo earplugs, active

antenna (see below), leather carry case and Sony's Wave handbook (basically a sawn-off version of 'Passport to Worldband Radio') and an operating manual.

LOOP ACTIVE ANTENNA AN-LP2

The AN-LP2 is a broadband active receiving antenna designed for indoor use. Folded up, it measures $205 \times 180 \times 17.8$ mm, but when opened up ready for use it has a diameter of about 490 mm. This antenna has a clip and a suction cap to enable it to be hooked up in a variety of places. Total weight is 236g including batteries and control unit. The AN-LP2 looks similar to an earlier model, the AN-LP1, however unlike it's predecessor, the AN-LP2 does not have a band selector - it simply operates between 3 to 27 MHz, continuously. This is a short-wave only antenna and does not perform well on MW, LW nor the FM band. The active antenna is powered by 2 \times 1.5 V AA batteries, or via the receiver using the external antenna socket.

PERFORMANCE

RF performance is quite good. I was pleasantly surprised to be able to listen to MW DX with a modest length of wire connected (e.g. Radio Disney, USA on 1580kHz with 50ft of wire). The set is very good for SW reception. There is only a small delay for the system to lock when using AM synchronous detection, and the ability to select either sideband of an AM signal is a definite PLUS when trying to combat interference from an adjacent frequency. Resolving SSB signals is a breeze with this set, as the tuning steps are 100 Hz.

The built-in small speaker does not do the audio justice. For music lovers; when connected to HI-FI stereo headphones in FM, the audio quality is unbelievable.

GRIPES

To a new user, the set is not terribly user friendly (you need the manual!) — this set has all of the appeal of a multi-function calculator. The built-in speaker doesn't do justice to the audio

quality. The size of the volume control (a small thumbwheel on the side) is VERY small. One would expect that this may give problems after frequent use. There is no tuning knob (in the traditional sense), however the 2-stage (course/fine) up-down buttons work fairly well. Sadly for FM DXers, the external antenna socket does not work on FM.

OVERALL

My personal opinion is that this is an unusually good portable receiver with advanced features, designed specifically with the world traveler in mind and a price-tag to match. The ICF-SW07 retails at NZ\$999.00 (30/5/2000).

THAT CAN'T BE ME!" - TIMOR RADIO UPDATE

Taken from UNESCO's Internet Website 3/00

When children heard their own voices for the first time on radio, they could hardly believe their ears. Popping eyes said 'That's not me! It can't be!' But it was. Using only a single microphone connected to a cassette recorder, in turn plugged to a 20 watt FM transmitter, the signals went up the cable and radiated from a simple dipole antenna to the community for a few kilometres around.

This experiment was conducted in the streets of towns in East Timor - Manatuto, mainly with young children; in Baucau, at the municipal market with two CNRT (National Council for the Resistance of Timor) representatives explaining the concept of radio run, owned and managed by the community. In Lospalos, with the help of CNRT and Church leaders, over 60 people including farmers and young students, came on Sunday to discuss the possibilities of their making radio programmes. Asked about the use of radio, one farmer said 'We are in the fields all day, what can we know about the rest of the world without radio?'

Leading the experiments were Louie Tabing, Manager of the Philippines-based Tambuli Community Radio Foundation, and Romy Carballo, Senior Broadcast Engineer, also of Tambuli; Choy Arnaldo, UNESCO Headquarters and Griet Dierckxsens, UNV staff member of the UNTAET Office of Communication and Public Information (OCPI), Dili. Griet was especially helpful as her fluent behasa quickly won people over to speak freely, and coaxed some bashful ones to sing. She also explained community radio and animated several discussions.

It was not simple at first to explain the difference between community radio and the transmissions of UNTAET radio available only in Dili and not yet in any of the districts. 'Community radio,' said Louie Tabing, 'is radio that is owned, managed and produced for the people and by the people.'

After meeting around the table, we invited the leaders to take the microphone and explain to the public on the air, what community radio was and what it could do for Baucau. They said it more eloquently than ourselves in Tetun and Behasa.

Baucau was fortunate to have a strong District Administrator, Ms Sarwa Sultana whose dynamism and warmth were overwhelming. She organised a group of some 20 community representatives. She was able assisted by Ms Liezl Rich, District Field Officer (DFO), from South Africa who had done some work with community radio there. Many of her staff also attended the meeting and supported the ideas.

All the communities visited were eager to participate in the radio project. In Baucau and Lospalos, community leaders themselves took to the airwaves and explained the project

to the people gathered and to others listening on their radios. In Lospalos, some speakers also used a fourth language, Fatloka, from the Pacific.

'Costs would be greatly reduced by making use of the existing towers in all these districts,' suggested Liezl and Hugo. Fortunately the new country has inherited a vast and complex system of telecoms and broadcast towers, some with several buildings on the property. These could be used for a standby or daytime generator, transmitter hall, production studios and offices. In districts where the tower is located away from the town proper, such as Lospalos, suitable radio station premises will be identified in the town and a link will be installed to reach the transmitter.

UNESCO with funds-in-trust from Portugal and a contribution from USAID will provide training experts and equipment. The bigger contribution will be that of the community – their own time, skills, organisatioms(l)ei+Z¶ë4ÓO'to make programmes, run technical operations and take the day to day responsibility for overall management. It is easy to turn on the transmitter,' says Romy Carballo, 'It's much harder to turn on the community.'

Radio receivers remain a major problem. While there are a fair number in Baucau which was less damaged by the post referendum crisis, almost all radios in the other districts were stolen or destroyed. The slow rebuilding of the economy has not yet enabled people to buy radios. Batteries are rare or pricey. For the particular conditions in East Timor it is more relevant to select one of the several models of combined power sources — battery, solar panel, and wind-up generator, though these are still pegged at fairly high prices ranging from US\$35 to US\$60.

But even as these communities prepare for establishing their own radio, two important actions are running parallel: the finalisation of the East Timor Broadcasting Law which states how all broadcasting shall be organised in the country; and the revitalisation of district relay transmitters for the national programme of UNTAET Radio. The first two links are to be established in Baucau and Maliana in the month of March, while the law should reach its finalisation stages by early April. There may soon be new voices added to the airwaves in some districts, whereas up to now only Radio UNTAET and Radio Voz de Esperanza (also called Radio Falantil) radiate on FM in the capital and Radio Kamanek broadcasts on medium wave (1404 kHz).

The real reckoning in community radio is that people will have their own means to seek information as well as to provide information and communicate with each other. When there is free dialogue and free circulation of ideas, informed opinions can be made and decisions for cooperation taken. The basic processes of democracy can be reinforced from the bottom up. Radio, like any other means of communication can speed up the democratic process and make it real and reachable. Radio can make self-determination and self-empowerment a reality for all.

The World of Radio Rhema in 2000 with David Ricquish, Wellington

From Christchurch garage to Moscow and a lot more inbetween...

It all began with DXing....founder of Radio Rhema, Christchurch youth Richard Berry, used to listen to shortwave radio station HCJB from Quito, Ecuador. In the early 1960's, he began to wonder why such a radio station couldn't exist in New Zealand. His story of vision and sacrifice which resulted in one of the world's largest religious radio networks is inspiring (read a shortened version at http://www.rhema.co.nz>www.rhema.co.nz)

From a mobile studio and 100 watt AM transmitter......a one day broadcast in 1976 introduced Christchurch listeners to the music and talk format which has now become familiar to all New Zealand. Now, in 2000, there are three networks covering 92% of the population. Rhema Broadcasting Group owns 28 AM channels, leases 5 others, owns 28 FM channels, and leases another 9 for a total of 68 stations across the two main islands.

Radio Rhema is the core network, with Southern Star Network the second largest (with 50kW on 657 AM they have the most powerful commercial AM transmitter in the South Pacific) and Life FM concentrated in the Auckland / Waikato region.

UCB is the umbrella group......which includes not only the three local networks, but also a growing worldwide influence. UCB is based in Auckland and has affiliates in the Pacific, Australia, UK, Russia and Estonia.

UCB Pacific Partne......(http://www.pacificpartners.org/cg/MainMenu) is a registered charity in Auckland, Nadi (Fiji) and Kingman, AZ (USA) operating A3R Radio (93.1 FM, 200 watts) in Nuku'alofa, Tonga. In this tiny pacific kingdom, media is severely regulated and all commercial activity ceases on Sundays. In this very conservative nation, 93FM complements state owned media with a mostly music and educational format. A bible training outreach is centered in Fiji.

Vision FM covers Austral......(http://www.visionfm.com.au) since 1999 with 30 low powered FM stations (mainly in Queensland, northern NSW and northern Western Australia) and a Channel 18 audio feed on the Optus B3 satellite system.

Serving small towns, rural areas and increasingly coastal resort areas, Vision FM has an easy listening music format, distributed from the Brisbane studios. Expanding rapidly, Vision FM holds more than another 100+ low powered FM licences across the country and is emerging as the second largest network after ABC Radio.

Radio Rhema is here too...with 30 community groups in larger towns and cities franchising the Rhema FM name. Around 15 broadcast permanently with another 15 using short-term licences as a step along the way towards gaining fulltime frequencies. More local groups are planning to take the Rhema brand into all the major metropolitan cities.

In Europe, UCB is also expanding.....from original timeshare on Manx Radio (1368 AM) and on AM/FM Irish stations, UCB Europe now broadcasts two non-commercial 24 hour NSP networks.

One has the same format as Radio Rhema (NZ) and is carried from this month on the SKY Digitial satellite system (SKY Sports1 audio 7.56mHz). The other is Crossrhythms, similar to the Life FM format in New Zealand. The networks are also carried on the Dream Family Network, part of Christian Channel Europe.

Future plans are for FM coverage throughout the UK and Ireland to complement satellite service. Based in Stoke-on-Trent, the UCB Europe facility covers three hectares with studios, technical and outreach services (http://www.ucb.co.uk) to underpin efforts in Eastern Europe as well.

Raadio 7 covers the Baltic state of Estonia......from Tallinn, this FM network began in 1995 with help from Swedish based IBRA, currently operates on 103.1 FM with 1kW and is about to expand into four more cities with new licences. Format is similar to Radio Rhema (NZ) with international music.

and finally to Moscow......where Radio Teos (http://www.teos.org.ru/) uses 20kW on 1134 AM from Kurkino in the Moscow region, as well as 20kW on 1089 AM for St.Petersburg. Broadcasting since 1993, Radio Teos is 30% financially supported by local listeners, and you

can hear them via RealAudio at their website.

Radio Teos has also begun a TV channel carried on the Petrony Cable TV system in St.Petersburg and surrounding cities such as Novgorod and Pskov. Satellite broadcasts of the AM programs are planned soon, for retransmission via AM and FM stations in cities west of the Urals.

From Christchurch NZ to the heart of Moscow......is a journey which reflects one of the most successful radio format franchising stories. Avoiding the small audiences of traditional SW religious broadcasters, and with little or no fanfare, Radio Rhema continues to expand with potentially hundreds of stations broadcasting locally worldwide. As a combined missionary and commercial outreach, Radio Rhema is an amazing success story.

And they QSL.....perhaps reflecting the early inspiration of HCJB, Radio Rhema has great QSL cards for their stations. As the designer of their very first QSL card for that 1976 broadcast, this DXer is pleased to see old traditions carried through into the high tech world of today. Richard Berry would be pleased.
