Paul Ormandy, Oamaru sends details of the new plan to establish web pages for every Pacific Island broadcaster. The Pacific Islands Broadcasting Association is running the project, with help from NHK Tokyo's Hyosyo-Bunka Foundation. Check out the story at Radio Netherlands Media Network: www.rnw.nl .

The basic aim is to give stations a global audience, and generate income through expatriate islanders sending messages for broadcast back home. Some sites are already appearing. My own research on the WWII Mosquito Network has received tremendous suppport from Jack Fox (at the NZRDXL Archives), Adrian Peterson of AWR, Trent Christman ('Brass Button Broadcasters' to be reviewed shortly) and FEN Tokyo.

We're now running at 50+ pages of notes, and expanding through the Jungle Network to occupied Japan, liberated China, and onto the old Indian Empire. This material will emerge as a series of articles, well illustrated, on both the website and here in the DX Times.

In the meantime, last word this month to Barry Williams, Auckland who writes: In the August DX Times, Ken Baird raised an interesting subject regarding the importance of loggings. I've never been a program listener. The ultimate verification of a station logged has usually been my aim.

During the early days of DX, the QSL was of prime importance. Today, have a look at the size of Bandwatch compared to SW Mailbag and we can see times have changed. I've no problem with this trend. Most DXers today don't consider QSL's as important as I do.

I question the value of listing loggings in Ladder format. I've questioned the value of our Ladders contest for a number of years. To me, it only signifies the amount of time we can put into the hobby! I only contribute to the Continents Listings; to me, more relevant.

Re Ken's idea: I presume this would be of new stations and frequencies. I can see little merit with this. Perhaps Ken could enlarge on the idea, and other members give some feedback via 'Talkback'. We have more listeners than QSLers and maybe members see merit with the idea. At least it would boost sales of League Logbooks!'

What say you everyone? Personally, I want to see Points brought back, and competitions actually have some competition again! Ladder and Continents totals could also have points totals for each entry. Sort out the 6BE's from the 2YA's! The VOA blasters from the 75 watt Bolivians on SW!

The Sydney Olympic Games Opening Ceremonies are now on TV, so until next month, thanks for renewing your membership, DX wisely and well, and see you in the DX Times next month. I'm sorry for holding Andy up over a week this month. Brickbats to me. Ciao.

AUSTRALIA: The ARDXC together with Radio Australia, is printing 250 special Olympic games QSL cards. As usual only full detailed reports will be verified. Now importantly in the ARDXC we allow seperate stations in this case Radio 2BL (702) Sydney on MW is doing the broadcasts and these will go out on Radio Australia frequencies. So in the case of ARDXC this a separate station. You will hear 2BL 702 IDis on Radio Australia. At the top of the hour you will hear Radio Australia ID's. All reports must got to Radio Australia GPO Box 428, G Melbourne 3001 Victoria Australia. All reports must be received by 16th October, 2000. The first 250 reports will be QSLed, once run out of the cards that's it! Allow 6 weeks for processing. Email reports treated like mail reports (Wright) More details on RA's Olympic coverage below! (Francis)

BELARUS: Belaruskaje Radyo has local programming 0340-0400 and 1500-1600 on it's first network. R Stalitsa (which means "capital") is the local station for Minsk area and heard on all BR 1 freqs who are not in use by a provincial stn, including most of the SWs with the exception of the ones with programming from the Brest, Grodno and Mogilyov studios, which are true local stns and otherwhise being on FM only; the staff of R Mogilyov (5965) was rather surprised to receive a report from Austrian DXer Herbert Meixner.(Kai Ludwig, BCDX)

CANADA: 6160 CKZN St. John's is on 24 hours a day as of July 10th. They relay CBN 640 except from 6 AM to 9:30 AM local when they relay a morning program from CFGB in Goose Bay, according to the station's engineer, Keith Durnford. (via Johnson, Cumbre) This shares the frequency with CKZ \underline{U} in Vancouver (Francis)

CENTRAL AFRICAN REPUBLIC The Hirondelle foundation tells Cumbre DX that a shortwave transmitter is en route to their latest station in Bangui, Radio Ndeke Luka. It is planned to operate it on Radio MINURCA's old frequencies of 5900 and 9900. As for the equipment used by Radio MINURCA, it was shipped by the UN to Sierra Leone some months ago [No word from the UN yet on how it is being used-Johnson] Radio Ndeke Luka can be

found on at http://www.hirondelle.org (via Johnson, Cumbre)

CHILE 6029.6 Radio Santa Maria, since two months ago they have been active again on short wave with their regular transmissions Monday to Saturday 1045-0230 (-0230 Sunday) & Sunday 1130-0300 (-0300 Monday). Previously their transmissions were irregular. Recently they have repaired their transmitter. (Barrera, Cumbre)

6080 Radio Patagonia Chilena. Inactive due to high costs of their kilowatt transmitter and electricity in their area. Also they large number of stations that are in their area. This is the reason for their inactivity I was told by technician Sr. Luis Arturo Ojeda. (Barrera, Cumbre)

INDIA: From August 15, 2000 (India's independence Day),AIR Jaipur 50 kw will drop 3345 for morning transmission in favour of 4910 (recently they dropped it for the evening broadcast). So their revised sked on 4910 will be 0025-0400 & 1130-1741. Similarly, recently AIR Lucknow 50 kw dropped 3245 in favour of 4880 and the revised sked on 4880 is 0025-0400, 1215-1741 (Jose Jacob, Cumbre)

INDONESIA: A couple of the high-powered transmitters in the Jakarta area have recently been reactivated, and up to at least four frequencies are now observed on air simultaneously (compared with a maximum of two previously). The domestic RRI Programa Nasional is heard on 11860 (to approx. 0100), 11760 (0100-1600) and revived 15125 which seems to be on all day, but is hard to trace here during local nighttime with poor propagation and QRM from co-channel Taiwan. External Sce Voice of Indonesia is heard at 0030-0400 on 9525 & 11785, 0800-0900 on 11785, and 0900-1300 on 9525. 15150 and FM 103 MHz for the Jakarta area are also announced in the EE segments beginning at 0100 & 0800 (Alan Davies, Cumbre)

MADAGASCAR: Voice of the People (to Zimbabwe) address is P.O. Box CY 3093, Causeway, Harare, Zimbabwe (Marks RNMN via Johnson, Cumbre)

SITES The American Forces Radio and Television Service (AFRTS) is operating via a number of sites, carrying the 'American Forces Network' which itself consists of programming from National Public Radio, interspersed with news and military information and public service announcements. There are a variety of sites in operation: Key West, Florida: 12689.5; Puerto Rico 6458.5; Sigonella, Sicily 4993, 10940; Barrigada, Guam 13362, 5765; Diego Garcia 12579, 4319; Kelfavik, Iceland 10320, 6350; Pearl Harbour 6350, 10320. Both Guam and Hawaii frequencies have been well heard in eastern Australia and NZ, all USB. TAJIKISTAN 12150 Que Huong Radio between studying their web and WHRI's, Que Huong appears to be here 2300-0000 from Mon-Fri and via KWHR Saturdays only on 17510, ex Mon-Sat. (via Johnson, Cumbre)

THAILAND: Radio Thailand's domestic service made a brief reappearance around 31 July on 4830, but that frequency now appears to be off air again. The English service, which occasionally IDs as 'NBT3', is now on MW and FM only. I believe that 'NBT' stands for National Broadcasting Service of Thailand. 6070 and 7115 continue to carry separate domestic net-

works in Thai (Alan Davies, Cumbre)

UNITED NATIONS David Smith of the United Nations reports: UN Radio is back on shortwave. On Monday September 4 2000, our current affairs programmes in French, English and Arabic will be carried live to Africa through the facilities of Merlin Communications. The Schedule is as follows:

It has been 15 years since UN Radio has been on shortwave. These programmes, along with our broadcasts in Chinese, Russian and Spanish, will also be carried on satellite by Merlin, for broadcast on partner stations around the world. Each 15 minute programme includes five minutes of world news, a three minute in-depth report on one of the main items in the news, and two three-minute features targeted to various geographical regions and focusing on issues including gender, environment, health and development. This launch coincides with the UN's Millennium Summit, running from Sept 6-8, and including roughly 155 heads of state. (Media Network website Sept 4 via DXLD)

USA: 7160U WGTG? Heard here with Alex Jones at 0125, gone by 0133. As strong as // 5085 and 6890. WGTG testing transmitter #3 on a new frequency or someone relaying WGTG? (Johnson Aug 30, Cumbre)

WXLW, 9320 at 2350 with gun rights show, ID at 2400, ads, then Bible study at 2403. Typical right wing SW stn. WXLW is 950 AM out of Indy. ID simply "WXLW Indianapolis". Still on at 0100 tune out. ?? I check low 31m most nights and haven't heard this one before, nor am I aware of any previous announcement of this on SW (Liz Cameron, MI, 30-31 Aug, DX LISTENING DIGEST)That would be WGTG in Georgia carrying a program originating with WXLW. SHOULD be a legal WGTG ID on the hour, but don't bet on it (gh / DXLD)

YUGOSLAVIA: Radio Yugoslavia's SW broadcasts are off the air after the transmitter site at Bijeljina in the Bosnian Serb republic was reclaimed by local authorities. The site has/had 4 x 500 kilowatt transmitters, although it had not been operating at full capacity in recent years. The site at Stubline in Serbia has been off the air since May 1999 after it was hit during the NATO air strikes. Broadcasts have moved to the internet www.radioyu.org. There has been speculation that broadcasts would resume via foreign relays but nothing has eventuated at the time of writing (Sep 7). Also, some reports suggesting that transmitters might be installed in Serbia - perhaps at Stubline. (Various sources, distilled by Francis)

RADIO AUSTRALIA AND THE SYDNEY 2000 OLYMPICS

When the 2000 Olympic Games comes to Sydney in September, Radio Australia, will be providing comprehensive coverage of the world's largest sports event.

From Friday 15 September to Sunday 1 October, Radio Australia will broadcast daily reports focusing on the performance of the region's best athletes. Our specialist broadcasters will provide seven reports each day Monday to Friday and four reports daily on the three weekends spanning the Games.

These special reports will be available on the Palapa satellite service; the east Asian and Pacific short wave frequencies used by Radio Australia, as well as here on our web site.

For our audience in Asia our special Olympic reports will be broadcast at the following times (UTC): Mon-Fri 1830, 1930, 0030, 0530, 0530, 0730, 1130, Sat/Sun 0030, 0330,

0530 and 1130.

RA will provide continuous ABC Radio coverage to the Pacific from 2100-0000 on 17715, 0000-0200 17580, 0200-0800 13605 and 0800-1300 11650.

Specialist language service broadcasters will also be part of R. Australia's team covering the Games in Sydney. From Thurs September 14, our Indonesian service will be broadcasting a daily report at (local times) 8:55 and an evening report on Monday to Friday at 19:15. A special 15 minute report will also be broadcast on Sundays at 9:45. Partner stations in Jakarta, Bandung and Medan will air a daily Olympic journal produced by R. Australia.

Our Chinese service will provide a 15 minute program running daily from Tuesday September 12. It will air every evening at (local time) 22:45, and this edition will be repeated at 9:30 the following morning. Our partner stations in Taiwan, Singapore, Malaysia and China will also be broadcasting this program.

Our Papua New Guinea service will also be providing a nightly 15 minute program broadcast at UTC 0915 from Saturday September 16. (Radio Australia)

David continues - "Just completed my second database - stations 'heard' but no QSL received. Came up with just 190 stations. Gee, there're some great catches! Only 1 Hawaiian never came back: KIPO 1350. Revised QSL database came up with 772 QSL's (7 less than I thought I had, damn!). The next statistic gives me some hope: QSL rate is 80.2% over 30 years of DX. Much higher than I thought it would be. Have to recalculate Continents Listing now and figure out where the 7 'missing' went from! Of the 190 not QSL'd: 75% (142 stations) are located in just 6 countries (USA 35%, AUS 13%, NZL 10%, CAN 7%, MEX 4%, CLM 3%, PHL 3%) and, 25% (48 stations) come from a wide variety of 36 countries. So, if I ignore DXing USA stations for a while, I can probably generate enough QSL's to rekindle the DX flame and build on the 80.2% QSL rate. Enough for now, I've got 4 reports to write tomorrow!" Stats can be a good vehicle to implement targets.

Peter Chambers, Esk Valley, Napier "A month of generally very poor MW propagation. Solar disturbances not helping things much no doubt. Power-line noise not bothersome most of the month. August 24 was the only night to show any Latin activity at all & poor at that. August 29 produced lively N. American reception, all X-band channels having copiable signals mid-evening but very fluttery and not exceptionally strong. Another solar disturbance started August 29th and may have kicked the N. American propagation into life. The night of August 30th however being very poor." Peter has also been experimenting with aerials, feeders etc at Nev McKenty's place to see if the local noise level can be stifled...

Paul Ormandy, Oamaru "A trip to Waianakarua saw some good reception from North America but Latins were abysmal... logs were taken of WTAW 1620 and WGSR 1570. Past 0700 the band degenerated in almost continuous static which was a bit hard on the ears. No QSLs for a while now so better send a few follow-ups out! HISTORIC CALLSIGN SIGNS OFF

Chicago's oldest radio station, where millions of fans turned the dial to hear "Amos 'n Andy" and "Fibber McGee and Molly" before television took over the night, signed off 0n 31 July 2000 for the final time.

On Tuesday, the 670 AM frequency WMAQ has held for nearly eight decades will become an all-sports station known as "The Score." Although WMAQ is based in Chicago, it was broadcast across the country. "When one of the top 10 call letters in the history of the medium goes dark, it's a strong signal that times have significantly changed in the industry," said Bruce DuMont, founder and curator of the Museum of Broadcast Communications in Chicago.

WMAQ's demise stems directly from federal regulations and the marriage of broad-

casting giants CBS Inc. and Viacom Corp. Federal ownership rules required that CBS subsidiary Infinity sell one of its eight Chicago radio stations. The company chose to get rid of a weaker frequency used by the sports station and move the sports station to the frequency held by WMAQ.

The station is all news now, but in its early years it was home to some of the most famous voices on radio. Even its call letters had meaning – We Must Ask Questions. They were chosen by then secretary of commerce and future president Herbert Hoover.

WMAQ began broadcasting on April 13, 1922, as WGU under the ownership of the Chicago Daily News and The Fair, a downtown department store where the original studios were located. Six months later, the Daily News bought out the store's share of the station and renamed it WMAQ. NBC bought it in 1931 and boosted its power from 250 watts to 50,000 watts, enabling the signal to be heard nationwide.

Under NBC's ownership, WMAQ became the home of some of radio's most famous stars: Red Skelton, Dave Garroway, Garry Moore and Hugh Downs among them. "Amos 'n Andy" premiered in 1928 and was broadcast each evening from WMAQ's studios. "Fibber McGee and Molly" followed in 1935.

"Those were the big ones," DuMont said. "Amos 'n Andy was probably the most important and most successful radio show of all time as far as a series is concerned." Over the years, WMAQ switched to easy listening and then country music, but news always played a major role, said political reporter Bill Cameron, whose 30 years at the station will end with the change.

"NBC News ran the local news department, and there was a big premium put on a professional approach to doing the news," he said. When the station was sold to Westinghouse in 1988, it changed to all-news programming, putting it in direct competition with CBS. Then, in 1996, Westinghouse and CBS merged. "We still competed to keep each other sharp, but it wasn't as keen as it was when Westinghouse didn't own CBS," Cameron said. Georgeann Herbert, who has managed the news operations of both stations for the past year, said all-sports WSCR was chosen over WMAQ to give the company one news station and one sports station, rather than two competing news stations. It will mean the loss of about 60 employees. In the newsroom, the mood has been glum, said Mo Whalen, a former reporter for WMAQ. News reporters bristled as WSCR workers came in for computer training and installed screen savers with photos of the new station's personalities.

"I kind of liked the fact that there were two news stations. One was a little more formal and one was a little less," said Whalen, who now runs a public affairs program for another radio station. Dave Sachs, a 47-year-old Union Pacific police officer from Chicago, has relied on WMAQ for quick news fixes for years. "That's all we need," Sachs said, a bit dismayed at the change. RADIO AMATEURS TO CELEBRATE 75 YEARS The NZ Association of Radio Transmitters will hold its 75th Annual Conference in Auckland during Queens Birthday Weekend 2001 (early June). The DX League plans to have an exhibit and manned stall at the Conference.

THE INFLUENCE OF THE INTERNET ON DX CLUBS

League Treasurer PHIL VAN DE PAVERD reports that 36 percent of DX League members are now internet-enabled with electronic mail addresses. This percentage was much higher than the Administration Committee expected, though still way behind our colleagues at the Danish Shortwave Club International, which estimates that 76% of their membership have connections to the internet.

DSWCI Chairman ANKER PETERSEN attended the League's 50th Anniversary Celebrations 2 years ago, and last month he was present at the National Mexican DX Meeting in Oaxaca. Anker gave the following address in Mexico on 6 August, and we believe League

members will find it of interest as we all contemplate the future of our SWL and DX hobby.

"I have been active DXer since 1957 and my main interest is to listen to domestic broadcasting stations in the tropical bands: 60, 90 and 120 metres.

I also attended the 4th National DX Meeting in Tehuacan two years ago and I am very happy to be able here to meet so many good friends again. Throughout these two years I have stayed in contact with some of you via electronic mail on the Internet. That brings me to one of the important aspects of my lecture, which is titled: The influence of the Internet on DX Clubs.

I am Chairman of the Danish Shortwave Club International which is 43 years old, so I hope you will permit me to use our experiences with the Internet when talking on this subject.

We have about 350 members who live in 42 countries in all continents of the world. During all these years we have published a monthly Club magazine in English, called Shortwave News (SWN). Thus we are without doubt the DX-Club with printed magazine with the most worldwide coverage.

With the introduction of the Internet, we began around 1993 to correspond via electronic mail with each other within the Board and Editorial Staff, and also with our members around the world. Since this is both cheaper and much faster than ordinary mail via the Post Office, this way of communication has expanded greatly especially during the past couple of years and we rarely use telephone or fax or send letters to each other any longer.

Our Chief Editor receives nearly all the pages from his sub-editors as attachments to e-mail, and since they are in digital form, it is much easier for him to put them into the magazine in the right layout.

At the beginning of 1996 the DSWCI began to use the Internet to publish weekly electronic DX-newsletters to our members. We called it the "DX Window" and it contained the best DX loggings and news on shortwave broadcasting which the members sent us via e-mail.

It was free of charge and was distributed to all subscribers as electronic mail. It soon became a big success, because our members received the hot DX-information while the stations could still be heard and several non-members soon joined as subscribers and sent us their loggings and news.

The bulletin expanded quickly, so we had to appoint a Chief Editor and some subeditors as specialists to take care of their specific regions of the world (Latin America, Africa Indonesia, etc). It took many hours to edit and distribute each DX Window, so we had to share the burden by shifting the responsibilities between two or three DXers from week to week. Since the Internet is global, it was not a problem for us to have editors in Denmark, Germany, the Netherlands, Austria, United Kingdom, Taiwan and Honduras! That worked perfectly! For more than a year our Chief editor was doing his job from Taiwan receiving inputs from his co-editors in Europe and Honduras!

Today there are several similar weekly or monthly electronic DX newsletters available free of charge on the Internet. Some of them even issue extraordinary bulletins, if something special happens. Let me mention some of them that are edited, before they are sent out as e-mail to those DXers who have asked for them:

- § Cumbre DX, USA (which is also broadcast on certain SW stations)
- S DX Listening Digest edited by Glenn Hauser, USA (also broadcast on SW)
- Numero Uno by Gerry Dexter, USA

- S Conexion Digital by Nicolas Eramo, Argentina with news from some of the best DX'ers in Latin America.
- § Boletín Banda Tropical by Jorge García, Venezuela
- § Chasqui DX by Pedro Arrunategui, Peru
- Noticias DX by two DX Clubs in Spain with Pedro Sedano as coordinator
- § Broadcast DX by Wolfgang Bueschel, Germany (WWDXC Germany)
- § Jembatan by Juichi Yamada, Japan concentrating on Indonesian stations
- Relampago DX by Takayuki Inoue Nozaki, Japan concentrating on stations in the Andes.

An even more advanced kind of distributing hot DX-information as e-mail via the Internet is the daily electronic DX-newsletter. Hard-core-DX issued by the Finnish DXer Risto Kotalampi from his home in California has more than 500 subscribers around the world and is the biggest of its kind.

In such cases, when a DXer sends an e-mail with hot DX news to a given address, it is immediately forwarded automatically to all subscribers without editing by the owner of the network. Thus every subscriber anywhere in the world gets the DX-news within minutes after it was sent from the sending DXer.

The second aspect of getting DX-information from the Internet is by searching or browsing the millions of home pages on the World Wide Web. In this case, the information is not sent to the individual DXer as e-mail, but he has to find it himself e.g. by using the browser programs from Netscape or Internet Explorer. The information is still free of charge, but he has to stay longer on the Internet to get it, thus the telephone bill will be higher than when receiving e-mail.

Most of the bigger international and domestic broadcasting stations have their own home pages, and you are often able to find their current frequency schedules and programme schedules there.

Many DX Clubs also have their own home pages, which contain a lot of information relevant for DXers. The home page of the Danish Shortwave Club International is at: www.dswci.dk

The third aspect of the Internet that I will mention is Real Audio. By using advanced technology, the broadcasting stations nowadays are able to transmit their radio programmes via the Internet. If the owner of a Personal Computer has the software required, he or she will be able to hear the radio programme in good quality directly in the loudspeakers of the computer, even if it comes from the opposite side of the Earth.

Many hundreds, maybe more than a thousand broadcasting stations in all continents can be heard via Real Audio today. Some Shortwave Listeners prefer this instead of hearing the stations on shortwave with all its disturbances. But remember again that the telephone bill will be high as you pay for every second being on the Internet.

Several international broadcasters have even reduced their shortwave broadcasts

for instance towards Western Europe, because they can be heard better nowadays via Real Audio or Satellite which often are distributed through our cable networks with perfect quality.

Earlier this year, when I edited the second edition of the DSWCI 'Domestic Broadcasting Survey', I made some observations which I wish to share with you concerning the still downwards trend in the number of active frequencies of Domestic Broadcasting Stations in the Shortwave Bands between 2200 and 5800 kHz.

During the period 1973-1997, 452 stations out of 1136 being on the air in 1973 disappeared from these SW bands or an average of 19 closing down per year. But in 1997-2000 the decrease has drastically increased to 212 stations or 71 per year!

There are still some 472 Domestic Broadcasting Stations to hunt for on the Tropical Bands and at the same time interfering broadcast and utility stations are disappearing. So do not give up your DXing on the Tropical Bands!

But pessimistic views indicate that most Domestic Broadcasting Stations on the Tropical Bands may have closed down by year 2007!

The biggest decrease in the number of stations using the Tropical SW Bands during the last three years was noted throughout Asia and in Southern Africa.

The main reason for this is that FM-networks are still growing in most parts of the world and replacing the need for shortwave transmitters. Today, the majority of Domestic shortwave transmitters can be found in developing countries with vast areas where it still is too expensive to establish a network of FM-stations that can cover the whole country.

I have just given you a guick introduction to what the Internet today offers to the DXer who have access to that from a Personal Computer at home or at work, or at a library or an Internet Cafe.

It is evident that the Internet as a new media is able to provide DXers with useful information much faster than the printed DX-bulletins.

But the Internet also offers so many other challenges to the user like surfing on the home pages or playing games, that he or she easily may find this more interesting than the traditional hobby of DXing.

Let me now speak about the core of the subject of my lesson: The influence of the Internet on DX Clubs.

At the annual Conference of the European DX Council which took place in Copenhagen, Denmark last November, the European DX-Club Representatives discussed this issue, but did not reach any conclusions. The question was raised: "Is there still a need for all the national and local DX Clubs in Europe, and for the European DX Council itself?" Somebody suggested that the clubs merge across the borders to be able still to publish printed DX bulletins.

I will use our experiences in the Danish Shortwave Club International as an example, but the situation is similar in many other DX-Clubs in the world.

First the failing interest for shortwave listening, especially amongst young people who are more attracted by the Internet and other challenges.

During the last several years, the DSWCI did lose about 25 members per year, but two years ago we lost 35 and last year it was 49. This is a serious development, so in April this year we issued a questionnaire to our members in order to analyze the situation. 75 members in 20 countries have answered the questionnaire, and I will now give you the results of that:

Those who answered had a span of age from 27 to 87 years. The average age was

52 while it was 49 at our survey two years ago. 95% of our members are above 30 years of age and 81% above 40. This again confirms that it is very difficult to attract younger people to our hobby.

Today 76% of our members have access to the Internet. Two years ago is was only 38%. It is fantastic to note that this number has doubled in just two years!

However, this new medium gives us much competition. First of all, it can offer so much information from all parts of the world and much entertainment, that the DX-hobby with all its disturbances becomes much less attractive.

Secondly, the time a DXer spends in front of his Computer cannot be spent in front of his DX-receiver. Thus in most cases, less time is devoted to DXing.

Thirdly, DX Clubs are competing on the Internet to bring the hot DX News, and several do that free of charge. For some DXers this is sufficient for their DXing, and they drop Club membership. Particularly our treasurer has noted the effect and we had a big deficit in our Club finances in 1999!

Our monthly magazine, Shortwave News, normally had 32 pages, but this year we have had to reduce every second edition to 16 pages in order to save printing and postage costs. You might ask: "Why do not cease issuing printed bulletins and just send out an electronic version? That would save a lot of money to printing and postage!"

Unfortunately, it is not that simple. 24% of our members have no access to the Internet and that equals to 82 paying members. We cannot just neglect them by ceasing printing SWN and only publish it via the Internet. Furthermore 11% have only limited access to the Internet.

In the questionnaire we asked them to mention their preferences on how the Club should provide them DX-information in the future. 37% of our members prefer a considerable increase in membership fee in order to get a SWN of about 32 pages, 12 times a year, but most will accept a mix of hot news via the Internet and some kind of a reduction in the publication of SWN. However, in their letters many warned us that publication of SWN only every third month would be too rare. It is remarkable that even amongst those with full access to the Internet two-thirds still want to receive the printed SWN. On the other hand, 19% wish to receive SWN only via the Internet for a lower membership fee and not in printed form.

About half of our members wish to receive a weekly news bulletin via the Internet (like the DX-Window) in order to get the DX-news before they get too old.

About half of our members also wish to be kept informed about new addresses of radio related homepages. This would be most relevant to publish on our home pages.

As a consequence of these results of our survey, the DSWCI Annual General Meeting in May 2000 decided to put all pages of "Shortwave News" on our home pages on the World Wide Web. Our members will then get a personal username and password, and then be able to read our members' bulletin via the Internet.

A special, reduced membership fee is now introduced for those members who just want to get SWN electronically via our Homepage and not in printed version.

Conclusions:

- 1} Electronic mail is replacing letters sent via the ordinary postal services.
- Electronic mail is the fastest way to distribute DX-information. In extreme cases, you can get the e-mail while the new station is still broadcasting.
- Digital editing of DX-bulletins is much easier than using the typewriter.
- Most radio stations and DX-Clubs have their own home pages on the Internet.

- Many radio stations broadcast in Real Audio via the Internet, which makes shortwave broadcasting old-fashioned.
- 6) Generally, the DX-information on the Internet is free of charge.
- Most European DXers have access to the Internet.
- A majority of these DXers spend more time in front of their Personal Computer and less time in front of their DX-receiver.
- 9) Several DXers find the free DX-information available on the Internet sufficient for their personal DXing and they quit paying membership in a DX-Club."

Those recommendations will include the results of an all-day forum in the Parliament Buildings involving a 'cross section of 40 broadcasters and young people', and the findings from the Ministry of Culture and Heritage's "research into the youth radio market and focus groups with young people". RADIOWORKS EXPANDS The country's second-largest private radio operator RadioWorks has said it will need to find "at least \$15 million" for new FM frequencies and is determined to secure frequencies in Auckland under the proposed 101-108FM band tender. RadioWorks wants to air its Energy FM outlet in Auckland. It has just purchased the Northland Radio Company which has 11 frequencies including KCC-FM and Magic FM. RadioWorks already operates Radio Pacific, Solid Gold, the Rock and The Edge, but only the former is already in the north. They now hope to bring one or two of their music stations to the region (E-Median Strip & Bryan Clark)
