their temporary tests via Guiana French instead of Germany instead of Chile, to no avail, but came upon something far more interesting. A prayer request for June 28 just missed it mentioned that a new 1 kW shortwave transmitter made by HCJB in Indiana is to be installed in Chazuta, Peru.

Rafael Rodriguez in Colombia noted my mention of this; he already knows about it as he's in contact with Ray Raising [sic] of HCJB who was about to depart for Peru along with three engineers to prepare for it to go on the air by August 8.

He also has the details from an official document about licensing the station which will be OAW-9A, on 4810 kHz, from the Iglesia Evangelica Central de Chazuta. We don't yet know what it will be named. Chazuta is a small town near the much larger city of Tarapoto in north central Peru. Rafael says HCJB originally wanted to set up a SW station in Colombia to serve the Amazon region, but permission could not be obtained. 

The Closure of 7HRT on 95.7 MHz in Poatina, Tasmania

It was reported in the Launceston Examiner Newspaper recently that 7HRT on 95.7 MHz is to hand back its licence. A spokesperson for the station Mr Matt Garvin (Station President), said the station had been broadcasting for some 11 years. After a station committee meeting it was decided the station could not continue. Reasons cited for the closure were recent difficulty in selling sponsorship for the station in the current economic climate, the rejection of funding submissions, a key sponsor withdrawing, a burst water main at the station's Longford studio, and loss of station personnel, which contributed to the station's situation. So this has meant the station is no longer financially viable. The station also known as Heart FM is to have a meeting on the 8th of August where it is expected the station will hand back its licence and also appoint an administrator for the company. The signal of 7HRT covered area close to Poating and the Northern Midlands area, just south of Launceston. I can hear 7HRT where I am in Launceston, but at a weak level. The township of Poatina was once a Hydro Village built by the former Hydro Electric Commission of Tasmania (after WWII); for workers and families who lived in the area subsequent building of dams and power stations took place, although the township of Poating was purchased by a Christian Organization called Fusion about 2 decades ago. The Fusion group has reinvented the town for training people in various developmental fields. Mr Garvin said further, it was hoped that another local group may take up the FM licence for the broadcast in the Northern Midlands area. (Martin Greer, Launceston, Tasmania)

Christchurch Freeview frequencies change

Freeview viewers may need to retune their TV or set-top box when the broadcast frequencies change in the Christchurch region on Tuesday 24 July.

The changes only affect Freeview terrestrial viewers who receive signals from the Sugarloaf transmitter. They will not affect Sky subscribers, analogue TV viewers, TelstraClear cable TV or Freeview satellite TV viewers.

The Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment's Radio Spectrum Policy and Planning Manager Len Starling said: "Affected viewers will see a message pop up on their TV screens this week, prompting them to retune when the frequencies change. Retuning can be done simply using the remote control."

"Those who watch Freeview TV and share an aerial with others, such as in an apartment building or retirement village, should contact their property manager for advice on whether their installation requires any modification."

Managers of apartments, hotels or motels are advised to talk to an installer prior to the frequencies being changed, to see if any technical adjustments are needed.

The channel frequencies are changing to ensure that New Zealand's radio spectrum is freed up for other uses and emerging technologies.

As I send this off to the Chief Editor, we're basically half way between the solstice and the equinox. Already in this neck of the woods, the daylight minutes are tumbling noticeably. We know our hobby's opportunities are shrinking too but still pleasant surprises come along as this month's mail shows.

Des Davey, Te Kuiti as always adds his interesting observations to keep me busy and out of mischief. First, here are his latest activities: "Reports are out to Alice Springs, NT 4835 & 2310; Tennant Creek, NT 2325; Katherine, NT 2485; CRI China 5955, 6020, & 15210; VoA 7520, 7560, & 12025; Radio Free Asia 11795; Bangladesh Betar 4750; and VoRussia 9665 kHz. QSL's to hand: Radio Kuwait 21540; RNE Spain 21610, 17595, & 15110; CRI China 5955 & 15210; AIR India 13710; and Voz Missionaria Camoriu, Brazil 5940 kHz, a first for me. I got (that) on July 3rd and in all the years that I have been a shortwave listener or DXer, I have never received such a large QSL card, 210mm x 295mm, and a nice QSL it is too. It came with a leaflet of staff photos and a few words about the station but it's not in English. "AIR India on 13710 kHz (is) the first QSL I've had from AIR for many years. Over some years I often sent AIR a report and got no reply whatsoever so I kind of gave up. About 20 years later in early June 2012, I decided to send a report after logging 13710 and bingo on the 20th of June I got a QSL at last!!

"How many of you can remember Radio-Tahiti FR3? Back in the late 1950's, I used to listen around 6 p.m. NZT on Sunday evenings on 6135 kHz to their lovely Island music as it was a regular show, though sometimes in summer it used to get fair and noisy. It was the only time you could hear native Tahitian on air. Any other time, the station transmitted in French. Other frequencies that I heard often were 11825 and 15170 kHz. 6135 was my fav Tahiti station that I tuned to every Sunday for some years before they pulled the plug on this music show in the early 1970's. I have QSL's for 6135 and 15170. I think the stations closed totally around the end of February 1971. I had a Tahitian couple who used to come to my place to listen to the music. Regards and happy DX, Des." (I think when I finally tracked down a decent receiver – the Eddystone S750 – around 1963 that 11825 was the dominant frequency for me in Hamilton. Having their interval signal booming through the house approaching 0400 UT as I did my high school homework, then switching to Amman, Jordan on 11810, must have driven Ma and Pa to distraction! Weren't they still on shortwave into the 80's? I seem to recall being able to hear them on the Icom R71A, and I didn't buy that till '81 or '82.) John Durham, Tauranga had high hopes for DX success at the beginning of winter, but suggests things haven't quite panned out: "Noticed the first signs of spring a few days ago with the wild cherry trees (Prunus cerotina) in flower. (We) Have had a lot of rain in the last couple of weeks with a deluge last evening 30/08, and had real concerns that excess water was going to get into a downstairs room but a guick dash outside to unblock a drain seemed to do the trick. I think this has been the poorest Tropical Band season I can remember even with the reduced number of active stations. There has been virtually nil activity from both Africa and the Americas. QSLs to come in: R. Japan via Chile 6130, France 11970 & Uzbekistan 15735 kHz; Fiji Freedom & Democracy via Cypress Creek USA 11565 kHz; Hamburg Local Radio, Goehren 7265 kHz; RMRC via Lithuania 11900 kHz; Radio Canada Int. via Philippines 9490 kHz; Radio Netherlands via Vatican 15495 & Sri Lanka 9800kHz; and Radio North Star from Sala, Sweden 5895 kHz." (Well, there aren't too many likely African targets any more -- granted I'm in high summer, though the thermometer has been struggling to squeeze over 25C -- but the two VoA's 4930/4960 seem to play tag each local evening with one being audible but not the other, then they switch about the next night! And not even a squeak from Meyerton or Swazi stuff. Sonder Grense when they switch up to 7285 just prior to 0500 UT have been booming in, and currently because of Ramadan, Mauritania has been showing up with decent modulation for a change on 7245 as 41m fades up for me ~0300.)

Günter Jacob in Passau, Germany is happy with his collection additions: "A number of good QSLs were received during this month. Dr Adrian Peterson sent these AWR cards: KSDA (9890, 11860, 13575, 15360, 15420, 15605, 15690, 15715, 17520) Trincomalee (11740, 11750, 11835, 15715), and Wertachtal (6020, 11610, 15270). Sterling Ottun verified KTWR on 13750 and 15240. S. Franklin Abraham of TWR India sent - by registered airmail - what I would describe as an excellent example of a verification card for my report on 11930 kHz, via Tashkent. Radio Nederland sent the card "TOT ZOVER 10/11 MEI 2012" for the final Dutch language transmission on 5955 (Wertachtal) and two different 3D "HOLLAND" QSLs: 21710 (Madagascar) and 21750 (Bonaire). Radio Vaticana sent the QSL "Radio Vaticana 1931 - 2006" for 6075, also another one - showing the ribbon microphone, used by Pope Pius XI on Feb. 12, 1931, to inaugurate Vatican Radio - for 3975 kHz. Radio Japan sent the long-hoped-for QSL cards for relay transmissions via the UK, 5920 and 11780 kHz. HCJB's QSL 2012-C arrived; it verifies Weenermoor (53N12, 07E19, 1 kW.) on 3995 kHz. Michael Kittner of Hamburger Lokalradio verified my report on the reception of Göhren (1 kW) on 5980 kHz. And also these cards found their way to my mailbox: Polskie Radio (9495 via Woofferton), IBB Edward R. Murrow Transmitting Stn (9820), CRI Urumai (9470), RN via Trincomalee (9445)." (Whoa. My hand is getting cramps just thinking of writing all those reports, but Deutsche Post no doubt appreciates the business.)

Bryan Clark, Mangawhai has a QSL back from Radio Netherlands Bonaire 12015 (last English tx). Our Man in Northland also says: "Some interesting SW catches during July including low-powered Colombian Salem Stereo on 14950, new Peruvian Radio Logos 4810, Papua New Guinea 6040 (on during July for General Elections - not heard on 2 August so may be finished). MW has been giving some unusual reception thanks

to the solar disturbances with CHHA Toronto 1610 showing up one day, and plenty of unidentified Latins to challenge me. A mystery American on 750 has still to be identified." (*I've been meaning to try for R. Logos, but waking up at a suitable time has so far not been achieved. The only quirks to report are the re-appearance of a Russian numbers stn on 15721 in the 0300/0400 UT hours, which plays merry whatever with RNZI, and Mother Corp's two tx's on nominal 6160 have launched their battle of the ears again: it seems like CKZN is up around 6160.9 though CKZU is also possibly a tad on the low side by about 15 Hz. I have no idea what audience CBC R. One aims for out here on the Left Coast, but it must be driving BC listeners crazy from mid-evening till any sign of the Newfie carrier fades with their daylight.)*

Dene Lynneberg, Pukerua Bay rounds out this month: "Thought I'd send in a couple of QSL's which have come back recently and make a rare appearance in the mailbaa. However I see I've missed the closing date by one day but maybe with the time difference between NZ and Canada they might just sneak in. If not I guess I'll be early for the next month. Verifications in from Radio Netherlands for last day of English broadcasting for the following frequencies: Bonaire 6165 and 12015; Wertachtal 6065; Trincomalee 9800; Issoudun 11615; Santa Maria di Galeria 17605 and 15495. Black and white card with words "Goodbye ... and thanks!" I first heard Radio Nederland in the early sixties and my first QSL from them was for 9590 kHz on April 7, 1961 at 0605 GMT. So I guess I've been listening to them for the best part of 52 years. Oh well all good things seem to come to an end at some stage. Also received a QSL from Nord AM 3995 khz via Kall-Krekel 1 kW for special broadcast on 2 June 2012. Nice card showing 'The era of analogue television at Heide transmitting station ended when the old antennas were dismantled with the help of a Swiss helicopter. Height of the tower 152m/499 feet'. Have also logged the NBC Papua and New Guinea on the recently activated frequency of 6040 kHz. I wonder where this transmitter is for 6040 kHz. If it proves to be Port Moresby then I haven't heard Port Moresby in this band since 1963 when I verified VLT6 on 6130 kHz at 0832 UTC on 11.01.1963. 6040 kHz was allocated to Milne Bay and I note from my logbook that I logged Radio Milne Bay at Alotau on 6040 from 2253-2320 UTC on 20.07.1976 and received a verification letter from them on 05.10.76. Oh the nostalgia!!!!" (Welcome aboard. The Aussie DX News reports that the NBC tx was at Port Moresby, and also that a new 25 kW tx could be in the works, whether for 49m or 60m/4890 I can't recall.)

Before the Porky Pig signoff, Gary DeBock in suburban Seattle has given permission to spreading the link for his report on a recent DXpedition to the Oregon Coast, and his success at a pile of Kiwi stations:

July 2012 Oregon Cliff Ultralight DXpedition High Altitude DXing Hot Spot for the South Pacific

Introduction The Ultralight radio enthusiast group has always had a dedicated core group of Transoceanic DXers, motivated by the awesome challenge of receiving exotic AM stations on simple pocket radios. Until very recently this fanatical group was probably regarded with a mixture of curiosity and sympathy by traditional DXpeditioners as they pushed their luck on ocean beaches without the benefit of spectrum capture, state-of-the-art filtering or huge antenna arrays.

Early last year Graham Maynard of the UK introduced a bizarre new ferrite-based antenna which was about to even the odds of success a little. however. The new Ferrite Sleeve Loop antenna was not only compact and easily transported, but it provided extremely high gain for its size--- outperforming much larger air core loops because of its lower noise



pickup. Although the new design came with the side effects of serious cost and weight, it did provide one supreme advantage over the traditional DXpedition antennas... it could be easily set up on one square yard of space, providing the breakthrough capability of high-gain DXing performance on extremely narrow ocean side cliffs. The Ultralight radio Transoceanic DXer could now have an important high-altitude advantage on his side— and it was about to demonstrate its effectiveness during this 4-day Oregon coast DXpedition.

DXing Venue To maximize the FSL antenna's effectiveness during this midsummer trip the decision was made to chase South Pacific DX at the site of Oregon's highest ocean side cliff—805 foot (245m) Cape Perpetua on the central coast, two miles south of Yachats in Lincoln County. This entire area was unfamiliar to the author, though, and I doubted that any suitable DXing site could be found at such a high elevation. As it

turned out the highest spots on Cape Perpetua were supposedly off-limits to early morning TP-DXers, having been designated as "Day Use Only" areas at the end of an isolated, dark road. Cape Perpetua still had plenty to offer dedicated DU-DXers, though-- a Highway 101 road side turnoff on a sheer ocean beach cliff, plunaina almost directly down to the Pacific. This spot (determined by home town DXing buddy Guy Atkins to be above 200 feet high) proved to be more than adequate for a potent elevation gain boost, which seemingly made the roadside DU-DXing site immune to any



significant propagation drop offs during the entire four days. With the exception of the Aussie-favored first day New Zealand stations were received at unprecedented levels throughout the entire DXpedition, and the only day-to-day change was the strength of the Australian stations, which ranged from vibrant to non-existent (during which the low-powered Kiwi stations snuck through at astonishing levels). Three of the top 10 stations in overall strength were these low-powered New Zealand stations (603-R. Waatea, 765-R. Kahungunu and 828-R. Trackside), none of which seem to have been received at Grayland (according to logs posted for the past 15 years). But Australian stations



also provided real excitement on the cliff, including a 400 watt HPONS station on 1701 kHz which produced readable audio momentarily during one memorable session (a DXing first in the Ultralight radio class).

DXpedition Radio and FSL Antenna The modified Tecsun PL-380 and 8" Ferrite Sleeve Loop antenna used for this DXpedition both included the latest technical advances from our quirky Ultralight radio science. The 7.5" MW loopstick PL-380 had a newly designed antenna with 70 turns of 330/44 Litz wire on a Type 61 Amidon ferrite rod (transplanted in place of the stock loopstick,

and mounted externally on a custom plastic frame), which provided a significant boost in AM sensitivity over the previous 7.5 loopstick models. By itself, this modified Ultralight radio was designed to outperform any stock portable in both AM sensitivity and selectivity.

But the main DXing gain boost for these Transoceanic sessions was provided by an 8" diameter MW-optimized Ferrite Sleeve Loop antenna, a collection of 61 Russian surplus 200mm x 10mm ferrite rods wrapped by 14



turns of 660/44 Litz wire, then tuned by a 381 pf variable capacitor. In A/B signal testing in my back yard at home this antenna's weak signal reception quality was essentially the same as that provided by a 9' PVC air core box loop, despite the fact that it could fit inside a plastic tote of only 15 cubic inches. The FSL antennas had been extensively tested and refined from the initial models used in the 2011 DXpeditions, and many improvements had been made in bump and slip resistance, weatherproofing and more compact PVC frames. This DXpedition FSL weighed about 16 pounds, and with a construction cost of around \$350 perhaps provided a typical example of why these new antennas have acquired the nickname of "Financial Sinkhole Loops." The South Pacific DXing edge provided by the antenna was unmistakable, however, and its high gain, low noise performance was crucial to Transoceanic success. The antenna was designed to fit securely on top of a custom rubber-coated PVC base with 4 plug-in legs (that could be assembled in total darkness within a minute).

A modified Sony ICF-2010 (shown at above right) was used to track multiple SSB

frequencies during daily morning enhancement on the Oregon cliff, providing critical information on changing propagation and DU target strength. This 19.5" loopstick model coupled up very well to the 8" FSL antenna, and its signal strength LED readout provided the perfect display to tune the FSL to a desired DU frequency (even in total darkness). The modified PL-380 then only needed to be tuned to the same DU frequency, and be brought within the FSL's inductive coupling range for a vibrant South Pacific MP3 recording.



Final Choice of DXing Venue Upon arriving in Yachats, Oregon before sunset on July 17th I eagerly scrambled around the entire Cape Perpetua area (2 miles to the south) in search of the perfect high altitude DXing spot. One immediate problem was that the highest areas were designated "Day Use," although since no starting time was given, I was willing to push my luck and go up to the top of the Cape in the darkness each early morning. The main problem with this strategy was that the 800 foot level was not only isolated, dark and of dubious security, but prone to severe winds and rain. Thick forest surrounded the narrow clearing at the top of the Cape, giving a DXer the distinct impression that he was about to be evicted by a pack of grizzly bears (or herd of elk) in the early morning darkness. There was a "fallback position" at the Highway 101 road side point of highest elevation, which although much lower in elevation at least had less wind, and presumably some protection from wild animals. It was a tough choice to make, and early the first DXing morning I actually visited both sites for a TP signal comparison in the predawn darkness. Unfortunately the 800 foot level was being hit by both thunderous rain and stiff wind at the time, making it very risky to set up the 8" FSL on its base. In the complete darkness shadows seemed to jump around the thick forest, giving me the distinct impression that angry mountain lions were forming for the charge. It soon became obvious that whatever theoretical DXing gain this lofty turf had to offer, it was just not worth the hassle of confronting nasty weather, wild animals and maybe even wild humans. So the final decision was made to DX at the Hiahway 101 road side turnoff... which fortunately provided much calmer weather, no wild animals and all the altitude agin necessary for a very thrilling DXpedition (with no AC power, water, lights or roof)!

Norm Clark Joins in the Fun On the last day of the DXpedition I was pleased to welcome fellow Ultralight radio enthusiast and friend Norman Clark (of Monmouth, Oregon) to the humble Highway 101 road side turnoff. Norm had brought along his familiar-looking 7.5" loopstick PL-380 and 5" Medium Wave FSL, and around 1210

UTC was immediately greeted by the strongest TP signals he had ever experienced. Norm seemed especially awestruck by the signal of the 5 kW New Zealand Christian music station 684-NZ Rhema on the cliff, as it momentarily pounded in like one of the local Oregon pests. 738-Tahiti and even 774-JOUB also came close to maxing out the S/N reading on Norm's Ultralight, and he probably left the Cape Perpetua cliff site with an entirely new perspective on Transoceanic DXing.



Summary The triple advantage of salt water propagation, high cliff altitude and FSL antenna gain produced some exceptional New Zealand signals during this trip, mainly those from the lower-powered Kiwi stations. The lack of Australian propagation on certain days made these 2 kW and 2.5 kW stations rule their frequencies, with 639-RN, 765-Radio Kahungunu, 828-Radio Trackside and 855-NZ Rhema all unusually vibrant. The signal from 684-NZ Rhema (5 kW) was also very memorable, which along with 765-Radio Kahungunu (2.5 kW) occasionally pegged the PL-380's S/N reading at the 25

maximum. Australian propagation was good the first day, and 738-Tahiti was always at a huge level every morning. Perhaps the most exciting fact about this ocean cliff DXpedition was that MW propagation was always excellent to at least one South Pacific area throughout the entire four days, a pattern which was also observed during the three day trip to the "Rockwork" ocean side cliff (near Cannon Beach) last August. In these days of dreary solar conditions and spotty Transoceanic propagation at sea level (which I personally experienced last year at Lincoln City), seven excellent TP-DXing days out of seven is something that may be the biggest ocean cliff discovery of all!

279-Radio Rossii (Yuzhno-Sakhalinsk, Russia, 500 kW) Good signal at various times but nowhere near its overpowering level last year

531-PI (Auckland, NZ, 5 kW) The Kiwi-slanted propagation allowed this Samoan language station to dominate the frequency without the usual (I.D. averse) Australian competition http://www.mediafire.com/?ge5np5flh5dxzfa

558-Radio Fiji One (Suva, Fiji, 10 kW) Poor signals throughout the trip from this sole Fiji MW survivor, which occasionally broke through domestic 560 splatter in a halfhearted sort of way

****567-Radio National** (Wellington, NZ, 50 kW) A regular every morning on the Cliff, with a mix of news, interviews and music, // 675 kHz. Usually the first New Zealand station to fade in around 1200 http://www.mediafire.com/?9z8vnphq6thc9p2 **576-2RN** (Sydney, Australia, 50 kW) Fine signal with YL interview during the sole favorable day for Aussie propagation. Usually plays a diverse mix of music as a programming staple http://www.mediafire.com/?068348cwqd2xn2y

585-2WEB (Bourke, Australia, 10 kW) A few ghostly traces of classic rock from this presumed Aussie on 7-18, but nowhere near its signal level on the Rockwork cliff last August. Strangely, the 2 kW Kiwi station never bothered to show up, despite awesome Kiwi propagation

594-3WV (Horsham, Australia, 50 kW) Fair signal with OM-YL interview during Aussie-favored propagation on 7-18, but usually way under the low-powered NZ-Rhema network during this trip http://www.mediafire.com/?z3ncl2n4r1np9a4

594-NZ Rhema (Timaru and Wanagnui, NZ, 5 kW and 2 kW) This low-powered New Zealand Christian station network ruled the frequency for most of the trip, with sermons and Christian contemporary music. An ID recorded at the beginning of this fair-level MP3 was the first one that I've managed in 10 Pacific beach trips http://www.mediafire.com/?d288w549wpe5e25 The network also had Christian sermons occasionally, as in this fair recording http://www.mediafire.com/?lw6a1r24l9hje5s

594-JOAK (Tokyo, Japan, 300 kW) Asiatic big gun snuck in along with 774-JOUB during a single brief period prior to DU morning enhancement on 7-21, but then (like JOUB) was quickly gone

603-Radio Waatea (Auckland, NZ, 5 kW) With Maori-language music and news, this lower powered station was quite vibrant during good Kiwi conditions. One of the best DU signals throughout the trip http://www.mediafire.com/?fisnsk95l62iims

612-4QR (Brisbane, Australia, 50 kw) An underperformer as usual during these Oregon coast trips, it was losing the battle with domestic slop on 7-18, and missing in action during Kiwi-slanted propagation thereafter

639-Radio National (Alexandra, NZ, 2 kW) The demise of Radio Fiji One on this frequency allowed this low-powered RN relay (//567, 675 and 756 kHz) to be heard at a fair level on most days http://www.mediafire.com/?bv6pcsqarcnnr2s

639-UnID-DU Talk-oriented DU English station competing with 639-RN at times, this was presumed to be the 5 kW Aussie 2HC in Coff's Harbour, which occasionally mixed with Fiji during previous trips

****657-Southern Star** (Wellington, NZ, 10 kW) This Christian music broadcaster boomed in with extremely strong signals during good Kiwi propagation. Along with **567-RN**, one of the best NZ signals http://www.mediafire.com/?ijcacg8uqmvian9

666-Noumea (Noumea, New Caledonia, 20 kW) Mediocre signals from this French language broadcaster rarely got through domestic splatter during this trip, a disappointment compared to its signals during the July 2011 Lincoln City visit (during which it was strong enough to confirm 738-RFO parallel)

675-Radio National (Christchurch, NZ, 10 kW) The second strongest signal of the Kiwi RN Network (after 567 kHz), it frequently pounded in during favorable propagation http://www.mediafire.com/?cc4e8lbzytf2x1c

****684-NZ Rhema** (Gisborne, NZ, 5 kW) Another Christian music broadcaster with an exceptional signal for its transmitter power level, this astonishing MP3 almost tested the PL-380's crunch resistance http://www.mediafire.com/?bge7anmbo8j79a8

702-2BL (Sydney, Australia, 50 kW) Another high-powered underperformer during this trip, it made a halfhearted appearance only during favorable Aussie propagation on 7-18

****738-RFO Tahiti** (Mahina, Tahiti, 20 kW) A French language blowtorch on the Cliff almost every morning, this station frequently tested the PL-380's crunch resistance. One of only two stations not from New Zealand to make the grade as one of the top ten DU signals during this DXpedition http://www.mediafire.com/?a4shuubhn36b6aa

738-2NR (Grafton, Australia, 50 kW) Except during Aussie-favored propagation on 7-18 this big gun station was almost completely inaudible under the booming Tahiti signal.

756-Radio National (Auckland, NZ, 10 kW) The weakest of the four RN stations, it lacked much of a signal even during great Kiwi conditions. Even the 2 kW 639 kHz station was usually beating it out.

****765-Radio Kahungunu** (Napier-Hastings, NZ, 2.5 kW) The booming signals from this low-powered Maori language broadcaster almost reached science fiction levels on the Cliff, and it was probably the biggest surprise of the entire trip. Part of the mystique was that this station has apparently never been received at the famous Grayland DXpedition site in Washington state. The second MP3 has a beautiful Maori-language rendition of the old Jackson 5 hit, "I'll Be There." http://www.mediafire.com/?my4o957wpjtve0m http://www.mediafire.com/?53ixrx2kv109g34

774-3LO (Melbourne, Australia, 50 kW) The Aussie big gun had a nice signal with a YL interview during favorable propagation on 7-18, but missing in action for most of the trip http://www.mediafire.com/?51mqzs4fd5dce1c

****774-JOUB** (Akita, Japan, 500 kW) This NHK2 big gun boomed into the cliff with a potent signal on the morning of 7-21 before the DU's reached their peak strength, and strangely enough was the first TP that Norm Clark heard on his PL-380 and 5" FSL (used to record this MP3). Other than that it was gone for the duration of the entire trip http://www.mediafire.com/?nt0wgedrvd8qhvu

783-Access Radio (Wellington, NZ, 10 kW) Considering its power level this Samoan broadcaster had fairly anemic signals on the Cliff, with this MP3 typical http://www.mediafire.com/?nsbwv3ax56k15yr

792-4RN (Brisbane, Australia, 25 kW) Music-oriented ABC station was missing in action except during the favorable Aussie propagation on 7-18, when it had good strength

828-Radio Trackside (Palmerston North, NZ, 2 kW) Another low-powered Kiwi station with amazing signals on the Cliff (and missing from any Grayland logs). Usually aided by bizarre propagation shutting out Australian stations, it typically ruled this frequency with its horse racing info, and was one of the 10 strongest DU's overall during the trip http://www.mediafire.com/?53b7zau8787ie0j

828-UnID-DU DU English program discussing a songwriter's music piece (seemingly far off topic for sports-oriented Radio Trackside). Maybe this vibrant DU is the 10 kW ABC station 3GI? http://www.mediafire.com/?aid9b6tmvdm6wq2

855-NZ Rhema (Hamilton, NZ, 2 kW) Pretty good signals from this low-powered member of the Christian broadcasting network with its typical music. Thanks to Bruce for station identity assistance http://www.mediafire.com/?6au1yq2505bt5cx

855-UnID-DU Female-voiced news apparently is from one of the Australian 10 kW ABC relays on the frequency (4QO or 4QB). Thanks to Bruce for ID assistance http://www.mediafire.com/?3ndxd5mpbb17yon

****891-5AN** (Adelaide, Australia, 50 kW) Far and away the most powerful Australian signal, it was the sole Aussie to peg the PL-380's S/N display at the 25 maximum. This ABC broadcaster apparently benefited from its central Australia location, giving it booming signals while eastern Australia was down in the noise. A frequent blowtorch on the Cliff http://www.mediafire.com/?rsvohlaro2w0xtr

891-4TAB (Townsville, Australia, 5 kW) Presumed the one occasionally way under 5AN with sports-oriented, fast talking announcer

927-UnID-DU Upbeat island-type music made me wonder at first whether Radio Fiji One had left this frequency or not, but Bruce says that the format fits the Australian 5 kW station 4CC in Gladstone (Thanks, Bruce) http://www.mediafire.com/?dvggy0mw5j114sw

936-UnID-DU Female-voiced news at fair level is presumed to be from the 10 kW Aussie station 4PB in Brisbane http://www.mediafire.com/?xwmk08yho7q8f8n

1701-UnID-DU Presumed Australian 400 watt HPONS station managed brief audio during an odd silence of the 1700 ESPN pest in Tijuana. Starting off with apparent preaching of some sort just above the noise level, an English-language ID (of sorts) jumps out of the noise at around 1:13 into the recording sounding like "You're listening to J.R. (something mumbled), the Christian way." Investigation and assistance by David (VK2DDI) has been very helpful, which indicates that the station identity may be the English language Voice of Charity, a 400 watt Christian broadcaster. July 15, 2012 -- Although shortwavers generally think of U.S. pirates as operating in the 6 and 7 MHz. bands, "modern" pirating actually began circa 1976 just above the end of the broadcast band, 1600 kHz. One of the first of the pirates was WFAT. Some of these stations were fairly widely heard, and their mastery of telephone loop technology permitted them to take listener phone calls while on the air. They provided early encouragement for the development of community-oriented broadcast band and FM pirate radio. Under "DX History/ Recordings." we have a couple of audio clips from WFAT, 1620 kHz. (and 3240), made in January 1979, circa 1000 UTC. (It is a 12-minute recording; stick with it, the audio improves.) WFAT was operated by Perry Cavalieri, and was transmitted from a public housing project in Brooklyn. The station was featured in a New York Times article, "The Sound of Silence on WFAT, Pirate Radio," April 21, 1979, a week after the station was closed down. -- And under "Specialized Resources," "Wavescan," two new entries from Adrian Peterson: "The Greatest Mystery in the History of Aviation: What happened to Amelia Earhart? The Radio Story Pt. 1" (July 1, 2012), and "Ancient DX Report: 1897" (July 8, 2012).

July 22, 2012 -- The Eddystone Company produced some of the most popular shortwave receivers used in the U.K. Under "DX History//Equipment & Advertising," we have posted a brochure giving a rundown of a group of Eddystone receivers, and a price list of components and accessories. The receivers are all early 1950s vintage, and the price list is dated January 1954.
