Test Transmission of 7RPH in Devonport-Tasmania on 96.1 MHz

A recent Public Notice appeared in the Launceston Examiner Newspaper, that 7RPH conducted a test transmission in Devonport on 96.1 MHz. From the 14th August 2012 - for a period of 14 days. I did hear this test transmission where I am here in Launceston. The signal was weak but steady. Also the signal was behind somewhat on the local Launceston 7RPH on 106.9 MHz. The main 7RPH station in Tasmania is in Hobart on the medium wave frequency of 864 kHz. Although at the time of reception of the 96.1 MHz, I did not tune into the Hobart frequency. With the coming FM DX season, it may be possible to receive the RPH stations, perhaps also the Devonport frequency, if this new outlet is on air. In the Public Notice the following 7RPH address and telephone number and station manager's name, was given for any notification of interference to other communications, from the 96.1 MHz. A couple of topics hit the headlines this month: Eddystone receivers and call signs. The first brings news from another of those familiar names of days gone by.

Ray Babbage in Melbourne, Victoria pops up with an interesting tale: "Hello Theo, you may recall me from many years back! (I) think I either spoke with you or corresponded when I was in Vancouver in August 1987. While I am a member of the DX League I do not DX these days -- I use a DR 28 to just surf the waves now and then. I think my last recorded logging was in the early 2000's, maybe 2003/04 but enjoy the Times and scan it monthly for information/people. I moved from Wellington 6 months after my Vancouver visit to Melbourne, but still get back to NZ every couple years now. I'm still in the Aussie work force but that may end in the next 6 months. I was reading Mailbag in the April Times and a comment to Mike Smith of Opunake about Eddystones. I have a working 680X -- got it I think from Bill Huddleston in 1977/78 when I was working in Wellington. I asked Bill about it and said I was interested and 3 days later it arrived on Air NZ from Auckland. It has the original box, speaker, and manual. Back about 1994 I rolled up at the United Airlines' counter in Auckland with this unit (they weigh tonnes) and had a bit of good luck. They put it aboard as passenger's luggage and it cost me nothing to transport. I used it a bit up to about 2000 but except for a few trips out of the storage cupboard, it's remained in the dark. It needs calibration etc. but I live in the inner city ring about St Kilda so reception is nothing flash. I also have a couple of tram lines running past 75 metres away. I see you mentioned Tony Marr/Dene Lynneberg having 680's too. I'm not sure if Ray Crawford in Kingaroy, QLD didn't have one at one stage as well. I am hoping to be in Canada next May, intending to see friends who live in Victoria, the same couple I visited in 1987. Details and time yet to be worked out but the intention is there. I was in NZ for the League's 60th in 2008. While I would like to be at Mangawhai in March next year, I doubt it will happen with Canada on the radar (though I will) get to Bryan's some day soon. Don't think I'm prepared to visit Canada any earlier than May, weather-wise and time-wise. I suspect early May is still a bit chilly in Vancouver. Good DX'ing to you. All the best, mate." (Thanks, Ray. Eddystones and tonnes went hand-inhand – I don't think you'd find any airline willing to be so accommodating these days. A couple of American budget outfits now charge even for carry-on luggage, so don't fly into Bellingham, WA on Allegiant if you're trying to get to BC's capital on the cheap.)

Bryan Clark, Mangawhai chimes in on the same receiver topic: "Your mention in the August column of your Eddystone 750 took me back to my early DX days - my first communications receiver was an Eddystone 840 which cost me (Mum & Dad that is!) 45 pounds. I then moved up to the 750 and finally to the 680X, my favourite Eddystone of all

time. I later sold it to John Knight to fund my upgrade to an Icom ICR70, but in later years bought another 680X for nostalaic reasons. It sits in the shack waiting to be resurrected. I'll never forget the time of our DXpedition to East Cape when Robin Chambers and Bill Woller caught the first traces of Saudi Arabia 1521 fading in around 0315 UTC on their respective 680X's. My Drake SPR4 didn't produce any audio till a little later. According to the Americans, that MW lonapath reception is a DX world record. Ah, those were the days, but for me there's still exciting DX to be had - see the broadcast trail for that. August was above average DX-wise with most of my listening from the Americas on medium wave: some nights I could hear stations from Peru in the south right through to Canada and Alaska. Particular hiahliahts were Radio Ya Ya Nicaragua 600 and Radio Guarani Argentina on 1650.13, plus a few previously unheard American and Canadian stations. On shortwave I continue my daily monitoring of the Colombian on 14950.7, Brazil 15191.5 and Argentina on 19 and 25 metres. Quite

a variation in signal levels from day to day. Just one report out to CVC La Voz 17680 final broadcast." (You forgot the Trio 9R-59 in your receiver rundown. Your S750 was the one my Dad financed (£50?). I don't think I ever did pay him back fully. There's a quite active Yahoo! Group: < http://uk.groups.yahoo.com/group/eddystone_radio_users/>)

Douglas Johns, Christchurch resurfaces with another topic that begged an answer: "Been a while since I reported, but after a couple of trips down south, (then) one to Hamilton, and one to Brisbane, all to visit grandchildren, I have QSLs from the following: AM: The Word Hamilton 576 and Christchurch 540, Radio Sport Hamilton 954, and Burn FM Ranfurly 729. FM: NewstalkZB 95.1 Alexandra, Radio Live 94.0 Invercargill and 95.9 Alexandra, Classic Hits 99.9 Alexandra and 98.8 Invercargill, Coast 92.4 Invercargill, Hauraki 93.2 Invercargill, More FM 89.2 Invercargill, ZMFM 95.6 Invercargill, The Rock 98.3 Alexandra 4JAZ 94.1 Surfers Paradise, ABC Classic 106.1 Brisbane, 4MET 105.7 Gold Coast, 4BNE 106.9 Brisbane, Port 93.1 Timaru, Rock 91.5 Timaru, Sound 97.1 and 90.7 Invercargill, Sound 93.8 Hamilton, ZMFM 89.8 Hamilton, Classic Hits 98.6 Hamilton, Radio NZ National 101.1 Hamilton, Raglan Community radio 98.1, Life FM 94.6 Hamilton, NewstalkZB 97.0 Hamilton, Hauraki 96.2 Hamilton, Breeze 99.4 Hamilton. Now a poser - are call signs still valid in NZ? i.e. 2XW used to be Radio Windy 891, and is now The Breeze Wellington, but does it still have the call letters 2XW? Likewise all the NewstalkZB outlets - do they retain their call letters? Interested in your thoughts. And that's it until next time. Regards and keep up the good work." (Always nice to have satisfied contributors, and it looks as if you must have also made a trip to the West Coast with that Karamea verie. As for your query: I asked that of someone somewhere at some time not too many years ago. But for an official reply, I passed the ball to our resident heritage expert. Oh, the Real 'XW wasn't Windy... it was 1XW R. Waikato, but then I'm biased on that account. <grin> At least you just verified its successor, Sport 954.)

David Ricquish, Wellington came back with this information about calls: understand it, the practice of allocating call signs to a broadcaster on AM or FM was discontinued about 10-15 years ago. I think the remaining instances may be registered aircraft, registered marine craft and amateur radio operators. I believe ITU countries can opt out of the call-sign process for various local use categories of their choice and license holders may use whatever identifying means they wish such as a brand name. In the early days of broadcasting, there was much tighter regulation of apparatus and the number relatively small. These days, the proliferation of broadcasting in various forms has simply made it inefficient to maintain registers of call signs except where there is an international dimension to the broadcast [aircraft, marine craft, amateur] and AM [although subject to international interference agreements] and FM are regarded as domestic broadcasts which can be regulated as determined locally. I don't know if that's the official version, but it's my understanding and I stand to be corrected by someone who knows more about the subject than me!" (That makes sense to me, and your raising of the "domestic" aspect would explain what has always happened in many countries. In a way, NZ and Aussie calls as used were/are not exactly true to format anyway: the ZLprefix was missing in Godzone. And across The Ditch, the various transmitters of the ABC's Radio National now seem to go by multiple -RN. Here in the True North, there has always been the seeming renegade use of CB- by Mother Corp that I believe was always explained as "just our business", and nothing to do with north central Chile! I haven't heard an exact CBU Vancouver call on air for years, although all CRTC docs refer precisely to presumed Industry Canada assignments for every little mini-watt relay.)

Ian Cattermole, Blenheim is back from his holiday in Fiji and adds this local colour after I wondered about a small radio: "No, I didn't take any receiver at all so (I'm) unable to confirm definitely that 558 is the only (transmitter still) on AM but did do a quick scan on the hotel room radio and was only able to raise the one on 558. That was in Suva though. We were mainly in Suva and Nadi where we go each year. Actually we will be back there in December for a family reunion which is going to be a big event. Life there as usual (is) pretty quiet and placid, nice place to go but the people in Suva seem to be more each year. I did read somewhere that over 25% of the Fiji population live

in the greater Suva region and I can well believe it. The CBD isn't much larger than in the late 50's when population (was) only about 25,000, now catering for about 8 times that number, hence the crowds. Contrary to what we read I never saw even one army person and life seems happy and quiet. They are now gearing up for the 2014 elections with registration being carried out in public places such as supermarkets etc. All citizens have to register to be able to vote so (it's) quite a large task. I noted that each one is photographed as part of registration, with quite some waiting time at the big supermarket in Suva as they all line up. An in-store coffee bar was right next to the registration area so we watched all this going on several occasions. Here are my SW veries received during July/August: CRI 7305; NHK Sitkunai 6165; REE Cariari 5965 & 9630; WWCR 9350; Gospel For Asia 15215; Bible Voice BC 15300; RDW Kigali 15275 & 11800: RTI Okeechobee 17725: RA 9560: RNW Trincomalee 9800: Radio Vaticana 9580; VOIRI 13780; AWR Wertachtal 15595; BBC Seychelles 17640 & 15490; TWR Africa 6120; VoV Sackville 9555; BBC Meyerton 7310; VoA Iranawila 7485; RFA Tinian 17635; RFA Sitkunai 9400: RRI 21500: RNW Bonaire 12015: AWR Moosbrunn 15150: RHC 6125. 6050, 9810, & 13780; VoV Hanoi 7220; WYFR Nauen 15495, 15160, & 15570; Afia Darfur 9815; VoA Wertachtal 7435; RFE/RL Wertachtal 7355; RNW Wertachtal 6065; RNW Tinian 15650; Radio Marti 11775; HCJB Wertachtal 11920; RNZI 7440; VoKorea 11535; and NHK Kranji 6140 kHz. There they are for this time around – don't expect too many next month though." (Well, even enthusiastic loggers and verifiers have to take a break. Thanks for adding info about Fiji: the 558 situation has real interest far a-field.)

Des Davey, Te Kuiti is trying to wind me up. First the stats: "Reports out to NHK Japan 9695; REE Spain 6055, 9535, 9620, 7275, 9570, 9535, & 15160; and VoA 7575 kHz. QSL's to hand are from CRI China 9470, 7325, and 6020 kHz. Well, spring is all about us here now – glad to see winter behind us too. Happy DX to you – I suppose it's almost your winter season – 73's." (Ouch! Let's not get too carried away... summer doesn't officially end till 22 September. Then there's autumn/fall before grim winter sets in.)

John Durham, Tauranga has an enviable verie from a new Peruvian: "Quiet month QSL-wise with two visits from the postie: R. Netherlands via Wertachal 6065 (final day broadcast) and R. Japan via Palau 11705; and via e-mail, R. Logos Chazuta Peru 4810." (Wow. The Logos verie is impressive. I could swear I've seen a comment from someone bemoaning no reply to a report, but I can't track it down. I must cross-reference my material better. Not only that, but weren't you one of the earliest to catch R. Hargeisa in Somaliland on 7120?)

Now from overseas: <u>Günter Jacob in Passau</u>, <u>Germany</u> still looks for answers to those roaming reports: "Two months ago, I sent a letter to the Directorate of RCI in Montreal with my thanks for the variety of interesting programs that it was always a pleasure for listeners to tune in. But I also tried to express my feelings after the close-down of transmissions via Sackville; I wrote: 'When you receive this letter, Radio Canada International is no longer on the air for its worldwide audience. RCI's shortwave transmissions from Sackville have stopped, and I myself will never forget how they encouraged me - as a boy of 14 years - to become a shortwave listener. They widened my horizon of a large country across the Atlantic, and they aroused my enthusiasm as a listener to world band

radio and collector of QSL verifications. I remember the names of Gerd Peter Pick, Vera Hirschmann, Max Fleck, Margaret Schweykowsky, Gunther Michelson, Walter Roome. My first reception report was sent to the German Program in Montreal, from where I received the first QSL card in my collection for the reception of CKCS on 15.32 Mc/s. Those were the days!' I also mentioned in my letter that between 1955 and 2003, 52 QSL cards arrived from Canada and were added to my growing collection. In order to participate in club contests/competitions, after 2004 I could only receive verifications for "Sackville/CAN" by reporting to other broadcasters with programs relayed via Sackville: China Radio International verified Sackville on 11 frequencies, Deutsche Welle on 3, Radio Japan on 2, and other broadcasters verifying SAC/CAN for their relayed transmissions were Austrian Radio (1), Radio Sweden (1), Vatican Radio (1), Voice of Turkey (1). When I made an attempt at finally aetting RCI QSL cards before sign-off, in May I was told: Thank you very much for your e-mail of the 9th with your reception report. Your QSL letter is being mailed this afternoon. (We have run out of QSL cards and, given the situation at RCI these days, we will not be getting more printed.) As for your older reports, the problem is that we do not have access to the files of program details from 2004 and 2005, so we are therefore unable to verify those reports at this time.' Michael Pütz of Media Broadcast GmbH, Cologne, informed me that they do not send cards by mail any more, however reception reports are verified by eQSLs. It seems that only Michael Pütz and Walter Brodowsky are doing the whole job there nowadays. These 24 eQSLs were received three weeks ago: Nauen (6010, 9695, 9800, 9810, 11955, 11995, 13615, 13630, 13645, 13655, 13700, 13740, 15315), Wertachtal (9840, 11690, 11935, 13605, 13655, 15325, 15470), Issoudun (13660, 13790), Trincomalee (13735), Montsinéry (11830). Family Radio sent these cards: Ascension (11615, 12070), Meyerton (5905), Almaty (7590), Abu Dhabi (11850), Okeechobee (6115),"

And a short but sweet note from <u>Jerry Berg in Lexington</u>, <u>MA</u> for one QSL being: NETHERLANDS 6165 RN-Bonaire, a card showing raindrops falling in water, 'Final EGlanguage Broadcast, June 29, 2012' on the front; full-data on the back. 7 weeks by postal mail for e-report.

Finally, there's yolk on my face but with a radio scramble (I don't think you can twist an egg): the day before column deadline, I had peddled my bike down to and around Vancouver's Stanley Park, about 15km from home. As I wasn't willing to huff back uphill, I was waiting for the trolley bus home when approached by a couple for tourist info. After a short conversation, I thought I was sure they were Aussies. Not so, embarrassingly, as they admitted to being from Wellington. After apology and explanation from me, they volunteered that they lived in a new subdivision above Kenepuru so I said, "Oh, you look right across at RNZ's transmitters." Yairs, was the answer, and the gent commented that locals are remarking that the towers have recently sprouted red flashing lights. Really? Even he seemed surprised that as possible air navigational hazards, tower lights hadn't been operational before. Mr Lynneberg: any explanation from your perch in Pukerua Bay, or are you too low?

Till October, listen well, and then spill more beans to share with the rest of us.

Radio Melody, which has also been known as Radio América, is being heard on 1629.83 with relays of Cadena 3 at nights. Cadena 3 comes from LV3 Radio Córdoba "AM70" and FM. (Henrik Klemetz via Real DX Yahoo Group) Radio Hosanna AM 1640 from Buenos Aires, Argentina is silent for some time, because their 50 meter high antenna fell over in the storm on 4th of April. The station has Facebook page at facebook.com/Hosanna1640. ((Ernesto Ruiz Diaz, Radio Hosanna via Jyrki Hytönen, Finland via IRCA)

Radio Guaraní has moved from 1640 to 1650. Heard in Belgium by Maurits van Driessche on 1650.13 and identification confirmed by Henrik Klemetz. (via Real DX Yahoo Group)



I would hear unusual Yanks between 9.30pm and midnight. WAKR 1590 was the first indication of US reception and the lower frequencies would open up. Several times Philippine stations overrode NZ and Australians during auroras." Hope your neighbourhood QRM stays away for a good while Keith!

BRYAN CLARK Mangawhai focussed his DX efforts on MW during August and was impressed with the number of previously unheard Yanks that he was able to pull through, as well as new catches from Nicaragua (600) and Argentina (1650). They advise that the 1kw AM signal on 1548Khz will close and it is expected that, at some point, a government-funded radio station, operating on FM will launch. The shortwave broadcasting mast has been dismantled by Cable & Wireless, but there is discussion with local ham operators to see if they can lash up something for their final broadcast so they can get on Shortwave. Forced from the site by interference from the neighbouring Wind Farm, the Quartz Hill User Group has been unable to find an alternative ham DX contesting site that met their demanding criteria for a low noise, accessible and large site capable of accommodating Vee Beam antennas for HF DXing.

BBC 90 YEARS CELEBRATION The BBC has announced plans for an unpreced-ented global simulcast across its radio networks including every UK station (local, network and national) and many World Service outlets to mark 90 years of radio. The simultaneous broadcast, called Radio Reunited, will take place on Wednesday 14 November at 1733 UTC - 90 years since the first broadcast from the British Broadcasting Company in 1922 - to a potential global audience of 120 million people across every inhabited continent. IS SWL DEAD?

I recently posed this question to the subscribers to the DX League's "DX Dialog"* e-mail group.

This is the question; "I would be interested in your thoughts about the future of the SWL hobby.

With so many international broadcasters discontinuing or severely curtailing transmissions, what are the dedicated SWLers amongst us finding to listen to? Have you spent more time on the utility bands, targeting domestic SW stations? Or maybe the internet, TV and other pursuits? Are you noticing the bands relatively empty? And how are the hard-core DXers, those that chase hard-to-hear and often domestic SW broadcasts faring? Have the gaps in the bands provided ample opportunity to hear stations previously smothered by the "big boys"? And what will happen to all those transmitters and antennas currently laying idle or under-utilised???? Be interesting to hear your thoughts."

Now, time for a definition. "SWL" refers to listening to radio stations for the program, whether its the news, music, politics or special interest programming. This for the most part refers to the major international broadcasters, i.e. Radio Australia, Voice of America, BBC etc...

And I've picked the interesting points out of the responses:

"Noise has mainly forced me off shortwave except for the limited amount of listening using a portable. From home most of my activity has been chasing after satellites." As regards shortwave, I think there will always be stations to hear and there is always the possibility - albeit remote that the broadcasters will realise that despite limitations, it is a better medium than the high tech solutions in use today. One thing that I have found is that many of the BBC World Service satellite feeds are part of a pay TV package or that they are on C Band which means that access is further restricted."

"From a North American perspective, both "cable" in its various forms and high-speed internet access are so ubiquitous that The Beeb knows full well its availability is infinitely greater here than it probably ever was for SW. In the Excited States, NPR stations carry multi hours of BBC stuff. In Metro Vancouver, trad. cable and the newer IP TV service from the major telco both have BBC World as part of fairly basic subscribed service, and penetration is probably well into the 90% range of households. I noticed the other day that we have a 24-hour Russian news service (in English) as basic! The telco provides a wi-fi modem for free, so all The Beeb's various radio services are available streamed, along with any other broadcaster, without being tied to a PC while at home. Admittedly, radio on the go is difficult but inclusive smart phone data plans are dirt cheap now, so again web-based streaming is right there -- a neat app I use (Tune-In) works just as well as a radio whether I'm listening to local CKNW/980, RNZ National, The Beeb, or my current quirk "Jacaranda Afrikaanse" from Pretoria. Is SW dead? Probably not, certainly not for me -- I'm lucky that my location even though vertical along with all the electronic

toys nearby remains very quiet. I still get a kick out of catching domestic broadcasters wherever they might be: so checking for Mauritania or Zanzibar or the Northern Territory or an Indian regional while grumbling about the CBC's incompetence on 6160 is worthwhile "

"I must admit that, with many of my shortwave favourites like Radio Netherlands, RCI, SRI, Radio Sweden now gone, I did fear that shortwave listening and our hobby did not have much of a future. Certainly SWLs have much less to try for, but for DXers there are still plenty of opportunities and perhaps for the DX League this is taking us back to our roots as primarily a DX group, focussed on tuning into exotic foreign and domestic broadcasts, not just shortwave but also medium wave. In the past few months we have had new 'domestic' SW operations from Colombia, PNG (shortlived), Uruguay and Somalia; a new high-powered operation from Bangladesh. A number of low powered SW operations from Germany and Scandinavia have created new challenges. And yes Paul, the departure of major shortwave broadcasters has definitely opened up frequencies and better chances to hear the more exotic operations. As long as Africa and South America are using shortwave frequencies, I will be happy. Unfortunately increased electronic interference has probably been the last straw for some hobbyists in urban areas, so the DXpedition may be the only way many of our members can relive their past DX highs.

"I would concur with others, there is little targeted our way any more so in terms of programme listening beyond Radio Australia I don't listen for content on SW any more. Urban living has killed DX alas for me, so only DX properly when or if I can get to a rural setting. It is getting harder and harder to find such spots even in our coastal country."

"I have noticed a drop in loggings for the Below 9 Section over the past few months. Activity is not as high as it was. I am plagued with noise myself, from TVs, Set top boxes, Plasma TVs etc. Bearings from my place to Sth America go directly through Coast Radio which makes it almost impossible to log anything in Sth America. This leaves me with CRI, CNR, WWCR and other relig broadcasters. I sometimes pick up the 3 ZL8 stns along with PNG. As a SWL rather than a Dxer, I find that SW has little to offer me now – I can hear most countries on the Internet. I keep listening to see what's there but am not as enthusiastic as I was 20 years ago."

even fewer each month or so. Seems that all we will soon have is Asia. Sad to say bit it seems to me that DX clubs will cease to exist within a very few years. With those sad comments I rest my case."

"Gidday all. Interesting discussion - I find myself gravitating towards the bottom of the SW bands because MW noise is getting difficult - given that I was inactive for many years while raising a family and losing space for a decent antenna! I sometimes drive to a close by coastal paddock where there are disused electric fences, drive in an earth peg and find a wire that's reasonably intact, but it gets cold, dark, and people give you funny looks as they walk past on the walkway! I think it's a good thing if the hobby gets back to it's roots - winkling out the hard signals. DX is still distance - by natural propagation. I use the same Tune In app that Theo mentioned - great for interest's sake, but it's not the same as straining to hear that elusive ID fade up out of the ether. It's just that the height of the bar has changed - downwards. What used to be a good catch is now a great one. The MW frequencies are chocka with locals - particularly here in Taranaki where every NZ station seems to crash into whatever antenna is up. X Band Aussies are much the same. I guess the challenges are still there - finding the uncommon among the usuals."

"Oh yes DXing 60 metres in the 70's and 80's what a field day we had !! I have cassettes full of Latins on SW and MW dating back to the 70's which some day I'll dump to CD, and some quite rare QSL's. Nowadays the transmitter of origin for the 'powerful' is rarely in the country of programme origination which detracts from the old appeal of hearing a signal from a distant country. The key issue we have as DXers is that the generation running radio stations now will rarely have heard of DXers; any station that wants to be heard will be using efficient equipment that doesn't require monitoring by a listener - or will have in place professional monitors. The priority for small stations is to satisfy their immediate audience with no interest in exotically located listeners. So we serve no useful purpose to a station, and replying to letters that prove we obviously heard them is unlikely to be a priority to an international broadcaster. I haven't reported more than five stations in the last 25 years - my QSL's are on tape (snip). Nowadays - I keep my ear trumpet on below 6 mHz and MW, enjoy the 1 kw Mexicans on the internet via Shoutcast; tune the rx on DX Tuners and on wet days replay the cassettes of DX gone by!

August 5, 2012 -- Under "DX History on the Net," we have added some additional websites (marked "New"). (1) Springbok Radio < http://www.springbokradio.com/> This is the site of the "Springbok Radio Preservation Society of South Africa," and is dedicated to preserving the sound archives of Springbok Radio, the commercial service of the South African Broadcasting Corp. It was on the air from 1950 to 1985, and shortwave DXers often heard it, although it left shortwave in 1979, by which time it was widely available on FM. There is a page of photos, plus recordings of ads and programs, the latter often opening with station IDs. The site, which is in both English and Afrikaans, is a reminder of another era, both in radio and politics. -- (2) And speaking of another era, webmaster Chris Turner reminds us that his site, the LM Radio Museum and Sound Archive < http://www.lmradio.org/> has been updated with a grand, 2+ hour audio history of LM Radio. Spend some time at this site and you will be rewarded with some very entertaining and educational material. Thanks, Chris. -- (3) Eastern Arctic Patrol < http://speeches.empireclub.org/60725/data?n=7> Not principally about radio, this interesting 1940 speech to the Empire Club of Canada about the Canadian Arctic mentions the "Northern Messenger" program and some other Arctic-related aspects of radio. Thanks to Harold Sellers for the reference. -- (4) Stations of Equatorial Guinea < http://bioko.net/galeriaFA/> This Spanish-language website is not limited to radio, but if you click on "Search" and then enter "radio" you will be treated to some 61 rare photographs of Radio Santa Isabel, Radio Ecuatorial, and even the ill-fated Radio Atlantica of 1947, which never came to air. And while you're thinking Equatorial Guinea, go to < http://mediateca.fundacion.telefonica.com/visor.asp?e7473-a14287> and hear (and watch) a talk entitled "The Real History of Radio Atlantica." (The presentation is sometimes a little halting.) -- (5) Radio Andorra < http://f5nsl.free.fr/andorre/amenuen.html> Though long gone from shortwave, the friendly sound of Radio Andorra became well known to many SWLs when it returned to shortwave during the years 1976-1981. This website has collected much information about the station. Unfortunately for most of us, the bulk of the content is in French, with a smattering of English and Spanish. However, the recordings will conjure up pleasant memories for anyone who used to hear the station. There are also links to other websites, also in French, about Radio Andorra. -- Also: Under "Specialized Resources," some new "Wavescan" stories have been added: (1) "The Greatest Mystery in the History of Aviation: What Happened to Amelia Earhart? Pt. 2: Radio Messages from the Crash Site." (July 15, 2012); (2) "Falklands Radio Anniversary-2: The Radio Story in Argentina" (July

22, 2012); and (3) "Radio Broadcasting in Ceylon-7: Radio SEAC Colombo Takes to the Air!" (July 29, 2012).

August 12, 2012 -- This time, under "DX History/Lists, Logs, Guides & Columns," you will find a scan of a March 1935 supplement to Radio Pictorial, a weekly British radio magazine. The inside of the supplement contains a map of the major mediumwave stations in the U.K. and continental Europe at the time. There is a list of locations and wavelengths on the back, and pictures of station personalities on the cover. This item is best viewed by setting your Adobe reader to one of the "side-byside" viewing modes. -- And under "Specialized Resources/Wavescan," you will find another entry from Adrian Peterson: "Falkland Islands Radio Anniversary-3: The Radio Story in England" (August 5, 2012).

August 19, 2012 -- If you were DXing in the 1950s-60s, you were probably a member of the Newark News Radio Club, and you will probably recall the name of LeRoy Waite of Ballston Spa, New York. Roy was the amateur section editor from 1952 to 1969, although he did some SWBC DXing as well. We have posted a small tribute to Roy under "DX History/People." Included in the items posted are the first and last amateur sections that Roy edited. Roy had to give up the column in 1969 following a stroke, but he remained a club member. He passed away in 1983. -- Also, under "Specialized Resources," "Wavescan," there is a new entry from Adrian Peterson: "The 100th Anniversary of an Almost Forgotten American Wireless Station [2XI]: Pt. 1" (August 12, 2012).

August 26, 2012 -- Tons of "radio logs," containing station listings, were published during the 1920s, 30s and 40s. This time, under "DX History/Lists, Logs, Guides & Columns," we have posted the 1936 Philco Radio Log (prepared by the Haynes Radio Log), which contains the usual things--lists of stations, in this case standard broadcast, SWBC and police channels--plus a few other things: an offer of a year's worth of the bi-weekly Chicago Short Wave Radio Club bulletin, and 2-1/2 years worth of updates to the Philco Radio Log, both for \$2; major league baseball dates; presidential electoral results for 1928 and 1932 and blanks for 1936; and (no surprise) a centerfold ad for "The New 1937 Philco with the built-in Philco Foreign Tuning System" (color-coded bandspread dial). The log's size is 4-1/4 x 6-1/2". -- And under "Specialized Resources," "Wavescan," a new entry: "Schenectady on Shortwave, Pt. 2: The Voice of Electricity" (August 26, 2012).

September 2, 2012 -- Under "Specialized Resources," "Radio Postcards," we have posted some more postcard views of AM stations (and two TV), this time in Missouri. The stations are (from top to bottom in the file): (1) and (2), two views of KMBC, located in the Pickwick Hotel, Kansas City, where the station occupied the entire 11th floor and guests could watch broadcasting in operation; (3) Mutual Broadcasting System station KWOC, Poplar Bluffs; (4) a postcard drawing of KSGM, St. Genevieve; (5) and (6), two views of Lutheran station KFUO, Concordia Seminary, St. Louis; (7) and (8), day and night views of KMOX, St. Louis; (9) KFVE, Hotel Chase, St. Louis; (10) KGBX, Springfield;

and two TV towers, (11) KFVS-TV, Cape Girardeau, 1,675 feet tall, and (12) KCMO-TV, Kansas City, 1,042 feet tall (and lighted nightly by 1,360 25-watt bulbs). -- We have also updated the URLs in our "DX History on the Net" page, and deleted sites that are no longer available. -- And we have posted a new entry from Adrian Peterson under "Specialized Resources," "Wavescan": "Schenectady on Shortwave, Pt. 2: The Voice of Electricity" (August 26, 2012).
