Our station is erected in the center of the city of San Juan, Puerto Rico, the Island of Enchantment

Its equipment consist of a Western Electric 500 Watts installation.

The Radio Corporation of Puerto Rico is affiliated with the International Telephone & Telegraph Corporation of New York.

At the present time we are broadcasting every Monday from 8:30 to 10:00 P. M., Wednesdays from 8 to 9:30 P. M., Saturdays 10:30 to 11:00 P. M. (One hour earlier than Eastern Standard Time.)

The distance from San Juan to New York is 1380 miles, to Chicago 2000 miles; to Denver 2600 miles; to San Francisco 3400 miles; to Schecoeslovaquia 5937 miles; to Madrid 4440 miles; to Glasgow 4922 miles approximately.

We are always glad to receive letters or cards from our listeners relative to the programs and it is our hope that you will have the greatest success in receiving WKAQ and we thank for your interest.

Our next test program will be broadcast on March 23 from 4:30 to 6:30 AM, P. R. Time.
