Dear Kermit:

I am very pleased to be able to confirm your most interesting DX report. To date we have received some sixty replies from listeners on our special DX program of January 12, 1953. It is indeed gratifying to hear from so many widely scattered points in the United States and Canada.

For the benefit of those of you who did not get all of the technical data presented on the program, it is herewith repeated.

CKXL operates on a frequency of 1140 kc/s twenty-four hours per day, except on Sunday when we are closed down from approximately 12:10 a.m. M.S.T. until 6:00 a.m. M.S.T. for maintenance.

The station utilizes an RCA 1000 Watt transmitter and employs a non-directional daytime pattern, switching to a directional pattern at night. The directional array is achieved by the use of two towers approximately 200 feet high, spaced one-half wavelength apart, and oriented on a line running 35 degrees west of due north. The pattern is pulled in from the directions, east by south-east, and from the south-west, affording protection to the co-channel stations.

Our co-channel neighbors are: KGDM, Stockton, California, 5000 watts; KSOO, Sioux Falls, South Dakota, 10000 - 5000 watts; WRVA, Richmond, Virginia, 50,000 watts; XENT, Neuvo Laredo, Mexico, 50000 watts.

We are sending you a booklet describing Calgary, "The City with Everything Under the Sun," where every year one of the largest and most colorful rodeos in the world, The Calgary Stampede, is staged. This event covers a full week and during this time the whole city goes 'western'. We hope you enjoy reading this booklet but better still, why not visit us Stampede Week which this year is being held July 6 to 11 inclusive? We feel sure you won't be disappointed in what you see and hear and will thoroughly enjoy our western hospitality.

We hope you had as much fun listening to our DX program as we had airing it for you.

On behalf of the management and staff of CKXL, I would like to extend all of our best wishes to the National Radio Club in general and you DX fans in particular. Good hunting.

Dear Mr. Geary:

This is to verify your report of reception of CJOC on November 25th, 1944, from 11:05 p.m. Mountain War Time until Sign Off at approximately 11:37 p.m.

Our transmitter is a R.C.A. model 1 K which delivers 1000 watts of power to the antenna. The antenna is $1/6$ wave length, vertical type, grounded. The ground system consists of 120 radials $1/2$ wave length, running their length radially from the tower and buried about ten inches under ground.

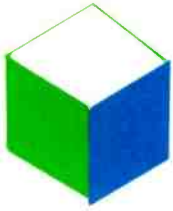

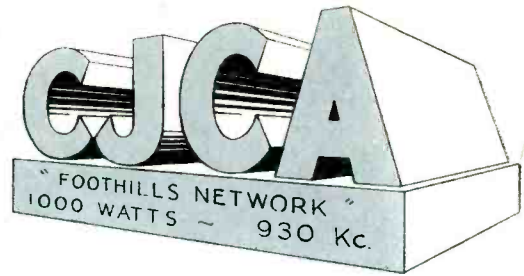

Dear Kermit Geary:

We wish to acknowledge your letter of October 13th and confirm your reception of our station.

It was certainly CHED that you heard, as your log checks quite accurately with our log. We were delighted to hear that our signal carries so far, since we only operate on 1000 watts and are on the same frequency as Dallas, Texas, with their 50,000 watts. Our transmitter is operated by remote control and is located one mile east and one mile south of our City limits.

CHED began broadcasting on a regular schedule at 8:00p.m. March 3rd of this year. We operate one a 24-hour schedule except on Sunday nights, at which time we sign off at 1:00 a.m. and back on again at 5:00a.m. We have an all-music programming policy except for News and Sports.

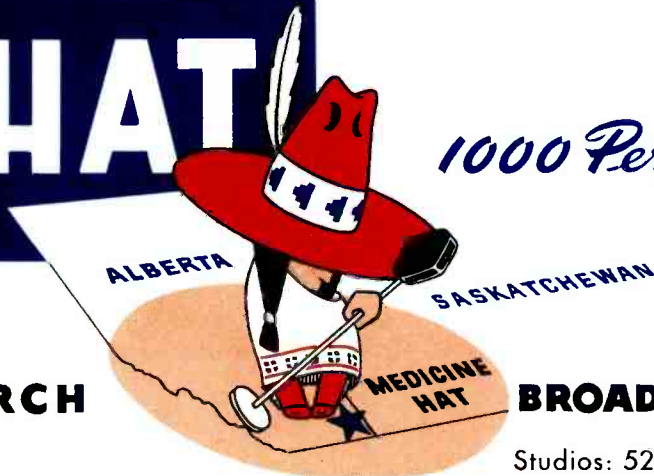

Dear Mr. Geary;

Thank you very much for your excellent report on our DX, also your kind comments about the program and signal quality. It is a pleasure to receive letters such as yours, as we definitely know then that these programs are genuinely appreciated. The boys put a lot of thought into these programs and the music was selected with an eye to having music that would be more easily identified, in the event that the speech might not come through too well at the far distant listeners' posts. It was apparently a good night for a DX show, and the trans-oceanic conditions in particular must have been nearly ideal, as we were heard in Dunedin, New Zealand by Ken A. Mackey. Three years ago, our signal reached N.Z.--Frank Wilson, also of Dunedin logged a good portion of that program. Ken Mackey caught quite a bit of our last one. It's really nice to get these reception reports from the far distant points. While our commercial department claim that they can't sell commercial time in New Zealand (!), it's still nice for us in the engineering to find out how far the signal can go. We're glad to hear that you experienced no trouble in picking us up.

Accordingly, please accept this as a letter of confirmation, which we are happy to be able to send to you.

CHAT has it's own studio building, with three studios, two control rooms, extensive recording equipment and a 'stable' of remote gear. We have 23 people on the staff now, including four of us in the engineering. Our transmitter is on the #1 highway, soon to be the new Trans-Canada Highway.


